Do not despise these small beginnings, for the Lord rejoices to see the work begin, to see the plumb line in Zerubbabel's hand'.

The thing I love about Scripture Union is the whole concept of small beginnings, even from its early history. This Year Scripture Union worldwide celebrated the 150th Anniversary of the founding of the organisation and a special gathering took place in Malaysia, with representatives from 130 movements and over 120 countries.

Almost 150 years ago in late August 1867 a 31-year-old office worker called Josiah Spiers was on his holidays in Llandudno in North Wales. A rather insignificant event you might think! But as Spiers was simply strolling along the beach, as you would on holidays, he watched a group of children making a garden with pebbles and seaweed in the sand. He had one of those Holy Spirit moments and wondered, 'Why shouldn't these children make a Bible text with these pebbles in the sand?'

So, the story goes he rushes to the local shop to buy some string and pegs and calls to the children' Who will help me write a text in the sand? A dozen or so children volunteer and Josiah proceeds to trace the text from 1 John 4:8: GOD IS LOVE!

The amazing thing is that this simple, life transforming message of God's Love, continues to be communicated to children and voung people from all over Ireland today through the ministry of Scripture Union, through camps, retreats, in schools and mid-week retreats at Ovoca Manor as well as parishes and communities by our 20 staff and over 250 Volunteers. 2017 was possibly the busiest year for ministry in my 18 years as General Director. Some 1559 attended our Camps and Missions, over 1600 participated in in-school and mid-week retreats, over 10,000 people viewed the NUA Film series and several hundred participated in our Primary age ministry. Behind all these facts is the amazing impact that the same life changing message of Jesus Christ is having in the hearts of these children and young people.

Throughout this Inspire Magazine you will read uplifting stories of the diversity of this ministry and especially of the many ways God is at work by His Spirit.

I wish therefore to extend my heartfelt appreciation to all the SU Staff team, Board and Council members, all our Volunteers and to each of you our Supporters, without whom this ministry would not be possible

Moving to Ireland from Canada meant picking up my life and dropping it half a world away. It meant leaving everything behind - job, home, friends and starting fresh, with no backup plan. Full immersion. I like to think that I've made the most of my time here, that I've been able to embrace the culture and every challenging

opportunity. Through heartfelt conversations with strangers, to giving talks to groups, to the hands-on training of climbing qualifications; there was always something new happening to push us further out of our comfort zones and keep us learning and growing. When I return home, people will look for differences in me.

They'll comment when I use words like "grand" and "footpath" and remark upon the slightest change of accent. Then I'll be among my own for a short time and all the phrases I picked up here will fade away and I'll sound just like every other Canadian. But the changes that matter aren't the ones you can hear, and I look forward to the moment when a friend says "you're different".

Because that will mean that God has been working, through stretching experiences and beautiful people (you know who you are), to make me into someone better, and someone better able to do his work. I talk about God a lot while I'm here. It's the camps, the community, the place. God is clearly so present and at work here and we love to comment on it. But when I leave back to a life where God is not a word mentioned daily, will I still say it? Will I still see him, in the beauty of a different landscape and in the friends I didn't have to go far to find? When I am no longer leading camps nearly every week, and no longer have the same motivation, will I still praise him so openly? I've learned that no matter the experience, no matter the country, no matter the friends made or the jobs undertaken or the hardships endured, that God is the only constant. And I cannot wait to continue getting to know him better through whatever comes next for me.

Throughout the year one of Jasper's most used phrases to Laryssa and I was "Yeah I'm kind of throwing you in the deep end here." It was usually in relation to doing something out of our comfort zone but it also turned into a perfect metaphor for my year.

What Impact is Making?

After 3 years of hard yet exhilarating work we finally launched NUA!!! It was one of the highlights of the year having the theatre in Gonzaga College full for the premier of Episode One. That was back in March and a lot has happened since.

For those of you who are stumbling across NUA for the first time it is a high-quality production with 8 episodes covering the core questions that young people are grappling with regarding the Christian Faith. It is a very exciting and ambitious project with the potential to reach 'a generation of Irish young people and beyond' with the gospel message, primarily through the 700+ secondary schools all over Ireland.

Since the launch over 700 resource packs have been distributed and over 200 secondary schools are using the resource as part of their RE curriculum. This represents approx. 10,600 people who will engage with NUA, including 150 parish/church based groups. This autumn we have had over 20 opportunities to present NUA to RE Teachers & Chaplains around Ireland and the response has been amazing, highlighting the need for such a faith based resource for Irish youth.

We are also working on translating the resource into Spanish & French for an international impact. Already NUA has been launched through Scripture Union in America and Scripture Union Canada are preparing to launch NUA there in early 2018.

It's been so encouraging to see others excited about using NUA both here in Ireland and around the world. We are only getting started!!

We were hoping for NUA to equip young people with the ability to intelligently explore and understand the Christian message and beliefs. We wanted to encourage viewers to wrestle with the things that just don't seem to make sense. At the end of the day, we wanted NUA to have an impact—immediate and personal, as well as the long-term, life-changing experience of working out faith in Jesus. Paxton, our very own Scripture Union Intern shares her experience of using NUA on retreats in Ovoca Manor...


Running NUA at Ovoca Manor retreats is a unique experience. Every school and student are different in their life experiences and spiritual backgrounds. Typically, throughout the retreat two to three episodes are shown. The students are split into small groups, which stay



consistent with leaders and students. The leaders also run outdoor activities throughout the day providing consistency to help build relationship with the students during the short amount of time. NUA asks and answers many of the questions that young people are curious about. Having a safe neutral space to talk about these questions is valuable.

It is rewarding to hear what each young person is wrestling with at the beginning, through the content of each episode and the discussion during the small groups and see how they have been challenged by the end of the episode.

Celebrating 150 Years of Scripture Union





It was Josiah Spiers who, in 1867, started "Special Services" for children in Islington, London. "Special Services" had an informal, friendly atmosphere, lively chorus singing and exciting talks with visual aids. This was a completely new approach to working with children. This idea grew rapidly to become the Children's Special Service Mission (or C.S.S.M.).

And so it was that this new approach of youth ministry made it's way to the Irish shores of Greystones, Co Wicklow, and with it the beginning of Scripture Union in Ireland, in the year 1896!

At that time Scripture Union in Ireland was managed from Scripture Union England and Wales and this arrangement nearly lasted a whole century right up until 1980 when SU Ireland was established as an autonomous movement.

But something special had happened 4 years previous to that. In 1976 SU Ireland had hired it's very first General Director, none other than the legendary Kingsley Prescott.

One of the biggest developments in SU Ireland's history happened during the time of Kingsley. At that time they where searching for an ideal plot of land to run activities from. Kingsley said that 'After a 4 year search for a premises to cater for groups of students for residential retreats, SU was given Ovoca Manor for just £1! The goodwill of so many Christian's amazed me and allowed SU to slowly develop the Manor and the grounds so that over the years, since the late nineteen seventies, thousands of young people have been challenged to become disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ.'

So many of us have lasting memories of our time spent in Ovoca Manor, for some it has been like a spiritual home. It was Kingsley who was responsible for hiring the Harpers, namely Herbert and Jean, who will go down in Ovoca Manor history as absolute heroes. For over 25 years Herbert and Jean sustained and developed OM facilitating the faith development of thousands.

Kingsley's time was not without a few memorable incidents. There was a very unfortunate incident which lead to a brighter future. Kingsley recalling this time explains that 'following the dramatic fire that destroyed all the stock in our first shop at Northumberland Avenue, Dun Laoghaire, the SU Council agreed to purchase 87 Lr. Georges Street, Dun Laoghaire. This was a significant change being on the main street of Dun Laoghaire which helped SU relate better to the general public. At that time (before Amazon!) there was an important ministry for Christian Bookshops to supply helpful literature both for children and adults.'

Kingsley has always been known for his love of God's word which is why SU was such a good fit for him. On reflecting about what SU means to him he explained that 'in this day and age when the Bible is ignored by some and criticised by others, the verse from Psalm 119 verse 105 highlighted by SU is what SU means to me 'God's Word is a lamp to my feet and a light for my path '. I am thrilled that Christians from all different backgrounds and churches can work together at SU to emphasise basic Christian truths from the Bible and leave the difficult questions till we arrive in heaven!

Celebrating 150 Years of Scripture Union

After 20 fine years of Kingsley's leading the reigns of SU Ireland was passed to a Northern Irish fellow, his name was Robert McMullan. Many will remember Robert for his multiple decades of leading the CSSM team in Greystones and for the unique way he said the word 'cake' but many might not be aware that he lead SU for 3 years. Rob said of his time with SU that he loved 'the sense of being part of a worldwide family especially having the opportunity to attend an International Conference and meet with colleagues from around the world, who shared their stories of how God was using Scripture Union to build his kingdom in their country'.

Rob was also at the helm when yet another significant development happened down at Ovoca Manor. Rob was delighted to meet at that time the President of Ireland. He said 'the opportunity to have Uachtaran Mary McAleese to open Densmore Lodge in 1998 was very memorable. Michael Hews in his book A Tale of Two Visions, writes, "There can't be many countries in the world where a national President has come to open a Scripture Union Building. But at Ovoca Manor in the Republic of Ireland it happened twice!"

Rob also really enjoyed his travels when he worked for SU. He travelled to some wonderful places around Ireland running Sunday School Teacher Training events with the one and only Elva Byrne. They brought what they now call pop up book shops to churches around the country as well.

Rob recalls these trips as highly adventurous and sometimes treacherous, he said, 'in the days before sat nav and mobile phones we got lost, very lost!'. Rob also wanted to give a shout out to Olive Nicols and the 'two legendary Seans' (Mullarkey and Kelly) as significant SU people who helped and journeyed alongside his spell at the top.

So what does SU mean to Rob? He said that 'you don't serve on a CSSM team for 32 years and be on staff for three and not have a passion for the ministry of SU! The first thing I did as a teacher when I arrived at The King's Hospital School in 1980 was to start an SU group. When I was in Uganda recently, the largest group in the school which I visited was the Scripture Union Group. They even had the SU logo on their school sign!

Now, leading a church in Coleraine we have the privilege of being an SU partner with the local schools worker in our area. As we keep saying, not every child goes to church but every child goes to school and therefore the ministry of Scripture Union is even more important now.'

Then came our very own Jim Donnan. It was the year that Manchester United won the treble (1999) that the SU Council decided in faith, that Jim Donnan (a council member at the time), would guide SU into the future. Bearing in mind that Jim was in full time public service work, you can imagine what a significant life change this was, and so, his new role as General Director of SU wasn't official until the turn of the millennium! In Jim's 17 years in charge there has been amazing developments. If you know Jim well, you'll know that he loves to passionately share what God has done, so keeping highlights to a few was hard for him to choose.

As has been a common theme through all of the 3 Irish Directors, the development of Ovoca Manor was also a key project for Jim. The Manor had been such a blessing but it was getting a bit tired and a new vision had been cast to use the Manor mid-week for school's ministry. The funds needed to upgrade and extend the Manor were major.

Funding appeals started as early as 2005 but Jim says that in 2009 when the design was out to tender, 'that the recession hit in Ireland and the planning permission was due to expire in 2010. To be totally honest my faith in seeing the project happen was at a low ebb despite having raised almost €700,000 euro!

In October 2010 I was sitting in the office in Dun Laoghaire and received a call from the Chairperson of SU Council who said we had received a significant gift from a totally anonymous donor. Like all General Directors of Charities my head started to race with anticipation and sums like €50,000 or even €100,000 came into my mind. No, this incredibly generous donor wanted to give €1,000,000 yes one million euro to undertake this project. I sat there and simply wept with joy!'

It is simply amazing that the funds would be supplied during a recession. God works in amazing ways and through all sorts of people. The upgrade, not only of the manor house but also the addition of high rope activities, has been a major highlight for Jim but the real amazement has been the incredible up take of mid-week school retreats at Ovoca Manor. Jim explains that the development of this ministry is due in part to the kindness of one individual.

Jim loves telling this story...'Around the same time of the extension project we were reflecting on the passage in Luke 10: 5-9 where Jesus sends his disciples out to evangelise and gives them what seems like rather odd instructions. He tells them "When you enter a house, first say, 'Peace to this house.' If a man of peace is there, your peace will rest on him. ... Stay in that house, eating and drinking whatever they give you. ... Do not move around from house to house. ... Heal the sick who are there and tell them, 'The kingdom of God is near you,'"

Over the years I have been amazed at how the Lord has advanced the mission of SU through us finding this 'Person of Peace'. One such person was a very random encounter with the then Head of RE in Gonzaga College Dublin Mr Daniel Mc Neilis.

I was in the office at the photocopier when Danny called in to see Jonny Somerville and asked about a possible school retreats in Gonzaga. I overheard the conversation and subsequently contacted Danny and we started building a relationship where he shared his heart for reaching his students with the message of Jesus and wanted them to experience going to Ovoca Manor.

So, we came up with this Ignatian concept of 'Finding God in All Things' with the idea of taking these young people on an outward and inward journey of encounter with God. Combining the outdoor activities at the Manor with scripture based talks and reflection.

The first year he brought his students for a week and it was an amazing time of blessing and they have come every year since during the first two weeks in September. But this concept and mid-week retreat experience has just flourished by God's grace and now we have some 50 schools. 90% of then with a Catholic ethos, and almost 1600 young people coming from late August into the following April each year. Such is the demand for this retreat ministry that this year we made the decision to employ a full time Retreat Coordinator to run this work and provide solid spiritual content. Danny was certainly one of these Persons of Peace and he is now enjoying the Lords presence having passed away in 2015. But what a legacy he has left.'

Jim would honestly admit that a part of him thought he made the biggest mistake of his life back in January 2000 but looking back now he has no regrets, yet extremely grateful to the patience and support of his better half Barbara!! Jim simply loves SU, he says he loves how SU 'is Scripture based, it is relational, and volunteer based. It is ecumenical and how we have seen the impact of that through working with all the churches and especially the Catholic Diocese and developing initiatives like Luke the Book, Ember Leadership and Faith programme, Pentecost project, NUA Film series etc.

Through all this I have been privileged to meet and have fellowship with people from all backgrounds and share the joy of seeing hundreds of young people experiencing a personal encounter with Jesus.'

The SU team has grown over the years and Jim has worked tirelessly to get the most out of the resources that we have. His ecumenical heart and team focus has helped steer SU down new exciting paths but at the heart of it all is the SU volunteers. As current director Jim should of course have the final word and his final word is one of thanks,

'a heartfelt thanks to all our volunteers, prayer partners and financial donors without whom this ministry could not have happened.'



Celebrating 150 Years of Scripture Union



Global (Assembly

10th - 14th November 2017 Putrajaya, Malaysia

In 1867 Josiah Spiers spoke to 15 children in a drawing room in Islington, London, and began the work of sharing the Christian message with children in a way that related to their real needs. This led to the founding of the Children's Special Service Mission (CSSM) which was later to become "Scripture Union". 150 years later, on the 9th November, two of our managers, Emma and Jonny, boarded a plane heading towards Scripture Union's Global Assembly and 150th Celebration in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

This was always going to be an exciting conference to be part of and a chance to gain a better understanding of this global organisation we are a small part of (staff and volunteers), Jonny and Emma did not expect to be so humbled to be seated in a room with SU representatives from 120 countries and to share in the common vision, and struggle, of faithfully sharing God's word with the communities they are placed in. It was inspiring to be seated in a room and sharing meals with representatives from the larger movements in Australia who have over 800 staff, to sharing lunch with men from South Sudan with hearts breaking for the political situations in their Country: both movements recognising that Christ is the hope for their nation.

Jonny was offered the amazing opportunity to be able to share NUA and his vision for the film series and how it can be a blessing to other SU movements. He was able to show a full episode simultaneously in English, Spanish and French and over 30 countries seem keen to use NUA, from as far east as Japan who want to dub the material, African countries, nations in South America, around Europe and down under, in Australia. Jonny was also afforded the opportunity to speak at one of the workshops which gave the time needed to explore in detail how other movements could roll NUA out in their context.

We are Scripture Union and the leadership team ensured that the conference attendees were focused on how the Bible is the centre of SU's ministry. They were reminded how Josiah Spiers studied the Bible, how that in the 1880's children who were part of SU had a membership card (with Psalm 118 on it) and how on the 50 year anniversary in 1929, SU adopted Psalm 119 as a central verse to minster from. Wendy Strachan asked "How can we imagine fresh ways to help people hear God speak through His word into their context?" Terry Williams challenged all movements to think whether they are creating a space where children can connect with the creator of the universe. "Are we coming to our children with an agenda or are we creating space?". Joe Kapolyo asked which groups are being excluded from hearing the gospel and CB Samuel guestioned whether we teach "the Jesus of the Bible" or "the Jesus we created".

An important part of the conference was the general assembly and the election of global board members. Monika Kuschmierz was elected the new Director for Scripture Union International and Christian Hellwig as the new Chairman. Once the official business was taken care of the 150 year celebrations began in the form of a Malaysian wedding feast.

It was a real inspiration to see some of the work other colleagues and SU movements are doing and the creativity behind it.

Jonny and Emma had brilliant opportunities to connect with people, to attend seminars, to see how other movements run similar ministries, to share resources and time to share in prayer and worship. These relationships have already started to open doors to ministry opportunities which is very exciting.

Josiah Spiers inspiration and motivation was clear and so as the conference attendees were challenged on the opening evening: let us read the Bible thoroughly, frequently, prayerfully, personally, together and obediently and let us adopt Josiah Spier's attitude of "I read it through, I pray it in, I pass it on".


















Celebrating 150 Years: Camps & Missions

2017 has been a great year in our camps ministry. We've been able to run 20 residential camps at our adventure centre, Ovoca Manor. We had a great time at Greystones C.S.S.M. sharing the gospel with over 400 children and young people. The most exciting thing was seeing the demand for our camps increase with 1559 attendees and all of our Easter, Summer and Parenting camps were fully booked with waiting lists. This can only be testimony to the faithful leaders who spend weeks, if not months, planning and preparing for these camps and to our prayer teams who ensure that every element of running a camp is covered in prayer.

While there are many 2017 highlights there are a few that stood out for me. During one of our camps this year I was giving a quick briefing talk to a team before the children arrived and I noticed that out of 18 leaders, 15 of them had either been through SU camps that I led on and they were a camper, or I personally had been their youth group leader/been a leader at their school Christian Union. This emphasises the importance of continual ministry and how when we pass on the gospel to a younger generation we need to allow them the opportunity and give them the support they need, to stand up and pass on that same gospel to the next generation.

Another highlight this year was when one of my leaders from our Weekend Adventure camps came to me and said "Emma, we run this camp every year for 5th & 6th class pupils in their school. We want the opportunity to tell these children about Jesus for four consecutive years so can we please run another camp for 3rd & 4th class?" This leader and their family saw an opportunity to work with these children on a continual basis and decided they should run a second camp.

It is through Volunteers' creativity and response to God's calling that any of our camps happen at all and I'm so appreciative of each and every one of them. As a result of this volunteer led vision, we were so excited to have been able to offer two Family Week camps this year which were both fully booked and enabled us to be able to connect with new families and hopefully, the next generation of this family based ministry.

Our longest running camp is Greystones C.S.S.M. and in this 150th year we decided to mark that occasion by gathering groups of people to form the numbers 1-5-0. We used a drone video to take footage of that from a birds-eve view and vou can see this video on our website (and maybe even spot yourself if you were at the beach that day). When Scripture Union started in 1867, it started with Children Special Service Missions, or as we know it: C.S.S.M. This first small beach mission started by Josiah Spiers had a global effect so it would only be fitting that we looked at Greystones C.S.S.M. and the impact it has had over the past 121 years. I have chatted to 5 people, all from different stages of life and all with a different story to tell about Greystones C.S.S.M.

In 2018 I am so pleased to say that we are able to offer three more new camps. We are delighted to work in partnership with Youth for Christ to offer a new Sports Camp based in Mullingar. We've recognised that hill walking and hiking is a growing hobby in Ireland and we cannot wait for our new "Dads and Lads" hiking trip for those with sons aged between 16 and 21. After many years of praying and planning, our C.S.S.M. ministry is expanding with a week launching in Dun Laoghaire in August. So thank you to all the people who have prayed for our camps, to all the volunteers who have led weekends and week-long residentials and worked at Greystones C.S.S.M, to all the parents who entrust their children to us and finally to all of you campers for making each camp as unique and special as they are.

Stories from CSSM Ruth Stephens

How many years have you been part of **Grevstones C.S.S.M?**

I've been going to Greystones C.S.S.M. since 1948 when our family was on holiday in Greystones. C.S.S.M. was on and my friend was going to it so I went with her. My attendance was a bit hit and miss between 1948 and 1966 but since then we've maybe missed one year. I've been involved as a camper and as a parent/grandparent, never as a leader. However, the most important thing is that I made a commitment to God in 1948 as a 6 year old at Greystones C.S.S.M.

Could you tell us about the impact it has had on your family?

In 1967 when we started to go with the kids, we were very involved and we brought all the kids there. There was one stage they had no musicians and Arlene, Rob and I played the accordion. I couldn't really play it but I still did it as there was nothing else providing music. Even when we gave just one note it was better than nothing! Several families used to picnic on the beach; rain, hail or snow for the whole fortnight which meant we were nearby to get the kids to the afternoon activities without having to go home all the time. The people who came down from Dublin for the day would join us for those picnics. The biggest impact for our own kids would have been that what they were learning at C.S.S.M.



was exactly the same as what they were learning at church and at home but from a different group of people, which confirmed the teachings. The children just loved it and they were ready every morning for the 10am Bible study (in the early days). Each of our girls (all three of them) in turn became leaders and when they started working they helped in the evenings when they could. Cheryl became very involved when she started working for Scripture Union and now our grandson is a leader.

Would you say that C.S.S.M. has had an impact on the Greystones community?

I'd say it has had a big impact and from our point of view we got to know lots of people that we wouldn't necessarily have met. We got to know a lot of parents who would come to the BBQs, parents evenings and the birthday service, and we still chat to them when we meet them today. Some of those parents started coming to church, maybe not as a direct result of C.S.S.M. but it was around that time when all of our children attended the mission. More recently, when the parent's evening is on and there might be around 500 people in the one place at the one time, I've noticed that a lot of those are Greystones people and maybe some of them don't go to church except perhaps for that one service during C.S.S.M.



Alison Gill

How many years have you been involved in Greystones C.S.S.M?

I have been involved with Greystones C.S.S.M. since I was first on the team in 1993. I was on the team for about 5 years and then took a break until 2006 when I changed job and I was available to help out again. During those intervening years my brother was on the team and my Mum cooked for the team so I still felt I had a connection to the mission. In 2010 I was given the great privilege of being asked to be the overall leader and I have been doing that role ever since!

Why do you run this mission?

There are many reasons why I run Greystones C.S.S.M, firstly and most importantly, children and teenagers need to hear about the love that Jesus has for each one of them: a love so great that He rescued them by dving on the cross and they also need to hear that He wants to have a day by day, year by year relationship with them. The best way to hear this amazing message of love and rescue is to listen to God's word from the Bible and C.S.S.M. gives us the opportunity to do that. We read and learn from His word on the beach in the mornings as a family community and in the afternoons and evenings as each child and teenager goes to their different groups, there again they will hear God speak through teachings from the Bible. This helps them to come to know Jesus maybe for the first time and also to grow in their faith in Him

I also run C.S.S.M. because it is one way that I can serve God and be obedient to His command to share the Good News of His love with other people. God has given me so many gifts and blessings and it is good to be able give back to Him in some small way through volunteering with Scripture Union at C.S.S.M. Lastly, I run C.S.S.M. because it is great fun and a really enjoyable two weeks where I get to hang out with some fabulous children and teenagers, their amazing parents and a brilliant team!

How have you seen God at work over the years through Greystones C.S.S.M?

As the main leader of C.S.S.M, people of all ages often tell me something of their story of being a follower of Jesus and how God used the work of C.S.S.M. as part of that story. I can think of the Sprat who went home from their afternoon activity and told their Mum and Dad that they had asked Jesus into their heart, and the group of teens who continued to meet together to do Bible studies after C.S.S.M. ended for the year and even a past team member who is now working in full time church ministry. I had a letter from someone recently in their 90s who wrote about the influence C.S.S.M. had on their faith journey. So it is with each one of those individual stories that confirms to me that God has been at work over the past 121 years. Of course He could do this without us but in His goodness to us He chooses to let us be part of His work, a work that holds up the light of His word to a world that needs to know His love.

This year has seen a fantastic resource added to our work here in Ovoca Manor. Being rooted in our Christian ethos it was our wish to be as inclusive as possible to our guests and so the planning began...

With support we have been able to develop a number of exciting adventure activities for those who are differently abled. It is our hope to use these developments for all ability school retreats or small activity groups.

We fully believe that it is of great benefit to those who take part in our outdoor activities, as we often see personal growth in self-esteem, confidence, teamwork and a deeper understanding of their faith. We wish to further this impact by reaching more people and offering a safe space to explore these elements.



The activities we can now offer are:

Abseiling available to those who have limited ability with their limbs, some use of one arm and one leg & those with an intellectual disability.

Climbing available to those who have an intellectual disability, or limited ability with their limbs.

Crate Climbing available to those who are confined to a wheelchair, with or without an intellectual disability. This is also available to those who have limited ability with their limbs.

Rope Climbing available to those who are confined to a wheelchair with or without an intellectual disability.

Zipline available to those who are confined to a wheelchair. This is also available to those who have limited ability with their limbs.

Youth & Schools Update

However now I have doubts about my idea, and I feel like I have more of an understanding about the world that involves Jesus and God'. There are many more students who have related similar things and I am thankful for the small role I get to play in the faith development of these young lives.







I have also had the amazing opportunity to partner with parish pastoral workers from the archdioceses of Dublin to help run their Faithfest events.

"These events bring together young people from all over Dublin for a night where they can explore faith more, while still being fun and entertaining for them".

Faithfest takes the form of large gatherings twice a year but also includes a weekend retreat in Ovoca Manor. These retreats in the manor are amazing, and gives young people who might not normally have the chance, the opportunity to visit the beautiful surroundings of Ovoca and further explore faith.

This partnership with the archdioceses also includes the Ember program, a faith leadership training program which seeks to build up young leaders in secondary schools. I am able to help with the running of the Ember residential in Ovoca, and starting soon we are looking to expand Ember into church of Ireland schools as well.

I am often overwhelmed by the amazing things God is doing across our country and I am humbled to be even a small part of that work.



The week was fun-filled as well as spiritually rewarding! From bathing in baked beans in 'messy games', to playing sports and copious games of Mafia, to early morning dips in the 'plunge pool' there was never a dull moment for kids and leaders alike!

SU Volunteer Testimony

'Family Week' was my first experience of a camp, and boy did it set the bar high! My brothers, sister and I see 'Family Week' as something you just don't miss, it's like Christmas, you just have to be there. This year we brought the tally up to 13 years attended and once I literally stayed the whole year! But that's another story, what I want to tell you is why, for 13 years, I keep coming back.

Not only has volunteering developed and challenged my views and understanding of faith, but it has given me so many valuable skills that are difficult to get as a young adult in todays world. Public speaking, working in a team, real life responsibility, planning, adapting plans, thinking fast and learning to slow down. Perfect for the CV! These skills don't just help you lead a camp but they spill out into the world you go back into after camp. They empower you to be better equipped leaders in your every day lives. I only went to one camp each year as a camper and I wish I had known about more! Dear Scripture Union Supporter,

The year 2017 has been a year of much growth in ministry with large attendances at SU Camps, many full and including a second Family Week. We have had continued increase in the mid-week retreats to over 50 schools with approx. 1600 students. We launched the NUA Film series in March and in the space of seven months we have distributed over 700 NUA packs with approx. 10,000 participants. Most exciting has been the take up by over 200 secondary schools, so we are over guarter of the way to our target of reaching the 800 schools throughout Ireland. We are in the process of developing a major new Scripture based resource called Dynamite for 6th class students preparing for confirmation and this has significant potential.

Staff wise we recruited an Admin person for our Volunteer Management and Garda Vetting, which is now a legal requirement under Child Protection and created a new role of Retreat Coordinator at Ovoca Manor and before the year end we will recruit a part time Admin/ Marketing role on a one-year contract for the NUA project to support all the admin, data gathering and follow up with schools and groups using the resource with an added element of finding new sources of income for the project.

The total turnover in 2017 exceeds a million euro and was €1,083,013 with estimated expenditure of 1,041,817. This reflects the significant amount of ministry activity and with a current staff of 23 which includes part time cleaning and catering staff at Ovoca Manor as well as three full time Interns and over 300 Volunteers.

While certain activities of the ministry generate income, some do not. We have also sought grant funding from some Trusts to support the salaries of staff working on major projects. However, the reality despite our best efforts is we have a very low regular monthly donor base in relation to the scale of our ministry, which generates less than €25,000 per year and we receive approx. €10,000 Tax on donations from the Revenue Commissioners.

So, we are dependant and indeed indebted to the very small number of amazingly generous Trusts and Individual Donors to fund projects like NUA and support Primary School Ministry and Capital Works at Ovoca Manor.

Thankfully during 2017 we managed to lease some properties and we will benefit from this rental income going into 2018. However, we still have some loan repayments, rental on our offices and, our monthly cash flow is at times challenging, but the reality with the scale and impact of such a ministry to thousands of children and young people significant staff and financial resources are necessary to make this possible.

It is difficult, but I feel we have little choice but to make our need known and to APPEAL to each of our supporters to consider, if possible, making even a small financial contribution and ideally a regular monthly contribution to Scripture Union Ireland. We have therefore included in this Inspire Magazine a **Giving Form** with all our Bank Details to enable you to make a one off or ideally a more regular donation.

Thank you for your support.

We constantly give thanks to God for His wonderful provision for the ministry of Scripture Union, through the great generosity of so many and for the impact this work is having in the faith and lives of thousands of children and young people across Ireland. We must also acknowledge the hard work and dedication of the staff team and the significant contribution of all our Volunteers as well as our Board and Council members.
