Welcome

Hello and Happy New Year

At the end of last year it was my privilege to spend time attending a number of events, where, along with colleagues, we were asking questions of and listening to our supported people, their families and our employees, in order to understand better what is important to them. This will help us to think carefully about how CrossReach develops as an organisation in the future. In my view there is no better place to start than by involving those who understand what will be needed best – our people. Under a theme of 'No Limits', which came out of one of our conversations, we have been



encouraging our people to help us think about how to move forward in a way which enriches lives and helps us to remain resilient in uncertain times. Later this year we look forward to talking about our future plans and sharing them with you.

Just before Christmas, our 'Winter of Light' short film series gave an insight into some aspects of the work of CrossReach. This is available to watch on the CrossReach YouTube channel if you haven't yet seen it. One episode focussed on what it meant to 'Care'. As I look through this edition, I am reminded about the very active nature of the word care, which is well understood by our employees. It's not simply about 'doing to' people - it is about making strong positive relationships so that all may live life to the full.

That theme is evident throughout this edition where you will read of an abundance of activity. Our residents at The Elms Home, supported by the team there, enjoyed a number of outings ranging from a trip on a barge to visiting animals at Edinburgh Zoo. Staff and supported people at Threshold Glasgow service staged a prom and had a lot of fun while enjoying a new experience; our remarkable team at Dumbrock House, set about raising funds so that the young people who live there could have some special Christmas treats. Netball, running and even beard shaving was on the cards, as the team demonstrated what care means to them-showing love in abundance.

The love and care shown by our staff to those they support is not unique to CrossReach, it is the very foundation on which good social care is built across our country. That hard work and commitment to building supportive relationships, which can help us all through the tough times, are what stops a very pressurised system reaching complete breaking point.

The value of this work, compared to the poor financial reward has been recognised by faith leaders across the country. They, along with other organisations who deliver social care directly, or have experience of what it means to be supported, have been lobbying the Scottish Government on the issue of fair pay. This needs to be reflected in the Scottish budget if it is to be achieved for the workforce. Last year half of the people who took up roles in social care subsequently left to pursue a career in another industry- not because they didn't like the work, but because the low wage paid for highly skilled work left them unable to balance income with the realities of day to day living. I would invite you to think about how you too might support this collective effort to achieve justice for the workforce, whether that is through understanding more about the issue so that you can influence local decision makers, through prayer, or by engaging with your local MSP.

I hope you find much to enjoy and to think about in this CrossReach News update. Thank you for your continued support, it matters, and it makes a difference.

Faith Leaders call for Fair Work in Social Care

You may be aware from reports on the news that Social Care in Scotland is receiving a lot of attention and that people both accessing services and working within the sector are calling for change. The current system allows for uneven access to support and can undermine the way in which people choose to live their lives. There is inequality in the way that the system is funded which means poor choice of services in some areas and comparatively low pay for employees. CrossReach is working with faith leaders across Scotland campaigning for fair work in Social Care.

Primarily, the faith leaders are interested in the social justice aspects of this situation and would be keen to ensure that those depending on the system for support and those working in the system are recognised for their intrinsic worth and should be enabled to live their life in the fullest way possible.

June 2023

Faith leaders unite under a joint initiative hosted by the Catholic Church and the Church of Scotland. A declaration was formed, and faith leaders were invited to sign.

August 2023

Declaration reaches 400 signatures*. The CCPS (Coalition of Care and Support Providers Scotland) invited faith leaders to provide a focus week as part of their national campaign '4 Steps to Fair Work'

September 2023

Programme for Government announced. Issue of fair pay recognised but delayed implementation of £12 per hour until April 2024.



CCPS issue media statement:

'Programme for Government social care pay announcement fails to grasp reality and begs questions over timeline'.



Real living wage announced as £12 from April 2024. This will mean that the uplift offered to social care staff will now be equal to what the minimum the Living Wage Foundation calculates is needed to meet every day needs.

Living Wage Scotland

November 2023

110 organisations from across civic society, including providers, anti-poverty groups, faith leaders, carers' representatives and equality organisations sign joint letter to First Minister calling on him to increase pay for social care staff.

December 2023

Representatives from the Church of Scotland, the Roman Catholic Church and Viv Dickenson, CEO CrossReach met with Michael Matheson, Cabinet Secretary for Health and Social Care.



December 2023

Faith leaders group write to Neil Grapy MSP, Cabinet Secretary for Wellbeing, Economy, Fair Work and Energy to request a meeting.

Scottish Government confirm budget of £12 per hour for social care staff from April 2024



*More than 400 faith leaders from all over the country have joined this call. This included the Salvation Army, the Free Church of Scotland, the Scotlish Episcopal Church, and from the interfaith partners, Jewish Care Scotland and the Scotlish Ahlul Bayt Society.

I can't wait to be part of the next prom committee to continue to make this an annual event for all customers to enjoy at Threshold Glasgow."









Days Out with The Elms

A talented resident at The Elms told us about a couple of days out they enjoyed.

Barge trip via Ratho.

"The van taking us, two carers, four residents, and one carer who was also a very skilled and safe driver - despite us going down some very narrow lanes! Her day did not start there, it began in Asda buying all the picnic food. A superb variety of sarnies, crisps, chocolate cookies and petite snowballs. Obviously mixed bottles of juice were

included too. The two carers settled us onto the barge, some inside and some outside in the warm sun. On arrival we were offered either tea or coffee which was much appreciated. All the staff on the barge were volunteers and extremely knowledgeable and friendly. As we started the sail down the section of the union canal, we went past some lovely trees and landscapes. Walkers waved to us, the young and the not so young. We were put to the test when identifying the trees, the one that got us all was beautiful and was a willow. We berthed for lunch at 12:30, ate too much and recommenced our journey. Another successful outing!!"



Trip to the Zoo

"A few weeks ago, two young dynamic carers asked me if I fancied going to the zoo. I must say I was speechless (very rare occurrence) did they realise the effort it would take to arrange such a visit? They were not to be deterred. So the day of the visit came I was really looking forward to it and we had a sunny day. Two carers Cameron and Claire and three residents in total two requiring wheelchairs. I forgot how hilly Edinburgh Zoo is. Both carers never complained but were exhausted by the end of the trip. We had lunch and a rest and started up another hill. A fabulous experience."





Dick Stewart Service

In June, Glasgow HSCP announced that they would no longer be providing funding for CrossReach's Dick Stewart Service beyond December 2023. The Dick Stewart Service is CrossReach's only justice service and provides accommodation and support for men coming out of long term prison sentences to integrate back into the community. The project also provides a Home Leave service to the Scottish Prison Service for men who are close to release.

The service has provided excellent support for over 20 years and recently received grades of 5 (good) and 6 (excellent) after an unannounced inspection. Efforts are continuing to find alternative funding to retain the expertise of the staff team and continue to provide vital support to service users into the future.

Gift for South Beach House

At the heart of our work in each of our care homes is the desire for each life to be lived to the full, regardless of age or diagnosis. In November 2023, South Beach House, our residential care home in Ardrossan, received a donation of £10,000 from the members of The Guild at St Cuthbert's church in Saltcoats. The generous gift will be used to furnish the home's new Namaste therapy room, which has been introduced to provide life-enriching sensory experiences for people living with advanced dementia. We are really grateful for this gift and for the benefits it will bring to our South Beach House residents and to their loved ones.









Fundraising at Dumbrock House

Staff team members Philomena, Jackie and Ross, who are also teammates at the local Knightswood Netball club, organised a netball tournament with games, raffle prizes and home baking. Support practitioner Ross has received international recognition as a netball player having been selected for both the Scottish and English men's national sides. Their team efforts raised over £800 and contributed towards the young people enjoying a holiday.

The end of September saw the Dumbrock team get their trainers back on again, this time to take part in the A J Bell Great Scottish run – just a quick 10k! Again, the team raised over £800 towards planning Christmas activities for the young people.

And finally, in the spirit of showing love to others, team leader Sandy and a young person from Carraig View, another of our children's houses, made a deal that Sandy would grow his beard for 6 months and let the young person shave it off for charity. They both chose causes that were close to their hearts and as a result, the Friends of Kilpatrick and The British Heart Foundation both received £200. Sandy commented "These are two amazing charities, one huge one and one local but both equally important to whoever needs them!

20 Years of Sunflower Garden

In recognition that children with a parent who uses substances need their own support, in 2003, in partnership with Edinburgh young carers, we planted the seeds of a pilot project to support 8 children. 20 years on we recently celebrated the growth of Sunflower Garden and the tangible benefits experienced by the children attending.

Sunflowers are remarkably resilient flowers that seek light and can adapt and blossom despite environmental challenges. Like the flowers from which the service takes its name, with the appropriate support, children's lives can grow and thrive despite the difficulties they face and you can read more about Sunflower Garden on our website.

Being able to go to somewhere like the Sunflower Garden gave me a chance to be a child. It enabled me to breathe. To do normal things. To make friends. And to do things for me. It enabled a safe space for creativity and play.



We were delighted to be joined by Rt Rev Sally Foster-Fulton, The Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. During her time with us she visited services and joined us for key events.

Simpson House, Counselling

CrossReach Counselling East provides a wide range of therapeutic support and counselling for individuals and families via three specific services. Support is delivered from two Edinburgh city centre premises as well as over the phone and online. The Moderator heard from the teams about the invaluable contributions that volunteers make to the service.









The Elms

The Elms is a large Victorian mansion set in its own extensive grounds in the Grange area of Edinburgh. It offers specialist residential care for older people with dementia in a safe and homely environment. During the Moderator's visit a 'Heart for Art' session was taking place which the artistic residents were enjoying.

Polmont Prison Visitor Centre

The Visitor Centre aims to support any family or friends visiting a loved one in HMPYOI Polmont. There is a children's play area, and opportunity for visitors to have refreshments and a talk with our experienced staff about any concerns or information about prison visiting. Discussions with the Moderator included the importance of nurturing and supporting families of those with loved ones in prison.









Allarton

Allarton is a residential service for adults experiencing mental health issues. With 14 bedrooms, the spacious house is designed to provide round-the-clock care, but also promote independence and choice. The service encourages residents to become part of the wider community and also offers a number of activities within the service.

Learning and Disability Forum

One of the highlights in the CrossReach calander is the National Forum Day for our adult learning disability services. The event brings together people and workers from across Scotland for a day of celebrating success, enjoying activities together and feeding into the ongoing development of CrossReach services.





During the Moderator's time with CrossReach, the short film series 'Winter of Light' was made. This ran each week in the run up to Christmas with each episode carrying a different theme.

Winter Appeal

We are incredibly grateful to everyone of you, who have supported our Winter Appeal featuring Andy's brave journey to turn his mental health around following a difficult childhood. Andy, a 59-year-old from Buckie, Scotland is a dedicated employee of a national roadwork company and in the winter he works tirelessly to keep the roads clear as a snowplough driver (thank you Andy!)



He told us...

"I have been married to my best friend for 39 years and have 2 children and 5 grandchildren. After a horrible childhood with no happy memories and endless battering and put downs, I was left with horrendous memories and a really bad case of anger and hatred towards people. I want to share my story so other people especially men in my age bracket who were brought up the same way as apparently it was the done thing then which I totally disagree with. After losing a close relative who was like a mother to me, I was at rock bottom.

My wife who knows me so well sat me down and got me to open up a bit. She recommended counselling which I thought was for people worse than me, she recommended CrossReach which has a office next door to her work.

I made the call which changed my life.

I had a fantastic counsellor who listened and never judged me. She gave me the tools on how to stop things in my head, hearing the voices which kept putting me down. She guided me in telling my wife, then my children some of my stories so maybe they could understand why I was always angry and stressed. They truly helped me. It was at that point I could say for the first time in my life, I was proud of myself.

Andy's journey is an inspiring tale of resilience, hope, and the capacity for transformation, this journey is only possible because of you. One in four Scots are suffering with their mental health, nearly half of men have negative thoughts and 1 in 3 consider suicide. Our expert counselling services are vital to our communities, supporting families at breaking point.

We have spent the last couple of months sharing motivational and uplifting messages to promote wellbeing and give people following us, a new perspective or approach to self help. Its been fantastic to see you sharing these messages to help spread the positive word in the hope it helps even one more person.

Last year CrossReach provided over 15,000 counselling sessions to people who may have otherwise had nowhere to go. As it costs over £75 to hold each session and as the times are increasingly challenging, it's more important than ever to keep supporting these community lifelines.

Whether you have prayed, shared or donated towards the appeal, we can't thank you enough. There is still time to change a life if you are able.

Employee Representation Group

"My name is John Proudfoot and I recently commenced the role of Lead Representative within the Employee Representative Group.

The Employee Representative Group provides a joint forum for the leadership team at CrossReach to consult and seek the advice and views of the workforce, and I have already had the pleasure of visiting a number of services and meeting with colleagues. The Employee Representative Group also ensures that all employees across the organisation are heard and treated fairly, and in line with CrossReach values and policies. We are also here to offer advice, support and representation through any formal process, which include disciplinary hearings, investigation hearings and attendance management hearings. This support is by no means mandatory, but is available to all members of staff.



The Employee Representative Group also represents staff in the negotiation of pay, benefits, conditions, formal consultations, and any other matters affecting your employment. I am also very fortunate to have the continued support and commitment from my Employee Representative Group colleagues, who are an elected group of Service Representatives, Elected Representatives and Senior Representatives who give up their valuable time to ensure the best possible outcomes for staff.



Each CrossReach Service can appoint up to two Service Representatives, who will attend regular Service Representative meetings, and provide the opportunity for the two-way flow of information between their Service and the Elected Representative Group. The Service Representative Group meetings will be held remotely. Should you be interested in taking on this role, you will required to be nominated by two colleagues from your Service.
