Rape Accused Granted \$30,000 Bail, Case Moves to Supreme Court

A 44-year-old man facing multiple rape charges has been granted bail and will return to court in December for a sufficiency hearing before the Supreme Court.

Edward Richard Christopher Phillips appeared before a Magistrate on October 6, will know whether or not he will be committed to stand trial on three counts of rape. The court ordered that a sufficiency hearing be held on December 5, 2025, at the Supreme Court.

Phillips, who had initially been remanded in custody, was on Monday granted bail in the sum of \$30,000 with surety.

The charges stem from a report made to police on September 16, 2025. Following that report, investigators launched a probe which culminated in charges being laid on October 1, after consultations with the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions.

When Phillips first appeared before the court earlier this month, bail was

denied, and he was remanded until his return on October 6. During that appearance, prosecutors outlined the allegations, and the defense made an application for his release.

On Monday, the court ruled that Phillips could be released on bail under strict conditions, including the financial bond and surety. The ruling comes as the case now advances to the higher court, where a sufficiency hearing will determine whether the matter proceeds to a full trial.

The case has drawn attention due to the seriousness of the charges. Under local law, rape carries a heavy custodial penalty if a conviction is secured.

The Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions has not commented on the matter beyond confirming that the case is proceeding according to due process. A source at that office told NewslineTCI that they could not comment on an ongoing case.

Police officials have meanwhile reiterated their commitment to investi-

gating sexual offences with urgency and care, urging victims to come forward and make reports without fear. Phillips will next appear in the Supreme Court on December 5, where

prosecutors are expected to present the evidence to support the charges. If the sufficiency hearing determines that the case can proceed, a trial date will be set thereafter.

Traffic Enforcement Officers in Division "B" (Providenciales) have continued their high-visibility efforts to keep roads safe, recording dozens of tickets and several arrests during recent exercises under Operation Impact.

On Wednesday, September 24, 2025, and Friday, October 3, 2025, officers mounted eighty-three (83) traffic checks across the division. These checkpoints targeted unsafe driving practices and non-compliance with road traffic laws, while also providing an opportunity to identify other offences impact-

ing community safety.

The results were significant. Officers issued fifty-two (52) tickets for a wide range of infractions. According to police, the leading causes of citations were excessive window tinting and seatbelt violations, both recording 15 tickets each. Another 11 drivers were penalized for operating unlicensed vehicles, while four (4) motorists were ticketed for improper license plates. Additional violations included:

- Permitting an unlicensed motor vehicle – 1 ticket

- Overcrowding a vehicle – 1 ticket
- Failing to conform to police or road signs – 4 tickets
- Driving on the incorrect side of the road – 1 ticket

Beyond ticketing, officers issued five warnings of intended prosecution, a formal notice that legal proceedings may follow. Police emphasized that this measure is typically used in more serious cases or when investigations are still ongoing.

The operation also uncovered other unlawful activity. In collaboration with immigration authorities, officers detained 15 individuals for immigration-related offences. This highlights the multi-agency approach of Operation Impact, which goes beyond road safety to address broader community concerns.

Police Commend Officers' Work

A spokesperson for the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force praised the Traffic Enforcement Unit for its dedication and professionalism. "These results reflect the hard work of officers who remain committed to reducing road accidents, deterring reckless driving, and maintaining public safety," the spokesperson said.

They added that while issuing tickets and detaining offenders are important aspects of enforcement, the ultimate goal is education and prevention. "Operation Impact is about changing driver behaviour. When motorists obey traffic laws, they not only avoid penalties but also help save lives."

Ongoing Concerns

Authorities have consistently flagged issues such as tinted windows, expired licences, improper road use, and overcrowded vehicles as persistent challenges. Officers stressed that while some motorists view enforcement as an inconvenience, the reality is that road traffic laws are designed for protection.

"Every citation is a reminder that the rules exist to protect drivers, passengers, and pedestrians alike," the spokesperson explained. "Non-compliance puts everyone at risk, whether through collisions, injuries, or worse."

Operation to Continue

Police confirmed that Operation Impact will continue in the weeks ahead, with Division "B" remaining a key focus area. However, motorists across the territory should expect additional checkpoints, increased patrols, and a strong enforcement presence.

Law enforcement is also encouraging the public to embrace compliance as part of a community-wide effort to reduce risks. "Road safety is a shared responsibility," the statement concluded. "By respecting the rules of the road, every driver contributes to making our communities safer."

With 52 tickets issued, 15 immigration detentions, and several prosecutions in progress, officers say the message is clear: unsafe driving and unlawful practices will not be tolerated.

NEW CHAIR APPOINTED TO LEAD INTEGRITY COMMISSION THROUGH NEXT PHASE OF REFORM

Hon. Justice Bernard Turner has been appointed as the new Judicial Member and Chair of the Integrity Commission, which the Governor's Office referred to as an important step in strengthening public integrity and accountability.

Turner was appointed by Her Excellency the Governor, Dileeni Daniel-Selvaratnam after consultation with the Premier Hon. Washington Misick and Leader of the Opposition Hon. Edwin Astwood.

The appointment of Justice Turner was made accordance with Section 3(1)(b) of the Integrity Commission Ordinance, and in line with section 6 (1) of the said ordinance.

Hon. Justice Turner, who currently serves as a Justice of Appeal on the Turks and Caicos Islands Court of Appeal, brings extensive regional and international experience in law, governance and anti-corruption. He has served as an AML/CFT examiner and trainer, a short-term consultant with the International Monetary Fund and Chair of the Commonwealth Working Group on Asset Repatri-

ation.

Justice Turner has also contributed as a designated expert to the Organization of American States Committee on the Implementation of the Corruption Convention.

The appointment follows the conclusion of Justice Lobban-Jackson's term as Chair and judicial member.

In welcoming Turner to the position, the Governor thanked outgoing Chair Justice Tanya Lobban-Jackson for her dedicated service and contribution to strengthening the integrity framework.

"The Effectiveness Review made clear that while the Integrity Commission plays a vital role in upholding ethical standards, important reforms are needed to enhance its effectiveness and public confidence," Daniel-Selvaratnam said.

She added: "I want to acknowledge and thank outgoing Chair, Justice Lobban-Jackson for her committed service and for her leadership in supporting the initiation of the Effectiveness Review,

which has provided a strong foundation for the next phase of reform.

"Under her guidance, the Commission has begun to take forward the review's recommendations, strengthening key areas of its work.

The governor also highlighted the wealth of experience that Justice Turner brings to this new role.

"Justice Turner is strongly positioned to lead the Commission through this next phase, given the depth of experience he brings from his distinguished legal career. With his leadership, I look forward to continued progress in advancing substantively these important reforms and in strengthening public standards of accountability and public confidence in the work of the Commission."

Justice Bernard Turner said he was honoured to be appointed Chair and looked forward to leading the Commission through this period of reform.

"It is an honour to be appointed to this role and to serve the people of the Turks and Caicos Islands through the import-

ant work of the Integrity Commission," he said. "The Effectiveness Review has provided a clear roadmap for improvement, and I am committed to ensuring the Commission implements these reforms to strengthen integrity, accountability and public trust in our institutions."

Future Work Permits Could Require TCI Knowledge Test

The Turks and Caicos Islands government is considering a new policy that could make cultural knowledge of the TCI a requirement for expatriates seeking work permits.

The idea, which is still under discussion, would require applicants recruited from overseas to complete an online training program and pass an assessment before being granted a permit to enter the country. Avi Adams, Director of the Department of Tourism Regulation (DTR), confirmed the move in an interview with NewslineTCI following a meeting with industry stakeholders.

"This proposal is still in the early stages, but it is something we are seriously exploring with the Ministry of Education," Adams said. "If approved, it could be implemented within the next three years. The goal is to ensure that everyone who comes to work in the Turks and Caicos understands our culture, our leadership, and our heritage, and can represent our islands properly to visitors."

Adams was speaking after hosting a Hotelier Stakeholders Meeting at the Department of Environmental and Coastal Resources (DECR) on Tuesday, October 7. The meeting brought together hoteliers and tourism leaders to discuss training standards, regulatory updates, and the broader push to align the industry under one standard of service.

At the heart of the discussion was the TIDES program, which is the acronym for "Together Individuals Delivering Excellent Service." TIDES is a national hospitality training initiative designed to create consistency in the service delivered to visitors across all sectors of the tourism industry. The program includes cultural and heritage modules, ensuring that workers understand the basic civic and historical knowledge often asked about by visitors.

"Too often, we find that people on the frontline of hospitality don't know who the Premier or the Minister of Tourism is, or even the story of our heritage," Adams said. "That cannot continue. If you are representing the Turks and Caicos Islands, you must be an ambassador. That is why everyone who completes the TIDES program will be certified and given an official ambassador card."

The program has already started training beach vendors, taxi drivers, VIP service providers, and other

hospitality workers, but the government's focus now is to ensure hotels, who collectively employ 5,000 to 6,000 people, are fully compliant. The rollout will begin with front-of-house staff before expanding to back-of-house employees.

Still, not everyone in the industry is without concerns. Some hoteliers expressed worries about the cost of the program, especially for larger resorts with hundreds of staff. The training carries a fee of \$50 per person every two years, which Adams described as "a minimal, non-profit cost" to cover administrative expenses like printing certificates and ID cards.

"There will always be those who support the initiative wholeheartedly and others who push back," Adams admitted. "But at the end of the day, the mandate is for all of us to be on the same accord, delivering excellent service. We are prepared to work with businesses on a phased basis if needed, but the training must happen."

Stacy Cox, CEO of the Turks and Caicos Hotel and Tourism Association (TCHTA), praised the direction of the program, though she also raised financial considerations.

"Training on this level helps us to create a culture of service that extends beyond hotels and touches every aspect of daily life in the Turks and Caicos," Cox said. "From gas station attendants to supermarket staff, this is about embedding cultural pride. But for resorts with 500 or 600 staff members, the cost adds up quickly. That's something we need to work through with Mr. Adams."

Cox added that with room capacity in the destination set to double in the coming years, now is the right time to reimagine tourism and strengthen cultural awareness.

The discussions around linking work permits to TCI knowledge are part of this broader effort to prepare for growth while protecting the cultural identity of the islands. If adopted, the Turks and Caicos would join a small number of destinations that require cultural knowledge assessments as part of employment eligibility.

"This is not just about rules and regulations," Adams emphasized. "It's about ensuring that every interaction visitors have with us reflects who we are as a people. Our culture, our food, our dialect, our way of life, these must shine through in everything we do."

No empty chairs: the case for attending the 2025 Summit of the Americas

The Dominican Republic (DR) is hosting the 2025 Summit of the Americas – a gathering of the Heads of State and Government of 32 countries of the Western Hemisphere.

On September 30, the Government of the DR publicly stated that Cuba, Nicaragua, and Venezuela will not be invited to the 2025 Summit of the Americas. The government was careful to explain that its choice is necessary to “ensure the widest possible political dialogue” and to “guarantee the success of the Summit.” It also makes clear that this decision “does not interfere with bilateral relations” with any of the three countries.

This decision is likely to provoke a response similar to that seen at the 2022 Summit in Los Angeles, when the US administration of Joe Biden did not invite the same three governments.

Calls for Heads of Government to stay away followed, and a few did so in protest at the non-invitation of Cuba’s President Miguel Díaz-Canel Bermúdez, Nicaragua’s President Daniel Ortega Saavedra, and Venezuela’s President Nicolás Maduro Moros.

Leaders should think hard before staying away from the 2025 Summit. Global and regional conditions have shifted: wars in the Middle East and Europe cast economic and security shadows across the Americas; within the hemisphere, ideological rifts are reopening. This is precisely the moment for leaders to meet— to manage differences, protect interests, and act in the interest of all the peoples of the Americas.

Attendance is leverage, not endorsement. Leaders who believe that Cuba, Nicaragua, and Venezuela should be invited should say so at the Summit, in direct terms. Refusing to attend neither alters the guest list nor delivers gains for the peoples of the Americas; it only removes strong national voices from the room where decisions and deals are made.

The agenda in Punta Cana in the DR is built around four urgent security pillars: citizen security, energy security, water security, and food security. Across reputable global assessments, Latin America and the Caribbean ranks poorly on all four: the region bears the world’s highest homicide burden; most countries

are not water-secure; energy-transition progress and grid reliability lag behind other regions; and the cost of a healthy diet is the highest in the world, alongside elevated food-insecurity rates. They determine whether freedom of speech is preserved; whether hospitals, schools and hotels have electricity; whether water pipes run and crops survive; whether households have access to food at prices they can afford.

The DR government put out the suggested theme for the Summit with these four pillars since February and the first draft of a possible Declaration from the Summit was issued in June. Since September 11, government representatives of the 32 countries have been negotiating the outcome document.

A major initiative at this Summit is the CEO Convocation co-hosted with the Inter-American Development Bank. That platform is designed for public authorities and private capital to assemble the financing and execution capacity that the four pillars require. Public-private partnerships, built transparently and on fair terms, can shorten delivery timelines and spread costs sensibly. The CEO meeting is where those partnerships can be made real.

Another imperative is greater trade and economic integration across Latin America and the Caribbean. Integration scales markets, deepens and de-risks supply chains, and accelerates the spread of knowledge and expertise. Practical steps such as, customs facilitation, reliable sea- and air-links, and competitively priced access to infrastructure inputs, are all matters leaders should use the Summit to agree and advance. Apart from these general considerations, Caribbean leaders should be at the Summit to focus on particular Caribbean concerns. The recent UN Security Council decision on Haiti must be advanced with practical timelines, resources, and roles. Understanding and progress are also needed on differences over climate change and sustainable development, where positions diverge but impacts converge. The negotiations in the Summit Implementation Review Group (SIRG), made up of all the independent states of the Americas except Cuba, Nicaragua, and Venezuela, began on September 11 and have yet to re-



solve differences on these points at the technical level. It may take direct consultation by leaders to agree on actions that can be taken.

The last Summit, despite political controversy, still produced outcomes of value, including climate- and energy-cooperation channels that mobilised technical support and investment for Caribbean states. The lesson is straightforward: even when politics creates dissonance, useful progress is possible when leaders are present, prepared, and focused.

There is a wider principle that should be stated; movement toward greater democracy and respect for human, civil, and political rights is necessary for broad-based development and for international financial support.

In Cuba, Nicaragua, and Venezuela, tangible steps in that direction would encourage broader backing across the hemisphere. In Venezuela’s case specifically, military threats against Guyana should give way to a peaceful, lawful path under international law and the process of the International Court of Justice that the UN Secretary-General authorised and Caricom governments have endorsed.

It is understood that President Trump may not attend for security reasons – a concern that might yet be resolved. Nonetheless, senior US representation is expected; at minimum Secretary of State Marco Rubio or Vice President Vance, or both.

The margins of the Summit are well-suited to quiet, candid exchanges with US principals on the effects of US

policy across the hemisphere; conversations that can yield practical attention to pressing issues.

This is a meeting to be present, active, and speaking: the DR government has set a constructive path; its non-invitations to Cuba, Nicaragua and Venezuela are framed as a Summit-specific decision, without prejudice to bilateral relations. Leaders should use that path to pursue national interests and advance hemispheric cooperation. Not attending leaves influence at the table in other hands. Attending, and doing the work, serves the people of the Americas. CMC

Rachel Taylor, charged the Ministry’s Policy and Planning Unit with leading a data-driven agenda to support decision-making and sustainable development, not only in the Turks and Caicos Islands but also within the wider Caribbean region. Domestic Violence Outreach Intensified by Police Unit

The Safeguarding and Public Protection Unit (SPPU) of the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force (RT&CIPF) stepped up its campaign against domestic violence on Friday, October 3rd, with an outreach initiative aimed at educating the public and offering immediate resources for those affected.

The initiative took place at SMART Supermarket in Downtown, Providenciales, where officers set up an information booth to engage directly with members of the community. Throughout the day, SPPU officers provided vital information on the signs, forms, and hidden impacts of domestic violence, while also ensuring residents knew where to turn for help.

According to officers, the outreach was designed to remove stigma and open conversations about a sensitive issue that often goes unreported. Many participants were surprised to learn the broad definition of domestic violence, which includes not only physical abuse but also emotional, financial, and psychological forms of control and harm.

One particularly revealing moment came when several men admitted they had never considered that males could also be victims. Officers emphasized that domestic violence does not discriminate—it can affect anyone regardless of gender, age, or social background. The message was clear: help is available, and victims should never feel ashamed to seek it.

The RT&CIPF underscored the importance of public awareness, noting that greater understanding can lead to earlier intervention and potentially save lives. "Domestic violence thrives in silence," an officer re-

marked. "By starting these conversations in everyday places like supermarkets, we hope to break that silence and make it easier for victims and witnesses to come forward."

Community members were also provided with key contact numbers for immediate support. These included the SPPU hotline at 232-6696, the Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub (MASH) at 338-4013, and the option to report incidents at the nearest police station. Officers reminded the public that reports can be made not only by victims themselves but also by concerned family members, friends, or neighbors who suspect abuse is occurring.

The outreach at SMART Supermarket is part of a wider series of public education efforts by the SPPU. Residents are encouraged to look out for the next pop-up booth scheduled for Thursday, October 17th, at Sunny Foods in Blue Hills. The police force hopes these initiatives will continue to foster open dialogue and ensure the community is better equipped to recognize and report abuse. The RT&CIPF is urging anyone currently experiencing domestic violence to take immediate steps to protect themselves and their loved ones. "Domestic violence is not something to endure in silence," the unit stated in a press release. "It is a crime, and it is never too early to seek help. Before it's too late, reach out. Your safety and well-being matter."

The SPPU reiterated that ending domestic violence requires collective responsibility. By staying informed, speaking up, and supporting survivors, the Turks and Caicos Islands community can help reduce the harm caused by abuse and build safer, stronger families.

After the ceremony, which was followed by a ribbon-cutting, a live demonstration of asphalt mixing was conducted.

Capacity Challenges at HMP Grand Turk Dominate National Security Council Agenda

The management and future of Her Majesty's Prison (HMP), Grand Turk, took centre stage at the latest meeting of the Turks and Caicos Islands (TCI) National Security Council (NSC), held on Thursday, 25 September 2025. Members received a detailed briefing from representatives of the Ministry of Public Safety and Utilities on the prison's capacity challenges, the state of the wider prison estate, and proposed immediate, medium, and long-term measures to address them. The Council acknowledged the pressures on the system and endorsed short-term proposals while also supporting a broader

appraisal to ensure that infrastructure investment is effectively targeted to meet the needs of a growing prison population. The Council also considered a series of other key security matters: Updates from the Unified Command on ongoing multi-agency operations, including the legal framework underpinning joint efforts across the national security apparatus. A briefing from the Permanent Secretary for National Security on the review of the liquor licensing regime, with members agreeing to further examine proposals for restructuring the

system.

A presentation by the Commanding Officer of the Regiment on the development of a maritime operational base and docking facility, aimed at enhancing command-and-control capabilities and response to maritime incidents and disasters.

An update from the National Security Threat Lead on the upcoming Northern Caribbean Security Summit to be hosted in TCI under the theme "Dismantling Illicit Maritime Activities Through Enhanced Cooperation". Members endorsed the summit and pledged support for its success.

The meeting was co-chaired by Her Excellency Governor Dileeni Daniel-Sel-

varatnam and the Hon. Premier Charles Washington Misick OBE at the Office of the Governor in Providenciales. Also in attendance were the Hon. Deputy Premier, the Hon. Attorney General, the Commissioner of Police, the National Security Advisor, the Permanent Secretary for National Security, the Commanding Officer of the Regiment, the Director General of the Border Force, and the National Security Threat Lead. Apologies were received from Her Excellency the Deputy Governor. Invited participants included the Hon. Minister and Permanent Secretary for Public Safety and Utilities, along with the Superintendent of the Department of Correctional Services.

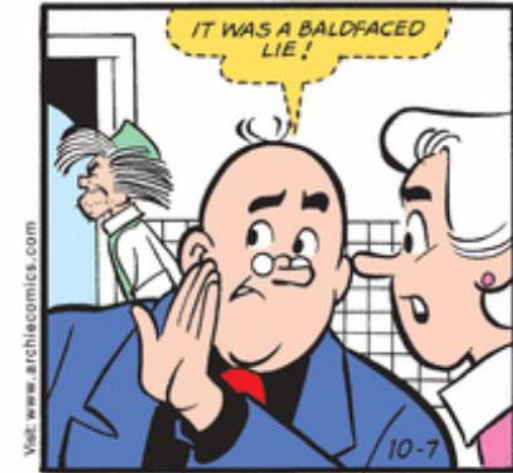

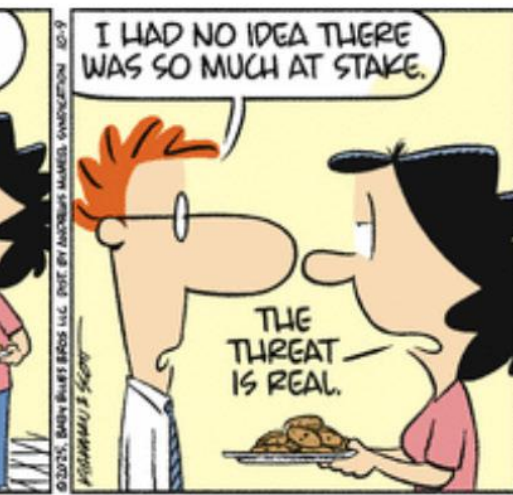

TURKS HEAD CACTUS

A living emblem of our islands—resilient, unique, and deeply rooted in our natural heritage.

The Turks Head cactus (*Melocactus intortus*) is one of the most recognizable native species in the Turks and Caicos Islands. Topped with a bright red, woolly cap called a cephalium, this unusual cactus has long been associated with the identity of the islands. Its striking crown, said to resemble a Turkish fez, is widely believed to be the inspiration behind the name “Turks Islands”

Often found clinging to sun-baked coastal cliffs or growing among the rocky limestone terrain, the Turks Head cactus is a survivor of harsh conditions. Its thick, green body is covered in vertical ribs and stiff spines, adapted to conserve water and withstand long dry periods. From the red cephalium, small pink flowers bloom, followed by bright red fruits that attract birds and insects.

This cactus is more than just a natural curiosity — it is a national symbol. The Turks Head cactus is featured on the Turks and Caicos Islands’ flag and coat of arms, a reflection of its deep connection to the land. It represents not only the islands’ natural heritage but also the strength and uniqueness of the environment that shaped it.

Although still relatively common in some areas, the species faces growing pressure from land clearing and rapid development. Conservation groups and the Department of Environment and Coastal Resources (DECR) have warned of the need to protect native habitats and preserve plant populations before they decline further. The public is urged not to disturb or remove the cactus from the wild and to support preservation efforts wherever possible.

In addition to its symbolic and ecological value, the Turks Head cactus quietly plays a role in local biodiversity. Its fruit provides food for birds, and its flowers support pollinators — small but vital interactions that help maintain the balance of the islands’ ecosystems.

Rooted in dry soil and crowned in red, the Turks Head cactus stands as a quiet emblem of Turks and Caicos — resilient, distinct, and deeply connected to the story of these islands.

“We believe that everyone deserves the joy of choosing something beautiful, regardless of their circumstances.”

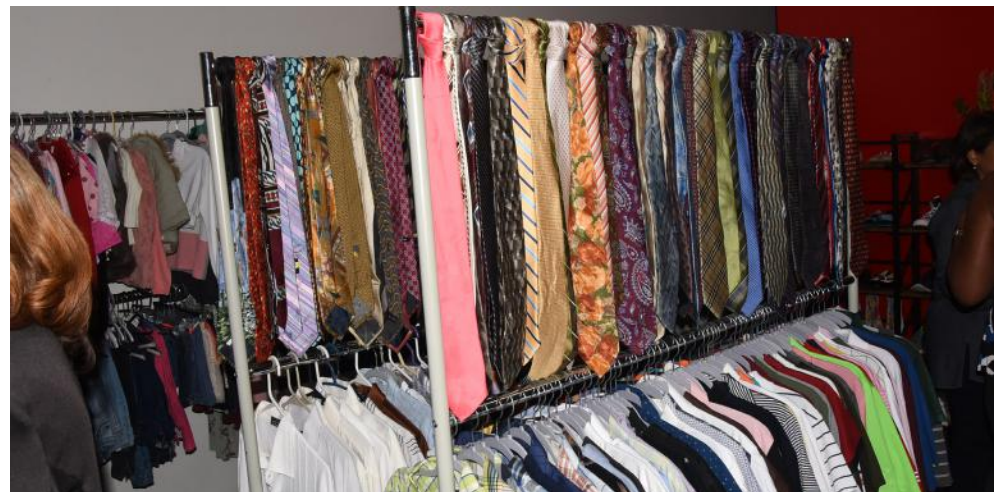

Sickle cell warriors are survivors

THREE YEARS ago, Latoya Minott Smikle’s world plunged into darkness. After five-and-a-half years of fighting courageously, her son Aiden-Jon Hall passed away due to complications of the deadly Sickle Cell Disease in 2022.

From her painful loss, she has transformed her healing into establishing the Aiden-Jon Amir Hall Foundation, which is seeking to raise \$1 million this year to provide financial support to six individuals with sickle cell disease.

The foundation, launched under the patronage of the Custos Rotulorum of the parish of Manchester, Lieutenant Colonel Garfield Green, is also looking to raise awareness about the disease.

Sickle cell disease is an inherited blood disorder that arose thousands of years ago in Africa to provide a protective advantage against malaria. In the early 1900s, western medicine identified the characteristic sickled red blood cells and in 1949, scientists discovered the underlying cause: a mutation in the haemoglobin protein.

The disease’s connection to malaria is why it disproportionately affects populations with African ancestry, and in the 1960s and 1970s, it became a significant focus of the civil rights movement due to its widespread impact on communities of colour.

During her fourth pregnancy, Minott Smikle, now mother of five, learnt that her four-week-old baby had sickle cell disease. At the time, she also found out that she, her partner, and their three other children were carriers of the sickle cell trait. Subsequent checks would later reveal that it was likely her mother who had the sickle cell trait.

“The Aiden-Jon Amir Hall Foundation was

founded in August 2024 as a personal and spiritual action, as a response to the struggles of persons in central Jamaica, especially small children who are ailing with sickle cell disease,” Minott Smikle said.

One of our objectives is to provide, not only medical and support-based activities to sickle cell warriors, but to provide a scholarship for at least one child living with the disease who is proven to be resilient in his or her studies despite the limitations imposed upon him/her by the disease,” she added.

Minott Smikle said they envision a world where every child living with sickle cell disease has access to the care, support and opportunities they deserve; free from stigma, isolation, need and inequality.

“Through increased public awareness, early intervention and community-driven advocacy, we will strive to create a future where challenges of the disease are met with compassion, understanding and lasting solutions,” Minott Smikle said.

Aiden-Jon she said, was a happy, loving and playful boy who loved helping others even at his age. “He was a real charmer with the ladies and they liked to give him flowers. He was with us for a short while, but was like an angel, touching the lives of so many adults and children alike. He was five and a half, when he left us. His memory remains as a key motivation for the work at hand,” Minott Smikle said.

Dr Martina Clarke-Robe, public health specialist at the Trelawny Health Department who was a presenter at the launch held recently, said one in 150 Jamaicans have sickle cell, while one in 10 are living with the trait. Many of those who have the trait, she said, have never been sick, while persons living with sickle cell can be

described as sickle cell warriors.

“A person with sickle cell disease experiences chronic pain from sickle cell crises, increased susceptibility to infections, and other complications like anaemia, stroke, and organ damage,” Dr Clarke-Robe said.

“A hallmark of the condition is painful episodes, known as sickle cell crises, caused by blocked blood flow through blood vessels. An abnormally shaped red blood cell shortage can lead to more serious infections, requiring preventative antibiotics and vaccinations. Shortages of healthy red blood cells result in anaemia, causing extreme tiredness. Potential long-term issues include stroke, eye problems, organ damage, and painful swelling of the hands and feet,” she added.

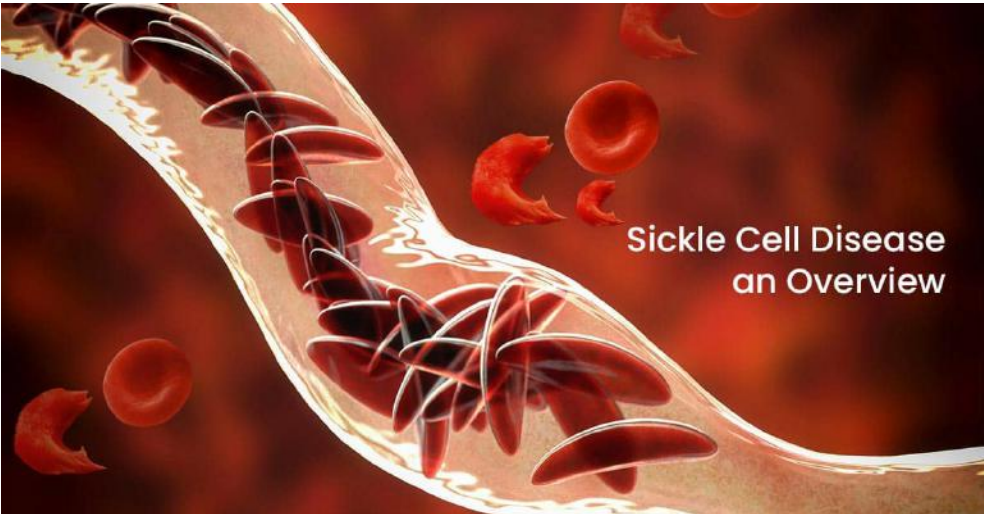
Minott Smikle said other objectives include promoting sickle cell disease testing, spreading the word about SCD online; in schools; in communities; in churches and GOs and NGOs through workshops; give SCD warriors a voice to share how they feel with the formation of support group

and a community where they can get not just help but counselling and building and engaging communities.

Their vision also includes partnering with entities such as the Sickle Cell Unit to share best practices and research information.

Minott Smikle said it is also their intention to lobby the Ministry of Labour Welfare and Social Security to include sickle cell disease on the list of disabilities. This she said can be supported by the fact that SCD patients suffer long-term medical impacts that often time render them incapable of working or to be out of work and school for extended periods of time.

The foundation’s first major event and its main fundraiser will be held on October 25 at the Church Teachers’ College poolside in Manchester; while the final activity for the year will be a warm clothes treat for sickle cell warriors. Blankets, sweaters, hot/water bottles, socks, etc, will be provided to help with the upcoming cold season.

Sean 'Diddy' Combs' lawyers want him sent to a New Jersey federal prison that offers drug treatment



Sean 'Diddy' Combs' lawyers want the hip-hop mogul sent to a low-security federal prison in New Jersey to serve his four-year, two-month prison sentence, telling a judge Monday that the facility's drug treatment programme will help him stay clean. In a letter, Combs' lawyers urged the judge presiding over his case, Arun Subramanian, to "strongly recommend" that the federal Bureau of Prisons place Combs at FCI Fort Dix, a massive prison located on the grounds of the joint military base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst.

FCI Fort Dix, one of several dozen federal prisons with a residential drug treatment programme, will best allow Combs "to address drug abuse issues and to maximise family visitation and rehabilitative efforts," Combs lawyer Teny Geragos wrote.

Also Monday, President Donald Trump told reporters that Combs had asked him for a pardon. Trump, referring to Combs by the nickname "Puff Daddy," did not say if he would grant the request. Messages seeking comment on Trump's remarks was left for Combs' lawyers and his publicity team. Combs' sentencing Friday on charges he transported people across state lines for sexual encounters capped a federal case that featured harrowing testimony about violence, drugs and so-called "freak-offs," and exposed the sordid private life of one of the most influential figures in music.

The "I'll Be Missing You" singer was convicted in July under the federal Mann Act, which bans transporting people across state lines for any sexual crime. His trial ended in a split verdict, with acquittals on sex trafficking and racketeering charges that could have put him behind bars for life.

Combs has been locked up at a federal jail in Brooklyn, the Metropolitan Detention Center, since his September 2024 arrest. His time there will be subtracted from his sentence, meaning he could get out in about three years.

In a letter to Subramanian on the eve of sentencing, Combs said he has gone through a "spiritual reset" in jail and is "committed to the journey of remaining a drug free, non-violent and peaceful person."

"I thank God that I'm stronger, wiser, clean, clear and sober," he wrote.

Subramanian has not yet acted on the request to recommend placement at FCI Fort Dix.

Judges often make recommendations about where inmates should serve time, but it's up to the Bureau of Prisons to decide. Those decisions, the agency has said, are based on a variety of factors, including the severity of the offence, the required security level and an inmate's programming needs.

FCI Fort Dix, the largest single federal prison by population with just under 3,900 inmates, is about 64 miles (103 kilometres) southwest of New York City, where Combs was born and rose to fame as a rapper and entrepreneur in an array of businesses, including fashion, television and liquor. An adjacent minimum-security prison camp has 210 inmates.

Combs once owned a home in New Jersey, selling it nearly a decade ago.

His primary residence, according to court papers, has been a \$48 million mansion on an island near Miami. That home and a mansion he owns in Los Angeles were raided by federal agents last year during the investigation that led to his arrest.

FCI Fort Dix has been home to a number of high-profile inmates over the years, including reputed mobsters, drug traffickers, corrupt politicians and "Pharma Bro" Martin Shkreli. For a time, it was run by the warden who had been in charge of a Manhattan federal jail when financier Jeffrey Epstein killed himself at the jail in 2019. That warden, Lamine N'Diaye, has since retired.

In 2021, a 27-year-old Fort Dix inmate was stabbed in the eyeball by a fellow prisoner. In 2019, a Fort Dix inmate, a former inmate and two other people were arrested for using a drone to smuggle in contraband including cellphones, tobacco, weight-loss supplements and eyeglasses. The same year, a Fort Dix correctional officer pleaded guilty in a separate case to pocketing bribes to smuggle in contraband.

During his time at Fort Dix, Shkreli ended up in solitary confinement amid allegations he was using a contraband smartphone to run his drug company from behind bars.

Inmates are forbidden from conducting business and possessing cellphones.

Bad Bunny kicks off 'SNL' 51st season with new faces, jabs at Super Bowl critics

Bad Bunny kicked off the 51st season of Saturday Night Live with a few timely jokes about his next high-profile gig: the Super Bowl.

"I think everybody is happy about it – even Fox News," the music superstar quipped in his monologue, referring to opposition in some quarters to his being named headliner of the Super Bowl halftime show.

He segued into a few sentences in Spanish, expressing Latino pride and joy over the achievement, after which he noted: "If you didn't understand what I just said, you have four months to learn!"

Bad Bunny will be making history by performing entirely in Spanish, a landmark moment for Latino culture.

Launching a season that introduces some new faces in the cast, the show's cold open featured a sketch mocking Defence Secretary Pete Hegseth's presentation to generals earlier this week. Weekend Update host Colin Jost played Hegseth, highlighting the defence secretary's remarks in which he said it's "tiring to look out at combat formations or really any formation and see fat troops" and said it was unacceptable to see fat generals and admirals at the Pentagon.

"No fatties, no facial hair, no body

hair," Jost's Hegseth said. "Just hot, shredded hairless men who are definitely not gay ... Because this is serious, we are facing the greatest threat to freedom and democracy the world has ever known. And we all know what that threat is."

Late Night TV! replied with James Austin Johnson as President Donald Trump, bursting in. "'SNL' 51 off to a rough start," Johnson's Trump add-

ed. "Seventeen new cast members and they got the 'Update' guy doing the open."

Looking to the future

After a fanfare-filled 50th season celebrating the past, Saturday Night Live is looking to the future with a cast that includes five new featured players. Ben Marshall, already an SNL writer, becomes a featured player, along with newcomers Tom-

my Brennan, Jeremy Culhane, Kam Patterson and Veronika Slowikowska.

Bad Bunny is having what can only be described as an enormous week: in addition to hosting SNL, he's coming off a historic residency in Puerto Rico. The Puerto Rican artiste has said one of the reasons his residency bypassed the continental US was a concern that US Immigration and Customs Enforcement officials could target immigrants for deportation outside his shows.

Asked Friday by a podcaster whether ICE officials would be conducting enforcement at the Super Bowl, Homeland Security Secretary Kristi Noem said they would, because DHS "is responsible for keeping it safe".

The issue made for a key joke in the Weekend Update segment. "A Trump adviser said ICE agents will attend the Super Bowl after Bad Bunny was announced as the halftime performer," noted co-host Michael Che, then quipping: "You know, to catch all those farmworkers who can afford Super Bowl tickets."

In his second SNL hosting gig, Bad Bunny was joined by musical guest Doja Cat, making her debut in that role.

AI-assisted album submitted in Reggae Grammy category

When the list of albums accepted for consideration in the Best Reggae Album category of the Grammy Awards is revealed today, an AI-assisted album could very well make the list.

The album is titled Dem Can't Stop My Joy (Rastafari Forever) by Adrian Donsome Hanson and Forever Roots Band. The 12-track album was released on August 29 under Donsome Records LLC.

Hanson, a well known producer, is not intending to rock the reggae boat with this project, instead he is using AI to his advantage in a world in which artificial intelligence cannot be ignored. The vocals are "refined" by AI with Hanson credited as vocalist. His reason for doing this sounds pragmatic.

"Over the years I've been writing and producing many songs and albums, and one of the biggest challenges has been that most reggae artistes charge a producer to voice on their riddim. Once they collect the fee and record, that's usually the end of their involvement – promotion, marketing, or even sharing the track on social media becomes the producer's burden. You're basically on your own until the song "buss" or takes off," Hanson shared with The Gleaner.

He explained that with this album, which has already passed 45,000 streams on Spotify, he wanted more independence. "I do about 90 per cent of the work myself – building the riddim, writing the lyrics, shaping the melodies, and even recording demo vocals. I also worked with Shan Blair to provide the female vocals ad libs. Then I use AI for maybe 10 per cent of the process – mostly to experiment with sound textures or to adjust how a vocal feels. So it's not a fully AI-driven album; it's human-led from start to finish, with AI only supporting my vision. I control the process, and that human direction is what gives the album its soul," added Hanson.

That 10 per cent, however, was significant enough for him to have to declare it when filling out the forms to submit Stop My Joy (Rastafari Forever) in the Best Reggae Album category of the Grammy Awards.

"What's interesting is that this is actually the first time I'm publicly saying AI was involved. The only place I've declared it before was during my Grammy submission, where I had to explain exactly how AI played a role in the project," Hanson continued.

The use of AI often triggers conversations grounded in ethical/moral concerns. When asked how he reconciled those concerns Hanson said he had none.

"I never asked AI to "make" the project for me. I just use AI to enhance certain parts, whether it's adjusting a sound or shaping a vocal to match the vibe I want. So at the end of the day, the soul and authorship of the music is fully mine," Hanson emphasised.

He added that the human element "is everything in this project" which he described as "freeing" because he didn't have to wait on artistes or features to complete his vision. His message is simple: "If you're going to use AI, you have to lead it and maintain your creativity. Don't let AI lead you."

Grammy watcher Sean 'Contractor' Edwards, who is "from the era of authenticity where reggae has the passion and the cry," noted however, that AI technology is here to stay "and will only grow exponentially in music".

"I see AI as a tool of technology that can be used in music like auto tune, which alters the pitch of vocals. For Grammy eligibility, however, a human must ultimately be the creative force behind the work.

Also, while a song containing AI elements can win, the award itself recognises only the human creators involved, not the AI material," Edwards stated.

First round of voting for the 2026 Grammys takes place from October 3- 15. Recording Academy members will vote to determine the nominees across the various categories. The nominees will be announced November 7.

Bonaire Residents, Greenpeace in Court For Climate Change Case

It’s the first case in Europe that combines the demand for climate change adaptation measures in an overseas territory and increased mitigation measures to keep warming below 1.5°C. It also represents one of the first opportunities to see how recent landmark decisions on climate change, such as the International Court of Justice (ICJ) Advisory Opinion on the obligations of states with respect to climate change, will be used in a national court. In July, ICJ judges unanimously ruled that states must keep global warming below 1.5°C and that their climate plans must show maximum ambition, taking into account historical emissions and national cir-

cumstances. **Current climate policy falls short** Particularly for low-lying islands like Bonaire, keeping global warming below 1.5°C is non-negotiable, it’s central to the well-being and livelihood of the residents. The Netherlands’ government is currently not complying with the Dutch Climate Act and is instead protecting major polluters by providing fossil fuel subsidies and rolling back climate policy. The inhabitants of Bonaire and Greenpeace Netherlands demand that the Dutch State make its fair contribution to achieving global climate goals. Given its historical emissions, this means becoming climate neutral as soon as possible, by 2040 at the latest.

Snapchat users share fury at upcoming fees for storing old photos and videos

“Half of my life is on this app and now they expect us to pay for it.” One-star reviews and a sense of injustice have dominated online discussion since the popular messaging app Snapchat became the latest tech firm to put a price tag on a service people previously enjoyed using for free. The app’s parent company Snap announced in September it would start charging people if they have more than five gigabytes worth of previously shared images and videos saved as Memories. For many, these retro posts act as a window to the past- leading some to accuse the firm of “corporate greed” in posts on social media and negative reviews on Google and Apple’s app stores. Snap has compared its paid storage plans to those provided by Apple and Google for smartphones. And as an alternative for those who don’t want to pay, users can download their Memories, which for some span tens of gigabytes of data, to their device. The firm told the BBC only a small number of users would be affected by the changes. It also acknowledged it was “never easy to transition from receiving a service for free to paying for it” - but suggested it would be “worth the cost” for users. Many criticising the move online seem to disagree. An online petition dubbed the fee a “memory tax”, with commenters calling it “dystopian” and “ridiculous” - while one person threatened never to use the app again. Meanwhile, in a one-star review on the Goo-

gle Play store, a person calling themselves Natacha Jonsson said it felt “very unethical”. “If I know millennials right, most of us have years worth of memories on Snapchat,” they said. “5GB is absolutely nothing when you have years worth of memories... Bye Snap.” And Guste Ven, a 20-year-old journalism student in London, shared on TikTok her plans to delete the app. “I decided that I needed to download all my memories as soon as I could,” she told BBC News. “Almost all of my teenage years have been documented through my Snapchat memories, all of the photos in there are really important to me. “It just doesn’t make sense to start charging people for something that has been free for so many years.” Snapchat has not yet said how much storage plans would cost in the UK - only that they are part of a “gradual global rollout”. But 23-year-old Amber Daley, who also lives in London, said in a post on TikTok she would be “distracted” by such charges. Amber told the BBC the app had become “a part of everyday life” since she started using it in 2014. While she said she understood the platform needed to make money, Amber suggested the Memories feature means more to users than the company may have realised. ‘Emotional artefacts’ Companies deciding to charge users for a service that was previously free is nothing new, and millions pay for services like iCloud and Google Drive to backup their photos

and videos from their smartphone. The reality of storing data in the cloud - which some in the tech industry like to refer to as simply “somebody else’s computer” - is it costs money. “Hosting trillions of Memories on Snapchat isn’t a trivial amount,” social media consultant Matt Navarra told the BBC. “Snapchat has to try to find a way to cover the cost of storage, bandwidth, back-ups, content delivery, encryption- all that stuff.” Evan Spiegel, Snap’s boss, said in September that the company was poised to reach one billion Snapchat users and generate “record revenues” But Mr Navarra said introducing fees for a service that had previously been free, and users had been encouraged to use as such, may feel like a “bait and switch” for some.

“Moving the goalposts after people have built this huge digital archive doesn’t really sit right,” he said. And for many, he added, “Memories aren’t just data dumps, they’re emotional artefacts”. Dr Taylor Annabell, a postdoctoral researcher at Utrecht University in the Netherlands, said Snapchat’s move shows the implications of commercial platforms being used to store sentimental personal content. “They benefit from this trust, interdependence, and presumption of never-ending access, which even incentivises some users to remain with the platform or continue to use it in order to scroll back through their archive,” she told the BBC. “But these are not benevolent guardians of personal memory.”



CCJ president touts value of regional court

NEWLY installed Caribbean Court of Justice (CCJ) President Justice Winston Anderson on Monday pointed out that even while seven states have continued to take their appeals in criminal and civil matters to the United Kingdom Privy Council, they have increasingly cited and relied on judgments handed down by the regional court.

Speaking during a Special Sitting at the Seat of the Court in Port-of-Spain, Trinidad, to commemorate his elevation to the office of CCJ president, Justice Anderson said whilst the accession of the seven remaining jurisdictions is anticipated, this “important phenomenon should not go unnoticed”.

“CCJ decisions in the appellate jurisdiction are given favourable treatment and are increasingly being cited and relied upon by judiciaries in countries which have not yet acceded to the appellate jurisdiction,” Justice Anderson stated.

He said a recent study indicates that there are at least 450 instances in which courts in non-appellate jurisdiction countries have accepted and relied upon CCJ decisions in numerous areas such as constitutional and statutory interpretation, criminal law and sentencing, enforcement of foreign judgments and awards, commercial law, and adverse possession.

The CCJ was established in 2005 as an appellate jurisdiction and an original jurisdiction. All 12 Caricom member states have signed the agreement establishing the CCJ in its original jurisdiction as the court of first instance which applies rules of international law in respect of the interpretation and application of the Revised Treaty of Chaguaramas. However, in its appellate jurisdiction the CCJ serves as

the final court of appeal in civil and criminal matters for only five countries — Barbados, Belize, Dominica, Guyana, and Saint Lucia.

On Monday, Justice Anderson said, “the existence of the CCJ has significantly increased the access by Caribbean citizens to final appellate justice”.

“For example, there were 19 appeals from Barbados to the Privy Council in the 20 years immediately before 2005. In the 20 years since then there have been 105 appeals from Barbados to the CCJ, an increase of over 450 per cent. In the case of Belize there were 33 appeals to the Privy Council in the 15 years before accession to the CCJ’s appellate juris-

diction in 2010. Since then, there have been 56 appeals from Belize to the CCJ, an increase of over 69 per cent,” he said.

Justice Anderson said for Dominica, the numbers were three to the Privy Council in the 10 years before joining in 2015 and 10 in the 10 years since then, an increase of 233 per cent. “St Lucia sent one appeal to the Privy Council in the two years immediately before joining the appellate jurisdiction in 2023 and sent five to the CCJ in the two years since — an increase of 400 per cent. The average increase in appeals has been 288 per cent. I should say that Guyana is the court’s largest or best consumer of appellate services but the com-

parisons are not easily made, given that that member State abolished appeals to the Privy Council in 1970,” he noted.

“On the hypotheses of an average increase of 288 per cent in appeals, there would have been a significantly larger number of CCJ appellate jurisdictions decisions had there been full compliance with the obligation in the CCJ agreement for all member states to join the appellate jurisdiction of the court,” Justice Anderson opined.

“Instead of 307 decisions there would have been approximately 1,200 decisions. The opportunity cost of non-accession can therefore be measured in terms of reduced access to justice, which is also a denial of justice. Equally, there is a corresponding loss — the opportunity to fulfil the mandate of the CCJ agreement to develop a Caribbean jurisprudence that is responsive to all areas of Caribbean life,” he said further.

In the meantime, Justice Anderson said in the 20 years of its existence, the CCJ has accumulated a significant body of judicial precedence, delivering a total of 347 decisions comprising 40 in the original jurisdiction — including one advisory opinion — and 307 decisions in the appellate jurisdiction.

Justice Anderson, a Jamaican who succeeded former CCJ President Justice Adrian Saunders, was on Sunday, July 6, 2025 officially sworn in as the fourth president of the CCJ during the 49th Regular Meeting of the Conference of Heads of Government of Caricom, chaired by Prime Minister Dr Andrew Holness in Montego Bay, St James. He was first sworn in as a judge of the CCJ in June 2010 and was the first Jamaican and the youngest judge ever appointed to the CCJ at age 49.

World Bank says Caribbean economies outpaced economies in Central America

The World Bank on Tuesday said that Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC) can break its low-growth cycle by harnessing entrepreneurship to create jobs, boost productivity, and accelerate innovation.

In the latest publication, the financial institution said that constrained by stubborn inflation, rising debt, weak investment, and ongoing global uncertainty, the forecast is for the region to grow by 2.3 per cent in 2025 and 2.5 per cent in 2026, the slowest among global regions.

“Governments in the region have steered their economies through repeated shocks while preserving stability,” said Susana Cordeiro Guerra, vice president for Latin America and the Caribbean at the World Bank.

“Now is the time to continue building on that foundation—accelerating reforms to improve the business climate, invest in enabling infrastructure, and mobilise private capital,” she told reporters.

According to the publication, titled “Latin America and the Caribbean Economic Review, Transformational Entrepreneurship for Jobs and Growth,” the external environment remains challenging, with falling global demand and commodity prices projected to drop around 10 per cent in 2025 and another five per cent in 2026, hurting key sectors.

It said trade policy uncertainty also threatens market access and nearshoring.

Domestically, inflation persists, and public debt is high, with the debt-to-GDP ratio rising to 63.8 per cent in 2024 from 59.9 per cent in 2019. Slower monetary easing in advanced economies is keeping debt servicing costs high and credit expensive, further dampening investment, job creation, and productivity growth.

Against this backdrop, the report calls for domestic reforms to attract investment and promote “transformational” entrepreneurship: high-growth firms that diffuse technology, create jobs, and raise productivity.

“The entrepreneur is the critical actor in development, identifying opportunities, innovating, and taking the risks needed to create value added and jobs,” said William Maloney, chief economist for Latin America and the Caribbean at the World Bank.

“Creating more dynamic economies in Latin America and the Caribbean will require strengthening our pipeline of entrepreneurial talent, while undertaking the systemic reforms necessary for them to thrive,” he told a news conference on Tuesday.

Although support for entrepreneurship is strong, the World Bank said most firms in the region are micro or small businesses with limited paths to scale, accounting for up to 70 per cent of enterprises in some countries.

It said a smaller group of “transformational” firms could drive productivity and innovation, but face familiar obstacles: scarce financing, heavy regulation, skills gaps, and weak infrastructure.

To stimulate private sector-led growth and jobs, the report proposes a three-point agenda. It said the region needs to invest in human capital, which is critical to job creation.

“Strengthen education quality at all levels and expand managerial support to grow the pipeline of capable entrepreneurs. Scale up short-cycle trainings, align workforce programmes with private sector needs, and update labor regulations to protect workers and support business growth,” it said.

The report also calls for supporting policy and regulatory reforms that establish a business-friendly environment.

“Eliminate distortionary subsidies, reform taxes to boost investment, and invest in logistics, energy, and digital infrastructure to lower entry barriers,” the report said.

There is also a need to expand access to finance, including private investment, with the report noting that over a quarter of firms face credit constraints, about twice the Organization

for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) rate.

“Strengthen risk-sharing, streamline dispute resolution, and modernize bankruptcy laws to improve capital allocation and protect creditors and entrepreneurs,” said the report.

It notes that with the right reforms, Latin America and the Caribbean can foster entrepreneurship to fuel innovation, expand opportunities, and build more dynamic, competitive economies.

Mbappe undergoing treatment for ‘small niggle’, says Deschamps

Kylian Mbappe is receiving treatment for a “small niggle” in his right ankle after meeting up with his international teammates ahead of the latest round of 2026 World Cup qualifiers, France Coach Didier Deschamps said Monday. The France captain sustained the knock at the end of Real Madrid’s 3-1 La Liga victory over Villarreal on Saturday, casting doubts over his availability to the national team for their upcoming qualifying matches against Azerbaijan and Iceland.

“I spoke with Kylian, he had a small niggle but it’s not serious, otherwise he wouldn’t be here today,” Deschamps told reporters at the French team’s Clairefontaine base near Paris.

“We will take the time with the medical staff to assess the situation and then see how it develops.”

Liverpool defender Ibrahima Konate also underwent tests after coming off injured in the Reds’ 2-1 defeat at Chelsea on Saturday.

The pair received treatment on Monday during training and are set to continue treatment on Tuesday, according to the French national team’s coaching staff.

The French football federation (FFF) also confirmed Paris Saint-Germain forward

Bradley Barcola would be sent home from Clairefontaine due to a hamstring injury.

“After consulting with the French national team doctor... [Barcola] has been diagnosed with a chronic injury to his right hamstring since Paris Saint-Germain’s Champions League match against Atalanta [on September 17],” the FFF said.

PSG then publicly rejected the diagnosis of the 23-year-old by France’s medical team.

“The information published in this statement does not correspond in any way to the medical information provided by Paris Saint-Germain’s medical teams,” the club posted on social media.

“Prior to the gathering [at Clairefontaine] and following the Ligue 1 match day 7 fixture against Lille, Paris Saint-Germain provided the French national team with a medical report on Bradley Barcola that made no mention of any chronic injury following the match against Atalanta.”

The attacker played 60 minutes of PSG’s Ligue 1 draw at Lille on Sunday before being replaced, showing no apparent signs of injury during the encounter.

Should Barcola end up facing time on the sidelines, he would be a further ad-

dition to PSG’s lengthy injury list which already includes fellow France forwards Ousmane Dembele and Desire Doue, as well as Marquinhos, Khvicha Kvaratskhelia, Fabian Ruiz and Joao Neves.

Last month there was friction between the two parties after PSG criticised the French national team staff following in-

juries suffered by Dembele and Doue during France’s opening Group D win over Ukraine.

Les Bleus are top of their group with two wins from two so far in qualifying. They host Azerbaijan on Friday at PSG’s Parc des Princes stadium before travelling to Iceland three days later.

Blake is set to join Jamaica’s Reggae Boyz squad for upcoming FIFA World Cup qualifiers after missing the previous international window through injury.

As one of the country’s most decorated players his leadership and experience will be key as the Boyz aim to take another step towards World Cup qualification.

Fraser-Pryce announces retirement after historic 18-year sprinting career

Jamaican sprint legend Shelly-Ann Fraser-Pryce, the most decorated 100-metre sprinter in history, has officially announced her retirement from competitive track and field, bringing the curtain down on an illustrious 18-year career that has inspired millions worldwide. A three-time Olympic gold medalist and ten-time World Champion, Fraser-Pryce has been a dominant force in global athletics since her stunning breakthrough at the 2008 Beijing Olympics. Her announcement marks the end of an era for one of the sport's most celebrated athletes. In a statement on Tuesday, the 38-year-old reflected on the central role of time in her life and career. She expressed deep gratitude to God, her family and Jamaica, noting that sprinting had shaped and disciplined her while bringing her "joy beyond measure". Fraser-Pryce paid special tribute to her husband, Jason, whom she described as her "anchor and greatest

teammate", and to her son Zyon, whose arrival, she said, gave her "a new purpose" and reminded her that her greatest title would always be "mom". The Waterhouse native also extended heartfelt thanks to Jamaicans for their unwavering support over the years. "It has been the greatest honour to carry our flag across the world. We may be small, but we are mighty," she said. Fraser-Pryce emphasised that while her competitive career is ending, her journey is far from over. She plans to focus on advocacy, mentorship and inspiring the next generation. "My race is not finished; it is simply a lane change," she said. Fraser-Pryce has accumulated a record-breaking list of achievements. She has won eight Olympic medals and 16 World Championship medals, including five world titles in the 100m, a feat unmatched by any other sprinter, male or female.

Financial struggles and inferior playing conditions in the Caribbean are contributing to the West Indies' poor performances on the cricket field, says Test Captain Roston Chase. Chase made the comments following his side's humiliating loss by an innings and 140 runs to hosts India inside three days in the opening Test match on Saturday.

However, he maintained that he was not looking for an excuse for his side's recent struggles after they slumped to their fifth Test defeat in six matches this year. It was also the fourth consecutive Test match that the West Indies had lost inside three days, dating back to the home series against Australia in July. Speaking in a post-match press

conference on Saturday, Chase said there was a need for improved infrastructure as well as better pitches and playing conditions. "...What I would say is that obviously there is a struggle in the Caribbean for finances, so whatever help we can get I hope that they do get it so that they can strengthen the infrastructure for the cricket. "I think the systems in the Caribbean are a bit poor in terms of training facilities and stuff, but I'm not using that as an excuse or something to hide behind for our poor performances that we've been putting out lately. I still think the onus is on the players to find some way to churn out runs and wickets," Chase said. The skipper said playing conditions in the region made it difficult for them to be competitive on the international stage.

He said batters in particular found it challenging to score runs, as was evident in the series against Australia where not a single batsman scored a century. "...The pitches in the Caribbean are not really batsmen friendly, so guys don't really bat for long periods and score those big scores. "And the outfielders in the Caribbean are really slow, so when you hit the ball in the gaps and you think you have four you probably end up with just two, so those are some of the problems that we're faced with in the Caribbean, so that's why you see guys averaging so low," Chase explained. "If you look at the past series that we had against Australia, I think that's the first time I've ever played an international series and a batsman never scored a hundred in three matches."
