A Symphony of Voices: How Community Input Guided Our Growth

At Gateway Foundation, growth is more than a goal—it's a vital response to the pressing needs of our communities. Our mission drives us to evolve strategically to address the urgent challenges facing those we serve.



In recent years, the data has painted a stark picture: rising rates of mental health disorders, escalating substance use, and increasing overdose deaths. Undergirding these realities is the undeniable disparity in access to substance use treatment. Only about one in four individuals who needed treatment actually received it. Furthermore, those without health insurance, those who were incarcerated, or those living in poverty face an increased risk of fatal opioid overdose, highlighting significant gaps in the accessibility and equity of comprehensive, evidence-based care.

These numbers motivate us to act, but the voices of our community truly guided our efforts—revealing how we should act, where we should focus, and what we should provide. Here at Gateway, we’ve embraced feedback by implementing systems designed to improve the sustainability of its collection and elevate guidance from diverse voices in our annual strategic planning. This past year, through surveys, focus groups, town halls, team meetings, we attentively listened to thousands of individuals, helping us grow in ways that are both equitable and intentional, addressing the specific needs of the communities we serve.

Hearing from our community and stakeholders has been an incredible privilege and honor. We are deeply grateful for their trust and the authentic insights they shared, which have been instrumental in shaping our approach and priorities. While distinct themes emerged across various regions and groups, a clear, unifying need was evident: access to high-quality services, which remains our top priority. In response, we:

- Opened new locations across Illinois, Georgia, and Florida.
- Reinvested in existing facilities enhancing infrastructure, expanding services and levels of care, and streamlining operations.

- Began updating our treatment curricula to address the holistic needs of our patients.
- Invested in the growth and development of our staff with new training opportunities and an advanced education benefit.
- Enhanced the capacity of our team by adding new positions and recruiting and promoting skilled individuals.

Additionally, we deepened our community connections, fostered camaraderie among individuals in Recovery, and, for the first time in Gateway’s history, invested in developing mental health and substance use disorder programs in California.

Finally, we are committed to being responsive to our community’s needs, as well as **being a voice for our community**. Through our new Public Policy Group and working with local lobbyists, Gateway will be a staunch advocate for expanding substance use, mental health and wellness resources that meet the needs expressed by our community.

We are proud to say that this past fiscal year was informed and inspired by a chorus of thousands of voices. Their collective input became our favorite song, one we played loudly and kept on repeat, ensuring our efforts were closely aligned with the community’s most pressing mental health and wellness needs.

Whether you sang a solo or joined the chorus, we thank you for sharing your voice. By listening to you, we are growing!

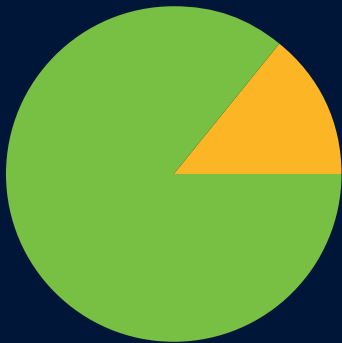
Gateway Treatment Offerings

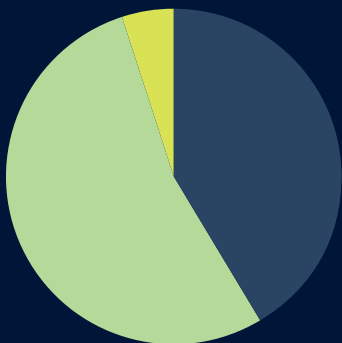

86% of Gateway Corrections patients received treatment while in custody and 14% received community-based treatment.



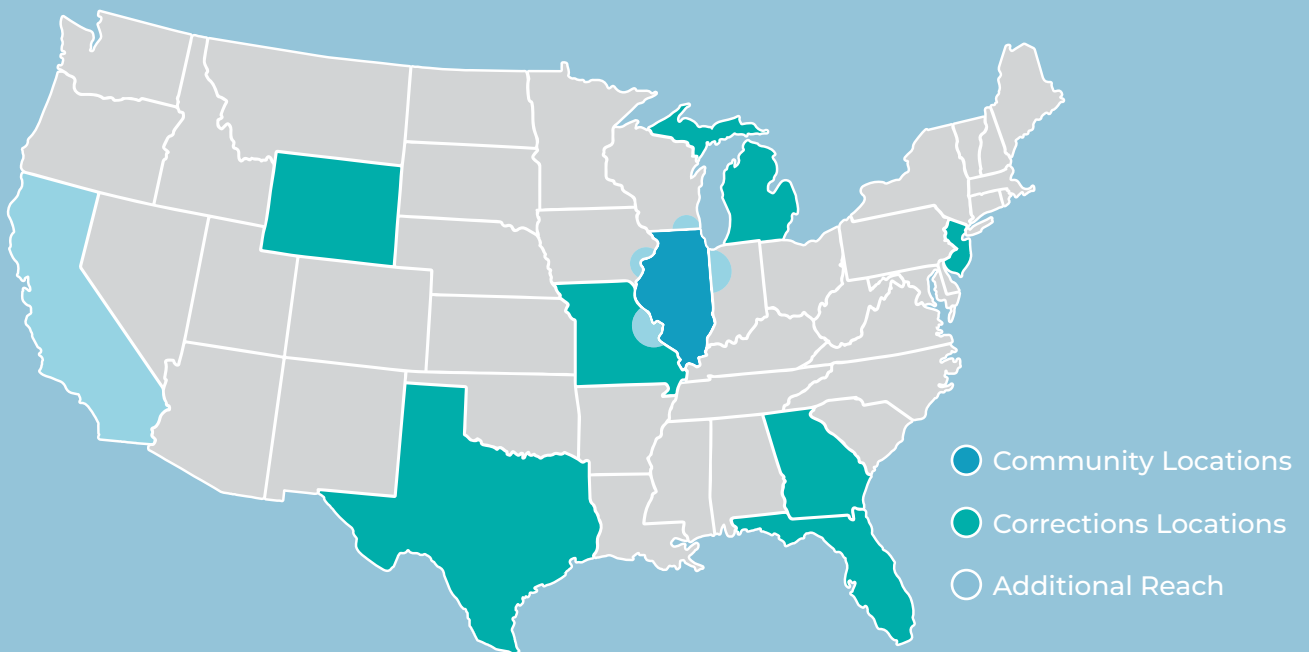

At the heart of Gateway Foundation's operations lies an often overlooked yet critical component: the Call Center. This Call Center serves as the first point of contact for many individuals seeking help, offering a lifeline to those in crisis and a beacon of hope for families and friends of those affected by substance use disorders.

At Gateway Foundation, our call center is more than just a support line; it's a cornerstone of our mission to deliver compassionate, effective treatment for substance use and mental health disorders. Operating around the clock, our call center ensures that help is always within reach, handling an average of 3,000 inquiries each week.

Thank you for choosing Gateway Foundation, how can I assist you today?

I need help and need to get into treatment. Do you have anything open for today?

I can help you with that. I'll just need to get some information from you to better understand your options...

Expertly Trained Staff: Providing Compassionate and Informed Support

What distinguishes Gateway Foundation's call center is the staff's personalized and empathetic approach with callers. The calls received are not your typical customer services inquiries but rather an opportunity to connect with an individual struggling with SUD, or their loved ones, to initiate a life-changing recovery journey.

Each call is treated with the utmost sensitivity and confidentiality and our staff recognize the critical role they play in guiding individuals through an incredibly vulnerable time. They understand the importance of establishing trust and offering each caller a personalized, empathetic experience—ensuring that everyone who reaches out feels heard, understood, and supported.

Notably, when someone with SUD calls our center, it's a crucial opportunity to guide a motivated individual towards the right treatment. That is why call center staff members are more than mere operators—they are highly-trained professionals with the expertise needed to provide accurate information and make informed decisions about the best course of action for each caller.

Our call center team is comprised of Care Advocates, Admissions Counselors and Manager. Each role plays a vital part in the support process.

Enhancing Support with Advanced Technology and Efficient Systems

Human connection is essential in facilitating treatment admissions, but technology also plays a pivotal role. In these crucial moments, any lapse in efficiency due to outdated or malfunctioning technology can easily become a barrier to treatment. The Gateway Call Center leverages advanced technology to ensure calls are managed efficiently and effectively. A sophisticated call management

system helps route calls to the most appropriate staff members, reducing wait times and ensuring that each caller receives prompt attention. The system also allows for seamless integration with Gateway Foundation's broader network of services, enabling smooth transitions from the initial call to intake and treatment.

The Call Center's Impact: Building Trust and Dignity Through Empathetic Support

The impact of Gateway Foundation's call center is profound. For many, the first call to the center marks the beginning of their journey to Recovery. The support and guidance provided by the call center staff can be life-changing, offering hope and direction at a critical time. Families and friends of those struggling with substance use disorders also find solace in the knowledgeable and compassionate assistance offered. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to our call center team for their fidelity and dedication. Their role is essential in advancing our mission to support individuals and families in overcoming substance use disorders and achieving lasting Recovery.



Being Where We're Needed: Expanding to Support Communities Facing Growing Substance Use and Mental Health Challenges

In 2023, an estimated 49 million individuals aged 12 and older experienced a substance use disorder within the past year. Among them, approximately 20 million adults also faced a co-occurring mental illness, and 12.8 million adults had serious thoughts of suicide. It's broadly understood that these realities are the consequences of an undeniable disparity in access to substance use treatment. Over 85 percent of those classified as needing SUD treatment did not receive substance use treatment in the past year.

Furthermore, those without health insurance, those who were incarcerated, or those living in poverty face an increased risk of fatal opioid overdose, highlighting significant gaps in the accessibility and equity of comprehensive, evidence-based care.

As we expand our services, we're committed to meeting the urgent needs of communities grappling with substance use and mental health challenges. This section of our FY '24 Annual Report features how we've expanded our reach and services to provide critical support to individuals in need.

Expanding Our Mission to Support a Broader Range of Mental Health Care Needs: Gateway Opens New Location in Bloomington IL

For over 55 years, we've had the privilege of helping individuals achieve Recovery from substance use disorders and rebuild their lives. But what if we could intervene earlier—before a substance use disorder (SUD) takes hold and before lives need rebuilding? We recognize that mental health and substance use are intricately linked, often forming a vicious cycle. Research indicates that while having an SUD can increase the likelihood of developing mental health disorders, conditions like ADHD, anxiety, and mood disorders can also elevate the risk of developing a substance use disorder.

At Gateway, our commitment is to provide a continuum of care that ensures high-quality services are accessible to those who need them. We've identified a crucial opportunity to enhance our services by focusing on mental health conditions that may precede the development of SUDs.

On March 22, 2024, Gateway Foundation proudly opened its newest treatment center in Bloomington, Illinois. This state-of-the-art facility marks not only an expansion of our reach but also a significant enhancement of our services. In addition to continuing our evidence-based treatment for

substance use disorders and co-occurring mental health conditions, Gateway Bloomington will be the first Gateway location to offer mental health support to individuals not identified as having a substance use disorder.

Our Bloomington location offers a team of skilled psychiatrists, counselors, nurse practitioners, and clinical support staff, all dedicated to delivering exceptional, individualized treatment for substance use disorders (SUD) and mental health conditions. Our clinicians develop personalized treatment plans tailored to each patient's unique needs, utilizing a broad range of evidence-based practices, including Cognitive-Behavioral Therapy (CBT) and Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT).

Beyond offering outpatient treatment for SUD and mental health conditions, Gateway Bloomington is also designed to enhance the overall quality of care throughout central Illinois. The facility includes designated space for a future Behavioral Health Training Center, which will be pivotal in delivering essential workforce training and continuing education for healthcare professionals across the region.





Gateway Foundation Jacksonville: A Pillar of Comprehensive, High-Quality Care for Lifelong Recovery

Shortly after its opening in 2018, Gateway Foundation Jacksonville (Gateway Jacksonville) is regionally significant to our mission to provide comprehensive, high-quality care across Illinois. This new facility was established in response to the closure of The Wells Center, a 50-year-old non-profit organization in Jacksonville that shut down in April 2017 due to the state's budget crisis and lack of funding. Gateway was approached to continue providing vital services at this location, ensuring ongoing support for the community of Morgan County and surrounding counties, including Cass, Pike, Scott, Brown, Greene, Sangamon, and Macoupin.

The Gateway Jacksonville facility is unique in its design and capacity, offering both residential and outpatient services all under one roof. It features 16 male residential beds and 30 male recovery home beds, serving clients from all Gateway locations across Illinois. As the only residential and outpatient service provider in Jacksonville and one of only three residential providers in a 90-mile radius, Gateway Jacksonville plays a crucial role in our network of care.

By offering a full spectrum of care, Gateway Jacksonville supports patients at every stage of their recovery journey, promoting the positive community reintegration needed for life-long Recovery.

As one of the staff members aptly put it, the true measure of success comes from our alumni's positive feedback and progress. "When an alumni calls us with an update of their success that they attribute to their experience at Gateway Jacksonville, our team's collective perspective is that 'THIS is the paycheck,'" said Dustin Lieb, Counselor Supervisor.

Gateway Jacksonville's success is not just about the facility itself but also about the dedicated team that operates it. Since opening, the facility has been instrumental in meeting the growing demand for high-quality SUD treatment services. Our Jacksonville team has worked diligently to maintain high occupancy rates and continuously adapts to meet the community's evolving needs.

From the facility's leadership to Recovery Coaches, Counselors, and the daily operating staff, each member brings a strong work ethic, commitment to Recovery, and a passion for helping our patients and their families. Every individual plays a pivotal role in delivering quality care and fostering a supportive environment for Recovery. We extend our heartfelt appreciation to our Gateway Jacksonville team for their unwavering dedication to providing high-quality care that is truly lifesaving.

Gateway Expands Support for Justice-Involved Individuals with Substance Use Disorders in Florida

According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, about 63% of individuals in jail and 58% in prison suffer from substance use disorders. Research indicates that those struggling with SUD are more likely to remain engaged in criminal activities. At Gateway, we believe that expanding access to reliable, evidence-based SUD treatment for those involved with the criminal justice system is crucial for reducing recidivism rates and the incarceration of nonviolent offenders. We also recognize that continued SUD treatment, whether during incarceration or under community supervision, supports a more positive reentry into the community and helps individuals rebuild healthier lives.

In Florida, we've partnered with the Florida Department of Corrections (FDC) to provide services under Gateway's Corrections division to address the state's increasing need for substance use disorders (SUD) treatment among individuals under community supervision, commonly known as probation. In May 2021, the FDC reported having over 84,000 community-supervised offenders, with approximately 61% needing substance use disorder treatment. Today, the department reports supervising over 140,000 offenders.

Through our partnership, Gateway was awarded the opportunity to provide outpatient treatment and aftercare services within the state's Judicial Circuits 1 and 2. This program will help clients successfully complete probation, avoid further legal consequences, and support their long-term Recovery.

- Individualized Treatment Plans
- Group Counseling
- Individual Counseling
- Outpatient Treatment Plan Review
- Aftercare Services

Gateway launched its Community Corrections program for Judicial Circuit 2 in July 2023, covering five counties in the Florida Panhandle. In its first year, we have served over 200 individuals.

We anticipate opening our Circuit 1 program in fiscal year '25 and plan to assist over 200 individuals in the first year.

Providing Treatment that Works

Individuals struggling with SUD and mental health disorders have already lost precious time—time spent with family, friends, or working towards personal aspirations. As partners in their Recovery, it's crucial we don't waste any more of their time. We take this responsibility seriously, employing only evidence-based treatments and practices that are proven to work. Our rigorous, research-backed approach ensures the highest standard of care, aiding individuals in reclaiming their lives, reuniting with loved ones, and reintegrating as valued members of their communities.

By prioritizing effective interventions, we strive to make every moment count in their journey toward Recovery and a healthier future. This section highlights some of our specialized treatment programs that have helped thousands of people get their lives back and allowed their communities to welcome them back.

Transforming Lives Through Empowering Recovery: Gateway Foundation's Impact on Alcohol Use Disorder

Alcohol is one of the most prevalent substances used globally, distinguished by its prominent role in socialization, spirituality, and cultural traditions. Yet, the rise of high-intensity drinking has increasingly impacted public health. From 2007 to 2017, the number of patients listed for liver transplants due to alcohol-associated liver disease (ALD) surged by 63%. Research also highlights that alcohol misuse not only significantly elevates the risk of liver disease but also heart disease, depression, stroke, and various cancers. Notably, alcohol use disorder (AUD) is the most common substance use disorder in the United States. In 2023, 10.2% of individuals aged 12 and older—approximately 28.9 million people—experienced an alcohol use disorder in the past year.

At Gateway Foundation, we're proud to make significant strides in helping individuals overcome alcohol use disorder (AUD) across all of our treatment facilities in Illinois. The following data specifically highlights the success of our AUD program at our Aurora treatment center. In FY24, our Aurora team treated 130 patients whose primary diagnosis was AUD. On average, each individual participated in the program for 25 days, benefiting from our personalized approach to Recovery.

Gateway Foundation Aurora AUD Program Highlights

- **Personalized Treatment Plans:** Our approach to treating AUD is rooted in personalized care. Everyone receives a tailored treatment plan that addresses their unique needs and circumstances. In FY24, we successfully implemented over 500 personalized treatment plans, ensuring that each patient receives the most effective care possible.
- **Innovative Therapies:** We have integrated several innovative therapies into our program, including Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT), Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT), and Motivational Interviewing. These therapies have proven highly effective in helping patients develop coping skills, manage their emotions, and stay motivated throughout their recovery journey.

- **Community Engagement:** Recognizing the importance of community support in Recovery, we have strengthened our partnerships with local organizations and community groups. Our outreach programs have reached over 1,000 individuals in the Aurora area, providing education, resources, and support to those affected by alcohol use disorder.
- **Success Stories:** The true measure of our program's success lies in our patients' stories. In FY24, 87% of our patients completed their treatment programs and are leading healthier, more fulfilling lives. One such success story is John, who, after struggling with AUD for over a decade, has now been sober for 18 months and is actively involved in our alumni support group.

Looking Ahead

As we move forward, Gateway Foundation remains committed to expanding our services and reaching even more individuals in need. Our goals for our current fiscal year include:

- **Expanding Access:** We aim to increase the accessibility of our services by opening additional outpatient clinics and offering more virtual therapy options.
- **Enhancing Support:** We plan to improve our aftercare programs to provide ongoing support to our alumni, helping them sustain their Recovery and continue their personal growth.
- **Research and Development:** We will continue to invest in research to stay at the forefront of addiction treatment, ensuring that our patients benefit from the latest advancements in the field.

Gateway Foundation's Alcohol Use Disorder program is more than just treatment; it is a beacon of hope for those struggling with alcohol use.



Expanding Access to Medication Assisted Treatment

At Gateway Foundation, we're invested in providing comprehensive treatments that are proven to be most effective in addressing substance use disorders (SUD). One such proven tool is Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT). MAT combines medication with counseling and behavioral therapies to address substance use disorders. These medications work to stabilize brain chemistry, block the euphoric effects of alcohol and opioids, alleviate cravings, and manage withdrawal symptoms, thereby helping individuals maintain their Recovery.

Research highlights the benefits of MAT, including:

- **Increased Patient Survival Rates**
- **Improved Treatment Retention and Completion**
- **Reduced Illicit Opioid Use and Associated Criminal Activity.**
- **Increase Employment Attainment and Retention**
- **Improved Birth Outcomes for Pregnant Women with SUD**

Despite these benefits, MAT remains underutilized and relatively inaccessible. Nearly all U.S. states have insufficient capacity to provide MAT to every patient who could benefit from the treatment. The 2023 National Survey on Drug Use and Health by SAMHSA reveals that only 1.9 percent of people aged 12 or older who identified as having a past-year alcohol use disorder received MAT. Similarly, only 18.0 percent of the 5.7 million people with a past-year opioid use disorder received MAT.

Gateway Foundation is proactively working to increase access to MAT through MAT-centered initiatives in our Community and Corrections divisions. We are collaborating with state departments and community organizations in Missouri and Illinois to provide MAT to more individuals.

Incorporating Medication Assisted Treatment to Help Reduce Recidivism

In partnership with the Missouri Department of Corrections and the Missouri Department of Mental Health, Gateway Foundation offers MAT to justice-involved individuals struggling with SUD. This initiative aims to support successful reintegration into the community, reduce recidivism rates, and prevent overdose deaths among those released from incarceration.

Research shows that opioid overdose is a leading cause of death among individuals who are released from prison, with a risk more than ten-fold the general population. Death rates were highest in the first two weeks after release and among those with mental health or substance use disorder treatment needs.

Our collaboration began in 2014 when Gateway was awarded a contract to implement MAT at three Missouri men's institutions through the RR-MAT program. Over the past decade, the program has expanded significantly, providing MAT across all Missouri Department of Corrections facilities and offering comprehensive post-release support and aftercare.

Key components of the expanded RR-MAT program include:

- **One-on-One MAT Education:** 60 days before release, patients are provided MAT Education and one-on-one consultation with a Re-Entry Specialist
- **Pre-Release MAT:** Patients receive their prescribed MAT medication, such as Vivitrol or Sublocade, 1-3 days prior to release.
- **Post-Release Aftercare:** Patients are scheduled in their home areas to comprehensive treatment programs for continuing care and MAT access.
- **Peer Support Specialist:** This position provides pre-release support groups, and assists patients upon release, offering support from individuals with lived experience in SUD Recovery.
- **Medicaid Application Assistance**
- **Warm Hand-Off:** We connect patients with their assigned community probation officers and Peer Support Specialists who will support them throughout their Recovery journey and community supervision period.

Between 2020 and 2021, 915 individuals received MAT through the RR-MAT program, with 80% receiving pre-release Vivitrol and 23% receiving post-release Vivitrol. Two years after their release, 37% of participants had completed aftercare, and only 12% had recidivated.

From 2023 to 2024, 470 individuals participated in the program. For FY 25, the RR-MAT program will continue expanding by offering MAT during incarceration, enhancing support for participants before and after their release. Additionally, the program will provide all FDA-approved medications for Opioid and Alcohol Use treatment, expanding our ability to tailor treatment to meet individuals' needs.

Our heartfelt thanks go to our dedicated Missouri-based team, whose unwavering commitment and impactful work in implementing and managing this program are saving lives across the state.

Streamlining Patient Admissions from Hospital to Community-Based Care in Missouri and Illinois

As opioid use continues to rise, so does the number of individuals presenting to emergency rooms with opioid-related health crises, including overdoses. While ER staff are skilled in stabilizing patients and managing acute symptoms, they often face challenges in connecting patients with specialized treatment providers who can address underlying substance use disorders (SUD) and co-occurring mental health conditions. At Gateway Foundation, we are committed to partnering with hospitals to enhance their capacity to identify patients who would benefit from SUD treatment and to facilitate a smooth, efficient transition of care for these individuals. We achieve this through two primary programs: The Warm Hand-Off Model operating in Illinois and ER Diversion programming operating in Missouri. While distinct in scope and execution, both programs share a common goal: linking patients who present to hospitals with opioid-related health crises to long-term recovery solutions.

Additionally, both programs leverage Peer Recovery Coaches or Recovery Coaches, who have personal experience with SUD, to educate patients and their families about long-term Recovery, including treatment options such as MOUD, structured sober living, and inpatient programs. Recovery Coaches are at the heart of this work and play a vital role in its success. Their lived experience enhances their ability to connect with patients, fostering engagement in treatment, harm reduction practices, and sustainable Recovery.

The Warm Hand-Off Model is part of our Community Services Division and is partially supported by the Illinois State Opioid Response Grant (SOR). The program establishes partnerships between hospital-based clinicians and Gateway Recovery Coaches who work together to apply

evidence-based approaches like SBIRT (Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment) to quickly assess hospital patients and, if needed, facilitate their seamless transfer to community-based SUD treatment programs. The model also provides crucial education to families affected by SUD and deploys life-saving tools like Naloxone for opioid overdose reversal. Currently, this program is active in over 20 hospitals and medical centers across Illinois.

In Missouri, our ER Diversion program centers around our partnership with EPICC (Engaging Patients in Coordinated Care), a community-based program that trains and deploys Peer Recovery Coaches across Missouri to link patients with SUD to appropriate treatment programs.

Gateway is an EPICC designated Substance Use Treatment Provider for the program's Eastern region. Our team's connection with patients begins when they are seen in a hospital for an opioid-related health event and referred to our care. Upon arrival at Gateway's St. Louis outpatient facility, patients undergo withdrawal management and are assessed for the appropriate American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) level of care combined with MAT. During FY 23, Gateway received 68 referrals to our community Corrections treatment program.

These initiatives demonstrate Gateway's commitment to bridging the gap between emergency care and long-term Recovery, ensuring that individuals in crisis receive the specialized support they need to reclaim their lives. We are grateful to our dedicated teams in Illinois and Missouri, whose lived experience, empathy, and expertise make a profound difference in helping people embark on their path to Recovery.

Fostering Community in Recovery

Community is essential in recovery for individuals grappling with substance use and mental health disorders, as well as for the stakeholders dedicated to supporting their journey.

Addressing the rising rates of SUD and mental health disorders, dismantling stigmas, and overcoming barriers to treatment requires a unified community effort. In this section of our annual report, we highlight two initiatives designed to foster supportive environments that extend beyond our facilities: our alumni program, which strengthens connections among individuals in recovery, and our active participation in community outreach events aimed at raising awareness about local resources and support services. These efforts are pivotal in creating a collaborative and nurturing network that supports long-term recovery and reintegration into the community.

Gateway Foundation's Alumni Program: Fostering Essential Social and Support Connections for Sustained Recovery

It's well-established that having a solid and reliable social support network is crucial for maintaining long-term recovery from substance use disorder (SUD). However, individuals with SUD often face the challenge of having fewer social supports compared to those without the disorder. Additionally, many social activities involve legal substances like alcohol, which can be triggering for those in recovery. As a result, opportunities to build and nurture supportive relationships can feel limited for those working to maintain their recovery. That is why Gateway Foundation, through our Alumni Program, has committed to fostering

social support networks for those in and graduating from our care. Our mission to promote a lively, supportive, and engaged community has flourished, with alum connections growing stronger and more extensive.

Enhanced Event Offerings and Record-Breaking Attendance

Over the past year, our alumni program has experienced significant growth. We've broadened our reach by hosting diverse events across six regions and deepened our connections with alums through targeted support

initiatives. These efforts have created a nurturing environment where alums can thrive personally and professionally.

We're thrilled to report record attendance at our alumni events this year! Across our locations, our Alumni Coordinators hosted over 70 diverse events—from bowling nights and baseball games to cookouts and community walks—welcoming more than 2,800 alumni and their loved ones. While varied in its focus and activities, each event offered invaluable opportunities for our recovery community members to enhance their social support networks, forge new friendships, and celebrate the strong community ties that unite us.

Additionally, we expanded our support group offerings to enhance our alums' well-being further. Our virtual support groups, facilitated by Certified Recovery Support Specialists under Gateway's Digital Toolkit program, continued to be a cornerstone of our support services. Hosted three to four times each week on average, these groups have become a vital resource for alumni, offering a safe space to share experiences, receive mutual support, and gain professional guidance as they navigate life's challenges in recovery.

We remain steadfast in supporting and fostering meaningful connections within our alumni community. At Gateway, we are committed to life-long recovery, viewing ourselves as a continual partner in the recovery journey of those we serve. Our alumni programming provides patients with post-treatment experiences, reinforcing their recovery and our commitment to their ongoing success and

well-being. As Shane Hassler, Director of Alumni and Recovery Support Programs and a Gateway Foundation alumnus, put it,

"I have witnessed firsthand the transformative power of our [alumni] community, he said. "Over the past year, I have seen countless individuals embrace their journey of recovery, drawing strength and inspiration from the support and resources we provide. Gateway Foundation remains a beacon of hope and resilience, offering a steadfast lifeline to those navigating the complexities of mental health and substance use disorders. Gateway Foundation Announces Grant Funding Opportunity to Preserve Legacy of Historic Beacon House

This spring, Gateway Foundation announced \$2 million in funds from the sale of the historic Beacon House, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation in Pacific Grove, California, will be used to expand access to substance use disorder treatment, mental health, and wellness services in Monterey County through grantmaking to other mission-aligned organizations and/or to reestablish services similar to Beacon House in the future.

Beacon House was one of the first treatment centers for substance use disorders in the Western United States. For decades, it was a pillar of hope and recovery for the Monterey County community. Although Beacon House ceased operations in 2021, Gateway Foundation, the former operator, created the grant program to preserve the organization's legacy and commitment to supporting health and wellness initiatives in Monterey County.

"We are pleased to announce that some funds from the sale of the Beacon House property will be used to support nonprofit organizations dedicated to promoting health and wellness from substance use disorders," said Jeremy Klemanski, President and CEO of Beacon House and Gateway Foundation. "Although Beacon House operations have ceased, our commitment to improving health remains unwavering. We believe these grants will continue to serve the Monterey community in meaningful ways."

Nonprofit organizations with missions aligned with the former Beacon House were encouraged to apply for grant funding, giving priority to initiatives focused on providing treatment for substance use disorder, co-occurring mental health, education, advocacy, and outreach to underserved populations.

"We recognize the importance of ongoing support for wellness initiatives, especially in light of current challenges," said Klemanski. "By investing in organizations with similar purposes, we aim to continue Beacon House's mission of fostering healing, resilience, and hope in our community."

Gateway has received ten grant applications from nonprofits in the Monterey County area and will announce the grant recipients later this year.





Advocating for Change

As we strive to deepen our impact and enhance equitable access to high-quality services for substance use and mental health disorders, we understand that meaningful, sustainable change extends beyond our direct efforts. True progress hinges on evolving local and federal legislation to improve access for those who need it most.

We are committed to leveraging our position as a trusted, long-standing leader in the field of substance use and mental health services to help educate policymakers about the critical needs of our communities, the challenges we face, and the essential steps required to deliver wide-reaching, effective services. Through this advocacy, we aim to champion policy changes that would improve access to treatment, strengthen the workforce in our field, and help our communities achieve lasting, transformative outcomes. Introducing Gateway's Public Policy Group

Launched in August 2023, the Gateway Public Policy Group, an external workgroup, provides leadership in developing, advocating, and promoting public policies that serve and benefit Gateway Foundation and the people we serve. The group focuses on enhancing governmental, industry, and public support for mental and behavioral health – including workforce development needs. Members work collaboratively to identify topics and concerns that impact our organization, sector, and patients – ultimately working to encourage a positive climate and greater investment in mental and behavioral health, including the Social Determinants of Health.
