### Youth must be heard and understood!

Youth Communication is a youth-led media organization that was founded in Chicago in 1976 by Sister Ann Heinze to facilitate positive teen self expression and emotional development through journalism and the publishing of a teen newspaper titled *New Expression*. Today our services are expanding to include Arts Integration programs and an annual teen-run Arts Festival. Youth Communication in Chicago, YCC, shares teen perspectives and accomplishments with their community to foster understanding, empathy and celebration!

### YOUTH COMMUNICATION CHICAGO

A Non-Profit Organization www.YouthCommunicationChicago.org

Youth Communication provides Chicago Public Schools administration, and their students, with multimedia vehicles to voice their ideas and discover their talents. Arts exhibitions and performances culminate in an annual Youth Communication Arts Festival.

Youth Communication Chicago (YCC,) helps teens develop their full potential through teen journalism, and arts integration programs that inspire them to succeed in school, work, and community. YCC's programs are grounded in the belief that reading, writing, and the arts stimulate the imagination and contribute to emotional healing, self-actualization, and constructive and compassionate communities.

### THE YOUTH EMPOWERING PROGRAMS:

**CORE WRITING PROGRAM:** Professional journalists and editors work with teens to produce true stories about the most important issues in their lives. In those stories, the writers show how they used social and emotional competencies to manage challenges to achieve their goals.

**PUBLISHING PROGRAM:** YCC publishes teen stories in New Expression, a print and online magazine. This program motivates teens to read and write, encourages good values, and shows how to make positive life changes. Teachers and other staff use YCC materials to encourage challenged teens while helping them improve their academic, social, and emotional skills.

ARTS INTEGRATION PROGRAM: Elements of the teens' stories are explored through artistic disciplines including visual arts, music, dance, theater, architecture, photography, fashion, and film-making, in small class sizes and one-on-one mentorship programs. Teens learn to engage their senses and wire their brains for successful learning while enhancing their emotional well-being, motor, and social skills.

ARTS FESTIVAL PROGRAM: Teens produce an Annual Youth Communication Arts Festival to share their achievements with family, friends, and the community. Through the experience of dignified co-creation, teens inspire other teens to explore personal issues with creative tools, focusing on empowered self-expression. The festival fosters inclusive communities that affirm identity, cross-cultural understanding, and peace while awakening a passion and appreciation for academics, the arts, and lifelong learning.

THE DONOR PROGRAM: Coordinates fundraising events to raise money to print and distribute the youth's "New Expression" magazine, and ultimately will raise funds to build a new Chicago Performing Arts facility, that'll also be headquarters for Youth Communication Chicago organization. The facility will provide space for operations, a state-of-the-art performing arts theater/event space for performances, fundraisers, educational programs, and the Arts Festival program.

**UPDATE**: Programs were suspended during the mandated lockdown from March 2020–May 2023, due to the COVID-19 health emergency / global pandemic. Reference: https://www.illinois.gov/news/press-release.25998.html.

Youth Communication Chicago's previous business location was at Columbia College. Since the pandemic, the organization has been without office space, and like most people, had no choice but to work from home.

Recognizing the profound impact that Youth Communication makes in teen lives, and the important role it plays in Chicago's cultural landscape, we've included finding immediate office space in our mission, where we can organize fundraising events, and re-launch the Youth Communication Chicago programs.

Chicago Teens need help! I'm a resident of Streeterville and the situation is frightening. My belief is that important programs such as after school activities, all ages shows and mentorship in general has been pretty much eliminated. When you look at the Chicago public School system, and the miss-appropriation of funds it's obvious why organizations that

try to help have no resources! What we have now is teens going wild in the streets, and I believe unless we take positive action things will only get worse!

#### HERE'S THE LATEST DEVELOPMENT IN MY NEIGHBORHOOD

SOAR (Streeterville Organization of Active Residents) is taking aggressive action to stop the teen takeovers in Streeterville, and SOAR's voice has been heard. Yesterday, SOAR President, Deborah Gershbein attended a community leaders meeting with Alderman Brian Hopkins, 18th District Chicago Police Commander Michael Barz, Sergeant Christorpher Schenk, representatives from the Cook County Sheriff's Department and other community leaders from the neighborhood.

She informed them that we cannot and will not tolerate hundreds of teenagers taking over our streets and terrorizing residents, workers and visitors to Streeterville. The situation at Grand and McClurg and surrounding area is outrageous and cannot continue. The commander promised immediate action and Alderman Hopkins has responded by initiating curfew laws and is supportive of the residents. This will be a process but know that the authorities who can make a difference are diligently working on this horrific situation.



I personally wrote to Alderman Hopkins: on June 26th 2024 and said this in my letter:

"Hello Alderman Hopkins, I spoke to James on Thursday,

about Youth Communication Chicago, a 501 C3 non-profit organization since 1976, about painting the walls of the underpass. As a resident of Lakepoint Tower for over 20 years, I was happy to see the wall whitewashed and clean. This project I propose will be done by students under the guidance of esteemed artist/educator, Arturo Barerra, and the title of the work will be: "Imagine What Your World Could Be."

We have funds, although a donation to further aid our students would be an excellent idea. especially since our neighborhood is having terrible youth problems. They need HOPE and mentors. Please consider this offer and let's be part of the solution. Your help would also be an excellent PR opportunity for our community. Sincerely, -Rachael Cain"



Finally on the 19th, after writing again, on the 17th I received this answer! "Sounds like a lot of red tape to me!"

Wow, that's not the reply I expected, since Aldermen are usually the one you go to, to help cut through the red tape. Boy is Hopkins quick to clamp down on teens, and give them no guidance, outlets or hope!

Apart from that, so far It's been a terrific year for me! I'm so very happy to have been able to connect with a lot of like-minded individuals! Old

Thank you for contacting Alderman Hopkins' Office regarding the Grand Avenue underpass.

As the site of any potential mural at this location would be on public property, the permitting process is handled by the Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events (DCASE). The process involves a community input process from the local neighborhood organization, a budget to be established, and the selection of a prequalified artist who is a vendor for the city.


