#### Sewa Bay Area Annual Banquet 2024 Raises Over \$800,000



At its 2024 Annual Banquet, Sewa Bay Area brought together over 250 attendees, including community leaders, volunteers, and supporters

Sewa Bay Area hosted its Annual Banquet 2024, bringing together over 250 attendees, including donors, dignitaries, partner organization members, and volunteers. The event celebrated community service and garnered significant support, with over 50 donors contributing during the fundraiser, helping raise nearly \$800,000 to further Sewa's mission. Dr. Anurag Mairal, President of the Sewa Bay Area Chapter, outlined the organization's focus areas, while keynote speaker Colin Boyle, Lecturer at UC Berkeley's Haas School of Business, emphasized the power of collective action.

The Sewa Excellence Award was presented to Milli and Himanshu Seth of the Saloni Heart Foundation, and the Sewa Partnership Award to Loreto Quevedo Dimaandal, founder of LoretoQD's Brigade - Silicon Valley. Both awards were presented by Colin Boyle and Rakesh Adlakha, Deputy Consul General of India in San Francisco. The event also recognized high school volunteers with Presidential Volunteer Service Award certificates and featured a captivating performance by Neil Nayyar.

Sewa's involvement extends beyond event support, with the chapter also assisting elementary schools in Fairfax County and nearby counties with after-school Science Olympiad programs.
