CITY CENTRE CAMPUS HITS NEW HEIGHT

Construction of the college's new city centre campus hit new heights just before the end of term, with the roof on the showpiece building now complete.

The state-of-the-art campus - which is phase two of the council's transformational City Learning Quarter masterplan - is situated around the Old Hall Street and St George's Parade area and is due to open in the 2025/26 academic year.



Louise Fall, principal and chief executive of the college, said: "After many years of discussions and planning, the latest construction milestone means that we are another step closer to the dream of a new campus becoming a reality.

"This is great news for the college and for the thousands of students, apprentices, staff, employers and local people who will benefit from the fantastic teaching and learning facilities for many years to come."

SUPPORTING STAFF

Staff who have recently joined the college got the chance to meet members of the senior management team (SMT) at a 'speed dating' session. Around 20 new employees attended the event and spent five minutes with each member of SMT (or a representative if they were unavailable) to find out more about their roles and responsibilities and what their respective department does.



PROMOTING OPPORTUNITIES

Students from a range of courses spent five days on a Regeneration Brainery bootcamp designed to give them the tools, contacts and know-how to kick-start their future careers.

As part of the programme, the students toured Wolverhampton and the wider West Midlands area visiting companies, speaking to employers and listening to inspirational talks, as well as meeting Richard Parker, Mayor of the West Midlands.

The students also got a behind-the-scenes look at progress of the construction of the college's new city centre campus, which is being developed as part of City of Wolverhampton Council's City Learning Quarter





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masterplan and is due to open in the 2025/26 academic year.

Participants on an Aspire in the Community course - run at Fifth Avenue community centre - gained a range of skills to get them ready for work and also learnt how to cook as part of the programme.

As well as developing communication, customer service and leadership skills, they added cooking skills to the mix thanks to weekly practical sessions run by a community chef from the WV10

Consortium and were able to take whatever they'd made home with them.

Students on a Get Ahead Programme took part in a range of activities to enhance their learning during the college's enrichment week.

Activities were designed to enable them to apply their learning in new ways, further develop their communication and teamwork skills, and support their mental wellbeing.







CURRICULUM ROUND UP APPRENTICESHIPS

An apprentice from a local engineering company who is doing his training through the college was named as one of the contenders for a national apprenticeship award.

Dan Collins, a toolmaking apprentice at Jenks & Cattell was shortlisted for the Aluminium Federation (ALFED) Apprentice of the Year award.



BAKERY, HOSPITALITY AND CATERING

Students doing professional cookery qualifications got a behind-the-scenes look at how a commercial kitchen operates when they paid a visit to the head office of Marston's PLC.

They toured the head office and took part in a masterclass with the company's development chef and tasted some of the dishes on offer.

Meanwhile, bakery students helped everyone get into the Christmas spirit by turning out a range of festive goodies including iced cakes, yule logs and mince pies.









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CONSTRUCTION

Students on carpentry programmes are getting hands-on experience of fitting high-quality kitchens thanks to a donation of brand new units from the Wolverhampton branch of Howdens.



ENGINEERING

Equipment in the new Advanced Technology and Automotive Centre, at the Wellington Road campus, continues to be expanded with the recent arrival of a range of new kit - including a CNC machine, bandsaw, lathe and milling machine - which will enable students to work accurately with metal and other materials during their course.

Students studying for automotive and engineering qualifications got the chance to find out about employment opportunities in both sectors at a

careers fair in the new Advanced Technology and Automotive Centre.

Around 250 students attended the event and talked to employers from different companies across the region about the range of jobs available and the skills and knowledge needed for successful careers in the industries.







ENGLISH

Students doing English qualifications took a step back in time during a visit to the Black Country Living Museum.

They discovered what 19th century England was like and heard stories about life from the start of the Industrial Revolution until after the end of World War Two.




FUTURES FOUNDATION LEARNING

GAMES DESIGN

Students studying for diplomas in games design got the lowdown on how social media influencers are sued by companies to promote their brands in the online gaming world through a link-up with an industry-leading esports marketing agency.

Representatives from Ireland-based Feenix Group ran a workshop for students to give them an insight into how brands integrate into online gaming platforms how the company identifies and recruits influencer talent to connect brands with the global esports audience, and the skills needed to work in the gaming sector.



HEALTH AND SOCIAL CARE

Students on the new Health T Level programme have been learning about the healthcare sector and getting hands-on experience of carrying out CPR on training 'manikins' - and they have been proudly wearing their new college uniforms too! The students also benefitted from a visit by John Harper, managing director of Complesso Healthcare Solutions, to find out more about what they will be required to do when they start their industry work placement with the company. Meanwhile, students studying for health and social care diplomas have been developing their mentoring skills by working alongside students on the Futures Foundation Learning programme and support them in lessons.

They also benefitted from a visit from representatives from the University of Wolverhampton and found out about career













opportunities in the fields of midwifery, nursing, public health and social work.

MATHS

A participant on a Get into Work for people who want to become support workers at the college reaped double benefits by doing the course. Joshua Cox was not only offered a full-time job but he also improved his maths skills through the Multiply programme, so that when he was decorating at home he was able to calculate the size of the room and how much paint he needed to buy.

Meanwhile, tutors from the Multiply programme have been working with parents at Villiers Primary School, in Bilston, helping them to develop confidence in maths (and English) so that they can not only support their children with homework, but also use their new skills in day-to-day life.





PERFORMING ARTS

Pupils from local schools got a glimpse of what it takes to be a successful actor when they attended a Perform Fest event organised by the performing arts department.

Former performing arts student Priyasasha Kumari - who went on to star in the popular TV

series Waterloo Road - was joined by representatives from the city's Arena Theatre who gave pupils advice on the skills and knowledge they need for careers in the industry.


TEACHING AND EDUCATION


