Without Geography

Contrary to popular belief, Geography is much more than the study of maps and the memorising of place names to use in a pub quiz, or even colouring in!

It is a critical discipline that helps students understand the complex and interconnected world they live in. At its core, Geography provides the tools to explore physical and human processes, understand spatial relationships, and appreciate the diversity of landscapes and cultures. Recent Yr10 field trips to Guildford Town Centre and Hayling Island highlighted many of these

Students saw evidence that the real world is much more complex than text book Geography, by looking at how processes interact and influence each other in the context of urban development (Guildford) and coastal processes and management (Hayling Island).

These trips also enabled students to make connections between different places and issues - for example, understanding the impacts of coastal management strategies on Hayling Island does not only shed light on local environmental issues, but also on global challenges such as climate change and sustainability.

Undertaking these two investigations also gave the Geography students the opportunity to practise and develop their critical thinking and problem-solving skills. Data collected in the field rarely matches the 'textbook Geography', but this gives students a chance to evaluate why this is the case. They have learnt in the last couple of weeks that traffic in Guildford is affected by the physical Geography, as the only place to drive over the River Wey in the town centre is on the one-way system - this affects traffic flows, pollution levels and environmental quality throughout the town. They have also learnt that coastal systems are much more complex than we teach them - the process of longshore drift on Hayling Island goes the wrong way because of the proximity of the Isle of Wight and the effect it has on sediment movement.

Overall, undertaking fieldwork helps students apply the theoretical knowledge they have learnt in the classroom, and helps them engage with their environment. It encourages teamwork and collaboration (trying to measure beach profiles), and enhances communication skills (asking questionnaires to members of the public). It helps build resilience and adaptability. However, in spite of all these great benefits of fieldwork, I suspect if you asked the students about the highlights of these trips, they would tell you it was having lunch at the fast food restaurant of their choice in Guildford, and the chips at the cafe at the end of the day in Hayling Island!



Before writing this article for the newsletter, I was waiting until the Euros Final had been played, so I could make some smug comparisons between the success of Gareth Southgate's England team and my beloved Tudor House. Unfortunately, it wasn't to be . . . but as I watched the disappointment of another major football tournament final slip through England's hands, it also made me reflect on what success really is. For me, bringing together a group of players to represent the Nation at a tournament is incredibly similar to bringing students together to represent their House at the different House competitions. Often, students want to excel for their own sense of pride and to impress others around them, which is completely understandable and a fair motivation to

However, trying to encourage students to represent the House for the greater good of the team is, for me, a much more powerful motivation. Gareth Southgate has always had the motto 'team before me', which I think has been shown time and time again by our fantastic team members in Tudor House.



Reflecting on the recent House Music and House Athletics competitions, it was fantastic to see not only individuals excelling, but also individuals pushing themselves outside their comfort zone for the greater good of the team. This included Lewis Harris being compare for Tudor, stepping up when others were less confident. The 1500m event at House Athletics is rarely the most popular event on the day, but again those students who volunteered to compete in the long distance event did so in order to gain as many points as possible for the team, regardless of whether they were to come last or first. This attitude of putting the team first is what I would describe as success. The characteristics of a team player outweigh all the brilliant individual skills a student can bring and if the students can carry this forward into their everyday life, they will be 10 times happier and successful for it. To conclude our


Informal Concert Series

Royal Academy of Art Summer Exhibition 2024

This gave them the opportunity to see what is happening in the art world right now, and inspire their 'Personal Investigations' - a project based on their own interests.

Around 15,000 works are submitted to the exhibition each year, with more than 1,700 of them making it into the final show for 2024.



This year's theme was 'Making Space' and exhibitors interpreted this however they wished. Most of the works exhibited can be purchased. It features new and recent art created by everyone, from emerging artists to the biggest names in contemporary art and architecture. At one time the show was known simply as 'The Exhibition', where the likes of Gainsborough and Reynolds, Turner and Constable sharpened their skills against each other. Today the Summer Exhibition continues in the tradition of showcasing a variety of work in all media, including painting, sculpture, photography, printmaking, architecture and film. Submitting under his real name, Jim Moir - the comedian behind Vic Reeves - sold 25 limited edition prints of his Bird Colour Wheel. The show runs until August 18th and I highly recommend it.
