Dear NFSPS Poets,



Spring has arrived, bringing with it the warmth of the sun and the vibrant bloom of spring flowers. I'm excited to invite you all to join us at the NFSPS Annual Convention and BlackBerry Peach SLAM in Albuquerque, New Mexico-

more details about this exciting event can be found in this issue.

As we embrace the season of renewal, let's also take a moment to remember our responsibility to manage our finances. This is the time of year to review our financial standing, plan for paying taxes, and ensure we have a strategy in place to meet our financial obligations now and in the future.

NFSPS has survived over the past 66 years by balancing revenues and expenditures and keeping a reserve for rainy days. Let's spend some time now reviewing where we stand as an organization from a fiscal point of view.

According to our Treasurer, Linda Harris, we need to make some changes to increase revenues or cut back on our expenses if NFSPS is to be around for another 66 years. Last year, we spent more than we took in, to the tune of minus about \$10,000. Although we have reserves, we cannot survive if we continue to lose money at that level.

We now have a Finance Committee, chaired by Steven Concert, our 1st Vice President, and consisting of NFSPS past Presidents, Susan Chambers, Paul Ford, Julie Cummings, our Treasurer Linda Harris, and myself. We have been meeting monthly to draft an annual balanced budget for NFSPS, and to adopt policies that protect our financial resources for now and into the future.

It is apparent that we are going to have to make some changes if we want to balance our budget. There are a number of areas that we are considering and I welcome your thoughts on how best to proceed. The first and most obvious thing we need to do is adopt an annual budget that balances revenues and expenditures.

On the revenue side, there are several ways we could increase revenues. We could raise the amount our State Chapters pay to NFSPS for annual dues, currently set at \$3 per member. If the dues were raised to \$5 per member with approximately 3,500 members, we would see an annual increase in revenue of about \$7,000, which would be a big help.

Another approach would be to increase the number of States that are members of NFSPS. We currently have 35 states as members. If we increase that number to 40 States, we would be well on our way to a balanced budget. Russell Strauss and Susann Moeller are working on increasing the number of member States, targeting the Carolinas, Alaska, and Hawaii.

Another way to increase revenue would be to raise the entry fees for the 55 annual contests. The demanding workload for administering these contests has required hiring a paid coordinator at \$500 per month, a new and additional expense beginning this fiscal year. We will need to look carefully at our contest procedures to see if we can afford to continue to maintain the current contest structure.

At this point, there is no desire to cut our existing programs. My personal approach would be to increase revenues to balance our budget. 2024 BARBARA STEVENS AWARD GOES TO POET FROM MUMBAI

2024 was the 30th year of NFSPS poetry book manuscript competition. Named for the late Barbara Stevens, a past NFSPS president who made a substantial bequest to ensure its financial viability, it has enabled the publication of 30 emerging poets' words, selected by as many distinguished poets serving as guest judges.



In 2024 the guest judge for the Barbara Stevens Competition was Diane Seuss, author of *Modern Poetry* (2024), a finalist for the 2024 National Book Award for Poetry; *frank: sonnets* (2021), winner of the Pulitzer Prize and the National Book Critics Circle Award; and four earlier collections of poems. Her selection was a first for the competition: a manuscript by an overseas poet. The winning manuscript, to be published by NFSPS Press this June, is *They Gather Around Me, the Animals*, by Kunjana Parashar, a young poet from Mumbai. It will be her first book.

Reading and re-reading Parashar's manuscript, I found myself deep in a world of fellow creatures both familiar and strange, a world conjured by richly textured language. In poem after poem, Parashar's language drew me into rapturous celebration of animals, and, in a stark series mostly of prose poems, gave me a devastating vision of life without them.

The opening poem, "Dedication," reveals at once this poet's love for a teeming natural world. It begins,

To pollen. To gadfly. Beetle of red. Green crown of leaf. To strawberries. And mulch. Squelchy soles of boots. To bogs. To the ancients who live in them. The exuberant litany continues through another ten packed lines. Another poem, "Invocation," summons wild creatures of the night, "the hour of slow loris," as in this passage:

Awake, cricket. Awake, cereus. Bear and honey badger, awake. Mark the air with your solitary cry, o wolf, hyena, purple frog. It is your hour....

As the presence of animal and plant life is richly invoked in such lines, its absence is starkly envisioned in a series of prose poems titled "Poem with No ... in It." Diane Seuss, in her comment on Parashar's manuscript, praises how, through watching and listening to "the actual world," the poems' speaker knows "That in the absence of birds, '[w]e break our binoculars in grief.' That in the absence of howls, in a poem without dogs, 'we lost our vowel sounds.' How the lyric itself, the music of our consonants and vowels, is contingent upon the voices of animals."

I asked Kunjana Parashar what experiences had shaped her poetry. In response, she described her trips to Sanjay Gandhi National Park, "where I have sat by the Dahisar River watching kingfishers, have gone up the rock-stairs of Kanheri Caves, and have spotted many a coucal, peacock, drongo, and sunbird." These experiences, she explained, were vital in forming her love for the natural world. It is through their language and prosody that the poems in *They Gather Around Me, the Animals* convey Parashar's love for the natural world. Diane Seuss notes that they are "written in a diction which opens the lexicon to the language of the ecological imagination." When I asked Parashar about her passions, she responded, "A passion much older than reading or writing poetry is listening to music." And she described her process of writing as "hammering away at a poem with my ear, trying to listen to and build upon the music of the line."

From her dual attentiveness—both to the natural world in all its abundance and peril and to the medium of language and line—comes the power of Parashar's poetry.

They Gather Around Me, the Animals will be available this summer at the NFSPS Convention in Albuquerque, as well as online and in bookstores worldwide. ~ Eleanor Berry, Stevens Award Chair

FELLOWSHIPS HELP WITH COSTS OF ATTENDING CONVENTION

NFSPS Conventions are a wonderful opportunity to connect with poets from all over the country, and attending in person provides a far richer experience than Zoom. Informal conversations, unscheduled get-togethers to share poems, one-on-one chats with presenters—these and many other rewarding encounters are only possible at the in-person gathering. However, the travel and hotel costs can be challenging or prohibitive. That barrier to attendance is what Convention Attendance Fellowships are intended to overcome. Instituted during the 2014-2016 Board term, they have been offered every year since, except for 2020, when the Convention was canceled because of the COVID pandemic, and 2021, when it was entirely virtual. They are funded by the NFSPS portion of profits, if any, from the prior year's Convention, plus what can be prudently drawn from the General Fund.

Although they can't cover full costs for anyone, they can supplement travel budgets by a few hundred dollars. If such a supplement might enable you to attend the 2025 Convention in person, do consider applying for a fellowship. The more members that attend, the more valuable the Convention can be for everyone.

All members of affiliated state societies are eligible to apply EXCEPT those who received fellowships for the past two consecutive years. The deadline for applying is May 18. IN MEMORIUM

NFSPS is deeply saddened to announce the passing of Billy Pennington and Valerie Martin Bailey. Billy was a dedicated member of the Poetry Society of Oklahoma and a long-time NFSPS Webmaster. He and his wife, Mikki, who passed away before him, played crucial behind-the-scenes roles in the success of NFSPS. Valerie was a longstanding member of the Poetry Society of Texas. As the Encore Editor before 2016 and an elected board member, she was also an essential part of NFSPS's achievements. They will both be profoundly missed.

CUPDATE! COLLEGE UNDERGRADUATE POETRY COMPETITION WINNERS

This year's CUP Competition had 35 submissions from 24 colleges and universities in 18 states, our largest and most diverse group of entries in recent years.

Our winners are *Confessional* by Azula Margaret Dubbs Jaggar from Lewis and Clark College in Portland, Oregon, and *Girlish* by Kimberlyn Vasil from Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana.

This year's judge, Anthony Robinson, said of the winners:

"Girlish is a dervish of youthful energy, exhilarating and foreboding at once. These are poems of a studied, frantic life so far lived and an atlas of tomorrow. They wrestle with angels, the urban landscape, and fraught personal history. Somewhere in here are insects and trains and sad guitars and television static and an ever-present many-personed God. Vasil traces a linguistic wonderland of a particular sort of Alice from birth to adolescence to tentative adulthood, playing out in scarred and barred landscapes, inventive formally and imagistically. Girlish has fangs! There is such strangeness and tenderness and mystery here as well. Girlish, at last, is a journey of discovery for the speaker of these words and the auditor of these poems: I'm doubly and gleefully glad to discover this new poet."

"Part ekphrastic exorcism and transformation, part unfinished love story, part personal exegesis, *Confessional* combines high mimesis and trenchant commentary in taut, spare lines teeming with evocative language and razored imagery. From a retelling of the akedah—the binding of Isaac—to the consideration of the poems of Frank O'Hara, this confessional is a museum of its own, giving life through art that informs and helps to create the human many-ribbed life of the speaker. Made of mythology, fine art, and contemporary life, Azula Margaret Dubbs Jaggar's words sing of quiet possibility in the wake of a (possibly?) lost love and a crisis of faith. They both reflect on the recent past and forge a path into a limitless future, brimming with a mature confidence that's rare to find in a young poet. Here's to more."

The SUNFLOWER POETRY SOCIETY OF KANSAS continues its commitment to making poetry accessible to all, poetry education and community outreach.

Combining visual art and poetry, members of SPSK participated in Arts on Fire (an annual fundraising event for The Interurban

Arthouse in Overland Park, Kansas). Artists and poets donate works to be sold during the event. These monies provide vital programming for the season and support a space that nurtures and encourages creativity from marginalized populations. This event has served as a wonderful way to build community and share poetry for a good cause.

We hold monthly workshops as part of The Sunflower Poets' Roundtable series. SPSK workshops are a safe space for poetic expression. We have members of varying skill levels. Constructive criticism is key. Our workshops aim to nurture creative expression and elevate the importance of embracing your poetic voice. Works in progress are encouraged. Honing one's craft can be a difficult journey and input from community is vital in that pursuit. It is also important to provide an embracing space for exploration, errors, challenging themes, conflicting ideologies, etc. All participants are encouraged to provide respectful and constructive feedback that will improve the quality of the poem and assist the poet in achieving their goal. In the first quarter of 2025, the workshops have centered on themes mirrored in the Poets for Peace Anthology by utilizing visual and poetic prompts to inspire poetry as well as submissions for the anthology. Some participating poets presented poems for feedback that were submitted to the anthology.

SPSK serves as a fiscal agent for The Poets for Peace Anthology Sunflowers Rising. In that spirit, M. Palowski Moore has financed a social media/promotional campaign via his Silver Lion Facebook page to encourage international submissions as well as increased awareness in North America. Additionally, he has contacted The Gloucestershire Poetry Society (UK) to assist with these efforts.

Vice-president Ana Wilkins has proven to be a dedicated outreach advocate. She has promoted SPSK and NFSPS during many speaking engagements throughout Kansas. Highlights of her efforts were observed as a participant during the African American Read-In event at the Topeka Shawnee County Public Library, as a judge/ spoken word presenter for The Living The Dream Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Student Poetry contest and as a featured author for Local Author Fair at Barnes and Noble Topeka.

We have launched our 2nd annual Voice of Tomorrow competition. All students currently enrolled in a public Kansas high school who identify as BIPOC (black, indigenous, people of color) are eligible. There is no entrance fee. Prizes are: 1st place \$100, 2nd place \$75, 3rd place \$50, and three poems will be selected as honorable mention and each poet will be awarded \$25. Each award recipient will receive an annual membership in The Sunflower Poetry Society of Kansas (a value of 25 dollars).

It is with a heavy heart that the Sunflower Poetry Society of Kansas (SPSK) announces the passing of founding member Ronda Jae Miller. A dedicated poet and educator, Ronda actively participated in poetry events across Kansas and authored five published books. She taught creative writing to incarcerated individuals, promoting catharsis through expression. Ronda was instrumental in shaping our group during its early years. A member of the Press' Review Board will send a link to a google doc that details the questions you will be required to answer on the form when you submit your manuscript.

When a manuscript is accepted by the 3-member League of Minnesota Poets Press Review Board, a \$25 consultation fee will be charged as a clear and affordable path to self-publication is laid out

for the poet. The fee is only charged after the manuscript is accepted and the publication agreement is signed. At that time, an ISBN will be assigned, and the publication plan can be executed. This opportunity is available to all members of the League of Minnesota Poets.

The conference featured keynote addresses by renowned slam poet Marcus Lattimore and esteemed poet and educator Annie Lighthart. Poetry workshops were conducted by Tiel Ansari, Dale Champlin, Lisa Kagan, Renée Roman Nose, Eva Sheehan, Colette Tennant, Emmett Wheatfall, and Nicole Zdeb. The open-mic session included a special reading by the recently appointed Oregon Poet Laureate, Ellen Waterston. Emmett Wheatfall was honored with the Patricia Ruth Banta Award, which recognizes an individual or group that has made a substantial contribution to Oregon poetry and the OPA's mission.

In October 2024, the newly elected board members Ty Brack, Amelia Díaz Ettinger, Julia Gaskill, Dr. Isabel Jaén Portillo, and Steve Slemenda joined the existing board members Aaron Erhardt (Treasurer), David Goodrum, Sharon Johnson, and Bob Sterry (outgoing president). The board subsequently appointed David Goodrum as its new president and Steve Slemenda as Secretary.

The Mid-Valley Poetry Society (a unit of OPA) received on February 25th a grant from the Marion Cultural Development Corporation in Oregon to support MVPS Poetry in Performance events ("Native American Traditions," "Spoken Word Traditions," and "Dead Poets Return," the first two with associated workshops) and the MVPS's outdoor poetry box located in Pasture Park at the Bush Barn Art Center in Salem, Oregon.

In early 2025, the OPA board established several key activities for the upcoming year: the 25th *Cascadia* Youth Poetry Contest and its accompanying anthology, publication of the 29th *Verseweavers* anthology featuring winning verse from 2024 contests, and conducting the 2025 Spanish Poetry Contest, an April National Poetry Month contest exclusively for OPA members, and the multi-category Summer/Fall Contest for both members and nonmembers. The board also voted again this year to help support sending the *Slamlandia* Grand Slam poet winner to the national competition in New Mexico this summer. Lastly, The annual conference will be held once again on the Oregon coast in early October 2025 with the theme "Waves of Peace."

OKLAHOMA POETRY ASSOCIATION: In 1934, Zoe A. Tilghman put out a call to the poets of Oklahoma with the goal of organizing the Oklahoma Poetry Society. The goal of the group was "promotion of interest and the recognition of Oklahoma Writers." Tilghman's first love in the literary world was poetry. She wrote poetry through every phase of her life. Tilghman was effective in accomplishing her goal in creating this society. She was able to encourage beginning writers as well as promote and secure recognition for Oklahoma poets who had been in the literary world for years. Throughout her life the one constant was poetry. The Oklahoma Poetry Society allowed Tilghman to share her love of poetry with the whole state as well. The distinguished members of the Poetry Society of Oklahoma have defined themselves as masters of words, and the poems in our anthology, <u>Answering the Call</u> are like jewels flashing their light, and hearts shall stir and pulses quicken. Each poem lingers long and vivid as one hesitates to turn the page, albeit anxious to savor yet another.

NFSPS ENCHANTING WORDS SPEAKER BIOS



NAOMI SHIHAB NYE describes herself as a "wandering poet." She has spent more than 40 years traveling the country and the world to lead writing workshops and inspiring students of all ages. Nye was born to a Palestinian father and an American mother and grew up in St. Louis, Jerusalem, and San Antonio. Drawing on her Palestinian-American heritage, the cultural diversity of

her home in Texas, and her experiences traveling in Asia, Europe, Canada, Mexico, and the Middle East, Nye uses her writing to attest to our shared humanity.

Naomi Shihab Nye is the author and/or editor of more than 30 volumes. Her books of poetry for adults and children include 19 Varieties of Gazelle: Poems of the Middle East (a finalist for the National Book Award), A Maze Me: Poems for Girls, Red Suitcase, Words Under the Words, Fuel, Transfer, You & Yours (a best-selling poetry book of 2006), Mint Snowball, Voices in the Air: Poems for Listeners, Come with Me: Poems for a Journey, Honeybee (awarded the 2008 Arab American Book Award in the Children's/Young Adult category), The Tiny Journalist (Best Poetry Book from both the Texas Institute of Letters and the Writers League of Texas), Cast Away: Poems for Our Time (one of the Washington Post's best children's books of 2020), and Everything Comes Next: Collected

and New Poems. Her new poetry book for children is Grace Notes: Poems about Families (Greenwillow, May 7, 2024). Kirkus gave it a star and called it "Beautifully written poetry about the butterfly effect of human experience."

Nye was affiliated with The Michener Center for writers at the University of Texas at Austin for 20 years and was also poetry editor at The Texas Observer for 20 years. In 2019-2020 she was the editor for New York Times Magazine poems. She is Chancellor Emeritus for the Academy of American Poets and is Professor of Creative Writing - Poetry at Texas State University.



LAUREN CAMP serves as New Mexico Poet Laureate. She is the author of eight poetry collections, most recently *In Old Sky* (Grand Canyon Conservancy, 2024), which grew out of her experience as Astronomer-in-Residence at Grand Canyon National Park. Camp has received fellowships from the Academy of

American Poets and Black Earth Institute, as well as the Dorset Prize and finalist citations for the Arab American Book Award, Housatonic Book Award, Big Other Book Award, and Adrienne Rich Award. Her poems appear in *Kenyon Review*, *Poem-a-Day*, *The Rumpus* and many other journals in the U.S. and abroad, and have been translated into Mandarin, Turkish, Spanish, French, and Arabic. He was formerly president of Just Poets in Rochester, NY; a board member of BOA Editions; and chief organizer of the Black Mountain North Symposium. Along with editing the 5-volume *Poets Speak* series and other anthologies (e.g., *Mo' Joe*), he has published his own

poetry, including *On Conesus*, *Topicalities*, *Road Ghosts*, *The Joe Poems: The Continuing Saga of Joe the Poet*, and *Joe Rides Again: Further Adventures of Joe the Poet*. His most recent book, *Tubbables*, delights in word play.



SETH Author, poet, musician and actor, SETH has carved his career experimenting with creative ways to present poetry. His mission: to make poetry more entertaining and thus more accessible to general audiences. One of the Rocky Mtn Region's best known performance poets, from 1989-2000 SETH was a member of **Open Rangers**, a network of poets,

actors, musicians, dancers, and other performance artists. From 1993-2004, he performed with critically-acclaimed performance art trio **Jafrika**, combining original music, poetry & dance. From 2000-2024 SETH headed **Art Compost & the Word Mechanics**, an elastic ensemble of improvisational musicians inviting poets and spoken word artists to join their weekly jam of music and spoken word. SETH is author of the poetry collection **A Black Odyssey**, available in print and audiobook, and an award-winning satirical novel, The Perfect Stranger. Learn more at https://www.wagingart.com.

SAMPLE OF WORKSHOP DESCRIPTIONS

RAINBOW WELCOME! YOU'RE SAFE HERE: Poets can be misfits just by being poets. But when we come together in poets-only spaces, we have an instant bond. Some of us have additional identities that can set us apart. As poets, we know that embracing those differences draws us closer—and expands us all. That's why the National Federation of State Poetry Societies recently adopted a non-discrimination policy. What exactly *is* the policy? What are the benefits of adopting it at the state level? What does it mean to be welcoming? How do we let poets know they are welcome? Get answers to these and more questions in a safe and welcoming space. You're also invited to submit your own questions for us to consider discussing in the 2nd hour.

THE VILLANELLE: MUSICALITY OF RHYME AND REPEATED LINES: What do peasant dance songs and poems of the Renaissance have in common with page and stage poets in this day and age? How can rhyme and repetition, which helped troubadours remember lines centuries ago, inspire poets and speak to audiences today? Echoes, reciting mantras, the marriage of repetition and surprise. Villanelles are 19-line poems containing two repeated lines and associated rhymes. We will read examples of villanelles from different eras; diagram these poems to understand the form; and, once we know the rules, talk about how to break them. We will then start drafting our own villanelles.

SESTINA SAMPLER WITH JULES NYQUIST: Let's have fun with the sestina, a poem of six stanzas with six lines each and repeating teleutons (end words). Discover magic—even obsession—with the sestina and its many variations! We'll use some writing exercises out of Jules' renowned Sestina Playbook, an innovative tool that is many things: poetry collection and workbook, reference and map. It wraps up Jules' Sestina class (which she has taught for over two decades) into a neat, fun package for play. You may even find yourself in a labyrinth! During class, you will start the first stanza; and may even complete an entire poem.

PUNCTUATE YOUR POEM WITH PUNCH!: How do I punctuate my poems? Capitalize each line and end with a comma? Use dashes—like Emily — Dickinson? Scrap capitalization like e.e. cummings? Create-my-own system? That depends on your personality, what you want to convey, and whether you're a punctuation maximalist or minimalist. To punctuate is literally to "point out" by way of marks; or, to "occur at intervals throughout," suggesting close ties to rhythm. Broadly, it includes "road signs" posted for the reader: yes, the usual, plus typefaces; font sizes; spacing; line breaks; even icons, drawings, etc. (We'll do exercises inspired by such questions.)

THE SMORGASBORD: We will write a poem, brainstorm ideas for other poems, and discuss how to compile these poems into a manuscript. As we create, we often end up with many scattered pieces. Let's focus on how to connect them into a cohesive collection.

PERFORMANCE WORKSHOP: Just as writing poetry is an art, so to reading and performing poetry in public. Taking a holistic approach to performing, this workshop explores incorporating body, voice, and mind into the reading of poetry. Learn the fundamentals of how to capture and hold a listener's attention. How to vary your speech patterns. How to expand the full range of your vocal apparatus. You'll also learn simple strategies for including music, theater, dance, and other poets into a multi-layered presentation. Participants should bring a short sample of their (or other) poetry, wear loose clothing and prepare to have fun.
