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Reader's Guide to the Plan

The following subsections describe what a hazard mitigation plan is, what type of plan the Pierce County's Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan (RHMP) is, and how the Pierce County RHMP is organized.

What is a Hazard Mitigation Plan?

The purpose of a hazard mitigation plan is to improve a community's resilience to hazards and lessen disaster impacts. Hazard mitigation planning is a process that brings a community together to identify their local disaster risks and vulnerabilities. Then, that community can create short-term and long-term strategies to protect people and property from these risks.

What Type of Plan is the Pierce County RHMP?

The Pierce County RHMP is a multi-jurisdictional hazard mitigation plan. Multi-jurisdictional plans bring together several jurisdictions – cities, towns, fire districts, school districts, utility providers, educational institutions, special purpose districts, and more – to collaborate on reducing risk to local hazards together. All jurisdictional partners in the Pierce County RHMP are either located within Pierce County or their service area is in Pierce County. Coordinated by the Pierce County Department of Emergency Management (PCDEM), the Pierce County RHMP:

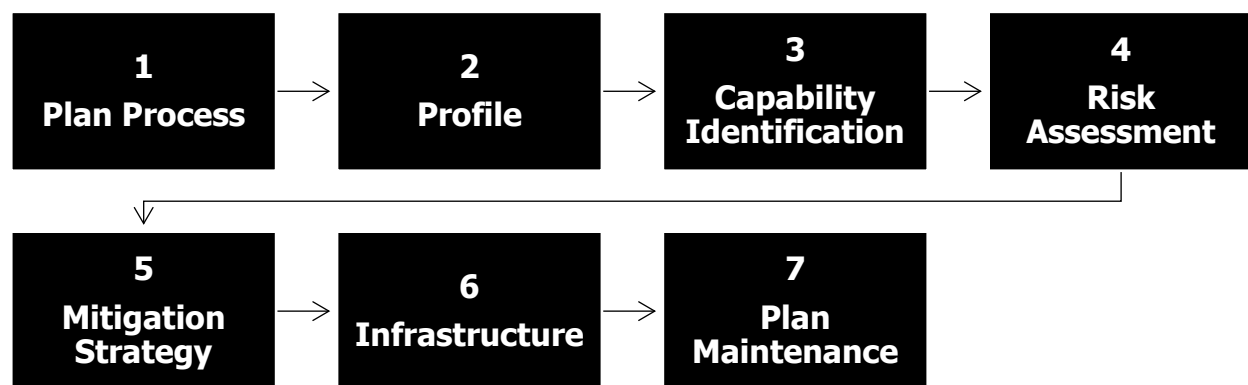
- Analyzes hazard risk across 64 jurisdictions using the same methodology;
- Builds critical relationships between emergency management and hazard mitigation planning partners; and
- Brings together short and long-range planning process across a variety of disciplines.

How is the Pierce County RHMP Organized?

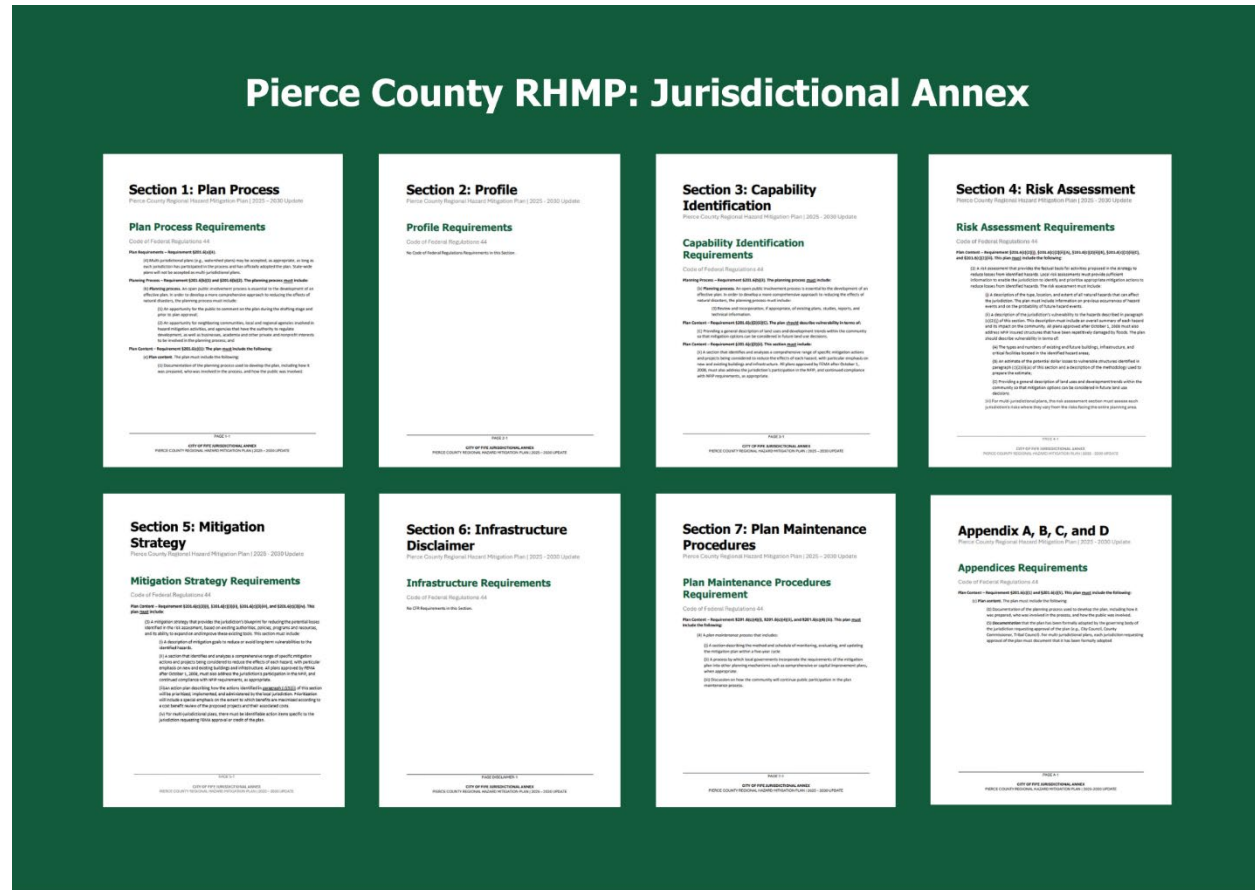
Figure 3 Pierce County RHMP Base Plan Organization

The Pierce County RHMP is comprised of the Pierce County RHMP “Base Plan” document that details how Pierce County on the county-level is assessing natural and human-caused hazards (see *Figure 3* for a visualization of the Pierce County RHMP Base Plan’s organization). The Pierce County RHMP also has Jurisdictional Annexes, which are essentially “mini” hazard mitigation plans – one created for each jurisdictional partner participating in the Pierce County RHMP planning process.

Both the Pierce County RHMP Base Plan and its Jurisdictional Annexes are organized into seven sections: Plan Process, Profile, Capability Identification, Risk Assessment, Mitigation Strategy, Infrastructure, and Plan Maintenance (see *Figure 2* below).

Figure 2 Pierce County RHMP Base Plan and Jurisdictional Annex Organization

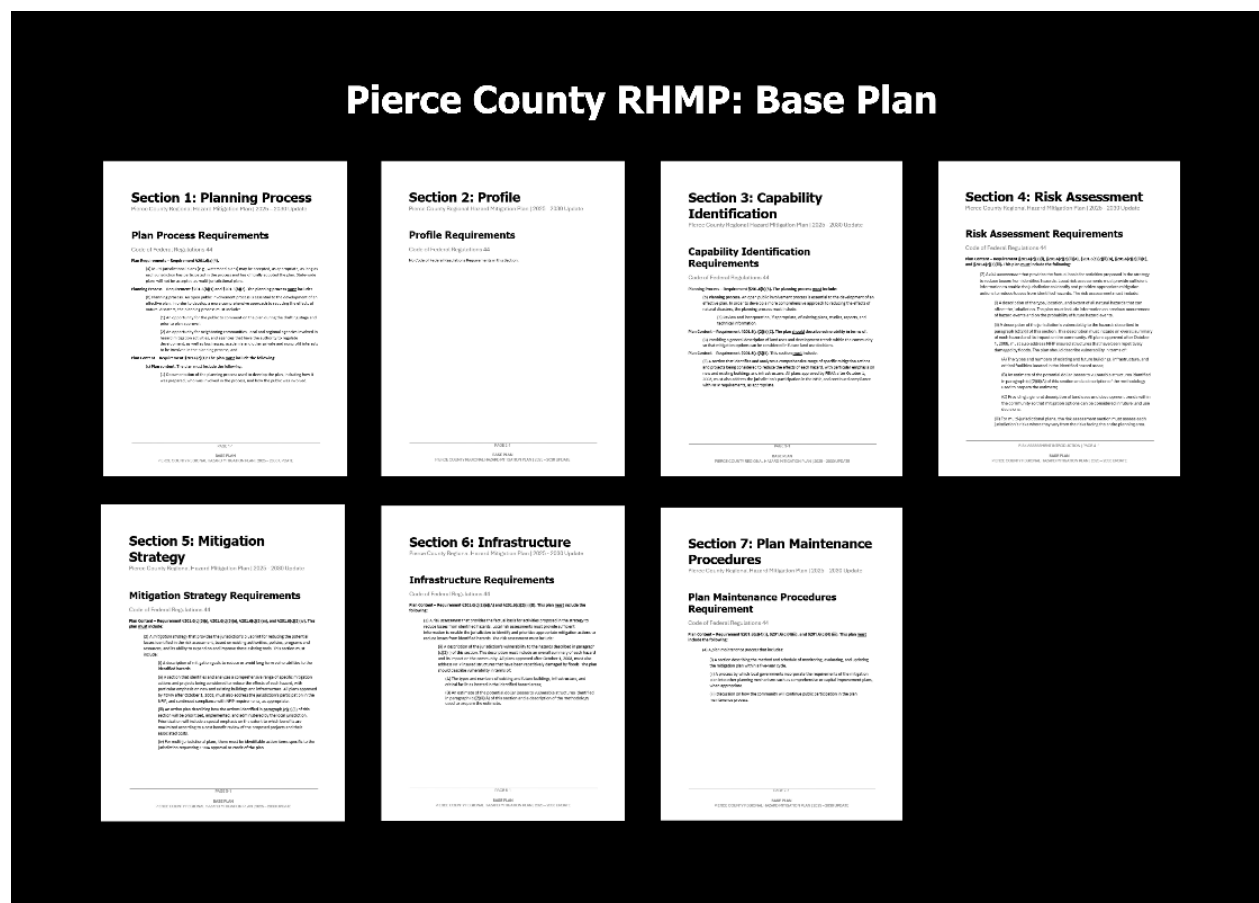


Pierce County RHMP Base Plan

The Pierce County RHMP Base Plan is a “road map” to the overall plan (see *Figure 3*). Altogether, the Base Plan:

- Explains the 2025 Pierce County RHMP planning process (*Section 1*);
- Orients the reader to Pierce County (*Section 2*);
- Identifies Pierce County capabilities (*Section 3*);
- Identifies and profiles local hazards (*Section 4*);
- Develops a framework and methodology for reducing risk to those hazards (*Section 5*);
- Identifies a framework for cataloging critical infrastructure that could be impacted by hazard incidents (*Section 6*); and
- Develops a way to track plan maintenance over the plan’s duration (*Section 7*).

Pierce County RHMP Jurisdictional Annexes

Together, *Figure 3* and *Figure 4* show how similarly the Pierce County RHMP Base Plan and each of its Jurisdictional Annexes are organized. One exception to this is that each Jurisdictional Annex has four appendices as well. *Figure 4* is an example of the plan organization for one of the Pierce County RHMP city Jurisdictional Annexes.

Figure 4 Pierce County RHMP Jurisdictional Annex Organization



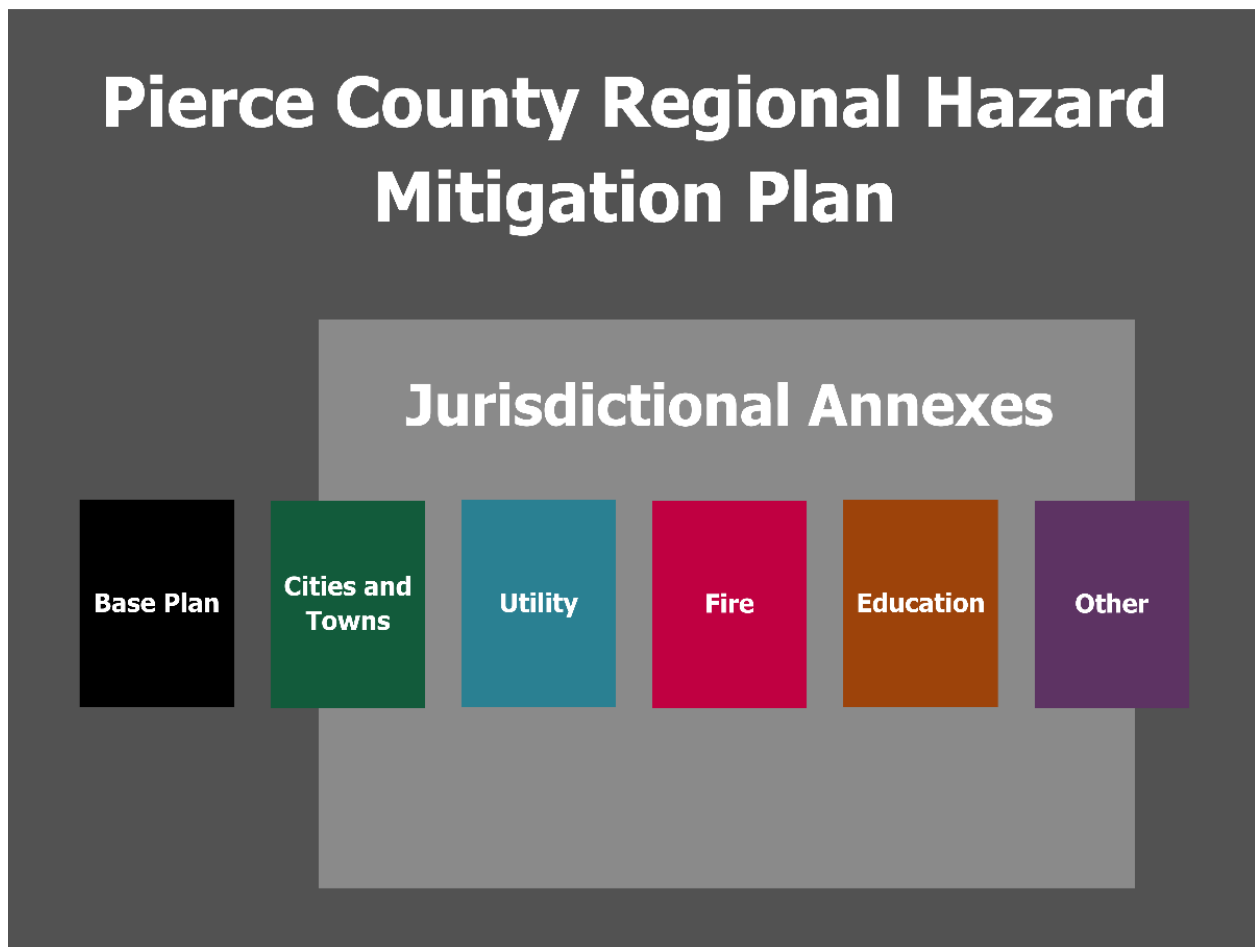
Furthermore, each Jurisdictional Annex has its own jurisdiction-specific:

- Plan process descriptions (*Section 1*);
- Community profiles (*Section 2*);
- Local capability identification (*Section 3*);
- Risk assessment and vulnerability analysis (*Section 4*);
- Mitigation strategies (*Section 5*);
- Critical infrastructure inventories (*Section 6*); and
- Plan maintenance strategy (*Section 7*).

Connecting the Base Plan and Jurisdictional Annexes

As there are 65 jurisdictions participating in the Pierce County RHMP, Jurisdictional Annexes are also sorted into five Discipline Groups for clarity and coordination: the Cities and Towns Group, Utility Group, Fire Group, Education Group, and Other Group (see *Figure 5* below).
