LAUNCH EVENT

Hundreds Gather to Witness Launch of Cathedral's Centenary

The famous West Doors of the Cathedral were shut in anticipation as guests gathered on the Feast of Epiphany to mark the start of the Cathedral's centenary year.

As the doors slowly opened, The Revd. Canon Andrew Horsfall, Interim Dean of Blackburn, was welcomed by two young choristers who helped to bring light into the building symbolising faith, unity and new beginnings.

Welcome prayers were said and the Cathedral gradually came alive with light and music as guests celebrated the start of a new chapter with great joy, warmth and anticipation for the year ahead.

The walls echoed to the sound of a brass fanfare, the choristers lit a centenary candle, which will stay alight throughout the year. Guests watched as details of a year of celebratory events - including worship, exhibitions, art installations and community involvement - were unveiled on a giant screen.

Ian White, Blackburn Cathedral's Chief Operating Officer, provided an overview of the ways to become involved and how our many communities can come together to celebrate the Cathedral's rich cultural heritage and support its importance to the region.

The finale was a memorable performance of the Hallelujah Chorus from Handel's Messiah which was performed by a combination of choirs, including Blackburn Cathedral's Youth Choir, Blackburn Chamber Choir and members of The Blackburn Music Society. They were accompanied by Director of Music, John Robinson, on the Cathedral's iconic organ and Prince Bishop's Brass.

Speaking at the event, Canon Horsfall said: "Since becoming a cathedral in 1926, this building has stood as a beacon of faith and fellowship at the heart of our community in Blackburn and has cherished its standing within the local and wider community throughout all this time.



This centenary year offers a unique opportunity to honour our heritage while looking forward with renewed purpose to what lies ahead and I am so grateful to all those who joined us on what is a very special evening."

Amongst the guests were the Mayor of Blackburn with Darwen, Councillor Jacqueline Slater, Council Leader Phil Riley, and Chief Executive Denise Park who said: "This is Lancashire's cathedral but we're really proud that it's in our borough, and at the heart of Blackburn. It is a great asset, they've got a fantastic programme of events planned throughout the year and I look forward to coming to see many of the exhibitions and things that they have on offer."

Fundraising Regulator Update

We are pleased to announce that the Cathedral has successfully registered with the Fundraising Regulator for England.



With increased fundraising efforts planned during the centenary year, and the appointment of two new fundraisers (see p10), we can now provide extra reassurance to donors. We have committed to fundraising in line with the UK's charitable fundraising standards.

Church of England Lent Theme

The theme for the Church of England's Lent season is **Draw Near**: Life-giving habits for Lent. At the heart of the theme is 'Rhythm of Life' - habits and patterns which help to grow as disciples of Christ day by day, especially as we prepare to celebrate the great mystery of God's saving love at Easter.



Reflections are centred around a summary of the Christian Way from Common Worship, which identifies six activities essential to our calling as disciples. Each week a different contributor will explore an aspect of Christian discipleship: worshipping together, praying, exploring the Bible, sharing communion, offering service and sharing the good news with others. Running alongside will be a 40-day challenge for families and children, who are invited to explore the life-giving habit of generosity in partnership with 40acts. Celebrating The Journey

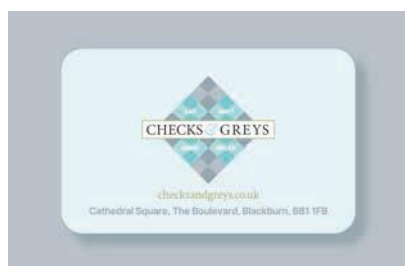
It is 21 years since the powerful series of paintings known as The Journey was commissioned by Blackburn Cathedral.

SAFEGUARDING

In Conversation with Lesley Hurst, Cathedral Safeguarding Adviser

Bringing a wealth of safeguarding experience, her recent appointment has significantly increased our capacity to listen and respond as we continue our improvement journey.



You're new to the Cathedral team, what drew you to the role?

I've worked in statutory safeguarding and education for 25 years and I discovered there were ways I could transfer my knowledge and experience from that sector into the Cathedral. As a Christian, I also believe my personal mission is to use my professional skills to help others feel safe. This opportunity felt like an ideal combination.

Why is safeguarding such a vital part of Cathedral life?

Safeguarding is a crucial part of Cathedral life and that's mainly because we're open to all. As part of our broader mission, we encourage everyone to come through our doors and for a wide variety of reasons.

We see people from every walk of life and as a result, we may have young people or adults who are at risk. It's imperative that our approach and our procedures are in place to protect them as well as our staff, volunteers and other visitors. Everybody should always feel safe and welcomed into our spaces.

Can you explain the role of a Cathedral Safeguarding Adviser?

I have a responsibility to ensure there is safe practise in terms of how the organisation operates on a day-to-day basis and this is covered by things like policies and procedures. Equally importantly, my role is to be a central, visible and available person that anyone can bring safeguarding concerns to. It is important to ensure that anyone interacting with the Cathedral feels safe, knows how to report a concern and that it will be always be taken seriously.

What does good safeguarding look like day to day?

I strongly believe that safeguarding is about relationships rather

than form-filling, so speaking and listening to as many people as possible about any concerns that may exist is an important part of my work. It's not just immediate concerns though. For example, I am also looking at safer recruitment processes to make sure we are recruiting and training staff and volunteers in the right way and doing so safely.

Are there any misconceptions about safeguarding?

Oh absolutely! I think the most common misconception revolves around the fact that many people think it's just about abuse against children. In fact, my work involves wider contextual issues such as what's going on outside the Cathedral not just inside it.

It impacts all of our users whether that's people who are here to work, worship, visit, volunteer or attend events. Plus it covers a multitude of areas - actually, we have far more issues revolving around adults at risk than we do around children, so it's about helping people understand exactly how safeguarding fits into their life within the Cathedral and how to keep us all safe because we firmly believe that safeguarding is everybody's responsibility.

How can you encourage people to speak up if something doesn't feel right?

I would really hope that by continuing to build relationships with everyone involved with the Cathedral, that people will feel able to speak up if something doesn't feel right.

I want to stress that you don't need to have evidence you just need to feel that something doesn't seem right. Come and have a conversation, drop your concerns in an email or fill in a concern form - it's really, really important because sometimes those small pieces of information

that you might think "*I don't really know*" or "*I'm probably wrong*" it could be the last piece of the jigsaw that we're waiting for. It could be that somebody is desperate for support and by us noticing and engaging with them, we can put support and help around them. I think it's really important to stress that if you feel something just isn't quite right, you share your concerns, because you will be heard.

Finally, what will success in the role look like to you?

Success to me would be that after the impact of the INEQE report, we get to a place where we know that our processes and procedures are where they need to be and people are empowered to speak up when they think things aren't right.

We want people to feel safe to communicate openly with each other. It is important that everybody feels safe to come and raise concerns - to know who to go to and when to raise them, and having no fear around doing so, knowing that they will be dealt with efficiently and effectively. Our place now within a wider network of organisations - which includes local authorities, agencies, charities and the voluntary sector - greatly strengthens the Cathedral's safeguarding provision.

But success in safeguarding is never found at a single point or moment in time. It is a continuous journey that we must take together. It isn't a job I can do in isolation - and only by everybody working together will we get to where we need to be.

I am grateful for the ongoing discussions we have with our congregations and these meetings are a valuable part of our journey. It is important to share and discuss our progress and whilst there is much more to do of course, this is matched by a deep desire to bring about further change."

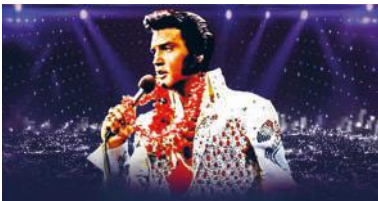

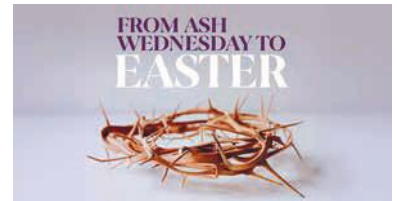
