Connection at the Heart of Community Health

Staying socially connected plays an important role in keeping both our minds and bodies healthy, and it's something Hesse Rural Health continues to support across our local communities.

Friendships and social interaction don't just make life more enjoyable – they can also reduce loneliness, lower stress and even improve physical health. Feeling part of a community brings a sense of belonging and purpose, which is especially important for people who may be at risk of social isolation.

Hesse's Social Support Program continues to provide valuable opportunities for older adults and community members to stay connected.

The program runs across Winchelsea, Beeac, Inverleigh, Bannockburn and Rokewood, with participants embracing the chance to meet new people and enjoy time together.

A range of in-house activities are offered, giving participants the chance to enjoy entertainment, build friendships and share freshly prepared, home-style meals in a relaxed and welcoming setting. The program also includes regular outings to local attractions, parks, cafés and events – offering enjoyable ways for people to stay active and engaged with the wider community.

Group exercise has also become an unexpected social highlight. While many join for the physical benefits, the shared

experience often builds strong connections and a sense of camaraderie. In July 2025 a new walking group launched in Teesdale, joining existing groups in Bannockburn, Winchelsea, Beeac and Rokewood. Run in partnership with the Heart Foundation, the Teesdale group meets at Don Wallace Reserve, where walkers can enjoy the natural surrounds – including kangaroos and native plant life – while improving their health and wellbeing.

Social connection is also at the heart of the Winchelsea Community Foodbank. Beyond providing access to food, the foodbank has become a welcoming space for people to gather, often arriving early to share a cup of tea or coffee and a chat. Volunteers, too, say they gain a strong sense of purpose from helping others.

The relationships formed through the foodbank – and strengthened through the food literacy program – are extending beyond the service itself, with participants supporting one another and becoming more involved in community life.

Through programs like these, Hesse Rural Health continues to help reduce social isolation while building a more connected, supportive and resilient community.

A Refreshed Walk To Work Day Puts Mental Health In Focus Save The Date: Friday 27 March 2026

The Pedestrian Council of Australia has today announced a new look Walk to Work Day campaign, turning the spotlight on the irrefutable benefits of walking regularly for better mental health.

Now taking place at the start of the year, Walk to Work Day supporting Black Dog Institute will bring a refreshed focus to the national initiative, with the Pedestrian Council of Australia CEO Harold Scruby saying the partnership was a natural fit and an exciting evolution for the campaign.

"We are thrilled to partner with Black Dog Institute. Given the benefits a simple walk can have on mental health issues like anxiety, depression and stress – we hope this simple reminder will go a long way in getting Australia's working population to walk more, not just on Walk to Work Day, but every day," he said.

The latest research from Black Dog Institute highlights the scale of the challenge facing Australian workplaces, with mental illness estimated to cost businesses more than \$39 billion each year through lost productivity, absenteeism and staff turnover. Around one in five Australians experience a mental illness each year, yet almost half will not seek professional help.

Black Dog Institute Fundraising Director, Laura Edwards, said that regular physical activity has been shown to play a powerful role in supporting mental health.

"Engaging in exercise has been shown to significantly reduce symptoms of depression, including major depressive disorder, with studies finding that walking for an hour a day can reduce the risk of major depression by up to 26 per cent. This is because exercise promotes positive changes in the brain, including neural growth, reduced inflammation and new activity patterns that support calm, focus and overall wellbeing," Laura said.

For people looking to improve their mental health, walking can be a simple, accessible and low-cost way to support mental wellbeing as part of everyday life.

Walk to Work Day supporting Black Dog Institute encourages working Australians to get involved in two ways: by getting started straight away and building simple walking habits in the lead-up to the event, walking more often, forming teams and fundraising between now and Walk to Work Day to support better mental health outcomes, and/or by taking part on the day itself on Friday 27 March, through group walks, walking meetings or encouraging staff to walk to and from work, with the option to fundraise on the day. Hymns: Greater Than The Sum Of Their Parts [Part One]

What's going on with hymns? Why do people enjoy singing them so much?

At the beginning of the covid pandemic, I was Director of Music for the parish of St John of Jerusalem, South Hackney, in London. When lockdown was looking like a possibility, the parish assured me that they would continue to pay me, no matter what. This was a truly Christian gesture of kindness and caring at a time of great uncertainty and came just before I lost all of my other income overnight when we did eventually go into lockdown. Being the sort of person that I am, I didn't immediately perceive this to be an opportunity to binge-watch Netflix whilst knitting and doing yoga but felt that I wanted to do something to earn my keep. 'What should that be?' I wondered. Having assessed my skill-set and available resources I pondered what I could contribute to the parish's collective spiritual and emotional well-being in this time of crisis, and the answer came, 'hymn singing'.

My job has always involved playing lots of hymns lots of times but the pandemic gave me an opportunity to stop and think a bit more deeply about what I was doing. The first thing I did for the parish

was to set up a Zoom hymn-singing group. All the churches were closed and collective worship in person had stopped but I knew that singing the familiar hymns of Lent – and later, Easter – would bring people a degree of comfort and normality. I was sure that the correct approach would be for me to play the hymns for everyone while they turned off their mics and sang at home. That was my first mistake. People didn't just want to sing hymns, they wanted to do it together. I took this on board and although I felt it had a pretty detrimental effect on the quality of my product, it was a sacrifice well worth making, as the result was a dynamic and joyful connectedness within the group.

My next mistake was to assume that this activity was all about hymns or music or worship or something, whereas it quickly became apparent to me that it was really about being together and doing together; so a bit of chit-chat, as we were outside the normal structure of liturgy, naturally became part of the session. Inevitably, some of what we talked about was hymns, sharing likes and dislikes and discussing why, what, where, when and who.

My next innovation, therefore, was to invite a participant to prepare a short presentation on one of the hymns chosen for the session. This might be about the text or the music, the poet, composer, translator or librettist, the context or history of the hymn, or a more personal reflection. I found this absolutely fascinating; it broadened my knowledge and appreciation of hymns more than I could ever have imagined and showed me how much they meant to others too.

Rain At Last!

What delight to have a nice down pour of rain for the garden last Wednesday.

Everything looked happy; veggies, garden plants, fruit & garden trees, even the leaves, blades of grass and the soil. All nicely refreshed and clean after having the past few months of heat which dried & burnt their leaves and the fine gravel road dust that covers everything was removed with the last of the rain drops dripping from the leaves. They are now ready for another burst of growth and fruit bearing. And we're ready to pick their offerings to enjoy eating them and preserve any excess.

Our tomatoes seemed to struggle from seeds sprouting in punnets then to seedlings in tubes. But, once in the ground, with the warming spring, the gentle early summer sun and sufficient rain, they burst forth, spreading their roots and growing in height without the confines of punnet or tube.

Then, the intense heat and lack of rainfall over summer burnt them & sadly set them back. They stoically have produced some tomatoes, still green, & we may not get a bumper crop, but we can now hopefully be picking those luscious red ones soon.

It wasn't to be "T" tomato month for us in January but we are looking forward to "T" tomato month in February. I can't wait to try Alice's tomato recipes. We've had a few cucumbers and I loved adding the cumin in Alice's raita recipe. I've made tzatziki but it doesn't have the cumin.

The zucchinis were quick to produce and we've managed to pick them small and have marvelled at ourselves for not allowing any monsters to grow this season! But, without the tomatoes we haven't been able to enjoy a zucchini, garlic & tomato cook up, fingers crossed we'll be there soon.

We water our gardens by hand held hose and watering cans for potplants, the delicate seedlings and freshly planted seeds.

We're on tank water for home and garden. We need to be diligent so we don't run out of water. This often happened when our kids were teenagers, the garden suffered then!

During any drought years we would use the washing machine's rinse water and keep a bucket in the shower to collect water for the garden.

Now, with only the two of us, it's a lot easier. We still need to be careful, thus we find hand watering best.

Paul is the master waterer.

The veggies are watered every second day. Individually they get about 10 to 20 seconds worth of hose water.

The fruit trees, once a week. Like Peter in his article last week, Paul will leave the hose dribbling a "generous for us" amount of water at the base of the trunk. Taking his time each tree will get it's ration. They are all well mulched with straw and manure on top so this watering will also give them some nourishment as well as hydration during the hot, dry rainless months.

The Everbearer raspberries are receiving this weekly watering too. The Everbearer are an autumn fruiting raspberry. Some say they aren't as delicious as they're spring fruiting relative but I don't agree and I love being able to be eating fresh raspberries in the autumn.

The garden plants are mostly natives. We are in the habit of buying and planting any new ones in the autumn, we feel there will be enough warmth and rainfall to start them off and have them established & settled by the summer. Then only the new autumn plants that may still be struggling will get a weekly water, the others, an occasional water only if needed.

We try to maintain all our garden areas to a size we can water manage them. It's a strict but loving watering regime for a garden that we get such enjoyment from.

history of winchelsea

Winchelsea Shire Hall

The Winchelsea Shire Hall is probably the most iconic building in Winchelsea's Heritage Streetscape.

The Winchelsea and District Roads Board was formed on 9 November 1860 and was the first form of local government for the Shire. The original building was completed in 1867. Winchelsea was the administrative centre of the Shire of Winchelsea, which was proclaimed in 1864, and which continued until 9 March 1994 when it was amalgamated with the Shire of Barrabool to become the Surf Coast Shire. The Winchelsea Shire Council met in the Bottom pub from its foundation on 27 May, 1864 until the construction of the original purpose-built Shire Hall in 1867. Names of Early councillors such as Austin, Mathieson, Anderson, Hopkins, Stirling, Plant, Prime, and Clark will be familiar to many locals, and many have descendants still living in the town.

The first Shire Hall was built in 1866 to a design by Henry Robert Bastow, member of the Plymouth Brethren and later Head of the architectural branch of the Victorian Education Department. It was demolished in 1907 when the existing Shire Hall was constructed to a design by Seeley and King of Geelong. Thomas Seeley was a member of the Independent Order of Rechabites and it may have been through friendly society associations that Bastow in 1866 and Seeley in 1907 were awarded their commissions to design these buildings. Both architects were not known for their civic architecture.

The Shire Hall hosted local civic and community events and celebrations. These included Council meetings, visits by Governors and dignitaries, exhibitions and weddings. One example of these was an event in the shire hall on Friday 18 September 1885, where about forty of the residents of the township held a farewell to Miss Davis, the popular post and telegraph mistress, who had been promoted to the charge of similar offices at Rushworth. A concert was held in the Shire Hall with a programme of dances and supper. Speeches and gifts were presented by Mr. William Stirling, J-P. The pianoforte accompaniments to the vocalists and the spirited dance music during the evening, were performed by Mr W. D. Goodall, of Geelong. Miss Davis was presented with an album of photographs of those who took part in the gathering. Over the years tenders for civic works such as road and bridge works were advertised through local newspapers and applications were delivered in person to the shire hall by prospective tradespeople.

The existing imposing Federation Free style bluestone Shire Hall building at 28 Hesse Street, which we enjoy in the main street of town was rebuilt 1907. The palm, elm and ash trees on the site and the bluestone war memorial planter at the front also contribute to the significance of the place.

On 6 May 1919, part of the shire was annexed to the then new Shire of Otway, and on 31 May 1927, parts were annexed to



the Shire of Barrabool. On 1 April 1989, Winchelsea annexed parts of the Shire of Barrabool, and was re subdivided into three ridings. On 9 March 1994, the Shire of Winchelsea was abolished, and along with parts of the City of South Barwon and the Shire of Barrabool, was merged into the newly created Surf Coast Shire. During the Shire of Winchelsea years, the Shire Hall was used for court cases and meetings of local government. At its zenith, the Shire of Winchelsea included Armytage, Bambra, Barwon Downs, Benwerrin, Birregurra, Boonah, Buckley, Deans Marsh, Fairholme, Lorne, Murroon, Ombersley, Pennyroyal, Ricketts Marsh, Ripplevale, Wensleydale, Whoorel, Winchelsea, Wurdiboluc and Yan Yan Gurt.

Refurbished in 2022, to its beautiful glory, Winchelsea Shire Hall is a community space for meetings, parties, events and more. Today it is an important community hub and a precious public asset to the Winchelsea community.

More Than Polar Bears and Penguins: Why Polar Warming Is Everyone's Problem

Christmas Day in Iceland set a new temperature record of 19.8°C, extraordinarily warm for winter and a marker of how far "normal" has drifted.. When reflective ice gives way to dark ocean, the water absorbs more solar energy, reinforcing warming and delaying refreezing.

Earth's poles are becoming less reliable as buffers and climate regulators. That matters for at least three reasons.

First, sea-level rise. Melting of glaciers and the Greenland Ice Sheet is a major contributor to global sea-level rise. For Australia, this translates into higher and more frequent coastal flooding, faster erosion, saltwater intrusion into wetlands and aquifers, and rising insurance and infrastructure costs for coastal communities.

Second, climate volatility. Here in Australia, a hotter, wetter global atmosphere increases the odds of sharper swings between extremes - more intense downpours and flooding in some periods, harsher heatwaves and fires in others. Disaster planning, agriculture, and water management are already becoming markedly harder.

Third, ecological and economic impacts. Practically, it means accelerating losses of ecosystem services that Aussies rely on - more coral bleaching on the Great Barrier Reef, collapsing fisheries, crop failures under heat stress, and higher costs for health systems and at the supermarket.

The implications reach well beyond the polar regions - into coastlines, food systems, infrastructure, and the basic assumption that winter will behave like winter.

Point of no return: a hellish 'hothouse Earth' getting closer, scientists say

The world is closer than thought to a "point of no return" after which runaway global heating cannot be stopped, scientists have said.

At just 1.3C of global heating in recent years, extreme weather is already taking lives and destroying livelihoods across the globe. At 3-4C, "the economy and society will cease to function as we know it", scientists said last week, but a hothouse Earth would be even more fiery.

It was difficult to predict when climate tipping points would be triggered, making precaution vital, said Dr Christopher Wolf, a scientist at Terrestrial Ecosystems Research Associates in the US. "It's likely that global temperatures are [already] as warm as, or warmer than, at any point in the last 125,000 years and that climate change is advancing faster than many scientists predicted."

Climate crisis linked to fall in southern right whale birth rates as researchers raise 'warning signal'

After decades of recovery, southern right whales are showing signs of a climate-driven decline in breeding rates.

Instead of giving birth to a calf every three years, southern right whales have shifted to four-year or five-year cycles, says Dr Claire Charlton, a marine biologist.

Charlton, who leads the right whale program in the Great Australian Bight, says southern right whales are "magnificent animals" – "just the sheer size of them, and the fact that they live for 150 years"

"They feed in Antarctic and sub-Antarctic waters during our summer time and then migrate up to our coasts during winter," she said. "The whales come every year to breed, mate, rest and socialise."

The researchers said similar trends had been observed in southern right whale populations across South America and South Africa, with other krill-dependent predators also facing pressure from marine heatwaves and declining sea ice.

This was a "warning signal" about how climate change was affecting marine life, Charlton said

Southern rights were like "tractors of the ocean", said Dr Peter Corkeron, a marine ecologist and adjunct senior research fellow at Griffith University. To feed, the whales would seek out dense patches of zooplankton and "go back and forth like they're mowing the lawn".

The change in calving intervals was a sign that conditions in the Antarctic and sub-Antarctic were not as good as they once were, he said.

"Anthropogenic climate disruption affects everything ... It's just another message, if people choose to pay attention to it, that we've got to do something about this."

News Update January 2026

Household water use is at its highest in summer, rising by up to 25% compared to winter.

This puts extra demand on our water storages, which have been impacted by a record-breaking dry period in the Barwon catchment, with Geelong storages ending 2025 at a 16-year low.

The six reservoirs that make up Geelong's system had a combined capacity of just 47.2% at the end of December. This is the lowest level at this time of year since 2009, when Geelong was in the grip of the Millenium Drought and battling severe water restrictions.

The long-running dry period has impacted catchments on both the Moorabool and Barwon rivers, and we've seen the lowest rainfall over a two-year period this century recorded at 3 key catchment areas – Bostock, West Barwon and Wurdee Boluc – across 2024 and 2025.

Our Geelong storages are currently at 41%.

A range of other water-saving programs and smart initiatives, including an uplift in the use of recycled water, are easing demand for drinking water supplies.

You can read more in our Annual Water Outlook which details how storages in our different water supply systems are tracking and how they handle various climate conditions.

Everyone has a role to play in saving water. Using water wisely in and around our homes plays an important role in helping conserve water supplies.

Small water-saving actions all add up. Simple things like shorter showers, turning off taps while brushing teeth, and watering the garden in the cool of the day, can help save water.

Permanent Water Saving Rules are in place across Victoria, to help us use water wisely outdoors. They include:

- only running sprinklers and watering systems between 6pm and 10am
- any hand-held hoses must be

leak-free and fitted with a trigger nozzle

- cleaning hard surfaces, such as driveways and decks, with a broom instead of a hose
- fountains and water features must recirculate water.

Please note, these rules are not applicable during an emergency such as the protection of people or property during a bushfire.

We also have a range of rebates and grants available for residential and business customers to help save water, including the new WaterSmart Home and Garden Rebate for residential customers.

From our 4-minute shower songs playlist through to grants, rebates, tips and guides, there are many ways you can save water and help secure your community's supplies.

Schools Ready For New Anaphylaxis Treatments For Students

The Victorian Government announced two new anaphylaxis treatment options will soon be available, including Australia's first needle-free adrenaline nasal spray, giving families and schools more choice when managing severe allergic reactions.

Anaphylaxis is a severe, rapid and potentially life-threatening allergic reaction that requires immediate emergency treatment with adrenaline and can be triggered by insect stings and foods such as nuts, dairy and seafood.

Currently, two injection-based adrenaline treatment options, EpiPen and Anapen, are available in Victoria.

From 2026, two additional treatment options will be introduced - the Neffy adrenaline nasal spray device and the Jext adrenaline autoinjector, expanding the range of life-saving treatments available to families and schools.

Families wanting to learn more about the new anaphylaxis treatment options, including when they'll be available, should speak to their GP or visit the Allergy and Anaphylaxis Australia website.


