PNP Government to Tackle At-Risk Youth in New Budget

The Progressive National Party (PNP) Government has placed the needs of at-risk youth squarely at the center of its new budget, unveiling a series of comprehensive initiatives aimed at transforming education and strengthening social support systems across the Turks and Caicos Islands.

Minister of Education, Youth, Sport, and Culture, Hon. Rachel Taylor, delivered a passionate presentation highlighting the government's renewed focus on vulnerable students who struggle to thrive in traditional learning environments. At the heart of this effort is a thorough review of the Alternative Education Policy, which Taylor described as a key step toward ensuring inclusive and flexible educational opportunities for all learners.

"The revised policy will provide customized educational pathways to reduce dropout rates, support re-engagement, and foster innovation," Taylor explained.

She emphasized that the policy is not merely an academic reform but a holistic approach that prioritizes behavioral support, emotional regulation,

and essential life skills. These interventions, she added, are designed to lower the risk of reoffending and build self-discipline and accountability in a structured, caring environment.

The Minister noted that the implementation of this policy requires a collaborative, multi-agency approach involving the Department of Rehabilitation, Social Services, and mental health services. By working together, these agencies can offer wraparound support that addresses the complex challenges faced by at-risk youth.

In addition to policy reform, Taylor announced plans to secure a safe and supportive home for the most vulnerable boys in the community. She revealed that she will lead a delegation to Jamaica in July to attend a conference on boys' education, bringing back insights to inform local programs and initiatives.

The government is also investing in educational quality through a newly established Quality Assurance Unit. Taylor shared that the first cohort of Quality Assurance officers has completed their training and will now begin inspecting schools and learning institutions to ensure con-

sistent, high-quality education. She reaffirmed the government's commitment to ongoing professional development to maintain high standards. Beyond education, the budget also prioritizes cultural identity and heritage preservation. Taylor unveiled a National Archival and Digitization Project, aimed at safeguarding critical historical documents and materials for future generations. She announced that a Request for Proposals for this project would be published shortly after the budget's passage.

Additionally, a National Artisan Registry—the first of its kind in the territory—will be established to document, celebrate, and empower local cultural practitioners. This registry will include artists, craftsmen, musicians, storytellers, and tradition-bearers, fostering both cultural preservation and creative industry development. Taylor emphasized that this initiative will enable the transfer of cultural knowledge across generations while providing new opportunities for local artists to thrive.

The budget also includes funding for the Cultural Ambassador Programme, set to launch in early June 2025, as

well as participation in this year's CARIFESTA, underscoring the government's commitment to telling the Turks and Caicos Islands' story and shaping its national identity.

"These investments in education and culture," Taylor concluded, "represent our commitment to building a brighter future—one that honors our roots while empowering our people to succeed."

Technical training modules delved into the Atlantic 85's engine systems, electrical and hydraulic systems, and the intricacies of its jet-drive mechanisms. These skills are essential for

ensuring the vessel's optimal performance during critical rescue operations, where every second counts.

The RT&CIPF Marine Unit expressed heartfelt gratitude to the RNLI instructors, whose expertise and dedication were instrumental in delivering this training. The Force also extended thanks to the FCDO and all partner agencies involved in making this training a reality, recognizing the collaborative effort required to bolster regional maritime response.

TCI Government Moves to Curb Governor's Role in Granting Islander Status

The Turks and Caicos Islands Government is considering legal amendments that would remove the Governor's authority in the approval process for Turks and Caicos Islander Status, following a controversial decision by Her Excellency Governor Dileeni Daniel-Selvaratnam to approve 49 applicants previously rejected by the Islander Status Commission.

In a recent statement, Premier Hon. Washington Misick announced that the Government will immediately review the legal framework governing the process. The review could result in a significant shift of authority, transferring final decision-making powers from the Governor to the independent Status Commission. Premier Misick said the current system contains a legal "loop-hole" that allowed individuals "of dubious loyalty" to receive Islander Status, despite being turned down by the Commission.

"My ministerial colleagues and I adamantly opposed the grant of Islander Status to many of the individuals recently approved by the Governor," the Premier stated. "We formally communicated our objections more than three weeks ago."

The 49 applications were originally submitted between 2016 and 2018 and reviewed by the Commission in 2021, which recommended their rejection. However, following a judicial review, the Supreme Court ruled in July 2024 that the Commission had overstepped its legal authority by applying discretionary vetting standards not prescribed in law.

According to the ruling, under Section 132(2) of the Constitution, any conditions for granting Islander Status must be formally established in legislation. The Court found that the Commission's broader assessment of applicants' character and community contributions was unlawful, and that its role was limited to verifying basic eligibility criteria under Section 4(2) of the TCI Status Ordinance — including British Overseas Territory Citizenship (BOTC), permanent residency,

and no custodial sentence over one year.

With no binding legal framework in place, the Court affirmed the Governor's discretion to grant Islander Status.

While the Premier acknowledged the Court's decision, he emphasized that it exposed a serious flaw in the current law — one that undermined the intent of reforms introduced in 2015 to increase transparency and reduce political interference in status grants. The Status Commission was created in 2021 as an independent vetting body in response to growing public concerns about fairness in the process.

"We must act decisively to ensure that such a situation does not repeat itself," Misick said. "The grant of Islander Status is a privilege, not a right. It should be reserved for individuals who have integrated into our society and contributed meaningfully to our Islands."

The Government has since introduced a points-based system to evaluate applicants more objectively. However, the Governor still retains the final say in granting status. Premier Misick indicated the Government will now explore legislative changes to remove that power, pending further consultation.

He added that the elected Government has a responsibility to ensure laws reflect the will and values of the people, and that the integrity of the Islander Status process is maintained.

Public Reaction: Mixed Views and Community Division


The Governor's decision has sparked widespread debate across the Turks and Caicos Islands — even within churches — with public opinion sharply divided.

Some residents have expressed support for the individuals granted status, noting that many have lived in the country for years and

contributed to the community. Others, however, argue that regardless of the individual merits, the Governor's unilateral action undermined the role of the Status Commission and eroded public trust in the process. Critics also contend that several of the applicants have not yet demonstrated sufficient cultural assimilation or long-term commitment to the Islands to merit such recognition.

In one notable act of protest, a billboard listing the names of the 49 approved individuals was erected by concerned citizens. However, NewslineTCI understands that authorities have since ordered its removal.

The Government's proposed legislative reforms signal a growing push to close the legal gaps exposed by the court ruling and to ensure that future decisions about Islander Status are made through a more accountable, community-led process.



I have lived within the continental United States for several decades now. Before that I attended one of the historically black colleges and universities for four years in Washington, DC. I have not only experienced the freezing cold and the deluge of snow of the north, but also the glaring sun and the sweltering heat of the south. I have not been to many states, but I have had the opportunity to, physically, touch the ground on the east as well as on the west coast.

Socially I have summered and wintered here in the United States — having gotten married here, attended the weddings of others, attended funerals of the young and the old — including that of my mother-in-law who died in New York, and that of my mother who had died years before in Maryland, just a few days before the attacks on the Twin Towers in New York and on the Pentagon building in Washington, DC. In fact, those attacks occurred the day before her memorial service was scheduled to take place in Washington, DC.

I can recall being caught in traffic in my brother's vehicle, driving up from Florida, along with my sister-in-law and my wife as we listened to the breaking news on the radio, and as we watched the tragedy in New York unfold on a small, portable television screen that we had in the car, and as we saw black smoke billowing from the Pentagon in the distance.

While we were stuck in traffic, sirens blared in the streets from emergency vehicles as they sped to and fro like angry hornets. Those were stressful times but I was able to weather the mental and emotional storms and keep my wits about me.

I have been there for graduation ceremonies, for US naturalisation citizenship ceremonies, for the births of babies and for their blessings in churches. I have been to birthday parties, get-togethers of family and friends, and I have attended office parties and picnics. I have been interviewed, rejected and hired for various jobs.

I have experienced the intrigues of office politics, the joys of promotions, the pain of company closures and layoffs. I have collected unemployment cheques. I know what it is to be rehired. I have paid my federal taxes, and I have paid into social security and into Medicare. Those experiences presented challenges but there, too, I was able to confront, to survive, and to overcome them. I have, like millions of Americans, cast my vote during the various election cycles in polling booths, and I have nervously watched on television as the results slowly came in. I know the disappointment when my candidates did not win and the sheer relief when they actually did.

I know what it is to stand in the freezing cold on the Washington Mall to witness a presidential inauguration. I have read the US Constitution several times — that to which I took a solemn oath — and I did so within the broader context of my reading of US history.

I have read books on American law so that I could better understand and appreciate the social, cultural, political and economic dynamics of national life. I have read about the lives of such people who laid the groundwork on which we operate today — George Washington, John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, Alexander Hamilton, Benjamin Franklin, Abraham Lincoln, Andrew Jackson, Theodore Roosevelt and Franklin D Roosevelt.

I was told how such men, along with many others, had built this nation on the ideas of the vaunted civilisations of ancient Greece and of Rome. I have been told that getting a good dose of Western philosophy and politics would inoculate me against the scurvy of “wokeness”. The advice, under normal circumstances, might have seemed logical, but for the fact that most Americans, I have found, do not like to read, and frown upon those who do as elites.

And just to be on the safe side, in order to get as broad a perspective of this country as I could, as a black man from the Caribbean I made sure that all of my bases were covered by reading about the lives and learning from the testimonies of black folk like Frederick Douglass, Harriet Tubman, Sojourner Truth, Booker T Washington, Marcus Garvey, Mary McCloed Bethune, Dr WEB Du Bois, Ida B Wells, Dr Alain Locke, Dr Carter G Woodson, Zora Neale Hurston, Claude McKay, Dr E Franklin Frazier, Dr Martin Luther King, jr, James Baldwin, and Malcolm X.

My desire was not just to live among the people in my adopted homeland but, again, to be able to know enough about them in order to be as one of them. I had drawn my line in the sand and I had wanted, through the process of enculturation, to consolidate or to solidify my place in the American society, for good or ill.

But what had all that effort managed to accomplish for me when I am now being told by the US Government that the words contained in the Constitution — especially those aspects that a child just having learned to read can understand — do not mean what they actually say, in very plain language? I think the medical and psychological professionals have a term for such behaviour, that being, “cognitive dissonance”.

Psychology, which I minored in while I was at university, outlined cognitive dissonance as a mental phenomenon in which people unknowingly hold fundamentally conflicting cognitions. Being confronted by situations that challenge this dissonance may ultimately result in some change in their cognitions or actions to cause greater alignment between them so as to reduce this dissonance. Relevant items of cognition include peoples' actions, feelings, ideas, beliefs, values, and things in the environment. Cognitive dissonance exists without signs but it surfaces through psychological stress when people participate in an action that goes against one or more conflicting things.

Doctor, I still have hopes for America — am I mad?

“Maybe the greatest madness is to see life as it is rather than what it could be.” — Don Quixote, Cervantes

According to this theory, when an action or idea is psychologically inconsistent with the other, people automatically try to resolve the conflict, usually by reframing a side to make the combination congruent.

Discomfort is triggered by beliefs clashing with new information or by having to conceptually resolve a matter that involves conflicting sides, whereby the individual tries to find a way to reconcile contradictions to reduce their discomfort. From all that I have been witnessing in the news, this seems to describe America today, and I do not want to come down with that malady. But, I digress. Let me resume my trend of thought.

What am I to think when some among us have chosen to interpret the words of the US Constitution to mean, for example, that corporations are like people, having the same rights and privileges as flesh and blood individuals, and that we can have law and order without having “due process of law”? What am I to tell outsiders when the document that is so unambiguous, so unequivocal, and so vociferous about people having been born here being citizens, raises questions among some within society about what “birthright citizenship” really means?

What do I tell the peoples of the world about guardrails installed to protect us from the whims of felons in our streets, in our homes, in our places of work and of play, in our churches and in the marketplace, but not against any of them holding the reins of national political power, especially as unqualified, reckless and vindictive individuals?

What do I say when the courts ban abortions because they kill babies, only to save them as future prey in schools to be hunted and gunned down by deranged perpetrators? What do I say to those who ask why the teaching of African American history, and why the teaching on “cultural inclusion” — done in order to foster a better understanding of those in the populace — are banned, but, on the other hand, why the sky is the limit on any way which can be conceived of by some who wish to undermine our democracy in order to build a tall, hard, and cold edifice dedicated to oligarchy and totalitarianism?

How do I explain how our traditional, life-long international partners became our enemies overnight, and how our sworn, mortal enemies became our bedfellows?

How did the philosophy of the “Fairness Doctrine”, which was created to protect free speech for all, for both rich and poor, become deemed as unfair, and was, consequently, abolished so that free speech is now, largely, part of the preserve of the wealthy? Why is it, in recent times, that it is so very hard for me to focus on or to take seriously anything written by or about Americans?

Whence this apoplexy of heart and of mind for the much-heralded American idealism? Whence this patriotic funk? Whence this sense of being housed in a literal insane asylum? I do not expect any improvement in our standing on the international stage ever

again, with our current, chronic viral infection of isolationist American exceptionalism, which history has proven does not work.

I think the country, having been teed off the green from the outset of its founding, has found itself far from the endgame that has been marked by its flag, having found itself mired very deep, and in a very wide sandy bog. And even if Superman was to suddenly appear, donned in his red cape with the big “S” on his chest, in order to save the day, I believe he might only be able to salvage some of our domestic dignity but would be incapable of lifting the international political and economic bridges that were made to collapse under the current Administration due to ineptitude.

All that having been said, please tell me, doctor, am I mad? I have 31 books sitting on a shelf waiting to be read, a variety dealing with US history and with other sociological aspects of American life, but of late I cannot seem to stir my weary mind and body to pick up any of them. My interest has been diverted, at least for the moment, further afield to parts of the world where people appear sane, and who take knowledge and the acquisition of it seriously.

My appetite has been developed for more delectable and nutritious intellectual fare, and for examples of leadership which do not remind me of nipple bottles, of baby diapers, of baby rattles, or of whining children fighting and quarrelling in a sandbox in the middle of a playground.

When I routinely read about or happen to see on television our president, his Cabinet, our Supreme Court justices, and our senatorial and congressional representatives, a darker more sinister side of Sesame Street comes to mind. Where are the adults in the room? Where is Gordon? Where is Mr Hooper? And yet, I still entertain a sliver of hope for this country.

Under the banner “Prioritizing Inclusive Sustainable Growth,” the Government of the Turks and Caicos Islands has unveiled a forward-looking agenda to diversify revenue, empower local enterprise, and protect the environment.

Acting Premier Hon. Jamell Robinson told the annual Business Outlook that inclusivity and sustainability will guide policy over the next decade.

“We aim for an economy that grows not just in numbers but in depth, reach, and resilience,” the Acting

Premier said.

Diversifying beyond tourism

He said while tourism remains TCI’s chief income driver, Robinson insists that long-term success depends on reducing over-reliance on any single sector.

Public-private initiatives, he said, are channeling capital into five priority areas:

- Agriculture and fisheries to improve food security and create value-added exports
- Renewable energy to cut costs and

carbon emissions

- Financial services to position TCI as a compliant, innovative jurisdiction
- Orange and digital economies where creativity and technology generate modern careers
- Modern infrastructure, the “bed-rock” of any vibrant economy

This multidimensional push, according to the acting premier, will build shock-proof foundations, create jobs, and keep more value circulating locally.

Reforming public finance

With IMF-CARTAC support, the Ministry of Finance is overhauling revenue systems, tightening compliance, and exploring new streams such as modest user fees in high-impact tourist zones. A broader base will give space to invest in people and climate resilience.

Backing small business

Acting Premier Robinson told the gathering that ninety percent of the MSME fund is already committed, supporting 89 projects. Fisheries received the largest share, and South Caicos logged a record nine grants. Entrepreneurs also gain technical assistance to modernise and reach export markets.

Quality-focused tourism

Robinson pointed out also that transforming the Tourist Board into “Experience Turks and Caicos” helped the destination welcome two million arrivals in 2024. He pointed out that the new aim will be to grow revenue per available room rather than headcount, thereby protecting the islands’ boutique appeal.

Infrastructure and clean energy

Robinson revealed that capital spending hit US \$38.6 million in 2023, and the 2025 budget earmarks US \$86.7 million for economic affairs, spanning land development, coastal protection, and telecom upgrades. A streamlined procurement process should accelerate delivery. He pointed out that energy reform may be the most visible shift, revealing that government has targeted 40 percent renewable generation by 2030, beginning with a modernised grid and net-metering that lets homes and businesses sell surplus solar power back to the utility company.

Real Estate

The acting premier pointed out that real estate transactions grew 2.5 percent in 2024 and are projected to climb 3.2 percent next year, underscoring investor confidence.

“The future we are shaping is one where growth touches every district, every family, and future generations,” Acting Premier Robinson concluded, urging partners to “move forward with clarity, courage, and shared purpose.”

Forum participants—including bankers, hotel executives, farmers, and students—applauded the emphasis on balanced development.

Among the other speakers at the event were Hon. E. Jay Saunders, Minister of Innovation, Technology and Information; Minister of Physical Planning and Infrastructure Development Hon. Arlington Musgrove.


Shaquaze Forbes Found Guilty in Grand Turk Firearm Case

Shaquaze Forbes, a 22-year-old resident of Over Back, Grand Turk, was found guilty on June 12, 2025, in connection with a firearm incident investigated by the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force (RT&CIPF).

Forbes was convicted on two serious charges:

- Possession of a firearm with intent to endanger life
- Discharging a firearm

His co-accused, Jerreal Missick, also 22 and from Over Back, was acquitted following directions

from the presiding judge to the jury.

Forbes has been remanded to Her Majesty’s Prison under the supervision of the Department of Correction and Rehabilitation. He is scheduled to be sentenced on July 18, 2025.

The charges stem from a report made to police on February 13, 2024, concerning the discharge of a firearm. Following an extensive investigation and consultation with the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions, both

men were formally charged.

The RT&CIPF continues to appeal to the public for information about illegal activity. Anyone with knowledge is urged to contact the nearest police station, dial 911, call the Serious Crime Unit at 231-1842, or reach out anonymously via Crime Stoppers at 1-800-8477.

As we enter the 2025 Atlantic Hurricane Season, I take this opportunity to strongly encourage all residents to make hurricane preparedness a top priority.

While disasters come in many forms and can strike with little or no warning, hurricanes are unique in that they occur within a defined season. This gives us a crucial advantage: time to prepare. However, what remains unpredictable is the strength of each storm, its exact path, and the scale of damage it may cause. That is why we must not become complacent or take this time for granted. Preparation is not just a precaution it is a responsibility.

As Chair of the National Subcommittees, I can attest that we are working tirelessly at the national level to improve our state of readiness. Our efforts include:

- **Strengthening Shelter Systems:** We are identifying and upgrading designated hurricane shelters to ensure they are safe, accessible, and adequately stocked to serve those in need during a storm.
- **Improving Drainage Infrastructure:** Significant investments are being made in flood mitigation, particularly in vulnerable areas, to reduce the risks and impacts of severe rainfall and storm surges.

- **Enhancing Early Warning and Communication Systems:** We are refining our alert systems to ensure that emergency notifications are timely, clear, and widely disseminated through multiple channels including: radio, SMS and social media.

These are critical steps, but they are only part of the equation. The truth is that a community is only as strong and prepared as its individual residents. You play a vital role in disaster readiness.

1. Make a Family Emergency Plan

- Identify a safe place to shelter during the storm.
- Establish an emergency contact outside the affected area.
- Plan evacuation routes and ensure everyone in your household knows them.
- Make special arrangements for elderly family members, persons with disabilities and pets.

2. Assemble an Emergency Kit

- Include non-perishable food and drinking water for at least 3 to 5 days.
- Add flashlights, batteries, a first-aid kit, essential medications, hygiene products and important documents stored in waterproof containers.

- Don't forget face masks, sanitizers and any special items needed for infants or seniors.

3. Secure Your Property

- Trim trees and remove debris that could become projectiles.
- Reinforce windows and doors and clear drains and gutters.
- Review and update your home insurance to ensure it covers hurricane and flood damage.

4. Stay Informed

- Monitor updates from the National Weather Service and local emergency management authorities.
- Trust only official sources of information. Avoid spreading rumors or unverified messages that may cause panic.

5. Check on Your Neighbors

- Community resilience depends on collective care. Check in with elderly neighbors, those who live alone, or those who may need help with evacuation or supplies.

Let us remember that preparation is a shared duty. When each household takes responsibility, the entire community becomes more resilient. Whether this season brings major storms or passes quietly, let us not leave our safety to chance. Every step you take now can help save lives and reduce hardship later.

Let us move forward together, prepared and united.

Stay alert. Stay informed. Stay safe!

ANTI-MONEY LAUNDERING COMMITTEE HOSTS SERIES OF NATIONAL MONEY LAUNDERING/ TERRORISM FINANCING / PROLIFERATION FINANCING RISK ASSESSMENT WORKSHOPS FOR THE TURKS AND CAICOS ISLANDS

The Anti-Money Laundering Committee (AMLC) hosted a series of workshops from May 5-13, 2025, aimed at identifying and updating our understanding of the Money Laundering (ML), Terrorism Financing (TF) and Proliferation Financing (PF) risks to the Turks and Caicos Islands.

In an effort to bolster national ML, TF, and PF risk understanding and mitigation, the AMLC is pleased to announce a series of multi-stakeholder workshops as part of the Turks and Caicos Islands' comprehensive ML, TF, and PF National Risk Assessment initiative which is critical not just for regulatory compliance, but for national security, economic stability and good governance.

The workshops held from May 5-13, 2025 were designed to gather empirical and qualitative information from local law enforcement, regulatory supervisors, private sector stakeholders, and related agencies to identify and understand the nature and extend of risks posed to Turks and Caicos Islands and by extension the global financial system from ML, TF and PF. The National Risk Assessment

currently being undertaken in the Islands includes an assessment of major proceeds-generating offences, vulnerabilities in the products and services of the financial and non-financial sectors, not-for-profit organizations, and virtual asset service providers. By engaging diverse perspectives and expertise from across sectors, these workshops play a crucial role in fostering a proactive approach to risk management.

"We are excited to launch these workshops as a vital component of our National Risk Assessment strategy. By harnessing the collective knowledge and experience of stakeholders, we aimed to strengthen our ability to mitigate risks effectively. It's not just about checking boxes or meeting global standards. It's about building a system that works for us, one that is smart, responsive, and resilient." said Mrs. Kenisha Bacchus, Managing Director (Ag) of the Turks and Caicos Islands Financial Services Commission and Deputy Chair of the AMLC, who opened the workshops.

Hon. Rhondalee Braithwaite Knowles OBE KC, Chair of the AMLC said, "The outcomes of

these workshops and others that will be held focused on private sector stakeholders, will inform our advice to the Cabinet on the relevant policies, with a view to strengthening the Turks and Caicos Islands' legal and regulatory frameworks, and support the development of an updated national AML/CFT/CPF strategy that is responsive, targeted, and effective."

This month's workshops focused on key areas such as the proceeds generated by corrup-

tion, human smuggling, drug trafficking, and foreign-generated offences as well as sectors such as banking, real estate, trust and corporate services providers, etc. leveraging insights to develop actionable strategies and policies.

Participants had the opportunity to contribute their expertise towards shaping resilient frameworks that safeguard the Turks and Caicos Islands' reputation as a well-regulated, secure, and stable economy.

Beyond Stigma: The Growing Culture of Care in Turks & Caicos

An OpEd by Lizzie Foster

With May behind us, the momentum of Mental Health Awareness Month carries forward, as individuals and organizations across the Turks and Caicos Islands continue to invest in creating cultures of care.

These conversations are no longer fleeting headlines or awareness campaigns confined to a calendar—they are seeds of hope taking root in workplaces, schools, and communities island-wide.

With rapid development, increased tourism, rising crime, and growing economic pressures, the need to address mental health has never been more urgent. Yet despite these challenges, many local organizations are stepping forward, creating environments where employees feel seen, supported, and understood.

For years, stigma has kept these conversations in the shadows. It told people that seeking help was a sign of weakness, that their struggles were personal failings to be hidden away. But the truth is that mental health challenges—whether anxiety, depression, ADHD, autism, or trauma—are not flaws; they are part of the human experience. Breaking this cycle of silence requires more than awareness—it de-

mands consistent action and care that honors the whole person.

In recent months, that shift has become increasingly visible. More businesses across the islands are investing in the mental well-being of their teams, recognizing that healthier minds create stronger workplaces. From Grace Bay Resorts to Wymara Resort, Ambergris Cay Resort, and the Alexandra Resort, companies are taking real steps to prioritize mental health.

Grace Bay Resorts has taken meaningful steps to prioritize the mental health of its staff in both policy and practice. Joanna Fortunate, Director of Human Resources, shares: “This initiative has been both a fulfilling investment and a meaningful way to support our team’s well-being. It strengthens our workplace culture and our ability to attract and retain talented individuals.”

The Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force (RTCIPF) is also leading by example. Through its ongoing wellness initiative, Healing from Within, the RTCIPF has deepened its commitment to officer well-being with sessions focused on emotional resilience, inner healing, and team building—each one designed with the unique pressures of law enforcement in mind.

“As officers, we face daily pressures that often go unseen,” shares Odessa Forbes, Training Manager. “Healing from Within’ is about creating a safe space where our team can reflect, reconnect, and recharge. Mental wellness is not a luxury—it’s a necessity, and management at the RTCIPF is proud to lead the way in prioritizing it.”

Even beyond hospitality and law enforcement, organizations such as CIBC Bank and the Turks and Caicos Real Estate Association (TCREA) have recognized the value of fostering cultures of support and resilience. TCREA recently hosted a workshop for their agents.

“With Mental Health Month coming to a close, we’d like to thank Lizzie and Lorraine for sharing that extremely timely session with us,” said Latoya Jones-Harvey, Vice President of TCREA. “Agents felt seen and heard and identified with the real-time exercises provided.”

Workshops like these often begin with uncertainty—some wonder if the tools offered will truly help, or if it’s just another box to tick. But as conversations unfold, something shifts. Participants hear stories that resonate with their own, learn new practices that bring relief, and see themselves reflected in one another. These gatherings become

more than workshops; they become spaces of shared growth, understanding, and genuine care.

This collective effort also extends to the youngest members of the community. At Project BREATHE—an event led by Barbara’s Lighthouse—teens were given the chance to share their perspectives and explore their mental well-being. “Project BREATHE was more than an event—it was a call to action,” said Selena Grant, President and Founder. “It’s about creating lasting change and ensuring that youth mental health is a national priority.”

Amidst these efforts, The Elephant Rooms has been proud to stand alongside so many others. Our team of specialists—including DBT therapists, mindfulness coaches, somatic therapists, registered behavior technicians, and nutrition and lifestyle experts—works to create spaces where every person feels safe and supported.

We offer workshops and therapeutic services for stress, burnout, multiculturalism, grief, trauma, and emotional regulation, as well as dedicated support for neurodivergent individuals, including those with ADHD and autism.

“Understanding and accepting who we are is beautiful, and we all hope to experience the sense of contentment and peace in this journey we call life,” shares Maxcia Williams-Rigby, a Registered Behavior Technician with our team.

As we enter June, we know these conversations must continue. Because investing in mental health is not about a single month—it’s about building a future where everyone feels safe to be themselves, where care and compassion are woven into the fabric of our workplaces and communities.

This month also marks Men’s Health Awareness Month—a timely reminder that mental health conversations must include the unique emotional burdens men often carry in silence. Let us continue to create brave spaces where men feel just as free to speak, to feel, and to heal. Because when we extend care to every corner of our community, we strengthen the whole.

The Trouvadore: The Shipwreck That Shaped a Nation

In August 1841, La Trouvadore was illegally transporting nearly 200 enslaved Africans from Africa to Cuba, despite the abolition of the transatlantic slave trade by the British Empire in 1807. As the vessel neared East Caicos, it struck a reef and sank. In a rare outcome for the time, almost all of the Africans aboard survived the wreck and swam ashore. Once on land, the survivors were taken into British custody in Grand Turk. Because slavery had been abolished across British territories, they were not re-enslaved, but instead liberated under British colonial law. Many would remain in the islands, where they integrated into local society and left an indelible mark on the cultural landscape.

A Hidden Chapter

For generations, the story of the Trouvadore was kept alive through oral history. Families in Grand Turk and Salt Cay passed down tales of African ancestors who arrived via shipwreck. However, the absence of official records or physical evidence kept the story on the fringes of public knowledge.

That changed in the early 2000s, when a joint team of archaeologists and marine scientists, led by the Turks and Caicos National Museum, along with support from the Smithsonian Institution and NOAA, embarked on a project to locate the lost vessel. In 2004, they announced the discovery of what was believed to be the remains of La Trouvadore off the coast of East Caicos. The find confirmed one of the most important, and least documented, episodes in the country's heritage.

From Tragedy, a Legacy


The survivors of the Trouvadore are believed to have played a significant role in shaping the demographic and cultural identity of the Turks and Caicos Islands. Many of today's Turks and Caicos Islanders can trace their ancestry back to those nearly 200 souls who emerged from the sea not as captives, but as free people on a new land.

Elements of African heritage, from bush medicine and rhythmic drumming to communal storytelling, bear the imprint of these unexpected settlers. For many families, the story is personal, rooted in bloodlines, surnames, and spiritual beliefs handed down through generations.

Memory and Meaning

The Trouvadore reminds us that the roots of Turks and Caicos are not just colonial or European—they are African. It is a story of endurance and dignity, of people who, even in the face of dehumanisation, survived, rebuilt, and helped shape a nation.

Though time may erode wood and sail, the impact of La Trouvadore is etched in the living memory of a people who turned a shipwreck into a new beginning—and helped shape a nation from its wreckage.

public health risk remains low. These measures help ensure timely detection and response to any potential developments.

Protecting Your Health and Our Community

The Ministry reminds all residents and visitors of the importance of maintaining general infection prevention and control (IPC) measures, especially in areas where respiratory illnesses are circulating. These include:

- Frequent handwashing with soap and water or using hand sanitiser when on the go
- Wearing masks in crowded or poorly ventilated indoor spaces
- Practising respiratory etiquette, such as covering coughs and sneezes
- Staying home when feeling unwell and avoiding close contact with others

Ensure vaccination is up to date, particularly for COVID-19 and influenza. Influenza vaccinations are

available at Primary Health Care Clinics across the Turks and Caicos Islands.

When to Seek Medical Care
Seek immediate medical attention if you or someone in your care experiences:

- Difficulty breathing
- Chest pain or pressure
- Confusion or difficulty waking up
- Persistent fever or other severe symptoms

Protecting Vulnerable Groups

Extra care should be taken to protect those at higher risk of severe illness, including:

- Older adults (60+ years)
- People with chronic illnesses such as diabetes, heart disease, or asthma
- Pregnant women
- Individuals who are immunocompromised

Caregivers and family members are encouraged to ensure that vulnerable individuals are up to date with vaccinations and are supported in minimising exposure to illness.

The Ministry of Health will continue to keep the public informed as more data becomes available and reaffirms its commitment to safeguarding the health and well-being of everyone in the Turks and Caicos Islands.

The Ministry of Health wishes to inform the public that it is closely monitoring the recently identified SARS-CoV-2 variant NB.1.8.1, which has been designated as a Variant

Under Monitoring (VUM) by the World Health Organisation (WHO).

This classification calls for enhanced monitoring and surveillance, though current evidence indicates that the

DECR Launches Public Survey on Marine Activity Management in the Turks and Caicos Islands

The Department of Environment and Coastal Resources (DECR) is inviting the public to take part in an online survey aimed at promoting the safe and sustainable management of marine activities across the Turks and Caicos Islands (TCI).

This initiative builds on a series of community workshops hosted by DECR in July 2024, which focused particularly on the use of jet skis and other marine recreational activ-

ities. The department is expanding its outreach to gather wider public input and ensure that all ocean users, residents, businesses, and visitors have a voice in shaping future marine policies.

The survey is part of a broader effort to implement Marine Spatial Planning (MSP) in TCI. MSP is a globally recognised approach that uses scientific evidence and stakeholder input to balance the diverse uses

of marine environments reducing conflicts and supporting sustainable development.

The deadline to complete the survey is 22 June 2025. Full details and access to the survey can be found on the flyer below.

Responses collected from the online survey, along with insights gathered during the 2024 workshops, will directly inform future planning and decision-making processes con-

cerning marine activity in TCI waters.

Can vaccines protect against dementia?

I had grown fond of an elderly patient who was living with dementia. Her family took such good care of her. Her hair was always nicely done, the grey strands glistening like silverware because of the copious petroleum jelly. Her neck, white as chalk, always seemed freshly dusted with a soothing scented powder.

If I ever develop dementia, I hope this is how my loved ones will be there for me, with all the trials that will come at moments when I am nothing like my usual self, restless, unable to sleep, confused, and even hostile. Other days, I will be pleasant and lucid, greeting everyone politely.

WHAT IS DEMENTIA?

The World Health Organisation (WHO) describes dementia as a collection of signs and symptoms caused by different diseases that destroy the brain over time. There are about 10 million new cases of dementia annually worldwide.

The effects include a breakdown in the ability to process one's thoughts. Features of dementia include changes in mood, ability to control emotions and behaviour. The most common cause of dementia is Alzheimer's disease, which results from a build-up of plaques or 'coating' on brain cells.

Although there is no cure for dementia, a number of medications can help slow disease progression and improve quality of life. Persons are at increased risk for dementia when they are age 65 years or

older, smoking, drinking too much alcohol, lacking regular exercise, overweight, or socially isolated.

Vaccine against shingles and its positive 'side effect' against dementia

A vaccine against shingles has been shown to decrease the risk of dementia by 20 per cent over a seven-year period. Researchers from Stanford University, USA, alongside collaborators from Germany and Austria suggest that "the Zoster vaccine will be both far more effective as well as cost-effective in preventing or delaying dementia than existing pharmaceutical interventions."

A vaccine is usually designed to protect us from an infectious disease. Potential side effects of vaccines include pain, redness, and fever, or a more serious allergic reaction. Rare side effects include Guillain-Barré Syndrome (GBS), an excessive immune reaction that damages nerves and occurs at a rate of about one case per million persons vaccinated against flu, for example.

GBS occurs more commonly after natural infection from viruses and bacteria than from vaccination.

The Stanford University researchers looked at electronic health records of over 280,000 persons in Wales to compare persons who received the vaccine against shingles and those who did not.

The researchers were careful to demonstrate in their analyses that the protective effects seen were not because of better

health-seeking behaviours in people who tend to get vaccinated, as health-seeking behaviours were similar between those who got the shingles vaccine and those who did not.

Outside of shingles, the protection was specific to dementia, as no protective effect was demonstrated for the other ten leading causes of death in Wales.

EFFECTIVENESS OF THE SHINGLES VACCINE

'Shingles' or herpes zoster, caused by the same virus that causes chickenpox (the Varicella zoster virus), is common among the elderly, or persons with a weakened immune system. Shingles occurs as an itchy, burning or painful rash in a localised area of the body, and results from reactivation of the virus that stays dormant or quiet in the nerves. One in three persons who get chickenpox later develop shingles.

The shingles vaccine in this study is made from weakened live virus. The vaccine against chickenpox should not be given to someone to prevent shingles. Although the weakened virus used to make up both vaccines is the same, the amount of virus in the two vaccines is different.

The 15-times higher amount of virus in the zoster vaccine makes it more effective in persons over age 50 years who have an ageing immune system. A newer shingles vaccine does not have the weakened live virus and is made of proteins resembling parts of the virus.

This year the shingles vaccine became available in the private sector in Jamaica. The older shingles vaccine is about 50 per cent effective against shingles, compared to the newer vaccine that is over 90 per cent effective. The shingles vaccine can be given whether the person has had shingles before or not.



cause can improve both heart and sexual health.

4. CHANGES IN URINATION

Soldier arrested in Suriname after body of man found in parked vehicle

Police in Suriname say a 36-year-old soldier has been arrested as they investigate the death of a man, whose body was found in a vehicle with a gunshot wound earlier this month.

The Police Public Relations

said that the matter had been investigated by the Capital Crimes department, in collaboration with the Paramaribo Investigation Assistance Team and the intelligence service of the Suriname Police Force.

It said that the soldier, who is attached to the National Security Directorate, has been arrested and after consultation with the Public Prosecution Service, was transferred to the Military Police as the investigation continues by a

joint team of the police and the Military Police.

The police said that an autopsy will be conducted on the body of the man to determine the cause of his death. The man's body was found in the vehicle on June 2.

UK sanctions two Israeli ministers as it ramps up pressure over Gaza

Two Israeli government ministers, Itamar Ben-Gvir and Bezalel Smotrich, have been sanctioned by the UK because of their comments on Gaza.

Mr Ben-Gvir, the security minister, and Mr Smotrich, the finance minister in Benjamin Netanyahu's coalition government will both face a travel ban and see their assets frozen.

The move comes as the UK and other Western nations seek to ramp up pressure on Israel's government amid the ongoing war in Gaza.

Israel's foreign affairs minister Gideon Sa'ar said it was "outrageous that elected representatives and members of the government are subjected to these kind of measures".

He added: "I discussed it earlier today with PM Netanyahu and we will hold a special government meeting early next week to decide on our response to this unacceptable decision."

Mr Smotrich and Mr Ben-Gvir both belong to right wing parties which help to prop up Mr Netanyahu's fragile coalition government.

Both have been criticised for

their hardline stance on the war in Gaza.

Mr Smotrich has campaigned against allowing aid into Gaza, while Mr Ben-Gvir has called for Gaza's people to be resettled from the territory.

The UK and its allies have increased pressure on Israel in recent months amid ongoing aid shortages in Gaza, as well as suggestions it could launch a new large-scale offensive into the territory.

Reports suggest only scarce

amounts of aid are making their way into the hands of Gazans, amid a new aid initiative backed by the US and Israel, instead of the previous UN-run programme.

The slow flow of food and medicines has prompted warnings of famine and starvation among the territory's population.

In May, Foreign Secretary David Lammy paused negotiations towards a UK trade deal with Israel as the Government

sought to pressure Israel to abandon its planned offensive into Gaza.

Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer, France's president Emmanuel Macron and Canada's prime minister Mark Carney also wrote a joint statement last month warning that Israel's leaders risked "breaching International Humanitarian Law" and calling for more aid to be allowed into Gaza.

Mr Netanyahu responded by claiming the three leaders were on the "wrong side" of history.

In September last year, the Government halted 30 out of around 350 arms sales licences to Israel, for fear they may be used for war crimes.

Ministers insist that this means F-35 fighter jets used by Israel no longer receive replacement parts from the UK, and no UK-made bombs or ammunition are used in Gaza.

Lord David Cameron has previously said he considered sanctioning both Israeli ministers in his final days as foreign secretary in Rishi Sunak's Conservative government.

Haiti's domestic flights resume, sparking both hope and skepticism

Haiti will resume service of domestic flights at Toussaint Louverture International Airport on June 12, re-connecting Port-au-Prince with provincial cities including Cap-Haïtien, Jacmel, Les Cayes and Jérémie. The move comes as the country remains under a U.S. commercial flight ban. Sunrise Airways will operate the flights under an agreement with the Haitian government. Officials say the plan is intended to restore internal connectivity, support economic recovery, and signal to international partners that the country is working toward normalization despite the crisis.

"This is an advancement that will allow citizens to resume their activities and facilitate international transactions," said Prime Minister Alix Didier Fils-Aimé during the signing ceremony.

The resumption is being touted as the first major effort to reinvigorate domestic aviation since security issues shuttered Haiti's airports earlier this year. In February 2024, flights were suspended for nearly three months after escalating violence forced airspace closures. On November 11, 2024, airlines like JetBlue and Spir-

it halted operations when aircrafts came under gunfire near Port-au-Prince airport. Since then, no international commercial flights have returned to the capital.

Yves François Ducarmel, Director General of the National Airport Authority (AAN), said the restart represents more than resumed service—it is a test of Haiti's resilience.

"This symbolizes determination and hope," Ducarmel said. "It's a collective commitment to reconnect people, revive tourism, and strengthen internal trade routes."

Mixed reactions as residents are hopeful but cautious

Some citizens welcomed the news. Jane Manuel, a Haitian living in New Jersey, said the decision will offer greater flexibility to those traveling between the capital and rural regions. "I think it's good news," she told The Haitian Times. "It helps people who would otherwise be stuck. There's no perfect time for travel when insecurity is ongoing, but mobility is still a need."

Others expressed concern about safety and affordability. Djinie Metellus, a resident of Carrefour—Port-au-Prince, said the move lacks meaning-

ful impact without real progress on the security front.

"This is an advancement that will allow citizens to resume their activities and facilitate international transactions through the airport."

"This doesn't solve the problem," she said. "Airfare is too expensive for most Haitians. Last year, a round-trip ticket from Cap-Haïtien to Port-au-Prince was \$298. That's not accessible."

Officials have not yet announced fares for the resumed flights. Additionally, uncertainty remains around infrastructure readiness and service consistency.

The U.S. commercial flight ban on Port-au-Prince remains in effect.

The domestic relaunch comes as Haiti continues to grapple with a U.S. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) ban on American carriers operating in its airspace. Imposed in November 2024 after gang gunfire struck planes near the Port-au-Prince airport, the ban was initially temporary but has now been extended through September 2025.

The FAA has extended its ban on U.S. flights to Port-au-Prince through September 2025, keeping Haiti's capital disconnected from direct American air travel.

Despite security reinforcements around the airport—including mili-

tary container barricades and housing clearances—international carriers have not resumed service. Haitian officials hope the domestic relaunch will signal readiness and eventually prompt U.S. and other foreign airlines to return.

"We are working to ensure that commercial flights to the regions become the first step toward resuming international travel," Prime Minister Fils-Aimé said.

Domestic relaunch in the shadow of broader travel restrictions

Complicating matters further, the U.S. on June 4 announced new immigration restrictions targeting countries, including Haiti, that pose "high risks in traveler screening and verification." The measure, signed by President Donald Trump, is set to take effect June 9 and further limits visa approvals for Haitians.

The Haitian Ministry of Foreign Affairs said it would pursue diplomatic dialogue to reduce the impact of the new restrictions. Officials stressed that these limitations could worsen conditions for families and professionals who rely on international travel for survival and livelihood.

"We call on our partners for an open discussion," the ministry said in a statement, "to ensure that this decision does not worsen the situation for many Haitians."

Jamaica To Phase Out Cotton Banknotes

The Bank of Jamaica (BOJ) is reminding Jamaicans that cotton banknotes will no longer be legal tender after 1 July 2025, as the country continues its transition to the more durable polymer currency.

Businesses and individuals are therefore being urged to continue accepting and using the cotton notes for transactions up to and including 30 June, 2025.

To facilitate the transition, the BOJ has confirmed that it is exchanging old cotton notes for the new polymer versions and will continue doing so indefinitely beyond the July 1 deadline.

In addition, deposit-taking institutions (DTIs) have committed to accepting the cotton notes from their



customers over the counter and, in some cases, via ATMs, until at least the end of July 2025.

"Businesses and individuals can therefore rest assured that they

will be able to deposit cotton banknotes to their bank accounts or exchange them for new polymer banknotes at their respective DTIs," the central bank said in a release.

The BOJ is encouraging the public to contact their respective financial institutions for details on exchange and deposit options as the deadline approaches.

Local Jiu Jitsu Champion Seeks Sponsorships for Summer Tournament in Chicago

Local Brazilian Jiu Jitsu athlete and coach Norman Saunders is seeking sponsorship to compete in the 2024 IBJJF (International Brazilian Jiu Jitsu Federation) Chicago Summer Open this August.

Saunders, who trains and coaches at TCI BJJ — the Turks and Caicos Islands’ only Brazilian Jiu Jitsu gym — has earned back-to-back gold medals at the Chicago Summer Open over the past two years. Competing against over 20 athletes in his division each year, he won all eight of his matches across the two tournaments, with six victories coming by submission.

“This is a big opportunity not just for me, but for the growth of the sport in TCI,” he said. “Any support would go a long way in helping me represent the island and continue this journey.”

Grand Slam Track cancels Los Angeles meet – reports

"I told the team it's not just about volleyball — it's about building character. And how they responded to adversity would define who they are."

The response was clear: Wesley Methodist came back stronger, more focused, and ultimately, victorious. Looking ahead, Myrie is hopeful that the tournament will expand in 2026, with more schools joining and the potential for separate boys' and girls' divisions. Interest is already growing, with schools like Holy Family expressing their intent to compete next year. "The level of talent on display this year — especially among the girls — was impressive. With continued support, I believe we can grow this into something even more impactful for school sports in the Turks and Caicos Islands."

For now, the trophy stays with Wesley Methodist — the undisputed volleyball kings of high school sports.

Turks and Caicos Names Team for NACAC Age Group Championships

The Turks and Caicos Islands have officially selected the young athletes who will represent the country at the upcoming NACAC Age Group U13 & U15 Championships, to be held in Managua, Nicaragua, from July 4 to 6.

The final team was chosen following a competitive trial meet hosted at the National Stadium on Saturday, May 1. Athletes in the Under 13 and Under 15 age groups competed across multiple events, with points accumulated to determine the overall standings. In line with NACAC rules, only the top two athletes from

each category will move on to represent the Turks and Caicos Islands at the international level.

Leading the Under 13 boys' division was Rozay Cox, who earned an impressive 2,871 points to secure first place. He was closely followed by DeShawn Clarke, who totaled 2,699 points to claim the second and final qualifying spot. Third place went to Duntae Outten with 2,345 points, a strong performance that unfortunately falls short of the team requirement.

In the Under 13 girls' category, Jamia Robinson emerged as the standout

athlete, accumulating 2,119 points. Steasy Lolo secured the second spot with 1,989 points, narrowly edging out Aaliyah Williams, who finished third with 1,987 points—just two points shy of qualification.

The Under 15 boys competition featured high-scoring performances, led by Djaffson Charles with 3,781 points. Makai Forbes followed closely with 3,659 points to lock in the second team spot. Dadrian Malbranche claimed third with 3,362 points, a solid showing in a very competitive field.
