AWHS GRADS RECOGNIZED FOR ACHIEVEMENTS, SERVICE

Our Anthony Wayne community has much to celebrate, with alumni excelling in various fields and being recognized for their remarkable contributions. From the arts to the military, and business leadership to community service, here are some recent achievements that showcase the excellence of our graduates:

Ken Bialecki ['82] was named among Penta Career Center's Outstanding Alumni. As the founder and owner of AE Electric, Inc., Ken has built a successful career in the electrical industry. He gives back to the community by supporting the St. Jude Dream Home Giveaway and mentoring other AW grads entering the electrical trade.

DISTRICT FINANCES: OPERATIONAL LEVY IMPACTS

The following information is provided to share some insight into what will happen next following the failure of the District's proposed operational levy that appeared on the November 5 ballot.

OPERATIONAL LEVY OUTCOME

The election outcome certified by the Lucas County Board of Elections indicates that the proposed levy failed by four votes. Since the difference is within 1/2 percent, the Secretary of State will conduct a mandatory recount. We are still waiting for official results, but are moving forward as if the levy failed.

PROPERTY REVALUATION, MILLAGE RATE AND HOUSE BILL 920

The state's constitution requires that schools receive a minimum of 20 mills in local funding.

The District's effective millage rate currently sits at just above the 20-mill floor at 21.99 mills. With the most recent property revaluation, the Lucas County Auditor says we can expect property values to increase by an estimated 29.5%. This will drop the District's effective millage below the 20-mill floor.

HOW IT WORKS: As property values increase, effective millage decreases.

House Bill 920 ensures that previously-voted levies cannot collect more than their approved dollar value. As property values increase, it takes fewer mills to generate the same amount of money.

Example: In 2003 voters approved a 4.85-mill levy, generating \$3 million per year. Since then, property values have increased, but HB920 caps the amount the district can receive to \$3 million - resulting in a lower effective millage rate.

HB 920 is designed to protect residents from paying more property taxes as values increase, but the new valuations are pushing the effective millage rate below the 20-mill minimum required by the state. The auditor must adjust the millage back to 20-mills, resulting in a tax increase for property owners.

AWLS is one of many districts across the state experiencing this issue. Districts that have not passed operational levies over a long period of time operate at or near the 20-mill floor. With the increase in property values, these districts are dipping below the 20-mill floor and must be made whole. AWLS has not passed a new operational levy since 2013.

QUESTIONS REMAIN

Unfortunately, we still do not have all the pieces to the puzzle. We will not know the District's new effective tax rate until the new property values are final and certified by the state. This also means we cannot calculate the increase for property owners or get a definitive anticipated revenue for the District.

We understand that this situation is complicated, and the unknowns can be frustrating. We are working hard to get the answers and will share more information with you as it becomes available.
