
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

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

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HEADMASTER'S COMMENT

Bryanston High prides itself on being a dynamic institution where there is constant re-assessment of methods, programmes and facility needs. Since the early Eighties the premise that has governed our thinking has been that technology and its accompanying extension of knowledge needs to be recognized and catered for in our educational approach. Pupils need to be put in touch with what their careers and society will require of them. The 'pupil active' learning programme, the computer-competence lessons and this year's introduction of computer-aided education through the Sergo mathematics course represent, in sum, significant steps forward into the future.



The combination of staff initiative and parent support is the foundation of an extremely successful academic venture that produces adaptable young adults capable of meeting the challenges of a changing society. And change, the clarion call of South Africa, is a constant factor in all facets of life today. Are we as a community equipped to cope with change? The answer is, I believe, a clear 'yes'. Model B, a significant step towards social change, was accepted with realism and equanimity. Multi-cultural education is part of our daily routine, accepted with calm pragmatism and a sense of justice done. Model C, with little option on our behalf, was thrust upon us. Realistically there is no alternative if we wish to maintain our cherished standards of education. Resigned to the inevitable, the community has shouldered the financial burden of ensuring a sound education for their children. Just as inevitable is the fact that the process of change in our country is far from complete. Adaptability and progressive thinking must continue to be our credo if we are to ensure that we remain in the forefront of education. At the same time the fundamentals of our present ethos and success as an educational institution must be retained as far as circumstances permit.

Change is a mercurial creature; at one time a source of exciting new vistas and experiences, at another time the cause of uncertainty and discontent. At present we live in volatile times, yet if we do not anticipate a bright, if different, new era, despondency must dominate our lives. In the interests of our children, dependant as they are upon us for a perspective on life, I suggest that we must foster within them a belief that calm, security and opportunity lie somewhere ahead. In the meantime, their focus must be on acquiring the knowledge and life skills that are, by their nature, inalienable possessions, secure within our children's minds.

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GOVERNING BODY REPORT

The past year has seen the implementation of considerable change at a national level of schooling structures in South Africa. By far the greater number of schools in the country have felt compelled to adopt the Model C option. This has led to principally three things. First, the erstwhile Management Council has been replaced by a Governing Body tasked with wide ranging responsibilities and some authority. Second, parents have been compelled to pay a great deal more for their children's education and, without the tax benefits of contributing fees to a trust fund, can now be taken to Court for failing to meet their financial commitments to the school. Thirdly, there is an uneasy feeling that even Model C, with its increased financial burden to parents, is only a temporary phase in a multi-stage plan to place the total financial obligations for secondary education squarely in the hands of parents whose children benefit from the service.

At this stage Government is still paying the teachers and making a basic contribution to running costs. We should not be surprised, if in time to come, teachers' salaries also become the responsibility of parents. For 1991 the Governing Body managed to keep school fees at R1 950 per annum for a first child. It is expected that in 1992 this figure will increase to R2 400. By October of this year 303 (45,7%) families had paid in full, 313 (47,2%) had made part payments and 47 (7,1%) had contributed nothing at all. Although a limited number of bursaries will be available to assist in cases of genuine need, far stricter measures for the early collection of fees will have to be instituted early in 1993.

It is hoped to maintain the pupil complement at a level between 850 and 900 since a minimum critical mass is essential to render viable the prescribed levels of school fees. In 1991 the school had 523 families with 1 child at school, 127 families with 2 children and 13 families with 3 or more children, giving a total of 663 families.

At the end of this year four senior and long serving members of staff will accept the retirement package offered by the Education Department in respect of the new dispensation. Consequently, it is with great sadness and an enormous debt of gratitude that the School bids farewell to Jenny Saayman, Ron Chiappini, Horst Heinzen and Blanche Quail. Moira Price, who has served as secretary for twelve years, will also be retiring. Our gratitude and good wishes accompany her to the coast. During the year, Pat Waite took over the position of Estate Manager from Rolf van der Merwe and the School is privileged to have its assets in such diligent, caring hands.

Mr Paige completed post-graduate studies at Randse Afrikaanse Universiteit and accepted a bursary to do further research in education on the Continent and in the UK. The school is proud to have at its helm someone so well qualified, who still has the energy to upgrade further his skills for inspired custodianship of our children's education. The Governing Body wishes to record its gratitude to the senior staff and more particularly to Brian Algie and Shane Cuthbertson for their management of the School during Mr Paige's absence.

In conclusion, I wish to record my gratitude to the parents, the Staff, the Parents' Association and my colleagues on the Governing Body for their confidence and support during the year past. A great deal has been achieved and even more remains to be done. We look foward to the challenges of 1993 and trust that, with the correct levels of funding, we will be able, not only to maintain, but build on the excellent standards of education the school has been able to offer its pupils.

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PARENTS' ASSOCIATION REPORT

This has been a watershed year for the Parents' Association, with the need arising to reassess the role of the P.A. in the life and times of Bryanston High School.

In the past, the P.A. was always responsible for generating funds and then allocating the funds to the necessary requirements of the school. Fund-raising formed a vital part of the P.A. function. With the formation of the Trust Fund in 1984, the fund-raising function was removed, and the P.A. simply disbursed funds as and when they were needed. They were the keepers of the purse. This now all falls under the School Fund, and is controlled by the school itself.

Ever increasing running costs, inflation and poor economic circumstances shifted the emphasis once again to the need for extra income. Part of these funds can be levied in the form of school fees, but the call for the P.A. to raise funds came at an Annual General Meeting some two years ago. The parents granted the P.A. a mandate to proceed with fund-raising projects to generate funds.

However, such a step would have limited success if there were no response or commitment from the entire parent body. Hence, for the past while, the P.A. has been trying to generate goodwill amongst the parents and attempting to get them back to the school by means of various "social" functions. These have taken the form of Golf Days, musical entertainers, sporting activities and various others. In the process, some money was raised but the emphasis was on parent involvement. Hopefully the future projects will not only involve parents, but will also raise a lot of money.

During the course of 1992, Bryanston High firstly became a "Model B" school, and then on the 1st August its status changed to that of "Model C".

The latter change has far-reaching consequences for most aspects of school life. The most important change pertaining to the P.A. is that it will now fall directly under the auspices of the newly elected Governing Body. However, its autonamy ought not to be jeopardised. Its specific functions will be clearly outlined and hopefully it will be an efficient, involved body of parents, working concertedly for the betterment of Bryanston High School.

As the year gallops to a close and the Matrics feverishly prepare for their finals, may I wish them every success, not only in the exams, but in their chosen careers as well. I feel especially nostalgic about the departure of these Matrics since my own daughter will be embarking on the exciting journey of life beyond school.

I would like to thank my P.A. Committee members for the fervour and enthusiasm with which they tackled all projects this year. My gratitude to the staff for their unending support and friendliness and a special word of thanks to Mr Paige for his friendship and guidance during my term of office.

May the holidays be restful and safe. May Christmas be a blessed, joyful family time. And may the New Year be a time of peace and prosperity for you all.



IN MEMORIUM

When the site of Bryanston High School was hectares of veld, a young Zulu man from Bulwer, in Natal, arrived as a member of the construction team that began laying the foundations of the buildings. Two years later the work was complete. Lucas Dumas bade farewell to his fellow builders and joined the original staff of the school when it opened in 1968.

Lucas continued to build and develop. As Induna of the groundstaff he led, by sweat and example, the work in establishing the fields. Many of the trees and shrubs that grow tall today were planted by him. He supervised the cleaning of classrooms while attending to his own allotment. When the caretaker was on leave he stepped in with quiet efficiency to oversee the fields and buildings. At the close of day his was the lonely figure moving along the passageways checking that all was secure.

In his time off, Lucas could be found in quiet conversation with his co-workers in their favourite corner by the Nicol Highway bridge. Their respect for this natural leader of men was always apparent. He was a fair taskmaster whose abiding concern was the welfare of his men. When the need arose he negotiated on their behalf with the sagacity of a sensible man and the dignity of a proud race. He selected replacements when the need arose and inevitably, his judgement was sound. In 1991 his son, Prince, joined the staff, a proud moment for the induna.

On Sunday, 4 October 1992, Lucas Dumas passed away in his sleep, a few months short of 25 years of exemplary service to the school he loved. It is his legacy that he will be mourned deeply by those who had the privilege of knowing him well. He will also be remembered as a familiar and respected figure by the thousands who passed through his school.

Personally, I feel that a special person has left my sphere. I have the profoundest respect for Lucas Dumas whom I regard as a truly noble man, one of proud bearing, compassion and personal worth. I will miss our conversations about life, his dry sense of humour, his sense of belonging and his wise counsel. Lucas Dumas was a simple man in his needs and background, but he was profound in his values, a man of integrity of a depth not often encountered. Bryanston High has lost one of its traditions.

A champion of the underdog, she is their voice in the school, arousing a social awareness that has brought forth an annual flow of food, warmth and financial support for the needy. Animals are

a focal interest in her life as well as her pupils. Sometimes these interests overlap as is evidenced by her affectionate labelling of her liveliest class as 'The Zoo'.

Ron attended Pretoria Girls High. She brings to her Mathematics lessons a patience and sense of humour that provides her pupils with a feeling of security and warm concern as they struggle with the cold logic of abstractions. Her love for life and fun is uplifting for others. The annual July Handicap draw is her domain. An avid reader, she also finds the bush an abiding interest. Conversation with her is a stimulating encounter with a lively, well informed mind, invariably including a chuckle or two.



I owe a great debt of gratitude to Jenny and Ron. Since they joined me as Heads of Department in the early days of my headship, they have given unstintingly of their talent, experience and support, both to me and Bryanston High. Their counsel has assisted me and others on the executive to grow in wisdom. Their positive influence has manifested itself in

people, values and procedures. All I can offer them in return, on behalf of all, past and present, is a profoundly felt 'thank you'.

Along with singing around the campfire, crossing mine-fields and transporting cannibals across the dam, we were kept quite busy for the remainder of the





The boys excelled by winning the Rugby section of the competition and placing second in the Cricket, the House Captain, Craig Swanepoel, playing a leading role in both.



My thanks to all staff who assisted, particularly Mrs Deacon who provides such an example to the house.





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
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For a number of years the blue CitiGolfs bearing the names of participating schools on their doors, have been seen on roads throughout the country. Bryanston High joined this most worthwhile programme in 1988. The programme comprises a series of lessons for Standard Nine pupils, based on a handbook, compiled by the Cape Town traffic police. This relates to almost every facet of road use, from theory, for example, the influence of gravity or friction on the vehicle, to more practical aspects such as how to negotiate a busy intersection. During this part of the programme regular tests are administered by the Sandton Traffic Department, and successful participants are rewarded with a certificate.

Once in possession of a valid learner's licence, the pupil can tackle the practical part of the course, usually early in the matric year. First of all,

mastery of the car's basic controls, namely clutch, brakes and steering, is taught on the school premises; mainly the netball fields. Once the pupil has gained confidence and expertise at the wheel, we venture onto the roads to teach the defensive tactics required for the "real world". On occasion this can be nerve-racking - for teacher and pupil!

The K53 system, which forms the basis for all driver testing in South Africa, assessed the driver's awareness of potentially dangerous situations and the use of defensive driving tactics. Although coaching for the licencing test is not the primary aim, the SDEP follows this method so that pupils will be equipped for it even without further driver training

Bryanston High runs an internal competition, comprising a pre-trip interior and exterior check, a yard test and a road test, to select the school's three most promising drivers, who receive further intensive training with a view to taking part in the regional inter-school SDEP s.D.E.P. 

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
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EXPRESSION


