Wurdale Fire Brigade Enhances Driveways and Parking with New Landscaping

The Wurdale Fire Brigade is proud to unveil a major improvement to the fire station's driveways and frontage, a project that not only enhances functionality but also improves the appearance and accessibility of the station. Thanks to the hard work of the brigade, the support of the local community, and the expertise of Greater Coastal Landscaping, the station's two driveways now feature smooth, flat integration with the road, additional parking spaces, and improved drainage to ensure long-term durability.

This transformative project was made possible through a combination of funding and support. Three-quarters of the cost was covered by a CFA Land and Building Services VESEP (Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program) Grant, a vital initiative that provides essential funding for improving emergency services infrastructure. The remaining one-third was funded through

the Wurdale Fire Brigade's own fundraising efforts, which were generously supported by the local community. The Brigade extends its sincerest thanks to everyone who contributed to making this project a reality.

The landscaping work was undertaken by Anthony Young of

Greater Coastal Landscaping, whose skill and dedication have resulted in an exceptional outcome. The new driveways provide smooth and reliable access for fire trucks and other emergency vehicles, ensuring that the Brigade can respond promptly to incidents without delays caused by uneven or inadequate surfaces. The additional parking spaces will also make it easier for members to attend the station during emergencies and training sessions, while the improved drainage under the entire frontage eliminates the risk of water pooling and damage during heavy rain.

Outgoing Captain Rob Wright deserves special recognition for his leadership in arranging this project. Rob's vision and determination ensured the project moved forward, leaving a lasting legacy for the Brigade and the Wurdale community. As Captain, Rob prioritised the safety and efficiency of the Brigade, and this project is a testament to his commitment. The Brigade is incredibly grateful for his service and for pushing this important improvement through to completion before his tenure ended.

Treasurer Chris Trotter also played a critical role in the success of this initiative. Chris was responsible for managing the financial arrangements, including applying for and processing the VESEP grant and overseeing the Brigade's contribution of funds raised through community efforts. Her meticulous work ensured that every aspect of the financial process was handled smoothly, allowing the Brigade to focus on the practical side of the



project.

The Brigade would also like to thank the CFA for their continued support through the VESEP Grant Program, which provides essential funding for projects like this one. The program enables local emergency services to make critical upgrades to their facilities and equipment, ensuring they can continue to serve their communities effectively. The Wurdale Fire Brigade is proud to be part of a wider network of CFA Brigades that benefit from this important initiative.

Finally, the Wurdale Fire Brigade extends its deepest gratitude to the local community. Without the ongoing support of local residents, businesses, and donors, projects like this would not be possible. Community Bank Bus to Cease Following Shire Fleet Withdrawal

The Winchelsea Community Bank Bus, which has helped so many local groups get out and about over the past decade, will soon be retired following changes to the Surf Coast Shire's community transport program.

Back in 2014, the Community Bank purchased its first bus after recognising that transport was a major barrier for groups like the Winchelsea Primary School and other local community groups and organisations. Hiring a commercial bus from Geelong or Colac was often too expensive, meaning many



events and excursions simply couldn't happen. The Community Bank stepped in and funded a locally owned based bus so that the community could stay connected and mobile.

The Community Bank engaged the Surf Coast Shire to manage the bus as the logistics and costs associated with insurance and regulatory maintenance and coordinating bus services wasn't viable and could easily be adopted into the existing shire fleet.

Unfortunately, this arrangement is coming to an end as the Community Bus program is scheduled to cease in September 2025. The Shire has confirmed that its bus fleet has reached the end of its life and is no longer viable to maintain, particularly with rising insurance and compliance costs around volunteer drivers.

Although we're disappointed by the decision to wind down the program, we understand the challenges involved. The good news is that the Shire will now be



offering subsidies for groups to hire private buses during the transition period. More information about this will be available through their website and should help local clubs and organisations continue to organise transport when they need it.

While the Community Bank Bus won't be on the road anymore, the Community Bank remains committed to supporting Winchelsea and its surrounds. Local groups can still apply for help through our quarterly Community Investment Program, which continues to fund grassroots projects that make a difference.

A huge thanks to everyone who's used, driven or supported the Community Bank Bus over the years, you've helped make it something really special.

Change To Road Rule From 1st July

RACV is reminding Victorian motorists that from Tuesday 1 July 2025, they will be required to slow down to 40 kilometres per hour when passing incident response vehicles that display flashing lights of any colour.

The change, announced in April this year, has been welcomed by RACV and its roadside assistance team, following a two-year campaign to review Road Rule 79A.

RACV General Manager Automotive Services Makarla Cole urged motorists to be aware of the rule change so that they could create the safest environment possible for roadside and incident response workers.

"We're grateful that the Victorian State Government has made this change to improve the safety outcomes and working conditions of roadside and incident response workers," Ms Cole said.

Since 2017, Victorian motorists have been required to slow down to 40 kilometres per hour when passing stationary emergency services vehicles displaying red or blue flashing lights.

This rule has now been expanded to include:

- Accident towing vehicles
- · Breakdown towing services
- · Roadside assistance operators
- Peninsula Link Incident Response vehicles
- EastLink and Transurban Incident Response vehicles "Now that we have had an important and much-needed update to 79A, it's up to Victorians to do their part and ensure these vital workers can do their jobs without fear of harm and get home to their families safely," Ms Cole said.

Non-compliance with the updated 79A rule may result in a maximum fine of \$961.

Have Your Say On The Draft Council Plan, Which Sets The Strategic Direction Until 2029

Surf Coast Shire Council has released its draft Council Plan 2025-2029, which sets the strategic direction for the next four years, and is inviting the community to provide feedback.

The draft Council Plan identifies five themes, with a series of outcomes for each

- · Assets and Infrastructure
- Climate and Environmental Leadership
- · Community Wellbeing
- High Performing Council
- · Sustainable Communities

The Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan, which is integrated into the draft Council Plan, includes the following priority areas:

- Increase Healthy Eating and Active Living
- Advance Gender Equity and Address Family Violence
- Improve Mental Health and Social Connection
- Reduce Harm from Alcohol and Vaping
- Tackle the Impacts of Climate Change on Health

The draft Council Plan has been informed by extensive community engagement, including a shire-wide survey and a community panel.

"Our Council Plan sets our direction, so it's really important that it's shaped by community views," Mayor Cr Mike Bodsworth said.

"I want to thank everyone who provided input via the Our Focus Our Future survey or other means. We received more than 1,000 community contributions, which was fantastic."

The survey, undertaken between November and February, revealed a highly engaged community with clear priorities and concerns in relation to the environment, cost of living, housing affordability, roads, health and wellbeing, and the management of tourism.

Earlier this year, a 43-member community panel was also appointed with participants selected at random

according to criteria of age, gender, location and housing tenure.

To achieve a representative sample of Surf Coast Shire communities within the panel, an expression of interest was run by the project consultants to ensure independence.

"We're so grateful to the 43 community panel members who came along to the sessions and shared their different perspectives, insights and advice. It was great to hear from a diverse range of voices," Mayor Bodsworth said.

The panel spent three Saturdays in March grappling with key dilemmas

facing Council and developed principles to help shape strategic plans and inform ongoing decision making.

"All of this community feedback together has informed the development of the draft Council Plan, and we're now asking people to review it to make sure it reflects community needs and aspirations," he said.

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Gnarwarre to the UN

The April and June 2025 meetings of the Surf Coast Shire Council's (SCSC) All Abilities Advisory Committee (AAAC) were held in a hybrid format to enable AAAC voluntary members the option of attending remotely if required. The AAAC advises Council on accessibility and inclusion of people with disabilities and carers in the Council's programs, facilities and services. Some AAAC members joined the April meeting from further away than usual, with Tim Harte, AAAC Chair, joining the meeting from Berlin, Germany, at 1 am local time, to participate in the meeting.

Tim, a Gnarwarre resident, was in Berlin to attend the Global Disability Summit and Civil Society Forum. Tim joined the April AAAC meeting after the 1-day Civil Society Forum which brought together over 500 representatives from Organisations of Persons with Disabilities (OPDs) from across the globe to call for bold, systemic change in global disability inclusion. The Forum reinforced the importance of embedding disability rights and lived-experience in local governance, such as the Surf Coast Shire Council's AAAC, ensuring grassroots leadership remains central to inclusive planning and service delivery.

Tim attended the Global Disability Summit through his voluntary roles as Independent Director for the Australian Federation of Disability Organisations (AFDO), Executive Committee member of the Australian Disability and Development Consortium (ADDC) and the Pacific Regional Representative for the UN affiliated Global Network of Young Persons with Disabilities (GNYPWD). Through Tim's role as Chair of the AAAC Tim is the youngest Chair of a government disability, access & inclusion committee in Australia and is a trailblazer at local, national and global levels in the youth disability space.

Tim Harte - "What we do at Surf Coast Shire Council through the AAAC is proof that co-design and incorporating lived experience works, bringing that approach to the Global Disability Summit showed the world how governments cannot just lead on disability, access and inclusion but also save money in the long run through planning and infrastructure that caters for the full diversity of communities. Ensuring community facilities are accessible benefits everyone, from a person who uses a wheelchair, to a parent with a pram."

In June, Tim also joined and Chaired the AAAC meeting from New York during his trip to the 18th Conference of State Parties (COSP18) for the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD) at United Nations Headquarters. The time difference for New York was not quite

Council Endorses 2025-26 Budget

Surf Coast Shire Council has finalised its 2025-26 Budget and 2025-29 Revenue and Rating Plan, introducing temporary measures aimed at easing the financial burden on drought-impacted farmers and commercial/industrial ratepayers.

Following consideration of community feedback regarding the Draft Budget and Draft Revenue and Rating Plan released in April, Council voted to:

- Reduce the Farm Rate Land differential from 75% to 64%for 2025-26, which will have the effect of freezing the average rates for farm land at 2024-25 levels; and
- Reduce the Commercial/Industrial Rate Land differential from 190% to 165% for 2025-26, which will contain the rate increase for these property types.

Mayor Mike Bodsworth said the changes were about recognising the challenging economic landscape being faced by farmers and other businesses.

"Farmers have had an extremely difficult year due to the drought, and freezing rates for farm land at 2024-25 levels is one step we can take to ease financial pressure," Mayor Bodsworth said.

"We also felt it was important to acknowledge that the drought has had flow-on impacts to other businesses in the shire, who were already feeling the effects of wider cost of living pressures.

"Adjusting the rating differential for commercial and industrial ratepayers is a way we can help in the short-term."

Since the release of the draft budget, Council's forecast income for 2025-26 has increased by \$125,000 thanks to higher-than-expected Victorian Government grants commission funding.

Council voted to allocate this funding toward:

- Additional resourcing in civil operations, to help maintain assets such as roads and footpaths to a high standard; and
- An extra \$10,000 to support community houses, increasing the annual allocation per community house from \$6,000 to \$8,000.

The final budget forecasts an operating result (Unallocated Cash Surplus) of \$2.1 million. This surplus will be essential in helping the Council fund the renewal of roads, buildings and other assets as they decline over the next 10 years.

Council has budgeted for a capital works program valued at \$52.65 million, taking into account existing multi-year projects and new projects for 2025-26.

This figure includes projects funded with the assistance of the state and federal governments such as the Wurdi Baierr Aquatic and Recreation Centre in Torquay.

The budget also details Council's commitments to core services such as open space, civil and road maintenance (with a total budget of more than \$14.3 million), waste and recycling services (\$13.06 million), early years (\$4.53 million), and local libraries (\$850,500 contribution to the Geelong Regional Library Corporation).

"The budget aims to support our community and set this region up to thrive in the years ahead," Mayor Bodsworth said. "There's a strong balance between financial sustainability and investment in facilities and services our community values highly.

The final budget is available to read in full on the Council website.

- Sealed Road reseal program: \$1.6 million
- Hard court renewal: \$600,000
- Building renewal: \$800,000
- Playground equipment renewal: \$300,000
- Footpath renewal: \$255,000
- Drainage renewal: \$150,000
- Other shire wide renewal (e.g. active play, bike parks, bridges, skate parks and signage): \$530,000

By the end of the 2025-26 financial year, Council will be responsible for the upkeep of \$1.37 billion in property, infrastructure, plant and equipment.

Our annual asset renewal costs are expected to double over the next 10 years, from just over \$10 million now to more than \$21 million by 2034-35.

Barwon Water Expanding Drought Support

Farmers in our region are experiencing dry conditions, with low on-farm water supplies. To help support those affected by dry conditions, untreated water is being offered for farmland properties and recycled water to farmers and community facilities who need it, under the Barwon Water Farm Drought Relief Program.

In the Colac region, access to untreated water will be available from the Colac Water Treatment Plant or Class B recycled water from the Colac Water Reclamation Plant. In the Geelong region, Class A recycled water will be available from Armstrong Creek. Untreated and Class A recycled water should be available now. Class B recycled water will be available from mid-July.

Access to the water is not restricted to

current Barwon Water customers or those within its service area - users from anywhere may apply to access the water. Untreated water will be provided at a discounted rate to farm customers. Class A and Class B recycled water will also be available at low or no cost. Those accessing the water will need to cover water carting costs.

Applications to use the water will ask for details around intended use, the type of land the water will be used on, nearby sensitive land areas, risk assessments and soil and nutrient management. Those approved to access untreated and recycled water through the program are responsible for the appropriate use, transport, storage and distribution of the water, which needs to be carefully managed in accordance with the EPA recycled water guidelines.

Barwon Water's Farm Drought Relief Program is being delivered alongside the Victorian Government's direct drought support and Agriculture Victoria's technical and decision-making support program.

Barwon Water's in-house contact centre



is ready to support any farmer in a discussion on payment assistance options and access to the new standpipes.

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Dry Swamps And Dams Pose Toxic Weed Risk To Livestock

The green pick available on swampy land or dried up billabongs and dams may seem a boon for producers during drought and difficult seasonal conditions. However, it's important to check for toxic weeds and plants in swampy areas before allowing stock access for grazing. There are many plants that grow where the land is usually wet and rarely dried out which could cause issues.

Toxic plants that might be found in these areas include dock, soursob, fat hen, lesser loosestrife and swamp grass. Many Dock (Rumex spp.) species such as swamp dock, curled dock and yellow dock, as well as

Fat Hen (Chenopodium album) and Soursob (Oxalis pes-caprae), cause nitrate and nitrite toxicity and hyperoxaluria or oxalate toxicity. Nitrate and nitrite toxicity can cause acute collapse and death once the nitrite binds to the haemoglobin in red blood cells, stopping the haemoglobin from carrying oxygen. The mucous membranes inside an affected animal's mouth may appear brown in colour due to this binding rather than the usual pink. There is no effective treatment for the condition. Oxalate binds calcium up in the blood causing acute low blood calcium and sudden death. Calcium is essential for muscles to work properly. Early signs of oxalate toxicity include a stiff gait, staggering, lying down progressing to coma and death. These weeds are not palatable so ensuring that stock are not put in hungry and have a wider forage area and supplementary feed available, will help to mitigate the risk. Keep a close eye on your livestock and avoid putting grazing pressure on the site.

Lesser loosestrife (Lythrum hyssopifolia) is a native plant that grows well in wet and damp soils, such as swampy areas and stubble after rain. Depending on how much is eaten the toxin causes severe liver damage and death, within 24 hours up to several days later.

Affected stock will seem depressed, lethargic and show abdominal discomfort before progressing to recumbency and death. Loosestrife is not usually palatable to stock, though if there is no alternative green pick it will be eaten. If there is a large amount in the area, it is unsafe to place stock on it as the toxicity builds up.

Swamp grass (Glyceria maxima - Poa aquatica) is an introduced, very tall grass that occurs around water bodies and wetlands. It carries a very high level of cyanide in the leaves. Due to the rapid effect of cyanide when ingested, poisoning causes acute collapse and death. Unlike nitrate and nitrite toxicity, the mucous membranes of the affected animals may appear bright pink, due to the body being unable to use the oxygen carried by the red blood cells. Swamp grass is unsafe as forage.

If you are putting stock onto a new area, thoroughly check for different species of plants, look at your records to see if anything happened last time it was used and ensure stock are not put on hungry which may cause them to forage indiscriminately. If your livestock show signs of weed toxicity, remove them from the area and contact your veterinarian or local Animal Health staff for advice. These services will be delivered in partnership with a range of technical experts, including farm business advisors, livestock nutritionists, soil, water and pasture specialists and veterinarians. The program provides tailored advice through one-on-one consultations, webinars, workshops, field days, and online tools and information. Farmers anywhere in Victoria can register now for a one-onone farm advisory consultation, to take

stock and discuss the best way forward for their business. The consultation includes a session of up to 3 hours (face to face on farm or online) and follow-up call, to develop and implement a drought management action plan.

When registering for the program, participants can indicate their preferred consultant from an extensive list of experienced service providers. Find more information about available drought support at agriculture.vic.gov. au/drought or call 136 186.

Soil needed to dig deeper into microbiome research

This World Microbiome Day, Agriculture Victoria is launching an expression of interest campaign to encourage farmers to donate soil samples to a National Soil Action Plan funded research project.

Funded by the Australian and Victorian governments, the 'Soil biodiversity across landscapes' project will seek to implement priority actions from the Plan under the National Soil Strategy.

Agriculture Victoria Principal Scientist Tim Sawbridge said he hoped to attract interest from at least 50 farmers statewide.

'We are looking at what microbiomes exist in soil and how they function across natural and farmed environments. A soil microbiome is a community of microbes, bacteria, invertebrates and other life forms that live within soil. To gain a deep understanding of their role in soil health, we're wanting a broad range of samples from various production zones and agricultural industries in Victoria,' he said.

AVR is working alongside the Arthur Rylah Institute for Environmental Research (ARI) on the project to collect and analyse samples of soil from across the state. ARI has provided over 200 samples from public land, such as state forests and parks and reserves, to AVR for analysis. Samples are being taken at Agriculture Victoria's SmartFarms including over time at the existing DairySoils study* at Ellinbank SmartFarm.

To express interest in participating in the project, farmers should email soil.microbiome@agriculture.vic.gov.au by 5 pm, Tuesday 30 September.

Soil samples will be taken from a single geo-location to a depth of 10 cm and 30 cm from a small area on the farm.

The soil structure, chemistry, botanical information and DNA will be analysed and barcoded for comparison with other samples in the dataset.



Councillor Catch-Up

Equally, congratulations to all those who voted for this project to give it more than twice as much support as the other projects that were put forward - a lovely bit of support by the community for the school. I look forward to (literally!) seeing the fruits of this project as they learn to create sustainable gardens.

As indicated in past articles, the Winchelsea Place Plan aims to provide the Shire with guidance for the ongoing development and growth of the town. It is so important that those who live and work in and around the town put in your own thoughts and ideas. The survey and panel submissions have now closed, next month sees the panel get together over several sessions to thrash out to guide development of the plan. I'll be calling in too, it will be really interesting to see what comes up.

The draft Road Management Plan (RMP) for the next 4 years up to 2029 is now out for you to review. For all those who want to see the Shire focus on roads more, this is THE document for


you to pay attention to (second only to the annual budget which funds it!). Winchelsea rated satisfaction with roads lower than any other town - so what would make things better? Section 1.2.1 is well worth noting in this regard ie. that the plan has to be achievable within available budget - spending more on roads means spending less somewhere else. It's also important to note that this RMP applies only to Council-managed roads within Surf Coast Shire.

To put the RMP into context, this isn't about upgrading roads to be sealed, it isn't about adding new footpaths anything 'new' is separate. The RMP is about maintaining what's already there; defining what triggers a response, how long it should take, what the priorities are. Our roads are classified depending on the type (eq. sealed vs unsealed) and how busy they are (eg. primary vs secondary). You can see maps of how each road is classified at surfcoast.vic. gov.au/Property/Roads/About-our-roadnetwork (and note that on Google Maps all the yellow roads are State/Federal responsibility). I encourage you to take a look to see if you have strong reasons to disagree with a classification.

Most of all, I encourage you to take a look at pages 28 & 29 which specify what defects Council is required to step in to fix, and the timeframe to do so.

Something to bear in mind is section 2.6.1 which outlines the responsibilities of road users, as defined by law. In essence, you need to drive to the conditions of the road, your vehicle, and yourself regardless of posted speed limit or type of road.

As always, don't forget to report ANY road issue vou come across (on a Council road, of course) via the Shire's website and its Lodge A Request facility. It won't get fixed if the Shire doesn't know about it...

Surf Coast Shire Council invites the community to share its feedback on the draft Road Management Plan 2025-2029, which outlines how Council will manage its road maintenance obligations and defines the responsibilities of road users.

The updated draft plan outlines several key changes:

- Improves inspection and response times for roads the community uses more frequently.
- Balances the need for timely responses with current budget and staffing constraints.
- Responds to increased claims by enhancing inspection routines and ensuring regular asset checks.
- Expands the plan to include inspections of previously excluded assets.

"This is a great opportunity for the community to have their say about the updated Road Management Plan," said Cr Paul Barker.

"We want to make sure the Road Management Plan reflects the needs and priorities of the community, and we can't do that without your input."

Council developed the draft plan after conducting an internal review of the Road Management Plan 2021-2025 considering:

- Findings from a review of unsealed road maintenance.
- Results from an evaluation of Council's Civil Operations Service levels.
- Benchmarking data from similar councils.
- Community requests related to road maintenance.
- Current staffing and financial resources.
- The Municipal Association of Victoria template used across all Victorian councils.

Council reviews and updates the Road Management Plan every four years, following each Council election, to ensure it reflects current needs and expectations.

"This plan directly affects how we respond to issues on our roads," said Cr Barker.

"By having your say now, you can help us improve the system for everyone."

Feedback for the draft Road Management Plan 2025-2029 will close on Friday 25 July.

Bennett Reserve Landscape Upgrade Proposal

by Growing Winchelsea's 'Winchelsea Arboretum Trail Group'



Winchelsea Arboretum Trail Group has proposed upgrading of Bennett Reserve, aiming to help activate the space through tree planting and landscaping.

The proposal aligns with the group's vision for enhancing existing treed sites in the town, developing new treed sites and linking the sites via 'greenways'. The arboretum trail group is a sub-committee of Growing Winchelsea and the Bennett Reserve project is being led by Growing Winchelsea with project planning support from the Surf Coast Shire Council.

It follows the successful community led landscape upgrade of the reserve on the corner of Mercer and Barkly Streets. The community proposal for Bennett Reserve was lodged via Council's Community Project Proposal Portal (surfcoast.vic.gov. au/CommunityProjects) and then referred to the Community Project Development Program for further investigation support.

Arboretum trail group members met with Council officers in January 2025 and discussed ideas for 'light touch' landscape enhancement. Council arborists have now assessed existing trees on site and identified some in poor health that need to be removed and others to be remediated.

These works will take place late June / early July. Most of the existing trees will remain. A draft landscape plan will be developed proposing planting of new trees, identifying of native grasses that could be isolated for remediation and installation of one or two picnic tables to encourage people to spend time in the reserve. The working group will aim to share the draft plan with the community in September 2025. Winchelsea Arboretum Trail Group will then seek funding for the landscape upgrade works.

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
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Surf Coast Shire Council has received its results from the 2025 Victorian Local Government Community Satisfaction Survey.

Based on this year's responses, Council continues to rate higher than the statewide average and ahead of similar large rural councils in perceptions of overall performance and across almost all measures.

Council's overall performance score of 57 is the same as 2024, ranking ahead of the average rating of 50 for the large rural councils group, and 53 for all Victorian councils.

Waste management and customer service both received index scores of 70, rating as Council's highest performing individual areas – both well ahead of the state and group averages.

Surf Coast Shire also rated higher than the statewide and large rural council averages in the categories of overall direction, consultation and engagement, value for money, and community decisions.

Maintenance of unsealed roads (score of 46) and sealed roads (52) were rated higher than the averages for other council groups, however both rated lower than Surf Coast Shire's 2024 results.

The annual survey is commissioned by the Victorian Government, with all local governments in the state able to participate.

Independent phone surveys of 600 resident and non-resident Surf Coast Shire ratepayers were conducted earlier this year, with responses collated and analysed by JWS Research.

Australian-based call centre National Field Services made 18,388 calls to achieve the statistically valid sample of respondents.

Councillor Tony Phelps said the survey helps Council track its progress to determine areas for focus and improvement.

"Thank you to the community members who gave their time to complete the survey," Cr Phelps said.

"We aim to be a high performing Council, and this is a good way to get a snapshot of how our ratepayers think we're going.

"The responses suggest our performance is well ahead of the average Victorian council, but there's room to improve and we're still striving to get better.

"While it gives us good insight, it's important to note that this survey is one of several ways we evaluate our performance to decide our priority focus areas."

Local Artists On Show

My partner and I were living in Terang and had been looking for a house together for a few years. We aimed to find a smallish but decent house on a generous block, with the prospect of creating a beautiful garden. After searching from Kyneton to Ballarat, we settled on Winchelsea—about halfway between Terang and Melbourne.

We moved on December 1, 2024, excited by the idea of living on a lifestyle farm with Highland cows, beautiful 360-degree views, and an abundance of quality sheds. I am an artist, so one of these sheds instantly became my studio. Another became storage for paintings I have made over more than forty years. However, the property also exceeded our expectations: the Barwon River borders it. We were enchanted by the River Red Gums, the meandering river, and frequent sightings of kangaroos, wallabies, platypus, and other elusive inhabitants.

My preferred medium is oil paint, and I am exploring further study in Italy to engage with the classical traditions of oil painting at a private academy in Florence. I work across a range of genres - portraiture, landscape and still life, which enable me to explore the themes of time and memory.

Soon, however, I will begin a new series based on the river that surrounds me. My partner has already begun restoring the riverbanks: clearing gorse, blackberry, box and kikuyu, and planting native trees and grasses, with advice from the local Landcare group.

Shortly after arriving, I was invited to join a group show in Geelong, featuring other artists from across the Western District. A few of us live on rural properties; others have moved from Melbourne or further afield. The exhibiting artists are Sandra Batten

(Barwon Downs), Chris Hoggard (Warncoort), Angela Baldwin (Kawarren Otway Ranges), Michele Caithness (Alvie), Jenny Grenfell (Colac), Julie Keating (Nalangil), Viv Wheeler (Colac), Alison McIntosh (Colac), Jan Stickland (Colac), Michele Kershaw (Gerangamete), Irene Crusca (Winchelsea), and Debbie Hill (Ballarat).

Perhaps the geographical isolation of regional Victoria encourages stronger connections between people. While a certain amount of solitude is needed for creativity to manifest, the need to connect — to be part of a community — is just as critical. The distances between us are significant; we often need to drive to meet up, which is why we chose the title 12 Down the Road. Many of the artists have been inspired by the beauty around them — volcanic craters, the Otways, gardens and birds, the hinterland, shifting cloudscapes as well as light and memory.

This exhibition wouldn't exist without the huge efforts of Sandra Batten and Julie Keating, who work hard at connecting artists in the Western District through projects, exhibitions, and other gatherings.

As artists, we work across a range of media including oil painting, ceramics, printmaking, mixed media, textile art, sculpture, and installation.

12 Down the Road will be exhibited at Untether Gallery from 10.07.25 to 02.08.25.

New Policy To Help Protect Public Art Across Surf Coast Shire

A new policy will guide management, maintenance and protection of the hundreds of items of public art across Surf Coast Shire – from sculptures and murals to installations and exhibitions.

Surf Coast Shire Council resolved at its June meeting to adopt the Public Art Policy, which also sets guidelines for commissioning and acquisition of new works, and commits to protection of artist rights.

The policy was presented for Council's consideration following a period of community consultation which recorded strong support for its overall direction.

Cr Rebecca Bourke: "This new policy recognises the great value of public art in our shire, and its role in helping create sense of place, enhancing and invigorating public spaces and reflecting and helping to express our stories.

"An audit completed during 2024

identified 279 individual items of public art across our shire.

"The policy will provide a sustainable framework for the management and preservation of these existing public art assets and clear guidance on acquisition and approval of new works."

Public art is defined as including sculptures, installations, sound or music-based art excluding concerts, exhibitions in public spaces, murals, art incorporated into urban design, and projections and illuminated works.

The audit and policy were recommended for delivery under Council's Creative Places Strategy, which includes a vision for the establishment of a public art trail as a cultural tourism attraction for the shire.

The new policy aligns with principles in the National Standards for Museums and Galleries, the National Association for the Visual Arts Code of Practice, and the Copyright (Moral Rights) Amendments Act 2000.

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
