

At Noah's Ark, it is very rare that we tell a child or family that they can't do something – we always try and find a way. But a few weeks ago, we did have to tell one child that they couldn't do something....

We had to tell Jaida and her Specialist Carer, Alice, that they couldn't listen to Rihanna *quite* as loudly as they were listening to her in the sensory room.

Not everyone loves listening to Rihanna as much as Jaida – which is A LOT. Jaida is three and a half and has been looked after by Noah's Ark since she was less than a year old. As well as listening to music, her favourite things are wearing bright trainers (which have made her famous at The Ark!), being read to, and relaxing in the sensory room.

Recently, Jaida started enjoying being cuddled more – something Alice noticed and reported back to mum.

"It's so special that Alice really takes the time to know and see Jaida, as outside of Noah's Ark, Jaida can often go unnoticed.

"People sometimes don't know how to act around a child who has a disability. They aren't trying to be mean, but because of this Jaida can fade into the background."

At Noah's Ark, Jaida is far from fading into the background – like all the children we support, she is treated like an individual with the team taking the time and care to get to know her properly.



As soon as we enter The Ark Jaida is treated like the most important person. When she stays overnight they decorate her room exactly as she likes it. Everyone does all they can to make her feel special, which as a mum is so lovely to see.

The team do all they can to ensure that the

entire family, not just Jaida, get the star treatment.

Faye's partner Kam and his daughter have been gifted tickets to Tottenham Hotspurs, and both Grandmothers have attended pamper days at The Ark with Faye.

Although they know that
Jaida has a rare genetic
condition, she does not have



an official diagnosis. Earlier in their journey, Faye and Kam used to pursue a diagnosis, but now they have decided to pour all their energy into something else...

"Everything we do now is about enriching Jaida's life, bringing as much happiness as possible. Without Noah's Ark, this would be so much harder and there would be far fewer magical moments. I feel so lucky to have them in our lives."




A Spurs surprise on football day out!

Before the death of their little boy, George, Elmira and Rupert had never heard of a bereavement suite. When George died in 2021, he was brought to The Ark to stay in our butterfly room, where Rupert and Elmira were able to say goodbye in calm and peaceful surroundings.

You don't want someone to solve your problem, because it's unsolvable, but you want someone to be there.

"We knew that we needed help. We didn't know what it would look like, or what it would feel like, but we just knew that we needed someone's help. Being left alone was scary."

Family Link Team Manager, Alex, has been supporting Rupert and Elmira on their journey ever since.



Rupert describes Alex as a voice in the fog at that time. "The fog of palliative care, child loss and the trauma of everything means that you're unable to see clearly or be present. Alex was able to guide us on everything, from emotional to practical things."

Elmira recalls a poignant moment with Alex when she said to her: "I've got to plan my child's funeral when I've never even been to one."

As well as supporting and advising on more practical matters like making funeral arrangements,
Alex also views her role as a nurturing one: "I'm trying to do the thinking so they can do the feeling. It was really important to check in on them both – I'm here, I'm present, I'm thinking of you."

Often, others' discomfort around death and loss leads



to feelings of isolation for many grieving families. Noah's Ark allowed space to remember George and make new memories, even after he had died.

"There's this problem that your friends and family think you want to be left alone, and you might even think you want to be left alone, but actually you're so lonely at that moment."

One of the ways Rupert and
Elmira choose to remember
George is by visiting his butterfly memorial
tribute, placed in our Butterfly
Woodland Walk. "It was very
important to have George's
butterfly. It's like mapping him.

It's yet another place that has his presence, and there's so few places that

he had a presence." George now also has a little sister, Sasha. Rupert and Elmira like to visit his butterfly with her, as they promise to keep building those memories for her too, as a family.

"Now Sasha has touched that butterfly and we have photos of that butterfly through the seasons, it creates that narrative and that connection."

Grief never ends, but changes and evolves overtime. It is our privilege to be there for families like Rupert and Elmira's, creating a space for them to continue their relationship with their child who died, whilst supporting them as they continue to make new memories together.

The Ark is a place of laughter and light for the babies, children, young people and families we support.


Baking with Rocco and Mickey








Days at The Ark are always full of surprises... and this one involved some special guests.

families we now care for. Whilst we



Alongside 25 NHS hospital partners, Spread a Smile provides support to two children's hospices, one of which is Noah's Ark Children's Hospice.

Spread a Smile has been supporting Noah's Ark Children's Hospice and their families since 2019, initially through weekly virtual sessions during Covid-19 and now supporting in-person. We were lucky enough to welcome Spread a Smile's Fairy Kirsten,

Changing how people think and talk about children's palliative care

Children's palliative care is life-long, supportive care for children with lifelimiting or life-threatening conditions.

It's all about helping children enjoy life as children, rather than as patients; as families, not just as carers. As medical advancements mean that children with complex needs are able to live for longer, the need for life enhancing palliative care is growing on a global level.

Despite being such an essential pillar to modern healthcare, palliative care is not very well understood by both the general public and healthcare professionals alike. We know that this adds to a

family's sense of isolation and prevents children and families from accessing our services.

Heard, a charity that works with people and the media to inspire content and communication that

changes hearts and minds, is working tirelessly to overcome these barriers in communication. Their programme on Children's Palliative Care has been invaluable as we continue to develop our communications, and we were delighted to partner with them in delivering a talk on how to talk about children's palliative care at our first ever 'Charity Partner's Brunch' in April this year.

Meet the Team



From our Medical Directors and Chief Executive to play specialists, nurses and volunteers, everyone at Noah's Ark is here to help the children and families we support enjoy life together, no matter the challenges they face.



Rebecca Taylor, **Transition Coordinator**

Rebecca Taylor, our Transition Coordinator, has always been passionate about empowering young people. Having seen how poor the transition from child to adult services can be for those with additional needs, Rebecca is dedicated to making the experience for young people at Noah's Ark as fulfilling as it can be.

Rebecca said: "It isn't like young people suddenly change overnight on their 18th birthday, but the system is almost designed like they do. Using my previous experience in hospices and hospitals, my role is designed to improve the experiences of the teenagers we support - starting from when they turn 14, right up until they transition to adult services.

A large part of this involves looking at how we can work with them to develop their life skills - skills that will enable them to have as much independence as possible. For some, this may mean learning how to book appointments themselves, for others it may be learning how to take public transport on

















their own, making a cup of tea or cooking

We also need to look at the culture at Noah's Ark and see how we can better adapt our services to be inclusive for the young people we support. For example, I am working closely with the Family Activities

Allowing children to be children... also means allowing teenagers to be teenagers...

Team to further adapt our activity groups for young people and working with the wider team on how we can adapt the physical space itself.

We also need to be equipped in supporting teenagers through the issues that are typical for their stage of life – including thoughts around gender and sexuality.

I am still in the early stages of my time at Noah's Ark so a lot of my time currently is spent learning – both from the team at Noah's Ark but also at other hospices. I am working with adult providers, such as North London Hospice, to improve communication and collaboration which will improve the experience for young people as they transition to adult services.

The most important source of learning is, of course, from the young people we support themselves – they are best placed to tell us how we can best support them! Allowing children to be children, rather than patients, also means allowing teenagers to be teenagers and I'm very excited to be a part of this journey at Noah's Ark."

Gill, volunteer at Noah's Ark

After taking early medical retirement Gill found herself missing working with children and young people with disabilities.

With some time to give, a Google search led her to Noah's Ark Children's Hospice. Volunteering with Noah's Ark gave her both the flexibility and life balance she desired, as well as the ability to give something back. Gill volunteers across the charity including as a vital part of the Family Link Team. In 2022 she was matched with a family who she now visits weekly to provide Home Support.

What's the best thing about being a Home Support volunteer?

The feeling you get when Xander, who is supported by Noah's Ark, gives you a big belly laugh because he is so incredibly happy at a song you are singing or a toy you are playing with together – it makes your day. If we could bottle that feeling and sell it, we'd be millionaires!

Xander is also non-verbal and it takes time to learn how he communicates. When

you get it right and you're there together, sharing that moment, it is extremely special. That feeling of connection is really important.

What are some of the benefits of volunteering at Noah's Ark?

It is the thing I look forward to most each week. No matter how I feel on the journey to my visit, I always feel happy on the way home. I was motivated to volunteer to help others, so I was surprised at how much I would also benefit from it – it is really good fun and so enjoyable, a real bonus.

What impact does volunteering have on you?

Daily life can be stressful. Volunteering gives you the opportunity to go and do something totally different, for someone else. It gives you a chance to switch off, have a lovely time and be helpful. It is brilliant for your mental health and good for the soul.

What would you say to someone thinking about volunteering?

Go for it! You will find Noah's Ark will listen carefully to what you enjoy and are good at. They then will match you carefully with a family that works for you. They won't make you feel out of your depth and have a great support system, meaning they are always there to help.



Bringing Makaton to Noah's Ark

Many of the children supported by Noah's Ark are not able to communicate effectively through speech alone, leading to feelings of isolation and frustration.

In order to create an environment where all children, regardless of their condition, can thrive and connect, we need to foster other communication methods that are inclusive to those we support. All children deserve the opportunity to express their wants, needs and feelings independently – in short, all children deserve to be heard.

What is Makaton?

Makaton is the UK's leading language programme for adults and children with learning or communication difficulties.

Today, more than 100,000 children and adults, including many of the children we support, use Makaton, either as their main way of communicating or alongside speech. The programme combines signs, symbols and speech to give different options for people to communicate.

How can Makaton help?

By giving them an inclusive and accessible way to express themselves, Makaton can transform the lives of people with communication difficulties. The ability of expression and to be understood is key in child empowerment and alleviating the frustration that is often felt as a consequence of not being heard. By removing this

frustration, it opens a child up to all kinds of possibilities for children to connect with other people and the world around them. At Noah's Ark, we want to create an environment where every child feels heard – and Makaton enables us to do just that!

Bringing Makaton to Noah's Ark

Staff were eager to sign up to Makaton Level 1 and 2 courses when the hospice launched its training initiative. Care and also non-care staff took up the training, reflective of the shared responsibility felt by everyone at Noah's Ark to create an inclusive environment for those we support, regardless of the role we have at The Ark. By the end of the training sessions, staff had learnt over 250 signs and symbols!
