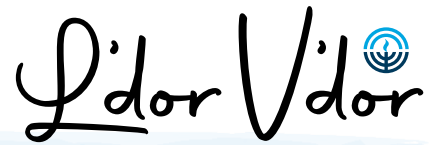

OVERNIGHT JEWISH SUMMER CAMP



The impact of Jewish camp is immediate. Children with pivotal Jewish camp experiences are more likely to become adults who value their Jewish heritage, support Jewish causes, and take on leadership roles in their communities. Last summer, Federation helped send 28 campers to nine Jewish summer camps.

Thanks to the generosity of Mimi Levin, The Greensboro Jewish Federation is proud to provide free PJ Library subscriptions to all families in our community. And, PJ Library isn't only about the books. All Jewish families, no matter their observance level or family structure, also have access to low barrier engagement opportunities to socialize.

- **156 children enrolled in PJ Library; 57 children enrolled in PJ Our Way**
- **118 families engaged at 10 events**

B'NAI SHALOM DAY SCHOOL



Representing the full spectrum of Jewish observance, B'nai Shalom creates a nurturing environment where approximately 41% of Jewish children in the community, infant through 8th grade, learn and grow. **Federation's allocation of \$212,500 covers 42% of families in financial need.**

Greensboro Federation Leadership Institute (G-FLI) is an 18-month leadership course and an opportunity for emerging leaders to identify and develop their leadership styles, exposing them to leadership opportunities within the Greensboro Jewish Federation and its constituent agencies.

JEWISH EDUCATIONAL LOAN FUND (JELF)

JELF provides interest-free, last dollar loans to Jewish students in need for their higher education. After receiving interest-free support from the community, students repay JELF over an 8-year, graduated period, in turn recycling the loans. ***This year, 13 students from Greensboro were awarded \$58,240 with the average grant being \$4,480.***



J•TRIAD

J-Triad offers a fun and meaningful Jewish experience for young adults. Focusing on Jewish, social, *Tikkun Olam*, and educational opportunities, J-Triad strives to enrich the experience among young Jews in the Piedmont Triad area by providing a full range of interesting, engaging events. ***Taking COVID-19 regulations into account, J-Triad successfully produced 23 events with 291 attendees.***



NORTH CAROLINA HILLEL

North Carolina Hillel empowers and inspires students to pursue their own Jewish journeys by creating strong communities and transformative experiences. NC Hillel encompasses eight campuses across the state comprising approximately 3,000 Jewish students. ***The Greensboro Jewish Federation allocated \$41,000 to NC Hillel and \$1,000 to Hillel International in 2020-2021.***

NATIONAL YOUNG LEADERSHIP CABINET

National Young Leadership Cabinet is JFNA's premier young leadership development program that educates and connects the next generation of global Jewish leaders and philanthropists. Cabinet trains and inspires the most promising young volunteers for positions of leadership in the Jewish community.

Emily Kranz, a member of Cabinet's current cohort, is one of more than 15 members of the Greensboro Jewish community to have participated over the years. One of these alumni is Congresswoman Kathy Manning, NC-06.

National Young Leadership Cabinet's focus is to provide tools for participants to better themselves and their capacity as leaders through continued learning, reflection, and action. Members participate in a five-year curriculum that builds on a series of Jewish values:

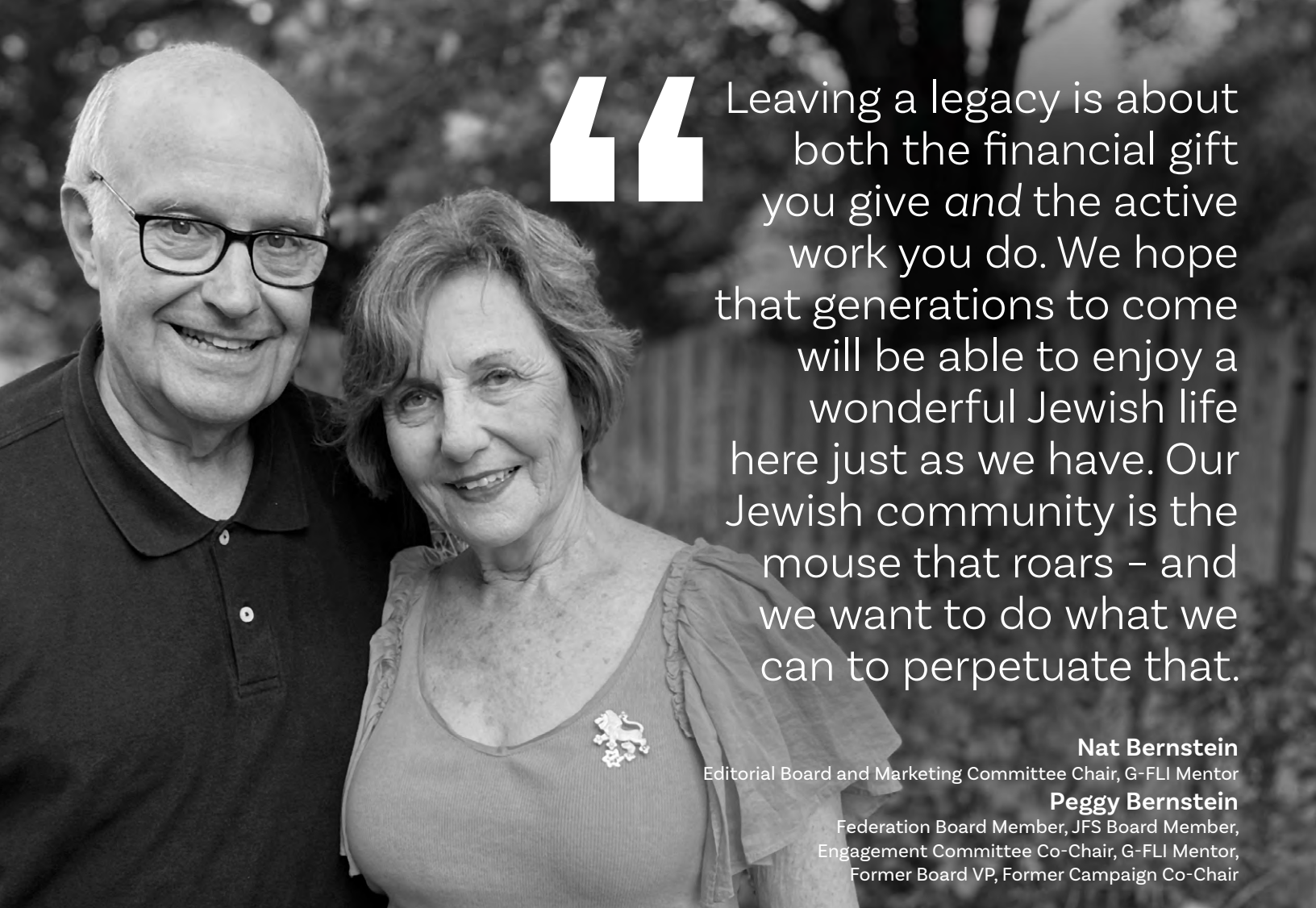


Jewish Family Services, a constituent agency of the Greensboro Jewish Federation, supports and empowers individuals and families in the Jewish community by providing a range of supportive and mental health services to assist all of its members to meet life's challenges.

- The incredible efforts of clinical staff made it possible to decrease feelings of isolation in their clients and **provide much needed support with the implementation and use of Doxy.me**, a secure teletherapy platform.
- The Food Pantry Task Force created a process to distribute food to small pantries in need of additional resources. **\$8,750 was allocated to outside organizations, \$6,000 to our community, and \$2,000 to provide holiday food cards.**
- The COVID-19 Emergency Relief Fund dollars assisted more than **40 families.**
- Mitzvah Day pivoted to Mitzvah May, resulting in more than **100 volunteers** throughout the month.

- *The Create a Jewish Legacy Program represents a shared commitment by Greensboro’s synagogues, agencies and day school to work together, under the leadership of the Foundation, to secure a vibrant Jewish future for our community. This collaborative endowment program enables donors to fulfill their philanthropic goals while strengthening our Jewish community by sustaining vital programs, services and institutions.*

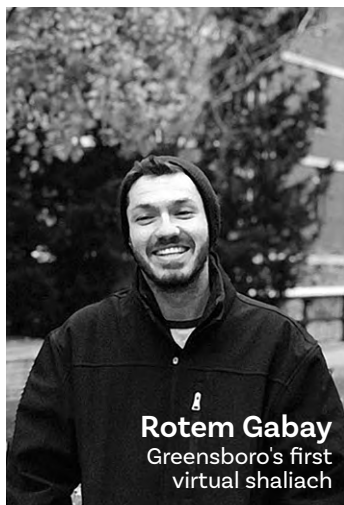


THE JEWISH AGENCY FOR ISRAEL (JAFI)

JAFI represents the voices of Jewish people and communities around the world, with the global reach, financial strength and infrastructure to quickly meet urgent needs as they arise.

Greensboro's allocation of \$100,000 helped:

- 23,281 new immigrants make Aliyah from around the world.
- 11,000 Masa participants graduate from their programs, bringing with them professional knowledge, leadership skills, and deeper connections to Israel and the Jewish people.
- Fund programs supporting Reform, Conservative, and Modern Orthodox education in Israel, helping ensure religious diversity and inclusion.
- 3,540 children receive support across Israel through the Youth Futures program and house 1,100 at-risk youth Jewish Agency youth villages.

PARTNERSHIP2GETHER (P2G)



JAFI's Partnership2Gether platform creates a living bridge between Greensboro, smaller communities in the Southeast, Prague and the Hadera-Eiron region of Israel. This includes peer to peer programs, cultural exchanges, customized touring and home hospitality in the region, teen exchanges, and educational programming.

Greensboro's allocation of \$20,000 went towards:

- B'nai Shalom L'Shi2f Classroom Connections with a school in Hadera, and educator's participation in the One2One English Program
- Expanding Israel programming with Greensboro's first virtual shaliach, and summer virtual programming for teens
- A full delegation of active participants in the fourth cohort of partnership's Leadership2Gether young adult program

AMERICAN JEWISH JOINT DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE (JDC)



JDC is the leading global Jewish humanitarian organization, working in 70 countries to lift lives and strengthen communities. JDC rescues Jews in danger, provides aid to vulnerable Jews, develops innovative solutions to Israel's most complex social challenges, cultivates a Jewish future, and leads the Jewish community's response to crises.

Greensboro's allocation of \$133,000 helped JDC's work, which included:

- Servicing more than 80,000 impoverished Jews in 11 Former Soviet Union countries throughout a network of 64 Hesed Welfare Centers, and distributing 21,372,400 PPE items to homecare workers.
- Helping 71,000+ people every, single day

GLOBAL EMERGENCY FUND



The Greensboro Jewish Federation's Global Emergency Fund was established to distribute funds as needed to assist communities directly impacted by disasters. **This year, the community raised a total of \$5,697 which was distributed for wildfire relief in California, the surge of COVID-19 in India, winter relief in Texas, aid in Israel during the rocket attacks, and survivors of the Surfside Champlain tower collapse in Florida.**

Ashkenormativity, the assumption that the Ashkenazi experience, culture, heritage and image is the exclusive representation of Judaism, ultimately finds itself as the prototypical baseline in most Jewish

educational institutions in the United States. With the critical goal of starting a meaningful and essential dialogue regarding racial and implicit bias, **the Federation, along with nine highly esteemed expert panelists in our community, designed a mindful three-part series of panel discussions where 412 attendees began conversations on Jews of Color, Microaggressions that Jews of Color encounter in Jewish spaces, and the role that the Jewish community must play in allyship.**

SHALOM GREENSBORO MAGAZINE



Shalom Greensboro magazine is a bimonthly publication that mailed to more than 1,500 households and was read more than 3,500 times online. Governed by an Editorial Board made up of seven members, the magazine's themes included: Navigating Race and Culture,

Education, Sustainable Living, and Traditions Reimagined.

The magazine offered an avenue for engagement among members of the local Jewish community and beyond to explore different perspectives, commonalities, and an appreciation of Jewish culture.



JEWISH VOICES FOR AN INCLUSIVE GREENSBORO

Launched in February, 2021, **The Jewish Community Relations Committee (JCRC)** was built to maintain strong relationships with the city's diverse set of communities in service of a common vision – an equitable, just and inclusive Greensboro.

We learn. We educate. We advocate. And we mobilize.

JCRC's core mission is to address historic and persistent injustices including all forms of systemic discrimination and oppression such as **antisemitism, racism, and poverty** primarily in Greensboro, but also in the United States, Israel and beyond. Jewish values lead us to approach this work with **a commitment to building cross-cultural relationships and promoting social justice.**

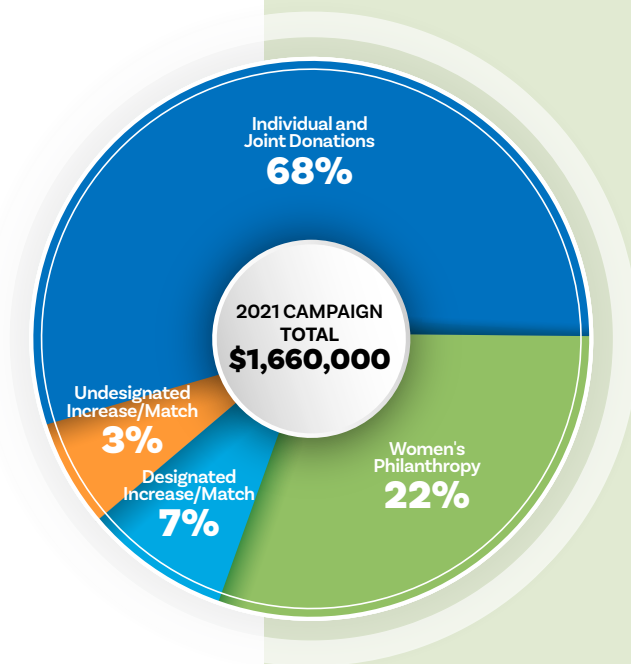

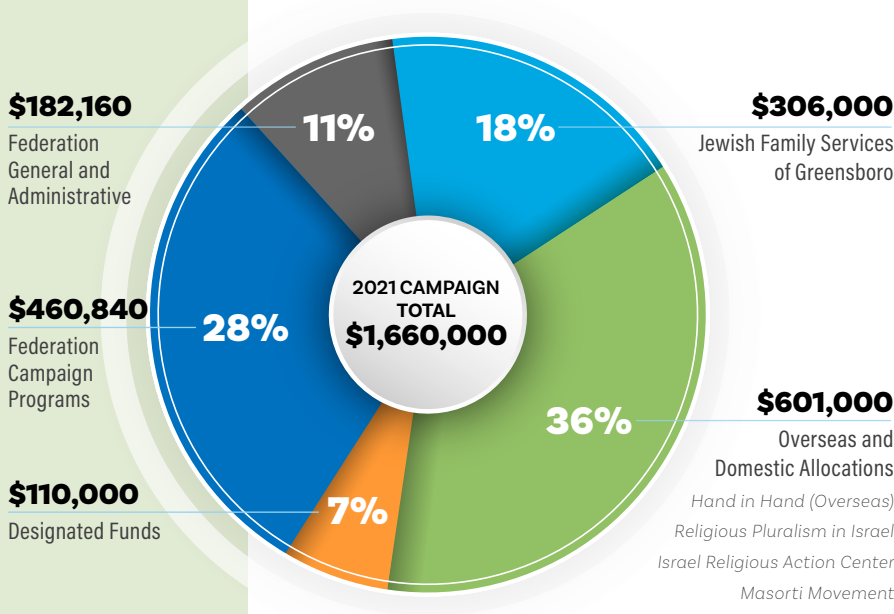

MAKING A PERSONAL CONNECTION WITH ISRAEL

A new and exciting addition to the campaign this year, **Campaign Israel Series** featured a wide range of stimulating topics surrounding Israel, its people and our relationship with them.

Spanning 12 days, the Campaign Israel Series brought 11 virtual speakers which drew 428 attendees.

Topics included discussions on Mizrahi Jewish refugees and how one can be a liberal Zionist with **Hen Mazzig**, the perpetual Israeli election turmoil with **Reuven Hazan**, an Arab Muslim Israeli's perspective with **Mohammed Zoabi** and an evening with **Yaakov Zada Daniel** and **Boaz Konforty** from *FAUDA*. **Pnina AGENCYAHU**, Partnership2Gether Director at JAFI and **Ariel Zwang**, CEO of JDC and B'nai Shalom Day School alumna, spoke at a session called *Powerful Women in Positions of Power*.

Partnering with friends from P2G, participants enjoyed an Israeli wine tasting with a seasoned sommelier, and were able to experience a view of Israel not often seen – through the eyes of a helicopter pilot – all while sitting comfortably in their homes in Greensboro.

The Greensboro Jewish Federation is run by a team of professionals and community volunteers whose main goal is the engagement and preservation of our Jewish Community.

Our professionals and volunteer leaders bring a wealth of experience and expertise, reflecting the engaged, vibrant, and flourishing Greensboro Jewish community. Recognizing that each Jew is responsible, one for another, the Greensboro Jewish Federation promotes the welfare of the Jewish people in our community, in Israel and worldwide.

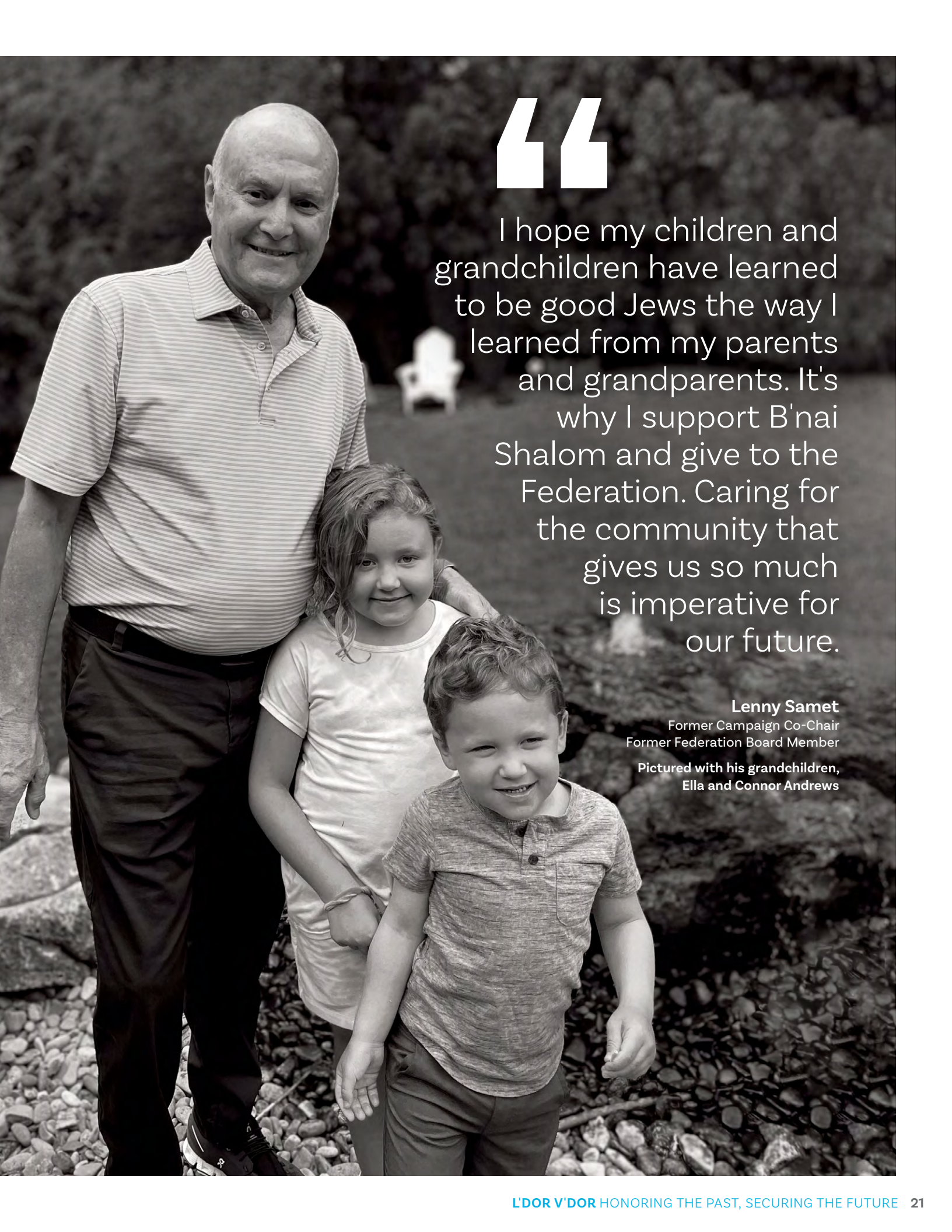
