Joining a School Band

It's that time of year when students are deciding wether or not to join the school band for next year. Here is some information that might be helpful.

From selecting the right instrument to learning to read music, being in band can enhance a student's education. Even children with no musical background can join their school's band. How is this possible? It's because all the basic aspects of playing a musical instrument and reading musical notation are taught at school. No one can predict whether a child will have musical ability, but even those whose parents are not musical have a chance of success. The most critical factors in whether a child will do well are regular practicing and desire.



Selecting an instrument – Selecting the right instrument is an essential part of joining a band class. Band directors will consider the student's preferences, musical aptitude, and physical characteristics before recommending the most appropriate band instruments for each student. The flute, clarinet, saxophone, trumpet, french horn, trombone, baritone, tuba, and percussion are good choices for beginners.

Band instruments can be purchased from local musical instrument dealers or online. Prices vary widely depending on the level of quality. Beginners should select lowerpriced, entry-level instruments. Upgrading to better quality instruments should the students have a gift for music can

always be done later. Those with a keen interest in improving their skills can take private music lessons to supplement the school instruction.

Band can be time-consuming – Students who also wish to participate in sports may experience schedule conflicts if they sign up for band. Both sports and band are time-consuming activities. Before a student registers for band, his or her parents need to consider the child's other needs and activities, including studying and time for fun. Like other music courses, band is an elective. In addition to the time spent in class, students will also be expected to attend rehearsals and performances outside of school hours.

Sheet music is the road map – Learning to read music is an essential part of the band experience. The songs to be played are written in musical notation on paper which is called sheet music. The way the information is put on the page determines what notes will be played, for how long and how loudly.

The composer records his intentions on the sheet music, and the conductor leads the musicians in the proper interpretation of those intentions. Not every conductor sees the music the same way. Recordings of the same music by different conductors will have subtle variations in the way the music is played even though the sheet music used was the same.

While musicians may have their own ideas about how to play the music, when they are in a band, they are expected to follow the directions of the conductor. If all the musicians went their own ways, the audience would hear a mishmash of sound instead of music. However, going rogue on your own is a GOOD thing. When you start to play your own music, that is when the world of music truly opens its doors to you! Go with the flow, practice and, most of all... HAVE FUN!



May is "Foster Care Month" - What Does It Mean to Foster a Child?

Webster's II New Riverside Dictionary defines "foster" as: "1. To bring up: nurture. 2. To cultivate and encourage. Giving or receiving parental care though not related through blood or legal ties."

A lot of nurturing, culturing and encouragement goes hand-in-hand with raising a foster child. There's also a lot of paperwork and meetings, but above all, being a foster parent means providing a

child with new opportunities that he may not have had otherwise.

Fostering a Child Means:

- * Mentoring the birth family and helping with the family reunification process.
- * Taking a foster child trick-or-treating for the first time.
- * Showing a foster child his first fireworks on a 4th of July.
- * Helping a foster child graduate from high school and set a goal to attend college or a vocational school.
- * Baking a foster child's first birthday cake, even though he's turning eight.
- Sharing some summer fun with a child who has never run through a sprinkler before.
- Maintaining connections with a past foster child who is now parenting her own child and doesn't mind you being a grandparent figure.
- Encouraging a foster child to rise above the issues of his past and move on with life

How to Become a Foster Parent

- * The rules for fostering a child are set by state law so they can vary, but becoming a foster parent almost always begins with a visit to the appropriate legal division in your state. You'll have to complete an application, but many states make these available online. The application will provide general details about your family and your home, and it may ask why you want to foster a child. You might be given an opportunity to state whether you'd prefer an infant, a toddler or an older child-even a teenager.
- Submitting an application is usually followed by an orientation class or a series of classes. You'll attend with others who want to become foster parents. It's a group thing, not a one-on-one lecture, and it's not just instruction. You can ask questions to get a feel for the kind of relationship you're about to embark on and to express any concerns you may have.
- Foster parenting almost invariably involves a home study. A social worker will come to your residence to meet with you and other family members and to make sure that your home is safe and nurturing. Your religion, race, gender, and marital status are not judged and are not considerations, although your age is a factor to some extent—you must usually be over 21 years old. Home studies can involve as many as five or 10 visits.

The Prospect of Letting Go

You might also have to learn about letting go eventually. The underlying goal of foster care is always to reunite the child with his birth parent or parents. Some behavior or incident led to the child being removed from his home, and the state will work toward fixing that problem so the family can be reunified. Sometimes that's just not possible, however, and the child is placed for adoption. Foster parents are often given the first opportunity to adopt, but if you decide against it for some reason, the child will be relocated to a new home.

American Barbecue - A Long Tradition



American barbecue is firmly ingrained into our history. The word barbecue instantly makes you think of the United States. However, BBQ is a passionate factor in the southern states more than any other place. Its foundation dates back before the Civil War. Hence, the history of American barbecue is practically the history of America itself.

Even though the history of American barbecue began in the south, there is no single taste prevailing there. The taste, ingredients used, and sometimes the cooking process varies from not only state to state, but even town to town. Let's review it by region by dividing it into the South, East Coast, and Central South sections.

SOUTH - They usually use mutton and beef cooked only in the slow cooking method. This is not at all what the original barbecue used to be made of. The South also has an extensive assortment of BBQ sauces to go with their bar-b-q. These sauces range from a mild sweet tomato sauce to blazing red-hot.

EAST COAST - They hold on to its original beginnings and use pork for its BBQ meat and vinegar sauces. The vinegar sauces have several variations that are rich in tomato or a yellow mustard-based sauce. Traditional favorite side dishes are coleslaw, hushpuppies, bread, stew or hash with rice.

CENTRAL SOUTH - They use pork like the East Coast but cut it differently - instead of being chopped, it is pulled. The meat is slow cooked, shredded by hand and covered with generous amounts of sauce. The pork ribs are greased with sauce or covered with a blend of intense spices before pit cooking. The sauce here is a sweet tomato one with a hint of pepper and molasses. It is generally served with coleslaw, French fries, baked beans, and combread. Further in the west, beef is preferred over pork.

The history of American barbecue tells a tale that has modified itself with the times. Even today, it would be beneficial to visit any of the Southern states if you want a bite of the all-original American barbecue.

Given that May is National Barbecue Month, you should go out and celebrate! Just don't forget the wet naps or a change of clothes. Enjoy!

Animals That Give the Weather Report

There are other animals out there in the animal kingdom that are believed to be able to predict the weather other than groundhogs! AND, they do it all year long! Some humans look to these animals for signs that the weather might change.Which animals, you ask?

Frogs

<u>Sheep</u>

<u>Ants</u>

<u>Elephants</u>
