
The Unwinding of the Medicaid Continuous Coverage Requirement

Who is at risk of losing Medicaid coverage?


NO LONGER ELIGIBLE

 People whose earnings now exceed the maximum threshold

STILL ELIGIBLE

- People who have not received notices about renewal due to a change in address
- People who didn't return the renewal form in time
- People of color and children are much more likely to lose coverage for procedural reasons
