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### **About the Cover**









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The Art Gallery e-mag John Singer Sargent

A Master of Portraiture and Light





### **Early Life and Cosmopolitan Influences** (1856-1874)

John Singer Sargent was born on January 12, 1856, in Florence, Italy, to American expatriate parents Fitz William and Mary Newbold Sargent. The Sargents, originally from Philadelphia, had left the United States following the death of their first child. Their life abroad was initially intended as a temporary retreat, but it turned into a lifelong European tour. Sargent's early years were marked by constant travel across France, Germany, Switzerland, and Italy, creating a worldly, multilingual, and artistically saturated environment for the young prodigy.

Sargent showed remarkable talent for drawing as a child. His mother, an amateur artist herself, encouraged his artistic pursuits. He received informal training from traveling tutors, and by his teens, he was making meticulous copies of Old Master paintings in European museums. His early influences included Titian, Rubens, and particularly Diego Velázquez, whose fluid realism and psychological depth would resonate deeply in Sargent's own work.

In 1874, Sargent was admitted to the École des Beaux-Arts in Paris, the prestigious state art school. There, he studied under Carolus-Duran, a fashionable portrait painter who emphasized direct painting, bold brushwork, and tonal harmony over detailed preliminary drawing. Duran's modern approach stood in contrast to the rigid academic traditions of the

École. Sargent became his star pupil and absorbed his techniques with extraordinary proficiency.

### Paris Years and *Madame X* Controversy (1874-1886)

Sargent began exhibiting at the Paris Salon in the late 1870s. His early submissions, such as Fanny Watts (1877) and Elizabeth Winthrop Chanler (1878), displayed not only impressive technical skill but also a growing psychological insight into his sitters. By the early 1880s, he had established himself among the leading portraitists of the Paris art world.

In 1882, he painted *The Daughters of Edward Darley* Boit, now one of his most celebrated works, in which four young girls are shown in an asymmetrical, mysterious interior space. The painting challenges traditional portrait composition and emphasizes mood and atmosphere over formal posing. The piece foreshadows modernist concerns with ambiguity, space, and identity.

However, the apex—and crisis—of his Paris career came in 1884 with *Portrait of Madame X*. The subject, Virginie Gautreau, was a wealthy and glamorous American living in Paris society, known for her beauty and daring fashion. Sargent depicted her in a black gown with a fallen strap, striking a pose that was both sensual and statuesque. Despite the painting's technical brilliance, it shocked Salon critics and the public, who found it indecent. The scandal damaged Gautreau's reputation and nearly ruined Sargent's own career in Paris.

Disillusioned by the backlash, Sargent relocated to London in 1886. Though the move was prompted by scandal, it would prove a turning point in his career.

#### **London and International Acclaim** (1886-1907)


London offered a new and eager clientele. Within a few years, Sargent became the premier portrait artist of the English aristocracy and upper class. His clients included nobility, politicians, intellectuals, and cultural figures. His portraits from this period are notable for their theatrical flair, lush textures, and psychological intensity. Works like Lady Agnew of Lochnaw (1892), Mrs. Hugh Hammersley (1892), and Mrs. Carl Meyer and Her Children (1896) combine technical brilliance with subtle narrative tension.

Sargent also painted numerous prominent Americans during his transatlantic visits. Among them were industrialist John D. Rockefeller, art collector Isabella Stewart Gardner, and President Theodore Roosevelt,

whom he captured in a famously tense sitting that resulted in a powerful and iconic image.

During this time, he became close friends with writers Henry James and Robert Louis Stevenson, both of whom he painted. His 1887 portrait of Stevenson is unconventional and modern, showing the author midstride in a cluttered interior, suggesting intellect in motion and the intimacy of their relationship.

Despite the immense demand for his portraiture, Sargent grew restless with the repetition and social demands. Privately, he expressed boredom and even disdain for the profession, famously referring to it as "a pimp's profession" because of the flattery and diplomacy required.

### Watercolors, Travels, and Murals (1907–1925)

In 1907, at the height of his fame, Sargent stopped accepting portrait commissions. He turned instead to watercolor and landscape painting, seeking artistic freedom and spontaneity. His watercolors, painted during extensive travels through the Alps, the Middle East, and North Africa, are vibrant, expressive, and filled with light. They reveal a freer, more personal side of his artistry—one less constrained by societal expectations.

Sargent painted architectural studies, sun-drenched facades, fishing boats in Venice, Bedouins in the desert, and mountain landscapes with an almost impressionistic looseness. These works were widely admired, and when exhibited in New York and London, they often sold out.

He also undertook large-scale mural projects, including the *Triumph of Religion* series at the Boston Public Library (1895–1919), and murals at the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. These works drew from classical mythology, religious allegory, and Renaissance traditions. Though not always critically successful, they demonstrated his ambition and versatility.

In 1918, during World War I, Sargent was commissioned by the British government to paint scenes of the war. His most famous war painting, *Gassed*, depicts a line of blinded soldiers walking in single file, led by an orderly. The work captures the horror and futility of war with clarity and restraint and stands as one of the most powerful images of WWI.

#### **Personal Life and Character**

Sargent never married and remained largely private about his personal affairs. He was known for his charm, wit, and modesty, but also for his reserve. He lived with his sisters and maintained close friendships with several women and men, leading to speculation about his sexuality. While he left few personal writings that could confirm such details, modern scholarship has explored the homoerotic undertones in some of his male portraits and drawings.

He had a deep appreciation for music and literature, often sketching musicians and attending operas and salons. He was an avid traveler, often spending months abroad each year, accompanied by friends, relatives, or fellow artists. Though he worked in the elite world of aristocracy and privilege, he maintained close ties to other artists and cultural figures.

### **Death and Lasting Legacy**

John Singer Sargent died unexpectedly of heart failure in his sleep on April 14, 1925, at age 69. He was buried in Brookwood Cemetery in Surrey, England. At the time of his death, the art world was moving rapidly toward abstraction and modernism, leaving representational art and portraiture less fashionable.


For decades, Sargent's reputation was somewhat eclipsed by the avant-garde movements that followed. He was often viewed as a relic of the Gilded Age. However, beginning in the mid-20th century, a reassessment of his work led to renewed appreciation for his technical mastery, psychological insight, and painterly innovation. Today, he is recognized as one of the preeminent portraitists in Western art history.

Major institutions including the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Tate Britain, the National Gallery of Art, and the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, hold significant collections of his work. His paintings are studied not only for their dazzling technique but for their unique place at the intersection of realism, impressionism, and modern psychological portraiture.

### **Epilogue**

John Singer Sargent remains a towering figure in the history of art. Through his remarkable ability to capture character, elegance, and the subtle interplay of light and form, he bridged the 19th and 20th centuries with enduring grace. His portraits are more than mere likenesses—they are timeless studies of personality and presence. Whether in the precise folds of a satin dress, the distant gaze of a sitter, or the golden haze of a Venetian canal, Sargent's hand continues to reveal beauty, complexity, and the truth beneath appearances.





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# Savannah Brandenburg—

Dictator Sveta-aka Savannah Brandenburg

Originally from California and now based in Florida, Dictator Sveta is the creative persona of a U.S. Air Force veteran turned visual artist. Her alias is both a nod to her eight-year career in military intelligence—where structure, secrecy, and surreal realities collide—and a tongue-in-cheek rebellion against authoritarianism. "Dictator Sveta" reflects her time living in Russia, her fluency in the language, and the contrast between her commanding past and her warm, unconventional nature.

After years of decoding satellite imagery and tracking global patterns, she now channels her sharp observational skills into vivid, immersive art. Her pieces often blend psychedelic, surreal, and fantasy aesthetics—where glowing mushrooms thrive, goddess figures rise from bioluminescent oceans, and reality is just a launchpad for visual storytelling. Using oil pastels, soft pastels, and digital tools, her work explores altered perception, mental health, cosmic beauty, and the strange harmony between nature and the subconscious.

Dictator Sveta's art has been showcased at festivals, night markets, and smoke shops throughout Florida. With a deep love for color, symbolism, and all things slightly weird, she invites viewers to dive into their imaginations, question the surface of things, and find a little magic in the unexpected.

### Paster and Paint with Plaster of Paris!

### **Melding Acrylic Paint**

About a year ago I saw a video of someone that does beautiful carvings on plaster placed on boards. I had to try it and so bought some Plaster of Paris and ever the one to experiment, I decided that instead of putting the plaster on the outside of a cradle board, I would pour it into the backside making the cradle a frame. After it dried, I painted the plaster black and carved a scene into it. I called it "Descending Waterfalls".

It has been a year, but I wanted to do something similar. Now I am sure this has been done before but I have not seen it so for me It was an experiment. This technique combines sculpting relief, acrylic washes and painting, and sgraffito to create texture and highlights.









I purchased a wooden pine circle and sanded it. Then, to reinforce it as well as give it something to add a hanger on, I took some old furring strips (molding) and cut them and glued them to the back and let it dry.



I mixed up a bit of Plaster of Paris and covered the circle and used a putty knife to give it a wall texture. After it dried, I lightly penciled in a simple drawing just to see how this was going to work. No need for something elaborate. Using some carving tools I carved out the image along the lines and beveled the edges.









I blew off the Dust and sprayed water on it, wiped it and let it dry. Then I gessoed it well and let it dry. Afterwards, I took a Black acrylic wash and covered the whole thing and then let it set in a bit. Then I lightly wiped off the paint leaving the black in the crevasses (this is similar to staining wood). I then used a green scrubby to lightly create texture and white highlights where I wanted them.





Now, I began to paint the flowers and a little bit of the background with thin coats of acrylic paint. To make it pop I add a little metallic copper to the background and I outlined the flowers with a black acrylic marker and black paint.







I scraped off the paint (like sgraffito) to bring out the highlights!



After 24 hours of everything drying, I gave it a couple coats of spray matte varnish and a couple coats of brushon Gloss varnish!



This is a great, inexpensive way to do a relief painting with texture. I have done something similar with modeling paste and air dry clay but this method allows you to carve fine lines and deep valleys. Just seal the Plaster of Paris with Gesso and your good to go. Who knew, Plaster and paint could be so fun! GLW

### Miraculous Neit!

Bas Jan Alder was a Dutch artist that was a part of the West Coast Conceptual art movement. He was born to parents who were both Calvinist ministers. His father was executed in 1944 by the Nazis for helping Jews escape the holocaust. He moved and became a resident of Los Angeles. To perhaps mock artist advent-guard artist Piet Monderian who broke down art into simple geometric shapes and limited colors, he painted "Piet Niet" meaning Piet Not. This was a rare painting from a conceptual artist where often photographed and filmed himself performing his "art" like sitting in a chair on a roof and then falling off the roof; "The fall", or riding a bicycle and "Falling" into a canal. Or a film of him having a tea party by himself under a large wooden box held opened by a stick as if it was an animal trap.

His last conceptual art was called "In Search of the Miraculous" where he was going to display photos of himself sailing across the Atlantic in a 13-foot stolen boat from Massachusetts to the Netherlands. It was far from a miracle however, when his boat was found floating upside down near an Irish coast. His body was never found again.



### **A Woman's Revenge**



Artemisia Lomi Gentileschi was an accomplished Italian Baroque painter. Her early work was in the style of Caravaggio. She was producing professional work by the age of 15 in an era when women had few opportunities to pursue artistic training. But her brothers and father were all painters, yet she excelled them all.

One day her father rented out an upstairs apartment to a young woman named Tuzia who befriended Artemisia, When Artisimia was 18, Tuzia had two boys over. One of the boys raped Artemezia. Although she cried out, her friend Tuzia kept quiet.

Angrily she confronted her rapist in a public trial. But the court did not believe her and tied cords around her fingers and tortured her to verify the charge. Though they believed her, they ultimately set him free.

She channeled her ensuing rage into her Biblical paintings like "Judith Slaying Holofernes," which depicts determined Old Testament heroine Judith severing the head of the drunken Babylonian general and "Jael and Siseria" where a woman drives a spike through a man's head.

Revenge also came through her success as a court painter for the House of Medici and as the acquaintance of the likes of Galileo.

### Jack the Ripper's Bedroom!


Walter Sickert was a German-born British painter from London. He was a member of the Camden Town Group, a group of English Post-Impressionist artists in London where they often met at Sickerts studio in Camden. He was quite eccentric and often painted well known figures from press clippings. He also used prostitutes for models for his paintings.

He painted a series of four paintings called "The Camden Town Murder" where a prostitute was found with her throat slit similar to the Ripper's work. Another artist, Robert Wood, was accused of the murder but later acquitted.

Sickert was also obsessed with Jack the Ripper who murdered 5 prostitutes 20 years earlier. Sikert's friends said he would often dress like Jack the Ripper.

In 1906 he painted a dark and moody painting that he entitled "Jack the Ripper's Bedroom". It was actually his own bedroom but the Landlady had told him that it once belonged to Jack the Ripper in 1888. She said that the tenant had gone out on the events of days relevant to the murders, and left once the murders stopped

After Sickert's death, some researchers thought he was Jack the Ripper himself but later discounted because He supposedly was in France at the time.
