Pastoral Letter - Revd Harry Welch

Dear Friends,

In the benefice, we are currently having a series of Bible sermons on the life and ministry of Old Testament Prophets. The Prophets were called by God to speak a message to a particular generation. There are five Major Prophets and twelve Minor Prophets; seventeen in all. The messages contained therein are tailored to counter the misconceptions and malpractices which had crept into the people's relationship with God.

There is a pattern to the Prophets' message from God. First is a reminder of where the people were in their relationship with God before they strayed. This is followed by a description as to how far the people had fallen from away, and then an encouragement, or warning, to turn back to God. Not all the Prophets were enthusiastic about their call from God. Isaiah was overwhelmed by a vision of God given as part of his calling, whereas Jonah tried his best to avoid his call and found himself all at sea. However, each message reached the intended recipients and God awaited their response. The message came from God's heart to His people; His desire to forgive and restore, to heal and save the lost sheep.

This waywardness of God's people was not confined to Old Testament times. Jesus is the embodiment of every message given to each of the Prophets. In the New Testament, the Lord spoke to the generation He lived amongst and turned an act in time – His death and resurrection – into a promise for all eternity of forgiveness and restitution. All that God promised to do in reconciliation, be it Old or New Testament, was made possible through the life death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

So, how do we, as Christians in our generation, avoid such waywardness? How do you and I ensure we do not go astray? The Prophet Micah offers the solution. The Prophet declares,

"He (God) has shown you, O mortal man, what is good and what does the Lord require of you? To act Justly and to love Mercy and to walk humbly with your God."

Once reconciled to the Father through Christ the Son, the call is, 'live out your faith in the power of the Holy Spirit.' Evidence of such a relationship is to act justly: to make a stand for right and to oppose evil. To love mercy: to bestow upon others the blessings we have received from God, no grudges, no divisions, no partisanship save that of being a child of God. Thirdly to walk humbly with your God. Herein lies the source of power, wisdom and discernment to stay true to the faith. The Hebrew word meaning 'to walk humbly' includes in it walking in a funeral or bridal procession. The Christian has died in Christ and as such is part of His Church, His bride and awaits the day when the church, living and spiritual, will meet the bridegroom Jesus Christ as He gathers His people to Him. The cure for waywardness is faithfully and humbly walking with Christ each day. May our walk together reveal Christ's power to change lives and enable us to encourage one another on our faith journey.

Wildflower Plug Planting at Boon Crag this August and September

We need your help to restore the wildflower hay meadows at Boon Crag this summer!

Since the 1930's, we have lost 97% of our wildflower meadows in Britain and now it only covers 1% of the land. Species rich grasslands, like hay meadows, are important for many reasons. To name a few of their ecosystem services; these habitats help increase pollination, improve soil health, act as natural flood defenses, improve animal health and provide nutritious food.

Cumbria Wildlife Trust and the National Trust are working together to restore traditional hay meadows to three of the fields at Coniston and the more helping hands we can get, the better.

A THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH by Rev. David Gregg AUGUST : THE PARIS OLYMPICS

Each corps in the British Army holds annual corps sports. In 1957, the star of the Medical Corps sports week was Dr. Roger Bannister. Each unit was expected to submit entrants, and our very small unit (of only 80 men} struggled to supply a team. Since the prospect of five days "leave" in Aldershot, in return for the minimal effort of a single heat on the track was on offer, I put myself down for the 100 yards! One of the competitors had run for Great Britain in the 1956 Olympics, and I am able to boast (tongue in cheek!) that I finished *ahead* of him in the Heats! (I trailed in a very poor last in Heat 1, and he almost overtook me as the leading runner in Heat 2!)

This year's Paris Olympics marks the 100th anniversary of the 1924 Paris Olympics, the setting for the film "Chariots of Fire". Its chief theme is the remarkable story of Eric Liddell, the 100 metres champion of Great Britain, who declined to compete on the Sabbath Day, because of his Christian principles, but went on to win the 400m title instead, breaking the World record in the process. (He spent the rest of his life as a Christian Missionary, eventually dying of disease in a Japanese internment camp in February 1945.

There are at least two ways that the Olympic Games feature in the New Testament.

One is with reference to the foot-races. In 1 Corinthians ch. 9 vs. 24-27, the apostle Paul writes:

Do you not know that in a race the runners all compete but only one receives the prize? Run in such a way that you may win it. Athletes exercise selfcontrol in all things they do, to receive a perishable wreath, but we an imperishable one.

Elsewhere the author of the Epistle to the Hebrews writes:

Therefore since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses (= spectators?) let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith. (Hebrews ch. 12 v. 2)

The laying aide of every encumbrance is a reference to the near-nakedness in which Greek athletes are usually depicted (the root of the word 'gymnasium' etc. ('gymnos') *means* naked!)

Secondly, the reference to "a perishable wreath" is, of course, to the olive wreath, the ancient symbol of peace and reconciliation and hope, laid on the head of every victorious athlete. It is the olive twig brought to Noah by the dove (of peace) that marked the end of the flood and reconciliation of God and humankind after the sin of the fall from grace in Eden. The process of producing *olive oil* by crushing the fruit to produce the pure oil for light, sustenance, heating and anointing lies behind Isaiah's famous prophecy of the suffering Messianic Servant in ch. 53. (The word 'Messiah' and its Greek equivalent, 'Christos', means the "Anointed One") and is especially significant in v. 10 ("Yet it was the will of the LORD to crush Him with pain".) The whole imagery of the Olive lies behind what is arguably the most revealing account of the suffering of Jesus and its consequences in the New Testament. The setting is the Garden of Gethsemane at the foot of the Mount of Olives. The name Gethsemane means "the Olive Press", and it is here that the submission of Jesus to the Father's will begins the whole process of squeezing the life out of Him, and the subsequent producing of the Oil of the Holy Spirit to bring reconciliation and the fruit of love, joy, peace etc., and the sure and certain hope of the eternal and imperishable crown of glory to all those who repent and put their trust in Him. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him may not perish but may have eternal life." The first thing I see every morning is the Olive Tree outside our bedroom window that speaks so clearly of God's grace. Hallelujah!
