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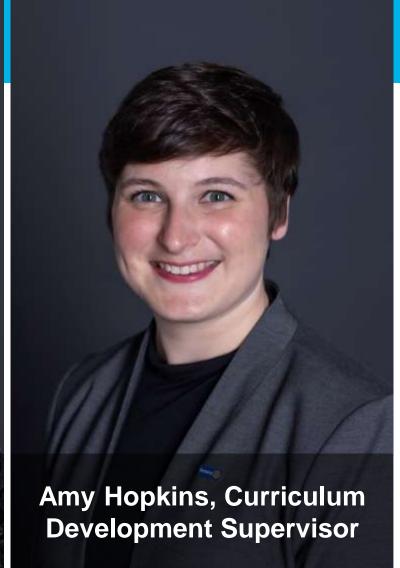

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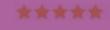

Training is the giving of information and knowledge. We can train others in doing specific tasks or train them in skills through demonstration, explanation, or other methods.

Training is done to the participant.

TRAINING vs. LEARNING



Learning is absorbing information in order to increase skills and abilities. Examples of ways people learn include reading about a topic, discussing ideas, or practicing a skill.

Learning is what a participant does.

TRAINING vs. LEARNING



Blended learning combines online and in-person study.

It can include courses in Rotary's Learning Center, in-person learning events, videos, analyzing data, job aids, and virtual meetings.

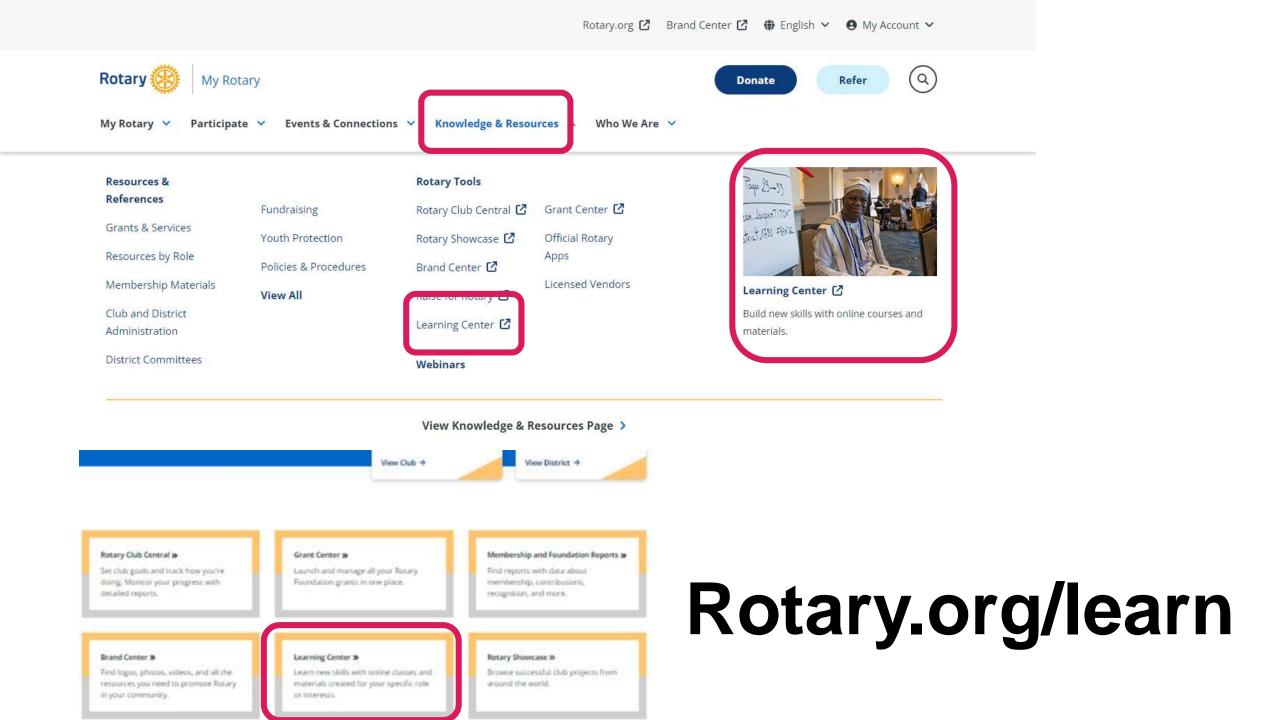

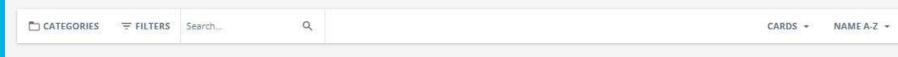

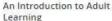

KEY POINTS

During the session

- Welcome participants and introduce yourself.
- Review the learning objectives.
- Highlight these key messages:
 - o Identify your club's strengths and weaknesses to determine what goals to set for the year and how you'll meet them.
 - Align your club's short- and long-term goals with Rotary's Action Plan.
 - Focus on the aspects of the Action Plan that are most relevant and meaningful to your club.
 - Review your district's goals and the Rotary or Rotaract Citation and think about how they fit into your goal planning.
 - Work with your club leadership team and assistant governor to set goals and find resources to help achieve them.
 - Review the status of your goals with members at club assemblies.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Use these discussion questions to get the conversation going:
 - Has anyone reviewed Rotary Club Central or used the Club Health Check? If so, what did you learn about your club? What are your club's strengths and weaknesses?
 - What types of activities is your club already doing to support the Action Plan?
 - How can the Action Plan be used to strengthen your club and make it more welcoming?
 - How can you get every member to support your club's goals?

ACTIVITIES

Activities

Choose one activity:

- 1. Align a goal or area of your club with Rotary's Action Plan
 - Allow 30 minutes for this activity.
 - Give participants the Your Action Plan worksheet.
 - Refer participants to the <u>Action Plan</u> flyer and the <u>What Clubs Can</u> <u>Do</u> flyer.
 - Ask participants to identify or reflect on their club's strengths and weaknesses.
 - Ask participants to complete the worksheet.
 - Divide participants into groups.
 - Ask each group to discuss the worksheet questions and their responses. Encourage them to note new ideas they hear from others.
 - If time allows, ask groups to discuss other goals.
 - Ask each group to summarize their discussion with the larger group.
- 2. Discuss Rotary's Action Plan
 - Allow 15 minutes for this activity.
 - Divide participants into groups and assign each group one of the Action Plan priorities.
 - Have them discuss goals or activities their clubs already have that relate to that priority:
 - What goals or activities does your club currently have that relate to this priority? How does your club support it?
 - What else could your club do to support this priority?
 - What steps will you take to support this priority?
 - How will you measure the success of your goal or activity?
 - o Ask each group to summarize their discussion for the larger group.

Before the discussion

- Prepare materials you may want to use for the discussion like flip chart paper, or markers for brainstorming.
- · Assign a person to take notes during the discussion.

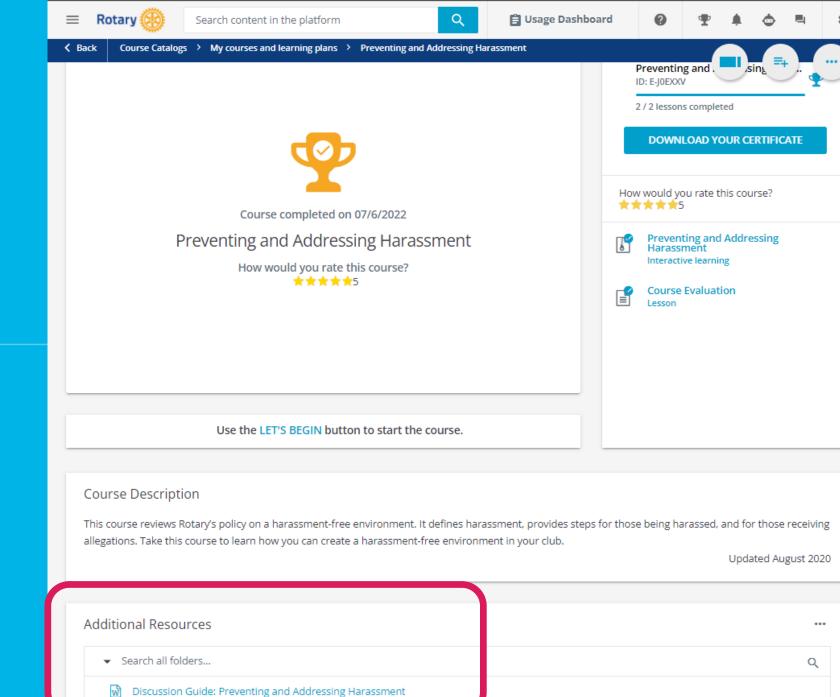
Suggested Discussion Questions

- Ask the group to determine rules or guidelines for the discussion at the beginning of the session. For example, some common guidelines are to listen without interrupting, listen to understand, avoid blame, commit to learning, and allow everyone a chance to speak.
- What does a harassment-free environment mean?
- How is our club actively working towards a harassment-free environment?
- What steps should we take to prevent harassment in our club?
- What happens if an allegation is reported (e.g., is there a review process, does the club have a review committee, etc.)?
- What can each of us do to prevent harassment in our club?
- What next steps should our club take and who would like to take the lead?

After the discussion

- Determine as a club what you want to do next.
- Identify a small group to work on implementing the ideas discussed, include specific timelines, and assign tasks to members.
- Develop a process and appoint a committee to address allegations.
- Ask all members to commit to follow the <u>Code of Conduct</u>.
