# Knocking on Summerfest's Door: Sheboygan teen rock band *The Doorknobs* takes the big stage

Who hasn't attended Summerfest, the popular music party held for nearly 60 years in Milwaukee?

Who has, however, performed there along the shores of Lake Michigan?

The Doorknobs, a four-piece rock band that formed in 2023 and consists of 16-year-old high school students from Sheboygan, have.

On Friday, June 19, to be exact.

"I think taking the stage for the first time and just looking out on the people, and you can hear or see the other stages in the distance, it was just really surreal to be in that big of a place," said Harrison Brunette, whose parents own a construction company in Howards Grove. "It was just really fun for all of us, and we can't wait to play big shows like that in the future."

The Doorknobs, which consists of Etude High's Brunette (guitar) and Lennon Helgeson (lead vocals, keys), as

well as North's Aiden Melei (drums) and Max Irby (bass, guitar, vocals), were one of 10 bands that participated in Summerfest's two-day Rockonsin last weekend.

Billed as the only garage band competition of its kind in the nation, Rockonsin is exclusively for Wisconsin students in grades 7-12.

The Doorknobs learned of the competition through school last fall and applied online – there were 53 other entries – by submitting video of one of their songs.

"We just thought it was another opportunity to perform," Brunette said. "But, I mean, it's Summerfest. It's like one of the biggest festivals in the world. So I'm not sure that any of us really had

an expectation of going in and winning. We just really wanted the experience."

Two months ago, Summerfest informed the band they were going to play at the Aurora Pavillion.

"I think we all kind of forgot that we entered in because it was quite a gap (of time),"

Brunette said. "None of us were really thinking about it all that much. And then suddenly the email came one day and it was like, oh, yeah."

Each band in the contest got to play a 20-minute set in front of three music industry judges who evaluated synergy, vocals, rhythm, technique and creativity.

Afterward, judges even took some time to talk to the Doorknobs.

"They gave us some general feedback about our performance and what they liked, and what they thought we could improve on as a band in the future," Brunette said. "They said we were really unique in comparison to the other bands that played."

But only two bands – first-place Krusher (comprised of Campbellsport students) and runner-up Candy Cigarette (Oconomowoc) – were picked to perform a 45-minute set at Summerfest on July 4 and receive a professional recording session at Madison's Blast House Studios.

"We knew they were kind of the frontrunners, even before the performance, based on their background and stuff like that," Brunette said. "So we weren't too shocked. It was a little disappointing, but we really were just happy to be there."

The show(s) must go on, however, and the Doorknobs are scheduled for 13 future gigs – including one July 31 at Sheboygan Brat Days' Battle of the Bands.

They already have two albums – Silver Leaf Sessions and Live at Rockapalooza – that can be purchased along with merchandise at thedoorknobs.bandcamp.com.

The band is also on Facebook, Instagram, TikTok and YouTube.

"I think we all definitely want the band to go as far as it'll take us," Brunette said.

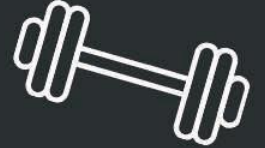
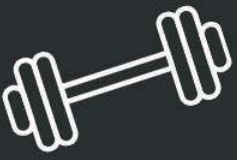

# Popular veggie farm ready to bounce back after freak hailstorm

It only took minutes for much of this year's crop to be destroyed. Old Plank Farm owner and Plymouth Review columnist Stephanie Bartel watched in awe and disbelief on Tuesday June 16 as a sudden hailstorm, which struck just after 2 p.m., shredded her vegetable plants. She and her crew had no idea the impending storm had the potential to wreak such havoc. Now in its 18th season, her Community Supported Agriculture farm at W6028 County Road C in Plymouth grows a mix of organic, fresh-market vegetables on 15 acres and serves 400 members from the Plymouth, Sheboygan and Milwaukee areas.

"Not even while it was happen- ing could we imagine the outcome," Bartel said. "It was like heavy snow. Not gigantic ice balls that damage cars and infrastructure... maybe marble size at the biggest. But it was just so heavy and so fast that it seemed like we were getting snow. I think that's what made it more destructive than most storms."

"This season's plants had been so beautiful. Big and healthy," Bartel lamented. "I just couldn't believe they were going to go down, but they did. So many of them did. There's only so much that broadleaf, tender annuals can handle, which is what most vegetable crops are."

"Virtually everything in our field was shredded to some degree," she continued. "I've never seen anything like it... It was terrible to watch, but also incredible.

We've certainly had our share of problems, but nothing like this."

The hail hit so hard and fast that nothing could be done to mitigate the damage.

"During and immediately after, the storm, all I could do was walk around and around the field in disbelief," she noted. "I'd bend down and scoop up a handful of the ice and pack it into a snowball just to make sure it was real. I was soaked and frozen, right there in the middle of June. It was heart-breaking."

But "right away the following day, we got out and started replanting," she said. "Winter squash, melons, cucumbers, and zucchini will already be germinating again and will probably only be about a month behind the first round that we lost."

"It was still so wet from the storm that the planting tractor got stuck in the mud in the first 15 minutes of the day. But my crew and I just got right to work planting by hand, and even though it's a lot harder that way, nobody complained," she added.

The farm produces more than 30 different vegetables and it's still too soon to predict the outcome for each one, Bartel explained.

But nearly all the crops in the field sustained some damage.

"Probably at least half of the yield potential was lost, mainly for the vegetables that were slated for harvest this month and in July," she said. "The first cucumbers, melons and winter squash are a total loss. Tomatoes might be too, and that's the hardest one to think about, because it's too late to re-plant. But we do have some greenhouse tomatoes that are just fine. And I think things like beets, kohlrabi, and lettuces will still produce something that we can use."

There was a bit of other good news as well: "The corn and onions have narrow foliage that was only battered up a little bit, they're the most likely to make a nearly full recovery," according to Bartel. "... The smallest plants held up the best because their leaves weren't a broad enough target to really get pulverized."

Planting cycles allow for additional optimism. "The thing about a CSA farm is that we weren't

done planting yet," she said. "That's what will save our season. Half our crops weren't even planted yet, and that's just part of the plan."

Most of the fall crops in the broccoli family were yet to go into the ground, so yields for later in the season remain promising.

The loss is not covered by insurance, but the farm's CSA members have already stepped up to offer support.

"Dozens of members have already reached out and reminded me that they stand by us no matter what, and that they will be happy with whatever we can give to them," Bartel pointed out. "Over the course of our 20-week delivery season, we will still be able to give them quite a lot of veggies, even if it's not what it could have been."

At least one other farm in the area was affected as well.

"The other little pocket of destruction that I heard about was at Kristy Rentmeester's farm down near Cascade, about ten miles away," she said. "They had hundreds of acres of corn and soy that were significantly impacted. But between Cascade and my farm there are two other organic vegetable farms that I've been in communication with, and neither was affected at all. The pattern of the

storm was incredibly wild."

"It's going to be hard to fill our CSA boxes over the next few weeks," Bartel admitted. "But we are a very resilient farm, and we were overprepared for this year's harvest, so we'll get by."

"Our three nearest organic farming neighbors – none of whom were affected by the storm – have all offered to help if and when they have some extra veggies to share, including Springdale Farm of Plymouth, Greenbush Growing Co-op of Plymouth and Three Sisters Community Farm of Campbellsport," she continued. "We've all been long-time friends and farming neighbors, and it's nice to know that they might be able to get some vegetables into our boxes for our members, if their harvests allow for it."

"There will certainly be some frustration and disappointment, and some financial loss on our end, but no one will suffer to a point beyond recovery," Bartel concluded. "... Our CSA members' faith and support in us is making a huge difference in how I'm able to respond to the situation."

"Being named player of the year is an incredible achievement," Rybarczyk. "It's an honor to be recognized as one of the best players in such a competitive and elite conference. Being named with two other guys just shows how many good players there are in the FRCC."

The Illinois Springfield recruit, who received all-conference honorable mention the previous two seasons, led his school in batting average, runs, hits, RBI, doubles and triples, and was also tops in innings pitched and strikeouts.

"I think the key to the season was just all the hard work the team and I put in this past offseason," Rybarczyk added. "Going from being a 2-17 team two years ago to a 12-14 team just shows how much everyone wanted to succeed, and it all started with the offseason work."

She was also walked a team-high 15 times.

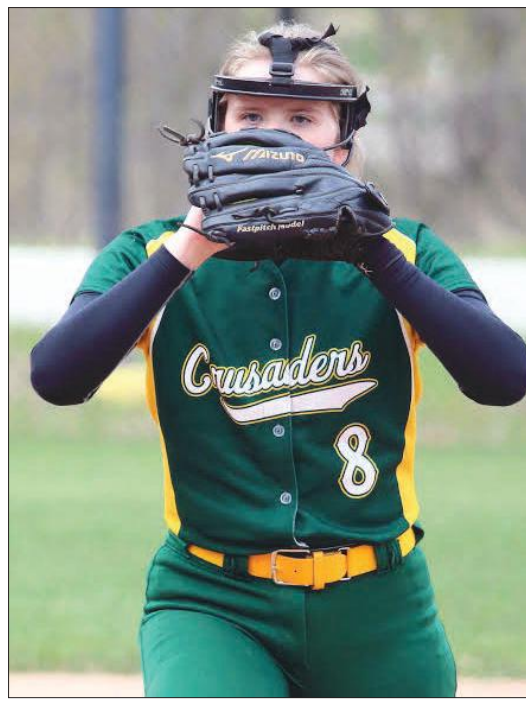
Sophomore infielder Ava Brashaw also received honorable mention. She ranked second in hits and stolen bases.

# WIAA allows shot clocks in non-conference games

The WIAA Board of Control approved limited use of the shot clock in basketball games next season at the Winter Coaches Advisory Committees affecting season regulations and membership policies at its June meeting on Monday.

Schools will be permitted to use a 35-second shot clock for non-conference varsity boys and girls games if there is mutual agreement between the teams, as permitted by NFHS rule adaptations.

The Board also discussed full implementation of the clock in 2028-29, which would require approval by the membership at the Annual Meeting in April.

Other changes to the Tournament Procedures eliminated language limiting a player to only two halves when a one-half junior varsity game is followed by a two-half varsity game, and removed a provision

that prevents teams participating at State from moving down to a smaller-school division the following year (even if their enrollment would have placed them in the smaller-school division).

### Changes in wrestling

The Board approved recommendations impacting the wrestling Tournament Procedures in the Season Regulations.

Dates for the girls regionals and sectionals will be moved ahead one week to Feb. 5 and Feb. 12, respectively, in 2027.

The details for the Girls Wrestling Team Tournament, beginning next season, were adopted. Sixty-four teams will compete in the Tournament Series with the top-two scoring teams from the individual regional tournament advancing to the sectional team tournament.

The teams will be seeded at

sectionals by applying the Team Tournament seeding formula to their individual regional lineup.

Teams advance from the team sectional to the State Team Tournament to coincide with the Boys Team Tournament Friday and Saturday, March 5-6 at the La Crosse Center.

In addition, the sectional pairings of the Girls Wrestling Individual Tournament will be determined by using an annual regional rotation that will pair regional champions versus regional runners-up in all weight

classes, which prevents student-athletes from the same two regionals from meeting in every sectional semifinal.

The third recommendation approved standardizes the seeding process for both the boys and girls individual and team Tournament Series. The new language also clarifies how previous season's State Tournament results are applied for seeding the individual tournament.

### Hockey changes

Two rule changes were approved by the Board, and the first alters the overtime process.

If a game remains tied following an eight-minute, five-on-five sudden victory overtime period, the ice will be resurfaced followed by a 17-minute, five-on-five sudden victory OT.

If a winner is not determined, the ice will be resurfaced and

a five-minute, four-on-four sudden victory period will be played with goalies switching ends.

The second change will implement a four-official system for all sectional and State Tournament games.

### In other news ...

The Board approved a new timeline for the conference realignment process. Beginning with the 2027-28 conference realignment cycle, non-football realignment will be conducted every four years.

The football-only conference realignment cycle will remain on its current two-year schedule.

And two men representing the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association presented a proposal in support of expanding the State Boys and Girls Basketball Tournaments.

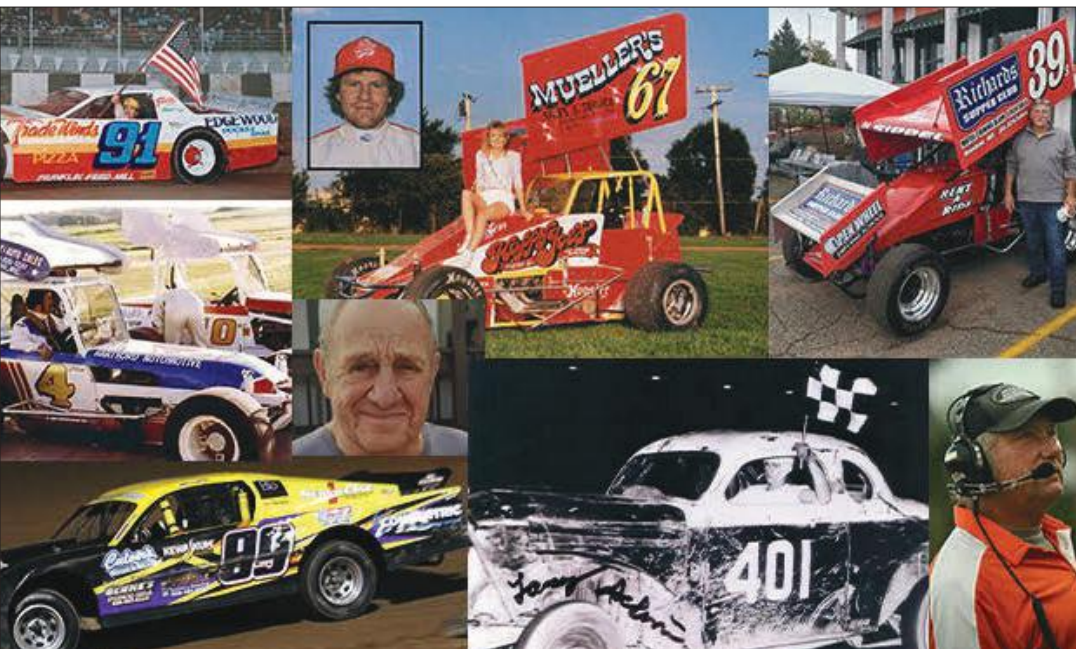

# Freedom Cry expands human trafficking response

About 12 years ago, a group of concerned parents in the area met at a coffee shop. They kept coming back, but it had nothing to do with the espresso or latte. They wanted to continue to educate themselves and discuss how to keep their children safe from human trafficking. More and more people came to the meetings, and in 2017 it evolved into a volunteer based non-profit organization called Freedom Cry.

"They thought that it was something that was only really happening overseas," vice president Mel Norling said. "They were horrified to learn that it's happening right here in Sheboygan County."

"People still believe that it isn't happening, or they know that it is, but they don't know to

what extent. And I think some of that stems from if they don't acknowledge that it's happening, they aren't compelled to do something about it, right? ... Our ultimate vision is to establish a safe home for women and their children."

Norling, a Howards Grove native who lives in Waldo, admits she was surprised to learn the age range of documented trafficking in the county was from ages 2-72 years old.

Since Jan. 1, Freedom Cry has been working with seven survivors of human trafficking in the county.

And on May 30, the non-profit held a ribbon-cutting ceremony for its first office at 124

East Mill Street in Plymouth.

"I was filled with awe to know that we've dedicated so much of ourselves, and our passion was essentially tangible and open to the community," Norling said. "Since the ribbon cutting, we've had people reaching out, inquiring about how they can be supportive of our projects, monetary donations, volunteering."

"Honestly, it's been a little overwhelming - in a good way - and it's definitely leading to growth."

The new office - staff previously met in area businesses or churches - is open from 1-5 p.m. on Thursdays and Fridays, and from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on

Saturdays through the summer.

It features a welcome center with merchandise, a survivor support room and an open area for presentations, among other things.

The website freedomcryinc.org states its mission is to partner with the community, provide prevention through awareness, and be a resource of direct support for survivors.

Volunteers "are the heart" of Freedom Cry, which operates on donations from individuals, churches, businesses, and community partners.

Freedom Cry offers presentations and trainings that

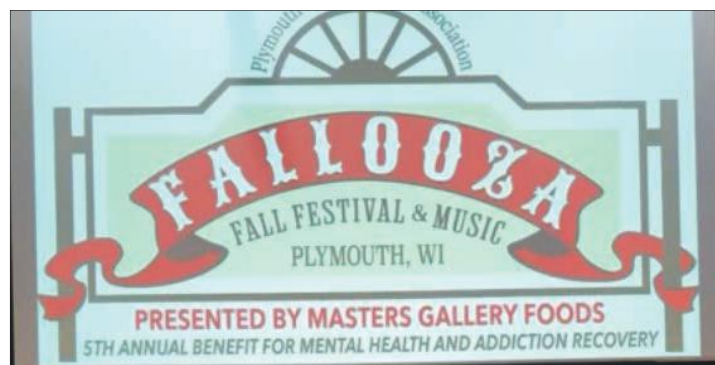
Lee Gentine, President of the Plymouth Advancement Association, shared that events like Falloozza would not be possible without the generous support from their sponsors.

**This Italian comfort food hits the spot**

"Comfort food" is an umbrella term that refers to a wide array of dishes. For fans of Italian food, there may be no dish that fits the comfort food mold better than lasagna. Lasagna can be made with a wide array of ingredients, and each iteration of it qualifies as comfort food. That's certainly the case with this recipe for "Lasagna With Zucchini and Meat Sauce" from Lines+Angles.

- 1 small green bell pepper, rinsed, trimmed and diced
- 1 onion, peeled and diced
- 8 ounces tomato paste
- 15 ounces canned tomato sauce
- 3 1/2 tablespoons red wine
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh basil
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh oregano
- 1 egg, beaten
- 2 cups low-fat ricotta cheese
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley
- 2 cups shredded mozzarella cheese
- 2 cups grated Parmesan cheese
- 1. Preheat oven to 325 F. Coat a deep 9 x 13-inch baking pan with nonstick cooking spray.
- 2. Slice zucchini lengthwise into very thin slices. Sprinkle

- slices lightly with salt; set aside to drain in a colander.
- 3. Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil over high heat. Add the noodles and cook until al dente, 8 to 12 minutes. Drain, immerse in cold water to cool and drain again. Lay the noodles in a single layer on a baking sheet and cover with plastic wrap.
- 4. Meanwhile, in a large skillet, set over medium-high heat, cook and stir the ground beef and black pepper for 5 minutes. Drain excess grease from pan. Add in green pepper and onion; cook and stir until beef is no longer pink. Stir in tomato paste, tomato sauce, wine, basil, and oregano. If sauce is too thick, add a small amount of warm water. Bring to a boil; reduce heat and simmer

sauce for about 20 minutes, stirring frequently.

5. Meanwhile, stir egg, ricotta, and parsley together in a bowl and mix well.

6. To assemble lasagna, spread 1/3 of the meat sauce into the bottom of prepared pan. Then layer 1/3 of the cooked lasagna noodles, 1/3 of the zucchini slices, 1/2 of the ricotta mixture, 1/3 of the mozzarella cheese. Repeat the layers ending with a layer of zucchini followed by a layer of noodles. Spread Parmesan cheese evenly over the top; cover with foil.

7. Bake for 45 minutes. Remove foil; increase oven temperature to 350 F, and bake an additional 15 minutes. Let stand for 5 or 10 minutes before serving.

Tip: This may be assembled a day ahead. Refrigerate until ready to bake.

The Dodge dealership was damaged by a fire in 1994 so a new facility was constructed next to the Chevrolet dealership. What remained of the original building was repurposed as the Plymouth Arts Center, representing the company's commitment to the community.

Joe and Kay's children, Teresa, Chuck and J.P., oversaw expansion in the 2000s including Hyundai in Fond du Lac, Chrysler and Jeep brand additions, launch of Sheboygan County Budget Auto, expansion of the Mazda brand, and acquisition of Dane County Auto for Van Horn's entrance to the Madison market.

Van Horn Automotive Group became the sole identity for the organization in 2014. President Richard Strong and co-CEOs Teresa and Chuck Van Horn led the company-wide consolidation and consistency of operations, values, and the customer experience.

The company transitioned to an Employee Stock Ownership Plan (ESOP), granting employees a 30 percent ownership stake at no cost, in 2016. The move preserved the Van Horn family legacy while giving employee-owners a direct role in the company's long-term success.

Succeeding years saw accelerated growth with the addition of Ford, Nissan, Volkswagen, Kia and Honda brands.

Today, community involvement remains central to the company's identity, a reflection of Kay Van Horn's heritage. Through the Van Horn Gives Committee, Pay-It-Forward initiatives, youth partnerships, scholarship programs, and local events, the company continues to reinvest

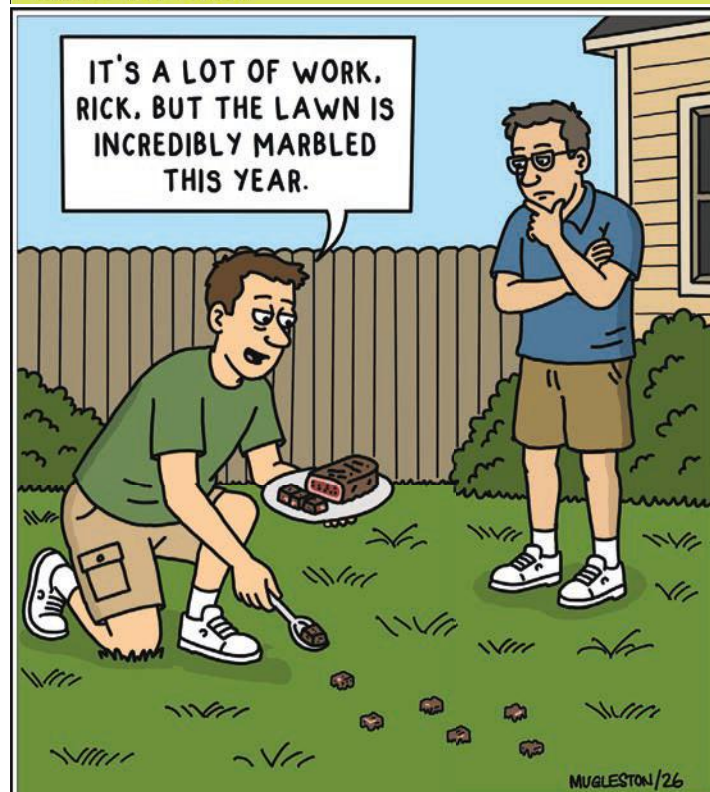

# Hail Storm

## The Veg Patch Dispatch

On June 16 at 2:00pm, my biggest concern was which beds we should use that afternoon to plant our second round of zucchini. The tractor was idling in the pathway behind me and my driver-dairy farmer and part-time crew member Bob-sat patiently waiting and watching me for a signal. Eleven empty beds lay before me, and I needed to divide them between the zucchini, cucumbers, melons, watermelons, and remaining winter squash that all needed to be planted that week.

I was fussing over which beds to put the zucchini in because I had the luxury to do so. We had become exceptionally organized and efficient this year. Our fields were glowing with health and high-yield potential, young plants were basking in the sunshine, and work was getting done across the field by different teams. That left time and energy for me to think through the zucchini placement, which is a key element to ensure

a quick and easy daily harvest. I had left no detail untouched as I mapped out our field this spring, no crop left behind as we planted week by week.

The tomatoes, zucchini, peppers, and cucumbers that had been planted three weeks earlier started thriving from the moment we put them in the ground. No transplant shock this year, no slow start. Not with our fertile beds, healthy plants, and plenty of irrigation. Irrigation was a hard won battle in May, in which a banjo player and two hair ties saved the day, but that's a different story.

I hadn't been taking many photos of the crops yet, or sharing too many predictions about the upcoming harvest. The crops looked so promising that I figured in just a few short days they would speak for themselves, as we began the weekly harvests. Little did I know that many of the crops would soon be silenced.

At 2:10pm the hail started. It

seemed to come up right out of the trees on the western edge of our field. The tractor was still idling at the beginning of the bed when we ducked under golf carts and other machinery to try and ride out the storm. It blew in unannounced, not even showing up on my phone's radar, and we expected it to move off just as quickly as it had come. At first I watched with eager anticipation. A rollicking bout of rain, thunder, and lightning popping up on a warm afternoon is as exciting as it is beneficial to our thirsty vegetable crops. But with this storm, that was not to be.

Fifteen minutes later it was over. The hail was too much and

it had come too fast. I watched our prized crops shred right in front of my eyes. It was only in the last few minutes that it went from manageable to disastrous.

In times of difficulty, it is hard not to ask why...why us? With the severity and the extreme isolation of the storm to consider, there is definitely bewilderment coming from me. But it's not really unexpected, in a way. Why would I expect farming to be easy? Why would I be entitled to not have this happen at my farm? I don't feel targeted or threatened by any ill will in nature. Some say that we are all given just as much as we can handle in life, no more, no less. That's probably true. Af-

ter all, we had been overprepared for the season, so we'll manage to get by in the end. And things could be a lot worse here. I mean, at least we didn't get any goats.

I've always loved summer thunderstorms. I wrote a poem about a thunderstorm when I was in third grade and won first prize in the district writing contest. Can I still, even after what happened here last week? I can't beat third graders in their poetry contests, no. But yes, in time I can enjoy my beloved storms. Getting hurt is a part of any kind of love. And I love my job working

# A Look Back on a human firecracker: Dynamite Bill

After all he'd been through, it's no wonder he felt confident handling explosives.

Born on May 22, 1887 as George Gustave Gartmann in Door County, the man better known as Dynamite Bill "packed a thousand and one adventures into his life as an explosives expert," according to his 1966 obituary.

George rose from a traumatic youth to become a World War I hero, a restaurant and saloon owner, probably the most well-known dynamiter in the state and a character who is legendary throughout Sheboygan County as well. Brilliant, headstrong, defiant, brave and decidedly quirky, he has inspired countless tales.

A 2021 article by local historian Beth Dippel called him "a veritable Paul Bunyan of the blasting profession." George's great-nephew, Keith Gartman of Camp Hill, Pennsylvania – who along with his wife, Dee, supplied much of the material for this story – simply said he was "a real firecracker."

His mother, Emilie (Zimmerman) Gartmann – originally from the Town of Wilson in Sheboygan – died of "lung trouble" when she was 32 and

George was just eight years old.

He and his six siblings were then farmed out to various relatives and neighbors. His father, a German immigrant named William, remarried in 1889 to another Sheboygan woman with the same first name, Emilie Hintz, who was more than 20 years younger than her groom, and they welcomed a son together one month later.

George's distant cousin,

Matt Gartman of Sheboygan, was told by his grandfather – who knew Dynamite Bill personally – that he always resented how he was forced to steal food from neighbors while growing up, and later on wished to distance himself from some of his family.

By 1905, when he was 18 years old, George appears in census records as an inmate at the Wisconsin Industrial

School for Boys in Waukesha, a reform institution.

Once he was released, he lived with his older brother Frank, who died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound to his head on February 26, 1907. An article about it in the Sturgeon Bay Advocate said that "the dead man and a brother, George, made their home in a dilapidated hovel on the old Hanrahan place, their parents having some time since removed to Sheboygan County."

Other accounts attest that George was introduced to the demolition trade as a "powder monkey" carrying explosives to blasting sites in a stone quarry.

By the time he was in his early 20s, George evidently wanted a new name and a fresh start, and changed his surname from Gartmann to Gardner.

The exact origin of his "Dynamite Bill" nickname is uncertain, but newspapers were

referring to him as such by 1919, so it was already common knowledge. Or the nickname could have something to do with Hoffman Dynamite Bill, regulating the storage of dynamite, which was passed in 1915.

At any rate, George was on his way to becoming a respected businessman – although his unruly shock of wavy, black hair truly made him look like a guy who blew things up for a living.

The Door County Democrat noted on December 17, 1915 that George was back in the area on court business and had purchased a garage and a half block of property in Sheboygan County.

"George still follows his old custom of never wearing a hat and made the trip here without

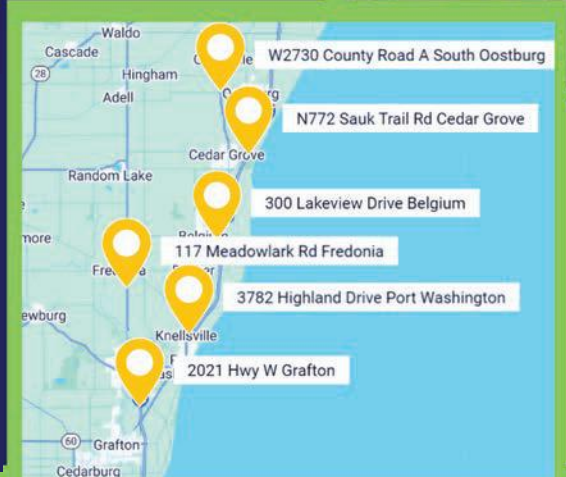
World Atlas' website has a brief write up on the 10 towns, and the following is how staff felt about Sheboygan:

"This is the 'Bratwurst Capital of the World,' and there are many ways to enjoy this quintessential German-Wisconsin sausage. Schulz's Restaurant serves bratwurst patties grilled over an open fire in a 1950s diner setting. Buy your own bratwurst to cook at home from Miesfeld's Market. "A thriving senior community is a hallmark of Sheboygan, including Uptown Social, a 55-plus community center where fitness, arts, lectures, and more are on offer. "Over 50 miles of beach and boardwalk run along the Lake Michigan shore, and if you are a golfer, it is also home to a championship course in Whistling Straits. "For those who want a more urban setting, the population of 49,000 means more in-town arts options while still keeping great access to the outdoors. "Several major hospitals, specialty clinics, and rehab facilities are right here. The average home costs \$264,820, barely below the state average because of the town's popularity, but still a good buy for retirees."

his head-piece, his long curly black hair floating in the winter breeze," the article stated.

A June 30, 1916 story in the same newspaper related that "George Garteman (sic), who never wears a hat, was in the city and county several days during the week, having disposed of his Egg Harbor farm to his brother. He conducts a saloon and garage at Waldo, Sheboygan County." George also farmed and operated a tavern in Elkhart Lake.

"He had kind of a floating lifestyle," his cousin Matt Gartman recalled. "He had the clothes on his back and was willing to travel. He was not the kind of person who needed a lot of stuff."

George and his longtime companion Amanda Behr, both then living in the Town of Lyndon, were granted a marriage license in 1916, but 1920 census records show they were still single at that time. Then the couple received a marriage license once again in Waukegan, Illinois in 1922. Their obituaries state that they were wed there in 1920, but family members have never been able to locate any actual records proving they were officially husband and wife. They lived apart at times and never had children together.

"Two years with the Rainbow Division's demolition squad in World War I honed Bill's skills with dynamite," Dippel's story contends. "After the Great War he returned to

Plymouth and made a name for himself, leading a life that alternated between celebrity and hermit."

"During WWI, Gardner was the only official dynamiter from Wisconsin," a biography by Janice Hildebrand published in the December 2, 1977 Plymouth Review states. "... His help in dynamiting an old stone bridge across the Marne River stopped the German advance. Gardner received the distinguished service medal award for rescuing Captain Samuel Ellerton, who was wounded in battle."

George was honored in a giant WWI victory parade in Sheboygan on April 25, 1919. Lengthy articles about him in the Sheboygan Press and the Sheboygan Telegram gushed about his exploits on the battlefield.

He "arrived in Sheboygan

last Tuesday with a fighting pedigree as long as a person's arm, and with thrilling stories of life in and out of the trenches," the Press account stated. "Dynamite Bill is a real sport and looks like Davie Crockett... His record is a magnificent one. If there was ever a real hero, it is Dynamite Bill."

"The champion stump blaster of Sheboygan County is a card and the vaudeville performers who have anything on him are few and far between," the Telegram story, which also related George's own tales of officers he admired and the funny come-uppances suffered by those he did not.

"Four languages, Holland, English, French and German, are spoken by him and he plays the violin," the article admiringly noted.

Once again, George's untamed hair repeatedly made the

news.

An October 15, 1919 piece in the Plymouth Review pointed out that "Dynamite Bill, Bill Gardner, has been blasting some monstrous rocks. When he blasts rocks, he goes a short distance away and watches, as does a ball player, where the pieces of rock are to fall, and he is able to dodge the rocks. When Dynamite Bill went into the army, he was obliged to have his long black curls cut. It is said he sold his hair for \$38 to a doll maker for dolls' hair. He is letting his hair grow again."

It seems like the electricity in the air during a storm helps plants to thrive. We need storms. We need the power of mother nature. We are lucky that in our region of the world weather is predominantly suitable for growing crops. I just figure that once in a while, even God drops his marbles.

**The Sounds of Summer: Enjoying the Season While Protecting Your Hearing**

When riding a motorcycle, consider wearing high-quality earplugs designed to reduce harmful noise while still allowing important sounds, such as traffic and sirens, to be heard. For fireworks displays, maintain a safe distance from launch sites and use hearing protection, especially for young children. Foam earplugs, earmuffs, or a combination of both can provide effective protection in noisy environments.

It's also important to recognize the warning signs of hearing damage. Ringing in the ears, known as tinnitus, muffled hearing, or difficulty understanding speech after a loud event may indicate that your ears have been exposed to excessive noise. If these symptoms persist, consult a hearing healthcare professional.

Summer's sounds are part of what makes the season memorable. By taking a few simple steps to protect your hearing, you can continue enjoying motorcycle rides, bike trails, fireworks shows, and other seasonal activities for years to come—without sacrificing your long-term hearing health.

**Hello friends,**  
This week and ever since 1982, I am fishing and escaping from the real world with friends and family at a fly in fishing lake in Ontario, Canada.

I am going to write my annual independent way of living, way of life story and I hope that you enjoy it.

On a good day, my truck is not started and I do not have to go town.

I have enough garden planted to feed myself and probably five other people with sweet corn (five crops), potatoes (400 hills), tomatoes (27 plants) and a whole bunch of veggies from onions to squash.

Last year I put up five Nesco's of chili, which I bag and freeze and makes an excellent meal.

I no longer raise cattle, as the calf price has become too high which in the past, I was breaking even but had manure. Now I would lose about \$800 per animal. My guess would be when my soil/sand becomes worthless due to a lack of nutrients I will get back into the cattle business.

My woodshed is stocked for the 2026/27 winter with split and drying oak.

Over the years I have planted 11 apple trees, and my life has become so busy that the last few

years I neglected them and did not make apple sauce.

This year I have been on top of pruning and spraying and hope to make 40 to 60 quarts of applesauce this fall. When my apple trees were blossoming in late April, there was a hard frost, I put my Mr. Buddy propane heaters next to them as well as some electric heaters and it helped but I still lost some potential apples. Necedah has cold overnight lows.

I have been working on the financial end of a retirement plan for 26 years, for a self-employed person that has a low income that has been a challenge but a few years down the road, and if Social Security still works, I should be fine when the time comes to slow down.

My time in the garden is a total addiction for me. The brown to green to brown phase of spring,

summer and fall for a garden and the at least 1,500 pounds of food I will harvest is like catching a really nice stringer of walleye every day.

Speaking of walleye, there used to be a yard in front of my house, now there is Lake Matilda which is named after Michelle Chiaro who was the coolest lady I have ever known. Michelle passed away on 6/15/22 and I will never stop honoring her.

Lake Matilda is my getaway, whether I am looking out my window, working on it, sitting next to a fire by it or like yesterday, swimming in it. So far I have planted bluegill, perch, crappie and last fall I planted twenty, 5 to 8-inch walleye in it.

The perch have spawned the last two springs, the bluegill the last three, the crappie are too young, the walleye will not

spawn but I will add 20 each fall and after 3 years harvest maybe 15 a year.

My entire life and I swear this is the truth, I have had a dream where I have tip-ups in my backyard, and I am fishing on the lawn where I grew up in Poynette. In a few years I think that dream will come true as I will have a shack on Matilda

and the thrill of catching a wall-eye will become reality, while the panfish will become a staple of my diet.

To feed the panfish and wall-eye, I have been stocking three gallons of fathead minnows each spring and fall. Fatheads are very prolific and spawn up to five times each warm season.

Most importantly is the newspaper staff and owners that run this column so I can live like I do since I was 27, thirty-seven years as of this past May. If you get a chance, tell them thank you, it makes a difference.

The truck pulls out of the driveway for Red Lake, Ontario in a few hours.

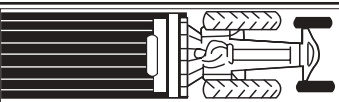

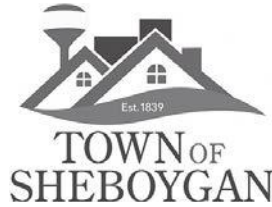

The largest and most anticipated annual event in the city of Sheboygan Falls is almost ready to launch.

The 38th Ducktona 500 Family Festival, Car Show and Antique Boat Show will bring revelers to the heart of the city on Sunday, July 5.

This year's event kicks off with a pancake breakfast behind the River Park large shelter from 7 a.m. to 11 a.m. by St. Paul Lutheran Church Feed My Starving Children Committee, with proceeds benefitting Feed My Starving Children.

The Ducktona Family Festival runs from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and will feature the popular classic car show, antique boat show, kids' Big Wheel races, petting zoo, kids zone, pony rides, balloon lady, science entertainment, food court and musical entertainment, as well as the signature duck race on the Sheboygan River.

"At age 38, Ducktona has

grown to new heights from its humble beginnings in the late 1980s," Sheboygan Falls Chamber-Main Street Executive Director Tammy Meyer said. "It is Chamber-Main Street's largest fundraiser of the year and a big key to our success each year.

Once again, the namesake and standout highlight of the day is the duck race at 3 p.m. along the Sheboygan River.

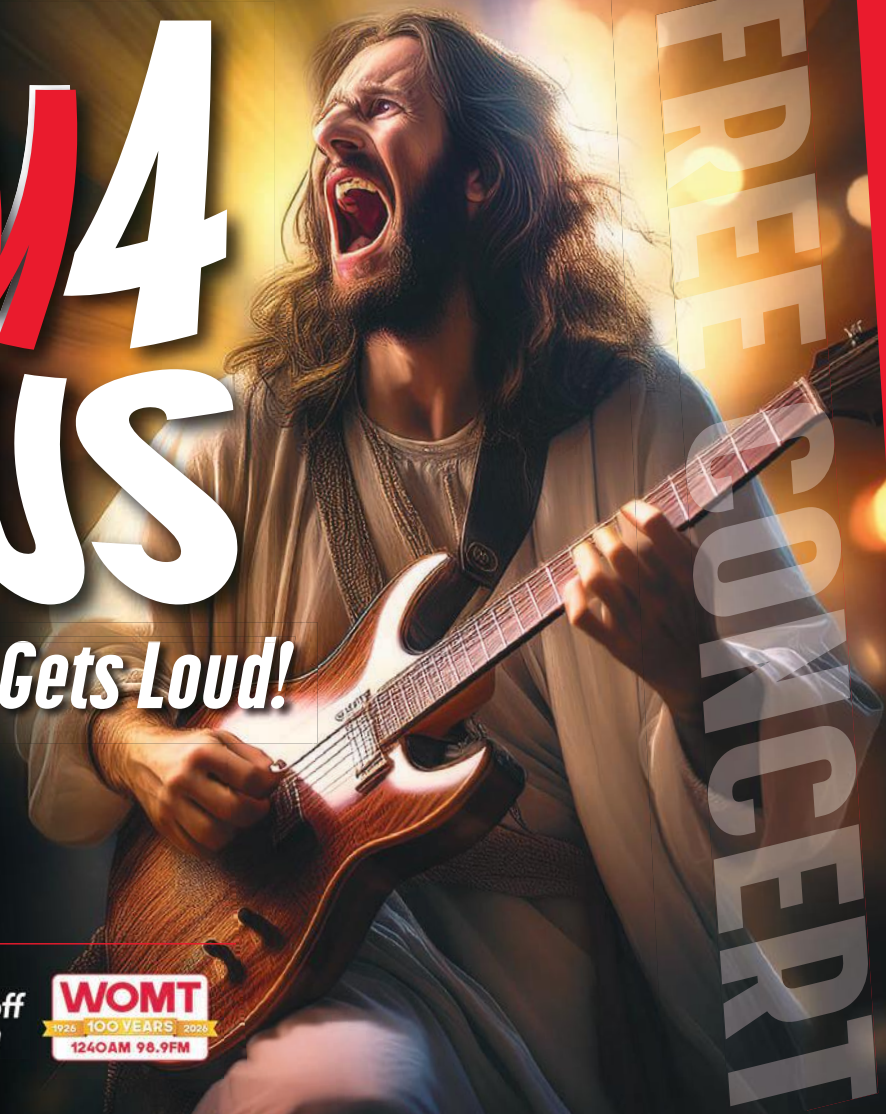
