Overview

This course is designed specifically for those members who wish to become <u>Fellows</u> of Association. The course extends and expands on the knowledge and skills that the acquired in the <u>Certificate Course in Arbitration</u>. This course will make considerable demands on a member's time.

Learning Format/Course Structure

The course consists of two modules, <u>Modules 3 and 4</u>. Module 4 (Award Writing, the Law and Practice of Arbitration, International Arbitration and Evidence) may only be undertaken concurrently with or after completion of Module 3 (Advanced Law of Contract and Delict). Neither module may be undertaken until a member has successfully completed <u>Modules 1 and 2</u> (the Certificate Course in Arbitration) and has met the minimum requirements for admission. The Association's <u>courses</u> will be presented exclusively through e-learning (online). Any member wanting to undertake the course may make application by completing the <u>application form</u>. The link to this facility and the course information booklet can be found on the Association's web page, <u>www.arbitrators.co.za</u>.

The Association's Fellowship Admission Course is an online learning course which is presented exclusively through e-learning. Students are expected to be able to independently work through the course material, undertake relevant research, submit assignments and prepare for the online examinations. Students are required to attend three compulsory online workshops for Module 3; three compulsory online workshop for Module 4A (Award Writing); and five compulsory online workshops, which include one compulsory two-day online workshop, for Module 4B (the Law and Practice of Arbitration, International Arbitration and Evidence).

Students will therefore be required to have access to the Internet in order to download the course material, submit the compulsory assignments, receive communications from the Association, attend workshops and write the online exams. Students, when making application for the course, must be familiar with the course requirements and information set out in the Fellowship Course information booklet which is available on the Association's <u>website</u>.

Requirements for Application

The prospective student must be a <u>member</u> of the Association who has completed the <u>Certificate Course in Arbitration</u> (Modules 1 and 2), or who has been exempted from Modules 1 and 3 through holding a South African law degree.
