INTRODUCING CHILD-FRIENDLY SCHOOLWIDE LEARNER OBJECTIVES (SLOS) IN EARLY YEARS

At Charter, our Schoolwide Learner Objectives (SLOs) are at the heart of our teaching and learning. But how can we introduce these important values to our youngest learners in a way they can understand?

Our Early Years team worked together to see the SLOs through the eyes and ears of our students. We developed child-friendly language that makes these core values easy to integrate into daily teaching and meaningful for our learners.

Since the Charter emblem features a unicorn, the new Early Years SLOs are represented by colour-coded versions of this mythical creature. Each uniquely coloured unicorn embodies an essential value, making it fun and engaging for young learners to connect with and remember these important principles.

The Early Years SLOs are:

"We are kind and helpful" - Representing a Responsible Citizen

"We are curious" - Representing a Critical Thinker

"We care about others and the world" - Representing an Internationally Minded Learner

"We try our best" - Representing an Academically Successful Student

"We take turns to talk and listen" – Representing an Effective Communicator

The children in Early Years are already engaging with these newly introduced SLOs. They will be celebrated in our Star of the Week certificates and reinforced through child-friendly stories in our weekly assemblies, helping to embed these values in a meaningful and memorable way.







YEAR 1 THAI TFL

In this lesson, TFL1, students learn how to call different shapes in Thai. They explore names for shapes like circle, square, triangle, and more. After that, they have fun creating various objects using these shapes while practicing their Thai. This activity will help students connect language and creativity, while learning Thai.




BIOLOGY OLYMPIAD SUCCESS!

ENGLISH LESSON

All key stages have been busy in their English lessons by enhancing their critical thinking and independent learning skills through active learning!

In Year 7, Miss Carter's students have been given evidence to consider which Shakespeare characters are victims and or villains, ahead of defending the characters in a 'court case.'

In Year 8, students have been working on their creative writing skills by crafting effective devices. Students have engaged in a sensory imagery carousel based on an image stimulus to develop ideas for narrative descriptions.

In second language iGCSE lessons, students created their own questions about zoos for their Animals topic. In groups, students rotated around the room, answering each other's questions to develop their ideas for For and Against arguments. Next, students will read zoo related articles, write reviews about their experiences of zoos and present a speech to their peers to practise their speaking and listening skills.





BRIGHTON COLLEGE MEDICAL CONFERENCE

This week, a group of Year 11 and 12 students attended a bespoke medical conference at Brighton College, designed for those pursuing medical careers. The event offered insight into the application process and the tough decisions doctors face daily—and it certainly delivered.

The day began with a keynote by Dr. Andy Schillinger, a physiotherapist with 30 years of experience in national football teams. Joonki in Year 12 found his talk on sports and medicine fascinating.

Students then attended a session on developing their Thai university portfolios, receiving advice from top-trained doctors and reviewing portfolios from graduating students.

A medical ethics carousel tested students' decision-making skills. They explored the four pillars of ethics and debated challenging scenarios with peers from other schools. I was impressed by their maturity and collaboration.

A highlight of the afternoon was a talk on the UK university admissions process, with Imperial College London providing key insights. Jao Sua in Year 11 found the additional admissions testing information particularly informative.

The day concluded with Multiple Mini Interviews (MMIs), where students tackled four-minute tasks under professional observation. They showcased strong decision-making and collaboration, leaving the event enriched and inspired. It was an insightful and rewarding experience for all.
