Over 550 people participated in the annual gala hosted by Sewa's Houston Chapter at the GSH Event Center on December 4. The gala, themed "HELP 2022 -- Local Presence, Global Impact" showcased the chapter's work and raised funds for various development programs. Sewa received an excellent response to the gala, as it had to close registration within a few days of the invitations being sent out. Dharmic Organizations Donate 630,000 Pounds of Food through Sewa Diwali

Sewa Diwali, a large food drive organized by Dharmic communities (Hindu, Buddhist, Jain, Sikh, and other Indian origin groups) across the country, donated over 630,000 pounds of food in the U.S. in 2022. Now in its fifth year, the drive benefited over 200 organizations from 32 states, including food pantries, homeless shelters, worship houses, and schools.

Since its inception in 2018, the Sewa Diwali project has donated close to 1.5 million pounds of food nationwide. Aimed at fostering togetherness and promoting the concept of Sewa (selfless giving), Sewa Diwali provides a platform for Dharmic and Indic communities to organize food drives during Diwali. Starting in October to mark the celebrations of Diwali, the Dharmic Festival of Lights, the food drive runs through the end of November. The Hindu Swayamsevak Sangh (HSS) and Sewa International volunteers enthusiastically coordinated these efforts regionally and nationally.

Pam Bozano, the Site Director of Nobel Prep for the Boys and Girls Club at Stonybrook Middle School, IN, thanked the Sewa Diwali initiative for the generous donation they received: "There is a big food disparity in this community. So, we are very grateful and appreciative that this donation benefits our kids and their families during the holiday season".

Explaining the significance of the initiative, Anil Kothari, Sewa Diwali National Coordinator, said the drive continues to bring people together for universal good. All dharmic communities believe in the principle "parōpakārārthaya" idam sharīram" (a person lives to serve others selflessly). In all dharmic traditions, Sewa plays a crucial role in an individual's life," he said.

The Plano Texas Police Department appreciated Sewa Diwali in their Facebook posting: "It was a blessing to see the overwhelming participation from all corners of the Dallas-Fort Worth (DFW) area, with multiple communities and American Hindu organizations participating in this Sewa activity."

Sewa conducted conferences on child trafficking, in collaboration with CHETNA; and disaster management, and development work in the Himalayas in collaboration with HIMSamwaad. The two days of the CHETNA conference comprised insightful sessions on human trafficking, organ trafficking, child marriage, online trafficking, trafficking prevention, and COVID-19 rehabilitation.

HIMSamwaad 2022 provides a platform for people in the Himalayan region to discuss development work in the Himalayas and ensure its sustainability. In addition, the conference focused on developing a roadmap for finding local solutions to the region's thorny development issues.

AmazonSmile generates over \$5818 in Donations for Sewa

Sewa International received \$760 through the AmazonSmile program in the third quarter of 2022. This amount marks a significant jump compared to a year ago when Sewa collected less than \$200 in the same quarter.

As per a recent announcement by Amazon, the customerdirected donation program will shut down permanently on February 20, 2023. Until November 2022, the program contributed \$5,818.47 to Sewa and over \$400 million to all US charities. Since its inception, AmazonSmile has given over \$449 million to charities worldwide. Amazon contributed half a cent to the customer-chosen charity for every dollar spent by the customer for all eligible purchases on its website.

The high school volunteer participants of the LEAD (Leadership, Education, and Development) program and the chapter volunteers collectively put in 40,000 hours of community service in 2022. The Guest of Honor at the event, Congressman-elect Thomas Kean Jr., appreciated the work of the volunteers and urged them to continue to serve their local communities. Congressman Kean represents New Jersey's Seventh Congressional District.

The event recognized the year-long efforts of the chapter's volunteers from the LEAD program, Family Services, Helpline, Disaster Relief teams, and recipients of the President's Volunteer Service Award for 2022. Over 500 attendees, including leaders of partner organizations, Sewa's donors, and parents of LEAD interns, participated in the event.
