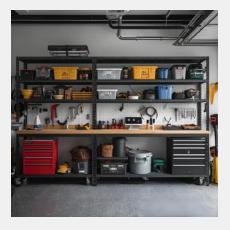
Preparing your home for sale does not have to be stressful nor does it have to cost a ton of money.

Think of it this way: if you wouldn't pack it up and bring it to your next home, it doesn't need to be on display now. Closets should look orderly, counters should look clear, and garages should look functional – not like an episode of Hoarders.

- Clear kitchen counters of anything but daily essentials
- Pack up seasonal clothing and shoes to free closet space
- Remove personal photos and fridge magnets
- Sort through "junk drawers" and donate what you don't need
- Stack or neatly box items in storage areas (attic, garage, basement)

FIX THE "IF I NOTICED IT, THEY WILL TOO" STUFF

You've probably lived with that squeaky door hinge or wobbly doorknob so long you don't even notice it anymore – but buyers will. Little flaws act like red flags. A dripping faucet makes them wonder about the plumbing. A scuffed wall makes them assume the whole house needs painting.

The good news? These fixes are cheap, quick, and immediately change the impression your home gives. Think of it as quieting all the "but what about..." doubts before they even start.



- Tighten loose doorknobs and cabinet pulls
- Patch and touch up scuffed walls
- Oil squeaky door hinges
- Stop dripping faucets (usually a washer swap)
- Smooth out any sticky sliding doors or drawers

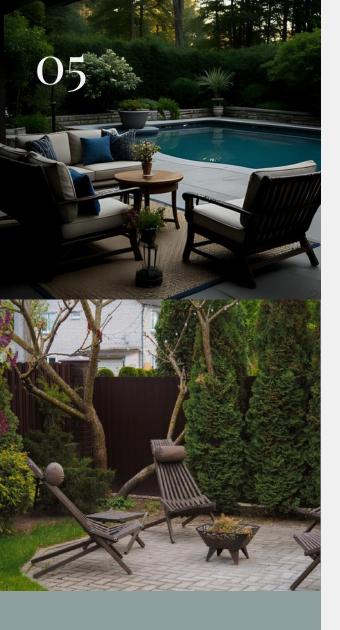
MAKE CURB APPEAL YOUR WINGMAN

FLAUNT WHAT BUYERS ARE HUNTING FOR

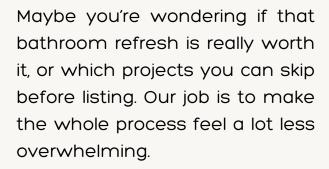

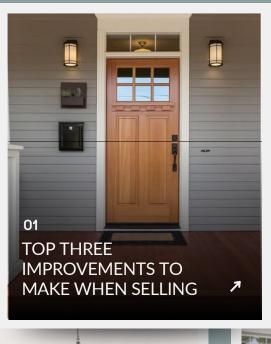




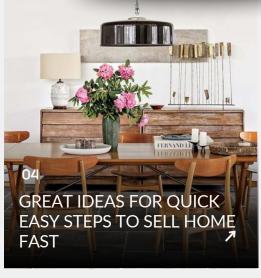
