# **School District opts** out of rapid testing

The Abbeville County School District has opted out of a program offered by the state to provide rapid COVID 19 testing--testing that has been offered to school districts throughout the state, Abbeville School District Superintendent Dr.

"The guidelines for administering tests require rooms to be cleaned and contract tracers would need to be utilized as soon as a rapid test indicated a student was positive for COVID-19. Parent permission would also be needed and this is another layer to the process.

Rebeca McCaslan, executive director of the Calhoun Falls Chamber, said the Calhoun Falls parade had about 20 entries.

The testing would provide results within 15 minutes, and would be targeted at students, to provide them with a better threshold of health.

Students who want to be tested have to be tested at an identified testing site or with their local physician.

# AAMC has 'all hands on deck' approach

By Henry E. Green With the news that many hospitals throughout the country are overwhelmed with COVID patients, how is AAMC faring?

Meg Davis, marketing/ foundation/volunteer services director, was asked that question.

"AAMC has recently seen a significant increase in the number of positive COVID-19 patients in both our inpatient and outpatient areas," she replied.

"As COVID numbers rise in our area, we are prepared with an "all hands on deck" approach that utilizes flexible scheduling and the cross training of staff enabling them to work in a variety of areas within the hospital.

"At this time we have a total of six COVID-19 beds that are contained in a Respiratory Unit which has negative pressure in each room. At this time, we have four of the six bed filled however this number fluctuates daily.

"With the dramatic increase in COVID-19 cases statewide, AAMC continues to stress the importance of wearing a mask and avoiding large gatherings as well as practicing social distancing and good hand hygiene.'

# Edwards sworn in as City Mayor

#### By Henry E. Green Abbeville City Council met Tuesday night, as a new mayor, Trey Edwards, was sworn in.

A plaque was presented to Council member Jim Grant for four years of service to the City.

A plaque was presented to Santana Delano Freeman for 20 years of service to the City by Mayor Pro Tem Faye Thomas, who also praised Freeman for the help he had provided to her while she has been on Council.

Trey Edwards was sworn into office as Mayor by City Judge David E. Strickland. Freeman presented the gavel to Edwards.

Freeman provided farewell remarks, thanking his family and many friends.

"Tonight is bittersweet," he said, noting that he begins a new journey in his life after serving first on City Council and then as Mayor--20 years of service

"A lot has changed since 2000," he said. "I am leaving the City better than when I found it."

An election of the Mayor Pro Tem was tabled, after a tie vote between Benji Greeson and Chris Crawford.

Council approved a resolution of the City to adopt the Abbeville County hazard mitigation plan.

Assistant City Manager Fran Anderson said that the City needs to adopt it to apply for a grant administered through FEMA.

Council received reports on the Civic Center update, ACPA board appointments, and COVID-19 bonus pay. Also approved was COVID-19 one time bonus pay as follows: \$200 for all

full time, and \$100 for all part time. All employees that fall un-

der the full time or part time category will receive these bonuses.

The cost to the general fund will be \$10,300, and the cost to the Enterprise Fund will be \$9,700 for a total of \$20,000.

Edwards said that he proposed the plan to let City employees know that Council appreciated their service.

In other matters, McMillan Pazdan Smith Architects has made an initial assessment of the Civic Center building and parking area, and presented cost assessments.

Proposed renovations to the current building would include bringing the building up to current codes, office and restroom updates, and other renovations, at an estimated cost of \$332,500. The City is currently having the HVAC system and the roof assessed in order to prioritize the different segments of the renovation project.

New construction of an approximately 3,000 square foot building for events to include one warming kitchen and two restrooms is estimated at \$1,300,000.

Appointments to the Abbeville Community Performing Arts Foundation will be made at the regularly scheduled City Council meeting on Jan. 8. Four of the members will be for three years, while three of them will serve for one year.

Applicants must come to the Jan. 8 City Council meeting to meet with Council and answer questions about their appointment applications.

Council approved appointments to the City Judge positions, including Carolyn Brownlee, William McNeil and David E. Strickland--all of whom will serve two-year terms and will be sworn in in January.

**City Manager Blake Stone** and City Attorney Tombo Hite were physically absent from the meeting but listened in electronically.

Also, Council went into executive session.

# Veterans mark Pearl Harbor's anniversary

It was not hard to see why, as it was on Dec. 7, 1941, that the Japanese Navy launched a surprise attack on the American naval base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

civilians, were killed in the attack.

"We should never forget this day," he said.

The Post 2 commander paid tribute to the sacrifice of those military personnel who died in the attack.

"Our nation owes a debt to our fallen heroes," he said.

The attack on Pearl Harbor led the United States into

World War II.

"The greatest generation went on to defeat evil during the Second World War," he said.

Greenfield noted that the History Channel has been having programs about Pearl Harbor.

Those in attendance had a moment of silence for the fallen, listened to a recording of "Taps," and listened also as a siren was sounded in keeping with the "emergency" situation of 79 years ago, and Wallace McClinton provided a closing prayer.

nent vehicle identification numbers from items such as boats and trailers, and take pictures of their valuables.

The Sheriff's Office is currently putting some anti-crime measures into place.

The Sheriff's Office periodically has extra deputies come to work to saturate high crime areas, Graham said Tuesday.

The Sheriff's Office has also strengthened its investigations unit by adding personnel.

# Preservation SC gets donation for Trinity

By Henry E. Green Preservation South Carolina recently received a donation which will benefit the effort to restore Abbeville's Trinity Episcopal Church, Mike Bedenbaugh, president and CEO of Preservation South Carolina, said Friday.

"We have received a generous donation of \$25,000 from Hughes Development Corporation in Greenville," he said.

"It's the final bit we needed to begin work on Phase Two, that includes finishing work on the steeple," he

#### continued.

It will allow work to be finished on the steeple, with work on this part of the church to begin in mid-January.

Bedenbaugh hopes to be finished with the steeple by March or April.

"It's going to be fully restored with new timber frames and foundation," he said.

Overall, for Phase Two, \$705,000 has been raised, he continued.

Phase Three will include the repair and replacement of the exterior stucco, and

the effort to raise money for that will begin next year.

Bedenbaugh estimates that it will take \$1.2 million to compete the work on the stucco, and after that the windows and the church's organ will be a restoration focus.

The Hughes Development Corporation has developed a number of buildings along the Reedy River in Greenwood.

"(Founder) Bob Hughes is a major supporter of our efforts," said Bedenbaugh.

Luke 2:13 "And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying: (14) glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, goodwill toward men!"

In August of 1865, shortly after the Civil War, the parishioners of Holy Trinity Church in Philadelphia sent their pastor, Phillips Brooks, abroad for a year. His travels took him through Europe, and in December to the Holy Land. There he traced the footsteps of Jesus southward and visited the scenes of the Bible narrative. After two weeks spent in Jerusalem, Christmas Eve found him in Bethlehem, the birthplace of Jesus. He later wrote to his Sunday School back in Philadelphia. He said, "I remember standing in the old church in Bethlehem. close to the spot where Jesus was born. The whole church was ringing hour after hour with splendid hymns of praise to God. It was as if I could hear angelic voices telling each other of the Wonderful Night of our dear Savior's birth. Two years later he wrote the Christmas carol, "O Little Town of Bethlehem." Being at the scene of Jesus' birth moved Phillips Brooks immensely when he contemplated the birth of the Lord Jesus and he composed a hymn.

But think about when Jesus was actually born-that

was when the first Christmas carol was sung. Let me share three thoughts with you.

First of all, notice the choir. It was the heavenly host. Can you imagine how beautiful it was? I have heard some magnificent choirs in my time but I am quite sure they did not compare to the heavenly host who proclaimed praises to God. This choir knew the Lord in a personal way, they knew Him as Lord of Lord and King of Kings before He condescended to come to planet earth. The world for the most part did not recognize Jesus as the majestic, marvelous, master of the universe, but the angelic choir sure did. They not only knew Him in a close personal way but they praised Him in a spectacular manner. Second, notice the content

of their praise-"glory to God in the highest..." they attributed glory to Jesus, and rightfully so. This angelic choir singing the praises of God was just the added boost for the shepherds to go and investigate.

Verse 15 records that the angels said to one another, "let's go and see this thing that has come to pass.'

The content of the choir's song helped speed them on their way.

Third, notice the context of this first Christmas carol-"...on earth peace, goodwill toward men." I imagine those words rang in their ears and gave their feet impetus to pick up speed and hurry to the manger in Bethlehem.

Literally, Jesus is God's peace-He is the Prince of Peace. When he was born into the world quite literally the peace of God was sleeping in the manger. Not only the peace of God was on the earth but the actual and literal proof of God's goodwill toward men was on earth as well. Since the fall in the Garden of Eden God had promised a savior and now He had arrived. The good will of God toward sinful man was encapsulated in the little baby Jesus.

John 3:17 illustrates the goodwill of God: "For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved."

What a wonderful gift to lost and suffering mankind.

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# In Abbeville County Coronavirus cases pass '900' mark

#### By Henry E. Green

The coronavirus numbers for Abbeville County are headed in the wrong direction--in a big way.

Abbeville County had a total of 908 positive coronavirus cases, according figures from the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control for the early afternoon of Monday, Dec. 7.

There were 18 coronavirus-related deaths in Abbeville County, DHEC reported. In Abbeville's neighboring counties, Anderson had 8,342 cases, and 224

deaths, while Greenwood to curb the virus. had 3,137 cases and 78 deaths.

McCormick County had 331 cases, and seven deaths, while Laurens County had 2,637 cases, and 67 deaths.

In South Carolina as a whole, there were a total of 218,820 positive cases, and 4,249 deaths.

The numbers in the Palmetto State are part of a particularly unpleasant surge which the United States is experiencing, a surge which has prompted some comprehensive measures

More than 30 million Californians are under stay at home orders, for example, after a major surge of cases in that state.

Meanwhile, infectious disease expert Dr. Anthony Fauci says, according to ABC News, that at least 75 percent of Americans need to be vaccinated in order to break the pandemic under containment in the United States.

That vaccine is expected to be approved in the coming days.

Abbeville High School athletic director Maggie Jameson has released a set of policies governing the use of Abbeville High's Moffat gym during the winter sports season.

It is all done with the aim of curbing the spread of the coronavirus.

The guidelines for 2020/2021 include the following:

All tickets will be sold using an e-ticket service, and the ticket link will be available on the school Website at 8 a.m. the day before each day.

The gym will be cleared between girls and boys games, and doors will open 30 minutes prior to tip-off. Masks are required for entry and should be worn at all times, and disposable masks will be sold for \$1 prior to entry.

Meanwhile, there will be social distancing protocols to be followed, with one way traffic flow patterns. People are asked to sit only at designated spots.

All fans should enter through the side entrance of the high school, and all children ages seventh grade and below must be accompanied by a parent or guardian 21 years of age or older.

Children must remain with the parent or guardian during the duration of the event, and all children must have a ticket unless they will be sitting in the parent's lap. Hand-sanitizing and hand-washing stations will be available, and a clear bag policy will be enforced. Finally, only authorized personnel will be allowed on the playing service of the basketball court.

Similar guidelines were provided for Hite Stadium during football season.
