
C. An engineer interested in finding solutions to improve the lives of those in rural communities, particularly in the areas of water and energy accessibility




IS IT A CIRCULAR OR LINEAR ECONOMY?

SCENARIO 3: A clothing brand produces fast fashion items and encourages consumers to buy new trends every season.





SCENARIO 4: A coffee shop uses disposable cups for all its drinks, and these are thrown away after a single use.
