



Hallam FC have turned to familiar faces by appointing Danny and Richard Patterson as joint managers as the Sandygate club looks to spark a new era.

The duo return to the Countrymen with a wealth of non-league experience, having racked up more than 2,500 games between them and collected over 20 league and cup honours during their careers.

Both are no strangers to Hallam either, having previously led from the front as captains and enjoyed success in blue and white, making their homecoming all the more significant.

Danny told *South Yorkshire Sport* the chance to come back was impossible to turn down.

“It was an absolute no-brainer when Hallam approached us about returning to the club.

“We’ve obviously been here before as captains and enjoyed success, but the people around the club were the biggest factor — the supporters, committee, volunteers and everyone involved.

“It really is a big family club,

and we love it to bits.”

The new bosses arrive with the task of rebuilding after a 12th-place finish in Northern Premier League East Division last season, despite operating in an increasingly competitive environment.

Danny is under no illusions about the size of that challenge.

“We’re under no illusions about the scale of the job.

We’re competing in a league where silly money is being thrown about, so we’ll have to do things a little differently.

“That said, we’re up for the challenge. We want to bring players into the club who want to play for the badge, the supporters and their teammates.”

A summer overhaul is already underway, with some players retained but a significant turnover expected as the pair reshape the squad.

“We’ve retained a few from last season’s squad, which was important, and we’re speaking

to a couple of others,” he added.

“But there will be a big change in personnel from last year, and that’s needed.

“We want to make sure we get the right fit for the club, especially given how far Hallam has come in such a short space of time.”

One of the club’s biggest draws remains its remarkable

credibly passionate about the club, just as we are, and we want the players to replicate that.”

The appointment follows a hugely successful spell at Retford, where Danny was the Assistant Manager and Richard was a key midfielder and coach to the U21s as they helped guide the club to the United Counties League Division One title last season.

Retford secured the championship in 2025/26, underlining the winning pedigree the pair now bring back to South Yorkshire.

“Last year was brilliant at Retford, winning the league with a record points total, but this was a challenge we couldn’t turn down,” Danny said.

“We’ve been around Step 4 for a long time, and Steps 5 and 6 as we’ve got older, and we’ve been successful.

“Now it’s about implementing the standards we expect from every player.”

Alongside him, Richard is equally focused on unity and long-term stability after a turbulent period off the pitch.

He also spoke to *South Yorkshire Sport*, outlining his vision for the club’s future.

“We’re now laying the foundations for a new era at the club, one that brings everyone back together and gets Hallam pulling in the same direction again after a turbulent few months,” he said.

“The rebuild will look different to what’s been done before, but the aims and objectives remain the same — to create a structure that can carry the club into another successful period and build on everything achieved in recent years.”

He also issued a rallying call to supporters ahead of the new campaign.

“The club has come a long way in a short space of time. This is the moment for everyone to remember that, come together and look forward with optimism.

“Get behind the lads and the club as a whole, and show exactly what Hallam is all about.”

NON LEAGUE ROUND UP

Steels Freeze Prices as Hallam Rebuild Begins

Stocksbridge Park Steels have thrown early support behind their fans by freezing season ticket prices despite last season's relegation.

Supporters will again pay £160 for adults, £100 concessions and £30 for under-16s, with the added bonus of an extra home game in the coming campaign, a move designed to maintain momentum and backing at Bracken Moor.

Across the city, a busy summer is already gathering pace — with recruitment, retention and off-field planning all taking shape.

Hallam's new era under Danny and Richard Patterson has started with two eye-catching additions from their former club, Retford.

Creative midfielder Jacob Priestnall arrives as a highly-rated local talent, having previously come through the youth system at Salford City before stepping into senior non-league football.

He is joined by versatile defender Jesse Omoregbee, a 19-year-old with a fascinating background that includes time in the academy of Italian giants Inter Milan before moving to English non-league.

Omoregbee has quickly built a reputation for his physical presence — standing at 6ft 4in — as well as his pace and ability at full-back playing for Handsworth and Swallownest before joining Retford.

Alongside the new faces, Hallam have secured important continuity.

Midfielder Alfie Smith, Jack Brownell, and Brandon Bradbury have all committed for the new season, giving the management team a core to build around.

Off the pitch, the club are also strengthening their structure, advertising for both a matchday secretary and a first-team physio-therapist as part of their ongoing development.

At Handsworth, preparations have taken on a fresh look with the launch of a new kit design ahead of the campaign.

The Ambers are also on

the lookout for a physio-therapist as they continue to build their backroom set-up for the new season.

Sheffield FC have made a major statement by tying down a number of key players — none more important than prolific striker Alex Hardwick.

The forward was the club's leading scorer last season with an impressive return of 30 goals in all competitions, underlining his importance to the side's attacking threat.

Hardwick, a powerful frontman from Rotherham, has built a well-travelled non-league career across clubs including Maltby Main, Parkgate, Stocksbridge and Ilkeston Town, and his goalscoring record has made him one of the most feared strikers at this level.

Joining him in committing to the club are Connor Cutts, Sam Greenhouse and Brad Beatson.

Cutts offers experience in midfield, having progressed through Sheffield United's

youth system before spells at Handsworth, Stocksbridge and Maltby Main, eventually settling at Sheffield where he became a regular presence.

Greenhouse, still only in his early 20s, adds youthful energy and pedigree — having been part of Rotherham United's set-up earlier in his career before moving into the non-league game.

At Dearne & District, stability has been the priority with a raft of re-signings confirmed.

Theo Wainman, Alex Wilkinson, Oliver Yates, Adam Baskerville and Owen Sykes have all agreed to stay, giving the club a settled base heading into the new season as they look to push forward.

Worsbrough Bridge Athletic have taken a different approach, mapping out a full pre-season programme to build fitness and cohesion ahead of their first ever season at Step 5.

Their schedule includes trips to Pontefract Collieries, Crowle Colts and Athersley Recreation, while also hosting Penistone Church and

local rivals Wombwell Main, who play in the County Senior League.

Armthorpe Welfare are investing in the future by re-shaping their pathway into senior football.

Graeme Nicholl and Chris Peacock will continue their work with the club's younger players by taking charge of the newly rebranded Development Team — formerly the reserves — with Tom Rich joining the management group.

The structure is aimed at creating a clearer route into the first team, strengthening the club from within.

Athersley Recreation are also stepping up preparations, announcing their pre-season fixtures while opening the door for new talent with first-team trials set for June 10.

Meanwhile, Club Thorne Colliery have confirmed their season ticket prices, with adults paying £85 and concessions £45 — another example of clubs across the region trying to keep football accessible at grassroots level.

England Call for Powney

Ashton Powney earned international recognition after playing 45 minutes for England Under-18 Schoolboys in their clash with Wales.

The South Yorkshire youngster started the game, representing his country, in the Centenary Shield fixture, stepping onto the pitch in the famous England shirt against their Welsh rivals.

The match formed part of the long-running schools' international competition, organised by the English Schools' Football Association, which sees England face Wales, Scotland, Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland each season.

Powney's involvement marks another major milestone in his development, with selection for England Schoolboys widely regarded as one of the highest honours in schools football.

The game itself was part of a double-header event staged by the ESFA, showcasing the best young talent from across both nations at under-18 level.

Powney started the match and was given a full 45-minute run-out as England looked to make an immediate impact in the game.

Facing a strong Welsh side in what is traditionally one of the



most competitive fixtures in the schools' calendar, he had to quickly adjust to the pace and intensity of international football — a significant step up from club and county level.

The England Schoolboys programme has a long history of producing players who go on to succeed in the professional game,

with the pathway involving rigorous selection through school, district and regional trials before reaching the final national squad.

For Powney, simply stepping onto the international stage is recognition of his form and potential, and adds to a growing reputation within the South Yorkshire football scene.

The experience of facing Wales — one of England's fiercest and most traditional rivals at this level — will provide valuable grounding as he continues his progress.

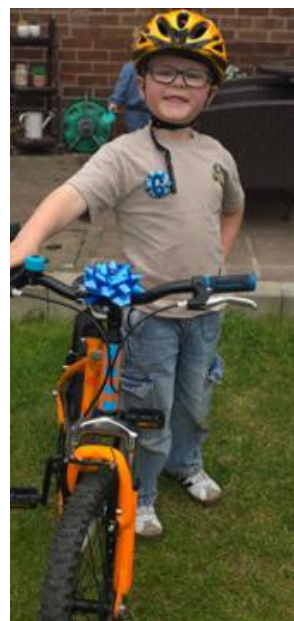
And with the Centenary Shield campaign offering further opportunities, his 45-minute outing could yet be the first step in a longer international journey.

Young Keeper's Ride for Life-Saving Cause

Asix-year-old goalkeeper from South Yorkshire is set to complete a charity bike ride after turning a personal fundraiser into a wider campaign to support life-saving equipment across local sport.

Corby, who plays for Mexborough Knights U7s, initially began raising money to buy prescription sports goggles so he could continue playing football safely.

However, after Specsavers stepped in to fund the goggles, the focus shifted to supporting Lauren's Legacy



#oneineverycorner, a Red Sky Foundation campaign aiming to in-

stall defibrillators at football grounds and sporting venues.

The fundraiser has already raised more than £4,000 through over 250 donations, with Corby due to take on a 6.25-mile ride around Rother Valley Country Park on Friday.

What started as a small family effort has grown into a wider South Yorkshire community campaign, attracting media attention and highlighting the importance of safety in grassroots sport.

The initiative links directly to football and

community provision, with the aim of making sporting environments safer for players, supporters and families through increased access to defibrillators.

Corby's story has already reached a national audience through extensive coverage, and organisers are now hoping for further backing across the region to build on that momentum.

Supporters can contribute via the campaign's online fundraising page as the youngster continues preparations for his ride.

Brave Students Bare Up for Cancer Fight

Sheffield University student Fin Goodger will likely long remember leading a group of forty or so fellow student runners on a five-kilometre dash from Goodwin Sports Centre to The Moor and back and mainly because he and most participants were wearing just their underpants.

“Our Ballsy5k event was designed to raise awareness of testicular cancer and publicise the city’s eighth Wilder fight night on 7th June while allowing students to make a further distinctive contribution to our adopted city,” explained Fin, who hails from Altrincham in Greater Manchester. “Us running around in brightly colour undies made people curious and intrigued. My student experience and that of many others has been enhanced by getting involved in Wilder Fight Night of which the underwear fun runs are part as we fundraise for The Oddballs Foundation. We aim to have fun, but the message is serious given how many



teenage boys and young men face testicular cancer.”

Fin’s major sport is football. “I’ve enjoyed

playing for the Sheffield University team this year and travelling around the north of England to play against

other university teams. I took part in the student boxing show in May 2025. “I loved the training. It was physically

gruelling and mentally taxing. I drew my bout. I can say that the idea of being hit in the face is worse than the reality.

In any case adrenalin kicks in and you just get on with it.

Wearing 16oz gloves means that it’s hard to get hurt but nonetheless everyone who takes part proves that they’re not lacking in courage, guts even. I was also delighted to raise £ 300 for The Oddballs Foundation.”

“I love Sheffield. What a great place to be a student. It’s hilly and the people friendly. Lots of greenery and generally clean and tidy. Beautiful parks and close to the Peak District. I plan to remain involved with Wilder and Oddballs. The events are student led. This year I’m promoting fight night via social media. Next year I hope to be in event management for fight nights and the awesome after show parties.”

Knight-Stokes Cup Bowls Into Schools

Cricket in South Yorkshire is getting a major boost this summer as dozens of schools sign up for the ground-breaking Barclays Knight-Stokes Cup.

The new national competition, launched for 2026, has been designed specifically to grow the game in state schools and give young players opportunities that have traditionally been harder to access.

Backed by the MCC, MCC Foundation and Barclays, the under-15 tournament is already being described as one of the most significant grassroots initiatives in English cricket for years.

Named after England captains Heather Knight and Ben Stokes—both educated in the state system—the competition aims to showcase talent from a far broader base than ever before.

Locally, there has been a strong response,

with schools from Sheffield, Rotherham, Barnsley, Doncaster and beyond entering teams. Among those taking part are King Egbert, Tapton School, Wath Academy, Hall Cross Academy and Penistone Grammar School, alongside a host of others from across the region.

In total, more than 1,000 teams from hundreds of state schools have signed up nationwide, underlining the appetite to revive and expand cricket participation.

The format will see teams compete in county-based rounds, progressing through regional stages before the very best reach a show-piece national final at Lord's in September—offering young state-school cricketers a rare chance to play at the Home of Cricket.

Organisers hope the competition will act as a catalyst for change.

Cricket has long been associated with inde-



pendent schools, but initiatives like this are attempting to level the playing field by increasing access to facilities, coaching and competitive matches.

Financial barriers have also been recognised, with participating

schools offered support and discounts on kit and equipment to make the sport more accessible. [lords.org]

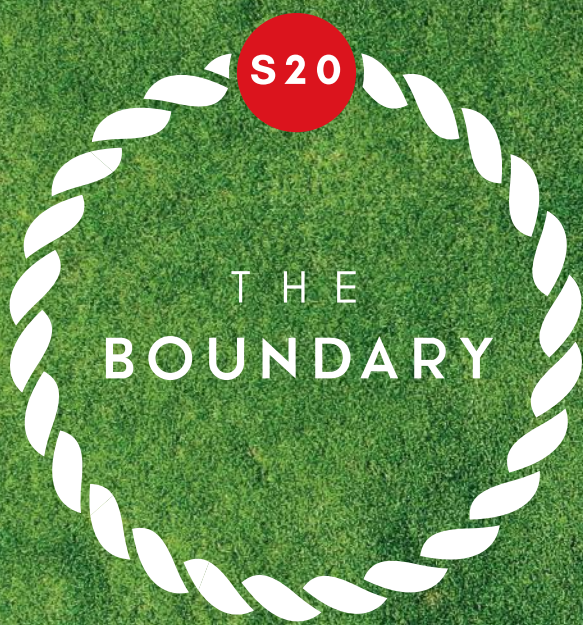
The wider ambition goes beyond simply crowning a winner. The Knight-Stokes Cup is part of a broader push

to embed cricket back into state education, inspire new players and ensure that talent is not lost due to lack of opportunity.

With such a wide spread of South Yorkshire schools involved, the competition prom-

ises not only fierce local rivalries but also a genuine pathway for young cricketers to dream big.

And for those stepping onto the field this term, the message is simple—this is just the beginning.

Rouane Fires Five as Queen Triumph

Swinton Queen lifted the Don & Dearne Cup after a 2-0 victory over neighbours Swinton Fitzwilliam at Mexborough Athletic.

The final brought together two sides with recent history, with Fitzwilliam having beaten Queen during the group stage – the only match in which Queen failed to score across the competition.

Fitzwilliam reached the final just a week after their Winstanley Cup defeat to Wath C of E, overcoming the same opponents 1-0 in the semi-finals to gain revenge and book their place.

Queen edged through their own semi-final with a 1-0 win over Central, courtesy of the prolific Connie Rouane. It was her fourth goal of an outstanding afternoon in front of goal.

The final remained tight until Rouane struck again to give Queen the lead, her fifth of the day, before captain Poppy Humphries

sealed the victory with a composed finish.

The triumph makes Swinton Queen the fifth different school to win the Don & Dearne Cup since its inception in 2022, underlining the growing competitiveness of the competition.

Thanks were also given to Kev Silverwood's ABC Landscaping for once

again backing the event.

Earlier in the day, the Karen Walker Shield – the second-tier competition – produced another memorable contest at Mexborough Athletic.

Lacewood claimed the trophy with a narrow win over Rawmarsh Rosehill in the final, capping a strong run through the tourna-

ment.

Rosehill had reached the final with a semi-final victory against Barnburgh, secured by a goal from Sophie Law, in what was Barnburgh's first year competing in Don & Dearne football.

In the other semi-final, Lacewood advanced thanks to another strike from

Leyla Noonan, who had scored in each of their opening four matches of the afternoon.

The final was settled by a long-range effort from Miya Hodgson-Love, whose speculative strike bounced over the Rosehill goalkeeper to secure a memorable win.

It marked Lace-

wood's first girls' football triumph and provided the perfect send-off for teacher Ross Edwards, who is set to take up a new role abroad.

The Shield is named after Karen Walker, whose 86 England caps remain the highest tally of any player from the Don & Dearne area.

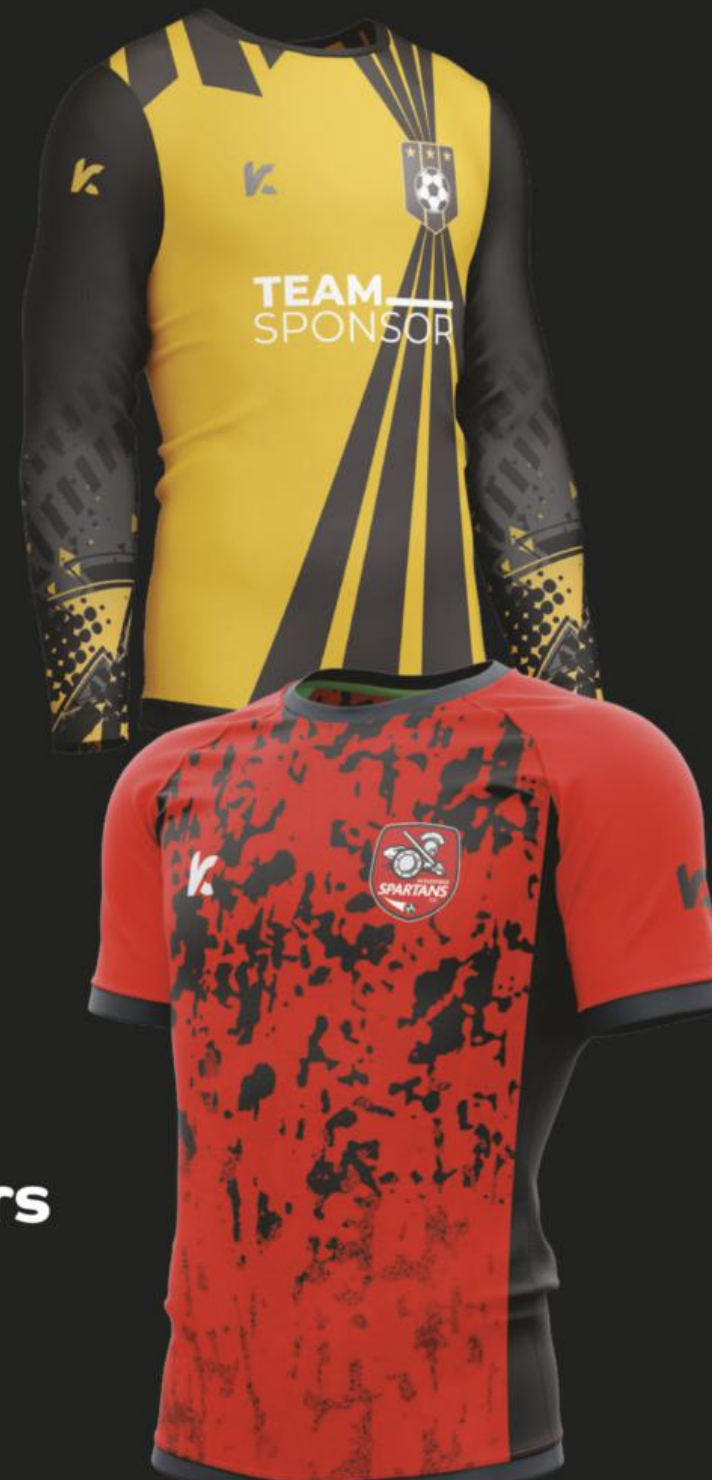

Interview with Alan Biggs

In the first in a series of interviews with local sports personalities for our summer editions, South Yorkshire Sport speaks with Sheffield based freelance journalist Alan Biggs

// I've been working around Sheffield Wednesday for some decades, and I have never known a better atmosphere and togetherness between the club and the supporters.



Four Decades Watching The Game Through Local Eyes

Our latest conversation took in the state of the local game, but it was shaped by the perspective of Alan Biggs, a journalist who has spent more than four decades chronicling football across South Yorkshire and beyond.

Born in Bromley in 1955 before moving north and growing up in Derbyshire, Alan developed his grounding in the game long before embarking on a career that would make him one of the region's most recognisable voices. Starting out at the Derbyshire Times, he progressed through Sheffield Cablevision and Radio Hallam, where he became Head of Sport, before establishing himself across the national media with regular work for BBC Radio 5 Live, Final Score, Sky Sports and talkSPORT.

Despite that national profile, his work has always remained rooted in the Steel City, covering Sheffield Wednesday, Sheffield United and the wider non-league scene for more than 30 years, as well as authoring Confessions of a Football Reporter. It is that depth of experience and long-standing connection to the area that underpins his views on the current

"Well, I think it's hugely promising. It's gone from being a nightmare to a dream scenario. An incredible transformation, isn't it?"

"I'm aware it's a honeymoon period. But all the right things are being said by David Storch and David Bruce, the new CEO. I genuinely be-



will be happy to have a club to support, given the uncertainty of surviving under the previous owner, Dejphon Chansiri. However, much of

the work off the pitch has already begun, and Alan is fully behind the operation.

"They know that the whole club needs attention. It's a huge job. And for that reason, I don't think anybody can stand there and say, 'You've got to get promoted next season or else.' I think there's an element of realism and patience.

"But as long as the club is doing the right thing, looks promising and is building, I think people will ride with that."

Another club that have had a mixed time off the field are Hallam FC. Following a successful campaign in their first-ever sea-

son at step four, there was significant upheaval as players departed the club. And a takeover attempt, which ultimately proved to be unsuccessful, left plenty worried about the long-term future of the club.

"I was concerned," Alan said. "Were they going to be the right owners? Was it going to change the ethos of the club, which, for me, is the all-important thing?"

“It’s a very friendly outfit that’s always looked to entertain and to do the right things. I was pleased when the chairman said he was going to continue, and I think they are looking for some fan buy-in.

“They must have wondered what was going on this summer with so many players leaving. And I did. I thought, ‘What’s going on here? Have they overstretched to get that far?’ Let’s give them an opportunity to reset and go again.”

Since speaking to Alan, there have been very positive wholesale changes at the club. Craig Denton has been replaced at the helm by former captains Danny and Richard Patterson, who will be joint first team managers.

There have been several high-profile arrivals since, notably the resigning of Brandon Bradbury and additions of Jacob Priestnall and Jesse Omoregbee. At such an exciting time off the field, following this buzz of activity, it’s always important to remember the scale of progress in such a short space of time.

“I watch Hallam as a supporter and not a journalist. I went out of curiosity about 10 years ago, when my kids had grown up, and I found that I’ve got a little bit more time.

“Non-league has really taken off; it’s unrecognisable. The first game I saw at Hallam, there were about 86 people there. Now it’s often 10 times or more.

“I don’t think people should forget where Hallam has come from under a committee of volunteers.”

Derbyshire, Sheffield FC harboured hopes of returning to step four after relegation the previous season. Despite a scintillating end to the campaign, which secured a spot in the play-offs, they ultimately came up short in the semi-finals against Tadcaster Albion.

Unfortunately, the world’s oldest football club are set for a completely different set of teams to face next season. They have been laterally moved into The United Counties League Premier North for the 26/27 campaign, which Alan believes will have a significant effect on the club.

“It must be a difficult thing geographically to organise for the FA. But it is a serious thing, and I hope that the club succeeds in their appeal. There’s an enormous amount of extra travelling and therefore extra cost involved in being shifted.”

However, as we have previously covered with Sheffield FC, they are a club well on the up. While the heartbreak of the play-offs will take a little time to get over, Alan believes their famous chairman will be gearing up for his first full season at the helm.

“Jon McClure isn’t taking on the chairmanship there as some kind of hobby or on a figurehead basis. He’s absolutely thrown himself into it. I went to two or three games there at the end of last season.

“He was circulating among supporters, moving around the pitch, trying to connect it all together. He is a great character. His fame will do wonders for Sheffield FC, and it’s such a prestigious organisation, so good
