FREE CASH, STABILIZATION FUND AND STATE REVENUES & CHARGES **(Definitions at back of this booklet)**

Free Cash in the amount of \$11,955,226.00 was certified by the Massachusetts Department of Revenue and made available for appropriation for Fiscal Year 2026. At the Special Town Meeting held on December 9, 2025, the Town appropriated \$2,783,241.24 from Free Cash.

A Special Town Meeting scheduled immediately prior to the Annual Town Meeting on April 14, 2026 includes additional requests from Free Cash totaling \$668,522.00. Articles on the Annual Town Meeting warrant for April 14, 2026 propose appropriations from Free Cash totaling \$4,355,297.00, including \$350,000.00 to the Stabilization Fund. If approved, these appropriations would leave an estimated balance of \$4,159,166.00 in Free Cash for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2026.

The Town's Stabilization Fund balance is \$5,652,103.39 as of this writing.

This year, the Town is also appropriating \$380,000.00 to be invested in the Dukes County Pooled OPEB Trust Fund for Other Post-Employment Benefits. Edgartown's total contributions to the Trust now equal \$3,680,000.00, and the market value of the Town's share of the Trust was \$6,352,457.00 as of June 30, 2025.

On June 9, 2025, S&P Global Ratings assigned a 'AAA' long-term rating to the Town's approximately \$18.2 million Series 2025 General Obligation Municipal Purpose Loan Bonds and reaffirmed the 'AAA' rating on all existing general obligation debt. The Town's 'SP-1+' short-term rating on bond anticipation notes was also affirmed. The outlook remains stable.

S&P's rating reflects Edgartown's very strong financial management, including conservative budgeting, disciplined reserve policies, and long-term capital planning and forecasting. These practices have supported consis-

tently positive financial performance, with revenues exceeding projections and expenditures remaining below budget, as well as an exceptionally strong tax base.

Maintaining a 'AAA' rating allows the Town to secure the most favorable borrowing terms, resulting in reduced long-term interest costs and continued savings for taxpayers.

FINANCIAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

To the Honorable Select Board and
the Citizens of Edgartown:

In cooperation with the Select Board, the Financial Advisory Committee conducted several weeks of hearings and review of the Fiscal Year 2027 operating budget and the articles presented for consideration at the 2026 Annual Town Meeting. During this process the Committee reviewed requests from more than fifty Town departments, boards, committees, and regional entities, as well as a number of capital and policy initiatives.

The proposed Fiscal Year 2027 operating budget represents an overall 8.4% increase from the previous fiscal year. The increase reflects continued cost pressures in several non-discretionary areas, including education, employee benefits, regional assessments, and debt service. The Martha's Vineyard Regional High School assessment increased by 10.7% (\$687,365.45), while Edgartown School salaries increased by 6.5% (\$557,042.94). The Superintendent's Office assessment increased by 8.9% (\$216,317.30). The Town's share of health insurance increased by 8.0% (\$364,735.12). Debt obligations also increased significantly, with interest and debt service rising by 68.4% (\$1,009,634.34), largely due to borrowing associated with the Fire Station project and sewer mains installed along West Tisbury Road. Regional assessments also contributed to the increase, including the Martha's Vineyard Commission assessment, which increased by 13.2% (\$106,764.00)

The warrant also includes two questions that will appear on the ballot. The first asks voters to approve a \$900,090.00 operating override to support the Fiscal Year 2027 budget. The Committee recognizes that a portion of the cost increases outlined above are outside the direct control of the Town, particularly regional assessments, education costs, and debt service obligations. The override is intended to maintain municipal services while addressing these structural cost increases within the constraints of Proposition 2.5.

The second ballot question relates to the proposed acquisition of the Martha's Vineyard Boys & Girls Club

property located at 4 M. Daniels Lane for municipal purposes. The Committee reviewed the proposal in the context of the Town's long-term planning objectives and available funding sources. The acquisition would provide the Town with a centrally located parcel and existing facilities that may support future municipal needs, recreational programming, or elder population community uses. Funding for the purchase is proposed through a combination of available funds, including stabilization, free cash, and a smaller tax levy component subject to voter approval.

Throughout the hearing process the Committee remained mindful of Edgartown's long-standing practice of conservative fiscal management. While costs continue to rise in a number of areas outside of the Town's direct control, the Committee also recognizes the importance of maintaining the Town as a competitive employer in an increasingly challenging labor market, particularly given housing and workforce constraints. The Committee believes the budget presented to Town Meeting reflects a balanced approach to maintaining municipal services, supporting and retaining a qualified workforce, and preserving Edgartown's long-term financial stability. The Committee extends its appreciation to the department heads, boards, and committees that participated in the hearing process, as well as to the Town Administrator and Finance Management Team for their continued assistance in preparing and presenting the Town's financial information.

False/trouble alarms caused by thunder storms, hurricanes, certain power outages or other situations as determined by the Police Chief or Fire Chief, shall be exempt from this section. False alarms caused by construction, Fire protection system maintenance or systems deemed unreliable shall be addressed by fines issued concurrent with 527-CMR 1 and Chapter 148. The Police Chief or Fire Chief will notify the owner of offenses by mail at the address on file in the Town of Edgartown assessors office. Cottage Dwelling A detached one-family dwelling that does not exceed 1,400 sq. ft. of livable gross floor area (~~meaning the heated floor area of the building above finished grade, excluding non-dwelling areas such as attic space or a garage~~).

Detached bedroom In any district in Edgartown, a detached bedroom is defined as either a freestanding structure or over or otherwise attached to a non-habitable accessory structure and all of the following:

- a. only one bedroom and bathroom(s) only
- b. no sitting rooms, no entrance alcoves, no hallways
- c. ~~the footprint, measured by the inside perimeter of the proposed livable space, is no larger than 400 square feet (includes bathroom and closets) and including enclosed porches. the footprint is no larger than 400 sq ft of gross floor area~~
- d. plumbing in the bathroom only and limited to one hand sink, one toilet, and one bathtub/shower
- e. no stove or refrigerator

Gross Floor Area The sum of the ~~horizontal~~ areas of all stories of a building, ~~or several buildings,~~ as measured from the ~~exterior~~ interior face of exterior walls, or from the center line of ~~a party~~ walls separating two buildings on the same lot. Gross Floor Area for a single lot shall include basements connected by an interior stair, lofts, and intermediate floored tiers, but shall exclude crawl spaces, garage parking areas, attics, enclosed porches and similar spaces, garages, sheds, gazebos, enclosed porches, screen porches, enclosed decks, guest buildings, and other accessory buildings. Gross Floor Area shall not include ~~unfinished basements, crawl spaces, attics, open porches, or open decks.~~³⁰

TOWN MEETING PROCEDURE GUIDELINES

The Moderator has absolute control of the Town Meeting.

The General Laws Chapter 39 Section 15: The Moderator shall preside and regulate the proceedings, decide all questions of order, and make public declaration of all votes. The Moderator recognizes speakers from the floor, and while they are speaking allows no interruptions except when a point of order is raised.

When a voter wishes to speak he may rise, say “Mr. Moderator,” and wait for recognition. Then, standing at a microphone, he should give his name. The voter may continue, with due regard to reasonable brevity, as long as he speaks directly to the question under discussion.

MOTIONS

MAIN motions are usually on articles in the Town Warrant. They are made, seconded, then open for consideration. Articles are not always brought before the Meeting in the order of their appearance in the Warrant.

SECONDARY motions are motions which refer to main motions. The Meeting is usually limited to the discussion of two secondary motions at one time. Secondary motions usually amend, postpone, or limit consideration.

AMEND

Amendments may be offered by any voter to the motion under discussion, provided the scope of the original motion is not enlarged or altered. Amendments are seconded and discussed; they require a majority vote to carry (pass). An amendment need not be voted upon if the proposed change is agreeable to the proponents of the original motion. Voters are encouraged to submit amendments in writing.

POSTPONE

1. **To refer to committee “Commit”;** If changes in a main motion are numerous, take much time, or require additional information, it is wise to commit the article to a committee. This secondary motion should specify which board or committee. If proposing a new committee, specify how many members, how appointments are to be made and when the committee should report.
2. **Postpone to a definite time;** defers action on a main motion to a stated hour, usually during the Meeting. At the hour specified, it is returned to the floor when a motion is made that the deferred article be considered.
3. **“Lay on Table”** intends to temporarily lay aside an article. Not debatable; majority vote carries. (To “Take from Table” see RECONSIDERATION.) An article not taken from table before the meeting adjourns is dead. To be considered at a subsequent meeting, it must reappear in the Warrant for that meeting.
4. **“Take no action” “Pass over” “ Postpone indefinitely”** are debatable motions and require majority vote. The intent is to defeat the motion.

LIMIT CONSIDERATION

1. **Limit Debate:** This secondary motion requests vote to be taken at a specific time. Requires 2/3 majority vote.
2. **“Move the Previous Question”** demands an immediate vote on any motions under consideration. May not be debated or amended. Requires 2/3 vote to carry.

POINT OF ORDER

If a voter questions the legality or propriety of the proceedings, he may rise, interrupt the speaker and say, “Mr. Moderator, I rise to a point of order” or “question of privilege”.

RECONSIDERATION

To consider a tabled motion “Take from Table”. The motion to consider a tabled question requires a majority vote and can be made at any time when no other question is before the Meeting.

TO RECONSIDER AN ARTICLE ONCE ACTED UPON AND DISPOSED OF

1. **Move to reconsider the vote:** This motion may be made by one who voted on the prevailing side of a motion which has been adopted, rejected or postponed indefinitely and wishes to change his views.
2. **To rescind.** If no one who voted on the prevailing side is willing to move to reconsider, any voter may move to rescind the vote on the main motion. Usually a 2/3 vote is required.

VOTES ON MAIN MOTIONS

1. Usually majority of those attending carries.

Exceptions:

2/3 majority vote required borrowing of money; appropriations for land purchase; land purchase for public domain; sale or abandonment of unneeded land; abandonment of projects for which money has been borrowed; appropriation for celebration of settlement or incorporation; zoning by-laws.

4/5 usually required payment of a bill for which insufficient appropriations were made in previous year.

MODERATOR’S RULES REGARDING TOWN MEETINGS

Priority shall be given to Registered Voters of the Town for admission to all Town Meetings, whether Annual or Special meetings. Therefore the following rules shall apply:

1. Prior to admission to the Hall, persons desiring admittance shall check in with the Registrars of Voters who shall be present at the main entrance with Voter Registration Lists.
2. Town officials and voters who desire to have a non-voter present to speak on any article of which he may have special knowledge or expertise should request the Moderator in writing at least seven days prior to the meeting that the non-voter be allowed to be present. The request should briefly state the subject matter and articles to which the non-voter desires to address the meeting. If the Moderator allows the non-voter to be present, he shall so inform the Registrars of Voters.
3. The Registrars of Voters shall admit to the meeting all duly registered voters of the Town and all persons whom the Moderator has informed them to admit.
4. Five minutes prior to the time the meeting is scheduled to begin, if there are sufficient seats for the registered voters present, plus an adequate reserve for later arriving voters, the Registrars may admit non-voters. Admitted non-voters shall not mingle with registered voters. They shall be seated in an area distinguishable from the remainder of the meeting so that the Tellers and Moderator can easily determine those who have a right to vote and those who do not.
5. Non-voters admitted to a Town Meeting shall not address the Meeting without the permission of the Moderator and shall make no remarks or comments during debate or participate in voting.

The Moderator retains the right to have any voter or non-voter removed from the Meeting.

CHERRY SHEET

This is a cherry red form which shows all of the State and County charges and reimbursements to the Town as certified by the Massachusetts Department of Revenue.

RESERVE FUND

This fund may be established by the voters at an ANNUAL TOWN MEETING or Special Town Meeting and may be composed of (a) an appropriation (not exceeding 5% of the tax levy of the preceding year), (b) money transferred from Overlay Reserve, or (c) both.

Any unexpired balance thereof at the end of the year is closed out to the surplus revenue (E & D) except, however, that from such balance there shall first be deducted and credited back to Overlay Reserve, to the extent possible, a sum equal to that amount, if any, which was appropriated from the Reserve Fund.

Transfers from the Reserve Fund are within the exclusive control of the Financial Advisory Committee.

STABILIZATION FUND

A fund set up by Town meeting vote under the provisions of Section 5b, Chapter 40 of the Massachusetts General Laws, not to exceed 10% of the amount raised in the preceding fiscal year by taxation of Real Estate and Tangible Personal Property. The aggregate amount in the fund at any time shall not exceed 10% of the equalized valuation of the Town. Any interest shall be added to and become a part of the fund. Appropriations from this fund may be made for any purpose. A two-thirds vote is required.

SURPLUS REVENUE - FREE CASH

Generally referred to as Excess and Deficiency, though that phrase nowhere appears in the statutes. This fund represents the amount by which Cash, Accounts Receivable and other floating assets exceed the liabilities and reserves. This amount of the Excess and Deficiency account over and above uncollected taxes of prior years constitutes "Free Cash" or "Available Funds" and is certified to the Town by the Director of Accounts of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, effective July first of each year.



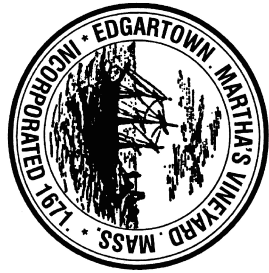
