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Vestry President

The church year from June 2025 to May 2026 has been very busy and full of challenges for our congregation, the staff, and the Vestry. Fortunately, it has also been a year of promise and success.

In the past year our congregation and its Vestry have dealt with three months of pastoral family leave, a devastating fire in the apartment building next to our parking lot, and a brutal winter season that resulted in significant increases in costs for snow removal, property maintenance and energy costs. The property inspection reports from qualified property professionals resulted in the recently approved plan for \$3-million worth of required repairs, replacements and renovation of our 235-year-old church building. That process, including the preservation/restoration of the stained-glass windows, is well underway. I'm therefore pleased to report that contracts have been executed, and onsite work is scheduled to begin on June 1.

Trinity's mission in a world of increasing danger and anxiety, economic turmoil, religious polarization and cultural conflicts is a challenging mission to be sure. We are all aware that mainline churches, including a number of Lutheran churches in our area, are closing or are on the brink of closing due to decreasing membership. There are several reasons for this, all well known. The good news is that our leadership and, indeed our congregation, are determined, more than ever, to remain a steadfast and important member of the religious community and the community at large. We are not keeping this a secret.

We remain dedicated to the three goals of excellence in study and preaching God's Word, excellence in Lutheran worship, and excellence in ministry in the community and the world at large. We celebrate our commitment to those goals. It has made a difference. Congregational attendance at Sunday worship has increased. Participation by our members in many of the various congregational ministries has increased. Mission-oriented partnerships have been formed and are always being sought.

The Vestry is in the final stages of completing the new Strategic Plan, which has been nearly two years in the making, and is now before the congregation for review and comment. We are hopeful that this new plan will provide us with direction and confidence in what we undertake as servants of God through Jesus Christ, whom we serve, and the Holy Spirit that inspires and empowers us.

We have been blessed with gifted spiritual leadership, skilled and committed Vestry members, and talented volunteers from our congregation whose dedication and work have made a real difference in our community. There is a positive energy at work in our midst. We look forward to receiving the next group of new members who will join us in praise and worship, service in ministry, and thankful happiness for all of God's blessings. I like to think that there are three categories of members: Trinity past, Trinity present, Trinity future. In which do you belong?

The Holy Trinity

In the name of our patron: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, whose triune love continues to abundantly sustain this congregation after 275 years. Amen.

We gather today to mark both our Annual Meeting and the official kick-off of Trinity's 275th anniversary, and I find myself amazed by what the Holy Spirit has done among us in the year that has passed since my last report. While our staff, Vestry, and committees deserve every commendation, our progress cannot be attributed to human effort alone. In my daily devotions I continue to ask God to uphold, sustain, and grow Trinity, and these prayers continue to be answered — often more conspicuously than I would have dared to imagine.

Trinity is thriving. Since my last report, more than a dozen people have entered our membership; nine more, drawn from five households, are received today. Another group is preparing to join us this autumn. Worship attendance has remained consistently strong, averaging around one hundred in the Easter season. Trinity's reputation as a fitting place for a festival continues to grow throughout Berks County, with both Christmas Eve and Easter setting post-COVID attendance records. The ambitious budget we approved in 2024 was more than met in 2025, and midway through 2026 our offerings are also strong thanks to your diligence in offering your first fruits.

The administrative strengthening of Trinity has continued in earnest. The Personnel Committee has now completed a second full cycle of staff reviews. Through the work of the Finance Committee, we completed a thorough RFP for new investment advisors and deepened our banking relationships, giving us flexibility. Our partnership with Common Ground, after a season of necessary discernment, has emerged stronger, with a new day for their expanded ministries and new rhythms for ongoing communication. And after a long recovery from a workplace injury, David Troche has returned to nearly full duty — for which I am personally and deeply grateful.

This is also the year in which you approved one of the most significant undertakings in Trinity's recent history: the structural restoration of our main building, together with the beautification of the sanctuary interior, at a total cost approaching three million dollars. The decision was not made lightly. It rests on the patient work of Franki Aitken, Steve Welz, Steve Hofmann, Eric Rosenbaum, and the entire Finance Committee, in close conversation with our architect Michael Kautter, the liturgical artisans at Canning, and our general contractor, Caldwell, Heckles and Egan, Inc. On the evening of Maundy Thursday, you said yes — yes to securing the structure of a 275-year-old building so that it might stand another 275 years; yes to the additional dignity and beauty that this sanctuary deserves; and yes to the generation yet unborn who will inherit it. Beginning June 1, the work will be visible and disruptive. The result will be more than worth it.

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
And so to today. Trinity Sunday, May 31, 2026, marks the official beginning of our 275th anniversary year. Throughout the year ahead, we will tell the story of Trinity's long faithfulness on Sixth and Washington, and we will write the next chapter of that story together.

A personal word of thanks before turning to what lies ahead. The gift of paid parental leave following the birth of our son Nels was one of the deepest blessings of this past year, and his baptism here on December 28th, in the company of so many of you, will remain a sacred memory for Marissa and me. Trinity continued to thrive in my absence — a testament to the strength of our staff and Vestry, and to the Holy Spirit's work of upholding this place.

That work now finds expression in the Strategic Plan that comes before you today. Built upon the Identity, Vision, and Mission statements you affirmed at last year's meeting; refined through a half-day Vestry workshop in January, three Sunday Forums this spring, and the written feedback of many members — this plan is not the work of any one person or committee. It is a synthesis of who Trinity is and who, by God's grace, Trinity is being called to become. It commits us to quarterly events that gather and form our people; to Trinity Circles for fellowship and shared acts of service; to a true pipeline for newcomers; to a renewed culture of welcome; and to the planned giving and added income streams that will sustain this work long past its five-year timeline. I commend it to you wholeheartedly and urge its adoption today.

As I look forward to the coming year, I do so with confidence. The momentum we have built together — in worship, in membership, in resources, in administrative discipline, and in vision — is real, and it is the Holy Spirit's gift. The construction ahead will be challenging. The work of the Strategic Plan will require sustained effort from all of us, especially as we pivot away from worn paradigms into new ones. But Trinity is sprier than we sometimes assume, and 275 years of faithfulness to God's calling have not exhausted her. There is much history yet to be made among us — and, in this anniversary year, much history to celebrate.

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Deacon for Formation and Service

“Your steadfast love endures forever.”

These prayerful words from our Easter season Eucharist liturgy resonate in a new way as I reflect on our ministry at Trinity over the past year.

As the called Deacon for Formation and Service, the lens of diakonia (Greek word for service) colors everything I do with and for our community. The primary areas for which I am responsible include Learning Ministries, Congregational Care and Concern, Fellowship, Outreach and Service, monthly preaching, and the ubiquitous ‘other duties as assigned.’

My $\frac{3}{4}$ time call expanded to full time for 3 months, beginning mid-August, as Pastor Hans was able to take family leave after the birth of his son. The leaders and staff of our congregation stepped up during his absence, devoting many hours to communicate and keep our ministry flowing amid many changes: Bard House renovations, hosting a community evening to support residents displaced due to a fire at the building next to our parking lot, hosting the Refresh Berks Mobile Shower Trailer on Friday mornings, and our first All Saints Vesper Service.

A few highlights: hosting the annual Kristallnacht remembrance service; working with Greater Reading Thriving Together to host 2 ESL community dinners where people can practice speaking English and hoping to expand the work to include regular small conversation groups; the mission/service trip to New Haven; walking with people amid joy and pains of life, including presiding at several funerals; lively Fellowship Events; supporting our Common Ground Recovery Community ministry; and traveling with church leaders to Guatemala to see and support the work of Hogar Miguel Magone, a home for boys and girls, and Hope Academy, a bilingual STEAM school for girls.

God’s steadfast love has been woven into the fabric of our life together and it will be exciting to see what God has in store for our future. Trinity is a vibrant community with many gifts. I am truly blessed to serve among you.

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Cantor

I will have completed my first full program year at Trinity on May 31st. Since June of 2025 the music department has made lots of good changes and had a successful program year. Summer 2025 was very busy for me personally as I embarked on several continuing education events. The first was the two-week Church Music Institute at Shenandoah University; this year focused on conducting and children's choirs and is part of a 3-year cycle after which I will be awarded a graduate certificate in church music. In July, I attended the two-day Augsburg Fortress session in Philadelphia, getting to experience workshops on choral music, handbell music, children's choir music, and keyboard music. In August, I attended the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians conference in Raleigh, NC. There I caught up with my predecessor, Karen Eddinger, who graciously introduced me to many of her longtime friends and colleagues. Lastly, I attended the newly established Seminar on Lutheran Liturgy in Minneapolis, MN.

During summer worship, we continued the tradition of having guest musicians participate in worship. We welcomed many of our own congregation, as well as several youths from the community who had won scholarships from RMF. We had a clean out of the Bard House and the choir room was refinished with new flooring, new lighting, and fresh paint! The old chairs were replaced with spare choir-loft chairs and both Trinity Choir and Mixed Ensemble resumed rehearsals in mid-September. We also began having youth handbell choir rehearsals immediately following Mixed Ensemble.

In the fall we tried a new vespers service for All Saints Sunday. We had moderate attendance and full choir participation. Afterwards we had a group dinner at Lang's Restaurant. Due to construction work at Christ Episcopal Church, we also hosted the annual Kristallnacht service, which was a great success, and we were honored to be able to host such an important community event.

During Advent, Trinity Choir successfully premiered a new piece that I wrote "Drop Down Ye Heavens." Mixed Ensemble led worship at the 5PM Christmas Eve service, and the Trinity Youth Ringers played for the first time. David Himes led the Trinity Orchestra in the prelude. Trinity Choir and Trinity Ringers led worship at the 10:30 PM service. Moving the prelude music to the actual start-time was very important in emphasizing that it is PART of worship and all should be in attendance.

The spring was fairly uneventful beyond normal rehearsals and services. Trinity Choir premiered another of my own works, "Choral Meditations on St. Matthew's Passion," for Palm Sunday. Mixed Ensemble, Trinity Choir, Trinity Ringers, and Trinity Brass all participated in a glorious Easter service. Music Ministry Sunday was again held on May 10, and in addition to having all the ensembles participate, Ralph Reeves and Darryl Jeffries were acknowledged for their many years of service to music at Trinity.

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Ensembles

Trinity Choir continued to lead worship a majority of Sundays and rehearse on Wednesday night. Beginning in September, rehearsals moved to the Bard House choir room. Jonathan Mortensen, Ben Hoover, and Maria Yost remain our Trinity Scholars. Jon Dienst and Levi Strauss joined the tenor section in the Fall. Trinity Choir led the vespers service for All Saints in the fall. During Advent, they premiered my piece “Drop Down, Ye Heavens”, and on Palm Sunday, premiered my “Choral Meditations on St. Matthew’s Passion.”

The Mixed Ensemble continued to lead worship once per month and rehearse on Sundays after worship in the Bard House. They joined Trinity Choir on Easter Sunday, singing an anthem by themselves as well as a combined anthem. On Music Ministry Sunday, they sang along with Trinity Ringers.

Trinity Youth Ringers began rehearsing in the Fall and played for the first time during the 5:00 PM Christmas Eve worship service. They played again on Pentecost.

Trinity Ringers continued to play in worship once per month and rehearse on Wednesday evening. Rita Dienst joined the ensemble in the Fall.

Trinity Brass/Trinity Orchestra were organized by David Himes and performed at Christmas. Trinity Brass joined the combined choirs on Easter.

Music Ministry Sunday was held on May 10th (Mother’s Day). Pastor Hans gave a sermon based on Psalm 66 and I spoke about the team effort it takes to make a successful music program, and thanked Ralph Reeves and Darryl Jeffries for their years of service. A cake was presented during coffee and conversation.

Concert Series

This program year saw the return of in-person Noonday recitals. The first was in September featuring Andrew Skitko in an all-Ukrainian program. In October, Gail Archer gave a tremendous recital of Ukrainian organ music as a joint concert between Fall Festival of the Arts and the Wolfe Series. Donations were collected for Ednannia, an emergency fund for Ukraine collected through the Berks Community Foundation. The Fall included two other Noonday recitals: Brandi Diggs accompanied by Akiko Hosaki, as well as a recital by me for Thanksgiving. In December we welcomed HGMC (formerly the Harrisburg Gay Men’s Chorus) who presented a queer lessons and carols. Donations were taken to support the LGBT Center of Greater Reading.

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In January, we welcomed local favorite Ben Small for a Noonday recital, and In February, Charlie Randazzo's Let's Dance Big Band gave a concert as part of the Wolfe Series. The fellowship committee put together a fantastic spread for the reception, and donations were again collected for Refresh Berks. I gave a noonday recital at the beginning of Lent, followed by violist Kathleen Stevens. The Kutztown University Vocal Ensemble gave a concert on April 26th as part of the Wolfe series and donations were taken for the Red Knight Accelerated Academy at Thomas Ford. A reception was held after to provide dinner to the students; as always, the fellowship committee and Mal did a tremendous job. Trinity Scholar Jonathan Mortensen finished the Noonday series for this program year with a fabulous performance of Gerald Finzi's "Before and After Summer." RMF again held their scholarship recital on May 17th. Lastly, the 275th anniversary year will be kicked off on May 31st featuring me in an organ recital.

Instruments

The organ and piano are maintained regularly. 1/3 of the organ will be removed and stored in the Hintz Room while restoration of the sanctuary takes place.

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Director of Technology and Communication

This year I have been blessed with technology that continues to perform consistently. Considering the number of electronic devices I am responsible for, this amounts to a minor victory of sorts (to me at least).

New investments in 2026 have already begun with the addition of a dedicated security video storage system. The new system was needed to increase the storage capacity – which is currently at 40 days. I also needed to free up space on main drive that contains our network installation. Since adding the additional cameras in the parking lot, bringing our total to 10 (including the door readers), we have been able to assist law enforcement by providing video footage to assist with investigations.

Other technology improvements include two staff computers that need to be replaced and another camera to be installed near the Chiller.

2026 started with the 50th Anniversary of Media Ministry! This monumental event included a comprehensive article prepared by Susan L. Peña, who is a friend of Trinity; which was shared with the Reading Eagle and Berks Weekly, and also an interview by 69 News that can be watched on YouTube at <https://youtu.be/0wfx2tKUX2I?si=5syfqGYc6e22aXK> ; and we also enjoyed a collection of video highlights with breakfast and kicked off worship with a throwback to Elton Richards.

This year I had the privilege of attending certified Ubiquiti training. We use Ubiquiti equipment extensively at Trinity and I am grateful for the opportunity to expand my understanding of it. The area of concentration that I focused on was Cybersecurity and Networking and included such topics as Port Isolation, Spanning Tree Protocol, Static Routing, and Firewall. The two-day class included a lot of hands on training and concluded with a test administered through Ubiquiti, and I am pleased to report that I am now certified in that area. Most of the changes I plan to make to our network will not be visible but will offer a better protection from internet-based intrusions.

So far I have not yet discussed anything new with video. This is because our video equipment continues to perform at a high level. One new addition is a new plugin to DaVinci Resolve (our video editor software) that animates the subtitles we use in reels for social media. This small addition helps with following along with the content and is common in mainstream vertical content. With the work soon beginning in the Sanctuary you can expect to see occasional reels showing progress. These reels will be produced like the ones I made during the All Saints Room renovation.

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Have you noticed any of the small changes that have been made in Steeple Notes lately?

We are testing out new layouts and an increased use of photographs in anticipation of the quarterly magazine format we plan to adopt later this year. Please feel free to let me know what you like and what you like to see in the new format.

The start of the 275th Anniversary is closely approaching and I have been working with the anniversary committee and Kristen Opalinski to present a 275th logo that represents Trinity in this year of celebration, you might have seen it in the May 31st announcement that is has been in the bulletin, on the website, and in Trinity Tidings.

Educational Assistance Committee

The Educational Assistance Committee granted awards to nine applicants in June of 2025. The Kindermusik program also received a grant and monies were set aside to support those in need in the city of Reading. The combined grants totaled \$62,103.00 and were allocated based on the prescribed parameters of each fund included in the Educational Assistance Funds.

The Committee is pleased to report that the applicants were well qualified and succeeding in their educational pursuits with grades meeting and exceeding the requirements set forth in our guidelines. The students were well spoken and made very positive impressions on the committee during the interview process. The online application format will be open for prospective grantees in May and interviews will take place during the second week of June, 2026. Applicants will be notified of grant allocations the following week so that the students may adequately plan for the upcoming academic school year.

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Evangelism and Media Committee

The newly formed Evangelism and Media Committee held its first bimonthly meeting on June 29, 2025 in the new Welcome Center. It has been an exciting year as our committee has been finding its direction and purpose among the committees here at Trinity. It has been my intention to link our committee with the Fellowship Committee, the Outreach Committee, and the 275th Committee. Our mission in expanding Trinity's visibility through our media endeavors and evangelical engagement is inextricably intertwined with the work of those other committees. Facilitating and fostering support for those committees is an important part of this committee, and I hope we can continue to cooperate and to succeed in advancing our common goals.

Thanks to the hard work of Matt Mellen, our Director of Technology and Communication, Trinity has been front and center in traditional media outlets such as the Reading Eagle and Channel 69 News. A few examples of the fruits of his work were the television news pieces on the Mardi Gras festivities and the Refresh Berks shower trailer initiated and partially funded by Trinity. These are also great examples of how the Evangelism and Media Committee supports the works of our Fellowship Committee and Outreach Committee.

In addition to these reports, the Reading Eagle has written about Trinity, placing Pastor Hans on the cover, highlighting our Church's evolving use of technology over the past fifty years, from its first TV broadcast to its current effective use of social media in spreading our message. In keeping with this evolution of how we reach new audiences and bring people to join us here, we intend to be making some changes to the media broadcast time on BCTV as we believe the costs involved do not generate an appropriate return on our investment. We will continue to broadcast the worship service on BCTV as we have previously, however, the additional content we publish will be cut and we will focus on other formats via the internet e.g., YouTube, Facebook, Instagram, and TikTok, to continue to publish such content.

As for our online broadcasts of worship, they have shown a steady increase in viewership thanks to the work of Matt to promote the worship service through YouTube and Facebook. We are averaging 62 viewers on YouTube and 30 viewers on Facebook each Sunday. These numbers are included in our attendance report to the ELCA. We are encouraging our members to support our online evangelism through sharing the worship service on their own social media pages, and we authored an article in the most recent issue of Steeple Notes highlighting the importance of social media in our efforts to attract more people to experience the wonderful and welcoming environment we have at Trinity. We will continue with these efforts throughout the 275th anniversary year.

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We intend to have the newsletter publication, Steeple Notes, changed from a bimonthly newsletter to a magazine format published quarterly with more in-depth content and move general reminders and notices of regularly occurring events to our Trinity Tidings weekly email newsletter. It is necessary to obtain estimates for the cost of such an undertaking, however, we believe there are funds in the current budget from the evangelism side of the ledger to cover the cost of the publication this year. We would like to have the magazine format ready for the fourth quarter of this year, after the construction is complete and to highlight the Trinity 275th and Advent/Christmas season.

As to the finances, the budget seems to be in good shape and on target in 2026. There are additional costs associated with the Microsoft subscription as Microsoft will no longer subsidize non-profit subscriptions, so we have decided to modify the subscription to a more moderate amount of software commensurate with our needs. Matt was able to purchase a new digital storage device to accommodate our media storage needs as we were using a hodgepodge of storage devices and did not have an adequate backup putting our digital archive at risk of being compromised, lost or erased.

I would be remiss not to thank all of the volunteers who make the Media broadcasts and communications possible as you see them every week operating the cameras in the sanctuary, and those you don't see behind the scenes working the audio and video boards to make our evangelical and media endeavors a success. I'm sure I can speak for all of us at Trinity when I say we could not do it without you and we greatly appreciate all you do!

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Fellowship Committee

The Fellowship Committee organized anew in early 2025, reevaluating our core purposes and goals as set forth in our Constitution's bylaws. Inspired by the completion of the All Saints Room and the Welcome Center, the committee dedicated this year to revitalizing congregational life together through thoughtfully planning events. This included the purchase of new table linens in white, gold, burgundy, and blue, as well as new efficient and practical coffee dispensers to better serve our gatherings.

The Fellowship Committee welcomed "Coffee and Conversation" time after church to be included in committee efforts. We conducted a formal survey to ensure our programming aligned with the congregation's desires. Events such as "Dinner and a Show," the "Soup and Soul" series, living history programs, and "Banned Bingo" were popular choices. We continue to work toward proposing a budget that appropriately meets our needs, though we face a consistent challenge in accurately predicting member attendance numbers for our planning.

Chef Mal remained a cornerstone of our ministry, working from the Trinity kitchen to create custom menus and provide delicious food for a diverse array of occasions. We were honored to host our first event of the year for Cantor Cameron Wentz's installation. In combination with the Rändel Wolfe Memorial Concert Series, the committee planned receptions for the Susquehanna University Choir and a festive hot chocolate reception in the Welcome Center for Harrisburg's Gay Men's Choir. Our community outreach and interfaith efforts were equally robust; we coordinated a Mardi Gras celebration benefiting Refresh Berks and hosted the Kristallnacht service and reception in partnership with the Jewish Federation of Reading and Christ Episcopal.

We also shared in many personal milestones of faith and family. On Pentecost Sunday we celebrated our Confirmants' and at the end of November hosted the annual Advent Breakfast. One of the year's highlights was welcoming the Becklin family's newest addition with a book-themed baby shower in July. Celebrating the birth and baptism of Nels Becklin served as the perfect conclusion to 2025, providing a joyful foundation as we look forward to the year ahead.

- Developing the annual operating budget for the congregation, in cooperation with the staff and standing committees.
- Overseeing the expenditures of all operating funds and generation of revenues.
- Working with the Stewardship Committee to obtain annual pledges from congregational members.
- Working with the Property Committee to identify present and future capital needs for the repair and maintenance of all church property.
- Review of the insurance needs of the church and establish contracts to protect the property, the public, and the employees.
- Manage the receipt and investment or use of legacy gifts.
- Select and review criteria for the management of the Trinity Investment Funds.
- Oversee that appropriate systems and procedures for the administration of all financial transactions for Trinity are in place with qualified staff and appropriate technology.

The Finance Committee meets quarterly, with additional meetings as needed during the development of the annual budget. Committee members on the current roster are Allison Kalbach (Chair), Erica Hofmann (Treasurer), Jeff Wasmuth, Franki Aitken, and Peter Graf. Peter Graf is the staff liaison.

In 2025, the Finance Committee issued a Request for Proposal to several investment management firms. After a thorough review of the submissions, including performance analysis, fee evaluation, service capabilities, and alignment with our long-term objectives, the Committee determined that a change in investment managers was in the best interest of the organization. As a result, we elected to transition from Connors Investor Services to Tompkins Financial Advisors. This transition was completed in October 2025

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Endowment Funds

The fair market value of our endowment funds on December 31, 2025, was as follows:

General endowment \$6,097,612

Property endowment \$775,670

Steeple endowment \$232,577

Educational assistance endowment \$2,807,177 (\$12,788 in educational assistance checking account)

Tompkins- savings \$339,642

The budgeted annual draw from the general endowment for 2025 was \$287,352 (5.25%) from the average of the trailing twelve quarter market value as of September 2024, and the property endowment draw was \$32,826 (5.00%) of the trailing 11 quarter market value at the time the budget was approved. As of 12/31/2025, the actual withdrawal rate from the General Endowment Fund was 5.10% of the 12 quarterly average, and 4.62% of the 11 quarterly average from the Property Endowment Fund.

Learning Ministries/Faith Formation Committee

Ministry with and for youth and children

Youth and Children are an active, vital part of our Trinity Community.

You can see them on Sunday mornings serving in so many ways: assisting the altar guild; running a camera during worship; assisting as crucifer, acolyte, torchbearer, usher, or greeter; singing and playing bells. We are blessed with faithful families and kids.

June 8, 2025 was a joyful day as Avery, Jacinda, William, Declan, and Abbie affirmed their baptisms. Each presented an expression of their faith journey. At the beginning of the academic year, we said a prayer for Kate, before she began her college career, and blessed backpacks and devices of students and teachers.

Our youth have a heart for service in the community. 3 youth and 2 adults from Trinity traveled to New Haven, CT June 22-29 for a week of service and learning. We were joined with youth and adults from St. John's, Sinking Spring and St. John's, Mohnton. Service. In August, youth helped lead a Birthday Party at the Lighthouse Center for Women and Children. 15 members walked in the Reading/Berks CROP Hunger Walk and raised funds to fight hunger locally and globally. We also served dinner at Opportunity House on the first Sunday in Advent.

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In the fall Trinity joined a pilot program from the Nourishing Vocation Project with Children at St. Olaf College, using the Wonders of Worship curriculum. At the teaching time in worship, we learn about the various parts of our liturgy and what they mean. As part of participating in the project, Dr. Wentz and I will attend a conference on Liturgy, Worship and the Arts (all expenses paid!)

This year we hosted the third Intergenerational Easter Egg Hunt. As we celebrated the surprise of the resurrection, there were surprises for kids, youth, and adults! Due to rain, it was held indoors, but the joy of the children was palpable.

Ministry with and for adults

The Learning Ministries Committee, in collaboration with Trinity Program Staff, envisioned our Sunday morning education hour to be intentionally intergenerational as we began the Trinity Together Sunday Forum Series. While it didn't turn out to be what we hoped would be a regular time of community building and learning for all ages, the 9:00 AM education hour offered a variety of learning opportunities about prayer, and the sacraments (preparing Nina for her first Holy Communion.)

The semi-monthly Bible Study for Women of TLC was held at the highlands from September-May. The Trinity Book Club meets every other month at the homes of various members. During Lent, Deaconess Deborah lead Book Study and Prayer Groups on Tuesday evenings and Thursday afternoons.

Learning Ministries is one of our ministry areas that has room for more ideas and passion. Our current committee members are Brooke Rosenbaum, Christine Motley, and Amy Heins as our Vestry Liaison! 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Outreach & Service Committee

Meetings are held 3 times per year at 11:30 AM on the 4th Sunday of January, April, and September. New members continue to be recruited. Come join us at one of our meetings, or talk to any member for more information. Give us a try.

This committee was re-launched in October 2024, so this is the first full year report of the “new” committee. As we look back, I think all will agree that this has been a year filled with many successes, joys, and a few challenges. As Trinity moves into the new 5 year strategic plan, we look forward to participating in renewed growth and change that is sure to come. This report seeks to summarize the committee’s work over the past 12 months.

Last summer we again held three Courtyard Cafes on June 25, July 23, and August 27 coordinated by Nancy Everson. Additional tents were purchased so all attendees would be able to eat comfortably in the shade. Many people attended, enjoying the food and conversation. We continue to believe this ministry is meeting its goal of outreach to our community. Unfortunately, with the upcoming renovations occurring over the summer of 2026, the committee has made the difficult decision to pause the Courtyard Cafes this summer with the intent of restarting them in 2027.

In 2025, we began holding ESL (English as a Second Language) dinners at Trinity in partnership with the Harwood Initiative in Reading. We held two in the past year, November 11, 2025, and February 10, 2026. Trinity provided the food and table hosts. As more organizations have joined this partnership, Trinity will host one dinner per year. Next year the ESL dinner at Trinity will be held on Tuesday, March 9, 2027. Maggie Shelly and Mike Faust serve as advocates for this outreach.

Refresh Berks is another new mission which came to fruition in the past year, with Amy Stewart-Himes serving as the advocate. Trinity and 6 other organizations were involved in fund raising in addition to a grant secured by Senator Judith Schenk. The Kickoff Splash was held on Saturday, May 17, 2025. The shower trailer was put into service in the summer of 2025. The trailer will be onsite at Trinity weekly again this year. A fundraiser “Raise the Roof” was held on Friday, April 17, 2026 to raise funds to build a garage to house the trailer. Our committee provided the raffle basket (put together by Jorge Tomas) which included all things Berks.

We supported Lighthouse Women and Children’s Center in several ways this year. Our Lenten Appeal was dedicated to fulfilling our \$25,000 room commitment. In 2026, we collected \$4,767, leaving a balance of \$4,059.85. This commitment will be completed by the end of 2026. As in the past number of years, our Angel Tree held gift tags for the Lighthouse Women and Children’s Center and Dayspring Homes.

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The tags were again quickly taken and gifts wrapped and returned. This year, we also provided a birthday party at Lighthouse Women and Children's Center on Sunday, August 24, 2025. All who attended had a great time, especially in the petting zoo. Carolyn Holleran is the advocate for this outreach.

On Sunday, July 20, 2025, we hosted a table at the Berks Pride event. We will again have a table on July 19, 2026. This year, Deaconess Deborah will be coordinating story times. Although the committee believes this outreach fits well into our mission, we need to review whether or not we continue it next year. It seems that not enough persons are willing to help staff the table throughout the day. If you also believe in this outreach, won't you please sign up to cover an hour or two on July 19? Amy Litvinov is the advocate for this outreach.

Again this year, we provided dinner to Opportunity House 6 times, feeding approximately 70 persons each time. A special thank you to all the team leaders who make this happen. If this is a ministry you would like to be a part of, please speak to the advocate, Russ Diesinger.

In September each year, we participate in the ELCA's "God's Work, Our Hands" Sunday, providing different types of outreach each year including sanitation kits for Refresh Berks, collecting toiletries for Common Ground, participating in the Potato Project, and washing windows at Lighthouse Women and Children's Center. Amy Heins is the advocate for this outreach.

This committee also works with Common Ground on an ongoing basis to provide clothes, etc. Maggie Shelly is the advocate for this mission.

In addition, we support the Crop Walk and Youth Mission Trip. Deaconess Deborah and the youth advocate for these items.

Over the past year, Trinity has begun to support the Red Knight Accelerated Academy at Thomas Ford, Reading School District. There were funds remaining from our 10th and Penn support which ended during Covid. Vestry agreed to allow those funds to be allocated to Thomas Ford School. This has become a new outreach for this committee. We are currently seeking an advocate for this. Until one is found, Deaconess Deborah and Vickie Unruh will serve as coordinators.

Finally, in celebration of Trinity's 275th anniversary year, there will be a special Outreach and Service Project. A subcommittee is being formed to determine the project, etc. Joseph Speece, III is the Outreach and Service representative on this subcommittee.

I continue to be excited about the Outreach and Service Opportunities at Trinity and look forward to what lies ahead in 2026 and beyond.

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Property Committee

The Property Committee is tasked with directing the maintenance and upkeep of Trinity Lutheran's property and buildings, working within the budget provided by Vestry. The Committee meets monthly and submits a monthly report to Vestry. The Committee works with the Senior Pastor and the Property Manager to oversee the church grounds, buildings, parking lot, and the cemetery located on South Street. The current Property Committee consists of: Franki Aitken, Pastor Hans Becklin, Anita Dolak, Steven Hofmann, Carol Miller, Charlie Moody, Eric Rosenbaum, and Mae Sunderland.

2025 – 2026 program year was another active year for the Property Committee. With the majority of the auditorium project behind us, our attention got turned to addressing the visible cracks in the sanctuary ceiling. Never did we imagine the magnitude of issues we encountered or the magnitude of the cost to address the structure issues found. Bi-weekly construction meetings have begun with the architect, general contractor and the sub-contractors. Though no construction will commence inside the sanctuary until June 1st, outside work or prepping may take place before then.

The Committee did some work at the Cemetery that made it less attractive for trespassers to occupy some of the spaces they had in the past. In 2026, we will try to address removing a shed that has fallen into disrepair on the property.

Thanks to the generous bequest Trinity received from the Reimer Estate, that beautiful, very tall steeple received a fresh coat of paint this spring.

This year we continued our upgrade of the HVAC system by adding two more units to the new control system installed when we upgraded the HVAC system in 2022. This is in line with our long-term plan to simplify controls and upgrade or replace equipment as needed.

The Committee wants to ask for your patience as we move worship services to the All Saints Room until the sanctuary project is complete in the fall. We know that when the final unveiling of the space occurs, everyone will agree that it will be well worth the inconvenience.

Thank you to the Garden Committee for putting a smile on everyone's face when they walk into church on Sunday. They make the gardens look amazing.

And a special thank you to Bill Norton, who stepped off the Property Committee this year. Bill may have stepped off the Committee but thankfully he didn't step away from the property. He continues to lend a hand, or hands when needed. Thanks Bill.

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FINANCIAL REPORT

Erica Hofmann, Treasurer, presented highlights of Trinity Lutheran Church's financial status for year-to-date through May 2025

- 1) This was the largest income stream in member offerings. This will allow Trinity to build its budget. Income from member offerings was under by \$9,400 compared to what was originally budgeted.
- 2) Parking lot income from rentals has been a tremendous asset to the budget.
- 3) Expenses are above budget by \$5,041.00
- 4) Income is below budget by \$845.00
- 5) Overall, Trinity Lutheran Church is on target with a surplus of \$679.00

No discussion or questions were presented regarding the financial report. Financial report was approved unanimously.
