Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The Fauldhouse and Breich Valley Community Development Trust (The Trust) is a Company Limited by Guarantee and was incorporated on 21 December 2006. The Trust was founded by members of the community of Fauldhouse following meetings at which local community groups were invited to attend and nominate individuals to serve as Trustees.

The Trust currently has over 360 members all either living or working within the catchment area the Trust serves. The Trust has Memorandum and Articles of Association that were subject to minor amendment to meet the requirements of OSCR, to achieve Scottish Charitable Status.

The principal activity of the company is to involve our local people and groups in achieving the objectives of the Trust as stated on page three.

Appointment of Directors

The board comprises a maximum of 15 Directors, of whom no more than 13 may be elected Directors and no more than two may be co-opted Directors. The Board of Directors is the governing body of the Company and is responsible for monitoring overall governance.

Subgroups are often established to support the board. They have no decision making authority. These subgroups can include

- **Events Subgroup**
To guide and assist staff in the organisation of community events
- **Newsletter Subgroup**
To advise on content and ensure that the newsletter is delivered to every household in Fauldhouse and the Breich Valley.
- **Staffing Subgroup**
Recruit, train & support The Hub/EDC staff & volunteers

The Directors, who are Trustees for the purpose of charity law, who served during the year and up to the date of this report, are set out on page five.

Induction and Training of Directors

The Directors have a wide range of life and professional experience that they make available to the Trust as appropriate.

Trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training events where these will facilitate the undertaking of their role and are informed of training opportunities from a number of sources such as Development Trust Association Scotland, West Lothian Council, Voluntary Action West Lothian, Social Enterprise Network and Business Gateway.

Organisational Structures and Decision Making

The Board of Directors is the sole executive committee of the Trust and is responsible for decisions regarding strategic direction.

The Board meets regularly, a minimum of four times per annum. Working groups (Subgroups) are established to progress specific pieces of work and they each report back to the Board.

Risk Management

The Board considers all risk management Health and Safety, Policies and Procedures, governs the Trust and its activities. The board also ensures that all necessary insurances are in place in relation to the activities, assets, liabilities and requirements of the Trust.

Relevant advice is sought during the planning of all future activities and projects.

Objectives and Activities

The Fauldhouse and Breich Valley Community Development Trust is guided by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.



Our Growing Programme

The Fauldhouse and Breich Valley Community Development Trust is primarily an Anti Poverty and Health and Wellbeing project based in Fauldhouse and have recently started a Youth Pathway Project.

The Trust is delighted at how fast the programme at the Hub and Eastfield Development Centre (EDC) has grown over the past 12 months. It highlights how hard the F&BV CDT team, volunteers and partners have worked. The feedback from the community has been very positive and encouraging. There are plans to further develop the programmes in both buildings.

In the past year over 9,000 visitors from Fauldhouse and Breich Valley have visited our buildings.

We have received over 2,000 phone calls and many messages via our social media and our website.

This has given us a clear insight into what the communities wants and needs, the issues, concerns and indeed their aspirations.

This Annual Report will give an idea of the projects and programmes that Fauldhouse and Breich Valley CDT have implemented.



Little Learners

F&BV CDT set up a new and innovative pre-school group, 'Little Learners' at EDC. Parents, guardians and/or carers bring their pre-school children along. Since starting in mid-February, 132 children and 87 adults have attended, these numbers are increasing weekly.

The room is separated into zones these have been put in place to teach children from a very young age to interact with (for example) the emergency services. In the hope of diverting them away from Anti-Social behaviour and criminal activity in later life. To help them to understand that these services are vital within the community, and that these services are there to help and support.

For example, the zones had a police station with car and uniforms, fire station with fire brigade and uniform, hospital, doctor and nurse uniforms, library, a classroom section. This is to help prepare them for starting school, building zone with bricks, uniform and diggers, sensory section and much more. The sessions and activities will alter and subjects such as healthy eating, exercise, cooking and life skills will all be topics covered by the group, in a fun and interactive way. Children will progress to our older youth groups, and community-based activities to enhance their social skills and provide learning opportunities. During the break, the Little Learners sit down for a drink and a healthy snack.

This project is delivered by Alex Blackley, F&BV CDT's Food Project Worker, Sally Lamont, Facilities and Activities Worker supported by volunteers.

Little Chefs

F&BV CDT set up a cooking project for children at EDC called the 'Little Chefs'. The programme was developed and is led by Food Project Worker, Alex Blackley with volunteer support. One of the classes is for ages P3-P4 and another is for P5-P7. The class teaches the children about healthy eating on a budget, food hygiene, personal hygiene, how to follow a recipe, measure ingredients, prepare fruit and vegetables, use a hob and/or an oven to cook their ingredients. The classes help improve confidence, build social and practical skills, teach literacy and numeracy and help children and young people interact in a positive and productive way.

The Trust are delighted to say that both classes have been hugely popular, and they have been completely full since starting. There are over 247 children attending per month. At present there is an ever increasing waiting list for children to attend these sessions.

Alex said how proud she is of the children and how some have overcome fears, example, one child has autism/OCD and has a fear of smells and textures. Since attending he has really grown and has overcome some of his fears and he is so proud of himself, as we all are. We have other examples of child development using these sessions.





Fun Football

This project started last year for boys and girls and is becoming increasingly popular with 50 children attending weekly P1-P2 and 3-5 year old children attend the free, four nights of Fun Football per week.

These sessions encourage exercise, movement, social skills, teamwork and coordination, all in a really fun way.

This project is delivered by David Allan Facilities and Activities Worker and local volunteers at EDC.

From six years old the children have the option to move onto a local football team. A Fauldhouse Community Football Club has been established, and is now a constituted group. The group are working with partners at West Lothian Council and with the SFA. This will enable the development of further opportunities for children and young people via the Youth Pathway.

Longridge United have also set up a football group at our Eastfield building and are working in partnership to establish childrens, young peoples football, sporting opportunities across the wider Breich Valley communities.

Eastfield Community Shop

Last year we were receiving a high volume of people contacting us desperately looking for food. To try and help the people who were financially struggling F&BV CDT opened a Community Shop.

Every week a minimum of 30 people attend the shop. Unfortunately, due to the cost of living crisis and the recent cuts to the benefits system we are seeing numbers increase, the demand will further increase as the benefit cuts come into effect.

We offer milk, bread, ambient items, frozen meat, fruit, vegetables, toiletries and much more, every Friday the shop also offers free Greggs.

In 2024 this was run by Sally Lamont, Facilities and Activities Worker. We also offer emergency packs for people who are referred to us by support workers, health visitors and social services.





Cook Along!

As part of the Food Project Alex Blackley Youth Leader delivers a weekly Cook a Long session at EDC. Approximately 20 people attend per session.

Alex chooses a different budget friendly recipe every week, she provides everyone with the recipe, cooks the ingredients with some of the people offering to help i.e. cut up vegetables etc, everyone has portion of the food to taste and each week the ingredients are available from the community shop, this allows the people to try and cook the meal at home. The project brings people together, teaches them basic life skills, addresses issues related to mental health and wellbeing.

Community Garden and Orchard

With the support of young people from the local community, and our partners. F&BV CDT created a small community garden and orchard area at the back of EDC. The Community Youth Team, The Larder and the Youth Action Project have a team of young people who have volunteered to help us with these early groundwork stages of the garden project. These are young people who may, for complex reasons, be involved in the youth justice system, who are struggling at mainstream school, or may be involved in Anti-Social Behaviour.



Some are volunteering as part of a certified training/accredited course, with the Larder for example. Others have become involved via the Youth Action Project or the Community Youth Team, among other pathways.

The young people have cleared the area, have built benches and planters, as well as bird feeders and bug hotel for the toddler group. They will be planting 20 young trees, ten apple, 5 cherry and 5 plums, for the community orchard.

The trees were provided by West Lothian Climate Action Network who are going to be providing training, advice and support on how to care for these trees properly. The plan is for volunteers to support and maintain both the orchard and garden with the long-term potential for the Little Chefs to use some of the produce grown.

This all ties into the Youth Pathway Project. F&BV CDT team will continue to engage with the young people and help them to access further accredited training, skills development and further enhance their employment opportunities.

Barista Training

This project is a partnership between Burnhouse School/ The Skills Centre and F&BV CDT. Pupils attend the Hub every Thursday morning with their teachers. The training is accredited SCQF Level 5.

The young people are taught how to use the Barista machine and how to make a variety of coffees, tea, hot chocolates, smoothies and milkshakes. Since starting this service in March last year, the young people have served over 800 customers.

This project will be further developed to include food, food hygiene accreditation, and it will tie in with the Youth Pathway Project.

The project targets young people with complex issues and additional needs. As well as being accredited the project helps develop confidence and self-esteem, it teaches important life skills and it is intergenerational.



Trishaw Project

The Cycling Without Age Trishaw project is targeted at those who are older and have limited mobility, are disabled individuals and/or who feel socially isolated.

The Trishaw is piloted (cycled) by a group of local, trained, dedicated volunteers. F&BV CDT thank our four Trishaw Volunteers – Marsha Williams, Joanne Bain, David Bain and Jim Hendry.

Pilot Trainer and Chapter Captain, Jim Hendry, has been extremely active this year. He does a weekly pick up of Care Home residents (weather permitting), he encourages people he sees in the streets to book a ride and he brings regulars along to the Coffee and Chat in The Hub.

The passengers, many from the local Crofthead Care Home, have so much fun and enjoy the rides in the fresh air. They often see people and places they may not have been for some time.

In 2024 there were 174 passengers taken out on the Trishaw in and around Fauldhouse.

A ride on the Trishaw makes everyone smile, whether you are a passenger or a pedestrian.



Groups

Every week approximately 40 members of the community attend the arts, sewing, crafts and mental health groups based at The Hub, while there they all enjoy a cuppa and a biscuit.

For example we have the Take a Break Group which provides a place to meet and have a coffee, the Stronger Together Group who provide mental health support, the Art Group which many users feel is a therapy which allows them to interact with other members of the crafting community.

Other Services

All the above offer a wide range of support including benefits, financial support, employability advice, support for carers, independent living among other things. These services are fully booked week on week, last year over 500 people used these services and many more were referred to these services in other locations in the F&BV CDT area.

Annual Community Events



Summer of Fun

F&BV CDT's free Summer of Fun programme had 514 local children attending over four weeks at Eastfield Development Centre.

The young people participated in a mix of activities including football, taekwondo, pottery, beauty, rugby, crafts, dance, Lego, fitness and more, with shows for the parents at the end of the programme. There was something for every child.

Sessions were held late morning and early afternoon and included a break for lunch, which was provided. Activities were held both inside and out, all weather dependant.

On the final day we organised a Fun Day for all the children who had attended.

Defibrillator at The Hub and Eastfield Development Centre



Eastfield Development Centre also now has an unlocked defibrillator. It is situated at EDC's front door for use in emergency by the community in the surrounding area. This defibrillator was awarded to F&BV CDT by the British Heart Foundation and is available for community use 24/7.

Thanks to Jamie from C Kerr Electrical, who installed the defibrillator and were the electrical contractors for the EDC refurbishment.

The Hub houses a defibrillator installed on the front of the building. This is accessible at The Hub's central location at all times. The access code is C1267 or call an ambulance on 999 for this code.

September Annual Fair Day



For the first time in many years, the free September Annual Fair Day was not the best of weather for the event but the poor weather didn't stop over 300 people attending.

We had refreshments, stalls, characters, face painting, a walkabout magician, a circus workshop, a tombola, live music, Fire Appliance, games, inflatables and a mining display to mark the 40th anniversary of the end of the Miners Strikes which brought together the communities of Fauldhouse, Stoneyburn, Addiewell, Loganlea and Breich.

Children's Christmas Party and Seniors Christmas Afternoon Tea



F&BV CDT provided festive cheer for the younger and older generations from across the Breich Valley at Christmas.

We held a children's Christmas party in EDC for 1-12 year olds. Over 50 children attended and had party food, played party games and visited Santa in his grotto.

The Seniors Afternoon Tea was very well attended. Residents of the Crofthead Care Home, also brought the entertainment with them. All had afternoon tea then singing and dancing. It was a reunion for many. It was a chance to socialise, connect and enjoy themselves in a thriving, happy environment. Some of those attending came with their carers, some had dementia and Alzheimers.

For some it was the first time they had gathered in a social setting for many years. The event included people from across the Breich Valley Villages.

Volunteer's Thank You Event



F&BV CDT held an event for our regular Volunteers to thank them for all their hard work throughout the year. Our volunteers are a very important part of the organisation.

The F&BV CDT team cooked and served a three course meal and entertainment.

Fauldhouse village Christmas tree



F&BV CDT provided the village Christmas tree and tree lights for an eleventh year in December 2024. West Lothian Council erected the tree and lights in early December on behalf of F&BV CDT.

The Trust has committed to raising funds, with the support of the local community, to provide the Christmas tree and tree lights annually.

The Trust has plans for 2025 to make the switch on of the lights more of a community event. Keep an eye on our social media for more information.

Community Benefit Small Grants

F&BV CDT receives funding directly from Tormywheel Wind Farm annually. These funds cover some of the Trust's vital running costs and enables the Trust to provide a wide range of anti-poverty services within the local community.

The funds also enable the Trust to provide the groups, projects and initiatives that address the needs of the local community, and contributes towards their running costs, such as utilities, maintenance and repairs.

This fund is available to constituted community groups and organisations with their own bank accounts who must be operating within 5km of the Tormywheel Wind Farm. Applications are available for funds between £250 and £2,000.

F&BV CDT manages, administers and distributes, on behalf of REG Power, the Community Benefit Funds each year as part of F&BV CDT's Small Grants Programme. This fund is available November/December each year.

Eastfield Development Centre refurbishment

F&BV CDT were delighted that local builders, JG Joiners and Builders completed the first phase of the redevelopment of Eastfield Development Centre (EDC).



Thanks to funding from West Lothian Council Place Based Investment Programme (PBIP) 2023-24 and the Levenseat Trust, the building now has a new much larger kitchen with serving hatches to both the hall and a new improved foyer area where you can sit have a chat and a coffee or tea.

The building also has a new office and an accessible toilet. A sliding partition wall has been installed to enable the hall to be split in two, with separate access to both areas, creating a more usable and flexible space for groups and activities.

This has allowed the previous office to house the Eastfield Community Shop.

Eastfield Development Centre has been a work in progress for the Fauldhouse and Breich Valley Community Development Trust (F&BV CDT) since 2012 after several local groups and people approached the Trust about bringing this well loved building back into use after it had fallen into disrepair since its closure.

Eastfield Development Centre was then leased by F&BV CDT from West Lothian Council from May 2017. The Trust managed to have some repairs and improvements done to the building over the years.

EDC was finally Community Asset Transferred from West Lothian Council to the charity in 2022 to allow this building to continue providing projects and activities to benefit local people.

As a charity, F&BV CDT rely on local fundraising and grant funding to deliver our projects. All the money generated at EDC is invested back into the building and to help run the activities based there.





Manager's Summary

For the Year Ended 31 December 2024

This Annual Report highlights some of the great work, activities, projects and events organised and implemented by Fauldhouse and Breich Valley CDT (F&BV CDT). The Board of Directors, the Volunteers and the F&BV CDT Team have all worked very hard and have contributed to the Charity's very successful year.

F&BV CDT have worked with a wide range of partners in 2024. This includes The Advice Shop, Citizens Advice Bureau, Community Connections, West Lothian Council, The Bridge Project, and many others, to provide a wide range of advice and support services within the local community.

Staff and volunteers have provided a varied programme of groups, clubs, activity sessions and events for all ages, from toddler's and youth groups to older people's groups and community events. F&BV CDT provide a free emergency food service and we operate a Community Food Shop. We can also provide support with fuel, clothes and much more. If we cannot provide a service we can refer to one of our many partner organisations. These partner organisations also refer individuals, and families to F&BV CDT for support, advice, information and access to services and resources.

F&BV CDT also have an annual Christmas Hamper and Toy Appeal supporting around 200 local families within Fauldhouse and the Breich Valley Communities.

The F&BV CDT now facilitate and manage two buildings on behalf of the local community, The Hub and Eastfield Development Centre. Both centres have seen a marked increase in footfall, number of people using the services and resources on offer 2024, with over 9,000 people visiting the buildings, either for advice and support, or to attend one of our groups or events.

F&BV CDT would like to stress that none of this work would be possible without the support of the local community and the dedication of local volunteers (who genuinely care about their community). F&BV CDT partners and partner organisations are also very important to the success of F&BV CDT. The funders, who are all named in this report. Without funding support the Charity (F&BV CDT) would not be able to provide the services and resources on offer. There are also the individuals and

businesses who have donated and supported F&BV CDT projects in many, different, ways. F&BV CDT would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for all their support 2023/2024.

As you will see from this report, 2024 was a very successful year. It was extremely sad, heartbreaking, that so many people needed food and emergency support! But it was good that the Charity was here to help, advise, support and indeed signpost. F&BV CDT intend to further develop their Services and Resources for individuals, families and the wider communities. We will also look into securing funding for a dedicated Mental Health and Wellbeing Project Development Worker.

As well as extending the Anti-Poverty Services and Resources on offer, F&BV CDT will also be working to develop and implement a Social Prescribing Model of Intervention and Prevention, and a Youth Pathway Project. This will also include sporting and leisure opportunities, education and skills development opportunities, and much more.

We are very much looking forward to 2025.
