

Black Women and Attorney General Aaron Ford Leading the Fight to Defend Democracy

Nevada Attorney General Aaron Ford is on a mission to defend our democracy as a renewed wave of voter suppression threatens to undermine the very foundation of our country. In an exclusive, heartfelt conversation, AG Ford didn't hold back when describing the gravity of the situation. "These new voting restrictions aren't random," he said, his voice filled with urgency. "They are designed with one purpose—to make it harder for communities of color to vote. This is about silencing the voices that have fought the hardest for justice."

From stricter voter ID laws to the reduction of polling places, these targeted tactics are part of a calculated effort to strip power from marginalized communities. Yet, amid these challenges, Ford shines a light on a powerful force in the fight-Black women. "Black women have always been the cornerstone of our democracy," he said with conviction. "They're not just participants in this fight—they are the leaders. They are the ones registering voters, educating their communities, and turning out in numbers that shift elections."

Nevada Attorney General Aaron Ford is married to Western Area Affiliate Member Berna Rhodes-Ford.

During our interview, AG Ford's reverence for Black women's leadership was unmistakable. He recalled the trailblazers who came before us—Fannie Lou Hamer, Shirley Chisholm—and modern figures like Stacey Abrams, who continue to shape the political landscape. "Black women have always fought for justice," he reminded me. "And now, once again, they are the key to protecting our democracy."

As I spoke with AG Ford during our interview, his words stirred something deep within me—not just as an interviewer but as a Black woman. His message wasn't simply a call to action—it felt like a rallying cry, a reminder of the battles our ancestors fought for the rights we enjoy today. Black women have always been at the forefront, and now, the stakes are higher than ever. If we don't rise to this challenge, the voices of future generations could be silenced before they even have a chance to speak.

But this isn't just a fight for Black women—it's a call to everyone who believes in equality and justice. AG Ford spoke passionately about the importance of voter education in combating misinformation. "Misinformation is the enemy," he warned. "When people don't know their rights, suppression thrives. We must educate ourselves and our communities to ensure no one is left in the dark."

AG Ford stressed that voter suppression isn't just a distant threat—it's happening now, and it affects us all. "We can't afford to sit back and wait for someone else to act. This is the most critical election of our lifetime, and every single one of us has a role to play."

That role begins with action. AG Ford's message was clear: check your voter registration, help others register, and volunteer at polling stations. "We all have a responsibility to protect our democracy," he insisted. "Democracy isn't something we inherit—it's something we build and defend."

Our VOICE. Our VOTE. Our POWER. These words are more than just slogans in our campaign to Link Up The Vote —they're the tools we've inherited to shape our future. Our voice is the platform we use to demand change. Our vote is the power we wield to make that change a reality. And our power grows stronger when we stand together, informed, determined, and unafraid in the face of those who seek to suppress us.

Attorney General Aaron Ford's words echoed in my mind long after the interview ended. His passion was contagious, and as a Black woman, I felt a renewed sense of duty to continue the fight for justice. This isn't just about one election on November 5th—it's about the future of our democracy and our collective responsibility to protect it. As AG Ford said, "The decisions we make now will echo for generations to come."

What can you do to make a difference?
Begin by ensuring your voter registration is up to date and that you are ready to cast your ballot. Next, spread the word—talk to your family, friends, and community members, because knowledge is the most powerful tool we have in fighting voter suppression. Then, take action. Assist others in registering, help organize transportation to the polls and motivate everyone you know to vote. Every effort counts.

Our ancestors fought and sacrificed for the right to vote. Now it's up to us to ensure that legacy continues. Let's make sure our voices are heard, our votes are counted, and our power remains undeniable.

How To Confirm Your Voter Registration Status

Check your voter registration online to confirm your voter registration number and if you are still registered. Verify your name, address, political party, and polling place.

How to check if you are registered to vote:

- 1. Visit Can I Vote and select "voter registration status."
- 2. Choose your state. You will be taken to a page on your state's election website.
- 3. Check to see if you are registered.

Our Work Is Far From Over

As part of The Links, Incorporated's LINK UP THE VOTE campaign, we've consistently provided tips in the Weekly Chain to help ensure you're registered and tracking your voter registration. More importantly, we've encouraged you to register new voters to support the national goal set by President Ethel Isaacs Williams to register 100,000 new voters. We've celebrated National Voter Registration Day and urged collaboration with partners like the NAACP, NCNW, the Divine Nine, and other community groups to host forums, rallies, and educational events to inform our communities about the candidates and key issues. However, with the election less than three weeks away, our work is far from over.



The LINK UP THE VOTE initiative has four core components: Voter Identification, Voter Registration, Voter Education, and Voter Activation. While each of these is critical, registering and educating voters is just the beginning. Now is the time for Voter Activation. Most voters have received their ballots, and it's crucial to engage them so they make their voices heard. Whether it's through direct mail, phone banking, text messaging, letter writing, or door-to-door canvassing, we must DO SOMETHING to LINK UP with voters and get them to the polls.



Our Work Is Far From Over

The 2024 **General Election** stands out as one of the most critical elections in recent history. It is vital that we use every tool at our disposal to ensure all voters, particularly those most vulnerable to harmful policies, make their voices heard.

According to the 2024 National Black Voter Project (BVP) Survey - a longitudinal study of Black public opinion- it has been shown that in recent months new and nonvoter turnout is trending to increase in November. The survey revealed that Black Women ages 18 –29 are 175% more likely to vote and Latino Women of the same age are 160% more likely to vote.

When reaching out to voters, encourage them to make a voting plan, particularly by voting early in line with National Early Voting Day on October 29, 2024. One of our Western Area LUTV goals is to celebrate voters who cast their ballots early—and we all love a reason to celebrate!

The 2024 General Election stands out as one of the most critical elections in recent history. It is vital that we use every tool at our disposal to ensure all voters, particularly those most vulnerable to harmful policies, make their voices heard. The damage done in recent elections, particularly to communities of color and African Americans, pales in comparison to the stakes of the upcoming General Election on Tuesday, November 5, 2024.



This is our opportunity to move forward. Through The Links, Incorporated LINK UP THE VOTE initiative, we are committed to ensuring that We are Not Going Back.

EL PASO (TX) CHAPTER FOUR VOTER REGISTRATION DRIVES









Since August 2024, the El Paso (TX) Chapter of The Links, Incorporated has been actively engaged in voter registration initiatives, partnering with the El Paso NAACP and the League of Women Voters. Together, we have successfully hosted four voter registration drives, resulting in the registration of 217 new voters. These efforts reflect our unwavering dedication to ensuring that every eligible community member has the opportunity to engage in the democratic process.

Our voter registration drives provide essential services such as updating voter records, checking voter status, assisting with vote-by-mail requests, and offering general election information. These events have proven to be invaluable resources, particularly for those navigating the complexities of voter requirements and processes. Tailored to support both first-time voters and long-time community members, each drive is designed to address various needs, whether updating information or clarifying voter status.

In addition, we have specifically targeted college and high school seniors with dedicated registration drives, further extending our reach to younger voters. Our efforts align with our mission to promote civic engagement and empower the community through participation in voting.





HAWAII (HI) CHAPTER

COLLABORATING WITH THE NAACP

The Hawai'i Chapter of The Links, Incorporated collaborated on a community event hosted by the Hawai'i Branch of NAACP Religious Affairs Committee. We partnered with Hawai'i community organizations to both educate and empower voters. The event included a panel made of state legal experts (including our very own Daphne Barbee Wooten) and included discussions on Project 2025 and the impact of recent U.S. Supreme Court Decisions.



LOS ANGELES (CA) CHAPTER 'BLACK LIVES AND ELECTIONS MATTER' WORKSHOP

As part of the Link Up The Vote initiative, the Los Angeles (CA) Chapter Cotillion program included a workshop entitled, "Black Lives and Elections Matter." This workshop was presented by member Melissia Buckhalter Honore, senior attorney, former law professor, past Western Area Black Lives Matter Chair, and current Western Area Editor-in-Chief of The Chain. Melissia is also the Chair of the Cotillion Volunteer Community Service Project. The Cotillionettes received a presentation on how BLACK LIVES AND ELECTIONS MATTER, with the central message that "Voting is Your Civic Duty! Cotillionettes learned the history of how voting was not a default right for all Americans. They also learned about how the 15th, 19th, and 24th Amendments, and ultimately The Voting Rights Act of 1965 shaped our right to vote. They also learned how those rights have since been eroded with Supreme Court rulings and voter suppression tactics. The workshop took Cotillionettes through the historical steps that landed us where we are today with our voting rights.

As part of their community service project, each Cotillionette was responsible for registering/pre-registering at least ten (10) individuals to vote. In addition, they also took part in a post card voter mobilization activity. This activity entailed a collaboration with the League of Women Voters to mail out postcards to remind individuals to vote, as an effort to mobilize the "get out the vote" campaign. Studies have shown that personal messages on postcards to voters result in higher voter turnout—which was critical to success in the 2022 midterm elections.







Pasadena-Altadena (Ca) Chapter

COALITION MOBILIZES TO GET OUT THE VOTE

The Pasadena-Altadena (CA) Chapter of The Links, Incorporated are thrilled to announce our partnership with the NAACP Pasadena Good Trouble Alliance, Altadena NAACP, Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., the League of Women Voters, and local churches for our Get Out the Vote initiative.

Each organization has taken the lead on a mobilization event, allowing us to join forces and collaborating, creating a more significant impact than we could achieve alone, thereby broadening our reach within the community.

Photos will depict The Pasadena-Altadena Links as they register students with Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. alongside the League of Women Voters at Pasadena High School. On September 17th, for the National Voter Registration Impact Day, our chapter worked alongside the League of Women Voters to register students at Pasadena City College.

SPOKANE (WA) CHAPTER THE POWER OF THE BLACK VOTE

On Saturday, September 28th, The Links, Incorporated, Spokane (WA) Chapter bolstered the message of the power of the Black vote for this upcoming election season by hosting a voter registration table at an event centered on the influence of Black history in the American West. Chapter members helped community members check their voter registration status and passed out stickers to reinforce the message to get out and vote in November. As we have seen the many strides made throughout history to level the playing field currently in debate between both political parties, what is often deemphasized in the larger national narrative is the impact that Black Americans have had on our society and democracy since the beginning. In keeping with the preservation of our history, "Trilogy" celebrated and elevated Black history in the Pacific Northwest at Liberty Park, a place that has historical ties and significance to the Black community in Spokane. Among the activities were an equestrian demonstration, a photo gallery of regional history, linedancing, singing, and civic engagement. The Spokane (WA) Chapter also took the time to walk in honor of Healthy Living at this event.







PORTLAND (OR) CHAPTER

PARTNERING IN TWO-DAY EVENT

In partnership with the Portland, OR Soul District Business Association and their 13th annual MLK Dream Run, the Portland (OR) Chapter of The Links, Incorporated provided onsite voter registration and voter information for participants at the two-day event on September 21-22, 2024. This event culminated with a 5k, 10k, 15k run event on the second day of the festivities. Our goals were 1) Encourage voter registration and verification onsite; 2) provide important voter registration information to participants; 3) encourage participants who engage with us to participate in the elected candidate networking session that took place during the MLK Dream event on September 21, 2024, from 1:00pm-3:30pm. We had 32 people register, update, or verify their voter registration.





GREATER SEATTLE (WA) CHAPTER EMPOWERING THROUGH ACTION: HEALTH, VOTING, AND WELLNESS INITIATIVES

We are excited to share highlights from our chapter's recent activities, focusing on health advocacy, voter registration, and community wellness. These events demonstrate GSCL members' dedication to empowering individuals through education and civic engagement. On September 20, 2024, our chapter partnered with Fred Hutchinson Cancer Center to host a unique "Science Salone" event. With a stunning Seattle skyline as our backdrop, members learned about the impact of cancer in Black and minority communities. The event included tours of a mobile mammogram unit and endoscopy suite, offering a tangible experience of cancer prevention in action. Attendees left with calls to action: learn their family's cancer history, prioritize early detection, and share what they learned with others. Following this, on September 21, we hosted the #LinkUpTheVote initiative, where members wrote Vote Forward postcards to potential voters in key states, encouraging them to participate in the upcoming elections. We were pleased to remind everyone to check their voting status at www.vote.org in preparation for Nov. 5.

GSCL members were also active in the community, encouraging health, wellness, and voter engagement during our Annual Walk for Healthy Living on September 28 at Volunteer Park in Seattle. This event gathered members for a morning focused on physical wellbeing, reinforcing the importance of healthy living and civic participation. We are proud to share the impactful work we are doing and look forward to our continued work in the community.







TOWN LAKE (TX) CHAPTER LINKING UP THE VOTE IN CENTRAL TEXAS





The Town Lake (TX) Chapter kicked off our programming year with an energized focus on Linking Up the Vote for the 2024 election season. Our National Trends and Services Facet has demonstrated an unwavering commitment to social action by actively engaging with the broader Austin community in support of our national areas of focus: voter registration, information, and identification. In the month of September, we held five voter registration drives in partnership with three local universities, including Austin's esteemed HBCU, Huston-Tillotson University, and the Austin Area Urban League. Members registered over 50 new voters and assisted many others with updating their existing voter registration information. Our Communications Committee has led an impactful social media campaign aimed at providing voter registration information to Texas voters. In the month of September, our voter registration content received over two thousand views across our social media accounts furthering our work to ensure members of our community are empowered to exercise their power at the ballot box. We are grateful to all of our members who have given their time in support of our Link Up The Vote initiatives and are excited to continue the work in the month ahead to ensure every eligible voter is informed and motivated to make their voice heard.

"EMPOWERING VOICES: THE LINKS, INCORPORATED AND PAUL QUINN COLLEGE UNITE FOR CIVIC ENGAGEMENT"

The Dallas (TX) Chapter of The Links, Incorporated recently partnered with Paul Quinn College for a dynamic evening of civic engagement on September 10th. The event, hosted on the PQC campus, brought together approximately 100 attendees, including students, faculty, and community members for a trio of activities focused on empowering voters and fostering democratic participation. Notably, members of the PQC Women's Volleyball team were present, showing their support in full uniform.

The evening kicked off with a voter registration drive, where attendees had the opportunity to register to vote or update their registration information. This was followed by a Volunteer Deputy Registrar (VDR) training session, equipping participants with the knowledge and certification to help register others to vote in Texas. The event culminated in a lively presidential debate watch party, allowing students to engage with current political discourse in real-time.

This collaboration between the Dallas (TX) Chapter and Paul Quinn College, supported by campus organizations including the Student Government Association, Collegiate 100, and the African American Leadership Institute, exemplified a commitment to voter engagement across four key areas: voter registration, voter identification, voter information, and voter activation. The success of this event underscores the power of community partnerships in promoting civic responsibility and ensuring that every eligible voter has the opportunity to make their voice heard at the ballot box.










SACRAMENTO (CA) CHAPTER LINK UP THE VOTE - SACRAMENTO STYLE

As residents of the Capital region of the 5th largest economy in the world, the Sacramento Chapter of The Links Incorporated responded to the call of action with focus and intentionality to increase voters -both young and mature individuals- in the 2024 General Election. We kicked off a 50-day plan on the night of the Presidential Debate to Link UP the Vote with our Link sisters and partners to impact voters. To date, we have expanded our reach near, far and wide to over 6650 individuals. We partnered with neighboring chapters, nonprofits, community colleges, youth, festivals, newspapers, and schools to register, educate and Link UP the Vote. Our activities included:

- Distributed 1000 vote postcards to vulnerable congressional districts to churches, schools and parents during voter registration drives and Health Walk with Solano chapter.
- Mailed cards to Michigan, Alabama and Vulnerable districts.
- Picked up 50 hard copy voter registration forms.
- Provided QR code for easy access to registration.
- Tabled at Cosumnes River College and registered over 100 new voters.
- Participated in NAACP training and partnered with postcard campaign.
- 20 Black Achievers Creating Change (BACC) high school juniors and seniors collected at least 30 names each of family, friends and students to register and encourage to vote.
- BACC teams of 5 members created Link UP the Vote videos to post on Instagram.
- Link UP the Vote message on the big screen for six straight nights during the 3rd Annual Oak
 Park Black Film Festival to encourage a packed house nightly to make their vote count.
- Link UP the Vote message on Digital Board in the Forty Acres Complex.
- Partnered with the Observer Newspaper for an Election Forum for discuss ballot initiatives, hear from local candidates and discuss Disinformation and Misinformation.

We are not done yet. We will Link UP the Vote through the finish line on November 5th.










EL PASO (TX) CHAPTER FOUR AREAS OF FOCUS

El Paso (TX) Chapter's National Trends and Services Facet structured our 2024 voting campaign to follow the four areas of focus identified by the Link Up The Vote component of the National Social Action Initiative:

- 1. Voter Identification
- 2. Voter Registration
- 3. Voter Information
- 4. Voter Activation

The last date of voter registration in Texas was October 7, 2024. We will continue to implement the other three focuses by sharing information, when possible, about voting including how an individual can confirm that he/she is registered to vote, identification needed to vote, early voting dates and locations, absentee voting, the importance of knowing the candidates and/or issues on the ballot and most importantly, voting. Our number one priority was to register voters. Our second priority was/is to dispense information in varying formats about the entire process of voting. We targeted young and new potential voters by setting up registration drives at our community college and the lobby of pediatric medical center. Other locations attracted more diverse individuals. To amplify our efforts, we partnered with other organizations.

MID-CITIES (TX) CHAPTER

OVER 300 ENGAGED IN VOTER REGISTRATION DURING GOTV BLITZ

To spark the interest of a Young Adult Audience in the race to register voters before election deadlines, the Mid-Cities (TX) Chapter of The Links, Incorporated partnered with the Kevin Kelley Concepts restaurant group to host GOTV registration at their popular sports venue Kanvas Sports + Social in Dallas, Texas.

In addition to Kanvas Sports + Social, the Restaurant Group owns Kitchen + Kocktails By Kevin Kelley with dining locations in Dallas, Atlanta, Charlotte, Chicago and Washington DC. The Mid-Cities (TX) Chapter held six Voter Registration Drives at Kanvas Sports + Social during the months of September and October timed to capture patrons frequenting the restaurant during popular College and NFL football game viewing. Chapter members registered 110 new voters and confirmed voter status for an additional 250 potential voters during the GOTV drives. Additionally, voter registration education cards were developed and provided with key information and dates for registration and voting.

Chapter President, Vickie Mitchell's thoughts on taking this critical action were "We knew that we needed to meet our community where they are, thus bringing the GOTV message to a key audience and immediately providing them with the information and tools they needed to register and vote were imperative."

Over 50% of the Chapter's membership actively participated in the GOTV effort as Deputy Registrars who registered new voters onsite and GOTV Ambassadors who checked registration status and provided voter education materials.

Legislative Issues Chair, Kim Walker spearheaded the GOTV effort. She shared "The collaboration with Kevin Kelley Concepts was critical to the initiative's success in that they provided onsite access to their patrons during peak hours with a dedicated GOTV registration area." The impact was further extended with the restaurant group's inclusion of a QR Code on its To Go and Onsite Menus that linked to a Voter Education Toolkit developed by the Mid-Cities (TX) Chapter.

BLACK FAMILY WELLNESS EXPO UMBRELLA ANATOMY

This year the Black Family Wellness Expo (BFWE) will be on March 15, 2025. As a reminder, National would like all chapters to hold this important impact day on the 15th, but if it is not feasible to do so, please hold sometime during the month of March for your day to be counted.

Remember, Impact Days such as BFWE are not programs but are **single activities**. As you plan your BFWE event, please make sure that it is a part of your greater chapter programming. And remember, the Western Area goal is to have 100% of chapters doing umbrella programming and having all our 61 chapters carrying out STEM Umbrella programs.

The BFWE experience organically creates an Umbrella framework with all Facets contributing.

Even though "Wellness" is incorporated into the name BFWE, we should involve all facets, not just HHS, contributing to its success. BFWE can be designed to be a day long display of all facets "umbrellaing" to serve the community. And remember too, that "wellness" isn't just about the health of your body. Wellness can be interpreted as the wellness of communities through voter registration or saving the environment, or career wellness such as STEM education, or even financial wellness to name a few examples.



There are three levels of expos that chapters can carry out to serve the families in our community:

- 1) Table displays, educational events, and health screenings
- 2) Table displays with educational events
- 3) Table displays only

The "attendees", or target community, are a critical element or key building block for your BFWE Chapters may dwell on those health and wellness issues that are particular to African Americans. However, the resounding question is, how do we get the turnout that compliments the enormous efforts that go into this much needed community engagement. As we look to our Service Delivery Model, understanding our target demographic is key to successful programming which includes the single activity of BFWE. Like planning a big party, where the guests are invited, we want to make sure our expo meets the expectations of our communities so everyone will show up!

BLACK FAMILY WELLNESS VIDEO MESSAGE



So how should we expand our thinking of attracting participants? Through marketing and collaboration?

Answer: Partner, Partner, Partner! Market, Market!

Who are the potential partner organizations that have years of offering successful public health services events that target the Black community specifically or may include our population within their events? Contact them and see how they have reached their participants. Find out what works and what doesn't. City, county, and state health departments are great sources of information.

If organizations want to partner with your chapter in putting on the event, so much the better! Think about what organizations you want to be a part of your expo and invite participants that align. For example, if your HHS facet has a table staffed by the Alzheimer's Association, invite caregivers or support groups to the expo to partake not only in the dementia related activities but to partake of the health screening and education activities.

Is your chapter going to continue to have voter registration or perhaps a financial wellness table? Invite students from your local colleges and universities to attend and also discuss Human Trafficking on HBCU campuses with NTS and STY facets spearheading these workshops. Also, as a part of your Umbrella Stem programs, all facets can present an Allied Health Careers panel working with Boys and Girls Clubs and high school guidance counselors. Does your ITS facet work with a refugee/ immigrant community? Plan an African Decent immigrant Women's Healthcare Education symposium and have breast cancer screenings. Invite the women to bring their husbands too for prostate screenings or prostate health workshops. You can market to caregivers, featuring AARP and Project Alert information and new mom's tables with infant giveaway items.

And don't forget the ARTS involvement. Why not have an art competition around some aspect of health and wellness with the submissions being judged and winners announced your BFWE. Additionally, this may be the ideal space to unveil your chapter's Dr. Me program.

Don't forget to use a variety of ways to reach participants including various social media, flyers, church bulletins, black newspapers, etc, etc, etc. Remember to advertise at every event you have leading up to the expo.

Lastly, don't forget to encourage attendees to come through the use of incentives. Can you provide free food, gas cards, grocery store gift cards, raffle prizes tied to attending sessions, screenings, and tables. I bet you can think of many ways to get people to your event!

Don't be the chapter that throws the party and those you invite don't come. Broaden that invitation list, use your creativity to reach the community, and show your community that the Links' BFWE is THE place to be!

WACO CENTRAL (TX) CHAPTER MENTAL HEALTH: A KEY PART OF 50TH ANNIVERSARY PROGRAMMING

The Waco Central Texas (TX) Chapter of The Links, Incorporated partnered with several organizations during its 50th anniversary to offer programming for mental health awareness targeting the Black community, including film discussions, voter registration drives and workshops. A healthy community impacts the quality of life for its members." She attended the health fair, representing Maji Rising. As passion project and labor of love, Maji rising is "a non-profit organization created to start a health care and education center in Spokane, Washington to serve our neighbors who are experiencing the most need." Focusing on lineage-based health care, Maji Rising aims to promote transformative community healing.



During the month of July, members of the Spokane (WA) Chapter collaborated to bring the Dr. Me! Program to youth at the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Community Center summer camp program. Exposing African American children in grades 3 through 5 to careers in the healthcare and medical fields. Deborah Cano, a retired nurse, and Mayah Eberhardt, an Eastern Washington University dental hygiene senior, were able to engage the students about their own respective jobs in the healthcare industry. Their visits helped make the possibility of a career in those fields attainable to the kids. Students were excited and motivated in the tactile components of the workshops, while wearing the white labs coats and using their medical kits. The lab coats were an instant hit, and helped students make a strong connection early on as role-playing provided great stimulation. Daughter of member Sian Armstrong supported the activities by assisting younger students and taking pictures. The week ended with the students receiving a certificate of completion and goodie bag. One of the students left the program proclaiming that he was ready to complete his degree to become a doctor. Students expressed excitement for the next day's lessons and were motivated.



BREAST CANCER AWARENESS



KNOW THE FACTS

October is breast cancer awareness month but we need to keep breast health awareness top of mind each and every day!

Here are facts to share with your chapter members and also with the communities we serve.

Breast Cancer is the second leading cause of death in Black women behind cardiovascular disease.

The incidence of breast cancer is no higher in black one than in white woman.

Black women are 41% more likely to die of breast cancer compared to white women due to factors including poor outcomes with all subtypes of breast cancer, less access to high-quality care and high quality health information, and diagnosis and treatment delays.

IMPORTANT FACTS TO KNOW:

- Most breast cancer is not inherited, so no family history does not mean you are not at risk for breast cancer.
- Know the screening recommendations From the American Cancer Society for average risk women. Average risk includes women WITHOUT a personal history of breast cancer, a strong family history of breast cancer, a genetic mutation such as BRCA gene which increases the risk of breast cancer development, or a history of chest radiation.

ACS recommendations:

- Women between ages 40 and 44 have the option to start screening with a mammogram yearly.
- Women 45 to 54 should get mammograms every year.
- Women 55 and older can switch to mammography every other year or they can choose to continue yearly mammograms. Screening should continue as long as a woman is in good health, and is expected to live at least 10 more years.

Please note that mammography is the gold standard for screening. However, if a person is at higher than average risk of developing breast cancer, additional imaging, such as MRIs may be added to the screening routine. Imaging, such as an ultrasound may accompany a mammogram if indicated, but it is not the first screening tool of choice.

It's important to know your body-look for changes in size, shape, feel of your breasts and report any changes to your healthcare provider ASAP.

Remember that men can get breast cancer too so they should also know what is normal for their bodies and report any changes in their breast that may be suspicious.

Remember, knowledge is power. Educate yourself about breast health and breast cancer.

Participate in clinical trials including breast cancer prevention, screening, and treatment trials. We need Black patients in trials to assure screening and treatment recommendations work well for black patients.

Early detection increases the chances of cure of breast cancer. Breast cancers that are diagnosed at an early stage can have up to approximately 90% survival. So take this information to heart, educate those around you about breast health, and remember it's breast pink 365 days of the year!

Please remember that Linkages to Life is part of our National programming and that Sickle Cell disease is now a new approved program. We encourage you to plan add a blood donation component to your chapter programming in November and/or as part of your Black Family Wellness Expo. Please work with your local chapter of the Red Cross to facilitate blood donation. AFRICAN AMERICAN BLOOD DONORS

Today, we need more people of African American heritage to grow the number of blood donors with well-matched blood to help those with sickle cell disease. According to Dr. Dawn C. Ward, MD, medical director of the of UCLA Health Blood & Platelet Center, "Blood donations overall have yet to bounce back from critical shortages during the COVID-19 pandemic." Dr. Ward also states the "The number of African American blood donors is extremely low," nationally. Given that the majority of people suffering from sickle cell are of African descent, it is essential to increase the collection of blood donations from individuals of African descent. The American Red Cross has launched a national campaign entitled, Our Blood Saves Lives "Closing the Sickle Cell Gap" to reach more donors who are African American, African, Caribbean and Mixed ethnicity to help patients with sickle cell and improve health outcomes in the United States. It is estimated that over 100,000 people have sickle cell disease and may require regular blood transfusions throughout their lifetime. Blood transfusions are critical in managing pain and the long-term health of those suffering from sickle cell. Blood donations from individuals of the same race or similar ethnicity and blood type are the most effective way to help patients who are experiencing a sickle cell crisis.

The Our Blood Saves Lives campaign serves to educate and increase blood drives across the United States, in the Bahamas and the United Kingdom. In addition, this campaign seeks to create a dialogue surrounding longstanding mistrust of the medical field within the African American Community, in hopes of rebuilding confidence and saving lives. The primary goal is to emphasize the importance of blood donations from African Americans to combat health disparities within the community, including but not limited to:

- a. Sickle Cell Disease
- b. Complicated childbirths
- c. Chronic illnesses, such as heart disease
- d. Trauma-related accidents, and violence

There is a great need for people of all communities to give blood to make sure that there is the right blood for everyone. Everyone can make a difference by supporting blood donations and recruiting new donors. The American Red Cross is looking to collaborate and mobilize resources in the most vulnerable communities. Through the national network, the Red Cross will support blood drives by providing educational information about the need for regular blood donations and donor eligibility, and/or active blood donor recruitment. They will also provide; planning assistance, recruitment tools, equipment & Eamp; supplies, and trained staff to screen donors and collect donations. 



Parliamentary Pointers

STANDING RULES: YOUR KEY TO EFFECTIVE CHAPTER MANAGEMENT

Best chapter management practices include having both chapter bylaws and chapter standing rules to effectively manage the business of Links. Standing rules are rules (1) which are related to the details of the administration of a society rather than to the parliamentary procedure, and (2) which can be adopted or changed upon the same conditions as any ordinary act of the society. RONR (12th ed.) 2:23. For example, a rule setting the time when meetings will begin is a standing rule. Standing rules are adopted as the need arises. Unlike bylaws and special rules, standing rules can be temporarily suspended for a session. See NAP Pathways to Proficiency, What Does It Say in the Bylaws? at pg.3.

Please note: A chapter standing rule may not conflict with or amend any governing document of The Links, Incorporated or the chapter's bylaws.

Chapter standing rules help members know what is expected of them and may cover a wide range of topics. In a recent survey of Western Area chapters with standing rules, the following topics were among the top 10 included in a majority of them:

- 1. Ads and Philanthropic Donations
- 2. Attendance credit/Sign-in process and procedure/Absence Notifications
- 3. Chapter Delegate and Alternate: Selection process and Expenses Covered
- 4. Courtesies and Acknowledgments (Cards, Flowers, Gifts)
- 5. Handling of Emergency Expenditures
- 6. Hostess Requirements, Expectations and Schedule
- 7. Limits on Debate during meetings
- 8. Meeting Notices, Date and Time
- 9. New Business: Requirements for introducing new business
- 10. Officer/Facet/Committee Reports: Advance written reports required



If your chapter has not yet adopted standing rules or updated them in recent years, I invite you to consider adopting a set of them to assist your chapter in functioning more efficiently and effectively going forward.
