The Economic Impact of Creativity and the Arts.

I

n our 21st-century world, few people can deny the importance and viability of the arts. Besides being an important tool for creative expression, art has a major economic impact on our communities, the nation and the world

In 2020, arts and cultural economic activity contributed \$876.7 billion to the gross domestic product (GDP) of the United States. This includes visual and performing arts, museums, design services, and fine arts education. Of course, the COVID-19 pandemic had a significant impact on the industry, as the previous year's figure amounted to \$919.7 billion.

It's estimated that the creative industry pays out over \$446 billion in wages to a workforce of over 4.5 million creatives.

The Arts Help to Fuel Productivity. There is no productivity without rest and leisure. Unlike machines, humans need to take regular breaks to recharge. Without breaks, the quality of our work diminishes and we'll eventually burn out. By engaging with the arts during our downtime, we become more efficient in our working hours. Collectively, this leads to a more productive workforce on a large scale. If you're like most people, you probably enjoy consuming some form of art during your leisure time:

Listening to music | Watching movies and TV shows Reading books | Playing video games | Visiting a museum or gallery

Besides being consumers of art, having a creative hobby is extremely beneficial for your productivity. Activities like playing an instrument, knitting, crocheting and coloring have been shown to increase brain function and improve memory. Even if we aren't actively creating or consuming art, our productivity is boosted simply by existing in a more artsy environment. Many studies show that a bright, creative workspace can increase employee engagement and efficiency. Many professionals hang works of art in their office for this reason. Others listen to music while working to help them to get into a state of flow where they can perform at their best.

A 2018 UNWTO survey showed that overall growth in tourism was much larger for countries that highlighted cultural tourism in their marketing policy than for countries that did not Earning Tourism Dollars. The United Nations World Tourism Organization (UNWTO) defines cultural tourism as "movements of persons for essentially cultural motivations such as study tours, performing arts and cultural tours, travel to festivals and other cultural events, visits to sites and monuments, travel to study



tours, performing arts and cultural tours, travel to festivals and other cultural events, visits to sites and monuments, travel to study nature, folklore or art, and pilgrimages." A 2018 UNWTO survey showed that overall growth in tourism was much larger for countries that highlighted cultural tourism in their marketing policy than for countries that did not (66% to 17%).

Besides the natural features of the environment (such as beaches, ski slopes, etc.), art is a major determining factor for tourists. People will travel thousands of miles to visit a gallery, or to take a photo in front of a famous sculpture or mural. While they're visiting, they're undoubtedly spending money with local businesses.

Art Can Positively Impact Property Values. Recent research suggests that the mere presence of street art in your neighborhood can add thousands to the market value of your property. In the United Kingdom, one study showed that Brits would be willing to shell out an additional £8,549 to live in an area with colorful murals or other forms of street art.

Though once seen as acts of vandalism, attitudes towards street art have become mostly positive within the last two decades, in part due to prominent artists like Banksy. In the U.K., his artwork has been known to double the value of the properties they're drawn on, as was the case with a run-down pub in Liverpool. Similarly, in the U.S., we've seen significant

property value increases due to street art in neighborhoods like Wynwood in Miami and Chelsea in New York. In Chelsea, for example, a building's value increased by over 135% thanks to a mural painted by Brazilian street artist, Eduardo Kobra. Besides adding economic value to a neighborhood, street art plays an important role in fostering a sense of community. Simply put, art makes your daily commute more pleasant and makes your neighborhood a nicer place to live. Neighborhoods with an abundance of street art are typically perceived to be more trendy, which can help boost development. While this can be a positive thing, we must be mindful of the negative implications of gentrification and safeguard against them. Enjoying Art for Its Own Sake. In a world driven by capitalism, we often use economic factors to justify the choices we make. Although the creative industry is a multibillion dollar one, it's important to remember that we can enjoy art simply because it makes us feel good. Art is a reflection of society and culture. It's a unifying and beautifying force that we can use to celebrate the good times and get through the difficult times.



Celebrated. Appreciated. Enthroned. Nina Simone is By No Means Forgotten

ina Simone. Her brilliance is still being observed, appreciated, and celebrated. Enthroned "The High Priestess of Soul", Nina Simone was actually much more.

Prolific Artist. Rolling Stone magazine named Nina Simone one of the 100 Greatest Singers of All Time. She recorded nearly forty albums between 1958 and 1973 in a wide range of styles.

Simone was a singer, composer, songwriter, pianist, and human rights activist.

Waymon Becomes Simone. Born Eunice Waymon on February 25, 1933 in Tryon, North Carolina the story goes that she cleverly changed her name to Nina Simone to hide her musical pursuits and club outings from her mom.

Her mastery of multiple genres grew as she matured. You will find folk, gospel, jazz, cabaret, classical, and other streams in her music.

Simone The Activist. It is well known that Nina performed "songs of love, protest, and Black empowerment." The iconic protest song "Mississippi Goddam" was released in 1964, in reaction to the bombing of the Sixteenth Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Alabama and the assassination of civil rights leader Medgar Evers, both in 1963. The song expressed her frustration with the slow pace of change in response to the efforts of the Civil Rights Movement."

Escaping USA Racism. Simone is one of many African Origin artists who left the United States to escape racism. In the early 70's she fled to Barbados. Domestic abuse was a major factor to her flight. Eventually she went to Monrovia, Liberia and then France. She famously referred to America as the "United Snakes of America". Simone wrote about going to Africa in her memoir stating, "Maybe I could find some peace there, or a husband. Maybe it would be like going home." In the documentary, What Happened, Miss Simone?, Nina stated "I toiled for so long in that place, in that prison. And now I'm home, now I'm free." An Extraordinary Life. Nina Simone had an extraordinary life and impact on music and culture in the USA as well as abroad. She was masterful. Influential. Determined. A powerful, empowered and competent performer. Despite her addictions, mental health issues, and being stripped of her livelihood because of her global advocacy for African people, today she is as popular as ever.






