## Longboat Police arrest armed man for battery on an officer

A Manatee County man was arrested for resisting arrest and battery on a police officer last week in a quiet neighborhood on the island.

Manatee County resident Richard Chase was arrested for resisting arrest and battery on a police officer last week in the Emerald Harbor neighborhood of Longboat Key.

Longboat Key Officer Shawn Swinford was dispatched to Emerald Harbor for a man who

was allegedly yelling at neighbors and residents and who did not live in the area.

Dispatch advised the man in question was in his truck, which was stationary in front of the resi-

Officer Swinford arrived on scene at 3:30 p.m. on the March 1 afternoon and reports the man immediately exited the truck and said he did not need to speak with the officer and told him to go away according to the police report.

Officer Swinford advised the man that he was called for a disturbance of some sort and Swinford

## Kashden running for Mayor Alpert's seat

Kashden's wife, Kelly Franklin, has sued Sarasota City Commissioner Kyle Battie for alleged defamation.

Resident Ron Kashden has filed to challenge Sarasota City Mayor Liz Alpert for her District 2 seat on the City Commission.

Kashden is a former CEO of a New York-based software company and has been involved with the Sarasota Coalition of City Neighborhood Associations, a local advocacy group, and served as the secretary of the Laurel Park Neighborhood Association.

Kashden's wife, Kelly Franklin, has sued Sarasota City Commissioner Kyle Battie for alleged defamation. Battie accused Franklin of making a racist social media post at a January commission meeting. Franklin asserts she was not the author and it was a fabrication and she has been harmed by the commissioner's statements. Battie says his comments do not constitute defamation and were made in the course of his elected duties and is protected speech. The City is paying for Battie's defense.

## **Great White Shark Rose** pings just offshore Sarasota

A 10-foot great white shark is continuing its visit in the warm waters off Southwest Florida.

The shark nicknamed Rose, tracked by OCEARCH, pinged far off the Sarasota coast at 4:11 p.m. Tuesday after surfacing around Cape Coral Sunday.

The 10-foot shark has a satellite tag attached to its dorsal fin which emits a ping when it breaks the water's surface and sends the animal's location to OCEARCH



Rose was located near the edge of the West Florida Escarpment. The 560-mile-long cliff in the Gulf of Mexico is 155 to 215 miles off the

coast and drops from a little over 300 feet to nearly 10,000 feet deep.

She previously pinged off the Treasure Coast Feb. 17 and 18 and Boynton Beach Feb. 19. Her tracker shows she's been spending winters around the Sunshine State since 2021, including the Gulf of Mexico in 2022 and 2023.

Rose isn't the only white shark to turn up in Sarasota waters this winter. A 10-foot great white shark named Penny pinged off the city's coast on Jan. 11.

White shark Rose was tagged by OCEARCH scientists on Oct. 4, 2020 off Lunenburg,

According to OCEARCH, she was named after Rose Bay near where she was tagged.

At the time, she measured 10 feet 5 inches, weighed 600 pounds and was classified as a juvenile shark.

Great white sharks can grow up to 20 feet long, but most are smaller with adult females averaging 15-16 feet long and males reaching 11-13 feet.

Rose has traveled 15,455 miles since scientists began tracking her in 2020.

says the man immediately became agitated at the officer's presence. The man was ignoring the officer and started walking toward the residence at Emerald Harbor Drive says Swinford.

Officer Swinford said he did not know if he was trespassing at the location and so Officer Swinford advised him that he needed to verify as to whether he was allowed to be at the property at this time.

Dispatch had previously advised that the man did not live at the Emerald Harbor home.

Chase continued to be argumentative reports the police and did not want to speak with Officer Swinford stating he was doing work at the residence. While speaking with him, Officer Swinford tried to get more information on what took place, he became even more agitated and started walking around the front of his truck stating he was leaving.

## Mote Marine unveils new exhibit

Mote Marine Laboratory & Aquarium unveiled a new exhibit titled Mystery Reef. Included in regular admission, the exhibit explores the threats facing Florida's coral reefs. Through activities such as a scavenger hunt, puzzle blocks, and an air maze, guests will leave with a better understanding of reef risks and mitigation strategies.

Mystery Reef encapsulates research conducted by Mote scientists, addressing issues actively tackled by multiple Mote research programs, including Ocean Acidification, Coral Health and Disease, Marine and Freshwater Aquaculture, among others.

"Conservation of coral reefs isn't just about protecting a beautiful ecosystem; it's about safe-guarding the very foundation of marine biodiversity and our planet's health," said Dr. Michael Crosby, Mote President & CEO. "By continually researching and sharing information on coral reefs, we illuminate the path toward their preservation, ensuring the intricate balance of life within our oceans for generations to come."

While educating guests on the health of Florida's coral communities, Mystery Reef also allows guests to become coral detectives for a day. Mote invites exhibit visitors to embark on an exhilarating, crime-solving scavenger hunt. With their sleuthing caps on, guests can investigate which prime suspect is guilty of hurting the reefs. Each suspect represents a different reef threat:

- Sickly Sal– Coral Disease
- o Coral diseases, often occurring in response to environmental stressors, cause massive reef decomposition.
  - Captain Conquerer– Invasive Species
- o Invasive species are organisms introduced to an environment where they are not native, quickly adapting and reproducing. Due to a lack of natural predators, they overwhelm and dominate the environment. The red lionfish, a nonindigenous, venomous fish, exemplifies an invasive species harming Florida's coral reefs.
- Corrosive Carl- Ocean Acidification
- o Ocean acidification occurs when carbon dioxide (CO2) from the atmosphere is absorbed into the ocean, lowering the pH. Rising ocean acidification is associated with negative effects, including damaging coral reefs and disturbing calcifying organisms' shell and skeleton growth.
  - Miss Match- Coral Parents Incapable of Pairing Up
  - o Corals must be close in proximity to fertilize after spawning. As ocean health declines,



healthy coral parents become rarer, producing fewer healthy corals.

• Hot-Headed Hector – Rising Ocean Temperatures

As oceans absorb excess heat from greenhouse gases, water temperatures rise. Increased ocean temperatures may induce coral bleaching (loss of coral pigmentation), disruption of fish breeding grounds, intensified hurricanes, and sea-level rise.

Guests can tangibly "mitigate" the suspects through various interactive exhibit elements. They will have the opportunity to "whack-a-lionfish," simulate coral spawning through an air maze, and connect puzzle pieces to build a healthy reef. The exhibit will also showcase a giant inflatable coral where guests can complete their detective work.

Mystery Reef is included in regular Mote Aquarium admission. Mote Aquarium is open from 9:30 a.m. - 5 p.m. every day. For more information, visit mote.org/mystery.

As a follow up to the discussion at the Commission meeting yesterday, I reached out to Dave Tomasko with the questions posed. Below is his response. We will invite Dave to provide an update to the Commission at the March 25th workshop and so that will be a further opportunity to discuss the matter.

### Potential increase in contribution rate

To: Longboat Key Town Manager Howard Tipton

I cannot find the justification for the original funding distribution – most likely it was a combination of geography and political considerations. I do think that they tried to make sure that those local governments with elected officials on our board would pay into the program, but why Manatee County and Sarasota County pay more than the City of Sarasota, or why the City of Sarasota pays more than Bradenton or Longboat Key – I just don't know. And why Holmes Beach and Bradenton Beach, for example, are not included – I don't know. But it appears that adding them to the list would require us to develop a new Cooperative Agreement, which would then have to be reviewed and approved by each of the parties involved, which is an investment in time and legal review that might not be worth the effort (I'm fairly sure we'd burn up more money in legal review for a new Cooperative Agreement than any increased revenue).

We could come up with some sort of geographic and/or population-based estimate, but that would require more time and effort and expertise than we have on-hand. So instead of seeking to justify the funding formula, we've simply requested that the funding formula that has existed for 20 years be updated to account for the cumulative effect of 20 years of inflation. I do understand the desire to better understand the basis for the funding levels decided upon 20

## Bordering on insanity in immigration policy

Enough fentanyl has seeped into the United States to kill every American. Taxpayers are paying the soaring tab which is overwhelming municipal budgets. The crisis is growing and spreading.

It is difficult to consider any issue other than the border crisis when assessing the current

political and societal landscape. Approximately three million migrants are pouring through our southern border annually. Some in that number include terrorists and violent criminals. Enough fentanyl has seeped into the United States to kill every American. Taxpayers are paying the soaring tab which is overwhelming municipal budgets. The crisis is growing and spreading.

Voters now rate Immigration as the most important issue, by far. In Gallup's latest poll, Americans name immigration as the most important problem facing the U.S. (28%). In this latest poll, 20% of Americans name the government as the second most important problem, followed by the economy (12%) and inflation (11%). A separate question in the **RUSOVICH** survey finds a record high 55% of U.S. adults, up 8 points from last



year, saying that "large numbers of immigrants entering the United States illegally" is a critical threat to U.S. vital interests. The prior high was 50% in 2004.

The public senses a national security threat. According to Customs and Border Protection (CBP), 268 non-citizens on the terrorist watchlist have been caught by the U.S. Border Patrol since President Biden's inauguration. But there is no way of knowing how many terrorists actually crossed the open border as approximately 2 million illegal immigrants have evaded border officials altogether during the Biden Administration. And the migrants come from countries which pose a national security threat. Chinese migrants are the fastest growing group crossing from Mexico through the southern border. Migrants from Yemen, Iran, Russia, Syria, and Afghanistan are also entering America illegally.

While most migrants are seeking refuge and a better life (though they should do so legally and orderly), some are violent criminals willing to kill and rape. Several tragedies in the last few weeks highlight the dangers. Laken Riley, a 22-year-old nursing student at Augusta University, was killed while jogging on trails around the University of Georgia campus. Jose Antonio Ibarra, a 26-year-old Venezuelan national who was living illegally in the U.S. has been charged in her brutal murder. Nilson Granados-Trejo, a migrant from El Salvador, has been charged with murder in the shooting death of 2-year-old Jeremy Poou-Caceres in Maryland. Yet another illegal immigrant from Honduras has been arrested in Louisiana for allegedly raping a 14-year-old girl and repeatedly stabbing a man during a robbery. And in New York, a group of migrants were released without bail after assaulting two police officers (the perpetrators subsequently flipped the bird and laughed in a video captured by Fox News outside the Midtown South Precinct in Manhattan).

These heinous crimes are even more reprehensible than one citizen assaulting another citizen as those caused by illegal immigrants are completely avoidable. In addition to the violence and

terrorist threat, deaths from fentanyl have led to a record level of drug overdoses last year. There were 111,355 overdose deaths in the 12-month period ending April 2023. Fentanyl and other synthetic opioids are involved in nearly 70% of the overdose deaths, according to the provisional data from the Center for Disease Control (CDC). China and Mexico are the primary sources for fentanyl-related substances trafficked directly into the U.S. The open southern border is the principal corridor used by the narco-terrorists. Thousands of families are in mourning due to the tragic deaths caused by this scourge.

And many states and municipalities are going into further debt and fleecing U.S. taxpayers to foot the cost of funding migrant services and facilities. New York city has already spent \$1 billion and is now accruing


\$9.8 million per day on housing and feeding migrants. Mayor Eric Adams estimates a cost of \$5 billion will be needed from the taxpayers to fund the crisis in the current fiscal year. Not to be outspent, California now spends a mind-boggling \$31 billion a year on benefits and services for illegal aliens, according to the Federation for American Immigration Reform (FAIR). The progressive paradise is doubling down on its support for migrants as it recently became the first state in the country to offer free health insurance to all undocumented immigrants. Poor taxpayers.

So, who is to blame for this national debacle? According to a recent Bloomberg News/ Morning Consult poll, 61 percent of voters in swing states said Biden bears at least some of the responsibility, compared to 38 percent who say Republicans in Congress are somewhat responsible for it and only 30 percent who say former President Trump is somewhat responsible. And just 32 percent of Americans said in a CBS News released last month that they approved of Biden's handling of the border.

Biden has tried to shift the blame to Republicans since the collapse of the recently proposed immigration reform negotiations, but the bill did not require action by the Administration until the daily number of migrant crossings surpassed 5,000 a day. Americans are also aware that it was Biden who lifted Title 42, halted construction on the border wall, and ended "Remain in Mexico"—all effective strategies in slowing illegal crossings.

While most Americans view the open border as a crisis, Biden and Vice President Harris seem oblivious. Former Chief of the U.S. Border Patrol, Raul Ortiz, told 60 Minutes that President Biden never spoke to him during his two years on the job. Neither did Vice President Harris, tapped as the administration's "border czar" by President Biden in May 2021. He stated that during his two years in office, "I've never had one conversation with the president or vice

Biden will face voter anger on election day over his mishandling of the border. Perhaps he should have never told migrants in 2019, "You should come."

As you are aware, the Sarasota Bay Estuary Program (SBEP) focuses on developing a sciencedriven, locally-developed and non-regulatory approach to managing the water quality and natural resources of Sarasota Bay. Due mostly to the efforts of our local stakeholders, we have had great success on the water quality issue, as recent improvements are sufficiently impressive that FDEP has concluded that the entirety of the open waters of Sarasota Bay now meet our SBEP-developed water quality goals for nutrients. In short, we are no longer considered "impaired" for nutrients - quite a feat!

The SBEP did not pay for the projects that led to these improvements, but we did play a central role in developing the bay's ecosystem health report card, working with our consultants to produce a detailed pollutant loading model, and combining those two efforts and working with our stakeholders to develop our 20% inorganic nitrogen load reduction target. We have also worked with FDEP and others to document the improvements in water quality, which led to the recent decisions to "de-list" bay waters for nutrient impairment. We have also taken the lead on the design, permitting, construction and construction oversight of projects funded through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL). In fact, EPA has informed us that SBEP's recently completed project at the Florida Institute for Saltwater Heritage is the first

BIL funded project to be completed in all of the southeastern US.

You are likely also aware that of our approximate \$1.1 million dollars in funding (\$1,146,000, to be exact) EPA provides about 74% of our funding. In 2004, the SBEP and its partners entered into an Interlocal Agreement that determined the annual local government contributions as: \$50,000 from Manatee County, \$50,000 from Sarasota County, \$33,000 from the City of Sarasota, \$133,000 from the SWFWMD, \$15,000 from the City of Bradenton, and \$15,000 from the Town of Longboat Key. I have not been able to find any detailed basis for the funding levels in that agreement, but I do believe that it was thought that such a formula broadly reflected the geographic coverage of those partners. However, the basis for the funding breakout was not documented back in 2004. While we could come up with a more precise breakout, questions would arise as to whether such a formula should be based on area, or population, or impervious area, etc. I don't believe it would be easy to come up with a new funding formula, which is why this request is based on simply adjusting the prior funding formula for the cumulative rate of inflation over the past 20 years (outlined below).

Out of an operating budget of \$1.146 million, we spend about 38% on salaries for our five full-time employees, and about 30% on operating expenses (including rent, computer support, employer contributions towards social security and Medicare, outside auditing services, workers compensation, outside legal counsel, etc.). That leaves us with approximately \$300,000 to spend on "projects". Of that \$300,000, we spend about 2/3rds of our project budget on Public Outreach and Engagement, including \$100,000 on the very popular Bay Partners Grant program. That leaves us with about \$100,000 to spend on other efforts – but \$50,000 is spent to maintain the fisheries independent monitoring program for the bay, which leaves us with \$50,000 / year for "science and restoration" projects. That is not overly problematic, since we are using the approximately \$900,000 year from the BIL funds for design and permitting and construction and construction management needs. However, we are now half-way through the 5-year BIL fund lifespan, and we are already not able to do as much in terms of scientific investigations as some on our Technical Advisory Committee would like us to pursue.

Which gets to the point of this email – a request from the SBEP for our local government partners to consider increasing their cash contributions to the SBEP. The amounts received from our local partners are greatly appreciated, but they have not changed in 20 years. What has changed, however, is the value of those funds, which have diminished over time due to inflation. Based on a web-based cumulative inflation calculator, it was determined that the cumulative rate of inflation over these past 20 years is approximately 60 percent - or an average of 3 percent/ year. With that in mind, I would like to formally request that the Town of Longboat Key consider increasing its annual contribution to the SBEP commensurate with attached table.

If all of our local partners increased their cash contributions as suggested, this would give us an additional \$174,000 a year to devote to scientific research and/or the design and permitting

of restoration projects on top of those identified in our five-year BIL Workplan.

I believe that the SBEP is well run and a bargain, and together with our partners, we have helped to turn our bay's water quality around in just a few years. With additional funding from our local partners – to account for 20 years of no increases – I think we can continue to do great work into the future. I thank you for your consideration, and if you need more details, please contact me at your convenience.



## What we talk about when we talk about health

Americans have possessed an impoverished vision of health.

In 1947, the World Health Organization defined health as "a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being." Do most folks take that expansive view?

The kinds of statements you'll get from people are more like these:

"The doctor says I'm in great shape."

"I eat real healthy."

"You really are doing great."

"I got great doctors and great medical care."

The first statement was made by a man whose lipid levels had gone done appreciably with statins, and died of

a heart attack six months later. The second came from a patient who considered pizza a food group and noted his "really healthy" use of "heart healthy cereals" like Cheerios. The third was the declaration of an internist to a fellow writhing with chronic pain, impressed more by his low blood pressure and cholesterol values than his continuing misery. The fourth implicitly believed medical care = health – though in most measures of what provokes better physical health, medical care is far down the list compared to factors like sanitation and lifestyle.

How you talk about health doesn't just change your view of health – it changes your health and that of people around you.


### The Absence of Disease

Almost 70 years ago the WHO warned against absence of disease as a marker for health. Guess what? Those are the measures typically used by insurance companies and doctors bound by their "metrics."

What you measure counts. If you don't measure it – well, it doesn't count.

People sigh with great relief when their cholesterol levels are "low enough" that they don't have to take statins. The truth is that other factors far bigger harbingers of their survival, particularly how they eat and move. Women are thrilled when their annual mammogram "adventure" is crowned with the success of "no disease." Yet as Gilbert Welch explains in "Less Medicine, More Health," perhaps every American women whose life was saved treating a "positive" mammogram may be attended by 10 others whose treatment saved nothing – many of the tumors would have gone away by themselves. Overall mammograms remain defensible screenings tools. The numbers game is more difficult to justify with urologists' mainstay, the PSA. The consensus of many researchers is that with this "screen" of prostate cancer every success is attended by 30-100 people treated unnecessarily – with accompanying mortality, destruction of sexual capacity, and inability to control urine flow for many.





in the conversation. Medical care is today more and more limited to specific "risk factors" affecting longevity. Everything else is off the table.

For present day medical practice, most of the important factors affecting your health don't get assayed. In essence, they don't count.

### **Population Versus Individual Health**

Health planners, social scientists and public health officials are deeply concerned with health endpoints that matter economically and societally. Most of these involve death.

Lifespan is often reviewed by looked comparing countries. Here, the US usually ranks around 40 to 50th, while our per capita health care costs are generally twice as high as those of comparably developed countries.

Why the mismatch? In part, because of the perception that medical care – and high medical spending = health. Factors like sanitation, nutrition, education, vaccination, are much bigger factors in determining lifespan. But that's "public" health. Public health does not have giant economic and political lobbies behind it – even if most of the world recognizes that public health efforts make populations live longer, feel better, and become more economically productive.

Yet the highly disciplined people who work hard to be healthy – and read carefully and thoughtfully the huge amount of "health" information available – can be fooled by the population statistics. Many believe that following lifestyle recommendations automatically means they will live longer.

They most probably will feel better. The odds favor that they will live longer.

But they are just odds. Chance, or what people see as luck, is a huge factor in individual health. You can do "all the right things" and still die at 20, or smoke three packs like the great pianist Eubie Blake and die at 100.

An example – Dr. Oz was shocked when he was found to have a large polyp on his screening colonoscopy. As he explained, he ate healthily, exercised, gave his life to helping others. How the heck could he get a big growth that might prove cancerous and kill him?

The same way most of us do – through chance. The risks of populations appear different when applied to individuals. You do what you can to improve the odds. But they are just odds, and the world is filled with uncontrolled and unknown variables.

### Real Health

How you define a problem changes the problem. Americans have possessed an impoverished vision of health. That's one of the reasons our health is so poor.

And that's just looking at physical health – lifespan, infant mortality and the like. Start looking at "quality life years" and other measures and we do even worse.

It's time for some better definitions. As Welch and others now recognize the importance of meaning and purpose – the "spiritual" dimension of health – it's also time to add meaning and purpose to measures of physical, mental, and social well-being.

Such a four fold approach can be operationalized for populations and individuals. It can also be applied to all phases of medical care – with all four parts brought to bear on every illness, from colds and coughs to cancer.

Until that happens we won't be taking about health. We'll just be talking about sickness. We really deserve better.

## **Indigenous American Wine Grapes**

Indigenous American wines represent a tiny proportion of wine sales but have had a profound effect on global wine production.

The story of American grapes and their influence on the global wine industry has many twists and turns. Although Viking explorers during the 10th Century discovered grape vines growing wild in what is now Newfoundland in Canada, the species of grapes found there did not include the ubiquitous wine grape, vitis vinifera, which originated in Europe and first appeared in America centuries after the Vikings discovered grapes indigenous to the Americas. Almost all of today's grape wines come exclusively or in large part from the descendants of European vinifera, including Cabernet Sauvignon, Chardonnay, Pinot Noir, Syrah/Shiraz, Grenache, Malbec, Pinot Blanc/Gris/Grigio, and thousands more.

These varieties have a high sugar content available to convert to alcohol during fermentation, and flavors attractive to humans. The vinifera grapes in Europe developed over thousands of years into a vulnerable monoculture, susceptible to disease. The disease did arrive during the late 1800's, in the form of an insect called phylloxera from North America. The insect attacked vinifera vines, destroyed large numbers of them, and spread in the wind to neighboring vineyards.

Here is where indigenous American grape vines, originally the villains of this story, turned into the heros. The indigenous American vines had long ago developed resistance to phylloxera. By grafting of vinifera vines onto the rootstock of American vines, European vineyards created a vine that had resistance to phylloxera in its roots and produced the taste of the Chardonnay grapes or whatever variety of grape a winemaker may choose to graft onto an American rootstock.


Adding resistance to phylloxera to vinifera vines has made an important contribution to European winemaking, yet American grapevines have done more. The indigenous American grape, Norton, stands on its own as a representative of Vitis aestivalis. Its intense dark fruit flavors and soft tannins compare favorably with older Merlot or Rhone red wine.

The French hybrids combine disease resistance and better tolerance of cold weather with the virtues of vinifera. We have tasted Baco Noir from Eastern Oregon. This hybrid extends the range of Pinot Noir into cooler climes with excellent results.

A friend (the Professor) shared a bottle of A Los Vinateros Bravos 2022 Pipeño Blanco with us. This hybrid of European and indigenous wines from the Itata region of Chile has a brown hue and aromas and flavors of fruits similar to gua-

To: Sarasota City Commissioner Debbie


Trice This morning at CCNA I introduced the idea of something I called Newcomers Academy. I thought of it because we are faced with hundreds of people moving to Sarasota every year from somewhere else. They arrive to become year-rounders or as snowbirds who will eventually become yearrounders, and our community's first challenge is to help them transition their sense of identity, their caring, and their civic engagement (and maybe even their philanthropy) to here, Sarasota, from where they used to live. Each neighborhood association could do its own version, or, and I think ideally, it should be a CCNA project. I envision a simple format at a place such as where we were for CCNA - within which just a few people, or maybe only one person, go(es) over all "the basics", such as I put into the list below. An hour or so on a week day evening, or on a Saturday morning - getting the word out would take some planning and working with local media. Yes, there could be flourishes - make it a social event with refreshments, bring in speakers from some of the cultural organizations, have the Chamber put together "welcome bags" of brochures (they are happy to do this if you give them a day's notice and tell them how many you want). and participants alike - the better.

You told me, or so I understood, the Commission or City officials are already thinking about doing a video version that would be made available via YouTube, and/ or at the City's website. People could watch it on their own time, assuming they could be persuaded to do so. As a stand alone thing, I can see the value of it. The only problem is that it doesn't allow for Q and A afterwards, as a "live" event would. I've thought about it, and if that happens, CCNA or a neighborhood association could advertise and recommend viewing the video, and tell people to then come to a gathering to talk about it and address questions and concerns the video would elicit. As I see it that could be workable. But I still see holding a "live" event as better - because it builds interest, positivity, and a feeling of social connection. Experiencing such an event with others instead of alone in front of one's computer how can you attend, find out more? will increase its effectiveness by a lot. (I'm a social psychologist and remember some of what I learned about the conditions that create lasting attitude change.)

I don't know where this idea will go, but I will be glad to help if asked. My list (which is just a beginning and I know you can add more) How City Government works and is organized?

can be contacted? What does a commission do, what do com-

missioners do, how is it organized? How people get elected to be commission-


