

Letter From the PA President Pro Tem's Desk

Dear Faculty Colleagues,

This semester, it has been my privilege to serve as President Pro Tem, in for our standing President, Michael Ferlise. I am very glad to share that Michael fully expects to return in the spring and resume his role as President of the Professional Association.

Our sincere thanks to Dr. Sirhan Abdullah, who has served in my place as Vice President, and has led the effort to draft a proposal for fully including nurses in our contract, and to Karen Hom-Galli, for serving as our Corresponding Secretary this semester. She not only handled the PA's correspondence, but also served as the PA's rep on the Calendar Planning Committee, Chaired the PA's Tenure and Promotion Prep Committee, and Co-Chaired a PA-Admin Working Group on research into the need for tenure-track lines, whose important work will continue into spring 2024. Thanks also go to Gilda Reyes and Claudia Delgado for their continued exceptional service as Recording Secretary and Treasurer, respectively. It is a testament to the strength of our union that when one member is out, others are ready, willing, and able to keep our union as active and strong as ever.

As we reported in the last issue of *Union Forward*, the PA continues to extend its reach beyond our College, participating in solidarity with other unions at the county and state level. Our Political Outreach Committee has strengthened its connections with the Hudson County Educational Association, its Legislative Action Team, and the NJEA. This summer, members of our Political Outreach Committee went on the road to Trenton and participated in an NJEA Lobby Day, stopping legislators in the hallways to urge them to support two issues: increased funding for community colleges and expanded sick leave for public school employees, both of which succeeded. The 2024 fiscal year budget signed by Governor Murphy includes a \$20 million increase for county colleges, and the new law affords public school employees expanded reasons to use sick leave, including the ability to use sick days for preventative care, to care for family members who are ill, and for other family obligations.

Here at home, our union remains committed to ensuring that our members' voices are heard, our contributions are recognized, and our rights are protected. This is a collective effort, which requires all of us to devote our time to the union in solidarity with our colleagues. Thanks to each and every one of you who has served as a PA representative, chaired or contributed to a PA Committee, written a newsletter article, attended and participated in an important college-wide discussion or open forum, worked on a PA project, or nominated a colleague for an award. Together, we stand as professionals who support one another, our mission as educators, and our shared principles.

Next semester will mark the beginning of preparations for our 2025 contract negotiations, and we will again be counting on the collective wisdom, energy, and commitment of our members to drive us. If you have issues you would like to see addressed in the next contract, please bring them forward. In the spring, we will begin forming working groups to research and draft proposals.

Our union derives its strength through the active engagement of our members – individuals who form a collective voice and unite in solidarity with one another. Together, we have made a difference and will continue to make one.

Dear Members,

I am pleased to present to you our annual report for the HCCC Professional Association as of December 2023.

As of December 2023, our financial status is as follows: \$10,319.32 in our checking account and \$25,763.15 in the Certificate of Deposit (CD), totaling \$36,082.47. In March, we closed two previous CD accounts and opened a new one with a deposit of \$25,000 at a favorable rate of 4% for a 13-month term. Since March 2023, we have earned \$763.15 in interest on this new Certificate of Deposit.

During the past fiscal year, our union received a total of \$14,860 from NJEA through our members' contributions. In dedicated pursuit of our union activities, we expended \$11,057.61. Notably, a portion of these expenses, amounting to \$5,934.35, was reimbursed to us by our college president's office and NJEA, a testament to the collaborative financial support that enables us to effectively serve our union members.

I am pleased to report that we successfully filed the Local Association Financial Assistance Program (LAFAP) before the November 1st deadline. Our diligent work was reviewed and signed off by a certified accountant and has been officially accepted by the New Jersey Education Association (NJEA).

We are also actively addressing a challenge that surfaced in recent months. As you know, our non-profit status was revoked by the IRS due to an unforeseen issue related to our state tax filings by the NJEA. Despite our collaboration with NJEA, it appears there was an issue with the inclusion of our organization in their group filing for state taxes, resulting in the revocation of our non-profit status. Our team is in close communication with NJEA, and we are working collaboratively to resolve the issue with the IRS to reinstate our non-profit status ASAP.

We appreciate your continued support and understanding and remain steadfast in our commitment to financial transparency, responsibility, and accountability to our members.

Why Climb Without Safety Equipment?

Before starting at Hudson County Community College, my professional experience was limited to full time teaching at the high school level, and adjunct instruction at the college level. And while working as an adjunct sparked my drive to become a full time professor, it certainly wasn't without its challenges.

I was lucky enough to have union representation at both of my jobs, and I would often hear whisperings of "well the union will have our backs" when faced with certain challenges. On a personal level, however, outside of contract renewals, I was just another cog in a system that was seemingly too large to care. I never met anyone from the union, I was never asked about my experiences, and I was never offered any platform for voicing my concerns. My support came predominantly from a few mentors that I worked with.

Joining Hudson County Community College as a tenure track member of the faculty, I wasn't sure what to make of the Professional Association. My experiences with unions had thus far been lackluster, and I had more "important things" to allocate my mental bandwidth toward: creating curriculum, trudging through the onboarding process, meeting new coworkers, learning new procedures, and—of course—gawking at the ostensibly indomitable peak known as the tenure process.

I attended the tenure orientation, and while it was helpful to glean insight from the administration, I was still desperately nervous about the tenure "binder," an artifact of great importance that would ultimately help decide whether or not I was able to continue my career at Hudson after spending four years as a full time instructor.

"Write everything down."

"Keep a digital folder of all of your contributions to Hudson."

"Take a bunch of pictures—save everything."

"Get involved!"

I was, of course, grateful for any guidance, but as the semester unfolded, I remember waves of anxiety lapping at my ankles, pulling me here and there while classes and grading necessitated the bulk of my focus. I tried implementing the advice I was receiving, but at times I felt like a mad artist, alone in a dark room with indeterminate cans of paint for me to throw onto a shadowy canvas...

Would the end result even resemble art?

I began attending Professional Association meetings, where I met some of the faculty leaders, current tenure track faculty, and other peers who'd already achieved tenure. I finally felt like I had a voice and a safe space to ask questions; I was excited to hear about an upcoming tenure preparation event being hosted by the Professional Association.

There were wonderful sandwiches, sushi, and tasty bites at the event. Most importantly, the union and its members were there to really dive into the tenure process, even going as far as to show us previous binders from now tenured faculty. The waves of anxiety have since waned, I'm happy to admit.

And though I'm only a semester closer to cresting mount tenure, the Professional Association has become my harness, rope, and map. They turned a daunting climb into a guided ascent, making the dream of tenure seem not just possible, but within reach.

From 'The Black Table' *Jeanne Baptiste*

The Black Faculty Caucus (BFC) is now in its third year. This Fall 2023, Bernard Adamitey was elected Secretary, mentored by the former Secretary Dr. Velino Joasil; and Daniel Ondieki is the Treasurer, mentored by Dr. Jerry Lamb the previous Treasurer. In the interest of continuity, Dr. Jeanne P. Baptiste was re-elected Chair, but the ultimate goal is to ensure succession and sustainability by mentoring and coaching the younger faculty into leadership roles.

The BFC continues its aim to integrate seamlessly into HCCC's framework. At present, the BFC is deeply entrenched in the Racial Equity Leadership Academcy's (RELA's) mission to foster black excellence by closing equity gaps for African American/black male students and improving their graduation rate. Previous to the RELA project, in an effort to increase recruitment, retention and graduation of all African American/black students, Dr. Jerry Lamb had designed a survey to poll African American/black students. It is fortuitous that this survey was available for the RELA project. It was revised by John Scanlon with input from the BFC and used in November 2023 to poll African American/black male students. Dr. Jerry Lamb then conducted focus groups with some of the respondents and presented an initial report to the extended RELA team.



Jeanne P. Baptiste holds a BA and an MA in English Literature from Rutgers-Newark; and a PhD in Women's and Gender Studies from Rutgers-New Brunswick. She has more than twenty-five years' experience in teaching and leadership (inter)nationally. In 2015, Javedd Khan hired her as an Adjunct at HCCC to teach College Composition and Developmental Writing. Jeanne has since added Cultures and Values, Business Writing, Introduction to Literature, and African American Literature to her portfolio. She received a NISOD Excellence Award as well as a League for Innovation in the Community College Excellence Award (Teaching Leadership). She has served on the Space and Facilities Committee and serves on the Board for the Center for Teaching Learning and

Innovation and on several working groups. She is the Chair of the Academic Senate and the Chair of the Black Faculty Caucus. She is also the faculty representative on the Racial Equity Leadership Academy's core team of five. Her pedagogy is framed primarily by her feminist lens; and her research focuses on matrices of identity: gender, sexuality, race, ethnicity, and Islam. She has published a chapter in Islam and the Americas edited by Aisha Khan. During the winter and summer breaks, Jeanne continues her gender work in her home country Trinidad and Tobago to eliminate violence against women and girls.

Professor Tony Acevedo attended the 2023 NJEA Convention as a representative of the HCCC Professional Association for the NJEA High Education Members Luncheon. Alongside HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber, the luncheon was for "higher ed members and supporters to participate in an interactive panel discussion regarding the positive impacts of effective labor management relations on campus."

Professor Acevedo discussed the contrast between the morale of our faculty with the previous college administration and highlighted the grassroots efforts of the faculty to revitalize the union from the ground up with new initiatives, committees, and events. He also discussed the intensive work of preparing for contract negotiations and how this labor led to two extremely successful contract negotiations and a separate negotiation for coordinator positions.

Dr. Reber discussed his personal journey through higher education and the two major points of focus of his presidency - diversity, equity, and inclusion and student success. He also emphasized his commitment to a non-adversarial relationship with the Professional Association.


