A Message From Our Senior Minister Rev. James H. Harry

It is believed that Christmas gift-giving didn't begin until around 336 AD. Before the fourth century, Christmas wasn't as celebrated a Christian holiday as Easter. Somewhere around 336 AD, December 25th became associated with

the celebration of Christmas and two factors lent themselves to gift giving. The first, of course, was the recognition of the gifts of the Magi [Wise Men] from the east who visited Jesus and presented him with gifts. The second was associated with a fourth-century bishop in modern-day Turkey who secretly bestowed gifts on needy people around the time the Church began to celebrate Christmas. His name? Saint Nicholas.

Today, giving gifts is a staple in families and among friends at Christmas. Aside from the commercialization and materialism of lavish gift-giving, many people put a lot of thought and energy and extend good wishes, cheer, joy, and love through the giving of a heart-felt gift to people we love. This is the same at Saint Paul Methodist Church as we look forward to sharing good gifts to others out of the abundance of our communal life together. These gifts come from the generosity of the people of Saint Paul through both the connectional giving and mission budgets which all of you contribute to through your tithes and offerings.

Through our denominational connectional giving, we share out of our abundance and support the ministries and infrastructure of the larger Church. Previously called the "apportionment" in the UMC, the vision for connectional giving in the GMC is an invitation for local churches to share abundantly and generously out of their own abundance. The hope for the GMC Connectional Missions and Ministry giving (no longer called apportionment) is that each local church chooses where their missional monies go both locally and abroad.

I am excited to share how our gift-giving this Christmas will benefit the lives of others.

Right here in Goldsboro, we will be giving Christmas gifts to the following local ministries and charities to assist them in their annual programs and ministries.

In addition to this local Christmas gift-giving, Saint Paul has continued its international missional focus through the ZOE Orphan Empowerment Ministry by supporting four Working Groups. A Working Group comprises anywhere between 25-30 children per group who are becoming self-sufficient and moving out of poverty. Currently, we financially support four Working Groups [2 in Kenya and 2 in India]. That is over 100 children [not including the dependent siblings they parent] that you are directly supporting to raise out of poverty, into self-sufficiency, and providing them with the opportunity to thrive where they never would have had the chance to do so.

Moreover, we have three additional opportunities to give during Advent.

- Angel Tree: The Angel Tree in the Narthex allows you to give a Christmas gift to 1. the Salvation Army of Goldsboro which will provide presents for 40 families at Christmas.
- 2. Congregations 4 Children Tree: The C4C Tree in the Narthex allows you to give a Christmas gift to the teachers and staff at Carver Heights Elementary School.
- 3. 2023 Advent Coin Boxes: The 2023 Advent Coin offerings this year will go to a new ministry we are beginning to support called Project Agape. Project Agape works directly with Christians in the country of Armenia who are suffering persecution for their Christianity. Armenia is credited as the first nation in the world to adopt Christianity as its religion, believed to have been under the evangelism of the Apostle Bartholomew at the end of the first century. Christians there are now being economically and physically persecuted for their faith and face extreme poverty. Project Agape is seeking to secure enough money to purchase comforters/blankets for the winter at \$20.00 per comforter/ blanket set. Our normal Advent coin offering is \$20.00 per family, and we hope to be able to send enough money for Project Agape to provide 100 comforters to our Armenian Christian brothers and sisters.

I think everyone enjoys receiving gifts. Christmas time is an especially wonderful time to give and receive gifts. It reminds us of the generosity of spirit and the lavish giftgiving of God in giving us his only Son, Jesus, to become the gift of love for the world. As I have gotten older, I have found I enjoy giving gifts more than I enjoy receiving gifts. I don't know whether that is particularly true of you or not. But, as we prepare to put these aforementioned Christmas gifts into the stockings of these local and international ministries, I believe that like the Church in 336 AD, we are honoring the spirit of Christmas by honoring the gift of the baby born in Bethlehem from whom comes every good gift under heaven.


Thank you for being a part of our Saint Paul Church family and may God's love continue to shine through all that we do.




