

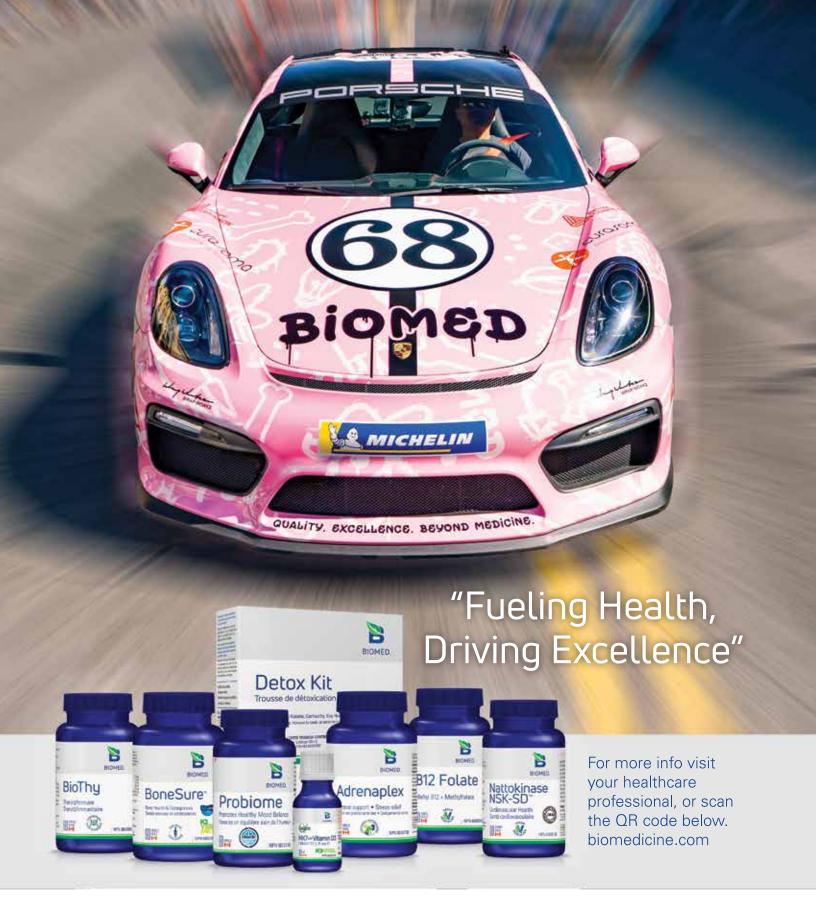



Passion for fast saloon Porsches

ost of you know that I named my beloved 2018 Porsche Panamera 4S "Helga." The name originates from the 80s BBC sitcom "Allo Allo," which hilariously depicts the World War II occupation of France. This TV series has become part of Polish pop culture, and we tend to call strong German women Helgas; it's a bit cheeky but still very positive.

Helga is strong, with 440 horsepower and 405 lb-ft torque; she absolutely flies. I think very few people realize that Panameras would easily keep up with

most 911s. Yet, it is a car I can use daily, year-round. And to me, that was super important. For now, this is my only car, and I need something I can have fun with, but also make a proper Ikea run.

I always liked fast saloon cars. My very first dream car of this kind was the BMW E32 and then the E38. Those simple lines were so elegant, but under the hood, there was a V12. If I had a parking space, I think I would still buy one today. Helga has a V6, but it is bi-turbo, which I think helps it make a balance between power and efficiency. When I am not

pushing it, I can get to around 8 L/100 km. So, this car does not bankrupt me.

But I think the most important thing for me is how this car makes me feel. Each time I give it some beans, it just brings a massive smile to my face. I love driving, and I love road trips. Driving for hours is an absolute pleasure; I never feel tired, even after long days smashing some kilometres. Then, when I park it, lock the doors, take a few steps, I turn around, and I still look at it with amazement.

Porsche Pink Parade

ast September, the CWR ladies proudly hosted the sixth annual Porsche Pink Parade, an event dedicated to supporting women's health and treatment through BC Cancer Foundation.

The Pink Parade was founded by Nancy Mao, who joined the club in 2016. Other than two editions of "W5" in 2017 and 2018, both organized by then Secretary Marolyn Hum, there were no other women-focused activities. As well, her experiences as one of only two women drivers during early-morning drives back in 2017 along the Sea-to-Sky Highway further highlighted the need for drives specifically for women. These moments emphasized the lack of women-focused events and inspired her to take action.


In 2019, Nancy took on the role of Activities / Social Chairperson for the club. In addition to organizing events, she wanted to also create experiences where women could connect and celebrate their shared interests. Seeking guidance, Nancy reached out to Judy

Colby, a longtime member and former Timberline Editor, to discuss her vision with the then-current Executive Committee. Her ideas received unanimous support. Additionally, Nancy contacted Asgar Virji, President of Weissach, who also pledged his support for women's events.

August 2020 marked the first ladies' drive to Squamish, led by Nancy and the Weissach team, which raised funds for the Union Gospel Mission's Women's and Family Centre in Vancouver. During the pit-stop gathering in the A&W parking lot, participants voiced their desire for more events like this. These conversations, and in partnership with Weissach, led to the creation of "Pink Parade" - an October drive for Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

The Porsche Pink Parade is now one of the club's signature yearly fundraising events, gaining support across the club. In its first year, the event raised over \$12,000 (\$6,000 plus change with donation match). Last year, fundraising

efforts topped \$27,000. Now that the 2025 campaign is completed, more than \$100,000 has been raised since 2020 as a result of this ladies' event.

Nancy chose to support the BC Cancer Foundation specifically to ensure that funds raised would stay in British Columbia, rather than being sent to national organizations which might not focus on local needs. She even invited ladies from three other regions to host their own Porsche Pink Parade: VIR (in 2023), BCIR (2023 and 2024) and PNWR (2024). Both VIR and BCIR also supported the BC Cancer Foundation!

Cancer touches the lives of many, including some of our members and their families and friends. By creating meaningful fundraising opportunities like the Pink Parade, everyone can actively contribute to the cause. Each year, participants and donors help make the Porsche Pink Parade especially personal and meaningful to the women in their lives and the Porsche club community they call home.

Storm-Watching in Tofino

very winter, strong winds from Japan travel over 8,300 km across the vast Pacific Ocean before reaching the rugged west coast of Vancouver Island. When they arrive, these fierce winds mark the beginning of the storm-watching season in Tofino, providing one of Canada's most awe-inspiring natural travel experiences.

Our destination was the Wickaninnish Inn, perched on a rocky promontory at the north end of Chesterman Beach, known as the perfect spot for storm-watching. This famous oceanfront resort combines rustic charm with an unbeatable front-row seat to nature's most spectacular displays. Great hotels don't just sell rooms; they sell memories.

My Porsche travel adventure to this remote community of 2,500 residents began with an early-morning two-hour ferry ride. We departed from Horseshoe Bay in West Vancouver to Nanaimo's Departure Bay on Vancouver Island. After reaching the island, we continued with a three-hour drive northwest to Tofino.

My amazing Porsche adventure at the Wickaninnish Inn.

In British Columbia, winter tires are mandatory on all mountain highways, including the route from Parksville to Ucluelet, from October 1 to April 30. I've just fitted new winter boots on the Porsche for this adventure, making sure we're ready for the road ahead! Winter tires behave differently on dry and wet surfaces, so I took this drive to get familiar with how they handle both conditions.

As we near Port Alberni, a forestry town now recognized as the salmon capital of the world. The highway traces the shoreline of Sproat Lake, which stretches over 25 km and is bustling with windsurfers on windy days. We planned a rest stop at the legendary Cathedral Grove, an oldgrowth forest of giant Douglas fir trees in MacMillan Provincial Park. As we entered the park, the towering trees lined the narrow twisty road and dwarfed my Porsche. Making ourselves feel even smaller,a true natural wonder that invites exploration.

Travelling along Highway 4 from Port Alberni to the west coast offers a spirited drive. The two-lane valley road rises and falls, inviting drivers to trail-brake and power through curves—a thrill

that Porsche owners live for. If you're unfamiliar with the route, watch for blind hilltops and tight 180-degree S curves, as the road frequently changes direction. The road surfaces are uneven due to patching, so drivers should be cautious of sudden pavement drop-offs, especially since many areas lack shoulders.

Upon arriving at the Pacific Rim Visitor Centre in Ucluelet, my bright racing yellow Porsche drew a sidelong glance from a Mountie in a parked unmarked black SUV. For a split second, my pulse quickened as our eyes locked. He paused, considered, then turned his attention back to a steaming cup and a large pastry balanced on his dashboard. I exhaled slowly, feeling my nerves relax as the officer reached for his treat. I gradually turned the corner towards Tofino, with only seagulls overhead and his hungry smile as witnesses.

The Wickaninnish Inn, opened in 1996 under the leadership of Charles McDiarmid-who remains Maître De Maison—has played a key role in boosting storm-watch tourism in Tofino and Ucluelet. Its innovative approach has set a benchmark in the industry, inspiring many hotels and helping to position Tofino as a year-round destination.

Each room offers views of the Pacific Ocean and/or the beach, with large windows built to withstand strong winds. Our spacious room features a king-size bed, a gas fireplace, and balcony chairs with an authentic Hudson Bay wool blanket for added comfort. Outdoor explorers will appreciate a pair of neon-orange raincoats in each closet and the option of custom-sized rain boots delivered to their room door.


The Wickaninnish Inn boasts the acclaimed Pointe Restaurant, famous for its superb dining and wine pairings. It also features the On the Rocks bar, Shoreline Terrace, Howard's Wine

Cellar, and the Ancient Cedars Spa. In the Beach building, guests can visit the Henry Nolla Gallery, Lookout Library, fitness room, and Driftwood Café. Each of these spots provides a hospitable setting for storm watching during your stay.

We arrived on a sunny afternoon with mild autumn temperatures and golden foliage. However, the weather suddenly changed, and a dark, overcast storm rolled in that night.

The next morning, we woke up in our cozy room to a gale-force storm with winds exceeding 50 km/h. We watched enormous three-meter waves crash violently against rocky outcrops and sandy beaches, creating a continuous symphony of surf that echoes through the air.

Once the storm subsided, we took a walk along Chesterman Beach, just steps from the Inn. Even with the waves crashing onto the white sand, there was a distinct feeling of peace in the air. We wandered through the resort grounds as well, surrounded by towering red cedars and bird songs. The experience was both captivating and humbling, serving as a reminder of the ocean's incredible force and the stunning beauty of this area.

From November to February, Tofino becomes a hotspot for those eager to experience the intense power of storm-watching. It's the ideal winter escape, as I prefer travelling during the off-season, which offers fewer crowds, more affordable accommodations, and greater opportunities to connect with locals.

This was our second visit to the Wickaninnish Inn, and Charles has consistently made us feel at home. The Inn offers exceptional service, luxurious comfort, and the promise of an unforgettable Porsche travel adventure along one of Canada's most spectacular coastlines.


he Pointe Restaurant at the Wickaninnish Inn is one of Tofino's top dining spots. Many seafood dishes feature freshly caught ingredients from local waters, and Executive Chef Clayton Fontine is committed to choosing high-quality, island-sourced produce.

During our evening meal, we each chose the menu with wine pairings. I ordered the Roast Beef Tenderloin, and my partner selected the Slow Cooked Steelhead Trout. Both dishes were delicious, and all the wines recommended were Canadian, which was a nice touch.

The setting inside The Pointe is spectacular, with panoramic windows that showcase the wild Pacific coastline and dramatic ocean. The attentive staff enhanced the experience, offering thoughtful explanations of each course and pairing. It's an excellent spot for a cozy, memorable meal, especially when the weather outside is stormy.

ofino is adjacent to Pacific Rim National Park and situated in the heart of the Clayoquot Sound UNESCO Biosphere Reserve. Outdoor trails and activities are plentiful; here are two of my top indoor picks during storm-watch season.

Ombre Restaurant

Located in the heart of Tofino, Ombre Restaurant impressed us with its beautifully arranged dishes. Each plate was thoughtfully crafted, highlighting not only the chef's creativity but also a keen attention to presentation detail. The artistry of the food enhanced our dining experience and reflected the restaurant's commitment to both taste and aesthetics.

During our evening visit, we shared eight small plates, including two desserts. The first and second plates were cold dishes, such as Lingcod Accras and Fall Crudités. My favourite was the Braised Pork Belly. If you're looking for a hearty, warm entrée, it's best to order it separately from the menu.

Relatively new to the Tofino dining scene, the restaurant's name was inspired by Tofino's sunsets. The atmosphere was lively yet relaxed, making it ideal for a casual evening out or a special occasion.

Tofino Clayoquot Heritage Museum

The Tofino Clayoquot Heritage Museum is housed in a bright blue building in the heart of Tofino. It's small but provides insights into the Nuu-chah-nulth First Nations peoples, the original inhabitants. We also discovered how Tofino Inlet was named in the summer of 1792 by explorers Galiano and Valdes after Spanish hydrographer Vincente Tofino.





The Tofino Clayoquot Heritage Museum offers a glimpse into Tofino's history, inviting visitors to explore its origins and stories.

We learned that Japanese fishermen played a crucial role in Tofino's fishing history, arriving in the early 1920s. They made significant contributions to the salmon trolling industry by introducing new techniques and gear, becoming an essential part of the local community. At one point, more residents spoke Japanese than English.

Despite its modest size, the museum presents an engaging selection of exhibits, including historical photographs, artifacts, and stories that highlight Tofino's diverse heritage. The displays and informative panels, along with knowledgeable staff, make it a valuable stop for visitors interested in the region's cultural and social history.

Vehicle Cooling Systems

Cooling systems are key to optimal Porsche performance.

ur vehicles are complex machines filled with various vital fluids to ensure trouble-free operation, but one of the most consistently overlooked is the cooling system. Coolant, also known as anti-freeze, plays a large role in our vehicles larger than most owners realize. Over the years, I have heard all kinds of myths and misunderstandings about vehicle cooling systems and their associated components. This article is designed to help better understand what cooling systems do and the importance of regular maintenance.



Cooling systems protect engines from overheating. But this is not the only task that engine coolant does - it also takes care of the lubrication process in the engine's moving parts, preventing damage to head gaskets, water pumps, and controlling temperatures of the pistons, cylinders, and cylinder heads.

Coolant transfers and optimizes the heat in the engine and provides antifreeze protection in low temperatures to keep your vehicle running in optimal condition. Since the internal combustion engine generates energy through the process of burning fuel, portions of this energy in the form of heat inevitably end up being harnessed by the engine and its parts themselves. The key role of the engine coolant is to prevent engine failures related to overheating and to keep the engine running at optimal temperatures for efficient fuel burning

and emissions regulations. Using the right engine coolant type and mixture provides the following benefits:

- · mitigate freezing of coolant in cold temperatures
- · prevent boiling of the coolant in high temperatures
- · prevent internal component corrosion
- · prevent wear of rubber and plastic engine parts
- · mitigate corrosion-induced electrolysis

Cooling systems also provide heat to the passenger cabin via the climate control (HVAC) system. This heat is used to maintain a comfortable temperature for passengers, as well as window defrosting and defogging functions. Now that we know more about the function of cooling systems, let's look at how they work.


Cooling System Operation

When the engine is running, the coolant

pump (water pump) circulates the coolant throughout the entire cooling system. As the engine temperature rises, the thermostat in the cooling system opens at a specific temperature to allow coolant to flow to the radiator. As the coolant flows through the radiator, airflow over the surface of the radiator extracts heat from the coolant before it enters the engine




Electrolysis damage due to poor cooling system maintenance

again. The radiator plays a critical role in heat transfer from the engine to the ambient air.

Another component that does a similar function is the heater core. This is a smaller version of a radiator housed inside the HVAC system. As cooler outside air is drawn over the heater core by the HVAC fan, heat from the coolant is transferred to the air piped inside the cabin via the vents, creating a comfortable temperature for occupants. While there are many other components of the cooling system that can play different roles (such as intercoolers used to cool compressed air from turbochargers or superchargers), the basic components are the coolant, coolant pump, thermostat, radiator, and heater core.

Additionally, various sensors take temperature readings from the cooling system in different places to allow the on-board computers to adjust the fuel maps, automatic climate control settings, etc. With today's ever-increasing computerized controls in vehicles, you can imagine the array of issues that can occur when specific components of a cooling system are not functioning correctly.

Cooling System Maintenance

Most modern cars will alert us to a failure of sensors & electrical-related components as well as scheduled intervals for maintenance. Warning lights will typically illuminate when the onboard computers see something out of range,

such as high engine temperatures, low coolant level, erroneous sensor readings, etc. The amount of data collected from cooling systems on modern cars is massive and can have an immediate effect on other components if the system is functioning correctly.

Some people have asked if it's okay to remove their cooling system thermostat during the summer months since they do not need heat...and they believe their engine will run better at lower temperatures. This is not only a myth, but it can cause detrimental damage to the engine and its components. Cooling system temperatures are optimized to allow for the most efficient fuel burn during combustion. Overcooling can lead to increased fuel consumption, excessive soot build-up, which can damage the emissions systems, and eventually damage the cylinder walls. Additionally, thermostats allow time for the hot coolant to dwell in the radiator for maximum heat transfer to the ambient air. With



the thermostat removed, the coolant becomes a continuous loop and on hot days, it can lead to overheating.

One area that is typically overlooked on our Porsches is the radiators. All of Porsche's modern sports cars from 1997 up have the radiators (oil coolers and AC condensers as well) mounted in the lower front corners of the bumper. Due to their proximity to the ground, various road debris (leaves, dirt, bugs, pollen, etc.) gets sucked into this area and eventually reduces air flow over the surface area. The on-board computer looks for a maximum temperature before illuminating the overheating light, but restricted air flow may not indicate a problem until you find yourself in the summer heat of the Okanagan Valley. Suddenly, your vehicle is overheating due to the ambient air temperature and reduced flow over the surface of the radiators. Regular visual inspection of the radiator surface areas and annual cleaning may be necessary-depending on mileage accumulated—to prevent this from happening.

Many owners find cooling system maintenance intervals confusing, and even more confusing sometimes is what to do if the system needs to be topped up. Manufacturers are now starting to advertise extended coolant life up to 6 years, and in some cases, stating lifetime coolant. The basis of these statements hinges on the factory-filled coolant not being disturbed, diluted, or contaminated, which is rarely the case over the life of a vehicle. My rule of thumb for coolant is this: if I don't know the history of the car, then I recommend a full flush and refill with the manufacturer-specified coolant. When topping up cooling systems, fill with the same product used from factory-fill or the last flush. If this is not readily available, demineralized water is the next best choice for small amounts, followed by distilled water if demineralized water isn't readily available. Never use tap water or bottled water to top up your cooling system, as this is how contamination happens. Drinking water has soluble minerals and salts present, which interfere with the coolant properties. Some coolants can form a sludge when mixed with incompatible products. This





Automotive cooling systems are one of the leading causes of roadside breakdowns.

can lead to overheating and corrosion, costing large amounts of money to fix.

Coolant pumps are another area typically overlooked. Coolant pumps contain rotating components which wear out over time. Most of the time, the coolant pump will give us a warning when we see small puddles of colored liquid on the garage floor, but other times, it can seize up in the middle of a planned road trip. Most manufacturers do have a recommended replacement interval for coolant pumps; it is typically listed as a set number of kilometres or years. Do not ignore the year interval just because you don't accumulate a lot of kilometres on your car this is where owners can find themselves stranded. Coolant pumps are constantly submerged in coolant, and on most vehicles, the bearings are under constant tension from the belt drive system. This is why manufacturers have year intervals for many components; many other factors come into play for the service life besides kilometres accumulated.

Summary

Cooling systems are essential for peak vehicle performance. If you have a preferred technician who looks after your maintenance, ensure they include cooling system checks and perform scheduled maintenance when required. A cooling system in top running condition rarely gives problems, but if ignored, it's just a matter of time before inevitable failure.

Barcelona hosts Porsche Carrera World Cup

An event for Porsche motorsport fans worldwide.

he Porsche Carrera World Cup returns in March 2026, 15 years after the first event with 911 GT3 Cup cars. It debuted in 2011 at Nürburgring Nordschleife and now moves to Circuit de Barcelona-Catalunya for the highly anticipated return.

The Carrera World Cup showcases Porsche's global racing ecosystem, uniting teams, drivers, and fans from five continents for a unique motorsport festival. Eligible to compete are drivers from the international Porsche Mobil 1 Supercup as well as nearly 40 national and regional Carrera Cups and Porsche Sports Cups, all driving the 375kW (510PS) 911 GT3 Cup, model generation 992.1.

In 2011, 98 drivers from 25 nations competed at Nürburgring Nordschleife in their 911 race cars during the 24-hour event, creating a unique spectacle. Porsche aims to match that level of participation during the March 5-8, 2026, Spanish Grand Prix at the circuit. There is no shortage of eligible

cars: since production began at the end of 2020, Porsche Motorsport has built a total of 1,130 units of the current 911 GT3 Cup (992.1). In Barcelona, the cars will compete with race ABS and traction control. From the next season onwards, its extensively revised successor will take over. The 382kW (520 PS) strong 911 Cup, based on the 992.2 generation, will make its debut in the Porsche Mobil 1 Supercup and selected Carrera Cups.

The Carrera World Cup showcases the huge power and passion of the global Porsche motorsport community.

The 911 GT3 Cup, one of the most produced race cars since the early 1990s. will be celebrated before the newest generation takes over. In Barcelona, up to 100 competitors will vie for a unique trophy last awarded in 2011, when almost 100 Cup 911 cars raced on the Nürburgring Nordschleife.

Compared with the Eifel circuit, the 4,657-kilometre Formula 1 layout

in Barcelona is too short to allow all one-make series cars to start simultaneously. For this reason, Porsche Motorsport is implementing an unusual format, inspired by sim racing competitions in which the Porsche Coanda Esports factory team participates. The entry list will be divided into four groups of up to 30 cars each, with drivers competing in three distinct classes. In the Pro category, primarily young, up-and-coming talents with FIA Gold or Silver ratings pit themselves against each other on their path to a professional career. The Pro-Am class is reserved for Bronze-rated drivers over 30, while the "Michelin Class" is open to Bronze drivers over 45 years of age.

Each group will contest three 30-minute sprint races plus one lap, including qualifying. Drivers will score points within their classes, and the top 50 percent in each group will advance to one of two semifinal races. The process is then repeated, ultimately deciding the 30 drivers who will compete in the final.
