Director's Letter

Dear Colleagues

It was a very busy half term week as the Jubilee of the World of Education took place. The news that Pope Leo XIV has named St John Henry Newman a co-patron saint of Catholic education, along with St Thomas Aquinas, has been received with joy as he is declared the 38th Doctor of the Church. Cardinal José Tolentino de Mendonça, the prefect of the Dicastery for Culture and Education said that Newman is an "extraordinary educator and great inspiration for the philosophy of education."

In addition, Pope Leo's Apostolic Letter "Drawing New Maps of Hope", was released on 28 October, marking the sixtieth anniversary of the conciliar declaration "Gravissimum Educationis". In it, he

reaffirms and expands that document's vision, applying it to the challenges of the present time. There is much to draw out from this Letter, in which Pope Leo invites educators to use language that heals, to keep an open and discerning heart, and to face today's challenges with courage and generosity. He acknowledges the real difficulties of the present: fragmented attention caused by hyper-digitalisation, fragile relationships, social insecurity, and inequality.

Against these threats, he calls for a spirit of inclusivity and evangelical gratuity that expresses itself in concrete acts of justice and solidarity. When education loses sight of the poor, he warns, it loses its very soul.

In light of the Pope asking how Christian education can respond today, it is timely that we are holding our School Leaders' conference on November 20 on the theme of **'The Legacy of Hope'**, with His Eminence, Cardinal Timothy Radcliffe as our keynote speaker. We welcome representation from all schools in the diocese at our annual gathering.

Bishop Richard will explore the Pastoral Plan for the Diocese The Word Who is Life: The Call to Mission. The Call to Mission focusses on the significant potential of diocesan parish communities to act as "beacons of light... not in an era of change, but in a change of era" consolidating the work already undertaken across the diocese to place prayer, formation, and mission at the heart of diocesan parish and school community life. I had the privilege of being in Rome at the start of the half term week, for the Jubilee of Synodal Teams and Participatory Groups, along with other colleagues from the diocesan Pastoral Plan Reference Group. We attended a meeting – dialogue with Pope Leo, whose opening remarks were: "The first word I would like to say...for all of us...is 'Mission' and the synodal process is to help the Church fulfil its primary role in the world which is to be Missionary and give witness to the person of Jesus Christ."

Pope Leo called on all those present to dream of and dare to build a humbler Church, who "bends down to wash the feet of humanity; a Church that does not judge as the Pharisee does the tax collector but becomes a welcoming place for all".

Our time together ended with the celebration of Holy Mass, presided over by Pope Leo XIV and the fruits of our time in Rome, taking part in seminars and workshops, liturgical events and moments of formation and exchange, will be discerned in the coming months as we continue our journey as a Synodal Church.

St John Henry Newman, Doctor of the Church

On 13 October 2010, in a damp Cofton Park in Birmingham, Pope Benedict XVI declared Cardinal John Henry Newman to be Blessed.

On 19 September 2019, at St Peter's Basilica in Rome, Pope Francis declared him to be a Saint.

On 1 November 2025, at Mass in front of the same Basilica, Pope Leo XIV proclaimed, in Latin, these words:

'We, having obtained the opinions of numerous Brothers in the Episcopate and many of Christ's faithful throughout the world, having consulted the Dicastery for the Causes of Saints, after mature deliberation and with certain knowledge, and by the fullness of the apostolic power, declare Saint John Henry Newman, Doctor of the Church. In the name of the Father and of the Holy Spirit.'

And thus St John Henry Newman, for 40 years a parish priest in Birmingham, become only the third Doctor of the Church from England!

Unexpectedly, I found my eyes filling with tears of gratitude and sheer amazement.

It is difficult to find words to convey the immensity of this moment. We are being told beyond doubt that this man, in his life and all that he wrote, both as a priest of the Church of England and as a Catholic, is a sure guide and teacher of the true faith of the Catholic Church. I rejoice that in a man described as 'an essentially English figure' is to be found, without dissonance or discomfort, a full expression of Catholic faith.

At that moment I also remembered the words of Prince Charles, published on 12 October 2019, that John Henry Newman 'stood for the life of the spirit against the forces that would debase human dignity and human destiny.'

In his homily Pope Leo proclaimed: 'Newman's impressive spiritual and cultural stature will surely serve as an inspiration to new generations whose hearts thirst for the infinite, and who, through research and knowledge, are willing to undertake that journey which, as the ancients said, takes us *per aspera ad astra*, through difficulties to the stars.'

He echoed Prince Charles' words when he also said, quoting Pope Francis, 'that we must work together to set humanity free from the encircling gloom of nihilism, which is perhaps the most dangerous malady of contemporary culture, since it threatens to "cancel" hope.' He continued by quoting the famous words of St John Henry Newman, words that I have sung since childhood: 'Lead Kindly Light'.

Pope Leo said: 'In that beautiful prayer, we come to realise that we are far from home, our feet are unsteady, we cannot interpret clearly the way ahead. Yet none of this impedes us, since we have found our Guide: "Lead, Kindly Light, amid th'encircling gloom, Lead Thou me on;" "Lead, Kindly Light, The night is dark, and I am far from home, Lead Thou me on.""

On that morning not only did we receive this great gift of a new Doctor of the Church, but Pope Leo also declared St John Henry Newman to be the Co-Patron of Catholic Education throughout the world, together with St Thomas Aquinas.

For us, in England, where Catholic education has long been our priority, this is a moment of huge potential renewal. For this reason I am sending this simple reflection to every Catholic school in the Diocese, so that we can all rejoice in this remarkable moment.

The words of Pope Leo are addressed to you:

'On this solemn occasion, I wish to say to teachers and educational institutions: "Shine today like stars in the world" through your authentic commitment to the collective search for truth and to sharing it with generosity and integrity. Indeed, you do so through your service to young people, especially the poor, and your daily witness to the fact that "Christian love is prophetic: it works miracles" (Apostolic Exhortation <u>Dilexi Te</u>, 120). <u>Dilexi Te</u> >>>

Then he said: 'the Lord Jesus is not just one of many teachers, he is the Master *par excellence*. Moreover, he is the Educator *par excellence*. We are his disciples and are in his "school." We learn how to discover in his life, namely in the path he has travelled, a horizon of meaning capable of shining a light on all forms of knowledge. May our schools and universities always be places of listening to the Gospel and putting it into practice!'

And finally, reminding us of the saying of St John Henry Newman that 'God has created me to do Him some definite service' he said:

'I pray that Catholic education will help each person to discover their own call to holiness. Saint Augustine, whom Saint John Henry Newman greatly admired, once said that we are fellow students who have one Teacher, whose school is on earth and whose chair is in heaven' (cf. Serm. 292,1).

I came away from St Peter's on Saturday 1 November 2025 with a depth of emotion which served to strengthen and expand my sense of wonder and promise evoked by the Visit of our King and Queen to Pope Leo just a few days earlier. These are blessed days for us all. Not only do they promise greater cooperation between all the followers of Jesus, but they also refresh in us an urgency about the key role that faith in God must play in our wider society. Today, in the words of Prince Charles in 2019, we urgently need to be able 'to advocate without accusation, disagree without disrespect, and see difference as a place of encounter rather than exclusion'.

May this new and holy Doctor of the Church, a man of great intellect, of every English sensibility, of broad and courageous pastoral dedication, intercede for us that the Lord may guide us with his kindly light.

On 27 October 2025, Pope Leo issued an Apostolic Letter entitled *Drawing New Maps of Hope*. I have attached a short summary of some of its key themes.

Some themes from Drawing New Maps of Hope

Pope Leo's Apostolic Letter *Drawing New Maps of Hope* reaffirms the crucial importance of Catholic Education. The Holy Father reminds us, quoting his recent Apostolic Exhortation *Dilexi te*, that education is 'one of the highest expressions of Christian charity'. (1.3) His letter is published sixty years after the Second Vatican Council's declaration on education, *Gravissimum Educationis*, which, he says, 'has lost none of its potency'. (1.3) But he sees changes in the educational environment, 'complex, fragmented, digitised', that make it 'wise to pause and refocus our gaze on the "cosmology of Christian *paideia* [education]": a vision that, over the centuries, has been able to renew itself and positively inspire all the multifaceted aspects of education.' (1.2) He says, 'Rapid and deep changes expose children, teenagers and young people to unprecedented fragility.' (10.2).

Pope Leo gives a short survey of some of the principal schools of educational thought in the Church over the centuries, and mentions some key characters who have shaped our understanding and practice of education. From the rest of the Apostolic Letter, certain key themes emerge:


- 1. Christian education as a collective task. 'The educational community is a "we" where teachers, students, families, administrative and service staff, pastors and civil society converge to generate life' (3.1). Pope Leo uses the image of a 'constellation' of those who collaborate in the service of education. In that constellation, he says, 'each "star" has its own brightness, but together they chart a course.' (8.1)
- 2. **Christian education is person-centred.** 'Putting the person at the centre means... helping them discover the meaning of life, their inalienable dignity, and their responsibility towards others.' (5.1). 'A person is not a "skills profile", cannot be reduced to a predictable algorithm, but is a face, a story, a vocation.' (4.1).
- 3. **Christian education is holistic.** 'Christian formation embraces the entire person: spiritual, intellectual, emotional, social, physical.' (4.2). 'Education does not measure its value only on the axis of efficiency: it measures it according to dignity, justice, the capacity to serve the common good.' (4.2)
- 4. There are **serious contemporary challenges** facing Christian education.
 - a. The digital environment. 'Artificial intelligence and digital environments must be oriented towards the protection of dignity, justice and work; they must be governed according to criteria of public ethics and participation; they must be accompanied by adequate theological and philosophical reflection.' (9.3) 'Technologies must serve, not replace, the person; they must enrich the learning process, not impoverish relationships and communities.' (9.1)

- b. **Inequalities.** 'Faced with the many millions of children around the world who still do not have access to primary education, how can we fail to act? Confronted with the dramatic educational emergencies caused by wars, migration, inequalities and various forms of poverty, how can we not feel the urgency to renew our commitment?' (1.3).
- c. Environmental issues. 'When the earth suffers, the poor suffer the most. Catholic education cannot be silent: it must combine social justice and environmental justice, promote sobriety and sustainable lifestyles.' (7.2)

5. Pope Leo offers three priorities (10:3):

- a. 'The first regards **the inner life**. Young people ask for depth; they need spaces for silence, discernment, and dialogue with their conscience and with God.'
- b. 'The second regards **the digital human**: let us educate in a judicious use of technology and of AI, placing the person before the algorithm and harmonizing technical, emotional, social, spiritual and ecological intelligence.'
- c. 'The third regards **unarmed and disarming peace**: let us educate in non-violent languages, reconciliation, bridges and not walls. "Blessed are the peacemakers" (*Mt* 5:9) becomes the method and content of learning.'

Pope Leo tells us that 'Catholic education has the task of rebuilding trust in a world riven with conflicts and fears, remembering that we are sons and daughters, not orphans; fraternity is born of this awareness.' (4.3) He concludes his letter by entrusting the journey of education to Our Lady, Seat of Wisdom, and appeals to all those involved in education, whether teaching or learning, to 'be servants of the world of education, choreographers of hope, tireless seekers of wisdom, credible creators of expressions of beauty.' (11.3).

She leaves the school in a strong place, and we thank her for all she has done to lead the school so effectively and wish her well for the next stage in her career journey.

Stuart McPherson is leaving Worth at the end of this term having served as Head Master since 2015. He is returning to Australia, where he will take up post as Head of Sydney Grammar School. Stuart is recognised for his inspiring, faith-filled leadership and recently said Worth offers "an education of heart and soul, which encourages all Worth pupils to think of their education not just in terms of their results or careers but also their contribution to the world through service to others, and building community and stewardship of the Earth."

Senior Deputy Marisa Bosa will serve as the Interim Head at Worth from January 2026, while Ben Pennington has recently been appointed as Head Master from September 2026.

THE ROSARY CHALLENGE

We hope you downloaded your certificates and will continue to pray the Rosary throughout the year.





In Catholic dioceses across Scotland, England and Wales, there are 364 schools (including primary, secondary and sixth form colleges) both state and independent, that are registered and taking part in the Oscar Romero Award. The Award is available at three levels, Participator, Developer and Innovator. 163 have achieved the first level – Participator, 38 are on the second level of Developer while 2 have attained the third level – Innovator.

Many headteachers and teachers are saying how the Award framework is supporting their work in offering a distinctive Catholic curriculum as well as staying faithful to the mission of Catholic education. The Award is also helping schools to meet the expectations of the Catholic Schools Inspection framework, especially in how they are engaging with Catholic Social Teaching (CST).

In Arundel and Brighton Diocese, 27 schools have registered for the Award. 10 of these schools have achieved Participator Level and one school, St Joseph's Specialist Trust, has attained Developer Level.

Through our subscription service, we now offer a members only section on our website where you will find good resources on how to complete your application. In this section, you will also get some general resources on CST principles, as well as pointers and links to some useful websites with resources on CST. Our team of Validators is also on

hand to support schools with their applications as well as offer guidance on what type of evidence is required for each level. They can do this via in person visits to the school or via a call/video call.

We are also available to lead school inset/CPD for staff, as well as help organise and run CST conferences for pupils.

In September I led a twilight inset session for schools in the diocese, offering some practical advice on how they could go about participating in the Award.

On Monday 29 September CSAN hosted the online launch event of the Youth Version of Love the Stranger. This launch coincided with the Jubilee for Migrants and the World Day of Migrants and Refugees (4-5 October 2025).

Love the Stranger was a document published in 2023 by the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales and presents a Catholic response to refugees and migrants. The document offers 24 guiding principles and has been endorsed by the Holy See, COMECE, CAFOD, CSAN, and Caritas Social Action Network members.

Caritas Social Action Network and Caritas Brentwood have now come together to produce a youth version for late teenagers. It is hoped this will be an important resource of formation in social teaching as young people seek to make sense of the contemporary world and understand how our faith helps us to respond.



SMARTPHONE FREE

This is a journey that many schools are on, but we are pleased to note in this edition of Alpha Beta, the impact of the **Smartphone Free initiative** which started in **Cottesmore St Mary Catholic Primary School, Hove.**

They hosted a Smartphone Free Childhood event back in January 2025. This was an event where around 170 leaders and parents, including MP Peter Kyle, came to listen to a panel of speakers discuss the impact of smartphones on our young people. In March, Rachel Breen, Headteacher, spoke at the diocesan RSHE Leads day. She also presented to Headteacher's from Bosco Catholic Education Trust.

The school set up Year 6 Smartphone Free Ambassadors and held assemblies to discuss their mission. In May, Rachel and her pupil ambassadors met with advisers in Brighton & Hove who were very impressed with how impassioned they were. This led to an invitation to speak at a meeting for Headteachers, Councillors and other members of the Local Authority.

The start of the new school year came and the school reports that no Smartphones have been brought into school.

Brighton & Hove City Council now lends its full support to schools which decide to become smartphone-free. It also asks parents to delay giving their children smartphones until 14 and to sign the Smartphone Free Childhood Parent Pact.

Rachel Breen is happy to support any school which would like to find out more about the process they followed in bringing about this change, not just in Cottesmore, but across all schools in the city.

St Edmund's Schola Cantorum were invited to sing monthly for a parish event in the local village hall. The first iteration of this was in October, and there were reports of the parishioners joining in with our wonderful choir singing "Kookaburra".

This first half term is all about preparation, not only for the busy period coming up, but also putting in foundations for a year of music making. St Augustine's Y5 are working towards their schools Christingle Service, singing in harmony for various songs and carols. St Cuthbert Mayne's School Choir has enjoyed an exponential growth of children joining this term, and now we have a lovely cohort on a Monday evening working on hymns, motets, anthems, and carols to aid the school in their worship. St Cuthbert's "Cuddie Duck Choristers" likewise, have grown, and started to be introduced to repertoire that builds on the previous years of the programme. St Hugh-of-Lincoln's School Choir are working towards the Woking Music Festival early this half term, learning a spiritual "Ain't that Good News"

complete with choreography and an arrangement written by Mr Ellson!

St Polycarp's Y3, St Joseph's Y3 and St Dunstan's Y5 have all been pushing through their musical notation exercises, learning the basics of sheet music, and understanding how to read melodies on a page.

SUSSEX SCHOOLS SINGING PROGRAMME

The term began with a joint performance at the Festival of Hope, where children from Sussex and Surrey schools came together to help celebrate 60 years of our Diocese. During Communion, the choir sang *Panis Angelicus* by César Frank, reminding all present of the beauty and reverence that music brings to our worship.

Since then, our young singers have continued to grow in confidence and musicianship. In schools and choirs across Sussex, children have explored a wonderful variety of repertoire; from Mozart's *Ave Verum Corpus* and John Rutter's *A Clare Benediction* to the much-loved *Edelweiss* from The Sound of Music. A new focus this term has been on music notation

and score reading skills; helping children gain confidence in understanding the structure and language of the music they sing

Several schools are now preparing to lead singing in their local parishes later this term. This will be a wonderful opportunity for pupils to apply their developing skills in a real liturgical context and to support congregational participation in worship.

The programme continues to build links between schools, parishes, and the wider diocesan community; encouraging high-quality music making and active involvement in the Church's musical life. We are now looking ahead to the Christmas season, with more exciting opportunities for our young singers to share their talents and to celebrate together through song.

SCHOOL ADMISSION / SCHOOL ADMISSION APPEAL

The new model admission policies can now be found on the diocese website <u>Schools & Admissions</u> <u>|</u> Education Service

As per the information sessions in October there are 3 new model admission policies for Primary schools and 3 for Secondary schools, to choose from. Other documents to accompany these new models are:

- Admissions Guidance for Catholic Schools
- Admissions Guidance for Clergy
- Certificate of Catholic Practice (CCP)
- New style SIF

Schools are reminded that the decision as to which admission policy to use <u>should only be</u> made now you are able to view and compare all new models against the existing policy, this should be taken by governors as the admission authority (in conjunction with Xavier/Bosco for CET schools).

The decision/discussion must be documented as part of your admission meeting minutes or in FGB minutes.

As in previous years we ask that all schools remain in contact throughout the process and keep the diocese informed of which policy you are choosing, as well as ensuring that a draft for the 2027/28 admission policies and final versions are checked by ourselves.

We will also assist with the documents for the consultation process.

Next Steps


- If you are under the 7-year rule, making changes or adopting a new model you will need to consult.
- Friday 19 December: the last date you can go out to consultation.
- Consultation must last for a minimum of 6 weeks and finish by 31 January 2026 (statutory deadline)
- **28 February 2026:** statutory deadline for admission arrangements to be determined even if they have not changed from the previous year and a consultation has not been required.
- **15 March 2026:** statutory deadline for admission authorities to send a copy of their full determined admission arrangements to the diocese, their local authority and publish those arrangements on the school's website.

Admissions & Parish Boundaries

Bishop Richard published a new Pastoral Plan for the Diocese of Arundel & Brighton in January 2024. Called "The Word Who is Life: The Call to Mission", the Plan creates vital new pathways for evangelisation, enabling diocesan clergy and lay people to collaborate more closely to meet the sacramental and formation needs of their faith communities through new parish structures centred on mission.

Following this publication each deanery will become a parish in the care of a Moderator, who will work with the priests of the parish *in solidum*. This process has already started in some areas of the diocese and it is envisaged that by summer 2026 all former deaneries will have inaugurated to become new parishes as shown in the New Parish Map March 2024.pdf



What this means for school admissions

The 2026/27 admissions policies were determined in the previous academic year and although the geography of the areas served by individual schools is unlikely to change, the terminology as a new parish is inaugurated will be at odds with that already published in school admissions policies, e.g. language of the former parish areas (the neighbourhood around one church) and deaneries.

If schools are in a newly inaugurated parish when Governing Bodies and Trusts carry out their ranking of applications for September 2026, they will need to rank according to the former terminology as it was when the policy was determined.

The new model admission policies the Education Service has now produced for schools to consider for use in 2027/28 have wording that aligns with the new parish structure, as by that point all former deaneries will have become a parish.

To adopt these new policies each school will need to go through a consultation process. If, after discussion, a Governing Body or Trust decides *not* to use the new policy for 2027/28 it will then be incumbent upon them to ensure clear and definitive explanations to parents that the areas referred to in the policy refer to former terminology and are not representative of the boundaries as they will be in reality at the point of application and admission for 2027/28.

In the new policies the term 'parish' refers one of eleven former deanery areas. Where a school is oversubscribed and therefore needs to limit their catchment area, the term 'ecclesiastical area' is used to describe the same geographical locality formerly served by individual churches and schools. These areas remain geographically unchanged and can be viewed in school maps on the diocesan website Find a School | Education Service.

This year's bidding round closed on October 24th; many thanks to all the VA schools who submitted bids. The amount bid for, as ever, far exceeds the anticipated funding available and we are confronted by some building issues which require urgent attention. Once again, we are attempting to alleviate the uncertainty around your projects by informing you of bid outcomes, as soon as possible. In December 2025 we will be confirming projects in priority according to the ranking criteria set out previously:

- 1. Health and safety and basic DDA provision.
- 2. Condition issues which would result in the closure of a school (e.g. failed boilers, leaking roofs etc.)
- 3. Other condition issues.
- 4. Suitability improvements where existing buildings are a barrier to delivery of the curriculum.
- 5. Suitability improvements which would have a positive impact on the running of the school.

Stress

Employers have a legal duty to protect employees from stress at work by carrying out a risk assessment and acting on it. The HSE has some helpful guidance for preventing stress in schools.

The Children's Wellbeing and Schools Bill

The Children's Wellbeing and Schools Bill should become law in September 2026. This may well have implications for your uniform policy.

Once the bill becomes law, it will be mandatory for schools to make no more than three branded items of uniform or PE kit compulsory for pupils. This increases to four at secondary and middle schools if one item is a tie.

Please be aware that the government's definition of "branded" - doesn't just refer to items emblazoned with school or trust names or logos.

The definition also includes "any item that, due to its colour, design, fabric or other distinctive characteristic, is only available from the school's or trust's appointed uniform supplier(s)". For example, a sweatshirt with a specific-coloured trim, or trousers with a unique style that are only available from one supplier.

The limit on branded items includes bags, including book bags or rucksacks, as well as items worn only at particular times of year, such as summer dresses. Even badges sewn onto generic items by parents will also count towards the limit.

The government recommends that schools start planning for this legislation now.

Information for all education settings: Understand your responsibilities under Martyn's Law

The <u>Terrorism (Protection of Premises) Act 2025</u>, also known as Martyn's Law, approved in April 2025, introduces new safety duties for premises, including many education settings.

There is a 24-month implementation period for planning and preparation before the law takes effect.

They would only require this check if they are receiving financial renumeration for another role within the school. However, for academies, right to work checks are necessary for Directors and Members. These will be undertaken as part of our safeguarding checks when we process applications and the DBS.
