MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

This is the concluding year of my seven-year term as Chair of the GECA Board, as I will hand over the reins to fellow Director **Angus Kell** at our Annual General Meeting in November. It has been enormously rewarding to contribute in some small way to improving sustainability during this tenure and my 11+ years on the Board.

Sustainability is an area that has been a passion and a focus for almost the whole of my life. My father was a designer and inventor in what was then called "the alternative energy sector" and developed solar and wind products in the 1970s and 80s. From the age of nine or ten, I was helping him in the workshop, and then, with my brother, established our own business to manufacture the wind and solar systems he designed – which was reasonably cutting edge back in rural West Wales back then!

So, it has been hugely rewarding decades later to be able to contribute to GECA's journey and, above all, it has been an immense privilege to be associated with such a passionate and committed team of people – the GECA Directors and staff.

This review will show some of the fantastic impact the GECA team has achieved in FY23. For example, we're particularly proud of developing and releasing Australia's first sustainable Infant Mattress standard. Any parent will say that their child's safety is paramount, but there is no reason why this should come at the expense of sustainability. Infant mattresses certified under our standard will, of course, meet the Australian standards for performance and safety. Still, they will also ensure that consumers know that their child's mattress was produced using sustainably harvested materials, is designed with reuse and recycling in mind, and avoids harmful products. So both the baby and the parents can rest easy!

Financially, GECA achieved a solid break-even result in FY23, which is our aim over the long term as a not-for-profit. However, we have ambitious plans to generate revenue growth in FY24-26 that we can then use to invest in achieving even more positive social impact for the community.

FY23 saw the departure of CEO **Michelle Thomas**. Michelle stepped up at a turbulent time in 2020 when the Covid pandemic caused immense disruption to our way of life and society everywhere. To her immense credit, she steered the GECA team through this period, and she was able to hand over an organisation with a solid balance sheet and a talented and dedicated team to incoming CEO **Josh Begbie**. We are delighted to have Josh on board to lead GECA through our next growth phase; he has already shown the necessary qualities to take GECA to new heights.

In my final notes as Chair, I want to pay tribute to departing Directors **Lorraine Stephenson** and **Steve Humphries**. Both joined the GECA Board around the same time as me and have served GECA with dedication and distinction during their tenure. Lorraine has Chaired our Standards Committee for many years and has brought a technical rigour and scientific mindset that has been invaluable. I and my colleagues on the Board have leaned heavily on Lorraine's technical expertise, and she leaves having made a huge contribution to GECA and the sector – something that she will no doubt continue to do in her other Board and consulting roles.

Steve has also carried a heavy burden as Chair of our Finance and Risk Committee. As a former audit Partner and current CFO, Steve has brought his immense accounting and technical knowledge to the role but always allied to a shrewd, practical and no-nonsense business sense that has meant he has been a considerable support to the GECA CEO and Team and a rock on which the Board can rely. GECA's strong balance sheet and solid cash position are legacies of which Steve can be proud.

So, my deep thanks as departing Chair go to Steve and Lorraine, who, like all our Directors, fulfil these roles in a volunteer capacity and should be proud of their contribution. My thanks also go to incoming Chair **Angus Kell** and fellow Directors **Emma Bull** and **Suzie Hollott**. Each brings invaluable technical skills, business insights and a passion for sustainability to the Board, and I will continue to enjoy working with them as a fellow Director to help Team GECA grow its positive impact.

Launch of the Infant Mattresses (IMv10-2022) standard Revision of the Cleaning Products (CPv3.0-2022) standard In our ongoing efforts to promote sustainable practices, our **Stripout Waste Verification Program** has achieved a significant milestone with the successful participation of the **GPT Group**. We congratulate GPT Group and **JLL** for their support as the project managing team during the pilot phase.

This program, supported by the **Better Buildings Partnership** (BBP) and funded by the **City of Sydney**, focuses on improving the accuracy and transparency of stripout waste data. Through this initiative, we have developed a streamlined yet robust data reporting process that can be utilised by building owners, BBP members, and the broader industry. Increased transparency in data reporting will facilitate improvements in contracts, tenders, and targets, contributing to a more sustainable and environmentally conscious industry.

OUR IMPACTS

MEET GECA'S NEW INFANT MATTRESSES STANDARD

We all want the best options for our children, including their bedding. Infant mattress safety is a sensitive topic, and research shows that a wide range of physical, chemical and quality requirements play a critical role in creating a good product for people and planet. So GECA is delighted to have released a brand-new <u>Infant Mattresses (IMv1.0-2022</u>) lifecycle ecolabel standard!

The standard's scope applies to infant mattress products, including cot and crib mattresses, household cot mattresses, mattresses for bassinets and other flat sleeping surfaces.

The manufacture, use, and disposal of infant mattress products can negatively impact our environment and health, depending on the choice of raw materials, padding materials, coatings, textiles, and adhesives. Some manufacturers may also use hazardous treatments or poorly manage their energy and water use during production.

The **firmness of an infant mattress is an essential factor** when it comes to safety. If the mattress is soft, an infant's head can compress into the surface and potentially block the baby's airway; however, this is unlikely to happen if the mattress is firm.

Recent research suggests that soft crib mattresses have been linked to high risks of sudden infant death syndrome (<u>SIDS</u>). Although there are no mandatory safety requirements for infant mattresses in Australia, this standard recognises voluntary firmness requirements to mitigate potential risks.

When a product is certified against GECA's Infant Mattresses standard, you know it has been assessed to meet environmental, human health and social impact criteria while proving that it performs as promised.



The standard sets requirements that aim to provide a benefit by:



GRASSHOPPER LEADS THE WAY WITH C&D WASTE CERTIFICATION

Established in 1978, **Grasshopper Environmental** has provided professional, tailored, and responsive waste management services for over four decades across two critical sectors in Sydney – building, demolition & infrastructure, and commercial & industrial. In 2021, they were certified under GECA's Waste Collection Services standard, which included Laing O Rourke's Central Station Metro Project. In 2022, Grasshopper Environmental again demonstrated its leadership by being **the first** to certify under GECA's <u>Construction & Demolition Waste Services</u> standard.

Australia's construction and demolition (C&D) waste has more than doubled over the past 15 years. It's **our fastest-growing waste stream**, generating 27 million tonnes of waste in 2018-2019, 44% of Australia's total! By 2025, it is expected that 2.2 billion tonnes of C&D waste will be generated worldwide. So, at GECA, we have developed a robust lifecycle ecolabel standard to reduce the impact of this growing waste stream and **recognise best practice waste minimisation and management** for services delivering substantial environmental benefits.

"We congratulate the entire team at Grasshopper Environmental for this significant achievement! By undergoing third-party certification, **Grasshopper Environmental is demonstrating its commitment to transparency, quality of service, and accurate data** for reporting. We also congratulate their clients, HPAC Nepean Private Hospital Project, JHCPB JV Rozelle Interchange Project and Lendlease Martin Place Project, for specifying an ecolabelled service," says GECA CEO Josh Begbie.





According to the team at Grasshopper Environmental, "Many of our customers require their own GECA certification for their projects, so it made sense for us to get ours too. This has made it easier for our customers to know their waste contractor is reliable and committed to helping them achieve their waste diversion targets. It's a win-win."

"GECA certification shows our customers we are committed to responsible waste management. It signifies to the industry that we are accountable for environmental compliance, aiming to maximise recycling and resource recovery."

INFRABUILD ACHIEVES GECA CERTIFIED STEEL

InfraBuild, Australia's largest vertically integrated, electric arc furnace-based steel manufacturer, has gone through the rigour of a third-party assessment to show that their **reinforcing bar** and **reinforcing mesh** products are better for people and the planet. In May 2023, they became the first to certify under GECA's Steel & Steel Products (SSPv1.0i-2019) lifecycle ecolabel standard.



InfraBuild has demonstrated leadership by independently assessing these products against 44 critical science-based environmental, health, social and quality impact criteria. For example, GECA's world-class *Steel & Steel Products* standard addresses multiple environmental attributes such as:

- toxicity
- air quality
- energy use
- recyclability
- hazardous substances
- water consumption
- use of sustainable materials
- waste minimisation



It also encompasses social impacts, including fair pay, equal opportunity, and a safe working environment for employees and people across the supply chain.

"InfraBuild's certification is a momentous occasion as they are the first organisation under our Steel & Steel Products standard. This is an incredible achievement, as the assessment looks at impacts across a product's entire lifecycle, from the extraction of raw materials to the end of its life!" says GECA's CEO, Josh Beg<u>bie.</u> Steel manufacturing is a significant contributor to national and global carbon emissions. In 2020, the total direct emissions from the sector represented **<u>between 7% and 9% of global</u>** <u>carbon emissions</u>. GECA's ecolabel standard places clear restrictions on carbon emissions, helping the industry to reduce its impact.

"Steel is a critical material for Australian buildings and infrastructure. It is also highly intensive in terms of impacts, including carbon. InfraBuild has taken a substantial step that has the potential to drive the entire sector toward best practice that will benefit people and planet. We congratulate them on their leadership," says Begbie.

In addition, InfraBuild's GECA certified products are recognised as Best Practice under the Green Building Council of Australia's new Green Star Buildings ratings tool – <u>Responsible</u> <u>Product Framework (v1.1)</u>.





These certified products can contribute to a Responsible Product Value of 15, the **highest level of recognition achievable** for:

- Responsible Structure
- Responsible Envelope
- Responsible Systems
- Responsible Finishes



"We are incredibly excited to be leading the industry as the first to obtain GECA certification under their Steel & Steel Products standard. The GECA certification means a select range of our reinforcing bar and mesh products, which are manufactured in Australia using our lower embodied carbon steelmaking techniques, are now able to support Green Star Buildings' rated projects and contribute to meeting the ratings tool's 'Best Practice products' criteria," says David Bell, InfraBuild's Manager Sustainability and Insight.

Together, GECA and InfraBuild are providing Australia's building industry with an independent, reliable and credible way to source reinforcing bar and reinforcing mesh products for their Green Star projects.

PROJECTS, CONSULTANCY & TRAINING

GECA has engaged in diverse and impactful projects alongside various stakeholders during this financial year. Our commitment to providing consultancy and advisory services has led us to collaborate with leading retailers in the office and furniture sector while partnering with organisations dedicated to advancing sustainability initiatives.

One noteworthy project involved GECA undertaking a **comprehensive review and enhancement of a prominent Australian retailer's sustainability program**. Working closely with the retailer's sustainability team, we identified two key themes, transparency and credibility, which became the focal points of transformative recommendations. These recommendations encompassed adopting a holistic sustainability approach, repositioning the program as an educational campaign, and implementing rigorous verification processes. Our ultimate goal was to enhance the program's effectiveness, credibility, and educational impact.

Additionally, GECA played a pivotal role in **consolidating information from five retailers regarding their actions on modern slavery within their operations and supply chains**, as mandated by the Australian Modern Slavery Act 2018. Collaborating closely with these retailers, we formulated a comprehensive statement successfully submitted to the Australian Government as compliant with the Act.

Furthermore, we are proud to announce the completion of our role as the Stakeholder Engagement Lead in the development of the Fit for Office (FFO) product stewardship scheme. This initiative, addressing the significant issue of office furniture waste, aims to establish a accessible, voluntary nationally product stewardship scheme for commercial office furniture in Australia. Developed in collaboration with sustainability experts from Edge Impact, Planet Ark, and GECA, FFO is now guided by an expert reference group of founding member organisations (see right) committed to sustainable practices (many of which have already been leading the way with their GECA certified products). Congratulations to these businesses!

We are enthusiastic about the positive changes these initiatives bring to our community and look forward to witnessing further advancements that benefit both people and the planet.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

GECA has finished the year on a financial even keel. While GECA is a not-for-profit organisation that exists to protect the planet and its people, we must have the funds to drive those outcomes, and all of those funds come from our activities.

While we operate like a business, being a not-for-profit, we have the benefit of being able to reinvest all of our revenue into driving impact, so the goal is always to finish the year by breaking even or running a slight profit that can be reinvested the following year. This past financial year was another example of that.

For the 2022-23 Financial Year, we finished with total revenue of \$1,072,207 and total expenses of \$1,072,364, for an annual loss of \$157. Compared with the year before, our revenue was essentially unchanged, but our expenses were higher due to rising costs of living and the extra costs of bringing on a new CEO.

Most of our revenue comes from our ecolabelling work, with some additional income from other related activities such as Claims Authentication, Advisory Services and Environmental Product Declarations. All of these services work to push forward our goal of helping our partners achieve good commercial, environmental and social outcomes for their businesses. Thank you to each of our partners in the year for partnering with us to reduce our collective impact on the world.
