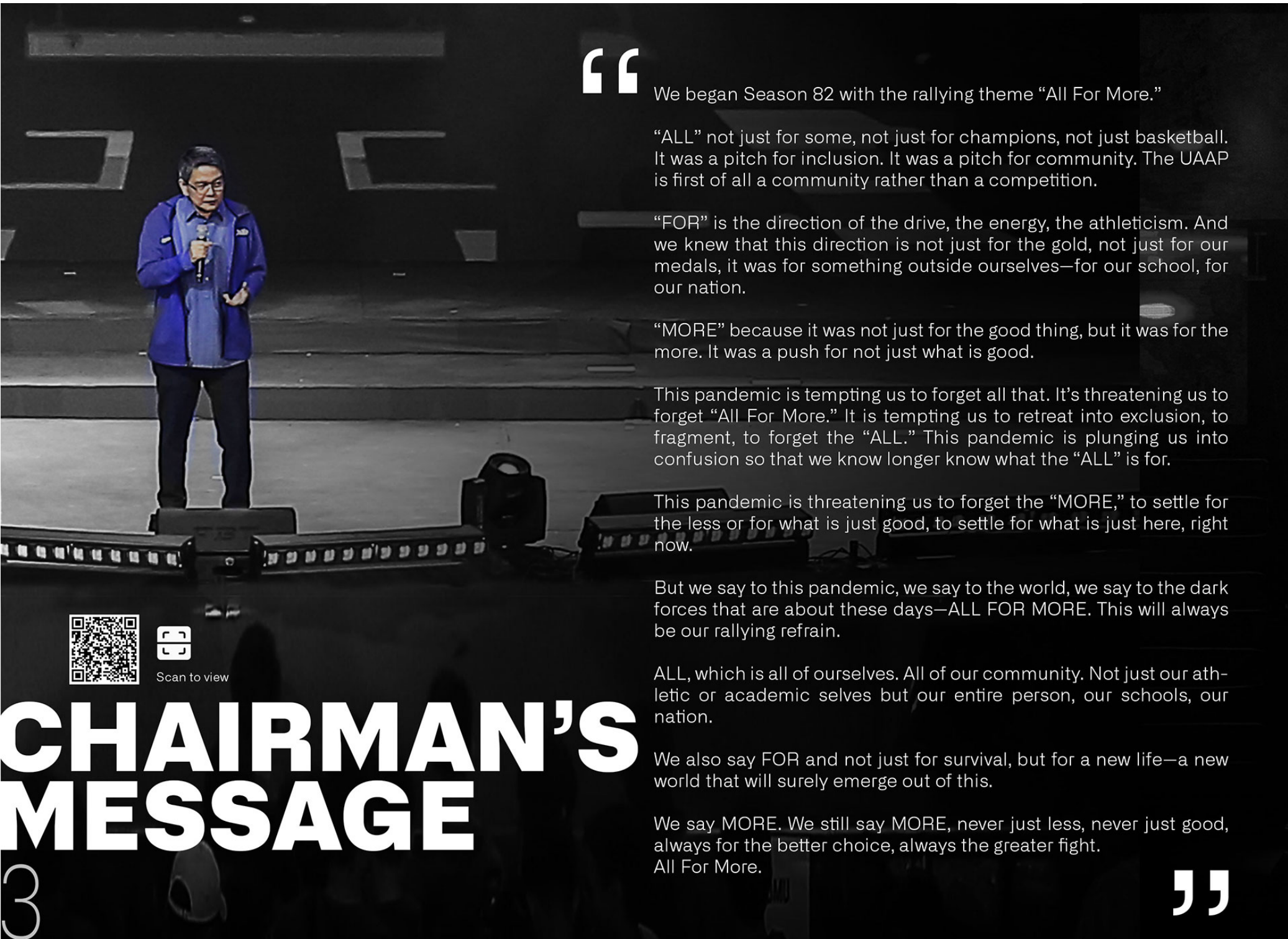

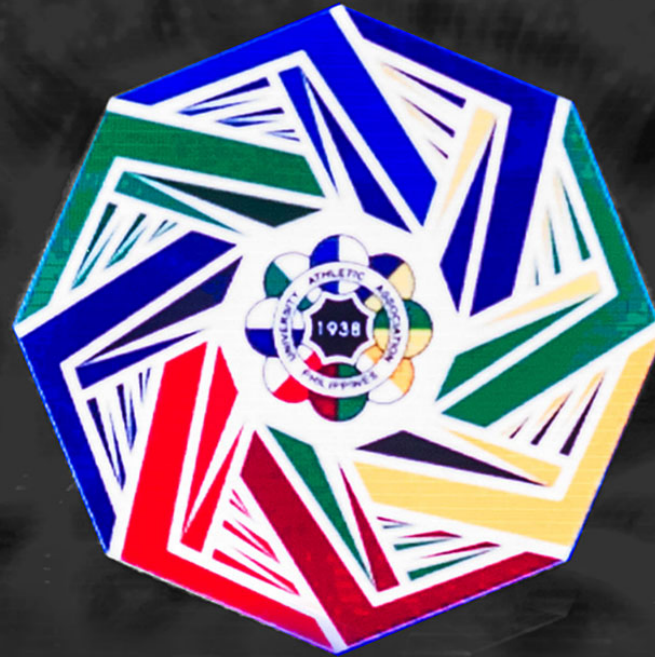

For its 82nd season, the University Athletic Association of the Philippines channels the concept of Magis (Latin for “more” or “greater”). Thus for this year’s theme: ALL FOR MORE.

It is hoped that this battlecry will motivate the student-athletes, coaches and staff, and school communities to go beyond what are expected of them.

It is a clarion call for the entire UAAP community to celebrate and be MORE—all for the love of the games, the schools, and country.

ALL FOR MORE even extends to the logo for this season.

This year’s emblem features eight sides, representing the eight member-schools that make up the league. The official seal serves as its heart. The shape of the logo radiates motion, highlighted by the presence of the “greater than” sign [$>$] in the different school colors.

The symbol represents the active, moving nature of athleticism. The circular look of the logo conveys parity—the member schools as co-equals with the opportunity in this age of connectivity. The logo also depicts how we can move forward by working hand-in-hand. Truly, the whole is greater than the sum of its parts!

SUSTAINABILITY

UAAP Season 82 host, Ateneo de Manila University, made sure to promote the preservation of the environment by using recycled and sustainable materials for the trophies and medals.

"The trophy and medal might be yours if you win in the competition but you will also win this for the communities in Marawi and in Taal. They made your trophies and medals out of recycled materials," explains Ateneo president Fr. Jett Villarín S.J. during the opening ceremony.

This spirit of community-building complements this year's logo and theme, "All for More." Three hundred and forty kilos of plastic waste and two hundred sixty-five kilos of scrap metal were recycled and used to create the medals and trophies handmade by Filipino communities. The lanyard for the medals were woven by the women of Marawi and the metal parts were made by Maranao craftsmen. The trophies were handcarved by an Ifugao artisan.

The UAAP partnered with Junk Not Eco Creatives to make this possible.

UNLIKE ANY SEASON

ALL FOR MORE



When the COVID-19 pandemic struck last March, the UAAP was in the early stages of its showpiece event for the second semester - Volleyball.

The football competitions only wrapped up its first matchday, while tennis, athletics, baseball, softball, and 3x3 basketball had yet to start. Fortunately, the finals of the juniors' basketball tournament pushed through just before Metro Manila was placed under enhanced community quarantine last March, 2020.

The pandemic altered the course of Season 82, which was eventually cancelled in April as the health crisis in the country continued to worsen. "We had to be careful because what was happening was bigger than sports," said Season 82 president Emmanuel Fernandez of Ateneo. "When the government said it was deemed unsafe to continue conducting classes, we had to follow that because UAAP games are school activities."

The season already presented many challenges as the men's basketball tournament ran on a compressed schedule during the first semester with the UAAP throwing its all-out support to the country's hosting of 30th Southeast Asian Games in November, 2019. Those decisions ultimately had a positive effect on the entire Philippines campaign as the country captured the overall title for the first time in 14 years.

As the euphoria of the SEA Games victory was still felt by Filipino sports fans, the stage was set for the UAAP's second semester events. It seemed like it was to be the continuation of a high for Philippine sports. "I thought the entire season was already challenging as we had to work our way around the SEA Games schedule," said Fernandez.

The volleyball competition was delayed for a couple of weeks from its original start in late January 2020 as the league sought advice from health officials on how to move forward following the first reported cases of the coronavirus in the country. "The first thing was the health and safety of our student-athletes," said UAAP executive director Rebo Saguisag. "We knew it was going to be tougher for them because they prepared so hard for the season and all of a sudden it was going to be taken away from them."

As ECQ was enforced in Metro Manila, Saguisag had mixed feelings. "While it provided hope that the season could still be saved, there was also a lot of anxiety because of the uncertainty," said Saguisag.

"I also felt bad for the hosts. We prepared a lot of innovations, including video challenges as we wanted to push men's volleyball after the SEA Games."

With time running out on the season ending on May 31 and quarantine rules still enforced, the UAAP pulled the plug on Season 82 in a resolution last April 7. "We just took extra precaution and followed government directives," said Fernandez. "Those decisions were not my own but were made upon consultations with the Board of Managing Directors. I think that is what's great about the UAAP is that everyone is working together with the interest of the league and the athletes in mind especially during challenging times."

So beyond this, we know that this season this year, we shall join our national athletes as well. We, as a country, we are hosting the 2019 Southeast Asian Games. And so, it is another occasion for us to come together as Filipinos. I hope that is something that is also a greater thing to do beyond our teams, beyond our school.

“All For More.” “All” because we celebrate each other—we are a community first before we are competitors. And “For” because the energy and the effort that we expend is not just for ourselves, but something much larger. And “More,” greater because, well, not because our muscles are stronger; we say “More” because our hearts are bigger, “All For More.”

Thank you, and let’s celebrate!

UST COMPLETES CINDERELLA RUN IN HIGH SCHOOL BASEBALL



University of Santo Tomas completed its comeback, outlasting Ateneo in Game Three, 4-3, to claim the UAAP Season 82 Juniors' Baseball crown.

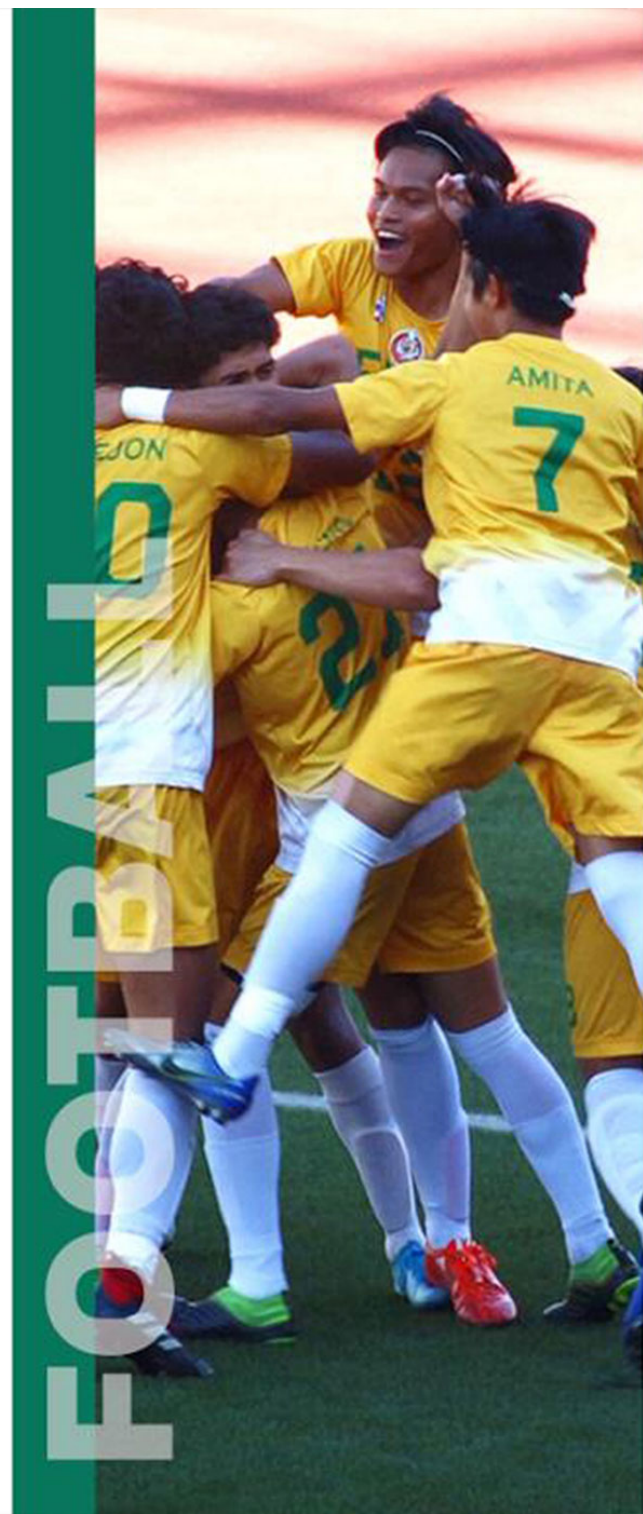
Ending Season 81 at last place, UST returned with a vengeance this year for its second title in three years.

Up by just one at the bottom of the seventh inning, 4-3, UST pitcher John Rafael Regalado struck out the first two batters. Ezekiel Laygo and Marcel Guzman then reached base. With two on and two outs, Regalado fanned Dax Fabella to deny Ateneo a walk-off win.

Finals MVP Regalado – who pitched all seven innings in UST's 7-3 Game Two win – threw a complete game. The native of Naic, Cavite gave up just five hits and one walk while punching out 11 sluggers.

The Junior Golden Sox started the season 0-2 before racking up four straight wins to force a do-or-die with Nazareth School of National University.

UST lost Game One to Ateneo, 15-3, before storming back to take Game Two, 7-3.



JACOB GARCIANO EXTENDS FEU-D BABY TAMARAWS DYNASTY TO 10

A ground breaking dynasty has officially been promoted into a decade of excellence.

Far Eastern University-Diliman banked on Jacob Garciano's brace to win 2-1 over Nazareth School of National University, and become the champions of the UAAP Season 82 High School Boys' Football Tournament.

Garciano produced two fine finishes in the 2nd and 30th minutes of the match to set the Baby Tamaraws on their way to the championship. This came amidst the constant bombardment from the Bullpups, who could only lament their lack of luck in front of goal.

It was the Baby Tamaraws' night to savor as they prolonged a streak of dominance in the boys' division, which started in Season 73.

De La Salle-Zobel finished in third place.

NU COMPLETES UAAP GIRLS' VOLLEYBALL SWEEP

Last year, National University-Nazareth School's bid for five-peat was denied by De La Salle-Zobel. This time around, the Lady Bullpups made sure no one could stop them.

NU completed its season sweep of the UAAP Girls' Volleyball Tournament with a masterful three-set Game 2 win over Adamson University, 25-10, 25-17, 25-15.

This is the Lady Bullpups' fifth crown in six years.

Finals MVP Evangeline Alinsug top-billed for the Lady Bullpups with 16 points on 12 spikes and two blocks. Season MVP Mhicaela Belen dropped 13 markers while Alyssa Solomon uncorked 11 points.

NU finished the season with a 14-0 slate.

Adamson finished in third place.



NU ANNEXES BACK-TO-BACK UAAP BOYS' VOLLEYBALL CROWNS

National University-Nazareth School completed its quest for back-to-back titles after taming top seed Far Eastern University-Diliman, 25-20, 25-20, 25-23, in Game Two of the UAAP Season 82 Boys' Volleyball Finals.

This is also the Bullpups' fourth championship in five seasons.

Back-to-back Finals Most Valuable Player Mac Bandola led NU with 15 points on 13 attacks. Michaelo Buddin, on the other hand, delivered 17 markers and 14 receptions.

Meanwhile, Bryan Jaleco unloaded six blocks to finish with 10 points.

The Bullpups ended the elimination round as the third seed with a 7-5 record.

NU defeated University of the East in the semis to drop the Junior Red Warriors to third place.



NU BAGS SIXTH STRAIGHT MEN'S BADMINTON CROWN



National University continued its dominance in the Men's Badminton Tournament after outlasting Ateneo de Manila University in the finals, 3-1, for their sixth consecutive championship.

The victory was also the 51st straight for the Bulldogs, dating back to Season 77. With another crown in the bag, NU tied the Blue Eagles for most championships in the league's men's badminton tourney with six apiece.

The title-clinching pair of Keeyan Gabuelo and Solomon Padiz Jr. claimed Season 82's Rookie of the Year and Most Valuable Player awards, respectively.

Ateneo captain Fides Bagasbas dumped Gabuelo in the first singles match, 21-19, 11-21, 21-18, to give his team the headstart, 1-0.

But the reigning champions could not be denied as the Bulldogs streaked to three straight match victories for the crown.

Padiz first equalized the tie with a 21-9, 21-14 sweeping of Blue Eagle Keoni Asuncion before the tandem of James Villarante and Julius Villabrille brought NU to the cusp of the championship with a 21-18, 23-21 triumph over Ateneo's Jenó Cariño and Bagasbas.

The duo of Gabuelo and Padiz of the Bulldogs then dealt the final blow, outmuscling the Ateneo duo of Arthur Salvado and Asuncion, 21-17, 21-23, 21-14.

Completing the podium was De La Salle University in third place.

ATENEO CLAIMS BACK-TO-BACK WOMEN'S BADMINTON TIARA

Ateneo de Manila University swept archrival De La Salle University, 3-0, for its second straight UAAP Women's Badminton championship.

The pair of Geva De Vera and Chanelle Lunod clinched the title for the Lady Eagles after a convincing 21-11, 21-15 decision over La Salle duo Shayne Boloron and Palma Cruz in the lone doubles match.

Lunod started the day for Ateneo in the first singles match with a 21-14, 21-6 crushing of La Salle captain Iyah Sevilla to give her squad an early 1-0 advantage.

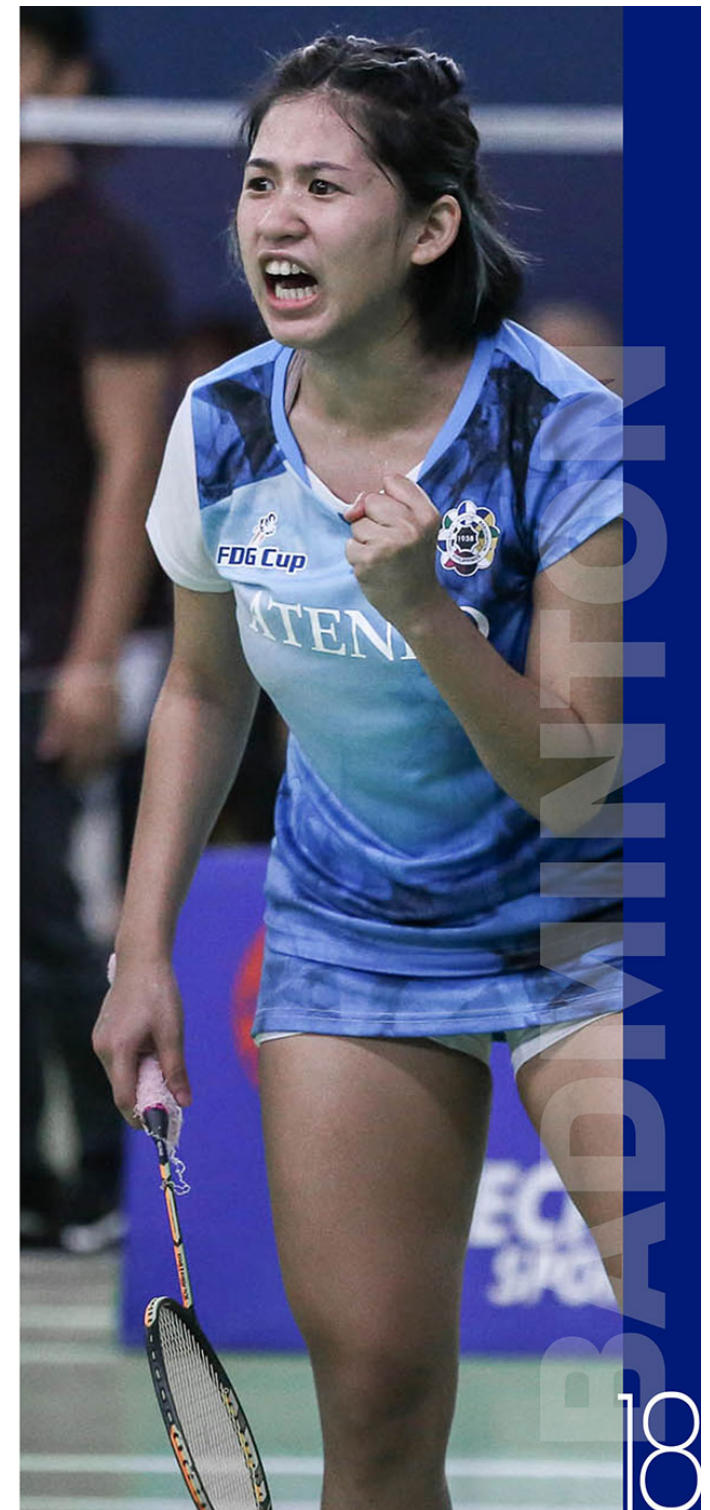
Rookie Mika De Guzman followed suit, handing Lady Shuttler Kanna Baba a 21-13, 21-18 beating in the second singles match that sent Ateneo one match win away from successfully defending its tiara.

The outstanding tandem of De Vera and Lunod was hailed as co-Most Valuable Player for the second straight season while De Guzman was awarded Rookie of the Year.

The championship was the Lady Eagles fifth overall, moving them to a tie with La Salle for second most titles in the women's badminton tournament.

University of the Philippines remains as the winningest team with nine titles, but they missed out on the podium this season.

National University worked its way up on the podium for a bronze finish.







HISTORIC 16-0

ATENEO COMPLETES BASKETBALL SWEEP



For 405 days, Ateneo lorded over the competition in the UAAP. On the 406th day, the Blue Eagles made sure to cap their run with another gold.

The Blue Eagles of Loyola Heights made history once more by completing a 16-0 sweep of the UAAP Season 82 Men's Basketball Tournament with an 86-79 win over University of Santo Tomas.

This is the first time in the history of the league that a team achieved a 16-0 sweep. Moreover, Ateneo extended its winning streak to 26 games. The last time it absorbed a loss was back in October 10, 2019 — a 60-63 loss to Far Eastern University.



Thirty Ravena capped off his stellar collegiate career with 17 points — eight coming in the fourth quarter — together with seven rebounds and five assists, to secure his third straight Finals MVP plum.

That gave Ateneo the honor of being only the seventh team in Men's basketball history to wrap up an immaculate season. It also takes home its 11th UAAP men's basketball crown in front of a capacity 20,198 crowd in attendance.

This is coach Tab Baldwin's third straight championship. The decorated strategist brought Ateneo to the Finals in all his four years at the helm in Katipunan.



NU EXTENDS WOMEN'S BASKETBALL DYNASTY TO SIX

National University's drive for 96 ended with title number six.

The Lady Bulldogs capped off another perfect season with a 66-54 Game Two win over University of Santo Tomas to capture the UAAP Season 82 Women's Basketball championship.

Monique del Carmen fired 15 points, four assists, two rebounds, and two steals. She got things done early with seven first-quarter points to set the tone for NU's 25-8 start, which extended to 20, 30-10, in the second frame.

Del Carmen capped off her collegiate career with a Finals MVP to boot. She exits NU together with Congolese center Rhena Itesi, who had 12 points, eight rebounds, three assists, and three steals, and Kelli Hayes, who collected nine points, three boards, two assists, and two steals.

Kaye Pingol also registered 15 points, five rebounds, two assists, and two steals. Unfortunately she was unable to finish the game after hurting her right shoulder.

NU dedicated this win to graduating senior Jack Animam, who remained in Auckland, New Zealand. Animam suffered an orbital fracture on her right eye, which led to the Mythical Team member missing the Finals series.



NU COMPLETES UAAP 82 BOYS' BASKETBALL SWEEP

Nazareth School of National University emerged as UAAP High School Boys' Basketball champions once more.

The powerhouse Bullpups pulled off a 16-0 sweep with an 87-80 win over Far Eastern University-Diliman in the finale.

The Bullpups led wire-to-wire to complete a 2-0 sweep of the best-of-three series.

NSNU extends its winning run to 27 games, while annexing its fifth championship overall in the past nine years.

NSNU duplicated the feat of Ateneo's Men's and National University's Women's teams, which earlier in the basketball season went undefeated in 16 games.

Carl Vincent Tamayo, who was named the Finals MVP, produced a monster double-double outing of 26 points and 22 rebounds. Winning two in a row, Tamayo averaged 19 points and 18 rebounds.

ADAMSON, UST DECLARED INAUGURAL UAAP GIRLS' BASKETBALL CO-CHAMPIONS

The unexpected cancellation of the rest of UAAP Season 82's high school events due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the winner-take-all Girls' Basketball game between Adamson University and University of Santo Tomas was not played.

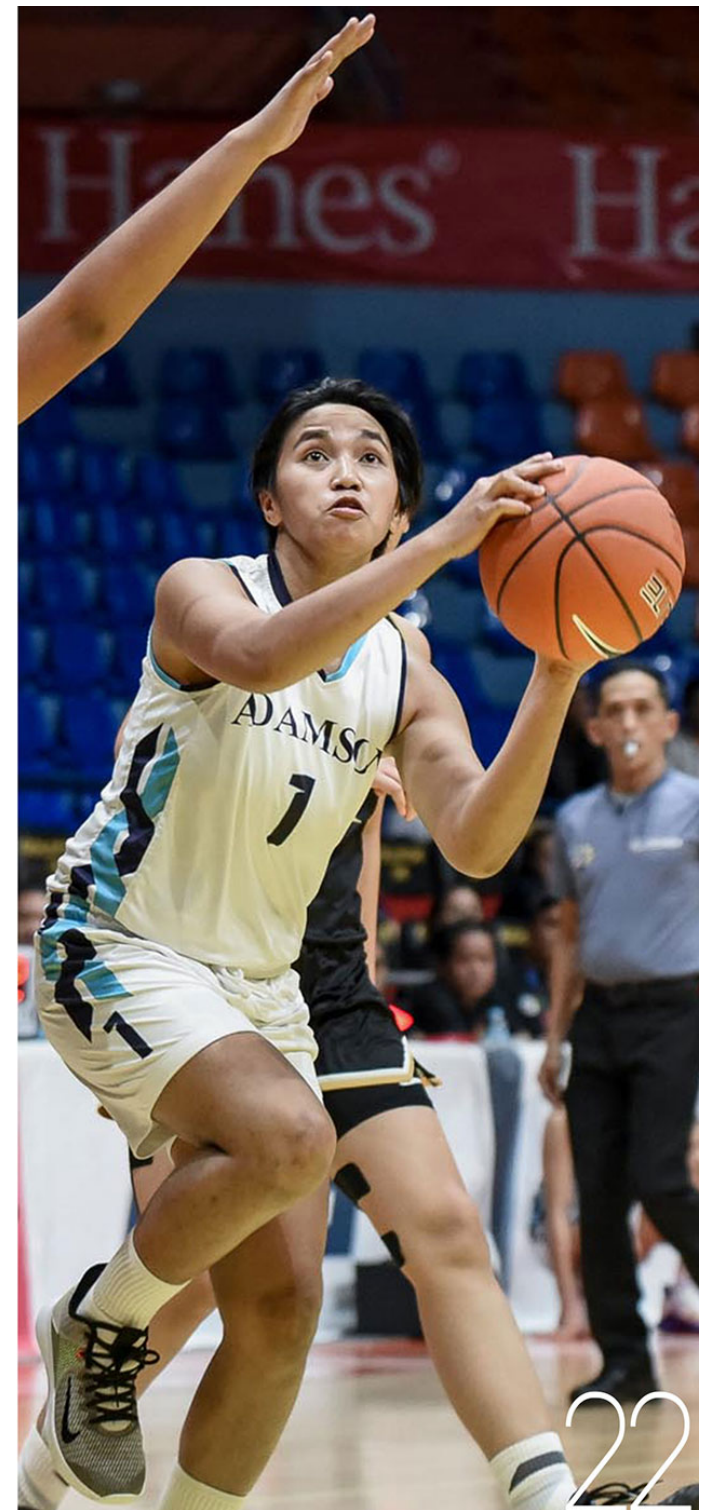
As such, both the Baby Lady Falcons and the Junior Growling Tigresses were declared co-champions in the demonstration sport.

The series was knotted at one-all prior to the cancellation. UST took Game One, 73-68, before Adamson forced a rubber match with a 79-74 Game Two win.

Game Three was supposed to take place last March 6 at the Filoil Flying V Centre.

Adamson's Cris Padilla was crowned as the MVP while joining her in the Mythical Team were Joan Camagong, Kat Agojo, Erika Danganan, and Brigette Santos.

De La Salle-Zobel (3rd, 2-4) and Ateneo High School (4th, 0-6) also competed in the league's first staging of such tournament.



UST SUCCESSFULLY DEFENDS WOMEN'S BEACH VOLLEYBALL TITLE

Queen of the sands once more.

University of Santo Tomas' Babylove Barbon and Gen Eslapor staved off gritty De La Salle pair of Tin Tiamzon and Justine Jazareno in the Finals to grab their fourth UAAP Beach Volleyball championship in as many years.

Moreover, the title was sweeter as the Lady Tigresses completed a perfect season and their seventh championship.

But the path to four-peat did not come without any hardships.

In the Finals opener, UST needed three sets to take down the Lady Spikers, 21-14, 20-22, 15-12.

And in the title-clinching Game Two, the Lady Tigresses had to fight tooth-and-nail against La Salle to force a tight 28-26, 21-18 victory for the title.

Barbon, who had big shoes to fill with UST beach and indoor volleyball legend Sisi Rondina's graduation, proved her worth and bagged the Most Valuable Player award.

Meanwhile, Jazareno was hailed as the season's Rookie of the Year.

Ateneo tandem of Ponggay Gaston and Roma Mae Doromal rounded up the podium at third place.



UST COMPLETES PERFECT SEASON FOR BACK-TO-BACK MEN'S BEACH VOLLEYBALL CROWN

University of Santo Tomas pair of Rancel Varga and Jaron Requinton bagged a perfect campaign after sweeping Far Eastern University's Jude Garcia and Doy Barrica in the Men's Beach Volleyball Finals for its second consecutive championship.

The Tiger Spikers hardly had to sweat in the Finals series as they responded with quick outings in both games for their league-best fifth title overall.

UST started its onslaught in Game One with a 21-11, 21-11 hammering of the Tamaraws.

And to close it out, the Tiger Spikers showed their composure in close games, squeaking out a 21-15, 21-19 decision to repeat as champions.

Virtual unknown Varga made sure to let the UAAP know that he had arrived, copping the Most Valuable Player award.

In the battle for the bronze, National University duo of James Natividad and James Buytrago fended off Adamson University's Leo Miranda and Jesus Valdez, 22-20, 15-21, 15-9, for the podium finish.

Buytrago also claimed this year's Rookie of the Year honors.

HIGH SCHOOL BEACH VOLLEYBALL DEBUTS

THE future stars of the sand court took the spotlight as the High School Beach Volleyball tournament made its much-awaited debut on Feb. 1, 2020 at the Sands SM By The Bay.

All eight-member schools participated in boys' division, while seven teams were fielded in the Girls side of the inaugural competition - a demonstration event in Season 82.

University of Santo Tomas earned the distinction of being the first-ever winner in the Girls division, as Vanessa Bangayan and Jullana Carreon overcame a tough stand by De La Salle-Zobel's Irah Jaboneta and Gerzel Petallo, 21-10, 24-26, 15-11.

In the Boys division, Far Eastern University-Diliman's Jelord Talisayan and Carl Cabatac became the first-ever winners. Talisayan and Martinez prevailed over the Nazareth School of National University pair of Jann Mark Pijo and Jvon Berdin, 25-23, 21-11.

From the opening day until the final weekend of the single-round eliminations, action was intense, proving that high school play in the sand court can match that of their collegiate counterparts.

NSNU and UST booked the first two Final Four slots in the Girls division.

The Bullpups' Kathrina Epa and Chantal Rodriguez disposed of La Salle-Zobel's Irah Jaboneta and Gerzel Petallo, 21-11, 21-13, while the Junior Tigresses' Vanessa Bangayan and Jullana Carreon carved out a 21-17, 21-17 victory over FEU-Diliman's Nikka Medina and Mary Melony Amaro.



NSNU dodged the upset axe in University of the East, as Epa and Rodriguez rallied past the hard-fighting duo of Chris Ann Susbilla and Dea Villamor, 22-20, 19-21, 15-13, to claim the twice-to-beat bonus in the semifinals.

Epa and Rodriguez helped the Bullpups raise their perfect record to 5-0.

UST also clinched the other twice-to-beat Final Four incentive with a 21-18, 21-10 win over Adamson's Mary Grace Borromeo and Ayesha Juegos. The Junior Tigresses finished the single-round eliminations with a 5-1 card.

With Lorien Gamboa replacing Jaboneta to join forces with Petallo, La Salle-Zobel bested FEU, 21-14, 21-13, to move closer to making it to the semis with the 3-2 mark in third place.

The Junior Warriors, who earlier beat Ateneo's Celina Vergeire and Ady Lasala in the morning session, 21-14, 21-14, fell to a 2-3 card alongside the Baby Falcons in fourth spot.

The Baby Tamaraws bowed out of contention with their fourth loss in five matches.

In the Boys division, UST and FEU claimed the twice-to-beat Final Four advantage.

The Tiger Cubs' Jay Rack dela Noche and Alexander Iraya topped UE's Francis Babon and JM Apolinario, 21-14, 21-13, to stay perfect in six matches while the Baby Tamaraws' Jelord Talisayan and Carl Cabatac improved to 5-1 following a 21-9, 21-11 romp of Ateneo's Mikka Mendoza and Anjo Almadro. UE dropped to 3-3 in a tie with NSNU and Adamson.

The Bullpups' Jann Mark Pijo and Reymart Reyes overpowered UP Integrated School's Brett Borja and Miguel Castro, 21-7, 21-14, while the Baby Falcons' Jefferson Marapoc and Evander Novillo downed La Salle-Zobel's Andre Espejo and Leinuel Crisostomo, 21-9, 21-16.

The Junior Green Spikers and the Blue Eaglets went down to 2-4 card. The final day of eliminations was supposed to be played on Feb. 15 and the championship round the following day, but was postponed due to the coronavirus outbreak.

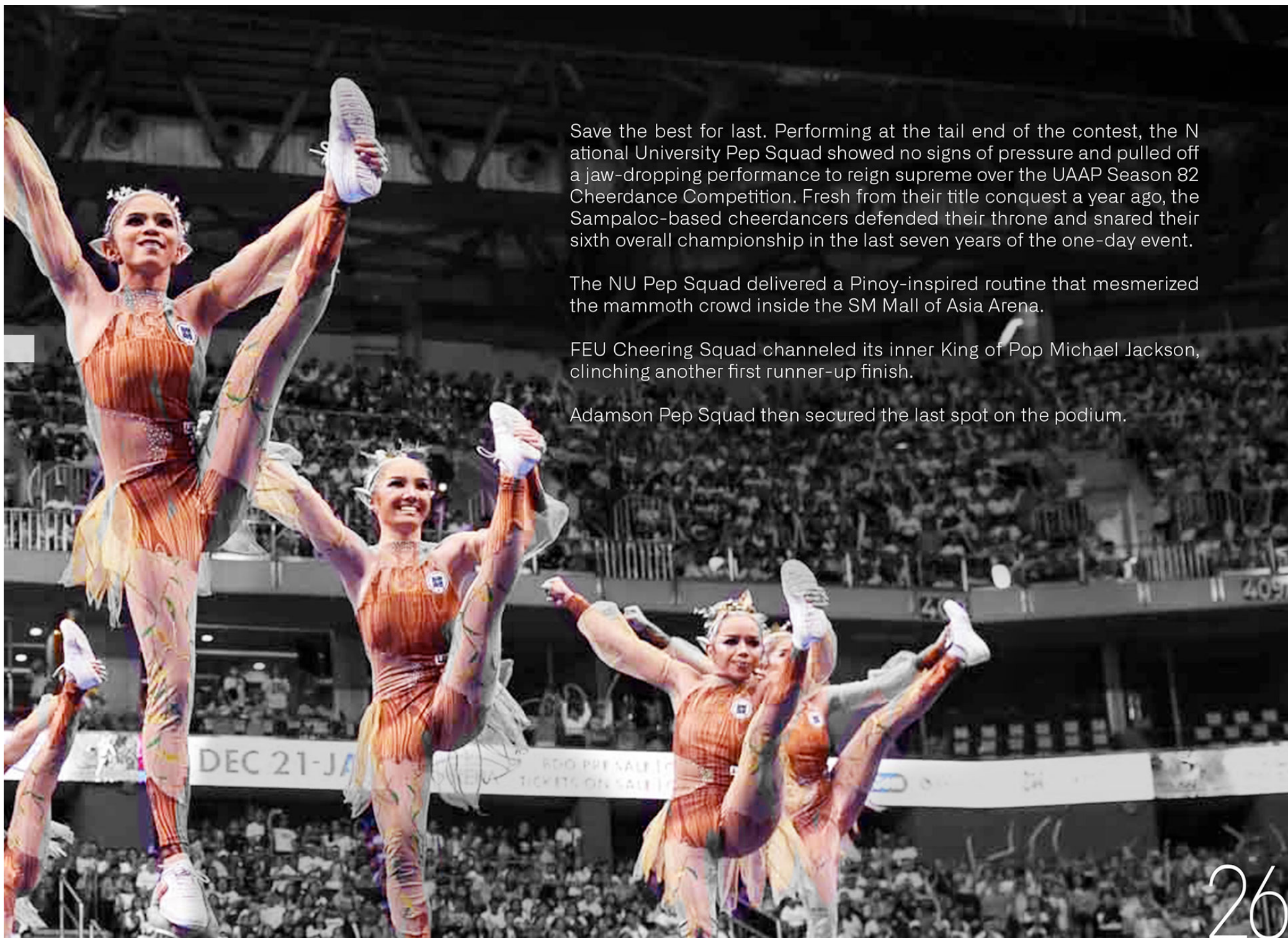
COVID-19 then became a pandemic, as the league in mid-March canceled the High School competitions, leaving the first-ever tournament without champions.

FEU Cheering Squad channeled its inner King of Pop Michael Jackson, clinching another first runner-up finish.

Adamson Pep Squad then secured the last spot on the podium.

FEU ON TOP OF WOMEN'S CHESS



Needing all the points in the final round, Far Eastern University could only manage a 2.5-1.5 victory over University of Santo Tomas, but it was enough to seal the UAAP Season 82 Women's Chess title.

Shania Mae Mendoza was the lone victor for FEU on board one while Bea Mendoza, Marife dela Torre and Viona Nepascua drew on boards two to four to end with 40 points, just enough to win the tiara.

The Lady Tamaraws 37.5 points just ahead by 1.5 points versus defending champions De La Salle's 36 heading into the final round, the latter could still snag the title.

But the Green Woodpushers, needing a sweep, settled for a 2.5-1.5 verdict against Ateneo to finish at second place behind 38.5 points.

UST bagged the bronze with 35.5 points. De La Salle's Antoinette Marie San Diego was hailed Most Valuable Player and was also the gold medalist on top board.

FEU's Mendoza and Rizalyn Tejada got the gold plums on boards two and six, respectively.

Manilyn Cabungcag and Laila Camel Nadera gave Ateneo gold medals on boards three and four.

Vanessa Fe Villamil on board five was UST's lone gold medalist.

FEU DOMINATES MEN'S CHESS

Far Eastern University finished with 43 points after 12 rounds to secure its back-to-back championship in the UAAP Men's Chess Tournament in dominant fashion.

To prove how dominant the Tamaraws were, they had already virtually clinched the championship with two rounds left to play.

FEU asserted its power in men's chess with its 15th title, the most in league history. La Salle and University of Santo Tomas are tied for second-most with seven titles apiece.

JM Jacutina was a revelation for the Tamaraws, bagging three awards in the tournament. He won a gold on board three, the Rookie of the Year plum and the Most Valuable Player award.

Teammates Jeth Morado, RK Sevillano and Israelito Rilloraza also delivered gold hardwares for the Tamaraws on boards one, two, and six, respectively.

UST was a distant silver-finisher with 35.5 points while University of the Philippines completed the podium behind 26.5 points.

Other gold medalists are Tristan Jared Cervero of Ateneo on board four and Tiger Woodpusher AJ Almodal on board five.





UE BREAKS 13-YEAR TITLE DROUGHT IN BOYS' CHESS

Thirteen years ago in UAAP Season 69, University of the East just grabbed its fifth championship in as many years. However, a drought followed.

In Season 82, the Junior Red Warriors finally regained footing, clinching the Boys' Chess crown after 13 long years of famine.

Lee Roi Palma showed the way for UE, garnering 10.5 points in 11 games to seal the gold medal on board one and the Most Valuable Player hardware.

National University-Nazareth School hammered Adamson in the last round, 3.5-0.5 to cop the silver with 33 points. Last season's titlist FEU-Diliman grabbed bronze behind 29.5 points.

Aside from the MVP, UE's Francis Roi Parro and John Kenneth Gelua also pocketed gold medals on boards three and four, respectively.

Jarvey Labanda on board two was FEU's lone gold medalist.

Doroy capped her final season in the high school ranks with a gold medal on board one and a Most Valuable Player plum after tallying 8.5 points in 10 games.

Third place Adamson had three gold medalists in Queenie Mae Samarita (board three), Robelle De Jesus (board four), and Naomi Gwyne Ramos (board six).

Other gold medalists were University of Santo Tomas' Francois Marie Magpily on board two, and FEU-D's Me Ann Joy Baclayon on board five.

League debutant Gabriel Ligeró's run set the tone for the day, stopping heavy favorite David Gordon of De La Salle University in the quarterfinals of the featherweight class. He eventually topped rookie Miguel Gonzalvo in the finals to claim an important gold for UST.

UP needed to take both the golds in the extra-lightweight and half-lightweight class in order to end a 12-year drought, but only Edward Figueroa emerged with a title.

Russel Lorenzo then needed to fend off UP sophomore Paolo Cruz in the -60 kg final in the golden score round to seal UST's fourth straight crown.

Ligeró, with his heroics and dominant showing, claimed the Most Valuable Player award.

UE BAGS HISTORIC UAAP WOMEN'S JUDO TITLE



Veneza Dayao broke through the stranglehold of University of Santo Tomas and University of the Philippines in the heavier classes, powering University of the East to its first-ever UAAP Women's Judo crown.

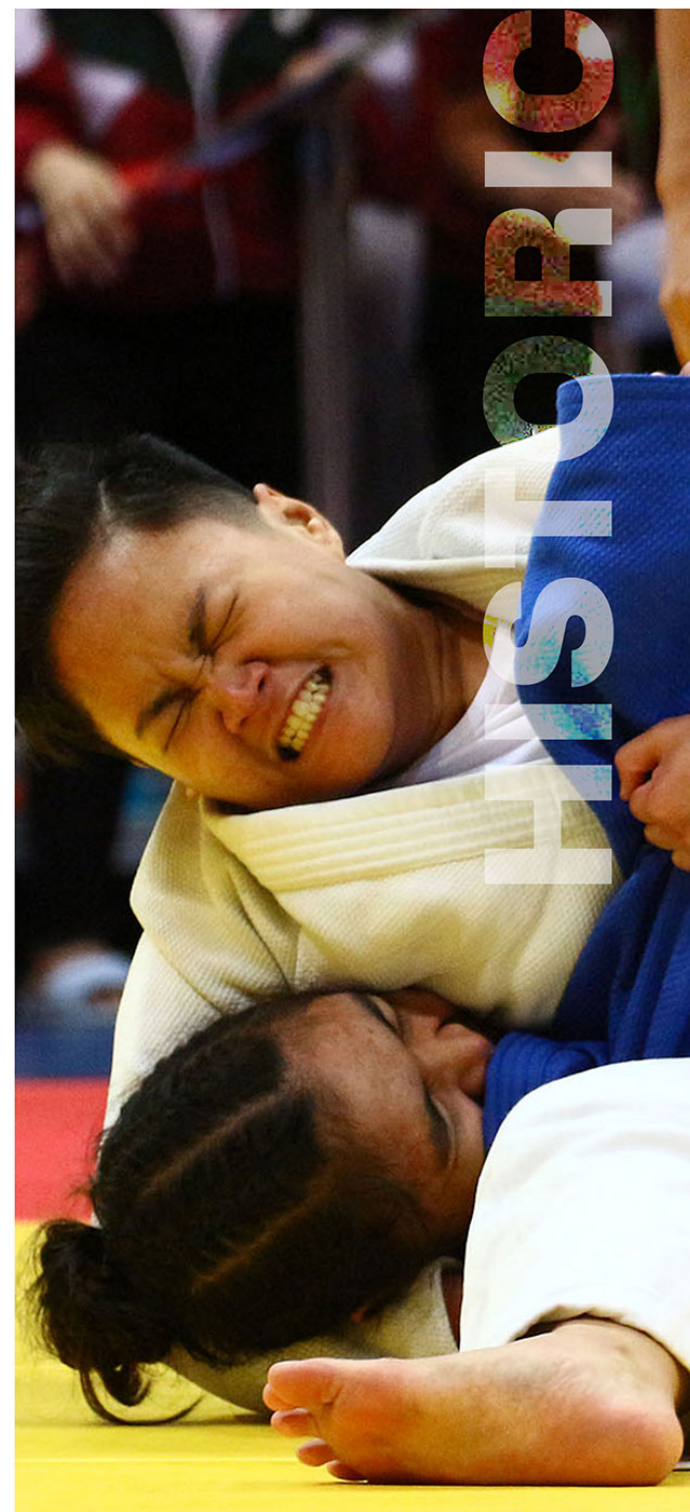

Eventual Rookie of the Year Sydney Sy dominated her UAAP debut. The world sambo medalist took care of UP's Jubelle Vergara in the semifinals, before finishing teammate Risa Dela Cruz for the gold in the heavyweight class.

However, Christine Pagdanganan was not able to close it out. Fighting Maroon Justine Main claimed her second straight half-heavyweight gold to help UP finish on the podium in third place at 22 points.

University of Santo Tomas annexed a fourth straight boys crown in the UAAP High School Judo Championships.

The Junior Golden Judokas won two golds on the final day courtesy of half-heavyweight Joshua Quizon and heavyweight Rael Abujos, to finish with 24 points.

La Salle-Zobel, which led on opening day, settled for second place with 21 points. Meanwhile, Far Eastern University-Diliman, courtesy of Knoxville Lining's half-middleweight gold, was able to reach the podium with 18 points.

UE GIRLS' ACHIEVE UAAP JUDO THREE-PEAT

University of the East kept the UAAP High School Girls' Judo title for a third consecutive season.

The Junior Lady Warriors successfully defended the girls' title after featherweight Mary Joy Baldos, extra lightweight Joemari-heart Rafael, and half-lightweight Denise Mae Pidlaogan emerged victorious in the final day.

UE finished with 37 points, 11 ahead of UST which settled for runner-up honors. Cathlyn Vergara was the Junior Tigresses' biggest hope after she broke through the final.

ATENEO RULES MEN'S SWIMMING

Ateneo continued to flex its muscles in the Men's Swimming tournament, stretching its dominant run to six years with the gold hardware, but this time with an incredible comeback.

Trailing De La Salle's 256 points by 13 entering the last day of tournament, the Blue Eagles needed to pull off a massive surge to defend their title.

And so they did.

Ateneo amassed 110 points in the final day to finish with 353, 10 more over silver medalists De La Salle. University of Santo Tomas garnered 322 points for the bronze.

Blue Eagles Drei Buhain (24.06 seconds) and Miguel Barlisan (24.11 seconds) tallied a 1-2 finish in the 50m freestyle to give their team a boost.

Ateneo's Ianiko Limfilipino also pocketed a gold medal in the 1500m freestyle, registering 17:27.56 over La Salle's Antoine Mendoza and University of the Philippines' Keane Ting.

In the final event of the tilt, the 400m medley relay, Ateneo was already ahead by six points, only needing a bronze to secure another title. Meanwhile, De La Salle had to grab the gold to dethrone the then-five-time defending champions.

But Tigersharks Kevin Dagum, Jay Cabulit, Reynal Cullentas and Renz Gawidan had other plans, topping the event in a record breaking fashion with a time of 4:01.13. Ateneo ended with a silver while UP bagged the bronze.

De La Salle's Sacho Ilustre swept all his seven events to be hailed Most Valuable Player.

Ateneo newbie Jiron Rotoni grabbed the Rookie of the Year honors by a hairline of 47 points over Ting's 46.

University of the Philippines finished second with 395 points after the four-day meet while De La Salle reached the podium with 203. University of Santo Tomas registered 96 points.

Lady Maroon Erin Castillo capped her maiden season with a golden double, bagging the 50m backstroke (30.98 seconds) and 50m freestyle (27.23 seconds) championships.

In her spectacular debut, Castillo grabbed this season's Rookie of the Year award.

But Ateneo also had a prodigy in its lair in Nirel Ibarra who grabbed the 200m breaststroke gold hardware with 2:50.63.

In the tilt's final event, Ateneo quartet of Courtney Gray, Jazmin Chua, Suzanne Himor and Marjorie Manguiat tallied 4:41.08 in the 400m medley relay for the gold. UP finished second behind 4:46.33 while UST got the bronze in 4:50.38.

UST RECLAIMS GIRLS' SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIP



After settling for bridesmaid finishes for the last three seasons, University of Santo Tomas finally reclaimed the UAAP Girls' Swimming title behind a 419-point masterful performance.

This is the Female Tigersharks 11th championship to remain the winningest team in league history.

Camille Buico once again led UST and was named the Most Valuable Player for the second straight year.

She capped her second MVP season with a new UAAP record of 2:24.04 in the 200m butterfly event, breaking Ateneo's Suzanne Himor's 2016 mark of 2:25.30.

Buico also reigned in the 50m freestyle event with 27.74 seconds.

University of the Philippines finished second with 297 points while Season 81 champions De La Salle-Zobel went third with 277 markers.

UP's Franz Joves ruled the 50m backstroke event for the second consecutive year with a 31.95-second output.

Meanwhile, Junior Lady Tankers Raven Al-coseba, Ayena Calvario, Kayleen Keh and Gene Quiambao erased the three-year UAAP record in the 400m medley relay, registering 4:40.42.

Junior Lady Maroon Aubrey Tom was hailed Rookie of the Year.

UST RETAKES BOYS' SWIMMING CROWN



Coming off a silver finish last season, University of Santo Tomas came back with a vengeance to retake the Boys' Swimming championship behind 461.59 points for its third title in four years.

Charles Arceo showed the way for the Junior Tigersharks in the last day of the tournament, tallying 2:27.62 in the 200m breaststroke for the gold.

He then connived with John Paderes, Jules Merandilla and Merrell Nerin in the 400m medley relay with a time of 4:03.78, for a new UAAP landmark.

Last year's titlist De La Salle-Zobel settled for silver with 370.50 points while Ateneo took the third place behind a 197-point showing.

DLSZ's Franco Dela Rosa won the gold plums in the 50m backstroke (27.85 seconds) and 50m freestyle (24.44 seconds) to lead his school.

Meanwhile, Ateneo was led by season Most Valuable Player Wacky Santos, who topped all his seven events.

In the closer of the four-day meet, Santos won the 200m butterfly, clocking in 2:09.98.

Junior Tigershark Robin Seranillo got this season's Rookie of the Year award.

UST DUMPS NU FOR 2ND STRAIGHT MEN'S TABLE TENNIS TITLE



University of Santo Tomas turned back National University in a come-from-behind manner, 2-1, in the best-of-three Finals for the UAAP Men's Table Tennis back-to-back championships.

Adding another crown to their gallery, the Tiger Paddlers now have 28 championships to cement their status as the winningest team in the sport.

After a tough 2-3 loss to the Bulldogs in Game One, UST clawed its way back to level the series at one match apiece after veteran Raymark Mabung dropped Romualdo Ramiro Jr. for the equalizer.

And in the rubber match, Mabung ultimately dashed NU's hopes of a crown, crushing Louis Llamas with a four-set win for the clincher.

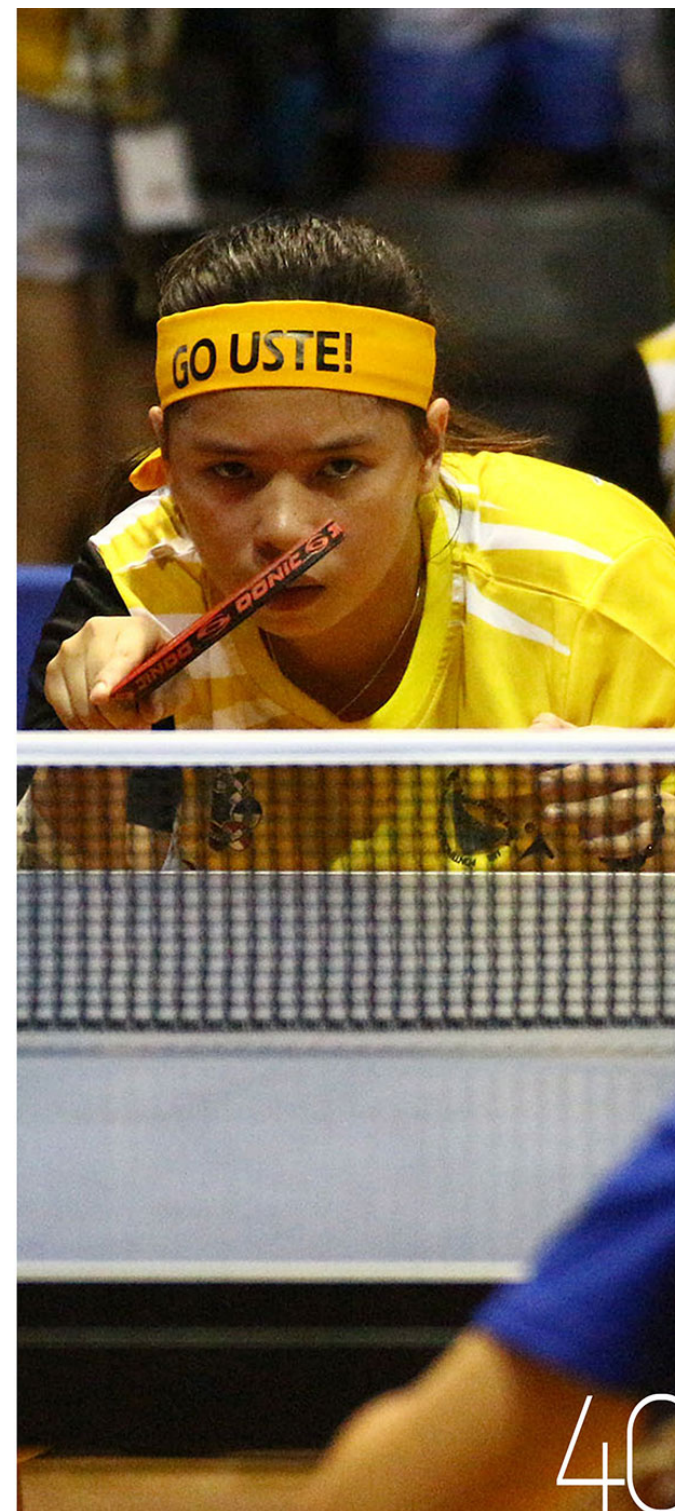

National University lifted its fourth-straight championship trophy after an immaculate 6-0 sweep of the UAAP Season 82 Women's Taekwondo Tournament.

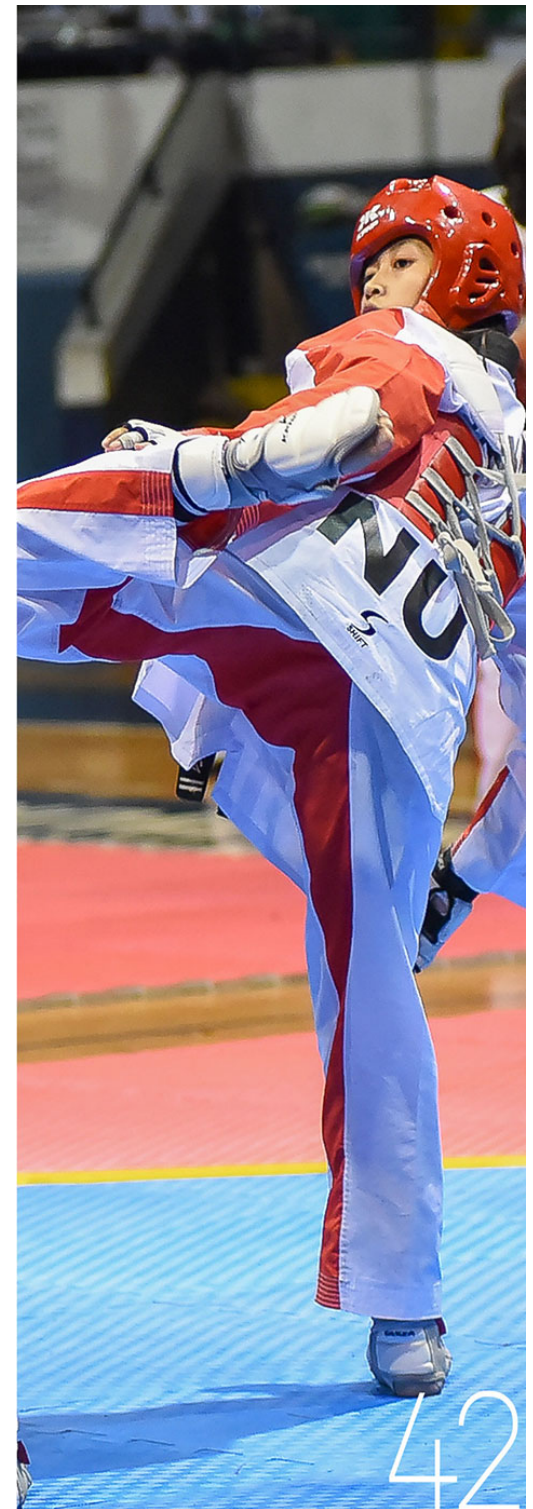

De La Salle University banked on the heroics of Patrick Perez and Angelica Gaw to capture its second-straight UAAP Poomsae championship behind a 2-2 gold-silver medal tally.

Perez and Gaw finished with three medals, two gold hardwares in each individual event and a silver in the mixed pair.

Gaw won by a hairline in the female individual event with an 8.060 average, just 0.020 ahead of University of the Philippines' Patricia Jubelag. National University's Denise Alicias was a distant third at 7.835.

Perez, meanwhile stormed the male individual event, scoring 8.140. Eventual Rookie of the Year Ricco Teraytay of NU had 7.980 while Maroons senior Lyan Llanto produced 7.900 for third place.

Tiger Jins Jerel Dalida and Jade Carno ruled the mixed pair event with 8.170. But the second place finish of Gaw and Perez was enough to catapult the Green Jins to the top.

In the team male category, the Bulldogs got their first-ever gold over UST and UP. The trio of Teraytay, Kier Macalino and Marvin Mori pulled off an escape act with an 8.035 average, just 0.005 above UST's triumvirate of Miguel Baladad, Darius Venerable and Dalida.

Fighting Maroons Jayboy Buenavista, Juanito Sandoy and Llanto were a far third at 7.865.

In the team female category, UP's Gretel Delos Martinez, Kate Castillo and Jubelag was a sure-fire gold with 8.035. La Salle's Daphne Ching, Zyka Santiago and Mikee Regala tallied 7.885 for the silver while UST trio of Erin Saceda, Nastassia Limos and Carno had 7.770 for third place.

The Bulldogs and the Maroons both tallied a gold, a silver and two bronzes. But NU copped the runner-up finish as they entered the finals of all events.

UST RETAINS HS TAEKWONDO CHAMPIONSHIP

University of Santo Tomas asserted its dominance in the UAAP High School Taekwondo Tournament with a clean 5-0 sweep of the competition for their 13th championship.

The Junior Tiger Jins finished in the podium in all five weight classes with a 3-1-1 gold-silver-bronze medal tally. Most Valuable Player Marco Rubio (-63 kg), Josh Maquiling (-48 kg) and Mark Gariega (+70 kg) were the gold finishers for UST while Kim Pasion and Aron Bangayan took silver in the minus-70 kg and bronze in the minus-55 kg, respectively.

FEU-Diliman walked away with the silver medal, dealing UST a 3-2 scare in the eventual titlist final outing. Gariega beat Baby Tamaraw Prince Castro in the +70 kg for the win.

FEU-D and National University ended the tournament with identical 3-2 win-loss cards but the former's victory over the latter allowed it to take silver. FEU's solitary gold came from Timothy Arcabos (-55 kg) while Russel Villanueva claimed silver in the minus-63 kg.

The Bullpups got two silvers from Rama Liporada (-55 kg) and Djanne Sarria (+70 kg) while Marcus Hinojas (-48 kg), Kurt Maverick Barbosa (-63 kg) and Darwin Cea (-70 kg) all bagged bronze. Jemuel Rendora and Kyle Tagsip gave University of the East a gold medal in the minus-70 kg and a silver finish in the minus-48 kg. Omer was also part of the DLSZ's basketball team.

The University of Santo Tomas (UST) claimed their 44th University Athletic Association of the Philippines (UAAP) General Championship in the collegiate division, as announced during the UAAP Closing Ceremony held last July 25.

To successfully defend their GC title for the third straight campaign, UST amassed a total of 209 points spread over nineteen events. Coming in second place is De La Salle University with 181 points. Host Ateneo de Manila University ends at third place with 164 points.

The Growling Tigers reflected their on-court collegiate dominance with thirteen podium finishes, including championships in the Men's and Women's divisions of Beach Volleyball and Table Tennis, as well as in Men's Judo. They finished first runner-up in Men's and Women's Basketball, Men's Chess, Women's Taekwondo, and Women's Judo. They also secured second runner-up in Women's Chess, Men's Taekwondo, and Men's Swimming.

UST made it double this season as they secured their 21st GC title in the High School division, earning a total of 179 points in sixteen events. To secure it for the sixth straight time, the Tiger Cubs claimed five titles this season: Taekwondo, Boys' and Girls' Swimming, Boys' Judo, and Baseball.

That's what these UAAP athletes felt for two weeks.

Time and again, the country's top collegiate league served as a breeding ground of Filipino champions and it was no different when the Philippines hosted the 30th Southeast Asian Games from 30 November to 11 December 2019. The last time the country hosted was fourteen years ago.

Our athletes responded to the call of flag and country, showing class, grit, and determination to conquer against all odds. It was an epic struggle all the way with rewards beyond their imagination.

That the Philippines cornered the overall championship was a fitting end to a SEA Games filled with memorable performances,

, particularly from the stars of the UAAP.

"Winning the gold still feels like a dream," said Jack Danielle Animam, the National University center after she powered the women's basketball team past Thailand. It was a historic first SEA Games title played in front of an adoring throng at Mall of Asia Arena on December 10, 2019.

Truth be told, the UAAP battles prepared Animam and NU teammate Kelli Hayes, Clare Castro of Far Eastern University, and Adamson's Nathalia Prado for tougher competition.

Those experiences came in handy against the formidable Thais, who had long dominated the event in the SEA Games until the Filipinas delivered a performance for the ages. Just a few days before, Animam showed everyone a portent of things to come with a golden finish in the 3x3 event, which was held for the first time in the SEA Games.

They may be foes in the UAAP, but here were the likes of Animam, Hayes, Castro, and Prado at the top of the podium, sharing a glorious moment as national athletes!

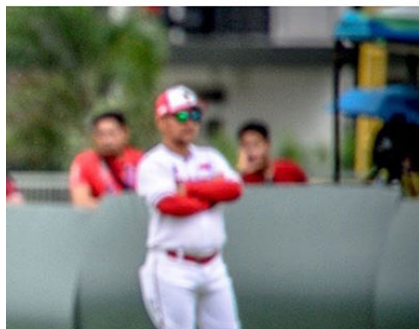
bannered by UAAP stars made the country proud with a golden finish.

Stacked up by a combination of players from De La Salle University, Ateneo De Manila University, Adamson University, University of Santo Tomas, the baseball team romped to a 15-2 victory over Thailand in the gold medal match.

The names of Brian Castillo and Steven Manaig of Adamson, Justin Rosales and Ron Dela Cruz of UST, Juan Alvaro Macasaet of Ateneo and Luis Escaño, Arvin Maynard Herrera and Diego Lozano of La Salle will forever be etched in the history books of the SEA Games as champions.

More than half of the members of women's softball team were also current UAAP athletes. Adamson's Arriane Vallesterro, Ezra Jalandoni, Angela Gabriel, Mary Joy Maguad, Nicole Padasas, Jennete Rusia, and Krisha Cantor joined forces with NU's Hannah Dela Torre as they helped the Blu Girls retain the title in Clark.

History was also made on the volleyball court at the PhilSports Arena where the men's team powered by UAAP student-athletes captured the nation's heart with a strong silver medal finish.

SOUTHEAST ASIAN GAMES

While a handful of former UAAP players were on the team, the present stars of the league also did their share in the memorable campaign.

UST's Joshua Umandal, Ricky Marcos, and Joshua Retamar of NU were all part of the squad that churned in the best finish by the men's volleyball team since 1977.

Also producing a silver medal was the men's softball team that included Julius Diaz of DLSU.

Not to be outdone were standouts in individual events.

Rookie Kurt Barbosa of NU grabbed the gold in the men's fin weight event in taekwondo, while judoka Chino Sy of UST struck gold in the samba event. Sy's sister, Sydney also contributed a bronze medal in the kurash event.

Barbosa was in full control in the gold medal battle against an Indonesian foe, scoring on an axe kick to highlight a scintillating performance.

Another NU taekwondo standout Marvin Mori won the silver in men's poomsae, while schoolmates Veronica Garces, Jessica

Cabanal, and Kurt Pajuelas took home bronze medals.

DLSU standout Maurice Sacho Ilustre claimed a silver medal in swimming after helping the 4x100m freestyle team finish second behind Singapore. Another silver came courtesy of Shania Mae Mendoza of FEU in women's chess.

Considered as one of the country's top fencing programs, the University of the East produced a gold medalist in Mickyle Rein Bustos, who was part of the team that ruled the women's epee event.

Christian Concepcion added a silver through the men's individual sabre, while fellow UE student-athletes Shawn Felipe, Samantha Catantan, and Queen Dalmacio chipped in bronze medals to the country's haul.

UST had two more athletes who collected silver medals in Leila Dela in taekwondo and Darius Venerable in poomsae.

University of the Philippines' Mariano Masano also came through with a silver finish in the men's 1500m event, while another State U athlete, John Viron Ferrer added a bronze in judo.

The national athletics team, which actually finished with 27 medals, also drew significant contributions from Jessel Lumapas of De La Salle, who was part of the 4x100 women's relay team that secured the bronze medal. Adamson's Joyme Sequita, likewise helped the women's 4x400 squad win another bronze.

Ateneo bets Jaime Viceo and Maxine Esteban grabbed bronze medals to help a hugely successful campaign in fencing that also saw Daniel Villanueva of UST claim a third-place finish.

Also coming up with a bronze finish was Jaron Requinton of UST and Jude Garcia of FEU in men's beach volleyball.



COVID-19: A DIFFERENT KIND OF ARENA

The COVID-19 pandemic made the world stop in 2020. There may not be any competitions on court, but the UAAP community moved their play in a different type of arena - sending help to healthcare workers and communities affected by the virus.

ATENEO

ATENEO DE MANILA UNIVERSITY

The Ateneo de Manila University together with its partner institutions, Tanging Yaman Foundation and the Simbahang Lingkod ng Bayan, mobilized its community to address pressing needs during the coronavirus pandemic. Through the University's Office of Social Development's platform of giving, Disaster Response and Management Team (DREAM Team) donations were received and duly acknowledged.

Donated food items were repacked; cooked food and urgently needed PPEs were distributed. As of the May 7 posting, ninety thousand four hundred twenty (90,420) families in two hundred nine (209) communities received food donation. PPEs were shipped to one hundred thirty-five (135) hospitals nationwide for use of thirteen thousand (13,000) frontliners and healthcare workers.

Philippine Jesuit Provincial head, Fr. Jun Viray, SJ and De La Salle University President Bro. Armin Luistro collaborated to set up a fundraising campaign called "Let's Work Together To Fight COVID-19!" Its aim was to provide for urgent needs of the most vulnerable communities.

Ateneo student-athletes for their part, organized their own fund-raising activities such as national team standouts Maxine Esteban and Pauline Lopez.

Esteban already had a busy year with her stint at the Southeast Asian Games, winning a bronze medal in the Team Foil event. The Season 81 Rookie MVP went on to help the Lady Eagles win third place finish in the UAAP Season 82 Fencing tournament. She then made moves to raise funds to help out the frontliners and affected communities, initially setting up "A Small Thing Goes A Long Way" with her siblings. The campaign managed to raise PhP 500,000, an amount put together from her own allowance and incentives from the Philippine Sports Commission.



ADU ADAMSON UNIVERSITY

Adamson University and the Vincentian priests rallied their community in support of many and urgent needs during the Corona pandemic crisis.

The San Marcelino-based university offered their Women's Volleyball athletes' dormitory as temporary accommodations for healthcare providers working in nearby Philippine General Hospital (PGH).

Some members of the Women's Softball team who stayed on campus during the quarantine protocols, assisted in the repacking of donated goods and meals earmarked for families in the Manila area and in select communities. These were the athletes who weren't able to defend their UAAP title this season as all games had to be cancelled.

Lastly, the University offered the use of their athletes' buses to transport front-liners who urgently needed to report to the Makati Medical Center.



De La Salle University was among the first schools to respond to urgent needs during the coronavirus pandemic.

Acting on the request of the Arnold Janssen Kalinga Center to provide additional shelter for the homeless, the De La Salle Brothers readily offered the use of the Razon Sports Complex and the College of Saint Benilde's covered courts. Donations received from various sectors provided for the many needs of those who were housed in these facilities.

Fund-raising efforts were quickly initiated by the Alumni and other sectors of the DLSU community. Several DLSU student-athletes also heeded the call for additional financial assistance. Iyah Sevilla of the Women's Badminton team established the Stronger Together donation drive. Sevilla, alongside fellow captains Ace Agustin of Swimming and Pat Eusebio and Nicole Alcaraz of Fencing, took the lead, under the guidance of the school's Office for Sports Development, represented by its head Joy Lanting-Cenarosa.

"As La Sallian athletes, we were always blessed and supported by the people around us," said Sevilla. "Siyempre sobrang saya po to see the faces of the people we were able to help through the pictures that were being sent to us. Very overwhelmed and fulfilled po ang feeling namin right now."

Some members of the Men's Basketball team were also involved in fund raising activities. Aljun Melecio parlayed his role as a sports ambassador. Together with Gatorade, they distributed sports drinks to the health care workers and

other frontliners in the City of Manila. In addition, they also donated and distributed packed meals to the frontliners in his hometown of Valencia, Bukidnon.

Aljun shares, "Siyempre, mag-iisip ka talaga ng kung anong puwede mo matulong sa mga frontliners di ba? In my own way, gusto ko pakita sa kanila na we appreciate them and that we are there for them."

Pampanga-based teammates. Justine Baltazar and Encho Serrano combined their allowances to provide meals for communities in Mabalacat and Apalit, respectively. Incoming freshman Joshua Ramirez did the same in Tarlac.



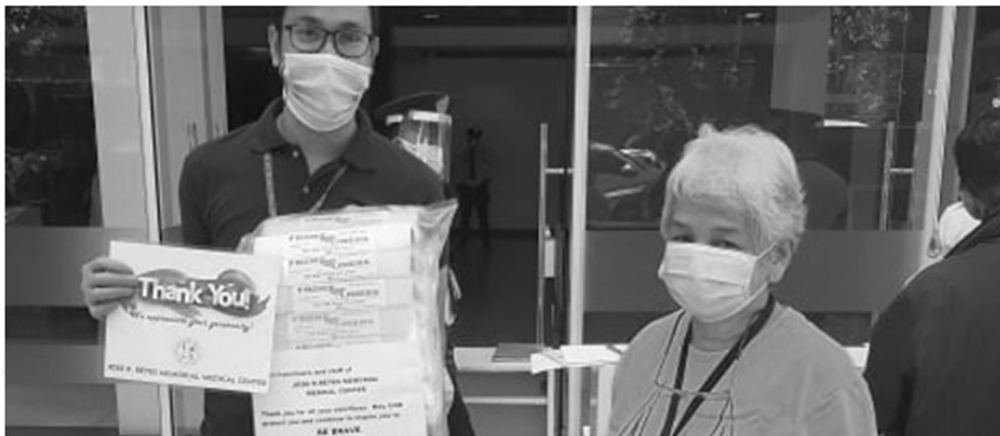
FEU FAR EASTERN UNIVERSITY

Far Eastern University student athletes responded to the urgent call to raise funds to be able purchase personal protective equipment (PPE) for healthcare workers. Ino Comboy (Men's Basketball), Jude Garcia (Men's Volleyball), and Celine Domingo (Women's Volleyball) were among those who stepped up. Each of them donated a game-worn jersey which were auctioned off in a fund-raiser, "May Twenty Ako".

John Paul Uminga of the FEU Tamaraw Volunteers helped raise funds benefiting the medical staff of the Dr. Jose N. Rodriguez Memorial Hospital in Calocan.

Alumnus and 2013 Ten Outstanding Students of the Philippines awardee, John Michael Lava, through the the PAKIG-AMBIT, likewise raised funds to purchase PPEs for medical frontliners in Cebu.

The Pantawid COVID Project of Patrick Manuel, president of the FEU Entrepreneurship Club, focused on providing food for street vendors, pedicab and jeepney drivers, and stranded dormers in the Morayta area.



Two outstanding student-athletes from the successful basketball program of National University did their share to help.

Five-time UAAP Women's Basketball champion Jack Danielle Animam started a fundraiser after learning of the needs of the medical staff inside the Bulacan Medical Center in her native Malolos.

The drive allowed two-time Southeast Asian Games gold medalist to purchase personal protective equipment and other basic necessities.

She shares, "Yung BMC is near us kasi and I saw yung dami ng patients that come in sa kanila. Naisip namin na why not gumawa ng fundraising para sa mga frontliners dito sa Bulacan. Just a little help para mapunan yung mga sakripisyo nila." Jack adds, "Of course being part of the national team does not mean na you only have to do your part sa court. You have to do your part as a Filipino citizen lalo na kung mayroon naman ka namang platform na magagamit."

In his hometown of Muntinlupa, Nazareth School of National University big man Kevin Quiambao showed his big heart by distributing 150 packed meals to the frontliners in Barangay Bayanan.

The packed meals are an offshoot from funds pooled from himself, friends and family. The Bullpup shares, "Nag-decide kami mag-help out para makatulong kami kahit paano and para alam din po na naa-apreciate namin yung pag sakripisyo ng mga frontliners." He adds, "Sobrang sarap sa pakiramdam na nagagawa mo yung part mo bilang isang Pilipino dahil isa ako sa ginawang instrumento ni Lord para makatulong kahit papaano."



The University of the Philippines played a significant role in fight against COVID-19, developing timely and necessary technology in care and fight against the effects of this deadly

One of those was the design and construction of a locally-crafted sanitation tent. Each is capable of disinfecting and sterilizing people in public areas, ideal for employees and frontliners who are unable to go home during the pandemic. The gym at the College of Human Kinetics (CHK) also served as the testing and production of these sanitents.

Another such development was the mass production of face masks at the College of Engineering using 3D technology.

Aside from sanitent production, the CHK converted its Kalinnga Center as a step-down facility. Normally serving as the practice area of the Women's Basketball team and the UP Pep Squad, it was used as an isolation facility equipped with tents, mattresses, beddings, and other additional facilities for recovering COVID-19 patients. The university also provided for the needs of the medical workers in the Philippine General Hospital.

Moreover, the State University cared for its university personnel who were forced to remain on campus in Diliman during the lockdown, as well as the marginalized living in the surrounding barangays. Donations poured in from its generous alumni.

For his part, Ricci Rivero, student-athlete of the Fighting Maroons Men's Basketball star distributed relief goods across the province, with the assistance of his family and friend Johnvic de Guzman. Among the beneficiaries are some of Isabela's key medical facilities: the Dr. Victor S. Villaroman Memorial Hospital and Isabela Doctors Hospital in Ilagan, the Isabela United Doctors Medical Center in Cauayan and the Southern Isabela Medical Center in Santiago. According to Ricci, "Hangga't mayroon puwedeng matulungan at hangga't mayroon akong maitutulong, tuloy tuloy lang po kami ng family ko sa pagbigay ng support. Wala pong maliit at malaki na tulong at this point, ang importante po ay yung magdamayan tayong lahat."



UST UNIVERSITY OF SANTO TOMAS

Coming off an outstanding season, Growling Tigers' rookie Mark Nonoy made an impact during during the early months of the coronavirus pandemic.

The La Carlota, Negros Occidental native, made possible the preparation and delivery of packed meals to the military and barangay officials in Barangay II (Poblacion) using funds pulled from family and friends, as well as his savings.

Mark shares, "Gusto ko lang po talagang makatulong sa kanila dahil sa sacrific-es nila para mapanatiling safe sa amin." He adds, "Napag-isipan po kasi naming wala naman kaming masyadong problema sa bahay pagdating sa pag-kain kaya napagisipan kong itulong na lang namin sa mga frontliners na nagsa-sakripisyo araw-araw para sa amin."

National University won back-to-back Men's Volleyball championship in UAAP Seasons 75 and 76.

In Season 77, however, their quest for a three-peat was stopped by Ateneo de Manila University.

Then in 2018 and 2019, the Bulldogs yet again won back-to-back-championships.

However in 2020, the Bulldogs were unable go for the elusive three-peat. This time it was not a team that prevented them from achieving their goal.

"Disappointed, siyempre, dahil nawala ulit sa amin yung chance for a three-peat," said head coach Dante Alinsunurin.

National U's quest for a three-peat was off to a strong start as it won its first two games.

COVID-19 blocked National U's shot at three straight championships right at the net.

Still, Ricky Marcos was there to pick up the pieces, passing the ball to Josh Retamar who then set up Nico Almendras for a kill.

Life goes on, the Bulldogs are still the Bulldogs - and in Season 84, they will go for a three-peat.

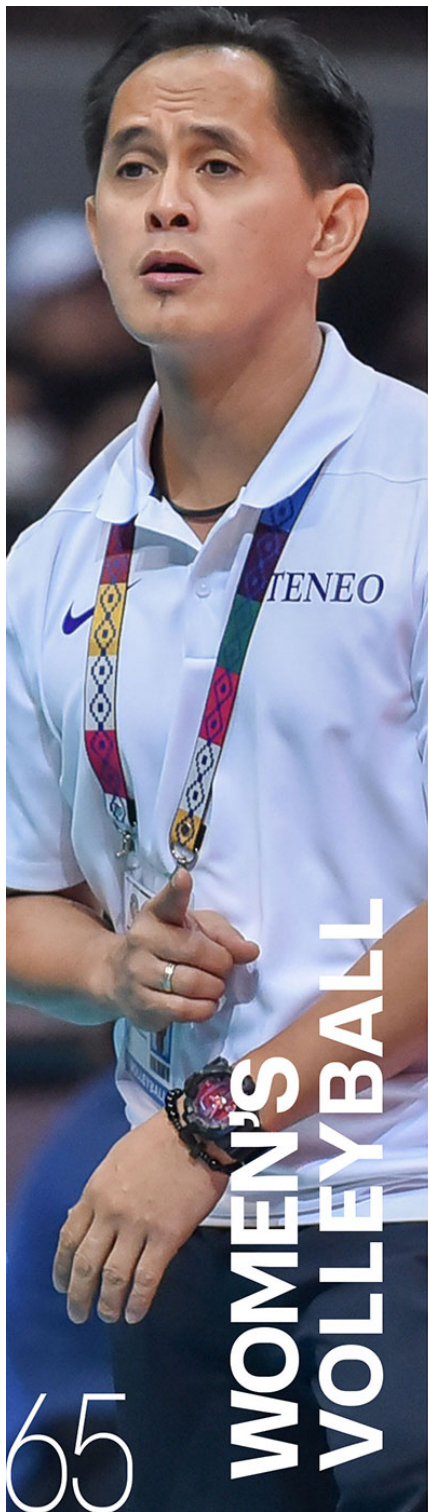

"Our focus is also in helping others in whatever way we can," he said. "Our focus is also on our faith. We never forget to pray that this pandemic shall pass. We ask our community, supporters, and fans to pray for us to have additional faith, wisdom, and strength to cope with the new normal."

Nobody knows what the future holds for the team—when exactly it would be able to defend its title, who would eventually make the team. What is certain is that, whenever the season resumes, the Lady Eagles will be prepared, ready to title.

WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL



At the end of UAAP Season 81, the UP Men's Track and Field team felt like they were on top of the world, and for good reason.

Led by fourth-year head coach and proud alumnus Rio Dela Cruz, the Maroons halted FEU's dominant run in the tournament and won their first men's title in 36 long years.

But just as the stage was set for a back-to-back title run, the team ran into multiple hurdles that they just could not clear. Whether it was due to bad timing or bad luck, UP's race back to the top just never got past the starting line.

"There are things that are beyond our control," Dela Cruz said. "Our regular UAAP schedule was moved to a later date due to SEA Games. Then, the Taal Volcano eruption happened just when everything was ready and set, and this affected our schedule. And now, COVID-19."

Nearly 16 months after they hoisted their historic title, Dela Cruz's boys faced the bitter reality that their title defense would not be happening after the UAAP canceled the rest of Season 82 for the safety of all its athletes.

However, instead of moping about the lost opportunity, Dela Cruz saw this as a window to tweak his coaching approach amid an unprecedented health crisis. "Because of the situation it's really hard to conduct regular training, but we managed to do online training to keep our athletes in shape," he said. "One of the challenges of online training is the wi-fi connection, so we created our training program and gave it to them on a weekly and monthly basis."

"What we are doing is for maintenance, strength and conditioning exercises," he continued. "It's really a challenge for some of our athletes to train because when they are at home, they also need to help their family. We have team members who are working during the pandemic, but they are trying their best not to skip daily workouts."

Although he is now confined to calling the shots behind a screen, Dela Cruz's endurance is still being tested just like his wards as he is currently dividing his time between online coaching and monitoring his children's online classes.

While the situation is obviously exhausting for coaches like Dela Cruz, he still squeezes out the extra energy to keep his athletes' morale high in the midst of all the uncertainties bogging down their minds.

According to Dela Cruz, "I always tell my athletes that our number one priority is to finish their education, and we are trying our best to help them by providing equipment and tools for their remote learning. Before I recruited them, they knew that education is the priority, so I know they are still positive because they can still study. We encourage them to find time to train as much as they can, but if it's too hard for them, then it's just okay. Once everything is back to normal we can start our regular training."

As the sporting world stands still while COVID-19 ravages unhindered, Dela Cruz is keeping a simple approach for his team's future: safety first, sports second.

"With all these things happening, our goal changed. The health and safety of our student-athletes became our priority," he said. "But as for coaching, my approach will be the same as before. My dedication and determination for the team will still be 100 percent. Our motivation is to defend our title because as you know, it's been a long time since our last championship, and we are holding to it as long as we can. But whatever will happen next, we will wholeheartedly accept it."

Not to mention the Morayta side parading nine veteran tracksters which only boosted Hamero's optimism for this year.

Joida Gagnao, who is the reigning UAAP Most Valuable Player and 2019 Southeast Asian Games silver medalist, bannered the seniors who were playing this year. Also among the veterans were Jelly Paragile, Mary Jane Lawas, Mary Jay Garcia, Kay Lene Mosqueda, Reynalyn

Aguirre, Joeneza Sustituedo, Maricar Silvestre, and Eliza Aguinaldo.

But FEU's bid for a back-to-back turned out to be a false start as COVID-19 prevented the starting pistol from ever getting fired. And now Silvestre and Aguinaldo will not be back for one last run for the Lady Tamaraws come Season 83.

"As a coach, malungkot ako para sa kanila at kung ano yung nararamdaman ng players, yun din nararamdaman ko. Ramdam ko yung sadness at disappointment kaso wala na sila magawa kasi parents na nila nagsabi," rued the 11-time champion mentor.

"Yan din naramdaman ko nung nag-champion kami at inannounce 'yung MVP, hindi nangyari nung tournament itself. Target namin is maramdaman 'yun this season kaso hindi na naman ulit nangyari dahil sa pandemic."

Hamero, however, believes that this test can only strengthen one's resolve. Moreover, the hunger of the Lady Tamaraws will not be satisfied until they can get back on the field.

"Yung naramdaman nila, gawin nilang motivation para sa Season 83. Yung feeling na maging champion sa araw ng awarding, yun ang gawin nilang way para makuha nila yung gusto nilang goal at makuha yung moment na nawala sa kanila."

After all, trophies and medals rust but memories live forever. That feeling that they believe was stolen from them is what drives the Lady Tamaraws to prepare harder than ever for next season.

WOMEN'S TRACK AND FIELD



UAAP Season 82 was supposed to be a restart campaign of sorts for Ateneo de Manila University and head coach Jaypee Merida.

Coming off a stellar title run in Season 81, the team was raring to fill a sizable hole amid their ranks following the departure of UAAP MVP and national team forward Jarvey Gayoso.

However, after a hot start in their first two games for the new season, their title defense was abruptly paused and ultimately stopped by the worldwide scourge of COVID-19. Left without a star and a chance to prove their mettle without him, Merida is now left to wonder what could have been.

“Actually, going to Season 82, we’re very excited talaga especially for me kasi it’s a time na after si Gayoso mag-decide, nakita ko yung team na nag-step up at kailangan talaga nilang mag-step up,” he said. “Nakita ko nga na nag-step up lahat, at kailangan nilang gawin because they have an objective at meron silang role na kailangan nilang gawin sa incoming season.”

Prior to Season 82, the team had already been hard at work in their quest to defend their crown at the turn of the new decade. After the first semester, the team flew to Iloilo for some friendlies before heading back to Ateneo for an intensive 10-day camp. “Pag kinakausap ko sila, talagang excited sila kasi parang na-feel nila na gusto nilang i-prove ulit kahit may players na nawala, namo-motivate sila na kailangan nilang mag-trabaho,” Merida said of his wards.

Sure enough, Ateneo translated their fire to production on the field after thrashing UST, 6-1, in their second, and, ultimately, final game.

Understandably, Merida lamented at the lost opportunities that his team could have had if not for the pandemic. “Naging sayang lang kasi andun na tapos maganda na supposedly yung start namin. Di nawalan ng motivation yung players. Na-realize nila na kaya nilang i-defend yung crown,” he said. “Medyo sad lang talaga. Ayun na eh, pwede na sana ma-prove na kahit kulang kami ng ibang players.”

Nevertheless, Merida is still looking forward to Season 83, which will reportedly start in the first quarter of 2021. Despite not being able to train nor play outdoors, the team is doing everything it can to stay in tiptop shape for another shot at the title. “Nag-online training kami, so may dalawa kaming ginagawa, yung strength training at yung technicals, para di rin mawala,” he said.

Although he admitted that the pandemic is changing the way he deals with the team, Merida is taking the challenge head-on, as any defending champion would. “Ang kailangan lang muna naming gawin ngayon sa year na to ay i-motivate yung players namin na there’s hope na babalik at babalik ang UAAP at training. Masyadong mahirap siya, pero kailangan naming ipakita sa team na motivated kami para sa UAAP.”

“What can we do?”

Not even legendary head coach Hans-Peter Smit had the answers as he watched his title defense campaign for the La Salle Lady Booters get derailed by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Just as the three-time defending champions were gearing up for their quest for a rare women’s football four-peat back in March, the UAAP suspended Season 82 and all its ongoing and upcoming tournaments.

In a snap, the beautiful game became a waiting one for Smit, who has been at the helm of the school’s football program for nearly four decades and has amassed a league-best 11 titles in the women’s division.

“Well, we can’t do anything about it. It’s something that nobody can do anything about,” he said. “The four-peat, if for example, we get it next year, Season 83, I still consider that a four-peat. But that’s not important to me. Three-peat, four-peat, what have you. That’s just a bonus. Doesn’t make a difference now.”

Prior to Season 82, the Lady Booters again made headlines after they captured their third-straight title in the Philippine Football Federation women’s league, which made Smit excited to see what more his girls can do. “We got the third-straight championship. That’s a good sign considering we are parading about 15 rookies,” he said. “With that many rookies and still being able to get the championship again for the women’s league says a lot already about the team.” But all that preparation was soon put to waste, no thanks to COVID-19.

As a testament to his unwavering dedication to his craft, Smit expressed his disappointment that he can no longer train nor even see his team until the health crisis eases up. “A pandemic is something else. It’s too major. It’s not that easy to fix.

Of course, I was hoping for the best, but I knew in my mind and heart that this year was out of the question, he said. “All we can do is talk about it, but we can’t do anything more. Online, we can only do so much. We lost about 50% of what we can do in a normal scenario. Tacticals are out of the question.”

As the sporting world now comes to terms with the sweeping changes necessary for safety and survival, Smit is now hard at work in ensuring that all his players are still given the best treatment under his watch. “The best thing there is just to keep them active and to show them that we’re still here no matter what. That La Salle is still around for the athletes,” he said.

“That’s why in the Office of Sports Development, we have a program with our psychologists for those kids who need a little talk to. People need to be monitored emotionally. Physical, that’s the easiest part. The emotional and mental state, that’s the difficult part, how to keep the kids in part with the program.”

By now, it’s no wonder why the Lady Booters are the most successful team in UAAP women’s football today. Not only are the players talented on their own, but their coach also makes it a point to leave no player behind, especially in these uniquely trying times.

“I lean on all of them. I never single out one player, especially with the women’s team. The women’s team has been very, very receptive ever since,” Smit said. “They go as a team, they talk as a team, they work as a team. When you do that, you go as a family.”

"It's hard to conduct trainings online for both baseball and softball. Our trainings require a big field for us to execute our drills," said Orillana.

Left without any choice, La Salle's back-to-back drive will have to wait for the new season.

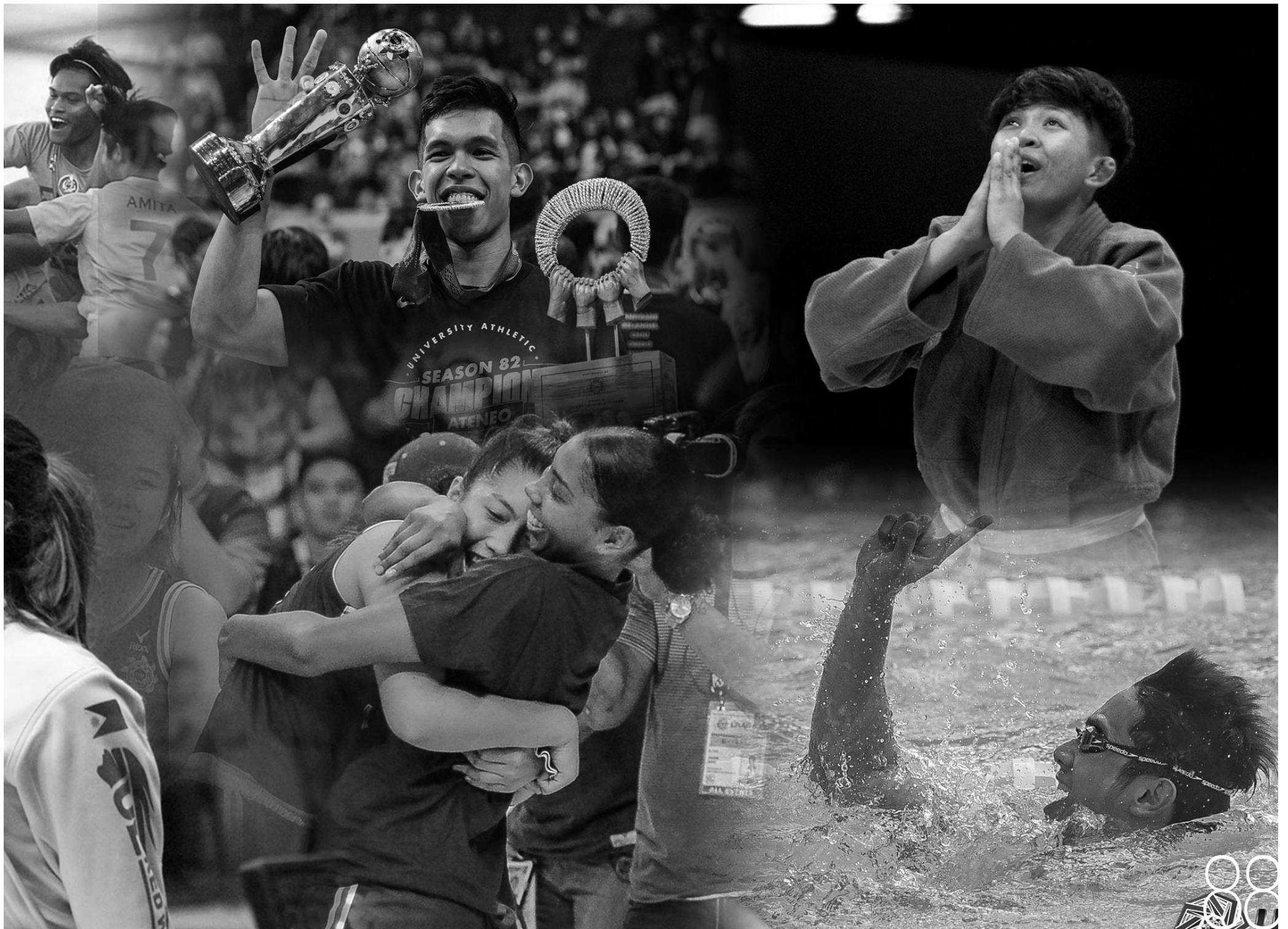

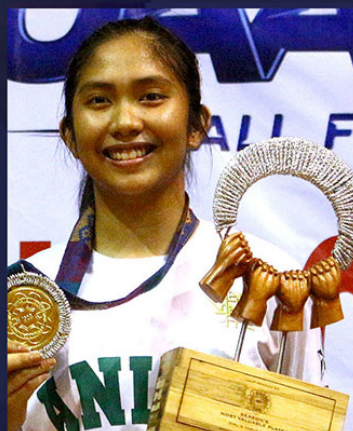

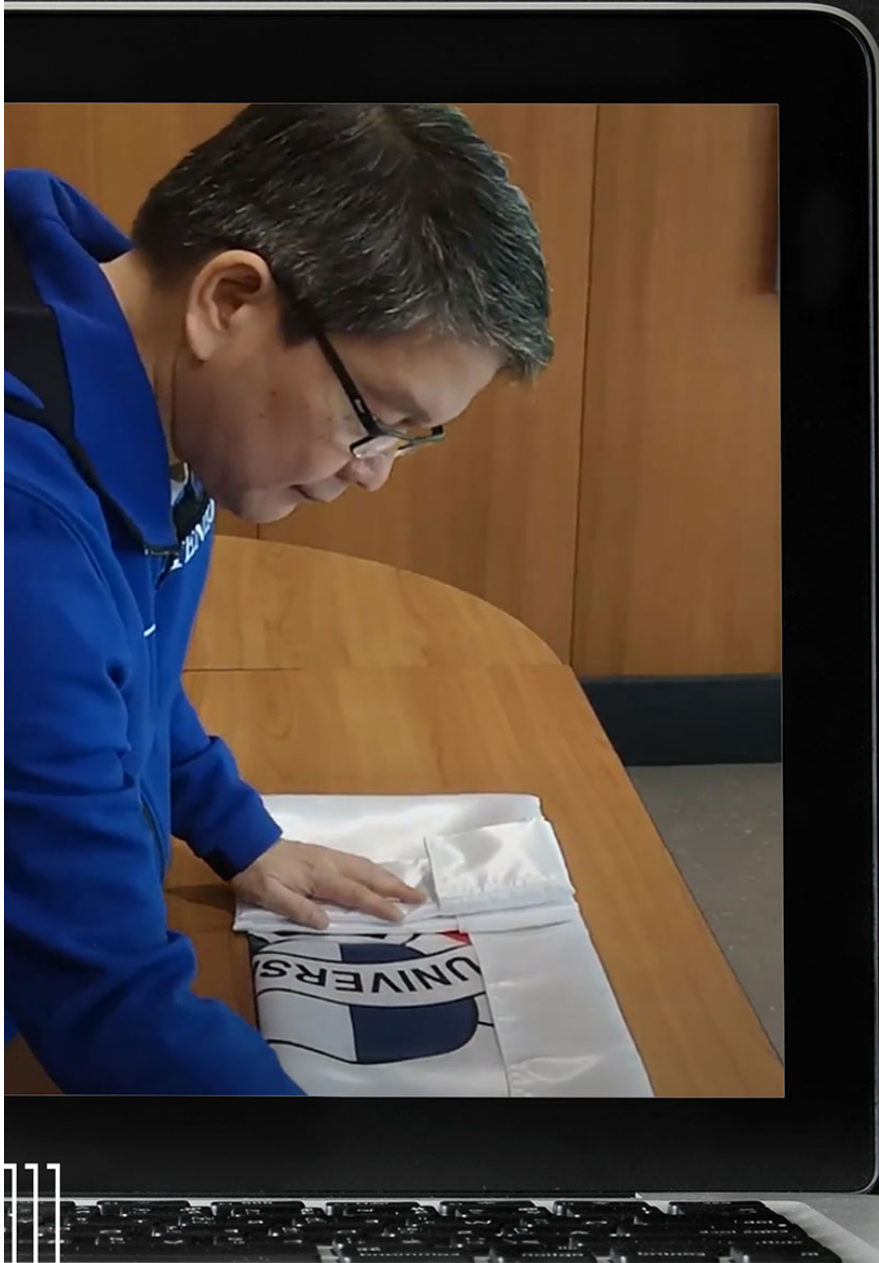

The closing ceremony of the country's premiere collegiate league was held in a special online event last July 25 on the ASB-CBN Sports website, Facebook, and Youtube accounts.

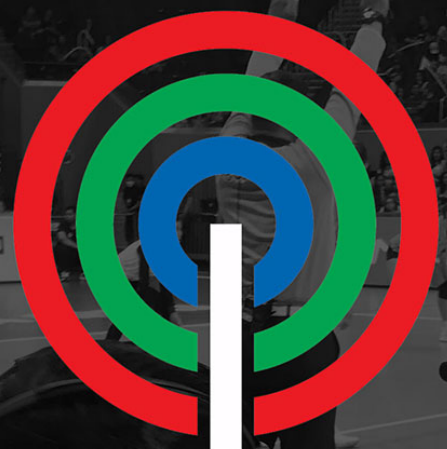

Season 82 Most Valuable Players as well as Athlete-Scholars from each school were also feted at the online ceremony. The UAAP also recognized the efforts of the member schools and athletes who have done charity work during the pandemic.

Filipino rock bands SpongeCola and The Itchyworms gave a special rendition of the official UAAP theme song "Ang Ating Tagumpay." ABS-CBN artists Ylona Garcia and Inigo Pascual opened the ceremony.

To formally end Season 82, a virtual turnover happened with Fr. Jett Villarin, S.J. handing over the hosting duties to Bro. Ray Suplido FSC. The Season 83 chairman also announced that the theme for the following season is "Fully Alive, Champions for Life".

The closing ceremony also served as a farewell to the partnership of the UAAP and ABS-CBN Sports for the past 20 years. The Kapamilya network has been the official broadcaster of the league since 2000. Together they have championed sports among the Filipino youth, showcasing many young, talented athletes and strengthening the local sports community in the past 2 decades.

Consistent with the theme #AllForMore, Season 82 saw unprecedented growth and achieved several milestones in so short a time all of which could not have been possible without our partner for 20 years

The “compressed” Basketball Season was designed primarily to give way to the national interest, i.e., the hosting of the SEAGames but because of the close consultation with our Broadcast Partner, it paved the way for a fast-paced format which added a twist to the already exciting games and which is now considered a blueprint or an option in Seasons to come.

#AllForMore also meant more exposure to other events and hence, saw the televised Women’s Ateneo-La Salle Basketball game. From the traditional single press conference to start the season, we had 3 last year. And riding on the momentum of the SEA Games success of the Men’s National Volleyball Team, the Hosts again worked closely with their partner, their kapamilya to come up with a schedule to give exposure where it is due.

From televising a single event, the UAAP’s present reach and influence is undeniable – slight ripples send shockwaves and dominate social media where wars are now fought. The public now has a sense of ownership over the Association and for better or for worse is a powerful platform in itself.

This is in no small part due to the collaboration with ABSCBN, our partner of 20 years and whom we have grown with. But, even as we bid goodbye for now, we are not necessarily dismayed, because if we may paraphrase Richard Bach, a farewell is necessary before meeting again again. And meeting again is certain for those who are family.
