\* John Fitz Henry, head of the Finance Committee on the Governing Body and Chairman of the Trust. Bryandale and Bryanston have benefitted from John's total commitment. In public the driving force in getting the funds in, an often unpleasant task, in getting the stalled media centre project started and completed, and initiating action on the sports complex project for which he arranged a pioneering bank loan which also financed the renovations. A forthright man of action, himself, John is the committed prodger into action. At times John's commitment has meant his being at the school virtually every day for extended periods - time sacrificed at the expense of his own business.

I would be most remiss if I did not record our appreciation of Leigh Eaton and the Mothers Committee and Gail Prior and her legion of tuckshop mothers. The Silver Jubilee Year has involved a continuous stream of additional functions on top of the usual hectic programme. Thank you for the many hours you volunteer to the school and congratulations on the exceptional standard of your catering and presentation.

Another essential project completed this year was the re-equipping and upgrading of the Industrial Arts Centre. Safety of pupils is a paramount consideration and the centre certainly meets the regulatory stipulations, besides providing more and better equipment and machinery than any other non-technical state school.



The pupils and staff have certainly identified with the need to make our Silver Jubilee Year a special one. When it is borne in mind that Bryanston with 752 pupils is considerably smaller than most of the schools we compete against, the achievements recorded in the succeeding pages are remarkable. The level at which we compete, invariably at the top stratum, should also be considered.

Once again, we were well represented at provincial level in our sporting activities. This year Bryanston pupils did particularly well in the various olympiads - Bernard Kuc and Harlen Henderson excelling. Public speaking expanded its scope and numbers - a particularly pleasing aspect in view of the long term benefits to the pupils involved. Dramatics also stepped to the forefront with a new approach that included a number of extra dramatic evenings in addition to the major production and house plays.

The level of participation by pupils at Bryanston deserves acknowledgement. The Hoopoe award system was introduced in which the top twenty-five participation points scorers in each standard receive a special certificate. There is also a trophy for the top Standard 10 pupil - won this year by Neville Stephen with the amazing total of 127 points (the minimum required of each pupil is 25).

I wish to pay a special tribute to our 126 matriculants. Despite being the smallest Senior group in the school's history, they established a record of nine honours blazers in one year. Talent and commitment in abundance. Their leadership of the school, under two exceptional Head Prefects in Giles Knight and Robyn Clement, was outstanding.

Once again the excellence of our staff manifested itself in all aspects of the school. Mrs Schumann, Mrs Buchan and Mrs Whitfield received TED merit awards - three being a high number for a school. Mr Visser, our Senior Deputy, has proved to be an invaluable acquisition and he has certainly made his mark in his first year as we are all aware. We are very proud that Mr Algie has been made the permanent principal of the New Midrand High. While we congratulate him on his deserved promotion we regret not having his extensive contribution to Bryanston. I thank all my staff, academic and administrative, for your team work in making Bryanston the dynamic, successful school that it is. You make your captain a proud man.

I look forward to 1994 eagerly. The renovations and sports complex will be completed. Our enrolment will be up by approximately 50 pupils as our reputation for excellence within a disciplined, progressive and happy environment attracts more and more pupils from outside our area. After 25 years we have arrived at the traditional stage of Bryanston High's existence. Our foundations are solid; we can continue to build upwards into the future.

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## GOVERNING BODY REPORT

After 25 years of distinguished service to the Bryanston community, the school can look back on another year of significant progress and satisfying accomplishments.




It is now some 18 months since the management and financing principles of the Model C system were introduced at Bryanston High and the positive factors eclipse the negative. The greater autonomy implicit in the Model C system has enabled all those tasked with managing the school to get things done more quickly and more efficiently. Consequently, a major R750 000 refurbishment programme of the buildings is underway, and this should be completed early next year.

A second consequence of Model C flexibility is that the ratios of pupils to staff have improved dramatically from previous levels, and we now have one teacher for every 15.2 pupils. This places the school in the same ratio category as some of the finest and most expensive private schools in South Africa. Considering that compulsory school fees for 1994 have been set at R2 780 for one child, R2 120 for a second child, and R1 460 for a third child, the costs of education at Bryanston High remain extremely competitive and well within the ballpark for the northern suburbs.

The Headmaster and Governing Body have remained in close and regular touch with bodies and organisations which seem destined to shape education policy from 1994 onwards, and it is anticipated that the composition of Bryanston High, together with its character and standards, will be largely unaltered in a changing dispensation. The pupil complement is expected to level off in the region of 750 for the medium term while the exceptional record of achievement, both in the classroom and on the sportsfield, promises to be sustained.

The school's 25th anniversary was celebrated by a highly successful carnival and a decision to build a pavilion for something in excess of R1 million. These, and many other successful ventures during the year, are a fine tribute to the spirit, energy and commitment of the Parents' Association. On behalf of the Governing Body, I extend to the Headmaster, Staff, the Parents' Association and all the involved parents, a sincere vote of thanks for their individual and collective endeavours that brought such a great credit to the school's 25th year.


Our Supporters Club has introduced designer clothing, the sale of which will also help school funds.



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
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## STAFF NEWS

# S T A F F



Headmaster **Mr R.E. Paige** is not only a highly respected member of the Bryanston Community, but is also very highly respected in the teaching fraternity. If Mr Paige expects a lot from his pupils and staff, he also expects a lot from himself. He has always lived up to his belief that a Headmaster should be thoroughly involved and should lead by example. What would we do without him ?



**Mr D. Visser** joined the staff in 1993 as the Senior Deputy Headmaster. Administratively, he is responsible for controlling the Standard Six group, co-ordinating all sporting activities and estate duties, as well as being Mr Paige's "right hand man". He teaches Afrikaans, whilst extramurally, he is in charge of Athletics and Swimming. His most favoured sport must be rugby, as he is the Vice Chairman of the Transvaal High Schools' Rugby Union, and was also chosen to select boys for the Craven Week side. 


**Mrs A. Peel** is the part-time immigrant Afrikaans teacher who nurtures the pupils to a love of a third language.


**Mr W. Rogers** joined the school as a business economics and accounting teacher. He is involved with cricket and rugby coaching, and assists in running the Business Game.

The adequate school library has evolved into one of the most advanced resource centres in the country. Mr. Paige's dream, on his return to Bryanston High in 1984, was finally realized on September 12th, 1989, at the opening ceremony. Strangely, our advancement technologically arises out of tradition. From the outset, Bryanston High has had a tradition of supportive, dedicated and hardworking parents who have made possible the funds to keep their children ahead in a challenging and changing world of education. While the children of the determined parents who gave us our Media Centre may no longer be with us, they will hopefully benefit, as Old Bryanstonians, by the use of the Pavilion being provided by today's parents.

The envy of my regional Media Centre colleagues, I have inherited a thoroughly modern building, fully equipped, so it was possible to introduce some exciting features this year. We obtained a television linked to S.A.B.C., and pupils are watching news and actuality programmes before school and during both breaks, and educational programmes in the afternoons - some of which we have been taping for the relevant academic departments on our new video recorder. Needless to say, we were extremely popular when our Springboks were playing rugby and cricket overseas! Our new facility has also enabled pupils to re-view setwork films, outside of class time, at their request. It is also increasingly being utilised as a seventh "viewing room".

Our new Music Centre provides light classical and instrumental background music for those studying or researching for assignments (hopefully encouraging a little musical appreciation!), and is an added facility to tape relevant "talk shows" for our Guidance, Moral Preparedness and Physical Activities classes.

Two hundred and eighty four titles are in the process of being accessioned on our computer system for general use, and seventy-eight books were acquired to boost our teachers' resources, together with twenty three videos. Three wonderful mothers, Linda Linton, Anne Wilford and Annie Bennet are responsible for all this hard work, giving up their Wednesday mornings to assist in the Media centre.

Subscriptions to periodicals such as Time, National Geographic, Finance Weekly, Readers' Digest and Getaway, and the Star and Financial Mail/Guardian Weekly are proving to be popular amongst the pupils. Our display of all our past school magazines and photographs has also provided much interest and amusement.

# ACADEMICS

The Teachers' Workroom now houses two computers, a word processor and a typewriter for use in the preparation of lessons and setting of tests, as well as shelving for storage and copies of past examinations over the years in all subjects for all standards (also available to all pupils). Our Computer Room has been taken over by Mr Breytenbach and Mrs Deacon, and the members of her Mathematics department, who also supervise the pupils working in the afternoons.

This year also saw the introduction of our media Centre Prefect body, giving what has become a very capable and dedicated group of pupils, the authority and responsibility of prefectship within the Media Centre, irrespective of their seniority within the pupil body. Their assistance has made it possible for our pupils to make use of all our facilities, including the pupils' own new photostat machine, before school and at break. They have also manned exhibitions open to the public, such as the Volkskas National Contemporary Artists Travelling Competition, involving paintings, sculptures and photography of contemporary South African graduates in Fine Art, which were exhibited countrywide before the final judging. We even managed to sell some artwork!


Our Current Assignment section, where books are held on reserve for short-term loan, has brought the teachers and their classes into the Media Centre on a more regular basis.




# HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT



## COMPUTER COMPETENCE

This year we are primarily introducing Computer Literacy to the pupils, which means we want them to be familiar with a computer. We want them to be, amongst other things, able to work a Word Processor and use it, for example, to type their school assignments. As they progress they will learn more about how to use spreadsheets, a database, graphics, etc.

With the help of Mr. Brian Huskisson, one of our parents, and his computer company, SUPIMA, we upgraded our old computers this year, and all of them now have hard drives. This allows for extra memory on the computers, and a lot of time is saved in loading programs. We also purchased nine new computers through SUPIMA. Many of us are aware of the fact that the technology in the computer world moves very fast, which means that the present systems become outdated soon after they have been implemented. Therefore we have prepared ourselves for this, in that the new computers can easily be upgraded.

Pupils spent the First Term learning the keyboard, and soon became familiar with the asdf;lkj routine. Not many pupils were keen to learn the correct way of typing; some even thought it impossible. However, they soon realized that it is essential to be able to move quickly around the keyboard in order to get the most out of their computers.

Although we do not teach Computer Science - that is the programming of software - we were able to enter eight pupils this year for the Computer Olympiad. These pupils have been mostly teaching themselves, and the opportunity was given to them to measure their success. Our candidates were Rory Gilfillan in Standard 6, Luke Searra, Michael Stevens and Nicholas Ward in Standard 7, Philip Tomlinson in Standard 8, Marcus Oshry and Demetrius Metsos in Standard 9 and Matriculant Bernard Kuc. They competed in the first round which comprised a two-hour problem-solving contest, written at various centres throughout the country. Bernard Kuc, Marcus Oshry and Philip Tomlinson were the top three pupils at our particular centre for the first round !






## YOUNG HISTORIANS' CONFERENCE



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


## BISLEY/ENGLAND SHOOTING TOUR 1993

For the first time in the history of the School, Bryanston High gained a Springbok shottist when I was fortunate enough to be chosen to represent South African National Schools at Bisley in England, in the British open championships. The tour lasted three weeks; the first two weeks being spent on preparation and some friendly matches. The first of the two matches was against the Great Britain B squad, and the second against the Kent Shooting Club (the top county in Britain). The South African team won both matches.

The beginning of the third week saw the start of the "Weekend Aggregate", the first competition of the Bisley. I was entered into C Class, along with 185 other competitors of all ages. The aggregate consisted of three competitions :

- \* Competition 8 - 40 shots at 50 metres in which I was placed third, with a score of 389 out of 400.
- \* Competition 9 - 20 shots at 50 metres in which I was placed twenty-third, with a score of 191 out of 200.
- \* Competition 10- 40 shots at 100 yards in which I was placed twenty-fourth, with a score of 382 out of 400.

Competitions 8 and 9 were then counted together for Competition 10A in which I gained sixth place with a score of 580 out of 600.

Competition 8, 9 and 10 were then counted together to give a score out of 1 000. My score of 962 was enough to give me fourth place and a silver medal, as well as a gold medal for shooting an average of 96,2% or above.

The next competition was the "Championship Aggregate", to be shot over four days. Up until then, the weather had been fine, but things were soon to change as the wind picked up. The 100 yard scores were mostly affected.

The "Championship Aggregate" consisted of six competitions. Once again I was entered in C Class, with 161 other entrants :

- \* Competition 1 - 40 shots at 50 metres in which I came second with a score of 390 out of 400.
- \* Competition 2 - 40 shots at 100 yards in which I came forty-sixth, with a score of 368 out of 400.
- \* Competition 3 - 40 shots at 100 yards in which I came third, with a score of 385 out of 400.
- \* Competition 4 - 40 shots at 50 metres in which I came fourth, with a score of 388 out of 400.
- \* Competition 5 - 60 shots at 50 metres in which I came ninth, with a score of 579 out of 600.
- \* Competition 6 - 60 shots at 100 yards in which I came forty-ninth, with a score of 555 out of 600.

This gave me fifth place overall, as well as a silver medal for shooting 2 665 out of 2 800. For fifth place, I received a bronze medal.

Many of the scores were paired together for separate unsquaded competitions. The results were as follows:

- \* News of the World Competition - I was placed first out of 138 competitors.
- \* The Bell/Daily Mail Competition - I was placed twelfth out of 149 competitors.
- \* The Olympic Appeal Competition - I was placed third out of 34 competitors.
- \* The F.S. Morse Memorial Challenge Cup - I was placed first out of 57 competitors.

This gave me a total of nine medals, one trophy and one plaque.

I have not been overseas before, so the trip proved to be quite an experience for me, giving our team the opportunity to visit sights such as St. Paul's Cathedral, Oxford Circus and Madame Tussaud's Wax Museum in England, as well as the Colosseum, St. Peter's in Chains and Tivoli Fountain during our 1½ day stay in Rome on the way home.

It was the first time that a Junior Springbok Team was sent to Bisley, and I felt honoured and proud to represent South Africa now that we have re-entered the international arena.



## CRICKET

Since 1968, Bryanston cricket has grown from being a school with only one team, one fixture and no fields to a school with nine teams, seventeen First XI fixtures and four fields. Our reputation as a cricketing school is high in the Johannesburg area. Few other schools match our commitment to the sport with over one third of the boys being actively involved in the game.

Fixtures have often to be arranged with Boys' schools to accommodate the growing enthusiasm amongst our boys. An extra field has been made available to ensure as many people as possible have the opportunity to play; a far cry from the 1968 season when Bryanston Primary School's fields were used.

Every year boys from our First XI represent the area side at Beckwith Week or Ken Viljoen Week. This year was no exception with Richard Mulholland and Chris Waddell being selected for the senior side. Sean Brogan also represented the area U15 side. 



Many pupils realised that drama is not merely acting but encompasses a number of very exciting activities such as voice production, stage personality, costume, make-up, song, mime, dance, lighting, sound, decor and props, stage management, front-of-house management, playwrighting, production design, choreography, publicity and music. We are hoping to include filming and video techniques, together with theatrical photography, in the near future. ### RECIPIENT OF THE BEST PLAYWRIGHT AWARD

"Waiting for the Morning" is a serious one-act play for the stage, which seemed to have a relevant message for today's fast-living society right from the start. As each character took on its own life and personality, the story simply began to write itself, resulting in a South Africanised story of teenage tragedy.

I mainly wrote it from a performer's point of view, using dialogue which could be spoken from the heart, and which would be exciting and challenging. It was also important that the story-line was relevant to a teenage cast. On the technical side, I tried to enhance the play by using the lighting and sound equipment we have available to us at school level. Without realising it, I ended up highlighting a number of moral issues in my play, and consequently, "Waiting for the Morning" does have a deeper meaning than is seen on its surface. The theme of Life and Death which concerns both young and old is raised: the fragility of life with its heartache, pain and sorrow, and the inevitability of death, which, ironically, can sometimes bring the peace and love which could never be achieved within a lifetime.


# THE BEST OF TIMES



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
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**VALEDICTORY SPEECH**

# THE FIRST TWENTY-FIVE YEARS

## The Headmasters Look Back



# CHRONICLES

1968-1974 : The early years by Mr. J. Alswang, the founder Headmaster

The opening and establishing of Bryanston High School was both an exciting and traumatic experience. The first "assembly" on 15th January 1968 was, of necessity, held in the open air (as the school was still in the process of being built), amid building rubble, bricks, sand, open trenches, etc. and in competition with the cacophony of builders, plumbers, electricians and other artisans and their helpers shouting, hammering, banging and clanging, with concrete mixers, pneumatic drills, high-pitched power tools and bulldozers adding to the tumult. This state of affairs continued throughout that year and the first year proved to be an experiment of education amid disruption and distraction.

To all this and other problems must be added the frequent differences of opinion with the architect regarding the impracticality of many of his ideas (even cattle grids at the gates, and his original plans for the secretaries' general office so exposed, the ladies would have contracted pneumonia the first winter!) and also his incorrect siting of the buildings.

We opened with under 150 pupils, a small staff of young, inexperienced teachers, no senior staff, no schemes of work, very limited book stock, no educational aids, no sportsfields (and no heating during the bitterly cold first winter).

We not only survived but made remarkable progress, thanks to the teamwork and co-operation of pupils, staff and parents (and also the good offices of our Inspector of Education, Mr J J A de Villiers, and the Secretary of the Witwatersrand Central School Board, Mr L Gillard).

The levelling of the site to provide sportsfields was another protracted headache. When provincial funds eventually became available, the contract was awarded to an inexperienced contractor, whose major achievements were bulldozing away all the topsoil and then dumping the subsoil on top of it, and going insolvent before he had completed even half the job. This resulted in yet further delays. Eventually we persuaded the Department to make available to the school the portion of the money still available for the contract and we completed the job.

Our enrolment mushroomed and within 3 years we had topped 1000 and a few years later almost reached 1500. Within a short while, the teaching staff expanded to 60, plus 5 administrative staff and 12 cleaners and ground staff. We were fortunate to acquire, within a year or two, a first rate Deputy Headmaster, 2 Vice Principals, a number of Senior Assistants and many competent and experienced subject teachers.

I promised the parents that, if the school enjoyed their co-operation, the pupils would have the benefit of all the facilities while they were still at the school. Thanks to the planning by the Governing Body (and especially the know-how of the late Mr W R [Bill] Hedding and the financial sagacity of the late Mr Harry [Ginger] Cohen) aided by the P T A, the Mothers' Committee and the parents generally, we acquired the essential facilities within a very short period (in fact, more and better facilities than many long established high schools). These included mini-buses, tennis courts, a swimming pool, rugby, cricket, netball and hockey fields, terraced embankments, pavilions, a tuckshop, lockers for pupils, etc. and even carparks for staff and school vehicles (which were put up by the Deputy Head). From the very first year, our pupils enjoyed a wide range of activities: a Drama Club, Chess Club, Adventure Club, Debating Society, School Orchestra (and later a Military Band), Photographic Society, Literary Club, Choir, Philatelic Society, Students' Fellowship, Pupils' Representative Council and all sports. In addition to playing sports matches against local schools, tours were organized to play schools in other provinces. Educational tours to historic sites and geographical features in various provinces in South Africa were also organized.

Bryanston High School was a number of firsts:

- \* a school magazine in its first year of existence;
- \* an educational tour to Europe by our pupils;
- \* the first school to build its own TV studio, install closed circuit TV in classrooms and produce its own educational TV programmes (with all the work done by some teachers and a number of pupils);
- \* from the very beginning, staging operettas, organizing a fund-raising Debutantes Ball and many other functions.



The House names were selected after very careful thought and consideration of all suggestions submitted. Apollo, Jupiter, Mercury and Neptune were selected to combine the classical and the modern - the golden age of ancient Rome and modern space navigation terminology.

On the whole, the school had an outstanding type of pupil, but, of course, we also had a few bad eggs: one who thought it daring to drink beer during assembly - I think he became a teetotaler after the consequences; another who, whenever he was in trouble, stayed home and telephoned the school with bomb hoaxes; there were also initially a few truancy cases, one actively aided and abetted by her mother.



The school spirit was outstanding and all, pupils, staff and parents, contributed towards this. When a newspaper columnist mourned the passing of Bryanston's rural atmosphere and tongue-in-cheek referred to its new high school "that looks like a penitentiary", he was submerged by a tidal wave of letters from indignant pupils. As a result of this, he subsequently apologised and admitted "the children are right and I was unfair".

Bryanston High School in a few years built up a staff of which any high school could be proud. Many of them went on to occupy promotion in other schools and three were promoted to the upper echelons of the Transvaal Education Department.

There were a number of impressive official events:

- \* the official opening of Bryanston High School by His Honour, the Administrator of Transvaal, Mr S G J van Niekerk;
- \* the opening of the school swimming bath by the Director of Education, Dr A L Kotzee;
- \* the opening of the school TV studio, etc. by the Director of Education, Dr A L Kotzee

There is so much more than can be added, as each day during the first few years was a memorable day, and so many different functions and activities took place, but shortage of time allowed for compiling this article, plus my not having access to the school magazines of the early years and other reference works, as well as being limited to a specific length, all mitigate against adding more, and might also be responsible for some important or more interesting items being omitted. The pioneers set the standards and provided the facilities, from which those who followed could benefit and also continue and expand. In retrospect I realise that the early years were difficult years but also satisfying years, when I realise how many problems we had to content with and how many obstacles we had to overcome, but also how much we achieved.





1975 - 1983 : The Connotation Phase by Mr J. L. Viviers

The Old Bryanstonians Association recently invited my wife and me to join them in the celebration of the 25th Anniversary of the foundation of Bryanston High School. If the young men and women at the function were a measure of the success of the education provided by the school and the years, the school can feel justifiably proud of its achievements. These past pupils had a bearing, exuded confidence and displayed a positive disposition that is a credit to themselves, their parents and the many teachers who guided them to adulthood.

The recipe for this success formula can be found in the uniqueness of that which makes the school one of the leading schools in the country. Bryanston High School has always been one happy family. It has been characterised by a working relationship between teachers and parents in striving to achieve a common goal, namely to provide the best possible education for one's children. The frequently referred to ideal of a partnership in education between teacher and parent was firmly established during the first few years of the history of the school.

The policy of Differentiated Education, namely, to provide an education to every pupil according to interest and ability, was fully implemented with great success as reflected in the excellent matriculation results of the pupils. With a Standard Ten group of approximately 220 pupils an average of 135 distinctions per year was the norm. At the time and in order to place the school on the map it was decided to concentrate on the Academics. Any extra-curriculum achievement was considered a bonus - of which there were many. It is also worth noting that for many years during the time in question Bryanston High School was the only school in the Northern Suburbs that offered the Practical Course to pupils who were not coping with the Ordinary academic field of study. The fine results achieved by these pupils also reflected positively on the school community who were guided by the theme "Care and Share".

No other school can boast the same degree of parental involvement as was the case at BHS. Not only were parents prepared to serve on committees, but as willing workers tackled projects that reduced the staff's load.

The Mothers' Committee ran the tuckshop and did all the catering at the various school functions. The Gardening Committee, a sub-committee of the PTA, drew up a one, five, ten and twenty year plan for developing the school grounds.

The success of their endeavours can be witnessed in "Campbell's Jungle" on the North Western embankment of the sports fields. As a fundraising project the PTA arranged the clean-up of the Braamfontein Spruit and pupils obtained sponsors for every bag of litter collected. Bearing in mind that it was at the time when the so-called long walks were popular in schools and pupils were sponsored for simply walking a certain distance, Bryanston High set an example by performing a community service which was gratefully supported by all concerned. Many have copied our initiative, we set the example.

Any school is as good as the calibre of pupils enrolled in it. BHS had and has the best. Present and past achievement will bear out this statement. This has come about through pupils who work hard and play hard and who believe in the Almighty God, themselves and their school.

During my five years as Headmaster, I deemed it a privilege and an honour to be associated with the finest staff members that a school could be blessed with. The commitment, loyalty and total dedication of all concerned was the secret of successes achieved. I salute all members of staff - past and present.

In conclusion, I wish Bryanston High, God's richest blessings. May the school continue to go from strength to strength.



1984 - 1993 : Changing Times by Mr R.E. Paige

My decision in 1976 to apply for the Vice-Principal post at Bryanston High proved to be an inspired one for my personal and professional fulfilment. In 1977 I moved across from Hyde Park High to begin a fifteen year association with the school and its people that has never ceased to be stimulating, challenging and infinitely rewarding. Those first five years nurtured within me a single career goal : to be Headmaster of Bryanston High School. One of the most difficult decisions of my life was to apply out in 1982 for a deputy principal post. In retrospect, this move proved fortuitous as it qualified me to return in 1984 as Headmaster in succession to Mr J.L. Viviers, who had been promoted to the Inspectorate.

1984 was not an easy year. The previous two years had seen the entire senior executive leave on promotion and a sixty percent turnover in staff. Schools react poorly to uncertainty and Bryanston was at a crossroads. My first task was to establish a sense of direction. Fortunately in the Governing Body, chaired by Dave Foulds, I had the support of wise counsellors committed to the welfare of the school and its pupils. Without them a turbulent first year for a young, inexperienced Headmaster would have proven even more difficult than it was.

Together, however, and with the energetic support of the Parents Association and Mothers Committee, we were able to re-affirm within the school, the principles of Mr Alswang and Mr Viviers' excellent administration and re-align the school towards the future.

Currently it is the perception with the advent of Model C that schools should be run as businesses. Back in 1984 that was in fact our perception. A joint planning seminar involving parents and staff formulated a mission statement for Bryanston High:

"The creation of a dynamic school producing well balanced adaptable adults capable of using their full potential in meeting the challenges of a changing society."

The changes to come in education were largely anticipated. In my review of 1984, I stated: "Communities can no longer look to the State for the financing of that which provides a better, more relevant education. The State will provide the basics; the parents' attitude and funds will provide the quality."

The adoption of a Trust Fund approach to financing the school not only enabled us to compensate for the State's re-direction of funds towards the upgrading of Black education but also provided the financial resources to provide the facilities to meet the requirements of a technologically orientational era. A major decision was taken to build a media centre incorporating television and computer-aided teaching centres. In 1987 computer-aided education became a reality for our pupils, and the following year the magnificently conceived Media Centre opened its doors - to become the focus centre of the educational thrust at Bryanston. The route from decision to completion was not a smooth one. But for the vision and determination of Mr Aarnout Brombacher, Chairman of the Governing Body and Mr John Fitz Henry, Chairman of the Trust, in overcoming dissent, the media centre could have remained on the drawing board.



Bryanston High would not be the leading school that it is without the commitment of its parent community to the education of their children. Both Mr Alswang and Mr Viviers stressed this in their reviews and I have been the heir to the legacy they have fostered. Besides the enduring quality of the pupils it is the extensive and continuing support of generations of parents that ensures that Bryanston has been and remains a stimulating and progressive environment in which to teach. Passive our parents are not. Vocal they can be at times. Yet invariably a positive outcome arises out of democratic debate and the pupils benefit. How many schools have over 100 mothers assisting in the tuckshop or Mothers Committees who work virtually full time at the school catering for a ceaseless stream of activities?

Over the ten years of my leadership I have had the support of a legion of special parents in my endeavours on behalf of Bryanston and I wish to record my deepest appreciation to them, one and all.

In 1984 Bryanston was reclassified because of its 1298 pupil enrolment as one of the new complex class schools. This entitled the school to a senior-deputy principal (a new type of post), two deputies and twelve heads of department. The expansion of the number of promotion posts available brought with it an influx of experienced, highly productive senior staff which provided an enhanced capacity for excellent educational standards. The calibre of senior staff and the quality of the in-service training programme initiated is evidenced by the fact that four staff were promoted to headmaster between 1986 and 1992. Mr Brown opened Ferndale, Mr Hendry, Fourways, and Mr Algie, Midrand, while Mr Mc Farland is now headmaster of Glenvista.




Generally, Bryanston has been fortunate to attract first quality teachers. The reputation of the school, the quality of the pupils, a supportive parent community and the superb teaching facilities provided by the parents are vital in this respect. In 1985 Bryanston was the first school to build a block of offices for senior staff from its own funds; for example. Another interesting phenomenon about the staffing is the number of past pupils who have returned to their alma mater. At various times the number has ranged from fifteen to the current eight, including three Heads of Department. Their presence assists in the maintenance of the Bryanston tradition.

A school is in essence its pupils. Bryanston is particularly blessed in this regard. Our pupils thrive on challenge and their achievements in the academic, sporting and cultural fields have given the school the national reputation it holds. Despite the impact on enrolment of a greatly reduced feeder area once Fourways opened in 1987, the level of achievement has not diminished as the contents of this magazine clearly show. That 752 pupils, imbued with the tradition of their predecessors, can achieve at this level is a source of deep pride in the community.

Twenty-five years down the road from its humble beginning Bryanston High has entered the traditional age. Past pupils have children at the school, past pupils teach on the staff, established customs need to be considered in decisions, precedents exist - an unique ethos permeates the school. Yet Bryanston remains in essence dynamic and progressive - one of its earliest and present strengths. Despite the uncertainty of the times, the sports pavilion project has begun, renovations are on site and a long term reconstruction of the entire school programme is in progress. Model B, then Model C, were welcomed as opportunities for alignment with change and justice. Multi-cultural education is simply another challenge to be faced, perhaps our greatest yet. I have a quiet confidence that Bryanston will meet the demands of the New South Africa and continue to grow with the process of change.

My ten years at the centre of Bryanston High have been years of personal professional fulfilment. Few headmasters I know have had such a supportive team of parents, pupils and staff in sharing the responsibilities of their office. I am deeply grateful. Sometimes in the years to come the moment to hand over the tiller will inevitably arise ... until then I will continue to value my daily inter-action with a special school and its people.

On 15 January 1968 one of the founder staff members who greeted the first pupils at Bryanston was Mrs Pat Deacon. Twenty-five years later, Mrs Deacon is one of the school's treasured institutions. 


## TWENTY-FIFTH JUBILEE CARNIVAL

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
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
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
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## CREATIVE WRITING COMPETITION


## **CINDERELLA ROCKERFELLA !!!**
