

#### **Research Seminar (20 hours)**

### OE 2P<sub>1</sub> – Research Seminar (20 hours) (10 sessions 2hr/week)

The choice of research area will alternate between phonology and travel in the medieval world. In the first instance, students will survey the phonological descriptions available of basic sound structures in their mother tongue, carry out field work in the form of interviews and recordings to elicit these sound structures, and compare the samples to the phonological mappings available. In the second instance, they will read around the idea of romance and travel and pick a research question relevant to the texts that considered., The student is expected to work on a paper of about 3000-4000 words in length and present to a viva board

- 1) To enquire into the phonological peculiarities found in an Indian language chosen by the student OR to pick a work centred around travel from the Middle English /Early Modern period.
- 2) Interviews/documentation of citations for these peculiarities/ Perform a close reading of the selected text
- 3) Framing a valid research question
- 4) Surveying and reviewing the literature and evaluating approaches that they embody.
- 5) Writing an abstract
- 6) Writing a Research paper
