

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

Why do people ride Horses? Why do people choose to teach it?

Foxberry Farm is an equestrian facility in Dallas, Georgia teaching the sport of Eventing which is an English discipline involving 3-phases of riding – dressage, crosscountry jumping and stadium jumping. Becoming a trainer is not a typical career path, but it is an exciting and fulfilling one. In addition, riding is an activity that benefits a person's life and can be enjoyed for a lifetime.

Alison Cochran is one of the trainers at Foxberry Farm, and she has been a trainer for 32 years. Her favorite aspect of being a trainer is the kids. She says, "I enjoy seeing their growth, seeing their excitement and encouraging them through their failures, and helping them sort of see all that they are." This is a great example of how dedicated these trainers are to their students.

Kim Abernathy, Foxberry Farm owner and trainer, decided she wanted to be a trainer because she never took lessons when she was younger, but was a 'barn rat' always "helping everybody else and ... cleaning stalls." She recalls, "I can remember looking out the stall window watching the coaches, and then as I got older, I thought I'm going to do that one day," and so then I did. Just as Kim watched through that stall window and was inspired to pursue a career with horses, most individuals are influenced by the people around them.

Abernathy has been a trainer for 23 years. She believes that working with horses teaches three essential life skills:

- a good work ethic because horses are a lot of work
- good time management because barn time doesn't go the same as normal time – barn time goes by way fast
- perseverance because things don't always go right

If Foxberry Farm's trainers are the heart of their riding program, then its riders are the lifeblood of the program. Hadley Heller, 15, has been riding for around six years. She says that what she loves about riding is "the competing aspect of it because I'm really competitive and I just like competing with my friends." Like many sports, the competition aspect of Eventing is definitely one of the best parts; it is what makes sports fun. Kintizing Bounds, 14, has nine years of riding experience and believes that riding can benefit a person. She says, "It's definitely kinda therapeutic... it does become a de-stressor for me like lots of the time." Bounds expands on the idea that riding horses can be beneficial to your mental health just like many other sports. Evelyn Dampier, 14, has been riding for about ten years and she explained that she got involved in the sport because her "neighbor actually had toy horses that I became obsessed with and she soon got me into riding."

All of these riders work very hard to balance their own lives with their training and riding commitments. A typical week at the barn for a competing equestrian is a five-day commitment. For most of these riders, this is a passion sport. They have fallen in love with the community it creates, their horses, and the benefits it provides. So, for them, time spent at the barn is the best time because it is filled with joy, connection, and horses.

DRESSAGE

Turn the Saddle, NOT the Bridle!

Have you ever heard the phrase "taking the reins" used to mean taking control of something? Yeah, I bet all the time! It's a pretty common phrase! Well, next time someone says that to you, tell them the whole of the English-speaking world has been working under a misapprehension about the reins!

Sure, reins are important, but they're part of a MUCH bigger equation! If you want to turn correctly and effectively, you've got to turn with the SADDLE, not the bridle! The saddle is the true steering wheel of your horse.

Most people, if they want to turn left, they just pull the

Ride a Geometric Shape to avoid the drift!

- Instead of expecting a pure circle when learning how to turn through the saddle, turn in tiny increments instead.
- Give the aids to turn as above,
- Then ride straight for a few strides.
- Then turn again.
- This will result in a pentagonal or hexagonal shape, but as your horse learns and you get stronger giving the aid, you will be able to ride a circle.

If you've been bridle turning all your life, these exercises will really help improve the quality of your

left rein, but all this does is take the horse's neck to the inside. This throws them off balance and then they swing their body out to correct this. Then the horse's whole body just falls to the outside.

Sure, you'll get some sort of a turn, but your horse's risk of tripping will be pretty high, and the quality of the turn will be



turns! Have a look at the video and see the difference in Mercurio when we do each turn:

very low. In fact, turn would be a loose term for what really would just be an extended drift! Turning the saddle is the way to avoid this dreaded drift action!

Here's how to "Turn the Saddle" to turn left.

- 1. Have contact with your horse
- 2. Push in with outside upper right thigh.
- 3. Place outside lower leg a little back.
- 4. Push the saddle around the turn

If your horse is a dedicated drifter from years of bridle turning, don't worry, they'll learn! But try this exercise to help teach them the new way of turning gradually.

GDCTA Training Grant Provides for In-Depth and Transforming Instruction

I applied for the GDCTA Training Grant knowing I wanted to aim for a working student position somewhere over the summer where I'd be able to take both of my horses, Mr Panda and Swell Continental, with me. Thankfully, Mary Bess Davis had room for me and my two horses, and I was very lucky to have received the funds from the Training Grant to afford spending two months getting amazing, one-on-one help from Mary Bess. On top of lessons, I learned so much from being able to work in the barn, such as helping with vet and farrier visits, and helping clients look at a sales horse.

After the first few weeks of taking jump and flat lessons with Mary Bess, it was clear I needed to completely reinvent how I was going about jumping both of my horses. This meant rewiring my brain and breaking yearold habits that were ok for the level I was competing, but not any higher. Having had Mr Panda for six years and since he was four years old meant that we had shared habits that we needed to overcome. For forever, I had been under the impression that Panda would jump a course best if I let him have his head, but with careful work under Mary Bess, I learned I was letting him go to the fences with a hollowed frame and therefore any impulsion we created was turning into speed. Swell Continental needed to be put into a collected frame to keep from spooking at the fences, but Mary Bess taught me that I was taking too much from his canter by collecting him without adding leg. So with my two very different geldings, I learned to change the way I was riding them over fences by creating a rounder, more energetic canter on Panda, and being confident enough to put my leg on when coming to a fence on Swell Continental.

Aside from improving and retraining my aids, Mary Bess helped me with my position drastically as well. I had never realized how unstable my lower leg was on the landing off a fence or that I was a bit behind the vertical on the flat. Not only did I learn to keep my lower leg still and to sit up on the vertical, but I learned what these improvements did for my riding and my horses' ways of going. Landing with my calf still in contact with the horse's side allowed for me to ask for them to soften as I landed and with the subtleness of my leg already being there rather than it swinging back into place during the stride after. The most drastic result I felt from a change in my position was Swell Continental's ability to come round through his entire body once I brought my shoulders directly over my hips.

I saw results like this more and more as I spent my time working for and with Mary Bess this past summer, and it was an incredible experience. I am so thankful I was able to afford spending my summer getting such indepth and transforming instruction with both of my horses.
