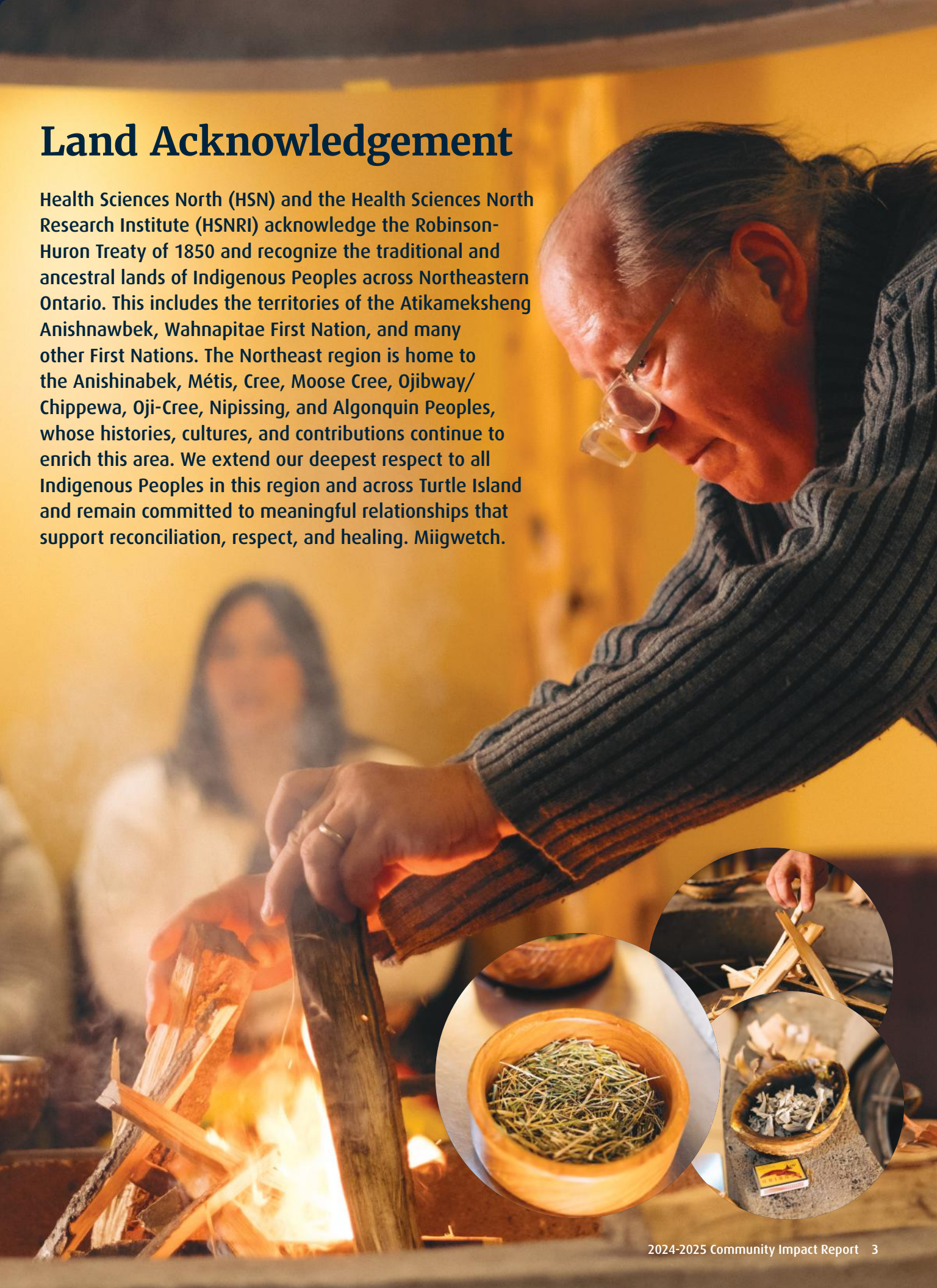
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Land Acknowledgement

Our Collective Accomplishments: A Testament to Your Generosity

As we reflect on another year of profound impact and progress, we share the Health Sciences North Foundation's annual report with immense pride and gratitude. This past year has seen significant transformation and a deepened commitment to the health and well-being of Northeastern Ontario.

We're excited to celebrate a pivotal milestone: the amalgamation of the Northern Cancer Foundation, NEO Kids Foundation, and Health Sciences North Foundation into one unified, stronger organization. This monumental step, driven by over a decade of collaborative effort and, most importantly, by listening to our incredible donors allows us to direct more of each precious dollar to frontline patient care, research, and education. By streamlining processes, we're creating more collective "horsepower" to better support our patients.

Reflecting on the past year, we're incredibly proud of the collective achievements your support made possible. Your unwavering generosity raised a remarkable **\$12.2 million** (net lottery) in support of excellence in patient care. In the past year alone, we invested **\$4.4 million** directly into patient areas at HSN.

Over the last year, your support enabled many significant milestones, including:

- **Transforming Cancer Care:** Advancements like the \$1 million Di Brina Family donation for chemotherapy, the MOLLI Surgical Localization System (supported by CIBC's \$500,000 pledge), and upgrades to our CT Simulator (with a \$200,000 gift from Wheaton Precious Metals) ensure world-class cancer treatment remains close to home. Community events like the Luncheon of Hope continue to push boundaries for cancer solutions.
- **Elevating Pediatric & Mental Health Services:** Your generosity significantly enhanced pediatric care, highlighted by the Palladino Auto Group Golf Classic, surpassing \$1 million in total funds raised. A vital \$150,000 Desjardins donation strengthened our Child and Adolescent Mental Health Program, while the Knights of Columbus's \$157,000 and BESTECH's over \$100,000 also supported NEO Kids and Family Program.
- **Driving Innovation & Research:** RBC Foundation's \$250,000 contribution boosted nursing education and simulation. HSNRI appointed Research Chairs in Healthy Aging and Indigenous Health, driving socially-accountable improvements. HSNRI's inaugural Catalyst community event showcased groundbreaking medical research, connecting researchers with our community.
- **Uniting Community for Health:** Events like Toronto Celebrates Sudbury and the Tim Hortons Smile Cookie campaign, alongside our successful 50/50 Cash Lottery (raising over \$22.4 million for HSN/HSNRI), mobilized unparalleled community generosity.
- **Securing Tomorrow:** We have reserved more than \$40 million for future projects including capital equipment and high priority healthcare needs priming innovation and excellence for generations to come.

These accomplishments are a direct result of our combined forces and your unwavering generosity. Each dollar you've entrusted to us has translated into tangible improvements in patient care, advanced medical technology, and enhanced health services right here in Northeastern Ontario. 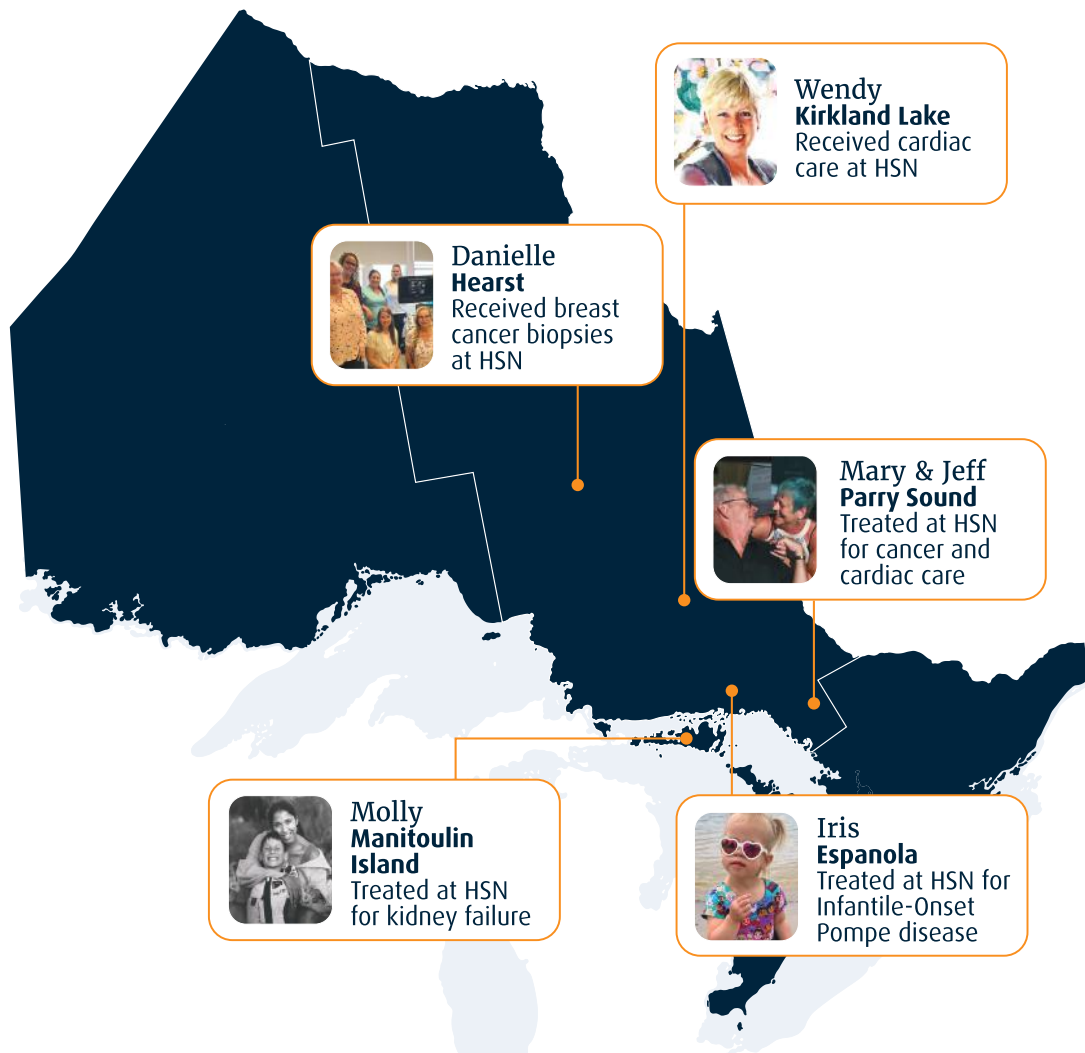

Di Brina Family Holdings is proud to announce a **\$1 million** donation to the Health Sciences North (HSN) Foundation, further enhancing world-class cancer care services at the Shirley and Jim Fielding Northeast Cancer Centre. This generous contribution will be instrumental in expanding chemotherapy treatment facilities, ensuring that more patients across Northern Ontario have timely access to critical care, while advancing important research to help patients and families in years ahead.

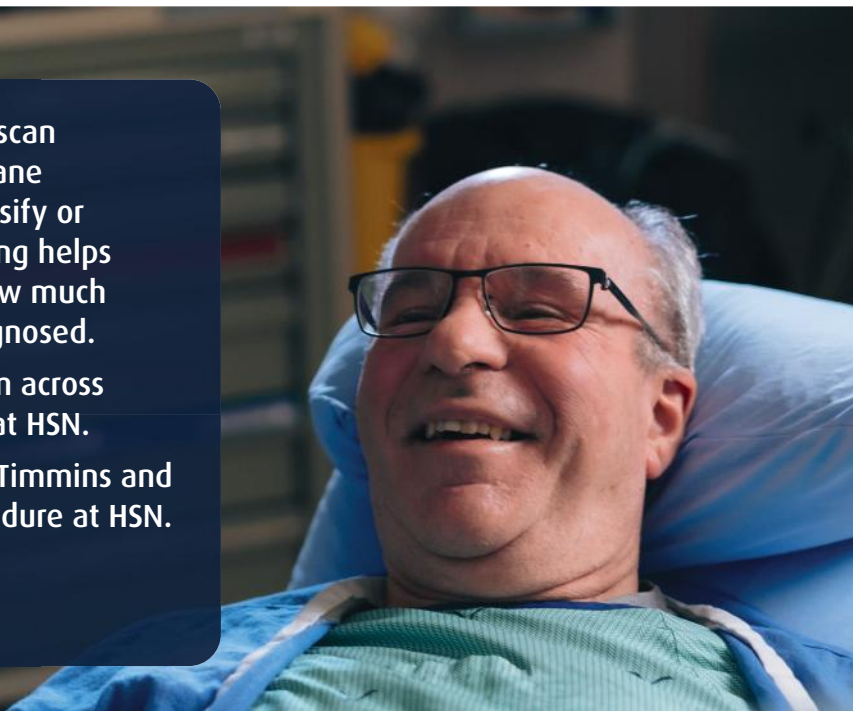

HSN introduced a new and innovative PET scan procedure, called Prostate-Specific Membrane Antigen (PSMA), which is used to help classify or 'stage' prostate cancer. Staging or re-staging helps describe and classify a cancer based on how much is in the body and where it was when diagnosed.

Each year, approximately 150 patients from across the region can now receive this vital care at HSN.

The first few patients came from as far as Timmins and the Temiskaming region to have this procedure at HSN.

These breakthroughs wouldn't be possible without the generosity of our donors.

The creation of a safety-focused comfort room will offer an environment where patients can self-regulate during periods of heightened stress and emotional dysregulation.

On International Childhood Cancer Day, we proudly recognized the remarkable strength of two young survivors, Amelia, 15, and Curtis, 12, who rang the HSN Foundation-funded Victory Bell after completing their chemotherapy treatments.

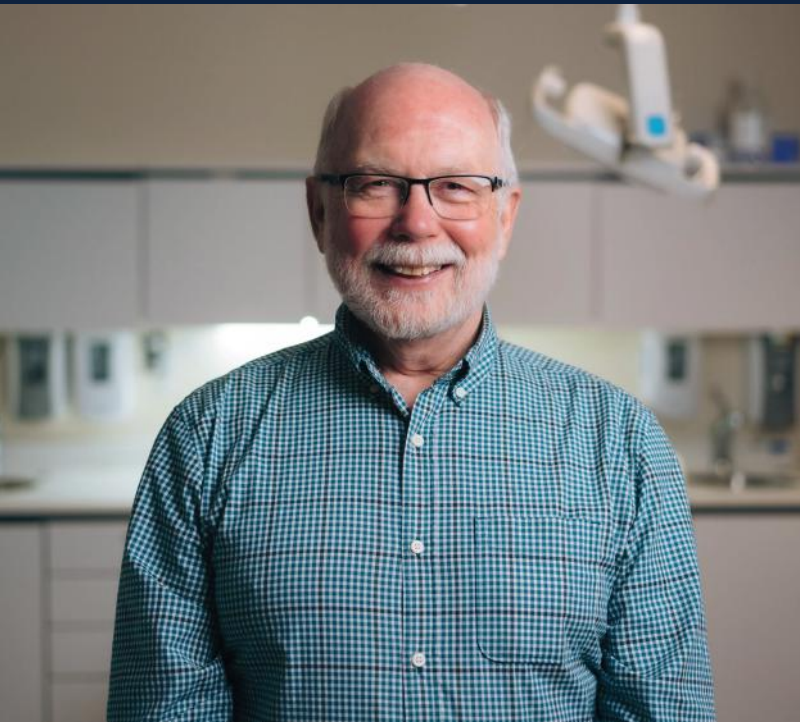

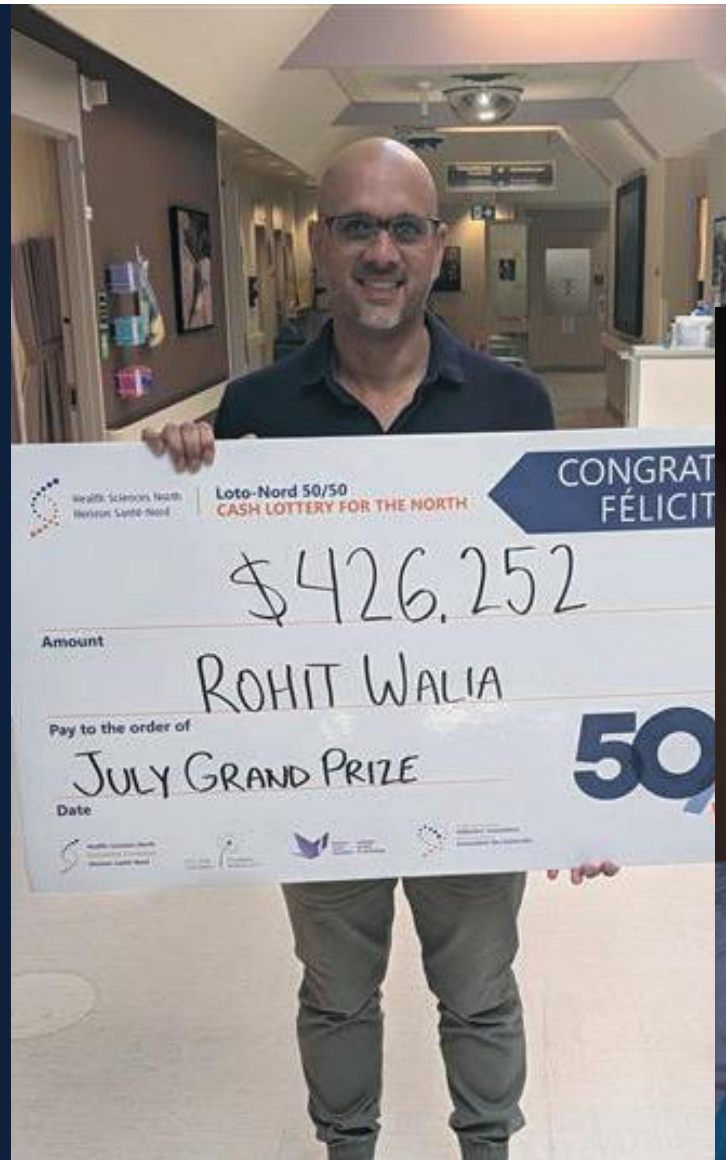

Winning the HSN 50/50 is certainly a special moment for me, but it also feels like things have come full circle in a way. When my father passed away in 2009 with esophageal cancer, my family knew the importance of the amazing cancer treatment he received at the Cancer Centre and its importance to Sudbury and surrounding communities," said Rohit, "From a young age, my parents instilled in me the importance of giving back. I remember travelling to India with them when I was young and providing food to a small village. Those lessons passed on to me and my family's history here made the decision to give a simple one. If I have the capacity and the capability to give back, why would I keep it all to myself?"



Funds raised through HSN's 50/50 Cash Lottery fund Breast Vacuum Biopsy System

Breast cancer is the most common cancer among women in Canada. It's estimated that, on average, 70 Canadian women are diagnosed with breast cancer every day. Screening mammograms are important because they are the best way to detect early-stage breast cancer, resulting in a higher likelihood of successful treatment.

Using a special needle attached to a vacuum device to take breast tissue samples for examination and detection of breast cancer, the breast vacuum biopsy system is one of the best breast cancer detection devices.

Funding Innovation

\$500,000 raised through the HSN 50/50 will support renovations to one of five radiation bunkers at HSN

Cancer patients travel across Northeastern Ontario to receive radiation treatment at the Cancer Centre in Sudbury. The five linear accelerators (LINACs) are used for external beam radiation treatments for cancer patients.

The current cooling equipment in the LINACs is aged and requires complete replacement. One LINAC is being replaced through Cancer Care Ontario, but renovations to the radiation bunker that houses the piece are required and not covered.

Your support of the HSN 50/50 Lottery tremendously impacts those seeking care in Northeastern Ontario.

Advancing Health Through Research

We would like to acknowledge the dedicated work of our Academic and Research Impact teams for their efforts to support the work of our Academic Health Sciences Centre, with 134 active trials across 16 research areas which made it possible to support the care of 931 patients through research this year. The inaugural Catalyst community engagement event hosted by HSNRI welcomed over 300 staff and community members, showcasing through a variety of presentations the many ways in which research improves the lives of patients at HSN.

As part of our goal to meet the specific needs of the Northeastern Ontario communities, the HSN Foundation supported the appointment of Dr. Chris Verschoor and Rylee Restoule as HSNF Research Chair in Healthy Aging and HSNF Coordinator of Indigenous Health Research at HSNRI. Their work will continue to generate research that drives socially-accountable improvements in health outcomes for the people of Northeastern Ontario.

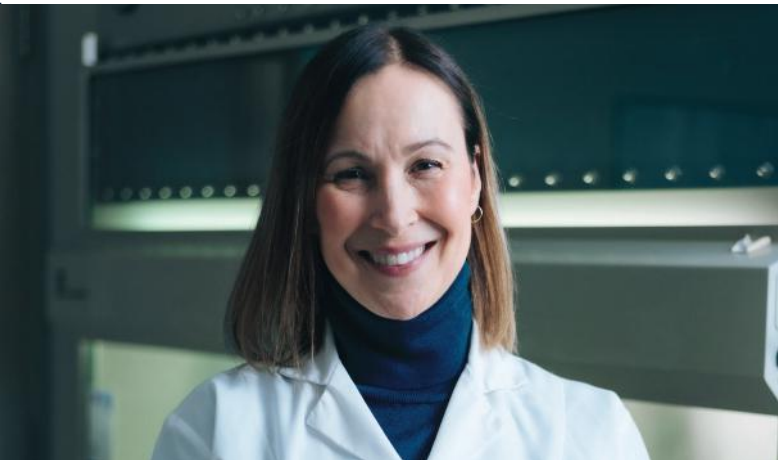

Bridging Health Gaps for Indigenous Communities

Rylee Restoule, HSN Foundation Research Coordinator of Indigenous Health, is leading a vital initiative to amplify Indigenous voices and improve health outcomes within Northern Ontario's healthcare system. A proud Ojibwe-Kwe woman from Dokis First Nation, Riley's journey, rooted in cultural reconnection and advanced studies, informs her crucial work.

Her mandate at HSNRI is to build a research team focused on Indigenous needs. One key project explores the impact of Indigenous Patient Navigators, who help bridge cultural and systemic barriers for those accessing care. Riley's efforts directly support HSN's strategic goals to enhance culturally safe and holistic care, ensuring that every Indigenous patient feels safe, respected, and seen. Her work is creating real change, fostering a healthier future for Indigenous communities across the North. The Indigenous Research Coordinator role at HSNRI is supported by the HSN Foundation and the contributions of our donors.

Dr. Chris Verschoor Named HSN Foundation Research Chair in Healthy Aging

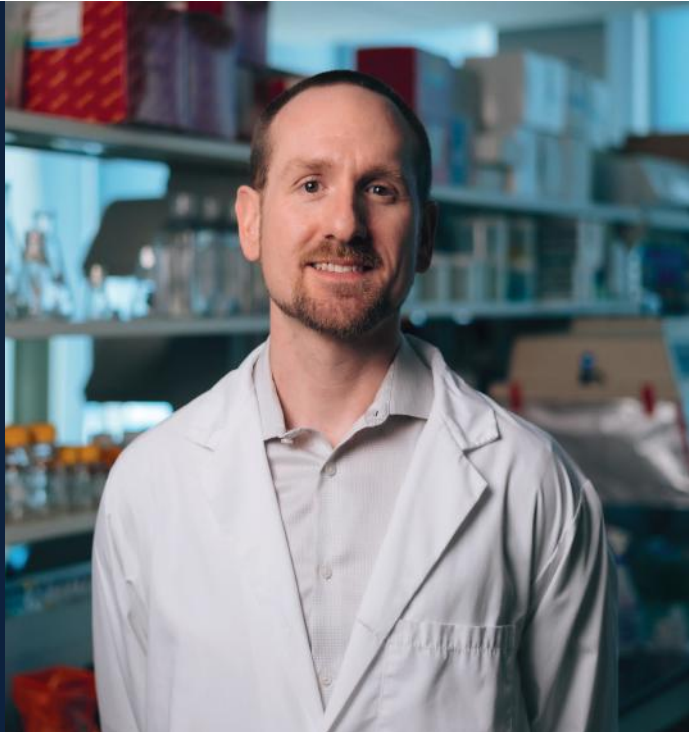
This new role is a vital step toward addressing the unique healthcare needs of Northern Ontario's aging population.

According to census data, Northeastern Ontario continues to age faster than the rest of Canada. Dr. Verschoor is dedicated to equipping healthcare providers with the knowledge to treat older adults more effectively and to promote healthy aging. With the support of our donors, his research will help provide quality care while reducing hospital visits and allow seniors to spend more time at home with loved ones.

Dr. Verschoor joined HSNRI in 2019 as a Research Scientist and brings extensive expertise in leveraging biological data to address age-related health challenges.

"Dr. Verschoor's appointment strengthens our research and clinical community. His innovative approach will help translate discoveries into better care for seniors across the region. Investing in Excellence: Cutting-Edge Technology



CIBC Pledges \$500,000 to Health Sciences North Foundation to Advance Breast Cancer Care

This significant contribution will support the acquisition of the MOLLI Surgical Localization System, a cutting-edge technology set to revolutionize breast cancer surgery at HSN.

The MOLLI Surgical Localization System represents a major leap forward in breast cancer care. Each year, over 120 women undergo breast biopsies at HSN to diagnose breast cancer tumours. MOLLI, a wire-free localization system developed by MOLLI Surgical, is designed to improve the precision and efficiency of breast cancer surgery. By using a small tissue marker implanted near the tumour and a wand to detect the marker's location, surgeons can more accurately remove tumours, potentially leading to smaller incisions, less pain, and better cosmetic outcomes for patients.



Wheaton Precious Metals Improves Access to Radiation Therapy

A generous donation of **\$200,000** from Wheaton Precious Metals will go towards the CT Simulator Replacement Project at the Shirley and Jim Fielding Northeast Cancer Centre. The CT Simulator is a vital component of radiation therapy, providing radiation oncologists with precise, state-of-the-art imaging to localize tumours and plan treatments with exceptional accuracy. Serving approximately 2,500 patients annually, the current CT simulator has been instrumental in delivering high-quality care, but is at end-of-life and in need of replacement. The new upgraded system will further improve patient outcomes.

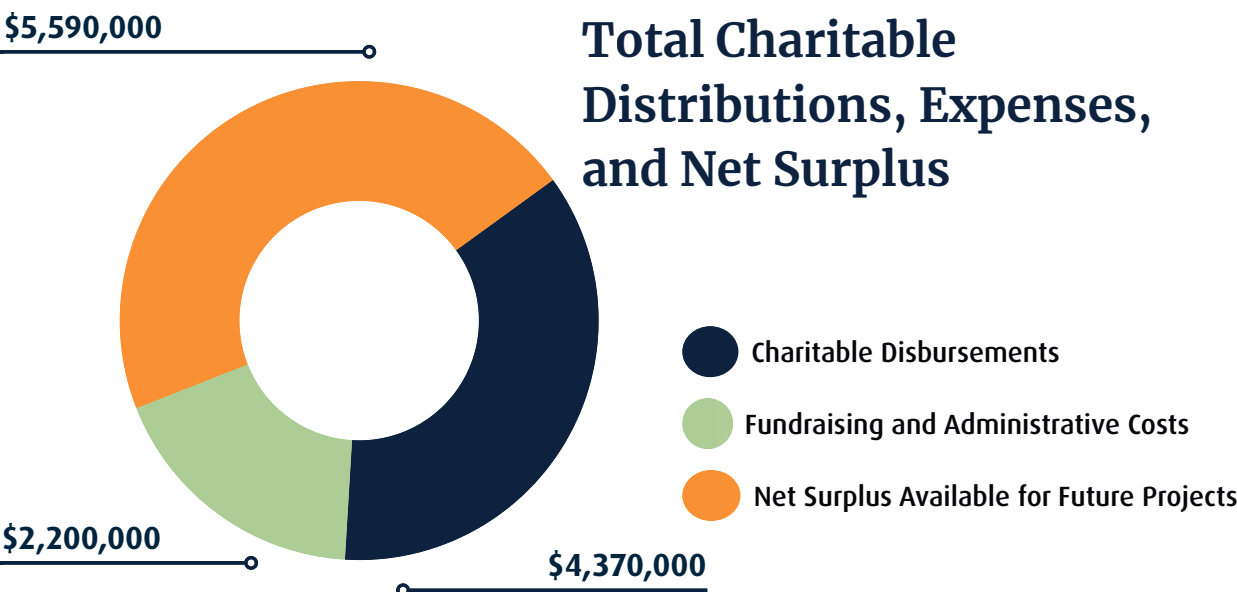
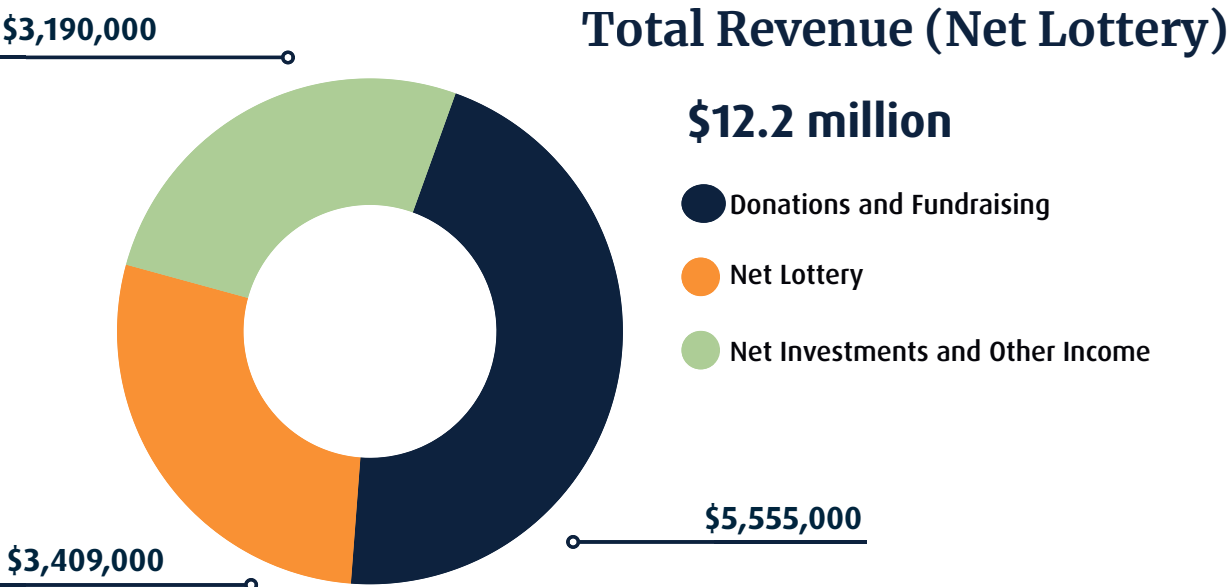
