CALL AND RESPONSE

Hello Hartford! What an unprecedented year 2025 has been, but we have survived, and we are still standing! This year I have watched the dedication, selflessness and commitment of our amazing staff and our Board of Trustees as we face an uncertain future. This summer and early fall we have put in place strategic planning for how to sustain our programs, planning and events over the coming year in the face of devastating cuts to grants and services from principal granting organizations such as the IMLS and the National Endowment for the Arts. These establishments provide critical funding that organizations like ours rely upon to sustain our community programs and exhibitions.

Many new federal regulations, especially regarding diversity and inclusion initiatives, have created a firestorm of activity for many of our local Hartford and Connecticut corporations which then meant a reprioritization of local funding. As we face the pressure of navigating great uncertainty we have not given up and neither have you. The support of our community has helped to sustain us this year and we thank you for your generosity and for organizations like the Hartford Foundation for Public Giving that committed to a \$6 million investment in Greater Hartford Arts and Cultural organizations.

Through our collections, exhibitions and programs the Amistad has always told the story of American resilience in the face of injustice. As an archive and gallery within a historical museum we are often reminded that art and archive are never neutral. What is created and what is saved is always a declaration of independence. The material culture that we steward here is a response to the

world around us and a call to community, an affirmation of the resilience of our ancestors.

As many of you know, our annual Juneteenth Gala fundraiser has been an important part of what we do. In 2026, in honor of America 250 and in keeping with the current local climate, we are taking the opportunity to innovate and pivot to a new event, our first ever Juneteenth Jubilee that will be free and open to the public!

Your continued donations to Juneteenth are essential and directly impact the sustainability of our organization as we face the economic uncertainty of these times. With your generous Juneteenth sponsorships and donations towards the Amistad Annual Appeal we can continue to fundraise and provide programs, events and exhibitions for our community throughout the year. We are especially touched by the gift of a model Amistad schooner from the renowned model ship builder Dan Schlossberg that appears on this issue's cover. You will have a chance to view this ship in person at our upcoming exhibition Rebel | Revolt | Resist opening May 7, 2025.

I look forward to continuing to work with our staff, volunteers, Board of Trustees, and The Wadsworth in response to the needs of our donors and our community. We are listening to you and if you call we will respond.

The Amistad Center for Art & Culture

Founded in 1987, The Amistad Center for Art & Culture is housed in the Wadsworth Atheneum Museum of Art, the oldest continuously operating public art museum in America. The Amistad Center uniquely inspires, entertains and educates diverse audiences through a robust array of art, cultural and educational experiences.

Our multidisciplinary collection of more than 7,000 works of fine art, photography, historical artifacts, memorabilia and rare books documents the African American experience from the earliest era of enslavement to contemporary creative achievements. We curate unique cultural experiences that encourage rich one-of-a-kind cross-cultural conversations. Through our efforts to honor and celebrate the history and contributions of all people of African descent in America we seek to inspire the next generation of artists, art enthusiasts and cultural visionaries.

Our *SNAP! Photography* program is an annual four-week summer artist residency program that engages a variety of teens (grades 9-12) from the Greater Hartford community in portfolio creation, the business of fine arts, undergraduate program exploration, curation in a museum setting, exhibition design as practice and a special exhibition.





SNAP! PHOTOGRAPHY is the Amistad Center's signature program, nurturing young artists in grades 9–12 and equipping them with the skills and experience to pursue their creative ambitions. SNAP! transforms student cohorts' aspirations of becoming professional artists into reality by offering paid opportunities


that affirm their artistic futures. As a community we recognize that talent is abundant—what often limits potential is access to opportunity. With the support of partners such as The Legacy Foundation of Hartford the Amistad Center provides students with immersive exploration of photography through studio practice, critiques and

seminars covering camera techniques, lighting, printing and the history of the medium. The program further enriches participants with field trips, neighborhood photo excursions, portfolio development and preparation for higher education.

SNAP! Photography Hartford Teen Artist-In-Residence Program 2025

This year's paid annual summer artist residency welcomed fourteen students into its 2025 cohort, with classes running July 7–31. Instruction was led by teacher Joel Citron, assistant teacher Royland Clarke, and Curator of the African Diaspora Bethani Blake, alongside guest professionals. The students' efforts culminated in a group exhibition at the Wadsworth Atheneum Museum of Art, and an accompanying zine on view November 15, 2025–January 11, 2026. An Artist Talk and exhibition reception for land•SCAPE will be held in the Hartford Courant Room on Saturday, November 22, 2025, from 1–2:30 PM.

Capstone and Finalization #03

Each student receives a camera to use throughout the program. The syllabus details what they should expect and their responsibilities. During this period they learn photography best practices, how to handle, hold and shoot their cameras and an introduction to photo composition, incorporating the essential elements and guiding principles of art and design.

The Second and Third Weeks #02

Students are introduced to street photography and portraiture, both historical and contemporary practices. The following weeks feature still life photography and editing in Adobe Lightroom. The works created during this period are evaluated and discussed collaboratively in the classroom.

After creating and critiquing their artwork students transition to exhibition and professional development and a zine production workshop. This directs their focus toward how their work will be received by the public, empowering them to design, in their own words and images, a small-scale professional museum exhibition and publication that highlights both creativity and critical engagement.



STEAM PROGRAMS

Amistad programs for young people inspire lifelong learning and financial, mathematical and artistic literacy.

The Amistad has been in direct contact with local area schools within the Title 1 program, which serves students in low-income households. Our STEAM programs provide educational enrichment and practical application skills for those students. Teaching a diverse demographic of K-12 students by creating community, Amistad's STEAM initiative is how we support advancement and help create a hub of creative community problem-solvers.

MATH IN THE MUSEUM

We are full STEAM ahead in demonstrating that there are multiple ways to understand and interpret the world. Through the Math in the Museum program we connect mathematical concepts with artistic expression, sparking new ways of thinking and encouraging creative problem solving. Our goal is to expand partnerships with regional public schools and families in the community, ensuring increased museum visitation and deeper learning through immersive interdisciplinary engagement.



The Amistad Center and The Wadsworth continue to strengthen our partnership by sharing resources, ideas, and opportunities to grow together. We work collaboratively to ensure our collective impact is greater than the sum of its parts. Our exhibitions often draw from the collections of both organizations. Come visit us and see The Wadsworth's Nick Cave Soundsuit on view in our current exhibition, Yoruba World and get ready for upcoming collaborations for the America250 initiative on view May 7, 2026!

Joint programs include our First Thursdays Caribbean Night Program every August, and recent collaborations include Film & Talk with RaMell Ross, Fine Art & Flowers, Festival of Trees and Traditions, Amistad! For the Culture: MLK Community Day, and family-friendly events like First Thursdays and Second Saturdays. Signature experiences such as the annual Pennington Lecture and Members' Morning Tours further showcase the richness of our partnership. 

Black Men & Boys Mental Health Initative

The I Am A Man initiative centers the mental health and well-being of Black men and boys through community, creativity and culturally grounded care. This three-part series is offered free of charge due to the generosity of a grant from The Hartford Foundation Black Giving Circle Fund and creates intentional spaces for healing, reflection and connection—inviting participants to engage in bold conversations, transformative art and restorative practices.

An evening with renowned artist and filmmaker Titus Kaphar featuring his critically acclaimed film, Exhibiting Forgiveness, and a deep discussion on its mental health focus and overcoming generational trauma. ur current exhibitions, Yoruba World and Manifest | 13 Colonies, continue to explore the variety of ways that people of African descent have created and utilized material culture to tell their personal and communal stories and to archive their histories and traditions. Both exhibitions feature collections from a diverse array of public and private institutions as well as private collections. The Amistad Center highlights loans from neighboring institutions as well as Historically Black Colleges and Universities and African American collectors to enhance the material culture we steward in our archives and to demonstrate the benefit of community collaborations. The exhibitions on view this year hold works of art and exhibitions on loan or generated from The Mead Art Museum at Amherst College, Xavier University of Louisiana and The Peabody Museum at Harvard University. A visit to our galleries will introduce visitors to the long trajectory of material culture that begins in Africa and flows throughout the Diaspora.



Celebrating the 250th anniversary of the signing of Declaration of Independence

The Amistad Center highlights 250 years of the Black American experience

On July 4, 2026, the United States will mark a monumental milestone-250 years since the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Across the nation cultural institutions, artists and historians are preparing to tell the story of America anew through exhibitions, performances and public programs that honor both triumph and truth. The AMERICA250 initiative, embraced by federal, state and municipal commissions and supported by a bipartisan Congressional Caucus, invites every community to participate in shaping this collective reflection. Here in Connecticut all 169 cities and towns are called to join in, with The Amistad Center for Art & Culture at the forefront of the Capitol Region's efforts. Through exhibitions such as Wendel A. White: Manifest | Thirteen Colonies and Rebel | Revolt | Resist, The Amistad Center shines a necessary light on how the nation's founding ideals-freedom, equality and justice—remain an unfinished promise for many. The highlight of the program will be our guest speaker, Wendel A. White, who will take center stage for a free lecture on his exhibition and its prevailing themes.

Telling inclusive stories

AMERICA250 | CT centers its work on three overarching themes: telling inclusive stories, honoring the power of place and acting for the common good. By "telling inclusive stories" the Commission honors the lived experiences of all Connecticut residents, sharing both well-known and overlooked narratives that together weave the fabric of our community. The "power of place" highlights how people across every era—before, during and after the Revolutionary period-shaped the identity and legacy of our state. And by "doing history for the common good" AMERICA250 | CT calls us to move beyond acknowledgment toward active engagement, celebrating Connecticut's role in the nation's formation while reaffirming the democratic ideals embedded in our founding documents and their relevance today.

At its heart, AMERICA250 | CT is a true community initiative drawing strength from every corner of Connecticut's cultural and creative landscape.

Museums, libraries, archives, community centers, schools and municipal offices are joining forces to ensure diverse voices are heard and new partnerships are forged. Each program builds a welcoming space for inclusivity—mindful of barriers such as cost, access and language—while celebrating the full range of Connecticut's stories.

As part of this statewide effort The Wadsworth Atheneum Museum of Art and The Amistad Center for Art & Culture will collaborate on an immersive museum-wide exhibition examining "the dream deferred." This reflective and critical project explores how far the nation has come in realizing the promises of the Declaration of Independence—and how far there is still to go in forming "a more perfect union." Echoing Frederick Douglass's question, "What, to the slave, is your Fourth of July?" the initiative reminds us that to truly appreciate freedom we must boldly exercise it.

The exhibition, Yoruba World looks at traditional sculpture and masquerade practices of the Yoruba culture of Nigeria and its influence on the formation of Yoruba Atlantic religions and the visual iconography of the arts of the African Diaspora. The exhibition features selected works from the Amistad Center's collection as well as traditional Yoruba material culture and works by contemporary Diaspora artists that reflect on the diffusion and vitality of Yoruba culture. Programming will focus on explorations of Yoruba influence and identity in the Americas with a special focus on the Brazilian, Cuban, Haitian, Puerto Rican and Jamaican descendant communities of the Greater Hartford region.

Dr. Sarah Clunis has a rich curatorial background in African and African diaspora art and culture. She is currently the Executive Director of The Amistad Center for Art & Culture at the Wadsworth Atheneum Museum of Art. Prior to this, she served as the Director of Academic Partnerships and Curator of African Collections at the Peabody Museum of Archaeology and Ethnology at Harvard University. She also held the positions of Director of Xavier University Art Gallery and Assistant Professor of Art History at Xavier University of Louisiana. Her work is characterized by a focus on the history and display of African art, the impact of African aesthetics on diaspora cultures, and the exploration of themes like gender, race and migration. She emphasizes oral histories, Indigenous knowledge, descendant communities and repatriation in her curatorial practice.



REBEL REVOLT RESIST

You see the flag is drenched with our blood. Because you see so many of our ancestors was killed because we never have accepted slavery.

n a world where cultural memory is contested and truth itself faces erasure, Rebel | Revolt | Resist stands as a powerful declaration of Black agency across centuries. Opening at The Amistad Center for Art & Culture, this exhibition traces a lineage of uprisings, acts of refusal, movements for justice and everyday forms of resilience that have shaped the Americas—from the Caribbean to New England, and right here in Connecticut.

Drawing on historical archives, artistic expression and contemporary voices the exhibition illuminates how Black people have mobilized against the forces of enslavement, racial terror, political suppression and cultural silencing. These acts were not isolated moments; they formed a continuum of resistance—strategic, spiritual, intellectual, communal—that pushed forward the possibilities of freedom long before abolition and long after emancipation.

Among the exhibition's most powerful works is Sonya Clark's *Unraveling*, a participatory performance and sculptural installation that invites visitors to physically unravel a Confederate battle flag. In Clark's hands, this deeply fraught symbol becomes a site of communal labor—an act of shared unmaking. Each pulled thread represents both a gesture of defiance and a meditation on the work required to dismantle systems born of enslavement and perpetuated through generations. Clark transforms fiber into witness; action into dialogue; and the slow, deliberate act of unraveling into a metaphor for the collective will required to confront racism in all its forms. By including Unraveling within *Rebel* | *Revolt* | *Resist* the exhibition underscores that resistance is not only historic but ongoing, material and participatory.

Rebel | Revolt | Resist invites visitors to witness lesser-known rebellions, community defenses and uprisings often omitted from mainstream narratives. Through photographs, documents, material culture and multimedia installations the exhibition offers a deeper accounting of how liberation is pursued in both bold strokes and quiet acts of courage.

This exhibition arrives at a pivotal moment as the nation approaches AMERICA250. It calls us to consider how our present struggles echo the past—and how our ancestors' insistence on dignity equips us to confront today's political climate with clarity and conviction. It also amplifies The Amistad Center's commitment to presenting histories that are truthful, nuanced, and rooted in community.

Visitors are invited not only to learn but to reflect: What do we owe to the rebels, the resisters, the revolutionaries? And what is our responsibility now?

With *Rebel* | *Revolt* | *Resist* The Amistad Center affirms that the story of Black resistance is not simply history—it is an ongoing charge to act, imagine, and insist on a freer, more equitable future.






WENDEL A. WHITE | MANIFEST: THIRTEEN COLONIES

This striking exhibition reveals the often-overlooked history of Black presence and impact in the original colonies and Washington, D.C. White's photographs draw objects from archival obscurity into vivid, almost theatrical light: stark compositions set against deep blackness where material culture emerges with clarity and tension. Each image reframes its subject, compelling viewers to confront the weight of history and the lives embodied in these objects—lives that profoundly shaped the world yet too often remain unacknowledged.

Serving as the juror for the 2025 *Nor'Easter: Annual Juried Members Exhibition* at the New Britain Museum of American Art was both an honor and a privilege for Rodneyna Hart, Deputy Director of The Amistad Center. This prominent showcase in the Northeast celebrates the exceptional work of emerging and established artists across all media, offering audiences a vibrant snapshot of contemporary visual art today. The exhibition's selected works reflect not only technical mastery but also the spirit of creativity that defines our region.

This year's winners embody that diversity and excellence: First Prize—Francis Estrada, whose artwork *One Last Dance for Fermin Tobera* beautifully encapsulates an ethereal memorial of the 1930 Anti-Filipino Riot in California; Second Prize—Rosalind Shaffer; Third Prize—Len Swec; and Juror's Choice—Andres Montiel, whose painting *Family Tree* vividly portrays a family whose members are each formed with unique detail and importance. AN EVENING WITH HARMONIA ROSALES


