TikTok may be banned in US

Recently, a lot of controversy has sparked over the possible ban of the popular TikTok app in America. TikTok is one of the most popular social media apps not only in America, but across the globe. On March 13th, a bill was passed in the United States House of Representatives which would, if passed, ban Tik-Tok. It is expected to move through the Senate fairly soon. Even though a lot of Americans, especially teens, are panicking over the bill, the details of it are important, so here is everything you need to know.

Currently, TikTok is owned by ByteDance, which is a company located in Beijing, China. Congress wants to force TikTok to sell the company to a non-Chinese owner because they feel that security threats are present. The main concerns are with the Chinese government

stealing data from Americans and potentially using the app to affect the upcoming presidential election. If the bill is passed, it would give "ByteDance six months to find a new buyer for TikTok" (npr.org).

Even though the bill

arose because of Security issues, many Americans feel as though banning TikTok is a violation of their first amendment rights, especially freedom of speech. ZBTHS student O'Brian. Claire shares. "TikTok is used as a major source of information, banning it could be considered a violation of our free speech rights, granted to us by the First amendment." O'Brian continued, "The banning of TikTok would be an instance of harmful censorship...The TikTok ban is just another poorly disguised attempt to repress the people who speak up and expose all of the corruption and immorality of our government."

Many other Americans agree, and have been calling their state representatives and senators to attempt to stop the bill from being passed and becoming policy. TikTok has been supporting the pushback by providing phone numbers and email addesses of representatives' offices to U.S. users.

Since "President Biden has indicated that he will sign the law," (npr.org), it is very possible that the bill could be passed in the Senate. However, considering all of the push back from TikTok and U.S. app users, especially with regards to the first amendment controversy, it will most likely be challenged in courts.

Overall, Americans will have to see what happens with TikTok in the next few months, and supporters will need to continue to express their opinions on the bill in hopes that their representatives will vote for what voters want.

The Senior Honors Program ceremony is going to take place at 6:30 pm but seniors need to arrive and check in by 5:45 pm wearing your gown and in formal attire on **April 25th**. The Community Awards Program that is invitation only begins at 6:30 pm but the students should check in by 5:45 pm wearing formal clothing and your gown on **May 6th**.

Prom is coming up and you should make sure you're there! It will be held at the Holiday Inn in Gurnee, IL on May 11th and tickets can be bought during lunch periods at the bookstore with cash only from April 8-26th.

Rare solar eclipse passes U

If you were at school last Monday (April 8th), you likely had the chance to witness an amazing spectacle: a solar eclipse. A total solar eclipse is especially rare in the United States, and we won't see another one for twenty years.

A solar eclipse occurs when "the Moon passes between the Sun and Earth, completely blocking the face of the Sun" (NASA). This only happens from time to time because the Moon's orbit doesn't perfectly align with the Sun and Earth. When they align, it is called the eclipse season and happens twice a year. During a total solar eclipse, the Moon blocks all of the Sun's light, creating the path of totality. At this moment, the once bright sky turns to complete darkness. Instead of the Sun, we are left with the sight of a black disc surrounded by the Sun's glowing atmosphere, the corona. Though it is the middle of the day, we can actually see some of the shining stars and planets that are normally visible at night.

During Monday's eclipse, viewers were reminded that they should never look directly at the Sun because it can cause severe eye damage. To safely view the eclipse, students and staff were given specialized eve protection that were specially ordered for the event. People often use eclipse glasses, a solar viewer, or an indirect viewing method like a pinhole projector.

When using one of these devices, do not look at any type of optical device such as a camera lens or telescope. At totality "You can view the eclipse directly without proper eye protection... when the Moon completely obscures the Sun's bright face" (NASA). But as we are not in the direct path of totality here in Northern Illinois, glasses are required the whole time. Fortunately, ZBTHS purchased nearly 3 thousand pair for

students to use to watch it with their classmates.

People traveled across the country just to experience the celestial phenomenon and it stands as a reminder to appreciate the beauty of the universe. There's really nothing to lose in seeing this rare opportunity.

SAT has significant changes

This year's SAT is set to switch from a paper and pencil format to a digital for the official testing date of April 16th, 2024. No more number 2 pencils. No more bubble sheets. The SAT will now me completely taken on school laptops.

And that's not the only change for the test.

With the digital SAT, students will get more time per question. Math questions will be explained more concisely than before, and reading passages will also be shorter. The SAT will be about 2 hours in length so shorter by about an hour. It will also feature a countdown on the test so you can easily track where you are and

how you're managing your time. Gone are the days of the proctor interrupting the silence or writing how much time you have left on a whiteboard as you test.

Another significant change will be in the overall format of the test. Each of the reading and math sections will be divided in half, making the test adaptive. Based on a student's success on the first half of each test, the second half will either be harder or easier.

Zee-Bee students already saw how the test will work in the fall, during the practice test. Unlike many other schools who experienced testing issues due to technology problems, ZBTHS's fall testing went fairly smoothly.

Students prepare for AP Tests

2023-2024 As the school year comes to an end, students all around the school prepare for AP exams. AP classes are a type of advanced class that is equal to a college-level course. At the end of the school year, students enrolled in these classes will take a test that determines if students will earn a class credit to count towards their required classes in college. This exam is counted for as a college credit if a student scores at least a 3 on a grading scale of 1-5 for many colleges. Students and teachers work diligently to prepare students for these exams all year.

Students who are enrolled in AP classes explained why they took these classes and how they are preparing for their upcoming exams.

Alex Damitz, a senior here at ZBTHS, who is en-

rolled in AP Stats, said, "Honestly, I'm just working hard in class, and working with friends to understand the material". Working with peers and classmates can help students grasp the concepts taught in class, making students more successful in AP testing.

Another student, Lorelei Scott, states, "For AP Gov I have been studying notes, and we have done a lot of work in class to prepare. There has been a lot of practice for the essays and all the quizzes we take help a lot with remembering things. The notes we take are a very useful thing for review." Studying material provided by teachers such as notes and classwork can help students feel ready for their exam. Practice essays that appear on these tests are practices as well, which can help students navigate the writing portion of the exams.

A third student includ-

ed her input about this topic. Clara Kelly, who is enrolled in AP Spanish class, was asked how she is preparing for her upcoming AP exam. She answers, "taking the AAPPL test (The ACTFL Assessment of Performance toward Proficiency in Languages) and speaking Spanish as much as I can with people for AP Spanish".

Lastly, Anesa Kight explains how AP classes help her "extend my knowledge in the class I took". AP classes go into depth about a topic, which can expand a student's insight for better understanding.

AP courses can be very beneficial to students. Students use their knowledge gained in these classes to not only learn and process information but to score as high as they can on their AP exam. If you are enrolled in AP classes, try to use this time to study for upcoming exams.

Taking the test and trusting yourself to do your best is what will encourage you to do your best. And juniors... you're almost done! Good luck with your SAT and remember these tips!


