THE VISITATION A QUIET ENCOUNTER OF LOVE, JOY AND MISSION.

The Feast of the Visitation invites us into a moment of quiet awe and wonder as Mary, pregnant with Jesus, visits her cousin Elizabeth, who is carrying John the Baptist. In this encounter, we witness Mary as the living tabernacle, bearing the very presence of Christ within her. It is a profoundly supernatural moment, as John the Baptist leaps in Elizabeth's womb, recongising Jesus. Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit, acknowledges Mary as the mother of our Lord. This meeting is also deeply human — two women, each on an unexpected journey coming together in recognition of God's promises unfolding in their lives.

This image of Mary carrying Jesus within her and sharing Him with others has become a reminder for me of what it means to carry Christ in my own life and share him with those around me. This is the heart of Christian ministry.

We often imagine that mission requires grand speeches or dramatic gestures but, like Mary, we can be called to share God's love in quiet, meaningful ways. Mary didn't need to preach or perform miracles; Mary's humble response to her calling invites us to reflect more deeply upon what mission truly involves.

The Feast of the Visitation is a powerful invitation to missionary discipleship and it deeply resonates with me in this season of Advent, especially in my role as a carer. Caring for a loved one can be a daunting and often overwhelming task, but Mary's visit to Elizabeth offers a powerful example of how to serve in love even in the most challenging moments.

Just as Mary, despite her uncertainty went to Elizabeth with a heart full of humility, faith and joy, I too am called to bring Christ's love into my role as a carer. Especially when the path is hard and often painful, it is an opportunity to embody that same selfless love. The Visitation reminds me that like Mary, I am called to serve not out of obligation, but out of a deep love that reflects the presence of Christ.

Hazel Lim, Mission Manager, Sydney Centre for Evangelisation shares the significance of missionary leadership in light of the Christmas story.


Expectant parents eagerly awaiting the arrival of their little ones often pause from their busy lives to reflect on their hopes and concerns, preparing for their new 'call to love.'

MILESTONES AND NEW BEGINNINGS

nd that's a wrap. The 2024 cohort's year finished on November 29 with our annual Mass and Graduation dinner.

52 students completed the Foundations of Missionary Leadership Program this year, which brings the number of people who have undertaken the course since the program began in 2020 to 200.

Over those five years, we have welcomed students from eleven Australian dioceses as well as from two dioceses in New Zealand. Our youngest student was 18, while our oldest student was in her eighties.

Our students have included diocesan and parish youth ministers, family educators, evangelisation and RCIA coordinators, parish ministry leaders, school principals, RECs, family educators, as well as Catholic education and chancery staff.

Perhaps most importantly has been the sizeable number of 'people in the pews' who have studied with us because they simply want to make a difference in their parish.

When I reflect upon the past five years, I am grateful to God for the extraordinary group of people who have come to be more deeply formed as leaders for the Church's mission. To all the graduates of the Foundations of Missionary Leadership program, thank you for your witness and for your commitment.

What's next for the Areté Centre? Well, in January we will welcome another 50 students to the Foundations of Missionary Leadership Program. Eight of these students will undertake the program as a Graduate Certificate through the University of Notre Dame, which is up from six students in 2024, and 3 in 2023.

It's always exciting for the team and the faculty to meet a new cohort of students and the 2025 group will be no exception. The Foundations of Missionary Leadership program is the core of the Areté Centre's ministry.

It's our flagship as it were, and we have no plans to stop offering the program any time soon. We believe we best serve the renewal of the Church by doing our bit to form lay leaders in evangelisation. Is there more for Areté to do? That's really up to the Lord. We just want to be faithful to what he has asked of us. *Velis et remis*.

Meet Joseph Raymond Wehbe, a Lay Chaplain with Catholic Care Western Sydney and Blue Mountains, serving at the Children's Hospital in Westmead. We sat down with Joseph to learn more about his journey of faith and leadership.

Which Parish do you belong to?

In what ways has Areté deepened your understanding of Catholic faith and how has this impacted your professional or personal life?

Areté has deepened my understanding of the Catholic Faith in an enriching and unique way as it explored the personal, spiritual, liturgical, academic and pastoral elements that I have found are all important in being formed as a Catholic. Both professionally and personally Areté has shaped how I communicate, love, minister, and accompany others on their quests to know God. It has also given me the courage to be bold, vulnerable, and open to God's love, which He freely invites me to enter into constantly.








What is one highlight or experience during your journey that you can share with us?

One highlight amongst many would be the friendships I have built during the year. Journeying with amazing people on fire with Holy Spirit encouraged me to continue to move forward when challenging times came my way. The late-night singalongs around the piano and the one-on-one conversations that were shared reminded me of how the early Church used to come together in fellowship while on mission.

During the course you discovered your charisms, how has this changed or impacted your leadership style in your professional work or as a parishioner?

When I discovered my charisms, I knew I was in for a rollercoaster ride with the Holy Spirit, yet I had no idea how the Holy Spirit was going to manifest these charisms within me. Since discovering that I had the charisms of healing and encouragement, the Holy Spirit has allowed me to help others receive physical, emotional and spiritual healing, as well as the encouragement to be bold in taking a leap of faith in engaging in a ministry where I get to use them. I also have a new perspective on how to incorporate faith in the workplace.





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What did you find most challenging during the Areté journey?

Taking what I had learned from the course into my parish ministry and finding that there was not a lot of receptivity to concepts such as forming a statement of mission, vision and values. I was challenged, discouraged, and felt as though I was misunderstood. As St Ignatius of Loyola teaches though: Desolation leads to Consolation.

What is your favourite bible verse?

Proverbs 3:5-8

"Trust in the LORD with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight. Do not be wise in your own eyes; fear the LORD and shun evil. This will bring health to your body and nourishment to your bones."

Who is your favourite saint?

My favourite saint is St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta. Her unwavering dedication to serving the poorest of the poor with love and humility inspires me deeply. She embodied Christ's call to love others selflessly, and her example reminds me to see the face of Jesus in everyone I meet.







Walking with God by Tim Gray and Jeff Cavins
